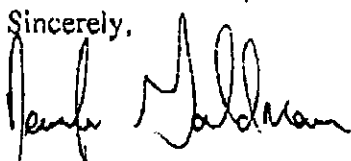

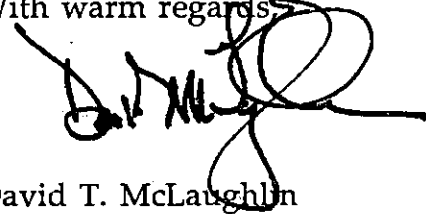

DIVERSITY AND DEMOCRACY

A Symposium of the Aspen Institute and the Gabriel Sherover Foundation

On the Occasion of the International Inauguration of Bet Gabriel:
15-18 March, 1993

Diversity, among individuals, social groups, cultures and states, poses an increasingly acute challenge to both national communities and the international system. Within a growing number of states, the problem of reconciling diverse cultural and social traditions and historical experiences within democratic political structures presents itself insistently in both familiar and unfamiliar guises. In interstate relations, the tension between the prerogatives of states and international norms has become ever more acute in recent years. The Symposium's purpose will be to stimulate reflection and discussion on these challenges from a wide range of perspectives -- including historical, political, cultural, scientific, and religious -- and to explore new approaches to dealing with them.

The Symposium will be composed of two primary elements:

- Major public addresses by international leaders.
- Closed working sessions of a group of approximately 25 leaders from a wide variety of fields -- philosophers, political leaders, historians, corporate leaders, scientists, writers and journalists, religious leaders, and others. Each working session will be introduced by short remarks on aspects of the session's theme by one or two participants.

The Symposium will begin with the official international inaugural ceremony of Bet Gabriel and Keynote Speeches on aspects of the overall Symposium theme. On each of the next two days, there will be a major public address in the morning, followed by two working sessions and a dinner with a major speaker. On the final morning there will be a concluding public session with a summary of the conclusions and recommendations of the earlier working sessions and a concluding Keynote Address.

Working Session 1 will take a broad view of Diversity and Shared Values. It will address diversity from various points of view and raise in general terms the challenge of building the shared values necessary for just and successful communities on a foundation of highly diverse ethnic, cultural and historic traditions.

Working Session 2 will address Diversity within States more specifically with reference to the ways in which democratic institutions can guarantee the rights of diverse elements within a state without weakening their sense of duty to the community and respect for the rights of others. Issues of individual and minority rights, citizen participation, and the role of government will be discussed with reference to particular societies -- such as the United States, the former Soviet Union, Yugoslavia, Israel and others -- which in one way or another currently face problems of this kind.

Working Session 3 will address the issue of Diversity within the International Community. The focus will be on exploring how the diversity of peoples and political systems within states affects the international system. Questions concerning the implementation of international norms, whether already broadly recognized (such as human rights and nuclear non-proliferation) or increasingly asserted within the international community (such as economic or environmental norms) can be peacefully accommodated within a system of interstate relations among states with different political, social, economic and ideological or religious systems.

Working Session 4, on Strategies for Action, will be designed to enable the participants to extract from the previous discussions practical conclusions concerning actions to be taken at all levels of government and society and by different groups to enable democratic systems to cope more successfully with the challenges of diversity.

The concluding session will provide an opportunity for the Chairs and members of the group to present their conclusions to a public session and to hear a concluding keynote speech on the themes of the Symposium.

Following the Symposium, a report will be prepared embodying the addresses and papers presented to the meeting and summaries of the discussions and conclusions of the working sessions. The report will be given a wide international distribution.

Our Lincoln Day Dinner is held on the campus of Purdue University at the Student Union Building. It is usually attended by 400 to 600 hundred people.

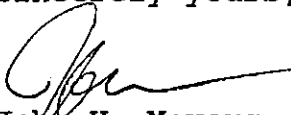

Dear Secretary Baker:

This spring at N.C.S. I will be teaching an advanced placement course in American Politics for juniors and seniors. The class examines politics at an in-depth level, focusing on the motivation behind political actions and the rationale of policy choices. I enjoy teaching it because the students who take it (some of whom are from St. Albans) all do so as an elective and thus are highly interested in the subject matter.

From time to time I try to bring in guest speakers to address the students in various areas of U.S. politics. Frankly, I can think of no one that I would rather have speak than yourself. After hearing you address my class last year at the State Department, I know you relate well with young people and are able to explain, easier than most, complex issues with clarity. What is the Ford Hall Forum?

Since 1908, the Ford Hall Forum has provided a platform from which the current political, social, intellectual, and cultural issues of the day could be discussed and debated. It is a voluntary assembly of the active and thoughtful people of our community without regard to economic, religious, or political differences, for the purpose of exploring all matters of public concern.

The Forum seeks to educate the public by illuminating the basic issues of our times. Its operating concept is simple: to bring to the platform leading authorities and specialists on diverse subjects, and to insist upon the right of audience members to pose questions directly to the speakers.

Now the oldest free public lecture forum in America, the Forum extends its influence nationally over public radio, reaching up to 1,000,000 people.

No Viewpoint Unchallenged

Audiences have been admiring, friendly, and critical, but no viewpoint goes unchallenged. Often two or more speakers present their different opinions and debate a current issue. Whether speaking alone or with others, every speaker is subject to the scrutiny of a lively and involved audience. Among the areas covered are politics, anthropology, sociology, philosophy, science, education, economics, literature, international relations, medical ethics, law, morality, and the burning issues of the day. The entire spectrum of attitudes and opinions from ultra-liberal to arch-conservative is presented. Indeed, it has been a source of constant gratification to the Forum over the years to be the target of criticism from forces of Left and Right for presenting unpopular points of view. This is precisely what the Forum is all about.

Who Listens?

The Ford Hall Forum serves a diverse constituency. Its audience is comprised of the elderly, the middle-aged and the young of all races, religions, ethnic backgrounds and economic levels, not only in Boston and New England, but throughout the country. Generations of students attending Greater Boston colleges have found the Forum to be a vital adjunct to their education, and a source of intellectual ferment. The Forum has members who have attended its sessions for as long as 40 years, and children and grandchildren of early Forum members are now regular attendees of the programs. Also, through its continuing efforts to interest and involve the public, the Forum welcomes many new people to its programs for the first time each year.

The Importance of the Forum

An informed citizenry is vital to a democracy. Yet most Americans obtain their news from television, edited into brief segments that can't explore an issue in depth or fully examine a speaker's statements. The Forum, in contrast, presents expert speakers with the time to explain their beliefs and support their assertions.

In addition, conventional forms of communication—the printed word, radio and television—give an audience no means of responding or questioning. The Forum supplies this added dimension through the unique opportunity to question and challenge these experts and opinion-makers.

Another unusual aspect of the Forum is its use of audience participation in the selection of speakers through regularly distributed program request forms. These, plus unsolicited letters of recommendation, are used in choosing topics and speakers. They keep the Forum in touch with citizens' deep concerns about current issues and place Forum programming at the forefront of public opinion.

Even as it changes to keep pace with the times and adds services to reach more people, the Forum remains true to its original principles: it is free to the public, it provides an open question period for members of the audience, and it presents many points of view in a non-partisan atmosphere.

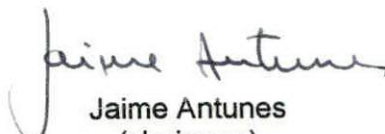

We hope that you will be able to accept this very deserving and a well earned award during our March 17 - 18, 1993 World Leadership Conference.

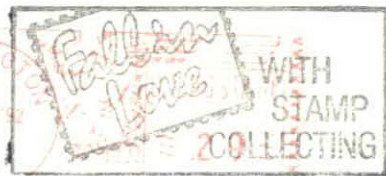
