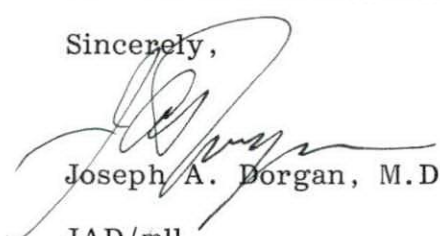

Politicians may talk about raising taxes only for rich people, but to raise any significant amount of revenue the pols would have to attack the middle class.

Follow the money

By Laura Saunders

A NOTION greatly appealing to the average voter is that the budget could be balanced by a tax increase imposed at income levels beginning just above his own. Appealing, but wrong, unless this voter happens to be at the extreme low end of the income scale. Income tax revenues are raised mostly from the middle class, for the simple reason that this is where most of the country's income falls. And for the same reason, tax increases raising any large quantities of revenue will have to come mostly from the middle class. That simple fact, illustrated in the charts on these three pages, is not

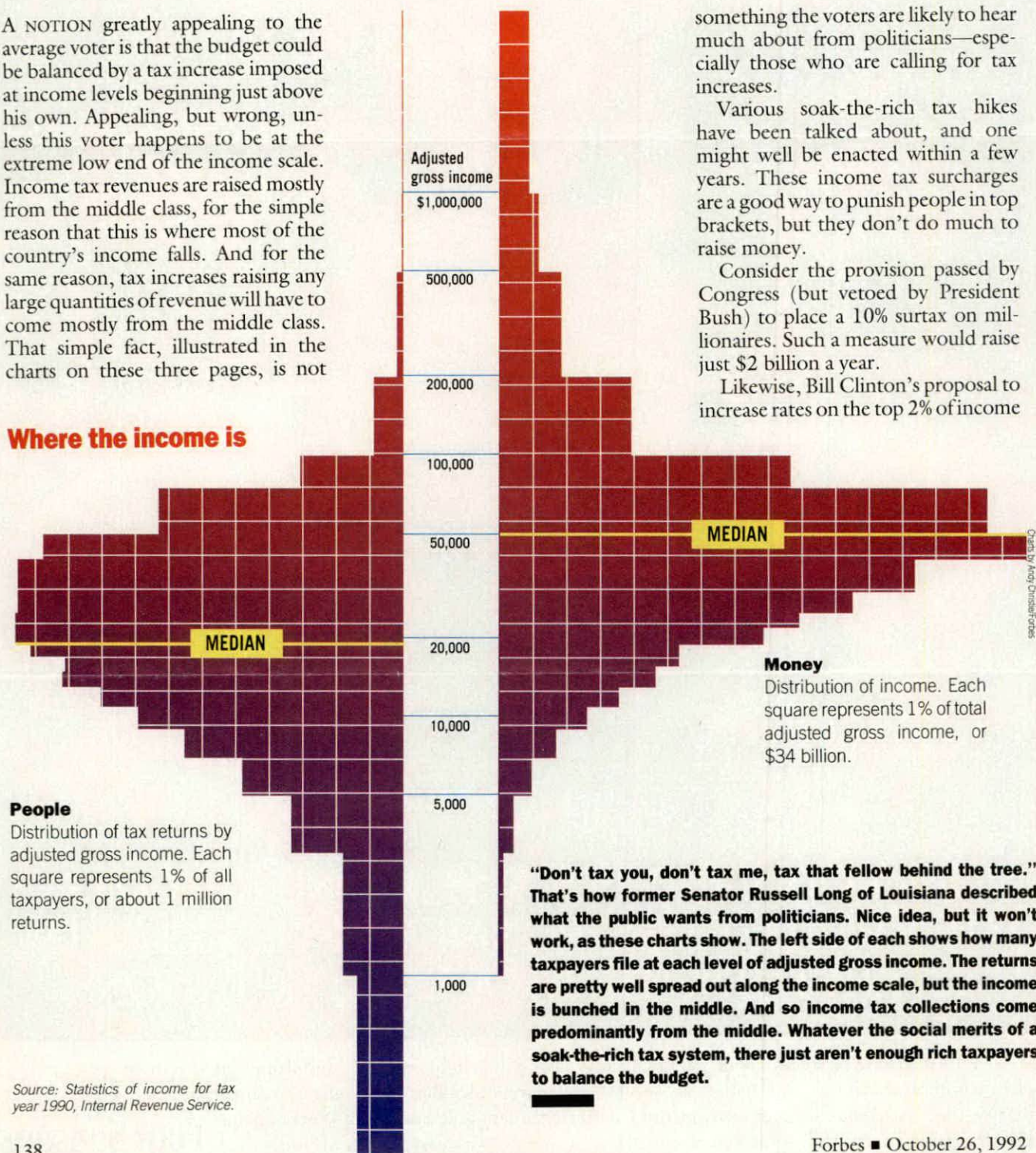
something the voters are likely to hear much about from politicians—especially those who are calling for tax increases.

Various soak-the-rich tax hikes have been talked about, and one might well be enacted within a few years. These income tax surcharges are a good way to punish people in top brackets, but they don't do much to raise money.

Consider the provision passed by Congress (but vetoed by President Bush) to place a 10% surtax on millionaires. Such a measure would raise just \$2 billion a year.

Likewise, Bill Clinton's proposal to increase rates on the top 2% of income

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earners, raise the alternative minimum tax and place a surtax on millionaires would raise about \$20 billion. Compare those numbers with the deficit, which will exceed \$300 billion for the fiscal year just ended.

Now look at the charts, which give a snapshot of the individual income tax for the year 1990, the latest available statistics. We have plotted the distributions of people, income and taxes. The distribution of tax returns (see the chart labeled "People") follows a predictable pattern. When income ranges are shown on a ratio scale, on which \$10,000 is equidistant from \$5,000 and \$20,000, the population spreads out along the familiar bell-shaped curve of statistics, except that there is some skewing toward the low end of the scale.

Now look at the chart labeled "Money." Again, the distribution follows a bell curve, but one far more concentrated in the middle. In other words, most of the income in this country—almost 60% of it—is earned by people with incomes between \$20,000 and \$100,000. If the budget

is going to be balanced or the government expanded, these people in the middle are the ones who are going to be made to pay.

Note that half of all returns show income less than about \$19,000. All told, this group's income accounts for about 12% of total adjusted gross income. But its share of the tax burden is much smaller, only about 5% of the total. If you doubled taxes on the

poorer half of the country, you could collect only an extra \$20 billion or so, and this from people who could scarce afford it.

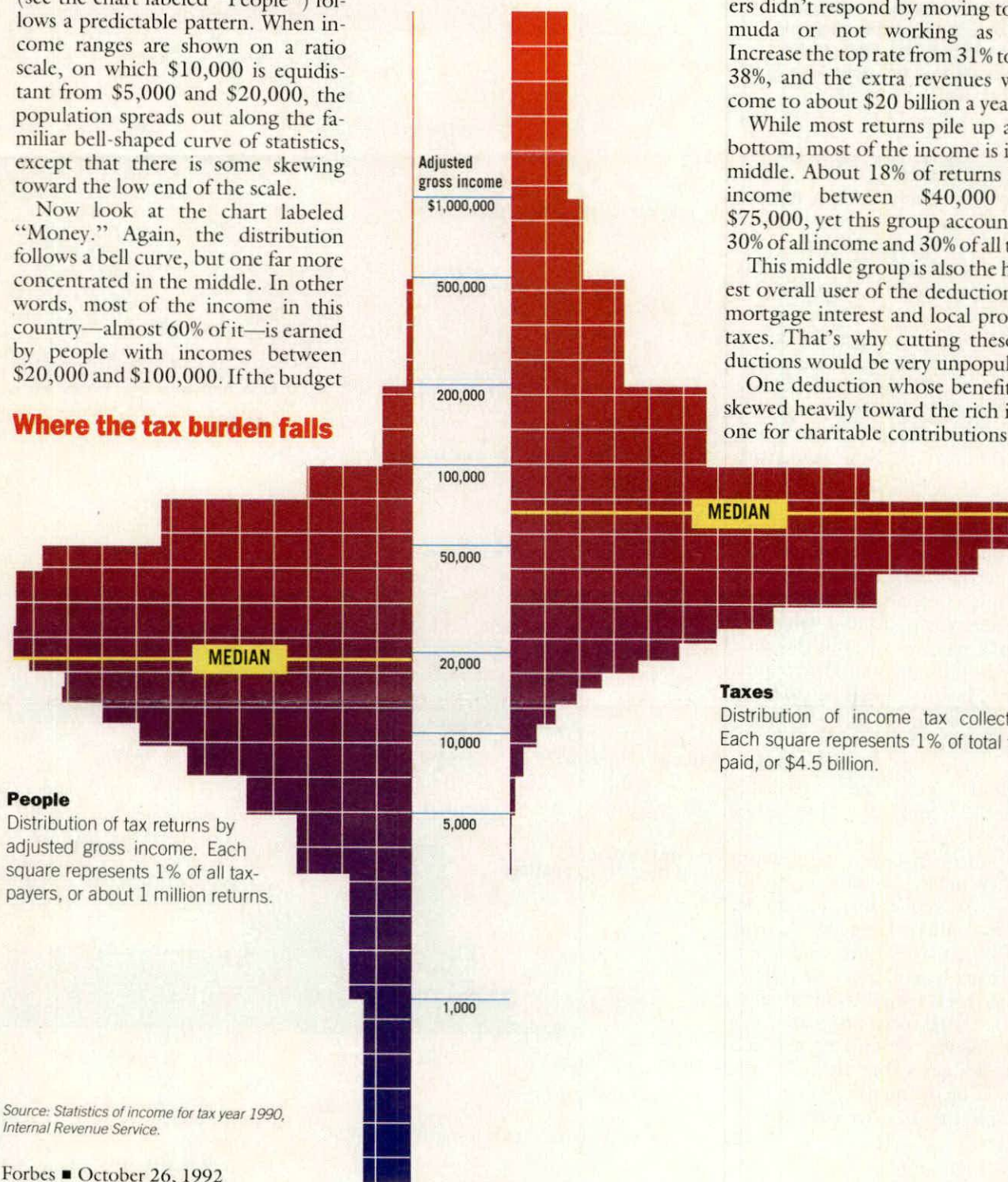
At the other end of the scale, less than 1% of all returns showed income greater than \$200,000. These people declared only 13% of all income but paid 23% of all income taxes. Double their income tax, and you would collect only \$105 billion in extra revenues—assuming that these high earners didn't respond by moving to Bermuda or not working as hard. Increase the top rate from 31% to, say, 38%, and the extra revenues would come to about \$20 billion a year.

While most returns pile up at the bottom, most of the income is in the middle. About 18% of returns show income between \$40,000 and \$75,000, yet this group accounts for 30% of all income and 30% of all taxes.

This middle group is also the heaviest overall user of the deductions for mortgage interest and local property taxes. That's why cutting these deductions would be very unpopular.

One deduction whose benefits are skewed heavily toward the rich is the one for charitable contributions. But

Who deducts what?

These charts show how different income groups use four popular tax deductions. Each square represents 1% of the total deductions claimed, plotted against adjusted gross income. Note that the deductions for mortgage interest and property taxes are most heavily used by the middle class, and therefore politically sacred. The rich, by contrast, make the most use of the charitable and state income tax deductions. Cutting the charity deduction imperils museums, colleges and churches, while limiting the state income tax deduction hurts high-tax states.

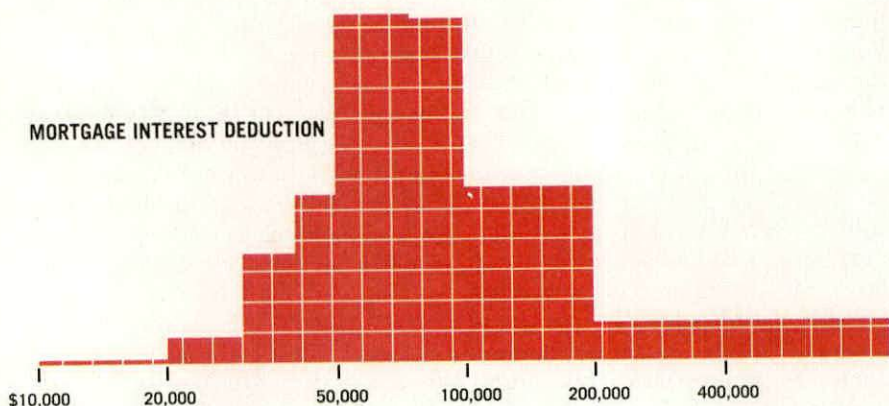
limiting this writeoff wouldn't necessarily make the middle class better off, if it meant that colleges got fewer donations and had to raise their tuition charges. And it would make lots of poor people much worse off.

The very rich are also heavy users of the deduction for local income taxes. Cutting this deduction presents big problems for politicians: It would be a huge effective tax increase on people and businesses living in those states, like California and New York, with the most expansive governments and progressive tax systems.

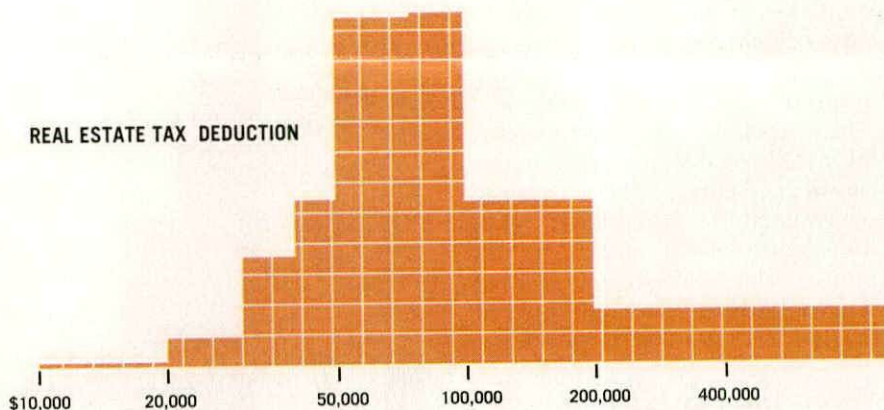
One thing that the charts don't show, and that the income tax laws don't recognize, is the geographic distribution of salaries. An income of \$100,000 would make a family in Nebraska very well off. But the same money in the suburban Philadelphia town of Abington doesn't go as far. A family consisting of two Abington schoolteachers and their children would have an income above \$100,000, yet they probably wouldn't consider themselves wealthy.

Keep all this in mind as the elections approach and the political blather increases. As economist and former Treasury official Eugene Steuerle notes, "We may opt for a more progressive tax system, but we shouldn't pretend that it would be sufficient to fund our large social programs." Or put it this way: Politicians may talk about raising taxes on "the rich." But if they want to fund expensive new programs, they have to soak the middle class.

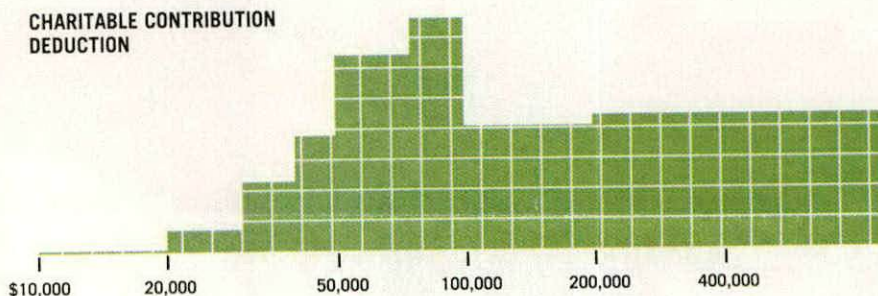
MORTGAGE INTEREST DEDUCTION



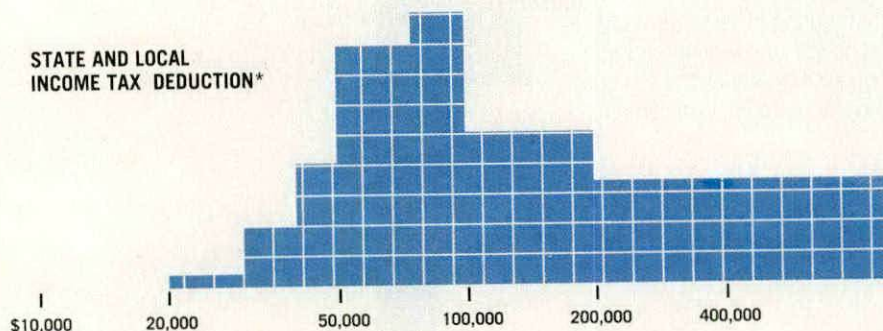
REAL ESTATE TAX DEDUCTION

Subject: Governor Clinton's Visit to the Soviet Union - 1969/1970.

Dear Mr. Secretary:

Recently, I read that Governor Clinton said that on his trip to the Soviet Union in 1969 or '70 that he stayed at the Hotel National in Moscow. This really got my attention. I have the following observations about this trip and where he stayed since I was living in London and making routine trips at this time to the Soviet Union selling machinery for my company:

1. To obtain a visa to the Soviet Union, you always had to have someone inside the Soviet Union sponsor you.
2. This someone inside the Soviet Union had to advise the consulate in London in writing to issue the visa.
3. They frowned on and were suspicious of one person traveling alone and always preferred groups.
4. The Hotel National was the hotel of choice of all Western travelers since it was a first-class hotel and had a hard currency restaurant and bar where excellent imported food, imported liquors and wines were available. Payment could be made only in hard currency. We always went there for dinner and envied people who were fortunate enough to stay there.
5. In all my travels to Moscow I was never privileged to stay at the National Hotel nor were any of my colleagues.
6. Single occupancy hotel rates in the Soviet Union in those days for Westerners was very expensive - in the neighborhood of \$200/day. (It seems strange that someone attending college on a supposedly limited budget could afford such extravagance. Did Mr. Clinton pay this rate?)

It should also be kept in mind that during this period the Soviets were squarely on the side of North Vietnam against us in the war. I think the American people should know who sponsored Mr. Clinton's visa, who arranged for him to stay in such an elegant, expensive hotel, and who paid for his accommodations. It appears to me that because he was a student apparently active in anti-war demonstrations at Oxford, that he caught the eye of the KGB or others and they invited him to the Soviet Union to promote their cause - which was against us.

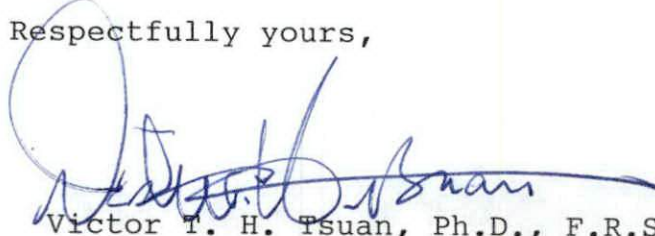

GOVERNOR CLINTON and ARKANSAS

Bill Clinton has made much of being "the most effective governor" in the United States. He has frequently cited his performance as governor of Arkansas as a reason we Americans should make him our President.

His performance in his current job should be examined. He has been governor since 1979, except for a two year vacation given him by the voters in '81 and '82 after his first term. He has been the chief executive officer long enough for his policies and leadership to have had significant effect. A little research in source books and the library shed some light on conditions in his state.

In general, Arkansas ranks at the very bottom in expenditures for public libraries and in having admitted more adults to prison than any other state, in proportion to population. Of the 50 states, it is in the lowest tenth in nine of the thirty items examined, and in the bottom third in 19 of those items. The state did not reach the top third in any category examined. One plus, however, is the fact that in 1986-87, SAT scores in the state exceeded the national average by ten percent in spite of the low expenditures on schooling. (Rank among states was not determined in this category.)

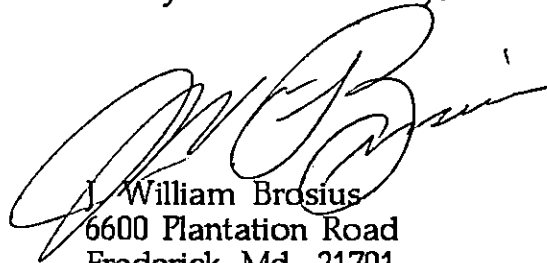
A number of factors were examined. All the following facts are presented without editing: what was found was what you see here. There was no special selection of the items studied: those chosen were ones in which data were readily available in the source books used. Where the data permit, Arkansas was ranked on a scale of 1 to 50 according to its performance in the several areas examined, 1 being the best standing and 50 being the worst, as compared with the states of the Union. The data used are the latest available. Washington, D. C. was not included in the rankings. Here is what was found:

The governor talks about balancing the state budget as an accomplishment. Actually, the constitution of Arkansas requires that the legislature provide sufficient revenue to meet state expenses. The governor is required by statute to reduce expenditures *monthly* to meet revenue. The governor *does* have the line item veto. With these requirements and tools, balancing the budget is hardly an accomplishment to brag about. Another restraint on expenditures run wild is the state law which requires affirmative vote of *three fourths* of the legislators to pass revenue increases and to pass the budget. Imagine the brakes such a rule would put on Congress, and the leverage it would give the President.

These facts about Arkansas speak for themselves. Further comment about Governor Clinton's sterling past performance hardly seems necessary.

Plenty steamed, readers flail fumbling feds

Doris Agardi had to fight her way through 11 pieces of correspondence before Medicare would pay for her mammogram.

Richard Matula had to appeal to the chairman of his Medicare carrier to get Medicare to pay his wife's routine claim.

Louis Bacon has received 20 letters from Social Security giving him conflicting information about his benefits.

All across America, AARP members are having similar trouble dealing with the federal government's bureaucracy. When the Bulletin asked its readers last November what steamed them about dealing with government agencies, they poured out their frustrations in more than 1,200 letters.

The problems of Agardi, Matula and Bacon are typical. Like Agardi, AARP members fumed that they have to slog through a blizzard of paperwork when dealing with Medi-

care, Social Security, the Department of Veterans Affairs and other agencies.

Like Matula, they complained that Medicare often turns a deaf ear when they try to go through normal channels to obtain a payment owed them.



And like Bacon, they felt that government employees often give them hopelessly conflicting answers to fundamental questions.

Other frequent complaints are that agencies often take an unconscionably long time to answer letters and fail to return phone calls or to supply promised information.

These gripes shouldn't surprise anyone, say people who study the bureaucracy. They are symptomatic of on-going problems in the delivery of services, says Bob Jackson, coordinator of AARP's Medicare-Medicaid As-

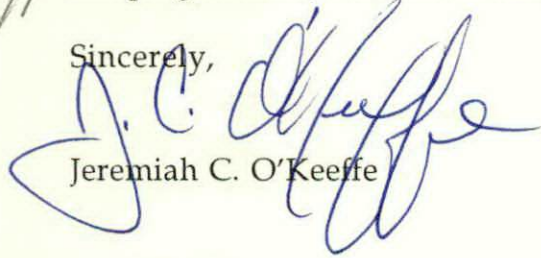
I will assume that at this point your time is indeed precious, so I will therefore keep my comments brief.

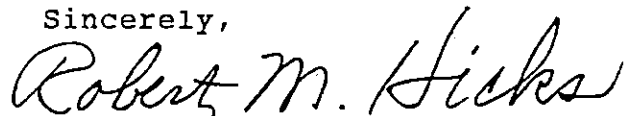

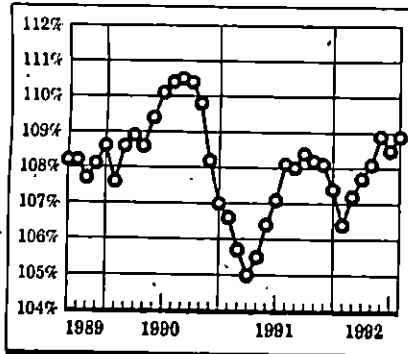

In percent (1987=100), seasonally adjusted.

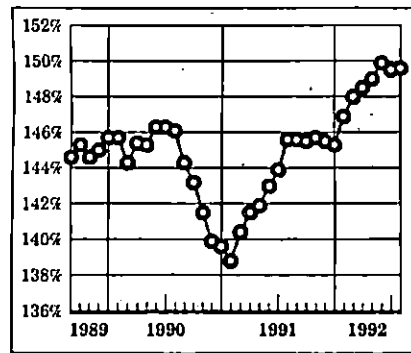

In percent (1982 = 100).

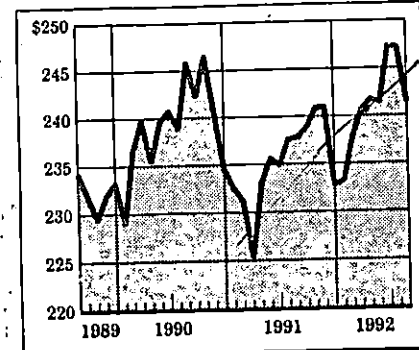

In billions of dollars.



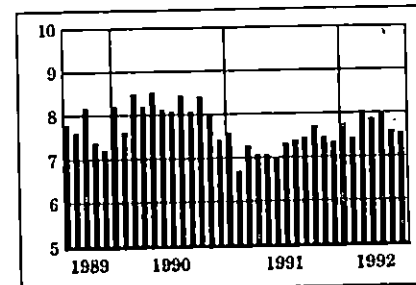

In millions of tons.

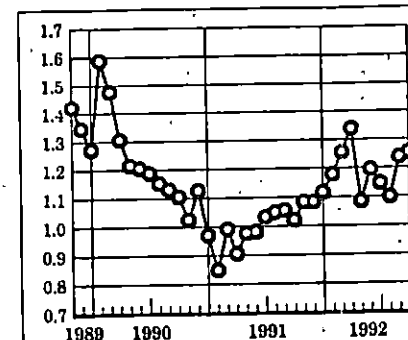

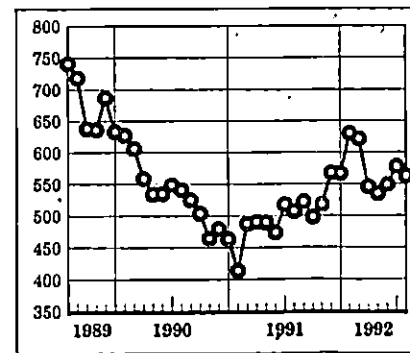
Annual rate, in millions of dwelling units.

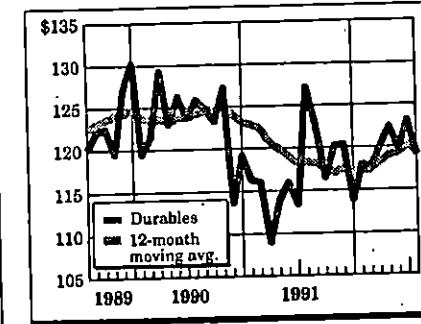

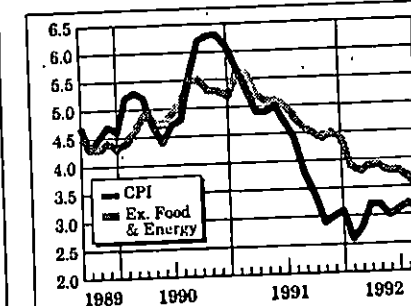

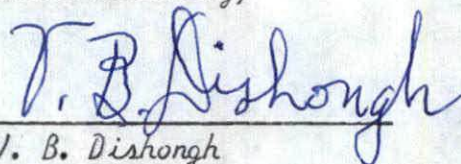

Good evening, ladies and gentlemen! I am taking this final opportunity to express to you as clearly and as logically possible, the reasons why I should be reelected your President on November 3rd and why Bill Clinton should not be elected.

My experience in government and politics at both the national and international levels has covered a period of 25 years. It has been varied and extensive, covering a wide range of responsibilities and activities, climaxed by my service as your President over the past 4 years - years of great Historical developments such, as, the demise of communism in Russia and Eastern Europe where it is in the process of being replaced by democratic institutions.

As a consequence, we have witnessed the reunification of Germany, the disappearance of the iron curtain and the enmity which had evolved between our peoples over the long years of challenges and threats and the menacing dangers of nuclear war. At the present we are negotiating terms of a formalized pact, which among other things will provide for destruction of thousands of intercontinental ballistic missiles. In the Persian Gulf war working through the United Nations, where I had served previously, we were able to organize a major cooperative offensive including a number of Arab nations to evict Saddam Hussein's military forces from Kuwait, which deprived him from gaining control of the major part of the world's oil supply. Largely through our efforts we were able to accomplish this without the involvement of Israel.

Thus hard feelings between the Arab states and Israel did not accelerate. This together with the latest Israeli election, has made possible a peace initiative, which in the past had been considered visionary at best and impossible at worst. Our policies and our diplomacy in the Mid-East were instrumental in bringing this to fruition.

I have been accused of spending too much time on foreign affairs and too little on domestic problems. But when we survey our achievements and successes

in foreign affairs they have redounded to enormous benefits for the American people. The fall of communism removed both the threats of its ambitions of worldwide political expansionism and of nuclear warfare with its terror and destruction. Now instead of being enemies our peoples are friends. We, also safeguarded the major part of the world's oil supply from an enemy and enabled friendly nations, who are the legitimate owners, to retain control. The peace process is now at work in the Mid-East where the long time inveterate enmity between Arab and Jew is moving toward solution.

When Ronald Reagan and I took office in January 1981, we inherited a sick economy wracked by the flawed economic and social policies of the democratic party, led by Jimmy Carter. Interest rates had reached the destructive level of 21 per cent and inflation, 16 per cent, with many business failures, foreclosures, bankruptcies and closures. These democratic policies proved to be so extensive and disastrous that within 15 months, we were in a deep recession.

Nevertheless, under economic policies instituted by our administration, now sneeringly referred to by Bill Clinton as "trickle down economics", within 6 years we had produced an additional 16,000,000 new jobs - an increase in employment without parallel within such a short period of time.

Although capitalism has proven to be the most acceptable economic system, because it is the most productive and operates hand in hand with the usual freedoms of democracy - the freer the people, the greater the productivity. Yet, there are still some imperfections in it such as, the alternating up and down swings of prosperity, and recession known as the business cycle. Although we have been able to lengthen periods of prosperity, no nation has ever been able to eliminate the period of recession that always follows. Our current decline in economic activity has been aggravated by sizable reductions in military personnel and military expenditures with the resulting decreases in production in those industries which have been producing military materiel. Although this has added an unavoidable burden on our people in the here and now, over a longer period of time its real benefits will become apparent to all of us.

The other major capitalistic nations of the world are now in deeper recessions than we. My opponent has expressed admiration for the way government and business work together in Germany and Japan. At this very time these two nations would like very much for their economies to be as healthy and sound as ours. Furthermore their systems stifle the development of small businesses which largely form the basis of our economic development and well-being.

It was recently determined that our workers are the world's most productive. This means that management has now largely replaced obsolete and out-dated equipment and machinery with the new tools of production needed by our workers to achieve this goal. It has made us more competitive in world markets where our export industries have been most successful.

Third quarter reports show that profits are up substantially in many businesses and industries all across the nation with the banking industry in particular showing a strong recovery. In addition new housing starts have risen in both August and September, this together with our low interest rates and plentiful supply of money in our banks forms the basis of a continuing economic recovery. The rebuilding of our highways and bridges will add additional impetus to increase production and employment. To free up capital for this expected growth we need a substantial reduction in the capital gains tax, which will bring benefits to all our people. When the other economies of the world recover our export industries will be impelled to further growth and expansion.

The free trade agreement negotiated by us with Mexico and Canada will be implemented gradually over a period of years, which will minimize the effects of it on businesses unable to compete whose workers must shift to other jobs. On the other hand there will be substantial growth of production and employment in our many industries which can successfully compete. By its very nature free trade results in each country specializing in those industries in which each enjoys the greatest comparative advantage in terms of costs of production and/or the least comparative disadvantage. This specialization will produce

more goods and services for the use of our peoples at the lowest possible price. In addition the efficiency of the exporting industries of the participating nations will produce higher paying jobs. As your President it will be my purpose to negotiate additional free trade agreements throughout the world.

In conclusion I believe this country would put itself at serious risk should it elect Bill Clinton President. He has not had one moment's experience at either national or international levels of government and politics; hence, he is without any expertise at all in these areas. His record as governor of Arkansas, an underdeveloped state with one of the lowest populations in the nation, has been both indecisive and ineffective.

Mr. Clinton has boasted of balancing the budget in Arkansas throughout his tenure, but failed to tell you that the constitution of his state made this mandatory. He had no other alternative.

Mr. Clinton has also laid claim to substantial progress brought by him to Arkansas' educational system, apparently referring to an article in Time magazine, which stated that Arkansas schools had shown the second largest improvement in education among our fifty states. Starting at the bottom any improvement would show a high percentage gain. While modest gains have been made in Arkansas schools, the state's schools after 12 years of Governor Clinton still rank among the worst in the nation in such categories as per capita education spending (47th), teacher pay (49th) and spending on higher education (43rd). Furthermore his trustworthiness and judgment leave something to be desired. His conflicting stories about his draft dodging tactics showed little regard for the truth of the matter and at the very least being an organizer and participant in a foreign country of demonstrations against his own nation and its policies at that time shows an extreme lack of judgment.

Finally Governor Clinton and I have a deep basic difference in our philosophies of government. He has promised just about everything to everybody. No one knows just what the additional costs will be except that they will be astronomical with the creation of new Bureaucracies and enlargement of existing ones. No one knows the cost of his healthcare program, but we should take

warning from Canada whose program has many shortcomings, yet has brought about 45% income tax rate on its average citizens. He speaks of cost controls which never work. Competition offers the only effective control of prices and improvement of product.

Governor Clinton and Senator Gore have been masquerading as middle of the roaders, whereas their promises and proposed solutions reveal them for what they really are - big spenders and big taxers. They are activistic, seeking to enlarge direct government intervention in our lives with its obstructionistic regulations.

My basic philosophy is that government should be limited in its interference and regulation of our lives. I believe the genius of our people, as free as possible of governmental controls over their economic and social activities make them the most productive and resourceful people in the world.

I recommend that you use the following criteria to make your choice between us next week before entering the voting booth.

1. Whom do I consider most trustworthy
2. Who has had the greatest and most important experiences and successes to serve as a foundation to build upon
3. Who is best qualified to serve as the Commander-in-Chief of our armed forces
4. Who is best qualified to restrain expenditures as we work toward a balanced budget
5. Who is most likely to keep the Federal government, its bureaucracies and regulations out of your private lives
6. Who is most likely not to increase your tax burden,

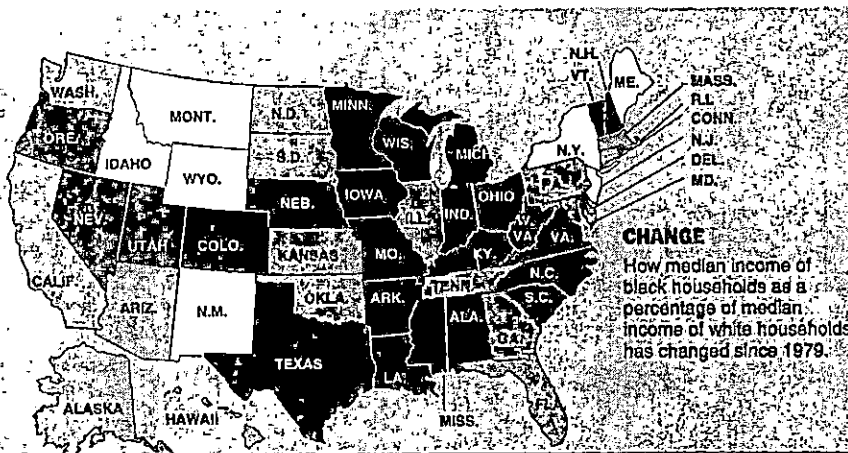
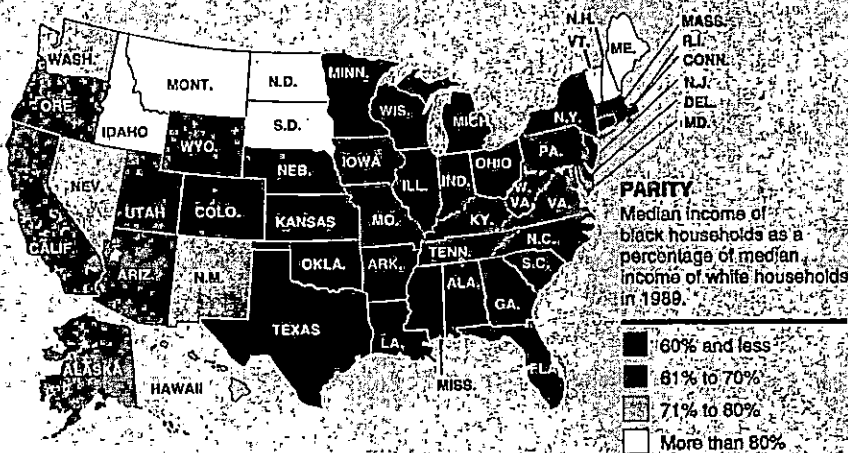

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# WISE WAYS TO TRANSFER ASSETS

Several of the tax breaks available when transferring assets to heirs are under scrutiny, so you may want to accelerate the process.

**W**hile the current broad tax bill may be pared down, postponed or vetoed, one trend is clear. Recent proposals suggest Congress is of a mind to step up taxation on estates and bury the evidence in a variety of legislation. Examples:

- A midsummer law extending unemployment benefits requires 20% withholding on lump sum pension distributions not made directly from one trustee to another.

- The broad tax package now in Senate discussion would postpone through 1997 a cut in the maximum base tax rate on gifts and estates. The rate is scheduled to fall from 55% to 50% next year.

- The same bill would also eliminate five-year forward averaging of lump-sum pension distributions. Ten-year averaging, as grandfathered by the 1986 tax law, is only available to a group now aged 56 and older.

- A long-term health care bill now in House committee would cut the unified gift and estate tax credit from a \$600,000 lifetime tax exemption to \$200,000.

**DUBIOUS CUTBACKS.** Congress has little time to get the broad bill out by recess, tentatively scheduled for October 2. The Senate has been lopping off dozens of amendments, and the final version could even be stripped down to the bill's "extenders," a set of tax breaks renewed each year. As for the health care bill that would strike off two-thirds of the gift and estate tax credit, it probably won't be on the House agenda until well into next year.

Some observers question whether such a cut in the estate tax credit is a viable proposal. Pamela Pecarich, director of tax policy at Coopers & Lybrand in Washington notes that it would "reverse the direction Congress established" by phasing in the credit starting back in 1977. More likely in the long run, she says, is elimination of the

## GENERATION SKIPS

Transferring assets directly to grandchildren takes care. A special tax is due on such transfers, but you come out ahead because skipping a generation avoids estate taxes on the assets transferred to grandchildren when their parents die. The "skip" tax is a flat 55%, scheduled to fall to 50% next year, but the current tax bill would extend the higher rate through 1997.

Your grandchildren pay the skip tax in addition to the estate tax due at the time of your death. It applies to assets transferred directly to the grandchildren as well as assets given to them through trusts and trust-like arrangements. Under current law, no transfer tax is due on the first \$1 million an individual transfers to the third, or a subsequent, generation. With the consent of a spouse, you can give or bequeath to your grandchildren up to \$2 million free of the tax.

Annual gifts in trusts or custodial accounts for the grandchildren are subject to the skip tax, but each grandparent still gets a \$1 million lifetime exemption from the skip tax plus \$10,000 annual exclusions from the gift tax. Grandparents with substantial estates are generally advised to use both of their exemptions from the generation-skipping transfer tax in full to avoid tax on \$2 million of their children's estates. ■

step-up for assets transferred at death.

Under present law, assets are transferred at fair market value to determine estate tax, but their appreciation is not subject to capital gains tax. One oft-heard proposal would tax the appreciation on the spot. A more likely reform, says Pecarich, would transfer assets at their original tax basis "so heirs wouldn't be strapped by an immediate tax but would pony up when they sold assets later on."

A deep cut in the credit, by contrast, would have immediate impact, subjecting a vastly larger segment of the population to the federal estate tax. Madeline Noveck of Novos Planning in New York and past president of the Institute of Certified Financial Planners says that besides making estate planning a must for even relatively modest estates, such a draconian step would "force people to use whatever means were still available for transferring assets earlier." While Noveck also has doubts that such a measure could pass, she says estate planners generally have been advising estate owners to review their planning in the light of the trend toward raising taxes on transfers.

**TAKING CREDIT.** More specifically, a number of tax and estate advisors are

now telling some of their clients to use up the full \$600,000 exemption while it's still available. But before you undertake such a transfer, warns William G. Brennan, editor of the *Ernst & Young Financial Planning Reporter*, "make sure you understand the impact."

Under current law, the federal taxes on personal assets transferred to other individuals are the same whether the transfers are made by gift or bequeathal. Both types of transfer get two major tax breaks:

- An annual exclusion, which allows gifts of up to \$10,000, or \$20,000 if made jointly with a spouse, to an unlimited number of donees each year.

- Unlimited transfers to a spouse, and a tax credit of up to a lifetime maximum exemption of \$600,000 for transfers to all others.

If your annual gifts to an individual exceed \$10,000 (or \$20,000 with spouse) you can still avoid the unified gift and estate tax by tapping into your \$600,000 lifetime exemption. But there's a significant difference between the two major tax breaks on estates. Annual exclusions reduce the estate at the time they are made. The lifetime credit is calculated at the time the estate passes to your heirs. When a gift to an individual

is in excess of the exclusion, you must file a gift tax return for the year, but there's no tax due at that time. The gift merely reduces the \$600,000 exemption allowed later on when the remainder of your estate passes to your heirs at your death. Note that you must file the gift tax form for any gift of more than \$10,000 because to qualify for an annual exclusion of up to \$20,000, your spouse must agree to the joint gift on the form.

**GIVING GAINS.** If you transfer assets worth \$600,000 to your heirs now and Congress reduces the credit later, your estate's lifetime credit will be the reduced amount. But while you can't escape a cutback in the credit by using it all up now, such a move could nevertheless make a significant difference in your estate tax liability over time. Brennan says the main advantage lies in keeping the appreciation of the assets out of the estate from the time when the gift is made, but he also points out that you can transfer \$600,000 out of your estate without tax now, even if the exemption is reduced and you have to pay tax on some of it later on.

Say you use up the current lifetime exemption by transferring \$600,000 to a trust naming your children as beneficiaries. You pay no gift tax on the transfer now, and if the current credit stays in effect, the full \$600,000 will escape estate tax at your death. If Congress cuts back the credit, your estate will then get whatever credit applies at the time of your death. Either way, the appreciation on the assets in trust remain out of your estate

from the time of the gift and you're not currently out-of-pocket for any gift tax.

**TRUST POSSIBILITIES.** You have considerable latitude in transferring assets to heirs via gifts in trust. For instance, you can still put a personal residence in a grantor-retained income trust. After confusing legislation on the subject in 1987, the 1990 Tax Act rewrote the rules on freezing assets in GRITs, setting new limits on the amount of future appreciation that can be shifted to heirs on transfer of substantial assets such as a closely held company. But an exception was made for homeowners.

Personal residence GRITs let you transfer your home or a second home in the future—after a specified term or at your death—and keep control of it while the trust is in force. The rules for determining the gift tax liability are a matter for a tax or estate planning advisor, but in typical cases it's less than half what it would be for an outright gift.

During the term of the personal residence GRIT (which is no longer limited to ten years), you reserve the right to live in the house. At the end of the term, the house reverts to the trust and its beneficiaries, but you don't necessarily have to give the place up permanently. To gain the gift tax advantage, the trust agreement must be made irrevocable, but when the term expires and you lose your rights to the house, you can have a lease agreement allowing you to continue living there for the rest of your life.

**TIMELY TRANSFERS.** A sluggish economy with real estate values down in most areas makes this an ideal time

for giving away a home or family business. The gift can be made at a relatively low valuation, and its appreciation during eventual economic recovery will be kept out of the estate. Heirs who currently receive the family homestead under a purchase arrangement also gain the advantage of low mortgage interest rates.

When contemplating a sizable asset transfer, life insurance trusts are also worth looking into. By making the gifts to an irrevocable life insurance trust, owners of modest estates can, in effect, significantly increase transfers with assets that don't yet exist. These asset transfers consist of annual cash gifts used by the trustee to pay premiums on life insurance. At the death of the trust grantor, the proceeds of the policy go to the trust, which then distributes them to heirs in accordance with the grantor's wishes.

Life insurance trusts are commonly set up to provide control over assets transferred to minors. When grown children are to be the beneficiaries, you may prefer to avoid the costs and complications of typical trust arrangements by having your heirs own the insurance directly. The parent applies the annual exclusion to payments for policy premiums, and the child owns the policy under strict IRS conditions. "You can also diversify risk by having separate policies with different companies or even different types of policies for each child," says Noveck. Universal policies do better in a high-interest environment, while straight life coverage is less interest-sensitive. ■

Over the past five years, foreign sales have increased at a 17% annual rate

vs. 4% for domestic sales. Productivity improvements and effective cost controls have helped to bolster margins, but earnings growth next year will largely depend on the extent of worldwide economic recovery. We estimate earnings of \$5.75 a share in 1992 and \$6.50 next year. *We believe the stock (MMM, 100, NYSE ★★☆☆; Quality ranking: A+) is fairly valued at 15 times estimated 1993 net and would not add to positions at this time.* ■

## Inflated Drug Treatment

The debate over how best to wage the war on substance abuse continues. Some argue for treatment. I agree. Treatment appears to be the most humane and effective way to go, but not in New York State.

In 1990, the state comptroller's office found that the state agency responsible for licensing and funding substance-abuse programs did so without regard to research findings or cost effectiveness. Millions of dollars for treatment were being wasted on inefficient and ineffective programs. Some of these programs have units which are chronically underutilized despite the public demand for treatment slots for the victims of "crack" and other substances.

That agency has since come under the Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services, but the 25-year legacy of waste has continued. Many programs regularly receive two, three, four, even eight times the established median amount of funding required for a favorable treatment outcome. This means that where one program can successfully treat an individual in a residential setting for \$25,000, other programs are permitted to spend from \$100,000 to more than \$200,000 for the same purpose.

My own experience as executive director of a substance abuse program revealed that even when the waste involved federal funds and was the result of corrupt practices by members of a program's board of directors, this agency does not take the interest of the clients to heart. Their primary concern was to limit the possibilities of a scandal and ensure the continued flow of federal dollars.

I am sure by now that you are familiar with the fiasco of what is called drug abuse treatment in New York State as funded by the Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (formally DSAS). Some of these programs have units which are chronically underutilized despite the public demand for treatment slots for the victims of "crack" and other substances. **Today, these conditions still exist.**

DSAS has since been merged with the Division of Alcoholism to form the Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services, but the waste, which has a legacy of 25 years, has continued. Many programs regularly receive two, three, four, and even eight times the established median amount required for a favorable treatment outcome. Translated into dollars this means that where one program can successfully treat an individual in a residential setting for \$25,000, other programs are permitted to spend from \$100,000 to in excess of \$200,000, for the same purpose. One or two instances of such excesses might be understandable, but the agency's own research reveals dozens of such cases involving hundreds, if not thousands of clients.



My own experience as Executive Director of a substance abuse program revealed that even when the waste involved federal funds and was the result of corrupt practices by members of a program's Board of Directors, this agency does not take the interests of the public, or indeed the clients to heart. Their primary concern was to limit the possibilities of a scandal, and ensure the continued flow of federal dollars.

Therefore, while I would agree that we should put emphasis on treatment provided by organizations such as Alcoholics Anonymous and Narcotics Anonymous, I would argue that we can not afford the type of treatment supported by the Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services unless their funding practices are dramatically reformed, appropriate accountability measures are put in place, and the boondoggling caused by inept, greedy New York politicians is eliminated.

The original owner, assigns, or heirs also have a two-year period in which the validity of the sale may be contested in court.

The sale of the land does not extinguish any lien for delinquent improvement district assessments or relieve the purchaser of liability for delinquent improvement district assessments.

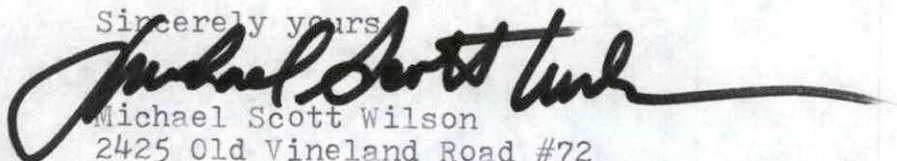
TV AD CAMPAIGN #2

## Batten the hatches if Clinton wins

As the Squire of Kennebunkport prepares for a genteel retirement on Walker's Point, the rest of us had best dig in for four very tough years. Four years of Hillary and Mario. Four years of Hayden/Fonda mentor Derek Shearer and the Hollywood Women's Political Caucus.

For the National Organization for Women, children's rights loonies, federal workers, union bosses, the National Education Association, Planned Parenthood, and big city political machines, they will be sleek years indeed — years of subsidies, social experiments, regulations, spending initiatives, and bureaucracy unbound.

For the rest of us, it will be Ethiopia, Biafra, Bangladesh, and other politically-induced famines.

How to prosper in the coming Ultra-Slimfast era? If you're in business — especially a small business — get out, now. Bill has exciting plans for you: new payroll taxes for health care and job retraining, mandated family leave, more environmental regulation, indexing the minimum wage, etc.

According to *Investor's Business Daily*, if enacted, all of these mandates will cost US businesses more than \$120 billion annually, about two-thirds of after-tax profits. I repeat, if you have a business, sell it. Put the proceeds into Swiss francs, gold mining shares, and other investments to be covered shortly.

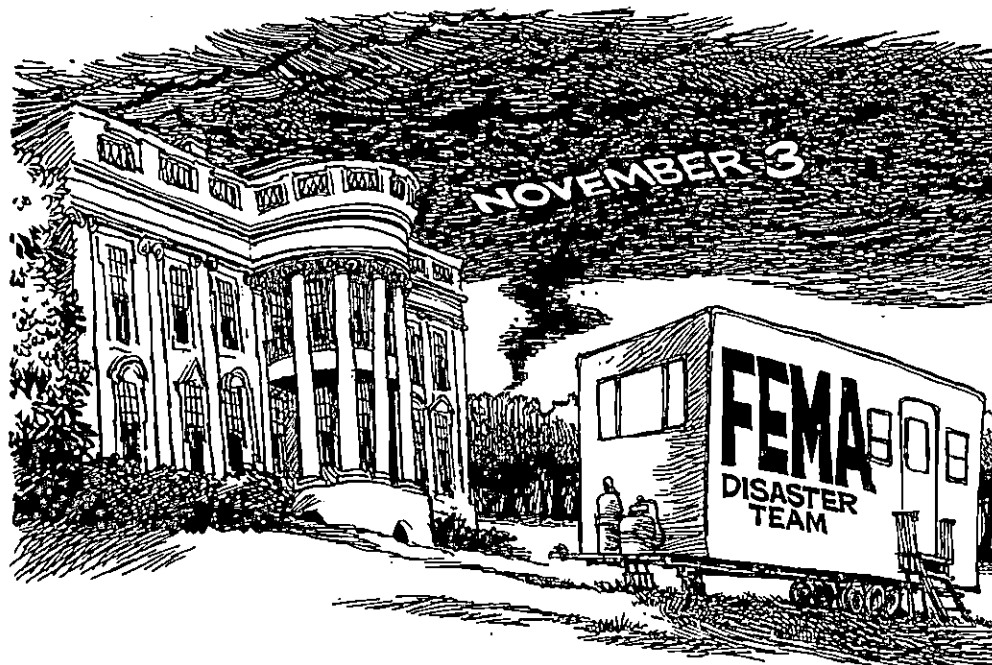
That goes double for export industries. Clinton claims he supports the US-Mexico Free Trade Agreement in principle, but has enough reservations to deep-six the deal. With arch-protectionist Dick Gephardt on board and heavy IOUs to the AFL-CIO, watch those tariff walls rise into the stratosphere.

Our trading partners will retaliate, hitting agricultural exports especially hard. That, combined with Greenie Gore's determination that farmers abandon most pesticides and herbicides, spells hard times for agri-business. Old MacDonald, sell that farm, eei-eei fast.

If you work for the defense industry, see a career counselor. Clinton wants to slash \$61.3 billion from the defense budget, above the cuts agreed to by Bush and Congress. If you're in mining, logging (soon to be sacrificed to save the spotted owl), nuclear power, energy exploration, or automaking (raising fuel efficiency standards from 27.5 to 45 miles per gallon will do wonders for domestic car sales), acquaint yourself with the help-wanted pages of your daily newspaper.

Get into depression-proof employment. The federal government will be the growth industry of the 1990s. New spending — an additional \$360 billion over four years — will drive a general expansion of the welfare state.

Look for career opportunities in the IRS (under Clinton, Arkansas went from 40th to 20th in per capita state tax burden), the Department of Education, Environ-

mental Protection Agency, and Hillary's old hangout, the Legal Services Corporation.

Other avenues of advancement include litigation law (Clinton opposes any reform and is deeply indebted to the shysters who've been writing campaign contributions), public education, and union organizing. The governor favors repeal of Taft-Hartley 14-B, which allows state right-to-work laws.

For investments, buy stock in H&R Block, real estate in Chevy Chase, Md., and Arlington, Va., and shares in condom manufacturers (the Lov Guv has promised AIDS activists to push condom distribution in the public schools). Open an abortion clinic, in expectation of renewed federal funding as well as passage of the so-called Freedom of Choice Act, which will invalidate state restrictions.

- Searching your family album for nude baby photos. As the NEA will be back in the kiddie porn business (Clinton opposes "censorship" in federal arts funding), these could be priceless.

- Learning Spanish, if you live west of the Mississippi. Once Gore and the unions sink the free trade pact, expect a sizable influx of Mexicans who can't earn a

living at home.

- Scouring your family tree for African or Hispanic ancestry. Quotas ("workplace fairness," Clinton euphemistically calls them) will be an article of faith for the incoming administration. If you're not successful, change your name, get a sex-change operation, or reorient your sexuality. The Democratic ticket is in bondage to a proposed federal gay rights laws.

- Buying the vacant lot next to your home before federal housing is erected thereon.

- Visiting that small country in the Middle East (Israel, Kuwait) you've always wanted to see — while it's still there. The Oxford peace-marcher said he would have voted to authorize force in the Persian Gulf, if it had been close, but sympathized with opponents' arguments. Besides, after he guts the defense budget, foreign intervention will be theoretical.

Hey, the next four years could be fun. My parents have fascinating stories about the Great Depression (bank failures, bread lines, 25 percent unemployment). By 1996, I'll have my own saga of suffering to relate to future generations.

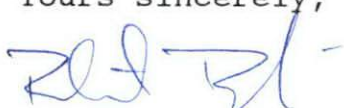
Dear Mr. Secretary:

## HOW BUSH CAN WIN

## A LOOK AHEAD FROM THE NATION'S CAPITAL

As the holiday lull nears in Washington, major decisions--on the economy, the budget, world affairs--are being made that will shape 1979 and later years.

On problem No. 1, inflation, now running at a 10-percent-a-year rate, the White House will issue final wage and price standards by December 15.

Likely: The 7 percent pay guideline will be eased to exclude extra costs of maintaining fringe benefits--such as medical insurance--at current levels.

Also probable: Restrictions on profit margins will be tightened.

The strategy is to give more to organized labor, squeeze business more in hopes unions will cooperate with Carter's plan to slow the wage-price spiral.

But the continuing drop in the purchasing power of paychecks will make more and more workers demand a wage "catch-up." Earnings for the average worker, after allowing for inflation, have fallen three months in a row.

Complicating the business problem: a stream of private forecasts of recession next year. This magazine's Economic Unit foresees a mild recession next spring, mainly because of high interest rates and tight credit.

It notes that housing--a key to recovery--and business investments--needed to keep the uptrend going--are both very sensitive to soaring rates.

What will that do to the administration's anti-inflation fight?

Slower business normally takes some of the pressure off prices. Our Economic Unit sees some lessening of inflation next year, but not much.

Look at what could happen to Carter's main plank in the anti-inflation campaign, the pledge to cut the budget deficit to 30 billion dollars . . .

Rising unemployment will increase pressure on Congress for more federal spending on jobs, particularly for youths, aid to urban pockets of joblessness.

The Economic Unit forecasts a jump in the jobless rate from 5.9 to 7 percent in the next year. That means 1.2 million more out of work.

For every percentage point increase in unemployment for men aged 35 to 44, the jobless rate for teen-age males jumps 4.5 percentage points; among black youths, the rate soars 6.3 points. These are the potential trouble spots.

When it comes to federal income, slower growth in 1979 will mean a lower tax take than the government anticipates for 1980--pushing up the deficit. The White House insists 1979 growth will be twice our estimate of 1.3 percent.

The struggle to develop a "guns without butter" budget for 1980 is not

going well as it is. Latest complication: heavy pressure on Carter to abandon his decision to squeeze social programs while beefing up defense spending.

Specifically, the pledge to boost the arms budget by 3 percent after inflation is under attack from such bigwigs as Budget Director McIntyre, Treasury Secretary Blumenthal, chief economist Schultze, inflation czar Kahn.

But Carter has to consider some foreign-policy implications:

How will America's European Allies react to his reneging on what they consider a promise to increase U.S. strength against the Warsaw Pact forces?

Will the Kremlin consider a defense cut a sign of Carter weakness?

Will the squeeze on the Pentagon hurt the chances of getting Senate approval of a new strategic-arms agreement with the Soviet Union?

Meanwhile, the battle will heat up between inflation fighters and federal regulators over the costs to the economy of proposed rules. The big items:

Environment rules to implement strip-mining legislation passed last year.

A general standard on what businesses must do to protect workers from cancer-causing substances. Critics contend that would cost 50 billion.

Regulations detailing what must be done to provide access for handicapped persons on any transport that gets federal funds--buses, trains, whatever.

A requirement that new facilities in "dirty" areas cannot add new pollution until existing installations are cleaned up.

Exception: The Transportation Department is considering asking Congress to let it ease the rules requiring auto makers to meet a fuel-economy average of 27.5 miles per gallon for their fleets of 1985 models. The reason:

Fear that it would put financially strapped Chrysler out of business, cut some foreign producers out of the U.S. market and thus weaken competition.

Poor people in the South migrate to the North for higher welfare payments, right? Not anymore. Northern welfare checks may still be larger, but--

A new Census Bureau study shows more poor persons moved into the South in 1975-77 than moved out. In the West, it was the same. The reverse was true for the Northeast and North Central regions. Not so surprising . . .

The number of blacks living in suburbs jumped by 34 percent from 1970 to 1977. Still, they make up only 6 percent of the country's suburban population.

Blacks in metropolitan centers outnumber those in the suburbs 3 to 1, but that's changing. Black population in cities has not increased since 1974, while their migration to the suburbs spurred in the past two years.

If you're waiting for comprehensive national health insurance, don't hold your breath. Carter's idea now is to submit it to Congress in pieces, slowly.

First sections are due on Capitol Hill next spring--including coverage for catastrophic accidents or illnesses, expanded health aid for the poor.

The big plan supported by Senator Kennedy of Massachusetts and labor unions will get a hearing, but opponents seem to have the votes. Physicians helped 20 Senate candidates this year with \$5,000 or more each. Nineteen won.

## California: Bruce Herschensohn (Open Seat)

The race to fill the seat of retiring Senator Alan Cranston can surely be characterized as the race whose candidates demonstrate the greatest dichotomy of views and political philosophies. Herschensohn, a former television commentator in Los Angeles, has impeccable conservative credentials. He has been an articulate advocate for reducing government interference in the private sector, cutting both taxes and federal spending,

and implementing an aggressive economic growth package. He speaks out on the need to maintain a strong national defense and has consistently advocated ensuring a safe and secure Israel. His opponent, Congresswoman Barbara Boxer, has a voting record that is vehemently anti-business and anti-economic growth. She bounced 143 checks as part of the House bank scandal and was termed the biggest spender in Congress by the National Taxpayers Union.

Whereas Herschensohn has been a stalwart, consistent friend of Israel, Boxer has on many occasions not supported key Israel-related initiatives in Congress. She has voted against a number of foreign assistance bills containing vital aid to Israel, voted against the use of force against Iraq in the Gulf war, did not oppose granting Yasir Arafat a visa, and did not support closing the PLO offices in the U.S.

In addition to his commitment to enhancing the U.S.-Israel relationship, Herschensohn believes the U.S. should move its embassy to Jerusalem, the undivided capital of Israel, believes that Jews have a right to live anywhere within the entire historical land of Israel, opposes the principle of "territory for peace", and opposes any role for the PLO in the peace process. He has also called for an increase in assistance to the Jewish state.

Data from focus groups indicate that Bruce Herschensohn's views on both domestic and foreign policy are more in line with the views of the people of California than his opponent's. This may be why Boxer has not accepted Herschensohn's weekly debate challenges. If Bruce is able to convey his message to the voters, he will have a great shot at winning this exciting race.



## California: John Seymour (Incumbent)

Appointed to the Senate in January 1991, Senator John Seymour will face former San Francisco mayor Diane Feinstein to complete the unexpired Senate term of Governor Pete Wilson. A successful entrepreneur, Seymour served as mayor of Anaheim until being elected to the State Senate in 1982. In his bid to protect his seat, Seymour must overcome the twin hurdles of a strong state-wide challenger and his own low name recognition.

Despite Feinstein's two-to-one cash-on-hand advantage and 100 percent state-wide name recognition, Seymour has been gaining ground on his opponent. In the last four months, Seymour has shaved close to ten points off Feinstein's initial lead. Political analysts believe that California voters will continue to move away from Feinstein once they become

acquainted with her record of favoring tax increases, being soft on crime, and supporting legislation which would cost California jobs. Feinstein's weakness continues to be her high negative ratings - almost as many voters view her unfavorably as favorably. She is also plagued by alleged campaign finance reporting violations from her 1990 gubernatorial bid as well as charges of campaign finance violations in her current bid for the U.S. Senate.

John Seymour has not only continued in the staunchly pro-Israel path of his predecessor, but has forged new ground on issues effecting the U.S.-Israel relationship and has evolved into an invaluable leader on a number of key issues of interest to our community. He was an early supporter of Israel's request for \$10 billion in absorption loan guarantees. He opposes the establishment of an independent Palestinian state, and was the first U.S. Senator to denounce the one-sided U.N. Security Council condemnation of Israel for its plans to expel Palestinian terrorists. In another display of leadership, at the California Republican Party's state convention, he played a crucial role in the defeat of several anti-Israel resolutions.

Seymour's electoral performance depends in large part on the success of his fundraising in the last weeks before the election and his ability to get his message out and introduce himself to the voters.

## Idaho: Dirk Kempthorne (Open Seat)

Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne will be facing Congressman Richard Stallings in a heated campaign to fill the seat of retiring Senator Steve Symms. Kempthorne has compiled an impressive string of accomplishments since becoming mayor in 1986. His success in his first term led to his uncontested reelection in 1989, the first time in over 20 years that a mayor has run unopposed in Boise. Under Kempthorne's leadership, Boise achieved unprecedented growth and progress. After focusing on Boise's decaying downtown district, Boise set a city record for new construction value two years in a row. Boise's success under Dirk Kempthorne earned it the National League of Cities award in 1989, recognizing the dramatic enrichment of Boise's urban development environment as a result of thoughtful and innovative urban planning.

Stallings' eight years in the House of Representatives will earn him the damaging "incumbency" title in this political year of the outsider. His involvement in the House bank scandal will serve as a liability as well. Stallings has not always voted in support of an activist U.S. foreign policy which enhances both U.S. strategic interests as well as the interests of key allies such as Israel. He voted against the Gulf war and opposed legislation, just five days prior to Saddam Hussein's invasion of Kuwait, which would have imposed sanctions on Iraq. Stallings has also voted against foreign aid bills which have contained key foreign assistance for Israel. He has not supported initiatives intended to bolster the fight against international terrorism, including those regarding the closing of the PLO offices in the U.S., the denial of visas to Yasir Arafat both in 1988 and 1989, and support for Israel's capture of Hezbollah terrorist Sheik Obeid.

Dirk Kempthorne's deep religious convictions form the foundation of his support for Israel. He has authored a pro-Israel position paper which opposes PLO efforts to gain international legitimacy, opposes the establishment of an independent Palestinian state, opposes a return to Israel's 1967 borders, and declares Jerusalem the undivided capital of Israel. On domestic issues, Kempthorne believes that the key to successful economic growth is the reduction of tax burdens and federal regulations on the business sector.

Polling data confirms that this race will go down to the wire. Kempthorne will continue to benefit from Stallings' unfavorable rating of 32 percent, which remains twice as high as Kempthorne's. As of the second quarter FEC filing, Stallings enjoyed more than two-and-a-half times as much cash-on-hand. With 12 percent of the electorate undecided in this state where media is inexpensive, money will have a dramatic impact on the outcome of the race.

## Illinois: Rich Williamson (Open Seat)

In Illinois, Rich Williamson faces the difficult task of introducing himself to Illinois voters who have been inundated with the name and face of his challenger for over six months. With her upset defeat of Senator Alan Dixon, Carol Mosely Braun has been transformed from an unknown Cook County Recorder of Deeds to the first African American, female nominee for Senate and has become a national media favorite.

After serving in the Reagan White House as a senior aid responsible for intergovernmental affairs, and then as ambassador to the United Nations offices in Austria, Rich Williamson became assistant secretary of state for international organizational affairs. In that capacity, Williamson opposed efforts by the PLO and Yasir Arafat to gain international legitimacy and fought anti-Israel initiatives at the United Nations. He has been to Israel four times and believes that such trips are necessary in order to understand Israel's precarious security situation. In February 1992, Williamson signed an advertisement in the *New York Times* which urged strong U.S. support for Israel's security needs.

Whereas Williamson's commitment to Israel is second nature, Carol Mosely Braun does not have a history of strong support for issues of concern to the Jewish community. She was a delegate for Jesse Jackson in 1988. She was the sole sponsor of a resolution in the Illinois state legislature praising former Congressman Gus Savage, a virulent antisemite. She was quoted in the *Jerusalem Post* as saying that the "Jews used to be viewed as part of the solution to our problems, now they are viewed as part of the problem." Among other glaring omissions, her position paper on the Middle East does not mention the status of Jerusalem, does not oppose a return to Israel's pre-1967 borders, does not oppose the creation of a Palestinian state, and does not pledge to maintain Israel's qualitative military edge.

Because he has lagged behind in fundraising by more than a 3-to-1 margin, Williamson has not been able to introduce himself to the voters. Whereas his opponent is known by over 90 percent of the public, Williamson is not yet known by even half the voters. Braun's steady fall in the polls, however, confirms

expectations that her negatives will rise once the voters realized that she is simply a career politician, who has run for public office eight straight times, voted to raise taxes in Illinois 14 times and raise income taxes by over 40 percent, and supports legislation to abolish the death penalty in all cases. Political experts believe that when compared to Williamson's pro-jobs, pro-business moderate message, Mosely Braun will be considered too extreme to represent the people of Illinois in the Senate. This race will depend on Williamson's ability to secure the necessary resources to make such comparisons possible.

## New York: Alfonse D'Amato (Incumbent)

In New York, Senator Alfonse D'Amato will face a stiff challenge in his bid for a third term from State Attorney General Bob Abrams. Abram's come-from-behind victory in the late Democratic party primary has resulted in his strong bounce in the polls and strong fundraising base. D'Amato's cash-on-hand could prove to be the critical difference if Abrams - who has received the endorsement of the Liberal Party - is able to continue his successful fundraising.

D'Amato must be able to utilize a large resource pool to continue running television ads through election day in the

expensive media markets of New York.

Since his election to the Senate in 1980, D'Amato's voting record on issues related to the U.S.-Israel relationship has been nothing short of perfect. In addition, he has demonstrated true commitment by maximizing his committee assignments during times of need for the Jewish State. As a member of two key Senate Appropriations subcommittees, the subcommittee on foreign operations and the subcommittee on defense, D'Amato has consistently been supportive of new ways to strengthen and expand U.S.-Israel strategic and economic cooperation. He has fought for policies which are beneficial to Israel and world Jewry and has opposed policies of his own Administration which he deemed to be against the interests of a strong U.S.-Israel relationship.

D'Amato's importance to the pro-Israel community is best understood by his consistency, willingness to differ with a prevailing opinion, and ability to implement policies which may not be popular at a given time. When Saddam Hussein threatened to burn half of Israel with chemical weapons, D'Amato took the lead on proposing sanctions against Iraq. When Scud missiles were falling on Israeli population centers, D'Amato went to Israel to express solidarity with the Jewish State. He was also one of the first and most vocal supporters of Israel's request for \$10 billion in absorption loan guarantees. Throughout his tenure in the Senate, D'Amato has either initiated, or at the least, supported, every legislative initiative opposing the proposed sale of arms to Israel's enemies.

Since this general election campaign could not begin until the Democratic primary was held on September 15, the candidates will have to focus heavily on paid media in the few weeks before November 3. Although he faces a well-known opponent, D'Amato has demonstrated a willingness and ability to fight as hard as necessary to win this race.

## Ohio: Mike DeWine (Challenger)

Incumbent Senator John Glenn's association with S&L financier Charles Keating will make his 1992 reelection bid the most difficult of his career. He is also plagued by a campaign debt, from his failed 1988 presidential campaign, which exceeds \$3 million. The negative press associated with these and other issues led Ohio voters, according to a January 1992 poll, to desire another candidate over Glenn by an almost two-to-one margin.

Glenn's opponent, Lieutenant Governor Mike DeWine, served in Congress from 1983 through 1990. Contrary to Glenn's perceived inattention to the parochial issues facing Ohio, DeWine achieved many legislative successes during both his eight years representing Ohio's 7th district and his time as an Ohio state senator. In addition to his

tough positions on drug crimes and support for capital punishment, he is credited specifically with strengthening drunken-driving laws both on the state and national levels.

DeWine served on the House Foreign Affairs Committee while in the House and it is this arena that his work was best known. In addition to his ardent support for the Nicaraguan resistance fighters, DeWine advocated an aggressive U.S. posture against international terrorism. He opposed granting a visa to PLO leader Yasir Arafat in both 1988 and 1989 and supported legislation to close down the PLO offices in the U.S. His understanding of Israel's strategic value led him to be a supporter of close U.S.-Israel relationship in all spheres of interest to the two countries. His support for the U.S.-Israel strategic relationship and for the maintenance of Israel's qualitative and technological advantage stands in stark contrast to Glenn, who took a lead role in opposing Israel's request for super computer technology which the U.S. has agreed to share, or in fact is already sharing with countries such as Saudi Arabia, Abu Dhabi, and India.

DeWine has kept pace with Glenn's fundraising throughout the first two quarters of this year and national Republican leaders have committed close to \$1 million for DeWine's challenge. Glenn's vulnerability may be best quantified by a May poll which showed that at least 51 percent of Ohio citizens characterized Glenn's job performance as either fair, poor, or very poor. President Bush took Ohio in 1988 with 55 percent and current data shows the state as a toss-up. DeWine will be helped by the Bush campaign's strong focus on Ohio this time around.

## Oregon: Bob Packwood (Incumbent)

Bob Packwood's bid for a fifth term will be one of the most closely watched Senate races in 1992. Since his election in 1968, Packwood has been one of Israel's best friends in the Senate. This year he will be facing the most expensive and fiercely contested reelection campaign of his political career.

Packwood has made tremendous contributions to the U.S.-Israel relationship and Israel's security and demonstrated first-rate leadership on these issues. He has carved out a special niche for himself as a result of his lead role in opposing advanced arms sales to Israel's enemies. The longer he has served in the Senate, the more Packwood has also been able to use his seniority to protect the U.S.-Israel relationship. As the ranking member of the Senate Finance Committee in 1988, for example, he supported a 1988 trade bill only after specifically exempting Israel's trade agree-

ment with the United States from any damage.

Packwood is also credited with possessing in-depth historical knowledge on the Middle East, the Arab-Israeli conflict, the history of Zionism and the re-birth of the State of Israel. On many occasions, he has taken to the Senate floor and provided historical context to current events in the region. His understanding and knowledge of the evolution of Israel's geographic borders, from biblical through modern times is unparalleled by any of his colleagues. His ability to articulate this information and educate others is invaluable to the pro-Israel community.

On the domestic front, his combination of fiscal conservatism with liberal stands on abortion and the environment have made him powerful enemies on both sides of the political spectrum. He is a firm believer in the free market and crusades for deregulation and lower taxes. Packwood received a boost when he was endorsed by the National Abortion Rights League executive board, a plus in a pro-choice state such as Oregon.

Packwood faces veteran Congressman Les AuCoin who narrowly defeated 1990 Senate candidate Harry Lonsdale for the Democratic nomination. AuCoin secured the nomination despite his belated admission to bouncing 80 checks as part of the House bank's "Rubber-Gate" scandal. With a strong political base in Portland and a seat on the powerful Appropriations Committee, AuCoin will be able to raise a large campaign war chest and be an extremely formidable opponent for Packwood.

Packwood's unique contributions on behalf of issues of concern to the Jewish community have been invaluable over the past 23 years. His role could not be replaced or duplicated.

## South Carolina: Tommy Hartnett (Challenger)

Former Congressman Tommy Hartnett represents one of the best opportunities to take advantage of the anti-incumbency mood and replace a Senate incumbent with someone who is more sensitive to the concerns of the Jewish community. Hartnett is running against 25-year incumbent Senator Fritz Hollings. Hollings, who in the past has been accused of making insensitive remarks against a number of religious and ethnic groups, including African Americans, Catholic bishops, and Hispanics, once referred to Senator Howard Metzenbaum as the "Senator from B'nai B'rith."

Hartnett is considered to have a genuine feel for the concerns of his state's voters. As South Carolina's leading proponent of term limitations, Hartnett promised to serve only three terms if elected to the House in 1980. After six successful years in Congress, Hartnett kept his word and did not run for reelection in 1986. In contrast, many pundits believe Hollings is simply out of touch with the voters of South Carolina. He was the only member of the state's delegation who voted against authorizing the President to use force against Iraq, opposes the capital gains tax cut, favors a 5% Value Added Tax, opposes educational choice, favored Senator Kennedy's "quota bill," and opposes product liability reform.

Hartnett has authored an in-depth position paper, in which he commits to strengthen and enhance the many aspects of the U.S.-Israel relationship. In a letter on behalf of Hartnett, Housing Secretary Jack Kemp notes that during Hartnett's tenure in the House from 1980-1986, Hartnett "strongly supported America's solemn, historic commitment to the State of Israel and to the security needs of the Israeli people. His voice in Congress is sorely missed by all the friends of Israel." Hollings, on the other hand, has consistently voted against the interests of a safe and secure Israel throughout his Senate tenure. Most recently, during the Senate Appropriations Committee's consideration of the Fiscal Year 1993 Foreign Aid Appropriations bill containing absorption loan guarantees for Israel, he was the only member to vote against the entire bill. Consistent with this anti-foreign aid record, he was also one of only 12 Senators to vote against the bill when it was on the Senate floor.

South Carolina Governor Carroll Campbell, who is considered one of the most popular public officials in the state, is the honorary chairman of the Hartnett campaign, and has been very active on behalf of Hartnett's candidacy. Recent polls taken after Hollings spent almost \$1 million on television ads show that Hollings is losing ground to Hartnett. They also indicate that over 62 percent of those polled think that either Hollings should be replaced or that someone else should be considered. More telling, of those who have an opinion of both candidates, Hartnett beats Hollings by nine points. Once Hartnett has the ability to get his message out, Hollings will be in for the toughest race of his career.

# NJC Election Report



## Washington: Rod Chandler (Open Seat)

With the retirement of Brock Adams, this seat represents the best opportunity for a Republican to pick up a seat being vacated by a Democrat. Congressman Rod Chandler, who has represented Washington's eighth district since 1983, will face State Senator Patty Murray. Chandler is an independent-minded moderate Republican who has sought to better the lives of his constituents without the need for great fanfare or attention. He has also been an ardent advocate of many issues of concern to the Jewish community. Chandler's credibility and dedication has given him the valuable ability to forge a working consensus with colleagues on both sides of the aisle.

Chandler has made his mark on an array of legislation to simplify federal regulations on pension plans and to expand access to health care without federal mandates. He has also opposed legislation which would place undue burdens on businesses. He supports a balanced budget amendment, term limitations, and limits on PAC contributions. Chandler is pro-choice and supports federal abortion funding in cases of rape or incest. Before winning the party's nomination, the National Republican Senatorial Committee took the unusual step of endorsing Chandler in the primary, as did HUD Secretary Jack Kemp.

Chandler's reliability on issues of concern to the Jewish community is unique. He has not missed even a single opportunity to support final passage of a foreign assistance bill containing aid for Israel during his House tenure. He has taken a leadership role to ensure that any potential F-15 sale to Saudi Arabia is consistent with Israel's security. He was a staunch and vocal supporter of a strong response to Saddam Hussein's aggression in the Gulf war, and voted to impose sanctions on Iraq prior to the invasion of Kuwait. He was also an early supporter of Israel's request for absorption loan guarantees. Unlike most candidates for the Senate, his opponent had not disseminated a position paper on Israel prior to the Democratic primary.

In the open "jungle" primary which was held September 15, the Democratic candidates pooled 49 percent of the vote while the Republican candidates garnered 48 percent. Republicans have been victorious in this state, as evidenced by Senator Slade Gorton, who has defended his Senate seat twice. Chandler's opponent will seek to capitalize on the anti-incumbency mood in the country by emphasizing "change" as a campaign theme. Chandler will try to expand the high approval ratings and high levels of support which he enjoys in his own congressional district to the rest of the state. Chandler, however, has had a difficult time to date competing with Murray's ability to raise money.

In the House, Congressman Rod Chandler has a strong, proven record of support for the pro-Israel agenda. If he wins in November, he will be a very strong friend in the Senate.

## Wisconsin: Bob Kasten (Incumbent)

Never having won more than 51 percent of the vote, Senator Bob Kasten has never had an easy race defending his seat in the U.S. Senate. Not only will this year not be any different, but it may well be the most difficult reelection bid in his entire political career.

Kasten will face State Senator Russ Feingold, whose come-from-behind upset over two better known Democrats earned him national attention. Feingold is expected to mimic his successful primary strategy in the general election and run as the political outsider with few or no ties to Washington.

For those who care about the future of U.S. support for Israel, Senator Kasten's reelection is of preeminent importance. There has truly been no greater leader in the Senate on issues affecting the U.S.-Israel relationship than Senator Kasten. As ranking member of the Senate Appropriations Foreign Operations Subcommittee, Kasten has been at the forefront of securing \$3 billion in annual all-grant foreign aid to Israel. He has also secured passage of innovative initiatives which further stretch Israel's assistance, which has remained at the same level for eight years, by close to an additional \$100 million annually. Kasten was also the leading advocate in support of granting \$10 billion in unconditional absorption loan guarantees to Israel. His eloquent floor speeches articulating the moral commitment to resettle the refugees who are fleeing the former Soviet Union were emotionally riveting and served to sensitize his Senate colleagues to the importance of this humanitarian endeavor.

Kasten's conservatism and devotion to free market principles has earned him the respect of many supply-side economists, while his concern for the environment has earned him the respect of conservationists. His tireless efforts on behalf of issues of concern to the Jewish community makes this one of the most important races this election. His defeat would be a tremendous loss for the pro-Israel community.

## Surveying the Bush Record

When Jewish Republican speakers go out into the Jewish community, the central question they are asked is this: What has George Bush really done for the Jewish community?

The reality is that George Bush has done a great deal. On both foreign and domestic policy, the Bush Administration has a tremendous record of accomplishments:

**Israel is safer now than ever before.** The historic Middle East peace process has brought the Arab states and Palestinians to the negotiating table with Israel. There is real, substantive dialogue taking place in a structure set up largely along the lines requested by Israel. The Bush Administration has enhanced and institutionalized strategic cooperation with Israel, which brings important defense benefits to both countries. The great military threat to Israel and the Middle East, Iraq, was destroyed in Operation Desert Storm.

**Israel continues to receive \$3 billion in aid, all of it grants.** This money is disbursed in a lump sum payment at the start of the year, not in installments, so that Israel gets the benefit of the interest on the money. The Bush Administration also provided Israel with emergency supplemental aid after the Gulf War. This Administration recently announced that it would transfer over \$700 million worth of advanced armaments to Israel from existing U.S. stocks to help maintain Israel's qualitative military edge. It was also this Administration which initiated the program of prepositioning U.S. military stockpiles in Israel.

**Immigrant absorption assistance is moving forward.** This year the President asked Congress to authorize \$10 billion in loan guarantees for Israel, which the Congress approved. In 1990 the U.S. provided \$400 million in housing loan guarantees.

**The U.S. continues to oppose the PLO.** The Bush Administration cut off the U.S. dialogue with the PLO and continues to oppose efforts by the PLO to gain international legitimacy or to participate in the Mideast peace talks.

**The U.S. has worked to save oppressed Jewish communities.** President Bush has been committed to helping Soviet, Ethiopian and Syrian Jews reach safety in Israel.

**President Bush has fought antisemitism,** by successfully building a coalition to repeal the U.N. resolution equating Zionism with racism, by speaking out against the rise of antisemitism in the former Soviet Union and

Eastern Europe, and by speaking out often against antisemitism in this country.

Those are the first things the Jewish community needs to know. But there is more to the Bush record.

**George Bush has been an effective world leader,** facing the challenge of a rapidly changing world. His policies regarding the breakup of the Soviet Union have been prudent and successful. The U.S. is now helping the emerging democracies of Eastern Europe develop vital democratic and free market systems.

**At home, President Bush has initiated new housing and welfare reform programs** to empower the poor to take control of their lives. Home Ownership for People Everywhere (HOPE), implementation of the Family Support Act and an extension of the Earned Income Tax Credit have helped the poor and working poor become less dependent on public housing and welfare. The President has proposed enterprise zones to encourage the creation of jobs and business opportunities in the inner cities.

**Education has been a priority for this Administration.** It has proposed school choice programs and major education reform. President Bush proposed the largest budget increase ever for Head Start, the program for early childhood learning development.

**President Bush proposed the first new major health care reform package,** known as "managed care", cutting costs while creating access to health care for more Americans.

**The Bush Administration has taken steps to spur economic growth** through tax incentives for first-time homebuyers and for businesses.

**Trade barriers have fallen under President Bush,** with the proposed North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) and other current programs opening markets to U.S. goods. The U.S. trade deficit reached its lowest levels in a decade under President Bush, and exports have reached their highest level ever. Our trade relations with Japan have improved, to the benefit of American workers and consumers.

**In every field of policy-making, President Bush has a strong record of achievement.** An objective comparison of the records and abilities of the two men running for President this year offers a clear distinction between the candidates. George Bush has done well for this country, and he has done much to help Israel and the Jewish community. This, unfortunately, is the record which the Jewish community does not know enough about.

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## New Faces on Capitol Hill Mean Opportunities, Challenges for Jewish Community

While it is difficult to predict the precise results of this year's national elections, two outcomes are known: many new faces will be coming to Capitol Hill, and many old friends will be leaving Washington. With over one-third of the House expected to turnover in an atmosphere charged by voter anger, we will be facing an unrecognizable, untested, and unpredictable political landscape on Capitol Hill.

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*With close to 100 open seats in the House and Senate, there will be many new faces in the 103rd Congress*

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The combination of retirements, reapportionment, and primary losses will result in the largest freshman class of new congressmen in over six decades. Fresh faces, new agendas, and revised priorities will prevail when the 103rd Congress convenes in January. Many of the new members will have campaigned on a theme of "change" — which is consistent with the anti-incumbent emotion sweeping the nation. We must, however, exercise extreme prudence to ensure that the desire for change does not effect those policy areas in which Congress has demonstrated an effective role. For example, while many of us look forward to Congressional reforms in the way our country addresses its social and economic problems, we should not forget Congress' historically consistent and invaluable support for a strong U.S.-Israel relationship.

This election cycle is truly a watershed period. Already there are close to ninety open seats in the House of Representatives and nine open seats in the Senate. The anti-establishment,

anti-Washington mood prevalent this year has produced many first-time candidates — future members of Congress — who lack the experience of previous political involvement on the key issues of importance to our community.

As a result, over the course of their first months in office, we must introduce ourselves to these new members of Congress and work to establish close, working relationships with them. We should strive to be viewed as friends and educators, and must position ourselves so that our views and opinions are solicited before, during, and after congressional deliberations on issues of importance to us. In addition, we will need to reinvigorate our advocacy on behalf of U.S. foreign assistance. Foreign aid has traditionally been one of the least understood and consequently most unpopular programs debated on Capitol Hill. New members of Congress will need to be educated on the importance of foreign assistance to U.S. foreign policy.

On the domestic front, Republican Jewish activists must be heard on an array of issues, ranging from civil rights, to the problems of the inner cities, to education reform. The Jewish community is not monolithic on these crucial issues facing our country, and our collective voices in these areas would be both refreshing and welcome to the Republican leadership in Congress.

Compounding the difficulties associated with candidates who are unfamiliar with the Jewish community, many of our close Republican friends in Congress who have demonstrated leadership on the pro-Israel agenda have chosen not to run for reelection this year. They will be difficult — if not impossible — to replace. In their absence, other leaders will need to be cultivated and befriended. With the potential for up to 150 new members of

the House of Representatives, our relationships with current members of Congress will gain increasing importance as they quickly gain seniority and influence in Congress.

Regardless of who is elected or defeated on November 3, those who return to Congress in January will claim to have been given a mandate to "change." As Jewish Republicans, we should remember the story of Queen Esther in Jewish history, as we prepare to work within a dramatically changed political landscape next year. Once Esther worked her way into a position of trust and authority in the eyes of King Ahasuerus, she was able to serve as a crucial counter to the wicked, political influence of Haman. Her access and influence with the king enabled her to duly represent the interests of her community by "petitioning the decision-maker", thereby successfully securing the repeal of the evil decree calling for the slaughter of the Jewish people.

We should all strive to emulate the actions of Queen Esther as we expand our legislative involvement after the November elections.

#### Arlen Specter

**RATING:**  
**Highly Vulnerable**

Arlen Specter has proven to be one of the most durable figures in Pennsylvania politics. He began his career in the early 1960's as a Democrat, crusading against corruption as an assistant District Attorney in Philadelphia. In 1965 he released a report calling the system a "cesspool," switched parties to become a Republican, and was elected Philadelphia District Attorney. Serving two terms, he earned a national reputation as a reformer. After being defeated for a third term and losing several statewide races, Specter made a political comeback in 1980, winning election to the United States Senate.

On Capitol Hill, Specter has maintained the law and order reputation he earned back home. As a member of the Judiciary Committee he has been actively involved in drafting federal law enforcement legislation. He was the author of a 1984 law providing that persons with three robbery convictions receive a federal sentence of 15 years to life without parole if caught with a gun. The law was later extended to violent crime and drug offenders.

Specter is regarded as a constitutional scholar by many, and has played a prominent role in Supreme Court confirmation hearings. He is a leading supporter of the death penalty for drug kingpins, terrorists, and those guilty of espionage and treason. In 1990 Specter co-authored a successful habeas corpus amendment to the crime bill that restricted appeals by death row inmates. He has called for an international court to try terrorists and in 1991 introduced an amendment which extends the death penalty to terrorists who murder U.S. citizens here or abroad. He opposed giving visas to Yasir Arafat in 1988 and 1989.

Specter's seat on the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Foreign Operations as well as the Subcommittee on Defense provides him with a unique platform to make tremendous contributions to the U.S.-Israel relationship. His accomplishment in the area of enhancing Israel's security has earned him the frequent accolade of being one of Israel's best friends on Capitol Hill. He is one of a very small handful of legislators to have supported every foreign aid bill containing assistance to Israel during his Senate

tenure. He is an outspoken advocate on behalf of maintaining Israel's military qualitative edge over its adversaries and has been a consistent opponent of advanced arms sales to Arab states.

His contribution to the U.S.-Israel relationship does not end with his votes. During the loan guarantee debate, in addition to writing a letter urging the President not to delay consideration of the loan guarantees, he authored an op-ed article carried by Jewish papers around the country outlining the need for absorption assistance and urging American Jews to lobby aggressively on behalf of the guarantees.

On many occasions, Arlen Specter has challenged criticism of Israel with precise and invaluable arguments. He provided a legal basis for Israel's apprehension of terrorist Sheik Obeid in 1989 and criticized the Administration's rush to back a U.N. resolution criticizing Israel for the Temple Mount incident in 1990. In 1991, Specter drafted a resolution terming Israel's strike against the Iraqi Osirak nuclear reactor a legitimate and justifiable act of self-defense and calling upon the U.S. to seek the repeal of the 1981 U.N. Security Council resolution which condemned Israel's action.

Specter has made significant contributions to Israel's security in quiet, unpublicized ways. After Iraqi Scud missiles began raining on Israel, Specter intervened with key Administration officials and ensured that Israel received the U.S.-led coalition's "Identify Friend or Foe" codes, which gave Israel the ability to retaliate against the missile strikes. Most recently Specter organized a new Senate Caucus on U.S.-Israeli Security Cooperation to institutionalize and enhance U.S.-Israel military cooperation and planning. Specter has gone to great lengths to publicize

Israel's strategic contributions to the coalition forces during the Gulf War.

Through energy and hard work, Specter has earned support from Pennsylvania voters. In 1986 he won reelection with 56% of the vote.

This year however, he faces political newcomer Lynn Yeakel, who won her party's nomination by capitalizing on the anger and frustration following the Clarence Thomas confirmation hearings. She has received much national attention and support from women's groups and liberal organizations. Her fundraising abilities have been impressive.

Yeakel's association with the Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church, which has hosted a series of anti-Israel and antisemitic programs, has raised serious concerns within the Jewish community. As a member of the church's Board of Directors, she has refused to condemn the anti-Zionist rhetoric, and pro-Palestinian actions of the church.

This race has been neck-and-neck since the primary. Although polls are beginning to show movement in favor of Specter, they are too little and too late to bring comfort to the pro-Israel community. As former AIPAC Director Morris Amitay wrote, "a Specter defeat in November would be an incalculable loss."

What is the greatest threat to American democracy? Big government? Judicial activism? Commercial television? No — public apathy. Everyone complains about the inefficiency of government, but only about 50 percent of eligible voters cast ballots in the 1988 presidential election. Far fewer than that voted in the congressional elections of 1990. As George Jean Nathan said, "Bad officials are elected by good citizens who do not vote."

For the Jewish community, voter apathy is especially disastrous. We are a tiny minority in this country, yet we want the White House, the State Department and all 535 members of the House and Senate to pay attention to the issues that concern us: Israel's security, freedom for Soviet and Ethiopian and Syrian Jewry, the fight against antisemitism. How do we bring our views and concerns to the attention of decision makers? By being part of the process — by participating in choosing the decision makers, and then staying involved with them as they serve their terms of office. If you throw up your hands at the problems in government, shut your eyes and stay at home on election day, you guarantee the Jewish community less representation, less access and a lesser ability to influence events.

The NJC believes that it is vital for Jews to be represented on both sides of the political aisle. The exclusive alliance of Jews and Democrats, we believe, has outlived its value. For Jews to be solely supportive of one political party is not in the best long-term interest of our community. If all Jews were simply Democrats, the Democratic Party would take us for granted and Republicans would ignore us. The Jewish community will be in the strongest position when we are equally represented in both parties.

Casting a vote is a one-time act, a simple errand to carry out once every two years. But the long-term benefits are enormous. Greater involvement — volunteering, contributing to campaigns, speaking out for candidates — has an even greater impact. Whatever your political affiliation, if you want your views to be known, you have to make your voice heard. As a citizen, you have a responsibility to vote, because you enjoy the benefits of living in this great country. If you care about Jewish issues, you have an even greater obligation to get involved, because if we as a community are not involved in the political process, our issues will be ignored. Look at the candidates, assess their records, decide which issues matter most to you. Then get involved in the process and cast your vote for the candidate and party of your choice.

## The Silence of the Jewish Community

Too often in this election year we have heard in the Jewish community only criticism of the Bush Administration and praise for Bill Clinton. Simple fairness would dictate a more balanced approach, but more importantly, Jewish voters have an obligation to understand the strengths and weaknesses of both candidates in order to make the best choice in the election.

One of the great frustrations for Republican activists is the lack of press coverage when President Bush does or says something positive for the Jewish community. The fact that none of the Jewish media or organizations publicized the President's repeated and sincere apologies to the community in the aftermath of his September 12, 1991 remarks during the loan guarantees debate is one example. That so few in the Jewish community are aware of the President's personal contribution to saving Soviet and Ethiopian Jews is another.

The silence of the community on the Bush Administration's many positive contributions to the U.S.-Israeli alliance has done a great disservice to the President and to the community. For example, President Bush has expanded special provisions which stretch foreign aid to Israel. The U.S. agreed to allow Israel to increase to \$475 million the amount of its military aid Israel can use to purchase goods and services from domestic Israeli arms industries which contribute directly to Israel's economy.

The Bush Administration has enhanced Israel's security, not only by providing Israel with access to a wide array of the most sophisticated armaments available, but by expanding the military cooperation and joint defense development ventures which are at the core of the strategic partnership. For example, the Bush Administration initiated an agreement with

Israel to pre-position American military equipment in Israel for use by either country in the event of an emergency.

Perhaps most importantly, the Bush Administration has brought about a peace process structured largely on the terms sought by Israel. Today Israeli negotiators are in substantive discussions not only with the Jordanians and Palestinians, but even with the Syrians. Truly Israel is more secure now than ever before in her history.

At the same time, the Jewish community has failed to criticize Bill Clinton for things he has said and done to Israel's detriment. Clinton told CBS *"This Morning"* in June that "I would cut some money out of foreign aid," without saying whether aid to Israel would be included. In his Middle East position paper, Clinton never even mentioned the role of foreign aid, and made no commitment to providing adequate funds to ensure Israel's strategic advantage in the region. The Democratic platform contains no mention of foreign aid to Israel.

Last month, Clinton expressed support for the sale of F-15s to Saudi Arabia -- before any such sale had even been proposed to Congress. President Bush had deliberated for months on whether to propose that sale to Congress. Clinton's remarks politicized a delicate issue and undermined any effective opposition to the sale in Congress.

The NJC has always believed that Jews should be active in both parties, lest we be taken for granted by the Democrats and ignored by the Republicans. This makes the silence of the Jewish media and community leaders all the more reprehensible, because by failing to note the achievements of the Bush Administration and the failings of Bill Clinton, they are denying the Jewish community the opportunity to participate fully in the political process.

## **NJC SENATE PROFILE**

### **Senator Bob Packwood**

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Bob Packwood's bid for a fifth term in the Senate will be closely watched, especially by the American Jewish community. Packwood, who has been one of Israel's best friends in the Senate since his election in 1968, will be facing the most expensive, fiercely contested reelection campaign of his political career.

Packwood has made tremendous contributions to the U.S.-Israel relationship. One indication of his consistently pro-Israel record is that he is one of the few members of Congress to have supported every foreign aid bill containing assistance for Israel since 1976. His most visible contribution to Israeli security has been his lead role in opposing advanced arms sales to Israel's enemies. In 1981 he led the charge against the sale of AWACs to Saudi Arabia. Three years later Packwood's successful organization of Senate opposition to a proposed sale of Stinger anti-aircraft missiles to Jordan convinced the Administration to abandon the sale. In the 100th Congress he led congressional opposition to the sale of advanced missiles to the Saudis.

The longer he has served in the Senate, the more Packwood has also been able to use his seniority to protect the U.S.-Israel relationship. As the ranking member of the Finance Committee in 1988, for example, he supported that year's trade bill only after specifically exempting Israel's trade agreement with the United States from any damage.

Packwood is also known for his deep historical knowledge on the Middle East, the Arab-Israeli conflict, the history of Zionism and the re-birth of the State of Israel. On many occasions, he has taken to the Senate floor and provided historical context to current events in the region. His understanding and knowledge of the evolution of Israel's geographic borders, from biblical through modern times, is unparalleled by any of his colleagues. His ability to articulate this information and educate others is invaluable to the pro-Israel community.

In addition to his contributions to the U.S.-Israel relationship, Packwood has been an active player on the domestic front. He is a firm believer in the free

market and crusades for deregulation and lower taxes. The successful, some say miraculous, passage of tax reform legislation in 1986 would not have been possible without his support as chairman of the Finance Committee.

Though the GOP is now in the minority, Packwood remains influential as ranking member of both the Finance Committee and the Joint Committee on Taxation. He has been President Bush's point man in pursuit of a cut in the capital gains tax rate. He also serves on the Commerce Committee where he is a spokesman for free trade.

Packwood was a lawyer and state legislator before defeating veteran Senator Wayne Morse in 1968. He has been reelected three times since then but polls indicate that he is in serious trouble this time around. His combination of fiscal conservatism with liberal stands on abortion and the environment have made him powerful enemies on both sides of the political spectrum.

In November, Packwood will face veteran Congressman Les AuCoin who narrowly defeated 1990 Senate candidate Harry Lonsdale for the Democratic nomination. AuCoin secured the nomination despite his belated admission to bouncing 80 checks as part of the House bank's "Rubber-Gate" scandal. With a strong political base in Portland and a seat on the powerful House Appropriations Committee, AuCoin should be able to raise a large campaign war chest and will be an extremely formidable opponent for Packwood.

Lonsdale, who lost to AuCoin by only 330 votes, may enter the general election as an independent candidate. Lonsdale, who garnered 46% against Senator Mark

Hatfield in 1990, has campaigned as an anti-politician and recently derided Washington insiders Packwood and AuCoin as "tweedle-dum and tweedle-dee." His entry into the race could serve to split Democratic votes and inevitably help Packwood. A July poll taken by the AuCoin campaign shows the race to be a dead heat, with both candidates taking 40 percent of the vote.

Packwood is gearing up for the coming campaign and is not one to shy away from a tough fight. He has plenty of campaign experience and has won difficult races in the past. As chairman of the National Republican Senatorial Committee in 1981-82, he is credited with maintaining GOP control of the Senate in the middle of a recession. The embattled incumbent also received a boost recently when he was endorsed by the National Abortion Rights League executive board, a plus in this pro-choice state.

Packwood's unique contributions on issues which concern the Jewish community have been invaluable over the past 23 years. His tough race this year will be a key focus for the Jewish community.

### Senator John Seymour

After being appointed in January 1991 to complete the unexpired Senate term of newly-elected California governor Pete Wilson, John Seymour has not only continued in the staunchly pro-Israel path of his predecessor, but forged new ground on issues effecting the U.S.-Israel relationship and evolved into an invaluable leader on a number of key issues of interest to our community.

A successful entrepreneur, Seymour served as mayor of Anaheim until being elected to the state Senate in 1982. As a state senator, he represented more constituents than most congressmen and achieved a highly successful legislative record. Seymour currently serves on four U.S. Senate committees: Energy and Natural Resources; Small Business; Governmental Affairs; and Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

In his bid to protect his Senate seat, Seymour must overcome the twin hurdles of a strong challenger and low name recognition. A moderate in ideological terms, Seymour won the Republican nomination after defeating a primary challenge from the conservative wing of the party. He now faces an uphill campaign against Democrat Dianne Feinstein, the former San Francisco mayor who narrowly lost to Wilson in the 1990 gubernatorial race.

Despite Feinstein's two-to-one advantage in campaign funds and 100 percent name recognition, Seymour has been gaining ground on his opponent. In the last four months, Seymour has shaved at least 15 points off Feinstein's initial lead. Seymour has also begun to air TV spots which characterize Feinstein as favoring tax increases, being soft on crime, and supporting legislation which would cost California jobs.

Seymour's election depends in large part on the success of his

fundraising efforts. These funds are critical if Seymour is to introduce himself to the vast majority of voters who have yet to form an opinion of their new Senator. California campaigns are prohibitively expensive, and it is estimated that he will have to raise upwards of \$18 million in order to compete effectively.

Feinstein is already well known, but her fame may turn out to be her Achilles' Heel. Almost as many voters view her unfavorably as favorably, a result of the bruising 1990 gubernatorial campaign. She must also continue to explain campaign finance reporting violations from her 1990 bid for governor.

Despite being the newest Republican in the Senate, Seymour has demonstrated leadership on key issues of concern to the Jewish community. At the California Republican Party's recent state convention, he played a crucial role in the defeat of anti-Israel resolutions. On a number of occasions, Seymour has taken a leading role in countering statements and policies which could have had damaging effects on the U.S.-Israel relationship.

Following testimony by Secretary Baker in May 1991 that there are no bigger obstacles to peace than Israeli settlements in the West Bank, Seymour immediately wrote a letter to Baker protesting the description. When the Administration was in the process of organizing the Madrid peace conference, Seymour co-authored another letter to Baker,

circulated among his Senate colleagues, stressing that Israel should not be forced to make any concessions in advance or as a condition of talks with its neighbors. He also proposed an amendment to the 1992 foreign aid bill linking proposed arms sales to Arab countries to those countries establishing diplomatic relation with Israel.

Seymour was an early supporter of Israel's request for \$10 billion in absorption loan guarantees. He opposes the establishment of an independent Palestinian state, and was the first U.S. Senator to denounce the one-sided UN Security Council's resolution condemning Israel for its plans to expel Palestinian terrorists.

Seymour is very high on the Democrats' target list, and Republicans are gearing up for what will be one of the most expensive campaigns in the country. Seymour clearly has a chance to win if he can raise the money needed to get his message across to voters.

## What Will Clinton Cost ?



Let's talk about the bottom line. If Bill Clinton becomes President, how much will it cost you? If you are an American business, Clinton could cost you 55 cents of every dollar of profit you make in the first year of his presidency. Here's how:

**Income tax increases on the top two percent of income earners:** increasing the top tax rate to 36 percent, raising the alternative minimum tax and adding a surtax on income tax returns over a million dollars. Keep in mind that fifty percent of the taxes paid by that top two percent of income earners is paid by small businesses and family farms, many of which file as individuals under Subchapter S of the IRS code. Cost: \$12.6 billion.

**Five new corporate taxes.** Cost \$14.6 billion.

**Mandated worker training expenses** of at least 1.5 percent of all wages and salaries. Cost: \$14.0 billion.

**Mandated play-or-pay health care expenditures.** Cost: \$20.7 billion.

**New taxes to pay for play-or-pay health care plan.** Cost: \$36.4 billion.

**Mandated parental leave expenses.** Cost: \$4.5 billion.

**TOTAL COST TO BUSINESSES:** \$102.80 billion. Since that amount comes to 54.8 percent of total profits of American businesses last year, the overall effect would be simply this: the federal government would confiscate 55 cents of every dollar of profit made by American businesses. What a wonderful incentive for economic growth!

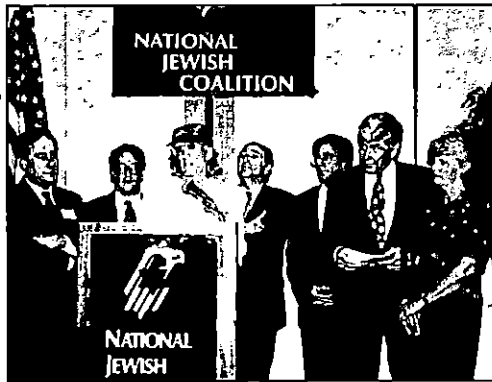

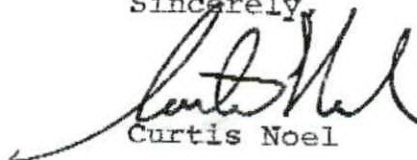
