SUBJECT: WHITE HOUSE CORRESPONDENCE

This memorandum is to request your assistance in expediting Presidential correspondence and draft Presidential messages that are routinely referred to your departments for response. There have been a number of changes in White House offices since this office last circulated a procedures memorandum on this subject. Recently, the number of overdue responses (more than two weeks old) has risen to nearly 4,900 pieces, and it is our hope that this reminder will be helpful in addressing that backlog.

As you know, the President places a very high priority on ensuring that all mail addressed to him is answered promptly and responsively. This includes Presidential mail that is referred to you for response. While the great majority of White House correspondence is answered by the Correspondence Department, letters that require a detailed response, involve information available only from your office, or are from specific constituency groups are referred to the appropriate office for response.

Letters to the President

Official letters and letters of significant interest to the President are first logged into the White House Correspondence Control System. We ask that these letters, covered by an accompanying blue tracking sheet, be answered within nine working days. These letters can be answered by you; or, if you think the writer should receive a Presidential answer, please send a draft reply to White House Correspondence, Room 94, for typing on the President's azure stationery. Please note if you recommend that the President should personally see and sign.

If the letter cannot be responded to within two weeks, the writer should receive an interim reply that acknowledges receipt of the letter and advises the writer that a more detailed response will be forthcoming. This is particularly important if the incoming letter is to be sent to a Department or agency for a draft or for

a direct response. Before sending to a Department or agency, please check with Beverly Ward, Issues Director in Correspondence, x7610, to determine if we have already received approved language with respect to the issue(s) involved. Also, rather than send such a letter directly to the Department, please route it through Interagency Liaison, (COKELL, Room 91) to facilitate the tracking of overdue agency actions.

We also forward to you letters from the general public that deal directly with your office's area of expertise or responsibility. We ask that they, too, be answered promptly -- even if the only possible response is to thank the writer for sharing his or her views. Frequently expressed views/suggestions may warrant development of your own form letter response.

Presidential acknowledgement letters (birthdays, anniversaries, weddings, etc.) must be requested by staff members by means of the completed form, Staff Requests for Presidential Acknowledgment Letter, at least two weeks in advance of the event and sent to Room 93. A copy of the appropriate form is attached.

Presidential Messages

The White House, and many of you individually, receive requests to send Presidential greetings to organizations for special public events such as conventions, annual meetings, or awards dinners. Requests must be received by the Office of Presidential Messages at least four weeks in advance of the event in order to conduct the necessary research, to obtain an Agency draft, to allow time for White House revision, and to receive White House clearances.

It is important that all relevant information about the event be included, and equally important that comments and/or clearances are promptly provided. Attached is a summary of information required for Presidential messages.

Summary

The volume of the President's mail is extremely high -- more than 60,000 incoming pieces per week, 600 staff requests for greetings letters per week, and approximately 300 Presidential messages for public events per month. Your important assistance in managing that volume is very much appreciated.

Requests for Presidential messages should include the following information:

- o Sponsor of event
- o Date of event
- o Date message is required if needed earlier for printing
- o Whether it is to be read or printed
- o Any past involvement by the President with the organization or personal relationship with honorees
- o A draft or bullet points of information to be covered (Drafts should be clearly labelled as to source.)
- o Any special handling/dispatch instructions

SUBJECT: The Crime Bill - Amendments

When we discussed the crime bill a little over a week ago, I was cautiously optimistic that while we might fail in our effort to pass an entire substitute for the Biden Bill, we could prevail in amending it provision by provision. Thus far, that assessment seems to be proving true. On all but the exclusionary rule, we have fared well:

- The Senate agreed to a Thurmond-Biden bipartisan compromise on Federal death penalty procedures.
- By a vote of 58-40, our proposal on habeas corpus was approved. Sixteen Democrats joined all the Republicans in supporting our proposal.
- A D'Amato amendment passed by a vote of 65-33, with support from Senators Wirth and Rockefeller, among others. The D'Amato amendment would make it a Federal crime, punishable by death, to commit a murder with a firearm that had crossed state lines. The Justice Department does have some reservations about what amounts to a substantial extension of Federal jurisdiction.
- A Symms amendment to provide the death penalty for drug-related murders in the District of Columbia passed by a vote of 60-39.
- A Helms amendment to ban preferential employment practices based on race or sex was tabled, by a vote of 71-28. The amendment was viewed by some as being too broad and possibly prohibiting out-reach and other traditional affirmative action programs by employers.
- Today, a D'Amato amendment providing mandatory prison terms for the use or possession of a firearm in the commission of a state crime passed 88-11.

SUBJECT: Draft Letter on Global Climate Change

I suggest that the following language be substituted for the last two sentences in the third paragraph of page one. The primary purpose of the change is to highlight the importance of the National Energy Strategy. The secondary purpose is to revise the statement about carbon stabilization, which is neither factually correct or to the point of the letter in its present form. Actual U.S. CO₂ emissions increased by about 15 percent over the 1975 to 1990 period. The "no increase" claim is valid only for the 1972 to 1987 period. It is, in my view, a hard (and unnecessary) stretch to label this as "the last 15 years" in a letter that will presumably be used in 1991 and 1992.

The policies proposed in the Bush Administration National Energy Strategy, if enacted into law, are projected to hold U.S. greenhouse gas emissions at or below current levels through the year 2030, even accounting for growth in economic activity that more than doubles national output. U.S. progress can also be measured relative to overall world emissions. The U.S. share of world carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gas emissions has fallen sharply over the past 15 years, and will continue to do so in the future under Bush Administration policies.

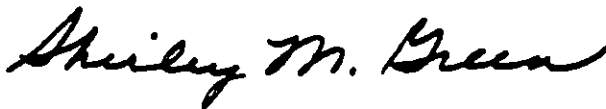
On behalf of President Bush, thank you for your message regarding the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA).

The President strongly believes that the Endowment must be a conscientious steward of taxpayer funds. In an effort to ensure the integrity of the NEA's grant-making process, Congress, working with the Administration, made a number of changes in NEA procedures during its last session, when it reauthorized the Endowment.

Grant applications are reviewed by as many as twenty citizen evaluators, and their recommendations are presented to NEA's National Council on the Arts for consideration and for recommendation to the Chairman. Now, NEA's oversight does not end with the issuance of a grant. If the Endowment determines that funds were not used in accordance with the purpose for which a grant was made, the new legislation authorizes suspension and debarment procedures. This legislation also authorizes the recoupment of funds when funded projects are determined to be in violation of obscenity laws.

President Bush appreciates the concern that prompted you to write. He supports NEA functioning within its Congressional mandate, not to dictate the content of projects, but to seek "artistic excellence ...taking into consideration general standards of decency and respect for the diverse beliefs and values of the American public." He has also made it clear that his Administration will work to ensure that Federal funds are not used for activities that clearly do not warrant financing by U.S. taxpayers.

During our dealings regarding American Satellite Co. v. United States, Cl. Ct. No. 525-89C, we discussed the possibility that Hughes Communications Galaxy, Inc. (Hughes) might file a similar suit based upon the Government's actions in response to the loss of the space shuttle Challenger. On March 22, 1991, Hughes filed such an action, seeking damages in the amount of \$288,454,000 for an alleged breach of contract and an alleged taking of property without just compensation in violation of the Fifth Amendment.

Like American Satellite, Hughes is seeking documents that pertain to the actions of the President and the Economic Policy Council (EPC) in responding to the loss of Challenger. In Plaintiff's First Request For Production Of Documents, Hughes requests the production of the documents identified in the declaration of Olin Wethington, Special Assistant to the President and Executive Secretary of the EPC. In Plaintiff's Second Request For Production Of Documents, Hughes seeks the production of documents pertaining to the development of the new space launch policy and the application of that policy to the payloads pending for launch, see Request Nos. 1, 2, and 4. We believe that documents responsive to these requests are identical to those identified in Mr. Wethington's declaration.

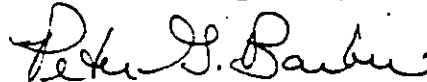
Plaintiff's Second Request For Production Of Documents also requests documents that were not sought by American Satellite. In Request No. 3, Hughes seeks the production of documents pertaining to the evaluation of its satellites by the EPC after the announcement of the President's new launch policy. Hughes also seeks documents pertaining to the marketing of space shuttle services, see Request No. 5; the development of the President's

August 6, 1982 space policy statement, see Request Nos. 6-7; and the development of the policy governing launch assistance that was approved by the President on August 6, 1982, see Request No. 8. The discovery request indicates that documents related to these issues may be in the files of the Executive Office of the President, the Office of Science and Technology Policy, the EPC, the EPC Commercial Space Working Group, the National Security Council (NSC), the NSC Senior Interagency Group (Space), the NSC Interagency Group (Space) ("IG (Space)"), the IG (Space) Working Group, and the National Space Council.

We request that a search be undertaken for any documents that may come within the discovery requests and screen them to identify any that may be privileged. We have requested interested agencies to search their own records and archives for responsive documents. Our response is due on May 6, 1991. Please advise us if additional time will be needed to complete the search for documents and, if so, how much time is needed.

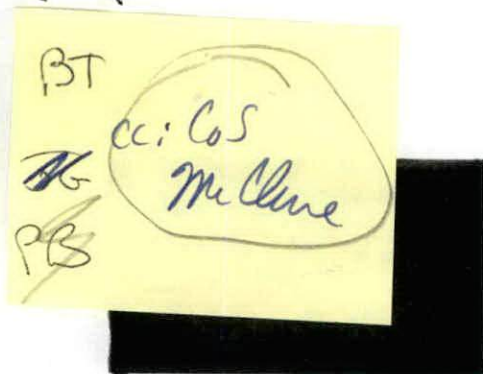

SUBJECT: The Crime Bill

On Thursday, June 20, the Senate began floor consideration of the violent crime control bill, using the Biden bill, S. 1241, as the vehicle.

By a vote of 55 to 41, the Senate agreed to a Bob Graham amendment to strike the "Racial Justice Act" from the Biden bill. The "Racial Justice Act" was Kennedy's proposal that would have invalidated virtually all state death penalty laws.

The Senate rejected, by a vote of 56 to 40, a Thurmond amendment in the nature of a substitute. The Thurmond substitute was the Administration's bill with three changes. First, the provision related to the admissibility of illegally seized firearms was deleted. Second, the provision related to closed hearings on deportation of suspected terrorists was deleted. And third, the authorizations in the Biden bill, approximately \$3.2 billion, were added to the Administration's language.

Two Democrats, Hollings and Shelby, voted for the Administration's substitute. Four Republicans, Chafee, Durenburger, Jeffords, and Rudman, voted against the Administration's substitute. Senator Simpson did not vote.

Last Friday, the Senate debated a Thurmond amendment to strike Biden's exclusionary rule provisions and insert the Administration's exclusionary rule provisions with the exception of the provision related to the admissibility of firearms. A vote is scheduled for 11:30 on Tuesday, June 25.

Today, Senators Thurmond and Biden offered a bipartisan compromise on the death penalty similar to the provisions that passed the Senate last year. Four other death penalty amendments will be offered to the Thurmond-Biden compromise:

- an Inouye amendment relating to the death penalty on Indian reservations;
- a Biden amendment relating to drug kingpins where no death has occurred;

- a Simon amendment relating to life imprisonment without parole in lieu of the death penalty; and,
- a Hatfield amendment relating to the televising of executions.

Other key votes will include:

- the Administration's habeas corpus provisions; and
- an amendment to strike the language in the bill related to the DeConcini ban on the sale of certain semi-automatic weapons.

Also on the gun front, discussions are underway between proponents of a modified Brady bill and Senator Dole, among others. Options include:

- shortening the 7-day waiting period;
- sunseting the waiting period;
- preempting state waiting period laws;
- a firm deadline for implementing the point of purchase identification system; and
- up to \$100 million in funding to assist the states in upgrading their criminal records.

The likelihood of an agreement containing any or all of these options is unclear. It appears that any amendment relating to the Brady bill will be among the last considered by the Senate.

Fight Brews Over RTC's Operations

Critics Call for New Management Team

Top Bush administration officials have concluded that a new, high-powered management team needs to be brought in from the private sector to get the massive and much-criticized S&L cleanup moving, administration sources said.

The pressure for change at the Resolution Trust Corp., the federal agency created two years ago to dispose of failed S&Ls and their assets, has fostered a behind-the-scenes struggle between Treasury officials and RTC Chairman L. William Seidman, who contends that the management team he has assembled is hobbled by having too many bosses. He is advocating consolidating oversight of the agency.

There was more stiff criticism of RTC operations yesterday, this time from Philip Searle, chairman of the RTC's private-sector National Advisory Board, who termed the agency "a massive bureaucracy, inefficient and not businesslike."

His comments, made to a Senate subcommittee, come on the heels of criticism of the RTC last week by the nation's chief auditor, who reported that the RTC—which will handle an industry cleanup whose cost is estimated at as much as \$500 billion over 40 years—has poor control over contracting and cash management.

The RTC is expected to seek approval next week for another \$80 billion in cleanup. Congress already frustrates

With all the complaints and criticisms in Congress is no longer centered so much on whether to overhaul the RTC, but on how to do it.

In draft testimony prepared for delivery before a Senate committee Friday, Seidman proposes combining the two boards that now oversee the RTC and having the agency run by a chief executive who would be appointed by the president.

Treasury Secretary Nicholas F. Brady and other top Treasury officials are known to favor keeping the current structure while bringing in an aggressive, experienced sales team from the financial world. They are arguing,

according to administration sources, that the RTC's top staff, most of whom are former Federal Reserve Bankers, are trained in handling bank failures and liquidations, but have little expertise in packaging and selling billions of dollars in real estate, loans, junk bonds and other securities.

Brady is scheduled to go before Congress next week to ask for more money for the RTC, and Treasury officials said yesterday he would not comment on restructuring the agency until then.

"Most of this is still being discussed," said Seidman yesterday. "We're trying to look and see what improvements can be made."

Seidman and other RTC officials believe their sales efforts are slowed

down by having to answer to one board that oversees operations and a second, cabinet-level board chaired by Brady that sets policy. Their concerns have been picked up by many in Congress, and both the House and Senate banking committees plan to take up proposals to consolidate lines of authority.

"Nobody's in charge if everybody's in charge," said Senate Banking Committee Chairman Donald Riegle (D-Mich.) last week.

The RTC's task is a "financial undertaking of breathtaking proportions," Searle told a banking subcommittee yesterday, noting that Seidman has calculated that even by selling a million dollars a day in assets, it would take 300 years to sell off the RTC's holdings.

The essential flaw in the structure, Searle said, is "the use of bureaucrats to manage a sales/marketing organization that must, if it is to succeed, be able to do business effectively and efficiently in an entrepreneurial, free-market society and economy."

Seidman noted that in less than two years the RTC has become the largest financial institution in the country, with an inventory of loans and real estate poor enough in quality to have brought down the S&Ls that held them.

And, he said, Searle "has been on the advisory board all these months and we've never heard any of that before."

Senate Banking Committee Chairman Riegle and several other committee members said last week that they think a "new team" is needed to run the RTC, particularly because Seidman is expected to retire at the end of September.

"You need some very heavyweights in there," said Riegle.

I am writing to convey my sincere appreciation for the boost you gave to the Nation's surface transportation program on Friday. We have much work ahead of us to reauthorize highway and transit programs before they expire on September 30. Your Rose Garden remarks will provide the momentum necessary to keep us moving forward on this domestic issue so key to America's continuing economic vitality.

The State transportation officials in attendance were most impressed by your remarks. Hal Rives, Commissioner of the Georgia Department of Transportation and the President of AASHTO, termed Friday's event "a great day for AASHTO." Christine Letts, Commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation, expressed appreciation for the Administration's leadership on this watershed transportation legislation. Dick Howard, Secretary of the South Dakota Department of Transportation, echoed the sentiments of several chief executives in his praise for your recognition of the capabilities of the States and the need for greater State flexibility in administering Federal surface transportation programs.

Tommy Harrelson, Secretary of the North Carolina Department of Transportation, completely endorsed your mention of a higher State match or an alternative approach that measures States' levels of effort in meeting transportation needs. He also expressed deep concern that North Carolina receive an equitable share of surface transportation program funds. Mr. Harrelson believes, as do many of his colleagues, that if their States do not receive equitable funding, there will be increased pressure to seek relief through "demonstration" projects. He and others also noted that the Senate bill unnecessarily requires States to program 75 percent of highway funds on the basis of population, and took heart from your comment that "State transportation officials have the vision, the experience and the organizations to ensure that highway funds are spent wisely."

Arnold Oliver, the Chief Executive Officer of the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation, was pleased to hear your continuing strong support for a National Highway System, and noted that the Administration's surface transportation proposal was a strong base from which to build.

Robert Bothman, Director of the Oregon Department of Transportation, very positively viewed your interest in surface transportation, but expressed concern that the transit program was not mentioned more prominently. Charles O'Leary, Commissioner of the New Hampshire Department of Transportation, viewed your Rose Garden remarks as an exciting opportunity to see the Administration moving forward on an important transportation issue and hopes your leadership will continue to be demonstrated through the remainder of the deliberations on this legislation.

I think Frank Francois, Executive Director of AASHTO, best summed up this event for all of us. He stated, "We now have our marching orders. It's a big job, but we can get it done."

On behalf of our State partners and your entire team here at DOT, our warmest thanks for your continuing interest and support, as together we work to move the Nation's transportation system into the next American century. You can be sure we will get it done.

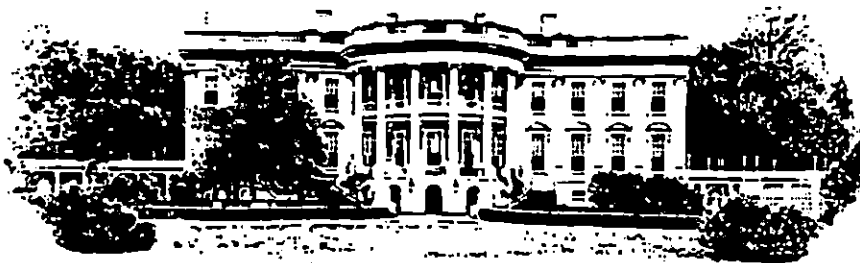

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

On Monday the House convened, but conducted no legislative business.

On Tuesday John Olver (D-MA) was sworn in as the representative for the 1st District of Massachusetts. He was elected to fill the seat of the late Silvio O. Conte (R-MA).

The House then passed H.R. 2622, the Treasury, Postal Service, General Government Appropriations bill for FY 1992. An amendment by Representative David Obey (D-WI), which increases funding for IRS examinations of the tax returns of high income and high asset taxpayers, passed by a vote of 411 to 1.

On Wednesday the House passed H.R. 2621, the Foreign Operations Appropriations Bill by a vote of 301 to 102.

On Thursday the House passed H.R. 2508, the foreign aid authorizations bill for FY 1992 and 1993. There is a senior advisors' veto threat on this bill based on UNFPA funding, numerous earmarks in the bill, and lack of Executive flexibility. The following amendments were added to the bill:

- expressing the sense of Congress that Kuwait should make improvements in human rights and should guarantee fair trials for those accused under the Iraqi occupation of Kuwait;
- prohibiting military aid to Jordan in FY 1992 unless the President certifies that aid is in the U.S. national interest, that Jordan has stopped helping Iraq, and that Jordan is being helpful in the peace process;

AGRICULTURE

June 24. Secretary Madigan will participate in an interview with Roger Runnigan, head of the Small newspapers company. Topics: milk inventory management programs and agricultural credits to the Soviet Union.

June 25. Madigan will address the House Republican Research Committee. Topic: general agriculture issues.

June 27. Madigan will participate in a conference call with forty radio broadcasters from a five state area and Canada who are meeting in Minnesota. Topic: general agriculture issues.

June 28. The Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee will hold a hearing regarding the safety of poultry for consumers. Deputy Administrator of the Food Safety and Inspection Service W.S. Senator Metzenbaum is expected to introduce a bill prior to the hearing calling for "whistle-blower" protection for poultry industry workers and directing the Secretary of HHS to conduct a study on the sources and levels of contamination in poultry. The hearing is expected to generate additional negative publicity for the department and the industry.

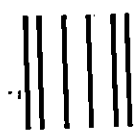

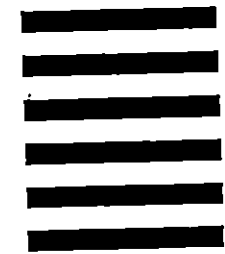

--DRAFT WHITE HOUSE TRAVEL GUIDELINES--

Dear:

Thank you for your letter to President Bush concerning official travel by the Chief of Staff.

The President has publicly and repeatedly expressed his full confidence in the ability and in the integrity of his Chief of Staff, Governor John Sununu. Following a review of the Chief of Staff's travel, the White House Counsel determined that Governor Sununu had complied with the existing policy. However, consistent with the President's commitment to policies aimed at preventing even the appearance of conflicts between personal and public interests, he has directed the adoption of a new White House policy regarding the use of military aircraft by the Chief of Staff and the National Security Adviser. To ensure that military aircraft are used only when necessary, this new policy will require the White House Counsel's Office to review on a case-by-case basis all requests for travel on military aircraft. Other travel by the Chief of Staff in an official car with a driver is authorized by Federal statute.

White House Statement on the Administration's Revised Travel Policy May 9, 1991

The President has directed the adoption
of a new White House Policy on the use of
military aircraft by the Chief of Staff and
National Security Adviser, based upon the
recommendations of Counsel to the Presi-
dent C. Boyden Gray. The new policy is
designed to avoid any questions about their
use of military aircraft.

- The President believes that the nation-
al security-related reasons behind the
former policy remain sound and make
commercial air travel an unacceptable
alternative for the Chief of Staff and

National Security Adviser in many in-
stances.

- Nonetheless, to ensure that military
aircraft are used only when necessary,
the new policy will require the White
House Counsel's Office to review on a
case-by-case basis all requests for travel
on military aircraft.
- In the case of official travel, use of
military aircraft will be authorized
where security, communications, or
scheduling needs require the use of
military aircraft.
- In the case of personal travel, the
President has decided that not only
must there be a determination that se-
curity, communications, or scheduling
needs require use of military aircraft
but also that there is an immediate and
compelling need for personal travel.
The policy would permit, for example,
travel on military aircraft to attend to
the serious illness of a close relative
when security, communications, or
scheduling needs would prevent travel
on commercial aircraft.
- To avoid the appearance that taxpayer
dollars are being used to subsidize po-
litical travel, the President has decided
to prohibit political travel on military
aircraft by the Chief of Staff and Na-
tional Security Adviser unless the offi-
cial purpose for travel is predominant
or the President approves the travel.
- For mixed official and political travel
or mixed official and personal travel,
the policy allows the use of military
aircraft for predominantly official
travel if security, communications, or
scheduling needs require the use of
military aircraft. To ensure that there
is no question about the official pur-
pose behind any trip, the Counsel's
Office will be required to make a de-
termination that a trip is predomina-
ntly official before the trip will be treat-
ed as official.
- The current reimbursement policy for
all nonofficial travel is being retained.
The Chief of Staff and National Securi-
ty Adviser will be required to reim-
burse the Government at commercial
coach rates plus one dollar any time
that they travel on military aircraft for

personal or political reasons. Where the Chief of Staff or National Security Adviser take an official trip and also engage in an incidental political activity on the trip, some part of commercial coach fare will be charged to the sponsor of the political event.

- The new policy does not apply to those members of the Cabinet (including specifically the Secretary of State, the Secretary of Defense, and the Attorney General) who, pursuant to longstanding policies, regularly use Government aircraft for official and unofficial travel. The responsibilities of these Cabinet members are such that they require instantaneous secure communications capability with the White House, their Departments, other Agencies, and the Congress. In an emergency, they must also be able to return to Washington, or to proceed to other destinations, on an expedited basis. These Cabinet members also have a heightened need for security because the nature of their official duties and their public visibility substantially increase the likelihood of threats to their personal safety.

Nomination of Robert H. Pelletreau, Jr., To Be United States Ambassador to Egypt May 9, 1991

The President today announced his intention to nominate Robert H. Pelletreau, Jr., of Connecticut, to be Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Arab Republic of Egypt. He would succeed Frank G. Wisner.

Since 1987 Ambassador Pelletreau has served as Ambassador to the Republic of Tunisia. Prior to this he was Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense, 1985-1987. He was Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern and South Asian Affairs at the Department of State, 1983-1985; Country Director for Arabian Peninsula Affairs at the Department of State, 1981-1982;

Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Near East and South Asia at the Pentagon, 1980-1981. In addition, he was Ambassador to the State of Bahrain, 1979-1980, and Deputy Chief of Mission in Damascus, Syria, 1975-1978. Ambassador Pelletreau was a political officer in Algiers, Algeria, 1973-1975, and served in several capacities in Jordan, Lebanon, Mauritania, and Morocco. Ambassador Pelletreau entered the Foreign Service in 1962.

Ambassador Pelletreau graduated from Yale University (B.A., 1957) and Harvard Law School (LL.B., 1961). He was born July 9, 1935, in Patchogue, NY. He served in the U.S. Navy Reserve, 1957-1958. He is married and has three children.

Nomination of Mary Catherine Sophos To Be a Deputy Under Secretary of the Treasury May 9, 1991

The President today announced his intention to nominate Mary Catherine Sophos, of California, to be Deputy Under Secretary of the Treasury for Legislative Affairs. She would succeed Bryce L. Harlow. Upon confirmation, the President intends to designate her as an Assistant Secretary of the Treasury for Legislative Affairs.

Ms. Sophos currently serves as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Legislative Affairs at the Department of the Treasury. Prior to this she was director of government relations for McCamish, Martin, Brown and Loeffler, 1987-1989. Ms. Sophos was assistant minority counsel and budget analyst for the Committee on Ways and Means for the House of Representatives, 1987, and legislative director and a member of the budget associate staff to Congressman Tom Loeffler, 1982-1986.

Ms. Sophos graduated from Pitzer College, The Claremont Colleges (B.S., 1976). She was born July 10, 1954, in Oxnard, CA. She currently resides in Washington, DC.

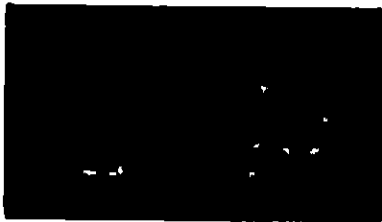

Since I left Camp David and the warm Bush hospitality, I have been traveling. I know you get reports from everywhere in Europe, so this may be repetitive or boring. But you may find some of these personal observations are tiled in the mosaic you must observe.

Italy: Of course, the Secchias send their greetings. Peter brings enormous energy to his job, but wants to be considered for Secretary of Commerce if Bob leaves. He has turned a suite of rooms in the residence into the "Bush Suite". Very nice.

Italy looks sleekly prosperous, better than I have ever seen it. I hope you can take a little time off when you and Barbara are there. I am not saying you would be canonized (right) but it might be close. The papers talk always of Pax Americana.

I was having dinner in Gubbio, a small charming medieval town between Florence and Rome, with a bookseller and the police and security folks. It was a small group of "real" Italians. The youngest cop suddenly rose mid-course with a toast to "President Bush" and a wish that Italy will have leaders like you. Very moving and a great time. The Italians still speak of Max Rabb. We are on a roll with Ambassador Secchia, too. There is a new Labor Minister, a trade union head, who is trying to reform an incredibly expensive pensions system. He seems confident he can. He's very sure of himself and a favorite of the press; he bears some watching for future moves.

Switzerland and the ILO remain about the same. I stayed with Max Abram and his new wife Bruna. He is a thoughtful, kind man, very in tune with you and Boyden on the Civil Rights bill. He is quite in love with Bruna, a charming Italian who has worked in the Human Rights organizations here. Very nice to see.

The new Director General of the ILO had just come back from Kuwait. He wants to work closely with us, I found him a good choice and his observations about Kuwait fascinating.

Had dinner with your friends Sadin and Katie at their chateau where you used to stay. They were both as lovely and welcoming as could be. If you ever wish to know some of the "chatter" about his future, I will be happy to pass it on.

Had a private dinner (the two of us in jeans) with Begum Aga Khan. She is a hoot.

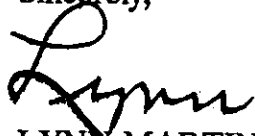
Long talks with Land Kirkland. He is replacing Kenny Young, his long-time alter ego and communications guru, with Jim Baker. (Not that Jim Baker.) Dear Mr. President:

As you know, I recently returned from a trip to Honduras, Nicaragua and Costa Rica, which I visited at the invitation of their leaders. During my stay, I met with the three Presidents and Ministers of the countries to discuss areas of collaboration and technical assistance in natural resource management. All have asked me to convey their best regards to you.

In reviewing your Enterprise for the Americas Initiative with Presidents Callejas, Chamorro, and Calderon, they asked specifically for the United States' help in natural resource management areas. I believe that this is one key to their success in economic development, and I am interested in further pursuing additional technical assistance and collaboration between the following Bureaus of the Department of the Interior and these three nations.

National Park Service: (1) Development of tourism; (2) environmental education; (3) park personnel training, and; (4) park planning and management.

Fish and Wildlife Service: (1) Wildlife inventory and management, and; (2) protection of endangered species.

Bureau of Mines: (1) Improved mining technology; (2) mine safety; (3) environmental hazards reduction, and; (4) mining law regulations.

U.S. Geological Survey: (1) Earthquake and volcano hazard monitoring and reduction; (2) mineral resource identification, and; (3) topographic mapping.

Bureau of Land Management: (1) Timber and forestry management and reforestation; (2) forest fire control, and; (3) Cadastral surveys.

Although all three countries would reap significant benefit from further technical assistance, Nicaragua is most obviously in need. President Calderon of Costa Rica asked me to tell you personally that the situation in Nicaragua is politically

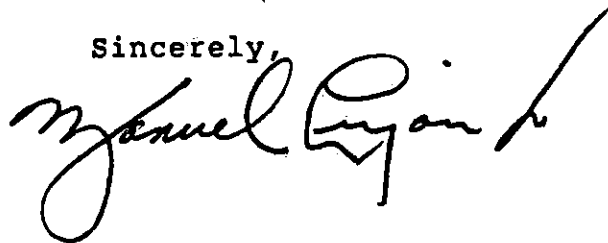
explosive, and it is made more critical by the lack of natural resource development and technology. There is no question in my mind that if economic development does not take place in the near future in Nicaragua, anti-Chamorro sentiment will rise, seriously jeopardizing the region's political stability.

In addition, all three countries have expressed a strong interest in developing the framework for free trade with the United States.

In support of your Enterprise for the Americas Initiative, I intend to send more Department of the Interior technical experts to Central America to develop collaborative programs and provide assistance to Honduras, Nicaragua and Costa Rica in the above mentioned areas.

I view my trip as a very successful one, and I hope it will contribute to furthering the goals of your Enterprise for the Americas Initiative. Should you require further information in any of these areas, I would be pleased to provide it.

The President today named the members of the Nassau County Police Activity League, of Mineola, New York, as the 491st "Daily Point of Light" for the nation. Police officers are fostering better relations with young people, helping them develop good character, citizenship, and sportsmanship.

Started in 1941 when there were only six police officers in all of Nassau County, today the Police Activity League is located in 31 school districts in the county, serving almost 30,000 young people. More than 1,500 police officers, parents, and other concerned community members throughout the county volunteer to serve as coaches and chaperones.

Each of the 31 branches of the program has its own coordinator and corps of volunteers who organize teams and recruit young people to participate. Some programs available for young people include baseball, basketball, wrestling, swimming, boxing, horseback riding, tennis, and hockey. Volunteers coach the teams, through which they teach teamwork, cooperation, and good health. The teams practice at least twice a week and play against other teams on the weekends. Sometimes, they play against teams from other areas in the county, allowing the young people to meet their peers from different racial and economic backgrounds. The Opportunity Center also provides school supplies and clothing, enhancing the chances that the children will go to school.

An artist by training, she has used her drawing and painting skills to earn a living. She started her own business, "Sign Magic," a sign painting company.

After this experience, Mrs. Turner realized the need to acquire employable skills. In 1989, she founded "Women Helping Women," a non-profit organization which trains women who have been displaced by divorce, abuse, or the death of a spouse in trades. She trains the women in sign painting and business management and she recruits local businesses and agencies to teach the women about water and waste management, pest control, carpet and tile installation, commercial truck lettering, and small appliance repair. After choosing a trade, the women spend four hours a day at the business, receiving on-the-job training. Also, 20 volunteers help Mrs. Turner babysit the children while the women are trained. Mrs. Turner and the volunteers also counsel the women and provide transportation to training sessions and job interviews. Women Helping Women has served 135 women since its inception, each one of whom has obtained full-time employment or actively pursued other careers.

I deeply appreciate your March 21, 1991 response to my letter. As you know, the purpose of my letter was quite simply to offer my sincere admiration and gratitude for your leadership during a time of military and economic upheaval. 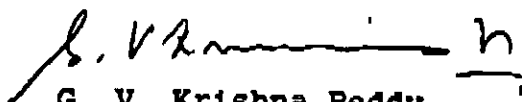

INFIGHTING DISRUPTS WHITE HOUSE, BUSH RE-ELECTION EFFORT

President Bush's political advisers, after searching the landscape in vain for a viable Democratic presidential opponent, appear to have fixed their sights on an enemy -- one another.

For now at least, much of the Republican Party's battle to re-elect Bush next year is intramural, according to Administration and national party officials. They say issue development, fund-raising and electoral strategy have given way to squabbling, backbiting and jockeying for position aboard an evolving campaign structure that is as laden with prickly egos as it is with political acumen.

So deep is the bitterness that some of the President's closest friends and supporters appear in the White House. Over Chief of Staff Sununu's embarrassing [redacted] ... Among influential Republicans, there is concern that some of the President's longtime political aides have had a hand in ensuring that Sununu's travel habits be discussed, with the intention of denying Sununu the same treatment. Officials say he had earmarked for himself in the past.

These are some of the major tensions.

-- Sununu and Robert Teeter, the White House lobbyist and strategist who is likely to direct the campaign, are already vying for control....

-- Clayton Yeutter...sent Bush a private note complaining that Sununu's air travel habits had taken a political toll on the President. The letter, like all such correspondence, passed over Sununu's desk. Yeutter's name now sits on Sununu's lengthy list of the disfavored, several sources said.

-- Sununu and Sig Rogich...are said to be trying to undercut Roger Ailes.... Ailes reacted angrily, and publicly, when another Bush strategist, Charles Black, suggested that Ailes might want to enlist the help of a new York advertising executive, Phil Dusenberry, as part of the ad team Ailes will direct. "Either I make the decisions or I won't be involved at all," Ailes told Adweek. "Black's not going to be in the loop in this as far as I can tell."...

But perhaps the largest dispute among the advisers, and potentially the most significant, is whether Bush need be concerned about his chances for re-election.... Teeter, according to one of Sununu's supporters, wants to run a "kinder, gentler" campaign, while Sununu thinks the Democrats need a good pasting....

Black, one of the few Bush advisers who was willing to speak on the record, sought to downplay the internal strife, insisting that all the President's top political aides get along. Ailes' outburst, Black said, resulted from a misunderstanding. "Friction will be the least of our problems," Black declared. Complacency, he said, is potentially a much greater impediment to reelection.

BUSH CHIDES CONGRESS FOR SECOND STRAIGHT DAY

President Bush attacked Congress for a second consecutive day Thursday, saying its members were ducking responsibility for not passing legislation he had proposed, particularly on transportation and crime.

At a \$1,500-a-plate fundraiser for the Republican Party, the President warned that if the Democrats did not act on his proposals the American people would vote them out of office.

"I also know Capitol Hill," Bush said. "The way the place allows each individual congressman to duck responsibility, even when action is imperative."...

"To listen to the leaders of the Democrats squawk, you'd think I'd violated the Constitution [by asking for a 100-day deadline]," Bush said. "If Congress doesn't get the message, the American people are going to have to get a new Congress," the President said to loud applause....

But Bush added that he was willing to work with "far-sighted, like-minded members of the opposition."...

Some of the loudest applause at the gathering went to Sen. Gramm, who noted that the 100-day deadline was up Friday. "Maybe the Democrats should be reminded what happened to the Baath Party in Iraq when they missed the last deadline set by George Bush," Gramm said. (Reuter)

U.S. IS AVOIDING DOMESTIC PROBLEMS, ECONOMISTS SAY

While President Bush has been criticized for lacking a domestic agenda, some U.S. economists say avoiding domestic issues is getting to be a dangerous national pastime....

Robert Hormats, vice chairman of Goldman, Sachs International, says Bush's attitude reflects a tendency among U.S. leaders at all levels to shy away from decisions on tough economic and social issues.... "But what is politically safe is often economically harmful. Difficult economic and social problems have been allowed to accumulate," Hormats, who was assistant secretary of state under President Reagan, wrote in the latest edition of Foreign Affairs.

...Jeff Frankel, an economist at the Institute for International Economics in Washington, said a lot of America's domestic problems are not being solved because the public does not reward politicians who take them on.... "There are no points in it," Frankel said. "But Bush gets big points for the Persian Gulf War." (Susan Cornwell, Reuter)

But final action on the highway bill remained bottlenecked Thursday over failure to reach a compromise in a dispute over how the highway monies will be divided among the states.

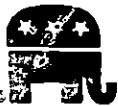

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: CLAYTON YEUTTER *CY*

First, thanks to both you and Barbara for making two appearances this week with the Republican Eagles. They really enjoyed what you had to say. Their mood was upbeat, we gave them a first rate program, and their rapport with each other was very good. We're going to try to give that program a shot in the arm in a number of ways so that we boost the retention rate. There has been too much attrition to suit me. It should be easier to retain major donors than attract new ones.

Larry Bathgate did not participate this week because of a major refinancing problem on some of his real estate loans. The local publicity on this caused him to offer to resign as RNC Finance Chairman, but I told him neither he nor I should do anything precipitous, and that we ought to wait a few days to see whether he can work his way out of his precarious financial situation. As with many real estate people, his problem is one of liquidity and nervous creditors, rather than net worth.

On that same front, I had a conversation today with Skip Hove, my fellow Nebraskan who is Vice Chairman of the FDIC. Skip agrees with me that by far the healthiest sector of the U.S. economy today is the Midwest.

Our friends in Louisiana are still working hard to avoid having a state convention which would likely endorse someone other than Governor Roemer. And they're still trying to persuade Clyde Holloway to drop out of the gubernatorial race and

concentrate on winning re-election to the Congress. Both endeavors are still below 50-50 in probability, but not impossible. Former Governor Dave Treen has been devoting a lot of time to this, and a note thanking him would be very appropriate.

Dan Cook, another fellow Cornhusker who is Goldman Sachs' top man in Dallas, has just taken on a big fundraising obligation for us. He has been attempting to raise \$1.5 million for our redistricting battles. That would be worth a 10 minute motivational stop in the Oval Office sometime if you can spare it.

Tom Pauken did lead the race for the Congressional contest in Dallas, with Sam Johnson, a state legislator, joining him in the runoff. Pauken took some flak for publicly criticizing you on domestic spending, but he responded by saying that critics failed to appreciate the context of his remarks and that he was really a big fan of George Bush. He would appear to have some unguided missile characteristics!

My impression is that Boyden Gray and his staff did a fine job on the travel controversy, though it is too early to tell whether that will extend the story or cause it to wind down. My guess is the latter because the press is now relegated to working the details, and the American public is not much interested in those.

There are a couple of lessons to be learned from this experience. One is that it almost never pays to be dilatory in providing the facts in such situations. That simply generates suspicion of wrongdoing, and fosters conjecture and innuendo which keep the story alive. It would have been better to have gotten the facts out more quickly in this case, but what has now been done seems responsive.

The second lesson is that one has to be scrupulously careful about travel because it is such a political lightning rod. Perceptions count for more than reality in this area, and we sometimes learn that the hard way.

I took the political pulse of some of our top Republican chairmen, committeemen, and committeewomen this past week and found them optimistic. All said the travel allegations were a negative, though not nearly as big a story as here in D.C. All were more concerned about your health, and about the political impact of that incident on the Vice President. They are very supportive of the Vice President but concerned that he may now be battered even more in the press. Fortunately, that pendulum seems to be swinging a bit to the Vice President's side in recent days. It has required remarkable restraint on his part over the past couple of years not to strike out against the press, but that will pay political dividends for him in years to come. People respect a class act, and the Vice President has been just that.
