Dear Mr. Baker:

It is my continuing belief that a majority of the public remain thinking persons who, when facts are brought to their attention, can see the reasonableness of the premise and will respond much more positively than they will to the "blame game". Hopefully you will recognize the value of this suggestion and take immediate steps to get it forcefully advertised.

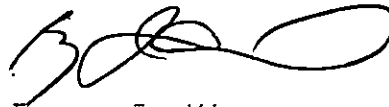

I appreciate your concerns about Bank of America's policy regarding charitable contributions to the Boy Scouts organization. I'd like to explain the reasoning behind the bank's stand on this issue.

Our decision was reached after a great deal of internal discussion. It was made based on a policy that has existed at Bank of America since 1978 and was not in response to any external pressures on the bank.

Both the Boy Scouts and Bank of America have been serving their communities for more than 80 years. We believe the Scouts are a great organization that plays a vital role in our communities. By taking this action, we are not trying to tell the Boy Scouts what to do. The Scouts will continue to determine what is in the best interests of their organization.

Bank of America, however, has a policy that all persons shall have equal opportunity and access to Bank of America facilities, activities and employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, handicap, marital status or sexual orientation. Based on this policy, we believe it is inappropriate for Bank of America to make charitable contributions to any organization inconsistent with the principles that govern our own operations.

Page Two

Bank of America was founded on the principle of serving all people. When the bank opened for business in 1904 it reached out to Italian immigrants in San Francisco's North Beach neighborhood who were largely ignored by established banks at the time. Today, our customers include people from all walks of life, at all income levels, with a rich diversity of beliefs and lifestyles. Inclusion is simply part of Bank of America's heritage.

We will continue to conduct United Way campaigns and employees will be able to continue their support of the Scouts through the Donor Designation program at United Way. We also hope and expect that our decision with regard to charitable funds will not diminish the voluntary efforts that many of our employees have made, and will no doubt continue to make, on behalf of the Boy Scouts and the fine work that the organization does.

Again, thank you for taking the time to express your thoughts on this matter. This issue notwithstanding, our objective, as it always has been, is to provide our customers with the best products and best service we can give. We appreciate your patronage and hope that we can continue to serve you.

Dear Mr. Mullane:

I read your letter dated June 30, 1992 and have carefully considered your reasonings. First of all, I agree with you that all persons, including homosexuals, should have equal opportunity and access to the B of A facilities. That is not my grievance.

What I disagree with your organization is so called equal opportunity without regard to "sexual orientation" clause. What I object to is an attempt to project, or proselytize, if you will, sex between man and man or woman and woman as being normal and trying to cram this view down everyone's throat.

It's akin to a Christian couple trying to rent an apartment from a Jewish landlord and demanding that he (a Jew) change his religion before they can rent the apartment from him. That's exactly what's happening with the Gay Pride Week and the organizations like the ACTUP and others.

Where will it stop? If Jane wants to have sex with Bruno, her dog, will she qualify for a protected minority status? What about pedophiles? Great many pedophiles, by definition, are also homosexuals and bisexuals. By your logic, they should all be covered by your sexual orientation clause with special protected minority status.

The fact that B of A can make any charitable contributions at all is due to the patronage of many customers like myself who fundamentally disagree with your "sexual orientation" clause; because we view it as an attempt at special privilege based on immoral behavior at that.

In response to your earlier letter expressing concern about Bank of America's charitable contributions to the Boy Scouts, we are pleased to inform you that the Scouting organization is once again eligible for donations from the bank.

It is our understanding, based on communications with the national leadership of the Boy Scouts, that the opportunity to become a Scout is open to all boys who subscribe to the Boy Scout oath and law, Cub Scout promise, or Explorer code (Exploring includes teenage girls.)

Our contribution policy allows us to make donations only to those organizations that provide full access and equal opportunity to all members of the class the organization is designed to serve. The Scouting organization, being open, under the above criteria, to all boys, which is the class it is designed to serve, meets the bank's contributions standards. The Scouting organization has the prerogative of establishing guidelines for those qualified to serve as adult leaders. Under our contributions policy, the Boy Scouts' eligibility for charitable contributions from BankAmerica is determined by its policy toward youth membership, not adult leadership. I hope this information clears up any concerns you may have had about this issue.

### Presidential Campaign

- ① I had written to your friend to lower Federal discount to 3% in 1991 and to 1% in 1992 and not to reappoint Alan Greenspan as Chairman last year. I had persuaded George Mitchell to make Federal Reserve Board as responsible to Administration. You have created an irresponsible government by creating Boards independent of President. The dollar should be talked down to 100 yen in spite of its inflationary component. To strengthen our export drive.
- ② When our competitors have tax based healthcare in Japan & Germany, and Canada has a common market with USA, fifty romance consortia is not enough to prevent GM shifting the plant from California to Quebec, so President should agree to permit States

to introduce tax based health care without any federal assistance, except for enabling arrangements for taking care of interstate transfer of insurance from consortia to free medical care States. If he does not make this compromise, Big Business and Big labor will combine forces against the President. However, the President should offer it as a potential compromise in his second term, recognising the pull of Canada for transferring US industries to Canada. Thus he should put in a reservation that eventually Canada would come around to Consortium approach. Thus he could <sup>get</sup> support of both insurance Companies.

- (3) The President should endorse the proposal of Governor Brown for two flat-rate taxes - 15% personal consumption tax and 15% value added tax if
- (a) Congress agrees to remove payroll tax and (b) restores to States the sovereignty usurped in 1930's as an emergency measure transferring all "the programs" made under "general welfare" provision as misinterpreted by

by the Supreme Court under pressure. The substitution of personal consumption tax is an idea of Lester Thurow who also sponsors "industrial policy". But it would be a shrewd move to tax consumption rather than income so that capital gains will not figure in income tax.

- ④ Finally <sup>you</sup> should indicate your wish to recruit Lester Thurow to replace Michael Boskin for the second term; also open negotiations with Ravi Batta who predicted this depression. He may help both U.S. economy and U.S. relations with developing nations like India. Persuade your friend the President to express the hope of recruiting both Lester Thurow and Ravi Batta. Also Treasury Secretary Brady needs to be replaced by somebody forceful <sup>person</sup> like Carla Hills or Governor Brown.

- ⑤ You have already talked to Ross Perot; offer him Directorship of Budget and Management if he is willing to help in downsizing Federal Govt. to pre-1930 levels when state powers were illegally transferred to Federal

by Good by a Supreme Court under duress.  
Since the 50 States have the ordinary  
sovereignty, you should propose associate  
membership in UN with voice in the  
various committees so that they begin  
to exercise the functions of ordinary

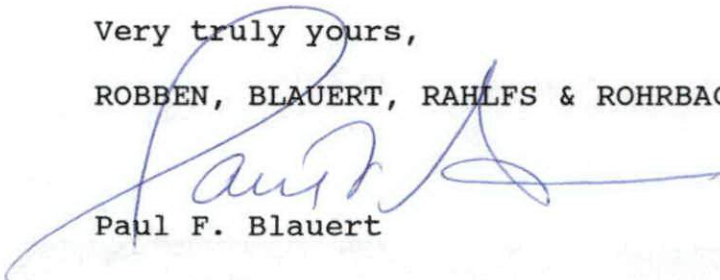
Throughout the presidential campaign there have been various characterizations of Governor Bill Clinton such as "Slick Willie" etc.

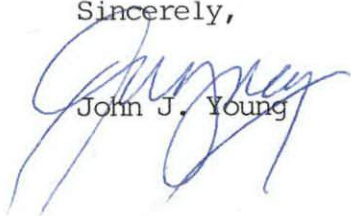

## THE MOST UNDERVALUED ASSET IN THE WORLD

The U.S. dollar.

### MAJOR EXAMPLE—AND A MAJOR MISTAKE

PRESIDENT BUSH should take his campaign cues from British Prime Minister John Major, who earlier this year won an upset victory in the face of an economy far worse than our own. Major slammed his opponents for their vow to raise taxes.

George Bush has made his point on family values. And Governor Clinton's slithering on free trade, his draft evasion, etc., will do the Republicans' work on the character issue. But people remain worried about the economy. The President must emphasize that growth can come only from reducing the tax burden, not increasing it.

But the Administration blundered badly by passing

up the opportunity to issue an executive order indexing capital gains for inflation. Charles J. Cooper, former assistant attorney general, recently rendered a legal opinion concluding that the President had the authority to do this without legislation. Instead of letting the matter be decided by the courts, the Administration flinched.

Politically, the issue was a winner. Why should farmers, homeowners, stockholders pay tax on fictitious gains? This only destroys capital. Because of high taxes, capital is locked in old investments. Indexing for inflation would liberate considerable sums for new ventures, which create most of the new jobs in our economy.

### ROTTEN REGULATIONS BEGET ROTTEN FRUIT

HAVING PUNTED ON indexing capital gains, the President can still strike a smaller but edifying blow for prosperity. The Department of Agriculture has a raft of regulations, some left over from the Depression era, that cost consumers dearly and are literally wasteful.

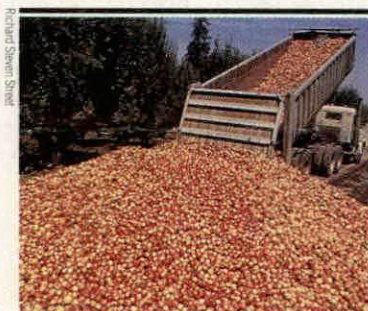
In California recently, growers of peaches and nectarines had to let tons of fruit rot. Why? Because the Agriculture Department decreed a minimum size that these fruits must be before consumers are allowed to buy them. So growers with smaller than regula-

tion-size fruit were threatened with criminal sanctions if they tried to sell them to the public, even though their peaches and nectarines were both edible and nutritious. And on what did the Aggies base these regulations? Only a hunch that consumers wouldn't buy the small stuff.

Why can't consumers make their own decisions?

The real reason for these regulations is to reduce supply to keep prices high.

The President has the authority to abolish these kinds of controls. He should promptly do so.



This doesn't help consumers.

### NONSTARTER

THE MUCH PUBLICIZED Perot plan for solving our budget deficit crisis misfires. It assumes the problem is simply a matter of raising taxes and curbing spending. It betrays an utter lack of understanding of what is behind the deficit.

The goal of government policy should be simple: Encourage the economy to grow as rapidly as it naturally can. Perot's scheme, with its burdensome array of new taxes, would reduce growth, not boost it. Perot et al. don't grasp the fact that taxes are not only a means of collecting revenue but also a price. If the price for productive economic behavior is too high, there will be less of it.

When Reagan slashed income tax rates, federal receipts grew mightily. The portion of the income tax take paid by the rich went up impressively.

Perot ignores the systemic causes of federal spending growth.

**Medicare.** Cutting benefits is a superficial solution. The problem with soaring medical costs is the way they are financed. Free-market solutions would curb runaway costs more effectively than government price controls. They would also not destroy medical research and development.

**Social Security.** You would never know it from the

rhetoric of Perot and others, but the system is in surplus. Not until sometime into the next century are outlays projected to exceed revenues. To keep the system solvent, payroll taxes should be cut, encouraging job creation. A strong economy is the best guarantee for future payments. Another reform: Give people the choice of either accepting the current payment formula or investing their Social Security taxes in an IRA-like account. These monies could then be pumped into the private economy by millions of individuals. This, too, would strengthen the nation.

**Interest paid on the national debt.** A reduction of 1% in interest rates would save \$40 billion a year. A modernized version of the gold-based monetary system that we had until 1971 would lop tens of billions of dollars from the budget. With such a scheme, homeowners could once again get mortgages at 6%. Long-term government bonds could be floated at 4% to 5%.

**Congress' propensity to spend.** The best way to curb it is not with exhortations or a balanced budget amendment. The President should exercise the line-item veto, a power

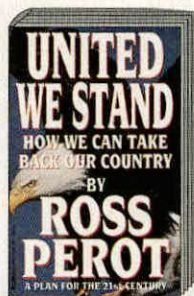
43 governors possess. Appropriations are now lumped together in huge packages that make vetoes difficult.

An indirect but more potent reform: term limits. Studies show that the more seniority a legislator has, the more likely he or she is to vote for more spending and more taxes.

**Highway and other infrastructure expenditures.** Let private companies finance and operate more of these. The new highway bill has provisions to encourage this. Mexico and other countries are already doing it.

#### Other budget deficit reducers:

- Pull capital expenditures out of the budget. Businesses and most states do that already. You can more easily highlight and analyze what is useful and what is pork.
- Change our horrific legal tort system, which is costing the economy some \$200 billion per year (a sluggish economy hurts tax revenue).
- Give parents true choice of which schools to send their children to. Better education means better human capital, which means a better economy for everyone.



## LEGAL SNOOPS

DID YOU KNOW that any federal agency can poke through your telephone toll records without your knowledge and without a warrant, even if you are under no suspicion for a crime? Casual fishing expeditions are now routine; federal agents have pawed through their colleagues' phone accounts to find out who might be talking to reporters.

Years ago the Supreme Court ruled that information about whom you called and who called you belonged not to you but to the telephone company. Congress should tighten rules under which government agents can examine your phone records. The regulations ought to be no more lenient than those governing wiretapping.

Here is the distilled wisdom of brothers Bob, Kip and Tim, and other FORBES eatery experts Jeff Cunningham and Tom Jones.

● **The Quilted Giraffe**—550 Madison Ave., at 55th St. (Tel: 593-1221). Still one of New York's finest. Chef/proprietor Barry Wine turns out extraordinary fare with élan. He's into Japanese styling, unafraid to use some of his oddball Japanese ceramics that complement his postmodern secessionist interior. The Kobe beef truly does melt in your mouth, and even the fat is meant to be eaten.

● **Borsalino**—255 W. 55th St. (Tel: 246-0710). An effusive PR letter raised expectations to unrealistic levels. Carpaccio chilled to the point of flavorlessness. Spinach and ricotta ravioli excessively chewy.

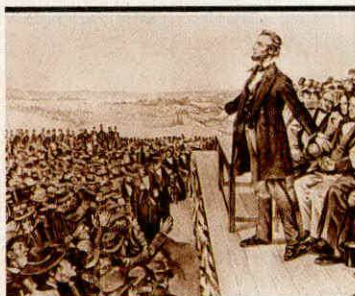

**INTRODUCTION**

Mr. President, at this time four years ago, my neighbor, Tom Fawell, and I hosted a fund raising party for you at our homes in Oak Brook, Illinois. Some of them have been out of work for as long as two years.

A focussed plan of action is needed now. We do not see the current economic situation changing quickly and see some extremely painful times ahead. In the past, the average American was somewhat apathetic

as to what our congressmen, senators, and government were doing because they were not personally affected by the decisions made by the leaders of our country. That is changing very rapidly, people want answers, and they want answers now. Instead of a government of the people, by the people, and for the people, we have a government of the few, by the few, and for the few. My fellow Americans and I feel that unless there are drastic changes made immediately, there is a potential for a revolution of the people so that the government will be held accountable by the people. Previously, people were not substantially affected personally by the decisions of government. Today tens of millions of people are now directly affected by the actions the government has taken. The campaign rhetoric that is going on by both political camps addressing issues of draft dodging, personal integrity, and broken promises is not important to us. This is no longer what the people out of work and the man in the street want to hear. They want to hear about jobs. The leaders of our country must be very specific as to not only what you intend to do, but how you intend to do it. Enclosed is an outline of the issues that we believe must be presented directly to the people immediately in order to turn the tide of this election.

### **PROPOSED SOLUTIONS**

The government must immediately take people off welfare and unemployment roles and put them to work. Every able-bodied citizen in the United States that is capable of working should be put to work immediately, and along with working, they should pay taxes. The government should start creative workfare programs on a broad scale at all levels of skill and all classes of Americans. The streets in the major cities are cluttered with litter, in some cases a foot deep, empty lots are strewn with garbage, abandoned buildings are everywhere, and yet some people are sitting at home, doing nothing, and collecting welfare checks. Many of these welfare cases have been going on for generation after generation. These unemployed people should be requested to meet at a specific location within their neighborhoods, put on buses, taken to these areas of blight, and clean up the streets with brooms and shovels. They should clean up the empty lots, clean up the abandoned buildings, get rid of the infestation of rats, vermin, and undesirable people that habituate these abandoned buildings. There should no longer be any free rides for capable workers. Give them a job -- not a handout. If all Americans are working, we will substantially reduce crime. People need to be engaged in some kind of hard work in order to feel a sense of personal satisfaction, dignity, and self worth. Anyone who is not working and is living with unusually high standards should be suspect.

### **PRODUCTIVE USE OF UNUSED GOVERNMENT FACILITIES**

Throughout the United States, there are hundreds of thousands of homeless people sleeping on the streets. In many cases, whole families are homeless. This is ridiculous when we have so many government buildings and military installations that are no longer used or needed. Great Lakes Naval Base just north of Chicago is a typical example. These unused facilities should not be closed, but should be converted

to house and feed the homeless and the aged. They should also be used for job training of the unskilled. Why can't we do this today...here in Chicago and across America?

#### **OTHER ISSUES**

Giving people jobs is, I believe, the most important issue today. However, we must also reduce, and ultimately eliminate, the federal deficit starting now. Government waste and entitlement programs can further be reduced by approval of the line-item veto. Many constitutional scholars believe that the President already has the authority for the line-item veto without the approval of Congress. Military spending can be cut to provide funding of programs to relieve the plight of the unemployed, homeless, and impoverished. We fully support you and your positions on these issues.

#### **METHOD OF PRESENTATION TO THE VOTERS**

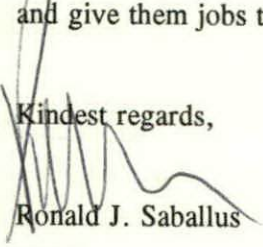

Ask the voters, if they agree, to call their representative and insist that all people be put to work now. We, the people, are no longer apathetic about government. The people will heed your call and insist that their representatives respond to their needs. Since many Americans do not even know the names of their representatives, provide an 800 line to inform them about who their representatives are and how they can be reached. If you help the people to be heard, they will respond. We know that America can get back to work, and you are our hope for the future. We, the people, believe that if you take this approach for the remaining days of the campaign, the voters will overwhelmingly support your positions.

#### **CONCLUSION**

We know there are many elected representatives and special interest groups who can give many reasons why these things cannot be done. We must not listen to what can't be done but direct our efforts toward what can be accomplished and what will be supported by the masses.

Please help us -- we need you to lead. We will rise up and do our part. Please give the people dignity and give them jobs today.

**OUTLINE OF ISSUES  
PRESENTED TO THE PEOPLE  
OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA**

- 1) Every able-bodied man and woman will be put to work immediately by the government.
- 2) The workers should be paid an amount equal to or slightly higher than welfare or unemployment payments plus the amount which will be assessed for taxes. The skilled and experienced individuals should be paid slightly more and should be used as supervisors and teachers to the inexperienced.
- 3) There will be an elimination of welfare and unemployment payments for all but those in school and those physically unable to work -- there will be no more free rides.
- 4) The workers will be involved in programs similar to the workfare programs now taking place in various states. It is ridiculous that people should be out of work while the streets and empty lots of our cities are littered with garbage and debris. These people should be employed to clean up the streets and vacant lots and to demolish the abandoned buildings, and then they should be trained to build new buildings in their place. These new buildings will provide affordable housing for the poor and homeless.
- 5) The unemployed clerical and professional people should be used to train others in their professions and should be used to process the clerical, accounting, and legal documents necessary for proper administration of the work programs.
- 6) The unemployed engineers, architects, and designers can be used to assess the deteriorating bridges, roads, sewer systems, water systems, railroads, airports, and infrastructures of our cities.
- 7) Many free regional day care centers will be established to care for the children of unemployed mothers. There will no longer be advantages to having more children just to increase the welfare checks. Many mothers can be employed in the day care centers to care for and help educate the children. The rest will go to work and learn a skill.
- 8) Learning centers will be established for the inexperienced. The inexperienced will be given crash courses in typing, word processing, nursing assistance, food preparation, etc.
- 9) Skilled tradesmen will work side by side with unskilled workers. The skilled tradesmen will be paid slightly higher wages and will teach the unskilled workers a trade or profession.

- 10) All workers will be encouraged to seek employment in the private sector and will be given substantial incentives to do so.
- 11) Incentives will be given to encourage individuals to start their own business and employ others.
- 12) The unused and unneeded military and government installations will be converted or changed to housing for the elderly and homeless. Some of these government facilities can be converted to nursing homes and the able-bodied citizens employed to serve the incapacitated and elderly. This will provide jobs, and poor elderly people will be allowed to live out their remaining years with dignity. It will also reduce the health care costs for the aged.
- 13) As these government installations are converted and made operational, there will be programs to encourage privatization of these facilities so the government responsibility can be reduced.

If we do the above, we will have:

- 1) Most Americans employed.
- 2) Minimal welfare and unemployment costs.
- 3) Increase in taxes by having a broader tax base.
- 4) There will be little excuse for homeless people.
- 5) Crime will be reduced because people will be earning wages, have dignity, and less free time to get into trouble.
- 6) We can better identify the criminals because they will be living with unusually high standards while not working.
- 7) America will be the most productive country in the world.
- 8) There should be less mortgage foreclosures and a resulting stability of the banking system.
- 9) Obsolete and unused military facilities will again be used for productive purposes with no loss of personnel.
- 10) The American public will be trained and learn skills.
- 11) New businesses will flourish.
- 12) Spendable income for families and individuals will increase.
- 13) We will be a kinder, gentler nation of Americans with dignity.

Dear Mr. Baker,

Re: The Upcoming Debates and the Foreign Tax Avoidance Issue

Several news reports have indicated that Gov. Clinton plans to denigrate the Administration for not doing more to collect taxes from foreign-controlled corporations operating in the United States. As one who has worked closely with Internal Revenue Service officials on this matter, I want to share my recollection of the President's efforts to step up enforcement in this area.

In July 1990 the oversight subcommittee of the House Ways and Means Committee held hearings on tax avoidance by foreign-controlled corporations, after an investigation of the tax returns of 36 foreign-controlled companies found that half paid little or no taxes over a 10-year period. Estimates of the uncollected taxes owed by all foreign-controlled corporations ranged from \$15 billion to \$25 billion per tax year.

As the ranking member of the Treasury Appropriations subcommittee, which has jurisdiction over the IRS, I contacted then-IRS Commissioner Fred Goldberg and found that he shared my belief that more needed to be done. Working with the IRS, I developed an amendment which became part of the *Treasury, Postal Service, and General Government Appropriations Bill, 1991*, to provide an additional \$10 million in Fiscal Year 1991 for the IRS to target those foreign-controlled subsidiaries which were not paying their fair share of taxes. At the insistence of the Senate, that language was weakened in conference to specify only that amounts above those provided in Fiscal Year 1990 would be spent on international enforcement efforts.

I countered with additional language which allowed the IRS to establish a task force comprised of senior IRS attorneys, accountants, and economists dedicated to enforcement activities related to U.S. subsidiaries of foreign-controlled corporations. President Bush signed this conference report into law (Pub. L. 101-509) and Commissioner Goldberg and others set out quickly to utilize the new authority.

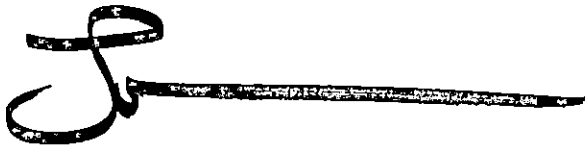
At the same time, the IRS stepped up its multilateral efforts to increase compliance by foreign-controlled companies with U.S. tax laws, including the exchange of tax information. The IRS also devoted additional resources to obtaining advanced pricing agreements, where the IRS negotiates in advance with foreign taxpayers in order to lock in a description of inter-company transactions so that IRS can better obtain the taxes owed.

Earlier this year, again with the assistance and support of officials at the IRS, I offered an amendment to the *Treasury, Postal Service, General Government Appropriations Bill, 1993*, which would allow the IRS to hire experienced attorneys to litigate actions against foreign corporations. This provision, which is included in the conference report that has been forwarded for the President's signature, will level the playing field for the United States against foreign-controlled subsidiaries, which have traditionally hired top-flight lawyers when they go to court against the IRS.

I hope that this review of the facts, which indicates the President's strong record in enforcing United States law where foreign-controlled corporations do not pay their fair share of taxes, is helpful if this issue comes up in the weeks ahead. Feel free to call on me if I can be of assistance on this or other matters.

## Mr. Clinton and the Draft

**B**ILL CLINTON'S draft record continues to be congenial ground for President Bush's reelection drive. The president confounded press and political anticipation yesterday that he would directly attack Mr. Clinton's record and account of his record. But the speech he gave was crafted to reflect on that record by implication in every line. Having previously derided Gov. Clinton as "the commander of the Arkansas National Guard"—a term he used in a comic way—he now chose to address the National Guard Association in Utah with no derision and to sing its praises—and to celebrate Vice President Dan Quayle's Vietnam-era Guard service. Even as he said he would not deliver the attack that some had expected on the Clinton draft record, he observed that there is "a lot of controversy swirling about service to country, about using influence to avoid the military." (That last word, "military," had a touch of art to it: Mr. Quayle did not avoid the military though, like Mr. Clinton, he did avoid the draft.) Mr. Bush went on, fairly, to underline a requirement to hold to the "highest standard" anyone taking on the commander in chief's burden of sending American soldiers into battle.

Maybe it will help the president to have his party and the press keep the draft issue alive. It's certainly not going to help Mr. Clinton, particularly if it throws him on the defensive, which is one part of its purpose. But our sense is that people pretty well already understand what Mr. Clinton did, in which case it may be less exploitable as an issue than Mr. Bush thinks.

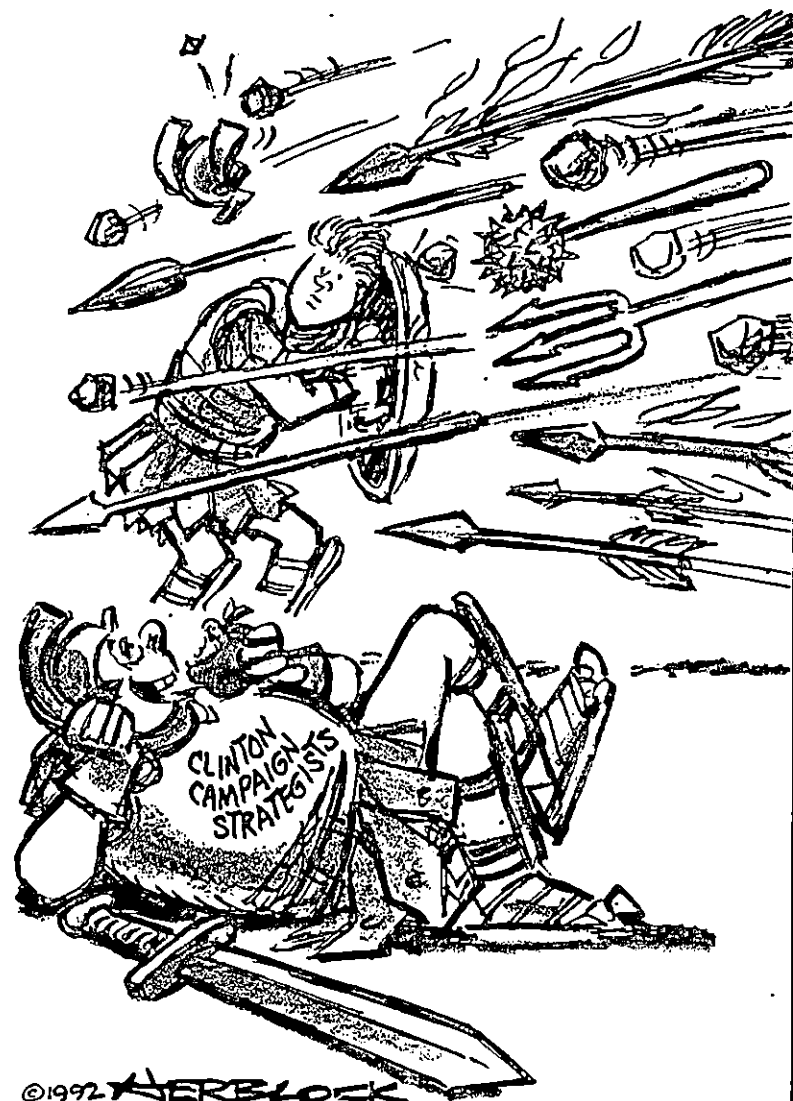
It's clear that Mr. Clinton tried to avoid the draft as

it approached, and ended up with a deferment on the strength of a promise to join an ROTC unit he had no great desire to join. A few months later, apparently uncomfortable at what he had done, he gave up the deferment and reexposed himself to the draft. By that time his chances of being drafted were less but still not entirely negligible; they came to depend on a lottery. He drew a high number and escaped. The governor has not been eager to discuss this subject; yesterday, for instance, following the president to the Utah podium, he skipped over any mention of it. On certain points, he has, in our judgment, fudged the truth, but for the most part, when forced to discuss the difficult subject, he has been straight enough that there can be no doubt what happened.

The question for the country is whether what he did at the time and what he has said since are disqualifying. Mr. Bush's hope is plainly yes; our sense, on the strength of the record so far, is no. A lot of good people were torn over that war; a lot of Americans came to think that it was morally wrong; and plenty of members of Mr. Clinton's generation, including some now prominent in both parties, managed in one way or another to avoid it. None of that was pretty, but it would be a strange final cost of that war to allow it to read a large part of an entire generation out of national politics.

People will reach their own judgment of Mr. Clinton's character, just as they will of the president's. Both need to be reached in the light of an entire life's record, and in the light of the country's current needs.

## Serbia: Lies and War

**N**O SOONER had Bosnia's Serbs given their latest word to calm the conflict than, faithful to pattern, they broke it. Ignoring the letter, they did not park all their tanks and heavy weapons under international surveillance. Ignoring the spirit, they rained more death on Sarajevo. It is true, as it almost always is in the old Yugoslavia, that the other side, in this case Bosnia's desperate and abandoned Muslims, contributed to the provocation and the slaughter. But it is also true, as it almost always is, that the Serbs—in Serbia proper and in Bosnia—were disproportionately responsible both for the causes and the casualties in this latest deadly surge. The Serbs are in a class by themselves as the party of lies and war.

In Geneva, nonetheless, the European Community and United Nations have now managed to draw Muslims, Serbs and Croats from Bosnia into a setting of diplomatic exchange. These officials are not sitting with each other. But at the least a formal framework has been initiated in which international expectations for a reduction of savagery can be channeled and sustained. Some fresh commitments to permit relief were obtained yesterday.

Serbian leader Slobodan Milosevic is almost universally regarded as an immense obstacle to peace. Much Western and American thinking

centers on how he can be removed from power. One new approach is to explore what can be done to support Milan Panic, president of the rump Yugoslavia that groups Serbia and Montenegro, as a peace-minded challenger to the far more powerful war-minded Milosevic. The unlikely Mr. Panic, an American industrialist, is showing a taste for the role.

A second approach goes to the urgent and feasible requirement of further tightening the United Nations' economic embargo of Serbia. Mr. Milosevic tries to turn the sanctions to his own propagandistic purposes. But a tighter embargo would at once crimp Belgrade's war-making capacity and perhaps encourage Serbs who believe Mr. Milosevic has led their country into catastrophe as well as dishonor.

A lagging third avenue is to alter the military equation. The idea of establishing a no-fly zone that would keep Serbia's dominant and aggressive air force out of Bosnian skies is under discussion. So is the idea of providing or permitting a flow of arms to Bosnia, which must face a far superior Serb force. However these discussions proceed, there is no point to go around insisting, as some do, that military force has no role. Let Mr. Milosevic and others not constantly be told what the West is not going to do against him.

## High Interest, Low Interest

**I**N THE COLLISION yesterday between the IMF and the Bush administration, the IMF was right. Nicholas Brady, the secretary of the Treasury, came before the annual meeting of the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank to press, once again, for lower interest rates. Shortly before he spoke, Michel Camdessus, the managing director of the IMF, had called that "the most serious mistake we could make today."

The great issue hanging over this year's financial meeting is the low economic growth in the rich industrial countries and what to do about it. The meeting isn't producing much in the way of answers, but it is certainly illustrating some of the differences that divide the people who make policy. Those differences have been greatly sharpened by the immensely disruptive currency crisis in Europe, and one element in that crisis was the disparity between high interest on short-term debt in Germany and low interest here.

The Bush administration, frantic to get the American economy growing faster, has been consistently drumming on the Federal Reserve Board and the commercial banks to get rates still lower. The Federal Reserve's German counterpart, the Bundesbank, is keeping rates up because it's worried about inflation. The real

source of the trouble in both countries is that their governments are running huge deficits, the Germans since reunification two years ago and the Americans since 1982. As Mr. Camdessus pointed out, it's not tight monetary policy but those big deficits that have rattled the markets and impeded growth. Governments, incidentally, can influence only short-term interest rates. It's long-term loans that build factories, power plants and schools, and long-term interest rates are about the same in this country as in Germany.

To get those rates down safely, without raising inflation in Germany or anywhere else, it's going to be necessary to get the deficits down first. Americans are reluctant to try to do it in a period of high unemployment, for they fear it would mean even higher unemployment for a while. But Mr. Camdessus urged the high-deficit countries to run that risk. Otherwise, he warned, things will only get worse.

A forceful drive to reduce deficits would mean that even the long-term interest rates will fall and—"in time," he said—that will offset the effects of budgetary austerity. Time, unfortunately, is what politicians both here and in Germany are running out of. That's why this week's international monetary meetings are turning out to be unusually scratchy and unproductive.

## The U.N. Needs Work

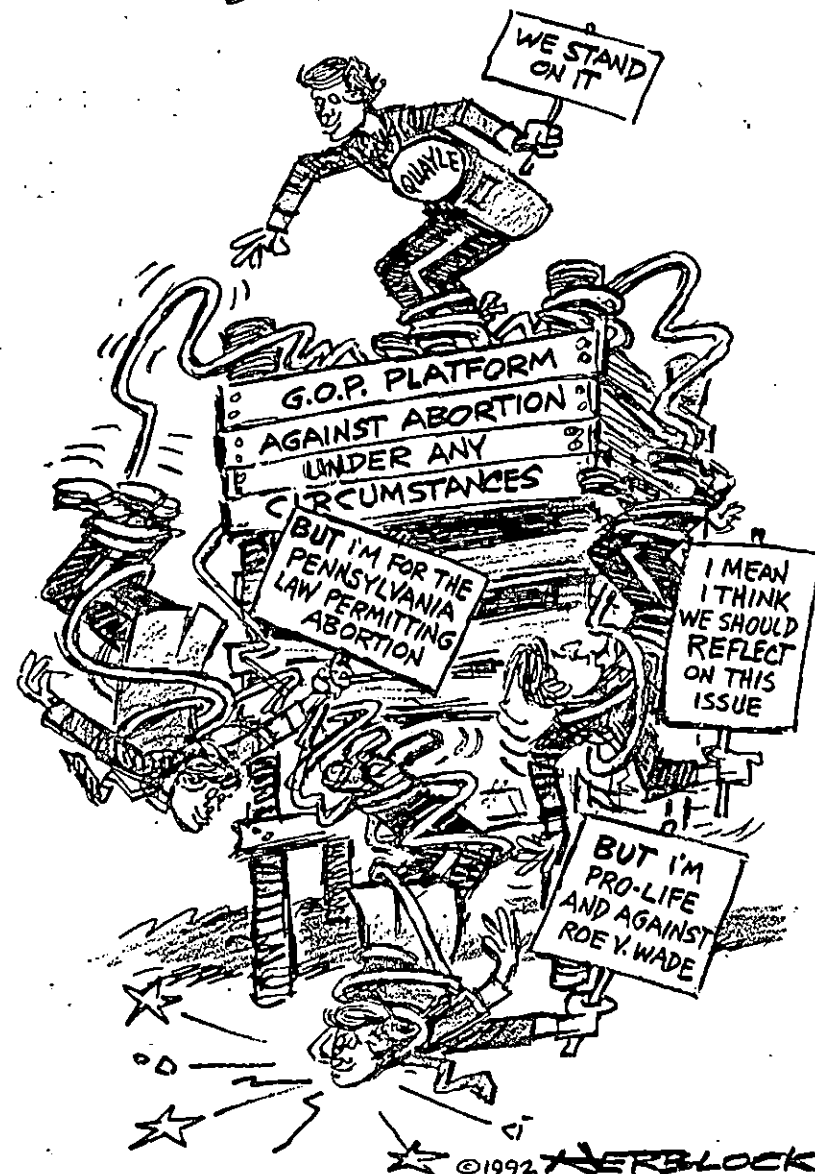
IN THIS post-Cold War dawn when immense new responsibilities are being heaped upon the United Nations, it is necessary (however disheartening) to learn of the structural and managerial inadequacies that diminish that still-vital organization. This is the sum of this week's series of detailed reports by Post writers William Branigin and Keith Richburg on the management and mismanagement of the institution. "Reform" has been in the air at the U.N. for some time, and they informed readers what reform must be about.

The writers found a sprawling jerry-built bureaucratic domain lying on the edge of, and often beyond, executive control. This was so in major programs ranging through development, relief and peace-keeping and in other programs conducted in some obscurity. Waste, inefficiency and corruption would be bad enough if it were just a case of money, time and manpower misspent. It becomes worse when the costs are measured in lives and opportunities lost and communities and countries let down. The contrast between the high purposes of the United Nations and the low level of delivery of some of its services is stark and should be regarded as intolerable.

The new secretary general, Boutros Boutros-Ghali, has taken preliminary steps of reform. Like many others, the American government voices strong support but does not always measure up to its own professed standards. It won't be easy to bring under control a bureaucracy so unaccustomed to regular and responsible oversight. The "culture" of the U.N. tends to favor informal accommodation among the many members seeking billets and perks, over the requirements of organizational efficiency. Among the Third World low-dues majority, there is a visible tendency to resist managerial strictures as high-dues developed-country decrees.

Which is to say that at the U.N., and not only there, everything is political. But that does not relieve either individuals who serve the institution or nations that benefit from it from redoubling their determination to make the place equal to its expanding mission. President Bush offered some suggestions for peace-keeping, among other items, to the General Assembly the other day. The United States and all the other deadbeats need to pay up their dues promptly. All these things need work and reform too.

## Making Over South Africa

**T**HE FUSILLADE of automatic weapons fire three weeks ago against anti-apartheid demonstrators in Ciskei was not the curtain raiser on more bloody confrontations in the apartheid-created homelands, as some had feared. Similarly, last June's Boipatong massacre, followed by a breakdown in constitutional talks and the largest general strike in the country's history, have aggravated South Africa's political crisis but not damaged it beyond repair. Despite these obstacles, the South African government and the African National Congress have wisely elected to rise above mutual recriminations and leave the blind alley in which they had led themselves to return to the negotiating table. That is a welcome development and one which should not be derailed by Zulu leader Mangosuthu Buthelezi's fit of pique over concessions made to get the stalled talks started again.

Despite the rhetoric and petty insults of political leaders during the past three months, most South Africans, black and white, clearly want something more than a return to the dismal days of world isolation, armed struggle and harsh economic sanctions. The long-awaited constitutional talks broke down over the issue of mounting political violence in the black townships. President Frederick W. de Klerk and ANC President Nelson Mandela have agreed to overcome

that critical stumbling block by strengthening security around the hostels of Zulu men (from which attacks allegedly have sprung) and by imposing a ban on the carrying of so-called "cultural" weapons by Zulus in public. Additional political prisoners will also be released as part of the agreement. Mr. Buthelezi, in part to position himself with his Zulu followers and to strike a better bargain with his conservative supporters in the white minority government, has raised the temperature by vowing to defy the agreements, which he calls "illegitimate."

Mr. Buthelezi's muscle-flexing comes at a moment when he, Mr. Mandela and Mr. de Klerk ought to be exerting a maximum effort to discourage their supporters from continuing their bloody rivalries. Instead, the Buthelezi reaction sets his followers on a course too dangerous to contemplate. It is hardly the behavior of a leader who fancies himself worthy of high office in the new South Africa. Now that the forces most capable of creating conditions for peaceful change in that racially torn country have found common ground, Chief Buthelezi ought to join them in their tortuous effort to make over South Africa to a nonracial democratic society. Abandoning negotiations, as threatened by Chief Buthelezi, is a sure way to guarantee a return to South Africa's failed history.

Dear Sec. Baker,

After prolonged consideration of why former Bush supporters are now for Clinton-- this is :

A NOT TOO BELATED CHECK PLAN FOR A WINNING CAMPAIGN based on 40 years GRASS-ROOTS experience (for comparison with plans made before your return to the White House), listed in descending order of importance:
