Campaign Concerns Prompt White House To Drop Waste Plan

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 — The White House has dropped a proposal to allow manufacturers to dispose of hazardous wastes in town dumps, senior Bush Administration officials said today, because of concern that the Bush campaign has become vulnerable to democratic charges on the environment.

The decision was made by the White House chief of staff, James A. Baker. Aides said he was worried about campaign charges that the Administration has tilted away from environmental protection. It struck down a proposal championed by the Council on Competitiveness, a cabinet-level group headed by Vice President Dan Quayle, which in the last 15 months has successfully advocated relaxing environmental regulations deemed to be needlessly burdensome to business.

Two senior White House officials said Mr. Baker was personally involved in the internal debate over the proposal, which would have allowed businesses to treat millions of tons of dangerous chemical wastes the same as household garbage and dispose of the material in ordinary landfills. Businesses are now required to detoxify such wastes carefully and bury them in special disposal sites or burn them in licensed toxic-waste incinerators.

The officials, who spoke on condition

of anonymity, said Mr. Baker was worried that the Administration's yearlong effort to relax economically burdensome environmental rules had "tilted out of balance" and might become a political liability. In particular, the officials said, Mr. Baker was concerned about Mr. Bush's latest campaign promise on the environment, a pledge made in the Pacific Northwest two weeks ago to rewrite the Endangered Species Act to reduce protection for wild habitats and threatened species when jobs were at stake.

The decision to drop the proposal was made on Monday, a day before several prominent Democrats, among them Senator Max Baucus of Montana and Gov. Roy Romo of Colorado, were scheduled to hold a news conference to attack the proposal as a threat to public health and the environment that could increase the poisoning of the nation's ground water. At the news conference they said their criticism influenced the Administration to withdraw the proposal.

Senator Al Gore, the Democratic nominee for Vice President, issued a statement today that said the Administration's decision to withdraw the proposal was "an election year flip-flop that reflects the phony environmentalism that has marked the Bush-Quayle Administration."

The Administration's action is a blow to Vice President Quayle, who has often been at odds with Mr. Baker on policy issues. Mr. Quayle and the young staff of his Council on Competitiveness seized command of the Administra-

tion's agenda on the environment in the middle of 1991 by convincing President Bush that billions of dollars and thousands of jobs could be saved through accelerating the development of timber, oil, coal and other minerals, and by reducing the reach of environmental regulations.

Vice President's Reaction

A spokesman for Mr. Quayle said today that dropping the rule was a single decision and did not indicate that the Administration was going to withdraw its support for speeding up commercial development of natural resources or for reducing environmental regulations it considers harmful to business.

"The Environmental Protection Agency received hundreds of comments and they felt it was appropriate to take the action they did," said Jeffrey A. Mesbitz, the spokesman, who said the issue could be taken up again after the election. "We don't see this as the start of a trend."

But officials of the E.P.A., the Department of the Interior and the Department of Agriculture said today that other proposals written by the Competitiveness Council and approved by Mr. Bush are also undergoing scrutiny by Mr. Baker's staff, including one proposed in August 1991 that would open half the nation's wetlands to development.

In the background of the Administration's decision on Monday lies a tangled political and legal history of the nation's program to manage and dispose of its most dangerous chemical wastes safely. In 1980, the chemical

industry challenged two of the most important new rules the E.P.A. had issued under the 1976 Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, the nation's hazardous waste law.

One rule said that if a hazardous waste was mixed with other wastes, the resulting mixture was hazardous and must be treated and carefully disposed of. The other rule says any sludges, residues or other byproducts from treating hazardous wastes are also considered hazardous by the Government unless there is proof that they are not.

The two rules cover 45 million to 50 million tons of hazardous wastes generated each year, mostly by manufacturers, according to Dr. Joan B. Berkowitz, an independent market analyst in Washington, who based her estimate on her own research and figures provided by the Environmental Protection Agency. The Shell Oil Company and many other companies argued that much of this waste is dirt or sand or other materials that contain insignificant amounts of chemicals, and is not a health or environmental threat, yet costs industry billions of dollars to treat, burn or bury.

Last December, the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit threw out the two rules, saying they had been issued improperly by the E.P.A. The court said the E.P.A. could reissue the rules, but must begin a formal process to write new ones.

Four Administration officials, who were involved in writing the new rule but who also refused to be identified,

described the internal struggle that accompanied the development of the proposal.

The competitiveness council, directed by David M. McIntosh, and conservative economists in the Office of Management and Budget, led by Art Fraas, heavily influenced the process of writing the new rule.

Mr. McIntosh and Mr. Fraas proposed measures that would have essentially allowed manufacturers to regulate themselves by deciding entire classes of wastes were not hazardous according to the Administration officials. Those wastes would have been allowed to be placed in municipal landfills at much lower costs than disposing of them in licensed hazardous-waste dumps or through incineration.

The proposal drew 650 comments from environmental groups, manufacturers, energy companies and the hazardous-waste-treatment industry. Nearly all of them opposed the measure proposed by the budget office and the competitiveness council, said Don R. Clay, the Assistant E.P.A. Administrator for Solid Waste and Emergency Response.

Before the decision of Monday, William K. Reilly, the Administrator of the E.P.A., had unsuccessfully fought for months to have the Competitiveness Council's ideas dropped from the proposal. When Mr. Baker took control of the President's campaign in August, Mr. Reilly appealed again to Robert E. Grady, a member of Mr. Baker's staff. Mr. Grady, who had been executive associate director of the Office of Management and Budget, has long been Mr. Reilly's closest ally in the White House.

We strongly supported Mr. Bush's presentation in Colville, Washington last month when he spoke on behalf of the timber workers of the Pacific Northwest and Northern California.

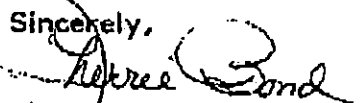
We strongly support him in his bid for re-election and have worked closely with his campaign headquarters in Bellevue, Washington.
