Mr. Johnson's contract expires at the end of the month. I would hope very much that it could be renewed. He has indicated that he would consider working for at least another three months. Obviously, I would hope he could be persuaded to work longer.

As in the past his work has been of the highest quality, and has contributed in a significant way to the success of our two-fold mission, managing the Presidential records for current needs and preparing them for future use at the Presidential library.

We have assigned him almost exclusively to the NSC files which have been coming to us in significant quantities on an almost daily basis -- in contrast to previous administrations when we got very few of them at all. In those instances, NSC boxed and placed them in an NSC storeroom from which they were sent directly to the library at the end of the administration. ORM views the NSC policy change as a vote of confidence in our operation. We would like very much to be able to process these documents both for quick recall now by NSC as well as research in the future at the Presidential library. Certainly it falls within our mandate to take on this responsibility.

However, the volume has been overwhelming. We simply are not staffed to handle the number of cases coming to us. As I have mentioned before, the ORM staff was geared to the volume of documents generated during the Reagan Administration. The offices that regularly sent files to ORM during those years continue to deposit material with us and, in almost every case, in larger quantities than before. NSC is a case in point. To date, NSC has sent to ORM approximately 15,000 cases. Mr.

Johnson has inventoried 5,300+ of them, concentrating on those that are security classified and/or more important. Being unable to keep up with the volume, we simply maintain the rest in numerical order according to a NSC assigned number. This option gives us only the ability to respond to NSC requests when they are able to provide the ID number for the case. Certainly we have other staff who could assist with this, but their normal assignments more than fill their day. Further, since we receive more requests for files from -- among others -- the offices of the President, the First Lady, the Staff Secretary, the Counsel, Presidential Personnel, Presidential Messages, Correspondence and the Chief of Staff, we are forced to spread our staff resources to accomodate "their" materials.

Short of increasing our staff, Mr. Johnson remains the most promising option for processing the NSC files. In his absence, we will be faced with some hard choices about where to cut more corners, a very disagreeable exercise.

Good work on your fundraisers the past week or so. All did well financially, and such events are helpful in getting out your message on the "domestic agenda." People just pay more attention out in the country than they do here inside the Beltway.

Perhaps the highest marks came from Utah, where we have an outstanding Republican state chairman. Our field people helped on your events there, and the teamwork was excellent. It was an example of the complementarity we need to achieve among us, the state parties and your campaign organization as we go into 1992. I believe we'll do a better job on that next year than in the past, because we're beginning to get younger, hard charging chairmen in a number of states.

I was in Pennsylvania a couple of days ago, and the Thornburgh race still looks solid though his lead is narrowing. Wofford is using TV heavily, as he must, but he'll run short of funds unless his numbers improve dramatically over the next few days.

As you know, Vice President Quayle was in the South last week--and was exceptionally well received, as always. He is concerned about Roemer/Duke, as are we, so your event there could be very critical. Louisiana is a very enigmatic political environment!

The Johnson/Fordice gubernatorial runoff in Mississippi takes place Monday, and is expected to be very close. If they make peace afterwards, either has a reasonable (though uphill) shot against Ray Mabus, an unpopular governor.

Mitch McConnell was in yesterday and he says that the Hopkins campaign in Kentucky is picking up. Though Jones, the Democratic candidate, has far more money to spend, Hopkins has been able to successfully challenge some of Jones' previous campaign expenditures. Still a longshot for Larry, but not impossible.

Redistricting is now finished in about ten states. We've retrogressed in none, gained in most. As these battles now heat up in the bigger states we're going to have strains between us, our governors and our state parties on the one hand (all of whom are generally working well together) and incumbent Republican Congressmen and legislators on the other. The latter continue to be the biggest threat to progress, as they try to give themselves a lock for years to come. Governor Sununu did a fine job on this when you were in California.

As you could undoubtedly tell, there are lot of strains and political cross currents everywhere in California. All of us at the White House and the RNC will simply need to nurture that situation along in the coming months. I plan to make another trip there reasonably soon.

Kerrey and Clinton presumably join the Democratic candidate roster within the next few days. Both will get some immediate attention--Kerrey on glamour, Clinton on Republican-like substance! But I don't see any of the Democratic candidates sustaining a high profile during the rest of this year. They simply won't have the money.

✓ Fundraising is mighty difficult for us in a recession, and it'll be even tougher for them.

As to policy issues, in my view we'll need an active health care agenda by early next year. We are now positioned in a passive mode, for very good reasons, but we'll not be able to sustain that politically. We do not necessarily need a comprehensive program; that may be impossible to engender in such a short time. But we need to get specific, market-oriented proposals on the table in some of the major niche areas, or we're going to be on the leadership defensive next year. This issue will receive more attention in 1992 than it deserves because the Democrats perceive it as a weak spot in our armor.

✓ Our principal 1992 worry is the economy. The economic indicators look reasonably good, but consumer confidence has been falling. If the latter trend continues, the indicators are going to be poor predictors. That says that we ought to build some of the good economic news into your forthcoming speeches in order to give consumer confidence a shot in the arm. We can't be fluffy about it, but we need to offset some of the gloom and doom the Democrats are purveying on unemployment compensation and other issues.

If the economic situation does not improve by the end of the year, we need to come out of the box early next year with an aggressive economic growth agenda. We've got to talk job creation, capital investment, fostering small businesses, and everything else--that is involved in putting people back to work--and we'll need to package all that well politically. Otherwise we'll be vulnerable to the fairness, income redistribution arguments the Democrats will inevitably make.

While in Europe last week I spent 45 minutes with Chancellor Kohl, subsequent to his trip here and immediately after he had seen President Mitterand. The Chancellor's comments on the Uruguay Round were right on target; we could have written them. Germany has finally figured out that failure of the Round could be very costly to them, and disruptive in dealing with their challenges of unification, Eastern Europe and Soviet assistance, etc. So they finally want to be helpful, and I've passed on my impressions to Carla Hills. But they want to do it in a relatively low key way because of their relationships with the French. Mitterand, on the other hand, seems to be a lost cause on all these trade issues. Overall, cause for some optimism on the Round, but I emphasized to the Chancellor, and to my former colleagues in Brussels, that time is running out. ✓

Finally, hang tight on the Israel loan issue. We're getting flak from Republicans in that community but they'll be all right if it becomes apparent that you are being even handed in the peace process. I've been encouraging them not to make definitive judgments prematurely. But they're impatient, and they analyze every word you use for signals on this sensitive subject. Your policy response was the correct one; we just cannot have any country circumventing U.S. foreign policy by ignoring the Executive Branch and going directly to Congress.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

I am very pleased that Secretary of Agriculture Ed Madigan will depart this afternoon for Moscow as head of a Presidential Mission to assess the food situation in the Soviet Union. Secretary Madigan will lead a delegation of senior private sector officials and government experts to Moscow, St. Petersburg and Kiev over the next nine days. I have just met with this distinguished group and have every confidence they will be a credit to the United States on this important mission. Their expertise in U.S. agriculture, the world's most productive and efficient, covers the spectrum from on-farm production to consumer retailing.

Their mandate is two-fold. First, Secretary Madigan and his team will work intensively with Union and republic leaders to develop ways by which the U.S. and its allies can help institute needed improvements in the country's systems of transportation, distribution, storage, and marketing of agricultural goods. This follows the excellent preparatory work done by Under Secretary Richard Crowder's expert mission last month. The ultimate answer, of course, is for the Union and republics to effect a rapid transition to a free market economy. Second, they will work closely with Union and republic leaders to identify likely food shortage areas in that vast country this winter and will discuss with them ways U.S. farmers can help reduce their needs.

In the meantime, I have decided to take another step to insure that the U.S. does everything possible to help with the food situation. The Administration will therefore make available today \$585 million in credit guarantees for private sales of U.S. agricultural commodities to the USSR. This makes immediately available all remaining credit guarantees originally scheduled to be offered through February 1992. This action will put more American grain and other food into the pipeline now so that it will arrive at its destination in time to be of assistance during the hard winter facing the Soviet people. So far this calendar year, U.S. agricultural export credit guarantees will total \$2.5 billion for the Soviet Union. The millions of tons of grain and other agricultural products shipped under these credit guarantees have kept American farm exports moving while making possible badly needed food imports into the Soviet Union.

These are exciting days and we are at an historic juncture in U.S.-Soviet relations. I am proud that America's agricultural abundance and expertise can play a crucial role in supporting the leaders -- President Gorbachev, President Yeltsin, President Nazarbaev and Chairman Kravchuk -- and others who are transforming their country and its relations with the rest of the world. We are with them, and working with them we strive to remake U.S.-Soviet relations for a brighter and more peaceful future.

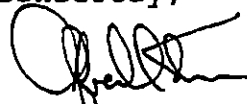

The Ukrainian Government, under the chairmanship of Deputy Prime Minister Sergei Komissarenko, will host commemorative ceremonies marking the 50th anniversary of the massacres at Babi Yar.

In the ten days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur in 1941, over 33,000 Jews were murdered at Babi Yar. In the succeeding 18 months, approximately 22,000 additional Jews were murdered as well as Ukrainians, Gypsies, Russians, Poles, Soviet prisoners of war and the hospitalized handicapped, for a total that may have reached 100,000 people.

The President has just approved the following individuals to represent him at the ceremonies from October 3-6, 1991. These names are ready for immediate release.

JONATHAN BUSH, and his wife Jody.

DELEGATES:

THE REVEREND DR. JOHN PAWLIKOWSKI, of Chicago. Father Pawlikowski is a priest of Polish descent who is a member of the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Council. He is also a professor of social ethics at Catholic Theological Union and a member of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops.

TARAS SZMAGALA, of Ohio. Mr. Szmagala was Chairman of Ukrainian-Americans for Bush, 1988.

The invigoration of the Economic Policy Council is welcome news and reinforces your commitment to a strong economy.

So I have some thoughts about the Domestic Policy Council and its potential.

First, I'd like to suggest a recasting of the Domestic Policy Council's mission: direct it to concentrate on two or three goals that cross jurisdictional lines and to provide a coherent strategy to you. A fixed time period for results would always be a part of your charge.

Second, I would think you could rotate the chairmanship on a goal-driven basis. If the goal was to present a plan to address the problems of rural America, the Secretary of Agriculture would be the obvious choice. But so would the Secretary of Health and Human Services -- in other words, you would have real options.

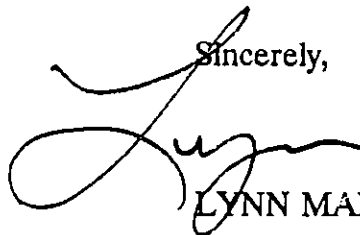
Of course there are pros and cons. Some might argue against change and voice concerns about active committees that could be subject to leaks or runaway projects that are half-baked.

But why miss a chance to counter the claims about a diminution of a domestic policy agenda? Why miss an opportunity to integrate cabinet goals?

Dave Gergen told me that although Richard Nixon may be remembered historically for his foreign policy achievements, what President Nixon says gives him the most satisfaction today are the moves he made in programs at home.

A well-constructed Domestic Policy Council would be a possible avenue for real progress.

A land of peace, not a piece of land

By Newton N. Minow

Most Americans, including American Jews, find it difficult to distinguish between the State of Israel and the Government of Israel. I am among those American Jews who often confuse Israel with the person serving as its current prime minister.

This is understandable because Israel is still a relatively new state. Israel's first prime minister in 1948 was David Ben-Gurion, a world-class statesman who once said that the history of the Middle East was not right vs. wrong, but right vs. right. We admired and respected Foreign Minister Abba Eban, and we fell in love with Prime Minister Golda Meir. All three recognized the need to compromise for peace.

However, in Israel, there were bitter opponents of David Ben-Gurion, Abba Eban and Golda Meir. These opponents who did not see the need to compromise became the Likud Party, led by Menachem Begin and Yitzhak Shamir. Likud insists that Israel's boundaries must conform to biblical Israel's boundaries. In 1977, the Likud Party won public office. Today, Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir presides over a shaky coalition government consisting of multiple political parties. Israel public opinion polls indicate Shamir's supporters amount to less than 50 percent of the Israeli population.

This week, Jews prayed in our synagogues on the Jewish High Holy Days for forgiveness for our sins. One prayer asks God to forgive us the sin of silence—remaining silent when we should speak out. I decided that I must speak out about the difference between the State of Israel and the Government of Israel—and about the differences between President Bush and Prime Minister Shamir. These differences involve the timing of United States loan guarantees to the State of Israel to help resettle Soviet Jews.

Months ago, the Israeli ambassador to the United States warned Prime Minister Shamir that he would have to choose between new settlements on the West Bank and the opportunity for peace. But Mr. Shamir,

under great pressure from tiny, extreme right-wing parties in his coalition government, did not want to make that choice. Afraid that his government would collapse, he overruled his own ambassador, and refused President Bush's request to wait for a few months. Threatened further by Ariel Sharon, the man who brought Israel into its tragic intervention into Lebanon, Mr. Shamir now hopes American Jews will persuade President Bush and Congress to advance the loan guarantees now. Meanwhile, poor, struggling Soviet Jewish refugees from communism are being used as pawns in an internal Israeli ideological fight.

As an American Jew proud of my religious and spiritual heritage going back hundreds of generations, I can no longer remain silent. President Bush should be given a chance to seek peace in his own way. As a

Threatened by Ariel Sharon, the man who brought Israel into its tragic intervention into Lebanon, Shamir now hopes American Jews will persuade President Bush and Congress to advance the loan guarantees now. Meanwhile, Soviet Jewish refugees are being used as pawns in an internal Israeli ideological fight.

Democrat who disagrees with President Bush on other issues, I believe there is no room for partisanship on this question. It was outrageous for an Israeli Cabinet minister to call President Bush an anti-Semite simply because he disagrees with him. We all want a safe, secure Israel, and we all want to help Soviet Jews find safe, new lives without entangling them in selfish Likud Party politics.

In Israel, there are many men, women and children who dream not for a piece of land, but for a land of peace. There are many American Jews who share their dreams. As the Jewish New Year of 5752 begins, we join them in the traditional Jewish prayer, "Grant us peace, your most precious gift, O eternal source of peace, and give us the will to proclaim its message to all the peoples of the Earth."

I believe the President and Mrs. Bush may accept the invitation of Charles LeMaistre, President of the M.D. Anderson Cancer Center at the University of Texas, to join the Center's President's Council. The letter of invitation explains that the President and Mrs. Bush have qualified for membership by their previous financial contributions to the Center. Members receive special mailings about Center activities, invitation to events hosted by the Center, and a marble-based plaque. In light of the significant personal involvement of the Bushes in the M.D. Anderson Cancer Center (apparently a portion of the proceeds from the book Looking Forward was donated to the Center, and the President has participated in Center events in the past), their service on the President's Council of the Center is entirely appropriate. 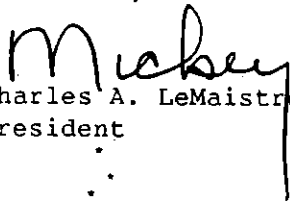

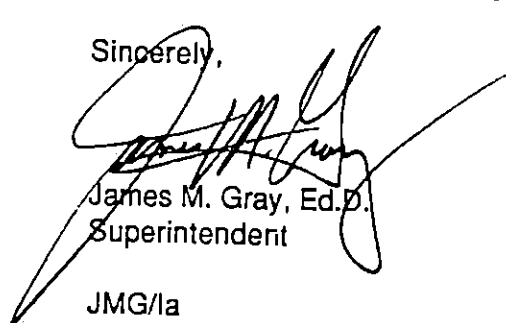
Dear Mr. President:

In the past few weeks, much has been said and written by the media about the lawsuit filed by Monette Rethford and her parents against the Norman Public School System, Lynne Miller, Principal, and John Scroggins, Director of Principals.

During the pendency of the lawsuit, the School District has been very reluctant to discuss the facts in the media out of respect and concern for the young students at Lakeview Elementary School. The Rethford family and their attorneys were eager to have their side of the case presented to the public. We have hoped that the public would reserve judgment on this matter until hearing both sides of the case in court or until the case was dismissed.

We would like to advise you of some of the recent developments in the case.

First, the lawsuit was filed seeking money damages against the school and the two individual employees. On the 5th of April, 1991, an order dismissing the damages portion of the action was entered by Judge West in Federal Court.

Second, it is very important to understand that this case is not about prayer in the school. This case is not about reading the Bible in school, nor is this case about whether a fifth grader can have a Bible study group on the playground during recess. You have been told by the plaintiffs and their attorneys that these are the issues in this lawsuit. They are incorrect.

We wish to make it abundantly clear to everyone: Neither Monette Rethford nor any of her classmates have ever been told that they cannot pray at school. They have not been told that they cannot read the Bible at school, nor have they ever been told that they could not have a Bible study group on the playground.

Monette Rethford was told three things by Lynne Miller, the Principal: 1) She was not not to scare other students. The Principal, Lynne Miller, was told by other children and other parents that Monette was scaring their children, to the extent that some of them complained of feeling ill. These children were told that the world was about to end and that they would go to hell if they were not saved soon.

Secondly, Monette Rethford was not to write notes in class. Lynne Miller was told that Monette was writing notes in

class that were disruptive. Lynne Miller has copies of several of the notes that were written which clearly indicate they were written in class and were disruptive. Some of the notes show that Monette was told to leave other students alone, so that they could do their classwork.

Third, Monette Rethford was told not to be judgmental. For example, we have notes that she wrote talking about how certain girls were not good Christians, or that a young lady's "spirit was dying." Mrs. Miller felt this was inappropriate and told Monette to stop doing this.

In their haste to file a lawsuit and get to the media with this matter, we believe the plaintiffs and their attorneys misunderstood the true facts of this case.

The school must always seek to follow the United States Supreme Court's directive that there must be a separation between church and state. This directive is not always easy to follow because the issues often become complicated. However, the issues presented in this case were very simple. The three specific things that Lynne Miller directed to halt were proper and fully justified under the circumstances. We can only hope that those of the public who made their mind up on this issue before hearing both sides of the story will now realize that the Norman Public Schools, by and through Lynne Miller, the principal, acted properly and with respect to all parties involved.

In a television news account on April 10, 1991, Mr. Steve Lewis, one of the attorneys for the plaintiff, is quoted as saying Monette has won her lawsuit. That is false and misleading. The truth of the matter is that the plaintiffs are totally unable to prove their allegations and they seek to dismiss the lawsuit. The lawsuit should never have been filed. It was filed without full knowledge of the facts.

Depositions were taken on April 2, 1991, of Monette Rethford and her parents, Lynne Miller and John Scroggins. It was abundantly clear after the depositions that the plaintiffs had no evidence to support their allegations. Having realized they had no evidence to support their allegations, the plaintiffs seek to dismiss their lawsuit.

The lawsuit was prepared by the Rutherford Institute of Charlotte, Virginia through its attorney, Larry Crain of Brentwood, Tennessee. An examination of the Rutherford Institute reveals that 86% of the total revenue raised by the Rutherford Institute comes from public donations. This may well explain why the plaintiffs sought extensive coverage by the media at the time of filing the complaint and at the time of falsely claiming victory.

Prayer OK at School, Norman Official Says

NORMAN — The Norman school superintendent Tuesday denied claims that a Norman fifth-grader was prohibited from reading the Bible or praying on school grounds.

Superintendent James Gray responded to controversy over a federal lawsuit filed by the family of student Monette Rethford, who alleges she was told not to hold Bible studies with her friends during school recess.

In a prepared statement released through the public relations office, Gray said Tuesday that students may read the Bible and pray in school.

But, they cannot conduct religious activities during school hours, he said.

Gray's statement did not explain his

distinction between reading the Bible and prayer, and the term "religious activities."

He could not be reached Tuesday for additional comment.

Stanley and Lolita Rethford filed their suit against the district in Oklahoma City federal court last month on behalf of their daughter, who attends Lakeview Elementary School, 3310 108 Avenue NE.

The Rethfords have said their daughter's First Amendment rights were violated by the school when principal Lynne Miller told her and her friends to stop their Bible study sessions.

But Rethford told *The Oklahoman* last week that she continues to read the Bible, pray and share her faith with

other students at school despite the order.

In his statement, Gray said, "The record is very clear that Monette Rethford has never at any time been prohibited from reading her Bible or praying at school."

All students in the Norman Public Schools are permitted to read the Bible or pray if they so desire, he said.

"The issue is not about the right of a student to read the Bible or pray. The issue concerns the conducting of religious activities during school hours in an elementary school," he said.

Lolita Rethford said the statement is confusing.

She did not know what religious activities are at issue other than prayer and reading the Bible.

"It's kind of like they're contradicting themselves by saying that," she said.

Reading the Bible and praying are religious activities, she said.

Norman school attorney Robert Pendarvis declined to discuss what the children were doing on the playground other than conducting a Bible study.

"I'm not going to get into the evidentiary matters," he said.

He said litigation is still pending in the case.

Bible Case In Norman Dismissed

Parents of a Norman fifth-grader who accused school officials of not allowing their child to read the Bible or pray on school grounds have voluntarily dismissed their federal lawsuit against Norman Public Schools.

Under an agreement reached out of court, Monette Rethford will be allowed to pray, read her Bible and share her faith with others at Lakeview Elementary as long as she is not disruptive and does not interfere with the religious and First Amendment rights of others, said Steven Lewis, attorney for Monette Rethford and her parents, Stanley and Lolita Rethford.

"That's all we were wanting," Lewis said.

Mike Reskovic, spokeswoman for Norman Public Schools, said school officials would have no comment.

The Rethfords contended in a federal lawsuit filed in February that Monette Rethford was prohibited by school officials from holding Bible studies during recess. School officials claimed that the 11-year-old girl scared some of her classmates to the point of illness with warnings that they would go to hell if

they did not allow her to save them.

They maintained Rethford had always been allowed to read the Bible, pray and hold Bible studies as long as she did not violate other students' rights. But they contended some students were coerced into joining Rethford's Bible study group.

In an order dated Wednesday, the Rethfords voluntarily dismissed their complaint without prejudice, meaning the lawsuit could be refiled.

There was no financial settlement, and the two sides still disagree over whether Rethford was actually forbidden to hold Bible studies, Lewis said.

In the future,

Norman Public Schools will have to decide what is considered disruptive and what isn't, Lewis said.

"If it ever becomes an issue with us again, we will discuss it with them," Lewis said.

Lewis denied that Rethford was ever disruptive during school hours or scared classmates by telling them they would go to hell. Rethford was approached by one student who asked about hell, and she answered with a biblical verse that frightened the student, he said.

"Anybody that

thinks about it, hell is scary," he said.

The lawsuit brought national publicity upon the Rethfords, but Lewis said the family has not been shaken by the incident.

"Being Christians, they are being called upon to share their faith in a world that doesn't want to hear," Lewis said. "It's reaffirmed their feelings, out of the Bible, that it's a rough world sometimes."

Attorneys for Norman Public Schools could not be reached for comment Thursday.

Norman Schools Reject Settlement of Bible Study Suit

NORMAN — Angry over premature publicity, school officials said Friday they are refusing a proposal that would have settled a federal lawsuit over Bible studies on a school playground.

For the first time since the suit was filed in February, school officials opened up with their side of the story about fifth-grade student Monnette Rethford's lunch-time devotionals with classmates.

Heavy local media attention and recent interest from national newspaper and television reporters prompted them to

speak out, school officials said.

Norman school attorney Robert Pendarvis said Rethford, a student at Lakeview Elementary School, 3310 108 Ave. NE, scared some of her classmates to the point of illness with warnings that they would go to hell if they did not allow her to save them.

"These children were told that the world was about to end and that they would go to hell if they were not saved soon," Pendarvis said in a press conference Friday.

Rethford passed notes to students dur-

ing class, labeled some girls as "not good Christians" and singled out one girl whose spirit, she said, "was dying."

Prompted by complaints from parents, Lakeside principal Lynne Miller said she tried to intervene by meeting with Monnette Rethford and her father.

However, the Rethfords have said their daughter has done nothing wrong.

Stanley Rethford, Monette's father, said Friday that it is not against the law to hold Bible studies during free time at school and he denied his daughter tried to intimidate students into being saved.

"All she did was, when kids asked her

questions she shared her faith with them," Rethford said.

He said his daughter would not have been disruptive in class.

The Bible studies were during recess and it was all voluntary on the students' part, he said.

But, Miller said, some students were coerced and pressured into joining the study group.

The Rethfords filed their lawsuit against the school district Feb. 21 on behalf of their 11-year-old daughter, claiming her First Amendment rights to reli-

gious liberty were violated by school officials.

Pendarvis said Friday that a tentative agreement to settle the case out of court this week was foiled when an attorney representing the Rethfords claimed victory on a television newscast. He said a victory claim Thursday by the Rethfords' Oklahoma City attorney, Steve Lewis, was misleading.

"That had a great bearing on the ability to solve this issue," Pendarvis said.

The settlement offer was initiated by the Rethfords' attorneys

early this month.

Lewis did not return repeated telephone messages left at his office Friday by *The Oklahoman*.

Pendarvis said the district may consider a new settlement proposal, but Monette Rethford will first have to agree to stop disrupting other students with her religious beliefs.

Under the school rules, Miller said Rethford would be allowed to read the Bible, pray and hold Bible studies as long as she does not violate other students' rights.

"Every child has the right to come to school in a safe and

non-threatening environment," Miller said.

Carolyn Moore said Friday that her 10-year-old daughter was a member of Rethford's study group in December. But Miller said her daughter became upset when Rethford questioned her faith because she had trouble interpreting Bible verses.

Rethford was "saving" children on the playground and condemning students who would not be saved, Moore said.

She said the study group seemed like a harmless idea at first.

"You had no idea it was going to get this out of hand," she said.

Claim of school suit victory 'false'

In response to a "surprise" claim Thursday that a Norman girl had "won" the right to pray in school in a lawsuit against the school district, Board of Education attorney Robert "Buddy" Pendarvis released a statement today to clarify the district's

position and explain recent developments in the case.

Pendarvis represents the district in a federal suit that claims 10-year-old Monette Rethford's rights to free speech and expression were violated when she was asked to stop holding Bible discussions at Lakeview Elementary.

"In a television news account on April 10, 1991, Mr. Steve

Lewis, one of the attorneys for the plaintiff, is quoted as saying Monette has won her lawsuit," Pendarvis said. "That is false and misleading.

"The truth of the matter is that the plaintiffs are totally unable to prove their allegations and they seek to dismiss the lawsuit. The lawsuit should never have been filed. it was

filed without full knowledge of the facts."

Pendarvis said that until yesterday it looked as if the suit would be dismissed and, in fact, the portion of the suit that sought money damages from the school district had been dismissed in an order from the presiding federal judge on April 5. He said Thursday's announcement confused and sur-

prised him, and the district will "just go along and see what happens" with the suit.

Responding to the surprise news account claiming victory, Pendarvis reiterated the district's position and explained that Rethford has not been prevented from praying or holding Bible lessons on school property during the school day. He added that she has continued to bring

her Bible and is, and always has been, free to discuss scripture with other students as long as she does not become disruptive.

"In the past few weeks, much has been said and written by the media about the lawsuit filed by Monette Rethford and her parents against the Norman Public School System, Lynne Miller, principal, and John Scroggins,

director of principals," Pendarvis said.

They have not been told that they cannot read the Bible at school, nor have they ever been told that they could not have a Bible study group on the playground," Pendarvis said.

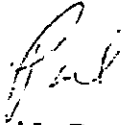

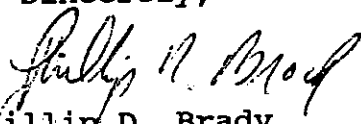

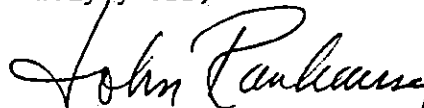

Again, all good wishes.

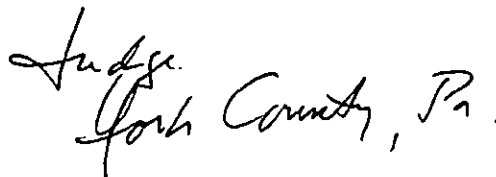

LET'S WIN ONE FOR THE COFFERS

A lucrative TV deal is pumping up revenues at Notre Dame Inc.

This could only be opening day at Notre Dame Stadium. Across the eight-acre parking lot, Irish flags fill a South Bend (Ind.) sky gray with barbecue smoke. A rock band jams out tunes for dancing students dressed in green and gold. Old-timers relax beneath canopies pitched next to lime-green buses with names like "Gipper II." But all the hoopla doesn't impress Coach Lou Holtz. "We'd play," he says, "whether or not we were on television or whether there was anybody in the stands."

Not to worry. Notre Dame has sold out 95 consecutive home games over the past 25 years. More important, the Sept. 7 home opener marked the school's first game televised under a five-year, \$38 million-plus contract with NBC.

PAYBACK. With legions of followers, most attracted by the school's winning tradition and Roman Catholic affiliation, the Fighting Irish command an unparalleled national audience for a college team. And increasingly, the university is trying to cash in on this popularity.

Call it Notre Dame Inc. Since Richard A. Rosenthal became athletic director in 1987, the school, like many other colleges, has started looking at its sports programs with more of an eye for the

bottom line. Besides crafting the NBC deal, Rosenthal intends to increase revenue by promoting sports such as baseball and expanding Notre Dame's lucrative athletics merchandising program, which earns the sports program over \$560,000 annually by selling shirts and jackets. Rosenthal, a former South Bend banker who set a Notre Dame record for most fouls in the 1952 basketball season, has also looked at lining up a pay-per-view TV contract. ESPN college football analyst Beano Cook bets Notre Dame will ink a pay-per-view deal. Says Cook: "They could gross \$100 million" by the year 2010.

Don't think Notre Dame would pour all that loot into athletics. Despite its newfound wealth, the school's \$14 million athletic budget just kept pace with inflation this year. And some proceeds

from the NBC deal will be used to boost scholarships for needy students.

Lofty purposes, for sure. But Notre Dame has taken a lot of heat for what many consider a low-down deal with NBC. In early 1990, the College Football Assn. inked a five-year, \$350 million package with ABC and ESPN. Notre Dame officials worried that ABC, as the exclusive CFA broadcaster, would emphasize regional telecasts. That would limit Notre Dame's exposure outside the Midwest. So it jumped ship to NBC and became the only major university to have its own network-TV contract.

Other colleges were outraged. "It was a shock to everyone," says University of Georgia Athletic Director Vince Dooley. Many felt that Notre Dame, which helped negotiate the ABC and ESPN contract, had betrayed its fellow CFA members. University of Kansas Athletic Director Robert Frederick was so infuriated that he canceled his university's basketball series with Notre Dame in 1992 and 1993. But more than a betrayal of trust was at stake. Without Notre Dame, the CFA was forced to renegotiate its TV package, losing \$30 million in the process, the association says.

Even the critics think Notre Dame and NBC have a winner, though. Notre Dame gets every home game broadcast nationally, and its teams have played in four of the five highest-rated regular-season games ever televised, including *numero uno*, a 1968 battle against the University of Southern California. Last year, Notre Dame was in all five of the highest-rated regular-season games.

'THANK GOD.' What makes the Irish such a draw? Since 1936, the team has won eight national championships, with seven Heisman Trophy winners. Legends, like Coach Knute Rockne, help. His teams lost only 12 games in 13 seasons from 1918 to 1930. Tough schedules help, too. This year, NBC will broadcast games against such top-ranked teams as USC, Michigan State, and Tennessee.

Notre Dame has long known the earning power of the gridiron. Football profits generated during Rockne's tenure, for instance, helped build classrooms and dormitories. Last year, *BUSINESS WEEK* estimates, football netted Notre Dame at least \$11 million. And with the NBC deal, the take can only get bigger.

"Thank God for NBC," says tight end Irv Smith, who dragged several Indiana players 25 yards while heading for a dramatic score on opening day. "My parents in New Jersey wouldn't have seen that play otherwise." That hallelujah, no doubt echoing throughout Notre Dame's hallowed halls.

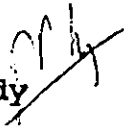

SUBJECT: "The Bush Record"

As we discussed, the Chief of Staff has approved a project to be called "The Bush Record." This would be a clear and consistent statement of the Administration's record over the last two and one-half years in both domestic and foreign policy. As we approach the end of the Presidential term, Administration spokespersons will increasingly have a need for such a document to articulate effectively the Administration's positive record and to address issues related to our record.

As you know, in the last year of the Reagan Administration, the White House assembled a similar document entitled "The Reagan Record." That project was approved by the White House Counsel's Office (Alan Raul was the Associate Counsel who conducted the review), but we have been unsuccessful in locating the written opinion from the Reagan Library.

The body of "The Bush Record" would be a series of papers on various issues, from education to the disabled to relations with the USSR, detailing the Administration's initiatives in these areas. This would include both White House initiatives and the work of the Departments.

Each paper would begin with a quotation from the President or a senior Administration official about the issue and would then have a narrative text detailing the accomplishments of the Administration in concise language.

Copies of the "Record" would be sent to Administration spokespersons and members of the White House staff. It should be very clear that this is an official, not a political, document. That having been said, it is clear that the need for such a document will only become greater over the next year, and having the Bush record available in an easy format will significantly improve our ability to articulate the President's positive record.

We would appreciate your providing us with a written opinion on this project as soon as possible, so we can begin the work. John Gardner will be overseeing this effort, and he would be happy to discuss it further with your office as appropriate.

On behalf of President Bush, thank you for your message about U.S. policy toward Israel and the Middle East. Since the end of the war in the Persian Gulf, the United States has worked hard to take advantage of the potentially historic opportunity to move the Arab/Israeli peace process forward. In recent months, the Administration has achieved a great deal -- fashioning a process that, for the first time, would launch direct negotiations among Israel, Palestinians, and all of Israel's Arab neighbors.

This effort did not take place in a vacuum. Over the past two years, Israel has opened its doors to more than 300,000 Soviet and Ethiopian immigrants. The steady influx of men, women, and children from around the world over past decades has been central to Israel's success. The United States has long supported immigration to Israel, and President Bush has been pleased to play a role in this enterprise. It is no exaggeration to state that many of the Soviet and Ethiopian Jews now in Israel would not be free and safe were it not for years of sustained U.S. effort.

The Administration is currently involved in extremely sensitive negotiations to pin down the final details that are related to convening a peace conference. What must be avoided is anything that would distract the parties from the hard choices and decisions that they have yet to make to get to the negotiating table.

As you know, President Bush asked Congress to defer for 120 days consideration of Israel's request for \$10 billion in additional U.S. loan guarantees that are intended to help Israel absorb its many new immigrants. President Bush has made it clear that the request for a delay in no way calls into question the need for a strong and secure Israel. As the President has said, "For more than 40 years, the United States has been Israel's closest friend in the world, and this remains the case and will as long as I am President of the United States."

Delay is being urged by the President for the best of all reasons: peace. It is the President's judgment that if Congress addresses absorption assistance now, a contentious debate will result -- one that could have the effect of losing the participation of either the Arab or the Israeli negotiating partners. If this were to occur, the best chance to promote

Arab/Israeli peace since the Camp David Accords will be lost, with uncertain and potentially dangerous consequences in the region. Postponement will also afford both the Administration and Congress an opportunity to study Israel's needs in greater detail and to craft a program that has the greatest likelihood of promoting successful absorption at minimal taxpayer cost, while at the same time contributing to prospects for peace.

The President appreciates having your views on this important matter, and he sends his best wishes to you.

The President today named Julie Harms, of Houston, Texas, as the 575th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. For more than four years, Julie, who is a twelve year old eighth grade student at T.H. Rogers School, has devoted her lunch hour and free time to helping students with disabilities.

Julie works with children at her school who have multiple disabilities, many of whom either cannot speak or hear. She takes time to read stories to her peers and visits their classroom during recreation and leisure activities to play with them, thus cultivating a personal relationship with each young person. Julie also helps feed the students and she assists with their ambulatory needs. Students smile and vocalize in response to interaction with her. As many of the children usually show little or no response to stimulation, Julie's teachers have been very pleased with the progress she has made with them.

In addition to working with students with multiple disabilities, Julie has been able to communicate with and teach deaf students after completing a sign language class at her school. Not only does she volunteer during the school year, but she has donated her time during the six-week summer school session for the past three years, ensuring that her friends will not forget her.

Aside from being a dedicated volunteer, Julie is a straight A student. She also enjoys playing the violin and is an award-winning ice skater.

The President today named the Match-Two Prisoner Outreach Program ("M-2") of the Richard J. Donovan Correctional Facility at Rock Mountain in San Diego, California, as the 580th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. The Rock Mountain institution, through the vast efforts of its dedicated volunteers, has brought hope and opportunity to an isolated prison population.

After nearly two decades, and timeless commitment by caring citizens, the program has grown from an encouraging experiment to a state-wide prisoner support group. Only a half-dozen volunteers launched the plan in four prisons during 1971. The program has now spread to 40 prison facilities and boasts the involvement of over 1,600 volunteers, including 130 at the Rock Mountain institution.

Once a month for adult inmates and twice a month for juveniles, volunteers from all facets of the community spend several hours befriending the most outcast and withdrawn prisoners. Airplane pilots, night clerks, housewives, and police officers make up just some of the diverse individuals who dedicate their time.

The M-2 program in San Diego addresses a wide array of both state and prison needs. According to Joseph O'Shaughnessy, the program's development director, prisoners enrolled at the Rock Mountain program have over an 80 percent chance of a successful parole. One inmate at the California Rehabilitation Center said of his experience, "I came into this program with guilt, feelings of doubt, and indifference about my release, but now I've been touched. My friend has helped me to realize how much we can affect positive influence on each other." Perhaps attitudes like that justify the nearly 1,000 Rock Mountain inmates waiting to be matched with an M-2 volunteer.

The volunteers of the M-2 Prison Outreach Program in San Diego have helped to create promise and promote change within the California prison system. The President salutes these volunteers for their community service efforts and for demonstrating his belief that, "From now on in America, any definition of a successful life must include serving others."

The President today named the Senior Volunteers of the Elvin Hill Elementary School of Columbiana, Alabama, as the 578th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. These local senior citizens volunteer their time and efforts to the Elvin Hill Elementary School to tutor children who require extra help outside the classroom.

In 1986, responding to the overwhelming number of children who needed assistance, the school initiated a reading program to help students acquire the comprehension and vocabulary skills which would allow them to succeed in their classes. Seeing an opportunity to give something to a segment of their community, which they had little contact with, the members of the volunteer group offered their assistance to the elementary school. Twenty-four senior citizens currently serve as tutors to over 100 students.

The program encourages the students to discuss their assignments, and volunteers serve as moderators for small group discussions two to three times a week. These discussions provide the students with opportunities to better understand school subjects and build self-confidence. The volunteers also share personal life experiences which enhance the students' education by providing them with positive role models.

Since the program's inception, reading and writing comprehensive test scores have risen considerably and many of the children have raised their reading and writing grades by one letter grade. Inspired by the success of the reading program, three members of the senior volunteers have begun an art program. The positive interaction of the volunteers and the students have inspired all involved with the program to continue.

The President salutes the Senior Volunteers of the Elvin Hill Elementary School for their community service efforts and for demonstrating his belief that, "From now on in America, any definition of a successful life must include serving others."

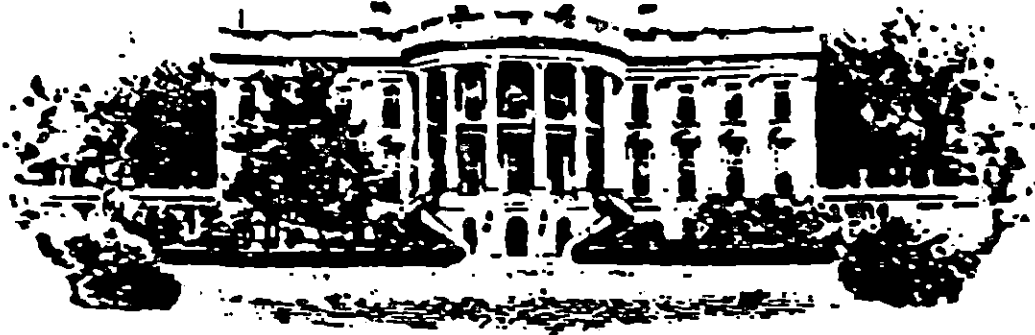

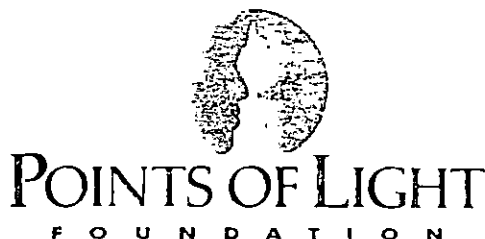
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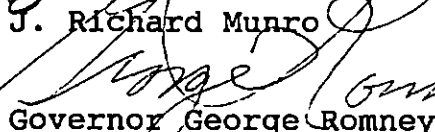

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS

GENERAL POINT

- The Administration favors legislation that is consistent with the Budget Enforcement Act (BEA) (e.g., Dole) and that promotes job-creating growth (e.g., Gramm-Wallop). It opposes legislation that violates the BEA or threatens to be counterproductive economically (e.g., the Democratic alternatives).

BENTSEN PROPOSAL IS A BUDGET BUSTER

- Last year's bipartisan budget agreement specifically said that new programs go on a pay-as-you-go basis. The Bentsen proposal seeks to sidestep the budget agreement by the declaration of an emergency.
- The effect of the Democratic bill will be twofold: first, it will increase the deficit \$5.8 billion requiring the government to sell that much more in public debt; second, it would destroy the budget agreement that is critical to this nation's economic health during the next decade and beyond.
- Federal Reserve Chairman Greenspan has already indicated his concern that breaching the discipline could result in an increase in long-term interest rates making the economy and unemployment worse, not better.

DOLE PROPOSAL

- The Dole proposal is fiscally responsible. It fully pays for itself.
- The offsets used in the Dole proposal are good public policy: a spectrum auction of government frequencies being freed up for commercial use and certain reforms to student loan programs such as extending the IRS Tax Refund Offset Program -- which is current law -- and requiring credit checks on borrowers over the age of 21.
- The essence of the Dole proposal is a two-tier system of benefits: 6 weeks for all states and 10 weeks in those states where the adjusted insured unemployment rate is 5% or more.
- This proposal reaches those who need additional benefits without throwing money out the window and adding more to the federal deficit.

PROGRAM WEAKNESSES OF BENTSEN PROPOSAL

- The four-tier approach of the Bentsen bill is cumbersome and administratively burdensome for states. In the past, such programs have resulted in high implementation costs, mistakes and delays.
- The maximum level of benefits provided under the Bentsen bill -- 20 weeks -- is excessive and produces a disincentive to re-employment.
- Bentsen bases his proposal on a trigger that includes a lot of groups who lack a legitimate claim to unemployment benefits such as students on break between school terms or those who voluntarily quit their jobs.

POTENTIAL VETO

- If the Bentsen proposal reaches my desk, particularly if I am given no option, I will have to veto it.
- I will need your support if that is the case. We cannot let this sort of legislation bust the budget or further threaten the recovery, much less worsen unemployment.
- I hope that I can count on your help.



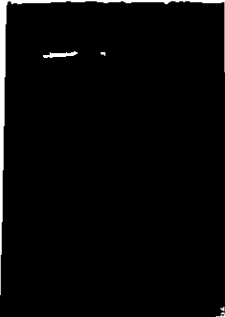

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

On Monday the House passed the following legislation by voice vote: S. 296, the Armed Forces Immigration Adjustment Act of 1991; S. 868, the Veterans Educational Assistance bill; and H.R. 3291, the FY 1992 District of Columbia Appropriations bill, which is identical to the bill passed in August with the exception that it does not contain the objectionable abortion language which prompted your earlier veto.

On Tuesday the House passed H.R. 3040, Unemployment Compensation Amendments, by a vote of 283 to 125. Forty-eight Republicans supported the bill, signaling their belief in the political necessity to do something for unemployed workers. If this bill is vetoed, it is highly unlikely that it can be sustained in the House.

On Wednesday the House was not in session, due to the observance of Yom Kippur. The House was in session on Thursday, conducting no legislative business, and was not in session on Friday.

SENATE

On Monday the Senate ratified the U.S./Soviet Maritime boundary treaty by a vote of 86-6. The treaty adjusts jurisdiction between the U.S. and the Soviet Union of certain areas in the Bering Sea.

Mr. Secretary General, members of the United Nations community, ladies and gentlemen, dear friends. / For many years, Barbara and I have regarded this as our second home. / Thank you for making today's homecoming a wonderful reunion. //

A writer once observed, "The character of a people is embodied in its leaders." / Mr. Secretary General, as I mentioned to the General Assembly, the character of the United Nations is embodied in you. //

You and other leaders have witnessed great changes in the past several years -- changes that brought an end to the superpower rivalry which poisoned the international arena. / The passing of this rivalry, in turn, has enabled the U.N. to assume its proper role on the world stage -- the role envisioned by its founders 45 years ago. //

History will record that at the onset of this decade, the United Nations regained the faith of its founders by responding with courage and vision to the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait. You helped the nations of the world restore peace and stability to the Gulf by reversing the tide of aggression against a member state. //

The founders of the U.N. were also determined, in the words of the prologue of the Charter, "to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person, in the equal rights of men and women and of nations large and small." //

Sadly, that faith is today diminished by the continued existence of General Assembly Resolution 3379, the offensive resolution which equates Zionism with racism. // This resolution has undercut the moral authority of the U.N. / We strongly believe that it is time to repeal Resolution 3379 -- and bring the deeds of the General Assembly into closer harmony with the noble words of its Charter. //

A new wave of freedom now sweeps the globe. In virtually every corner of the world, repressive governments have been swept aside. In their place have sprung up democracies -- fragile, admittedly -- but democracies which can and must be nurtured to withstand the daunting difficulties they confront. //

Our task is to strengthen these democracies -- affirming the rights of the individual while truly responding to the collective will of the people. / Only then, Mr. Secretary General, can we truly live your words: "Resolution of conflicts, observance of human rights and the promotion of development together weave the fabric of peace. If one of these strands is removed, the tissue will unravel." //

My friend, you have played a central role in binding the fabric of peace. // You have helped lessen tensions around the

world in a time of tremendous change. // Thirty years ago, one of your predecessors, Dag Hammarskjold, was killed in a tragic plane crash. Today, we remember how he said: "Only he who keeps his eye fixed on the far horizon will find his right road." //

By keeping your eye fixed on the horizon, you have helped the United Nations find the road to peace. I thank you on behalf of freedom-loving peoples. I congratulate you for a job well done. In that spirit, let us raise our glasses:

-- To the cause of peace;

-- To the health of my dear friend;

-- And to the liberty we can, and must, achieve for the children of the world.

You may not know it, but at least from my point of view, you have let me have the greatest job in the world.

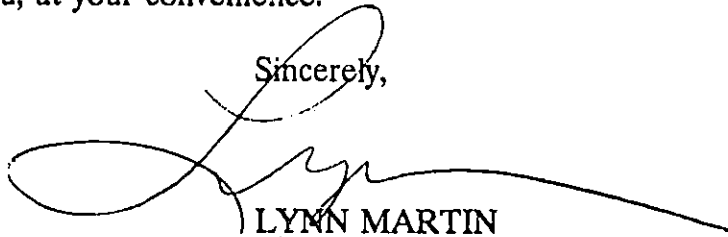

The President today named the volunteers of the Bedford-Stuyvesant Volunteer Ambulance Corps of Brooklyn, New York, as the 572nd Daily Point of Light for the Nation. The Ambulance Corps recruits and trains disadvantaged and unemployed neighborhood youth while serving the emergency medical needs of the community. The volunteers have become role models to the residents.

The Bedford-Stuyvesant Volunteer Ambulance Corps (BSVAC) was established in 1988 by Lt. James Robinson, a supervisor and 20 year veteran of the New York City Emergency Medical Service and Specialist Joe Perez, a registered health care instructor for ten years. Mr. Robinson and Mr. Perez, observing a discernible deficiency and lack of emergency medical care for the Bedford-Stuyvesant area, formed the Ambulance Corps to ensure the availability of adequate care and to increase the emergency response in this medically underserved neighborhood.

The group's founders developed an organizational structure that is dependent upon the commitment and support of volunteers, many of whom were previously unskilled. The outreach efforts of BSVAC has known no bounds. Volunteers are actively recruited from among young men and women who are jobless and school dropouts. They undergo an extensive training program and become certified technicians upon the completion of the coursework. During this process, many students develop enough self-confidence to complete their high school educations. The corps has a 100 percent success rate in the placement of its 110 graduates. The volunteers, in turn, recruit their peers in service to the community. Today, over 200 young people per week are seeking an affiliation with BSVAC.

The organization, originally headquartered in an abandoned building, has expanded to a staff of 20 with over 50 volunteers. Calls initially answered on foot by volunteers are now met by one of three ambulances owned by BSVAC. The number of emergency responses has increased from 75 medical alerts per month to over 300 calls. The corps attributes its success to the importance of saving lives and learning to assist others in need.

The volunteers of the Hemet Honey Bears coordinate a bowling league for 69 adults with emotional and developmental disabilities, such as autism, cerebral palsy, epilepsy, and Down's Syndrome.

In 1974, responding to the lack of social outlets for individuals with disabilities, Frank and Ann Allyn transformed a casual bowling group of six individuals into an organized weekly league. The group quickly gained prominence in the community and bowlers began participating from throughout the area. The league held a contest to select a name, and the bowlers decided to call themselves the "Hemet Honey Bears."

Nearly forty volunteers, including seven certified coaches, are active with the Hemet Honey Bear program. They meet with the participants once a week, from September to May, for an evening of bowling at a local bowling alley. Volunteers encourage the bowlers to become good citizens and help them develop social skills, as well as physical dexterity and coordination. By cultivating these skills, participants gain a sense of self-achievement and a more confident outlook on life.

Hemet Honey Bear volunteers also coordinate weekly incentive and performance awards, special bowling events and tournaments, and holiday parties with the support of local businesses and community groups. Half of the original volunteers have begun offshoot teams in neighboring towns in cooperation with the Allyn's.

The society established the first shelter for battered women in the State of South Dakota on the Rosebud Sioux Reservation. Through the years, Ms. Black Bear has served in several capacities with the society.

In recent years, lupus has left Ms. Black Bear unable to be as physically active as before, yet she continues to serve as a voice of support for her Native American sisters. Ms. Black Bear's home is open to women who are in need of support and often four to six women may stop by or call on her for help each week. Ms. Black Bear usually speaks in the native Lakota language during her sessions. Once active in leading classes for batterers at the local courthouse, Ms. Black Bear plans to continue this line of counseling and support this Fall.

Ms. Black Bear has been active at the state and national levels as well as within her community. She was instrumental in starting two other women's shelters in South Dakota and in the founding of the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence. In 1989 Ms. Black Bear was appointed as the chairperson of this coalition, making her the first Native American woman to hold this position.

Volunteers encourage children who have lost someone close to express their grief through a variety of art activities. The art allows children, who cannot express their emotions in sophisticated words, to communicate what they are feeling and to work through the grieving process.

Sponsored by Sutter Community Hospitals Foundation, the Children's Bereavement Art Group has served over 805 children between the ages of four and sixteen since 1985. Over 20 volunteers aid three registered art therapists in assisting grieving children. Eight to eleven children participate in a bereavement group according to their age and the nature of their loss. In this way, the children can receive support from their peers and realize they are not alone in their grief. A volunteer and an art therapist work as a team to facilitate each group and create a safe environment for the children to express their grief. The groups meet every other week, for ninety minutes, for a total of ten meetings. A family potluck dinner is held on the ninth session so that the children can present their art work and experiences to their families.

The volunteers help the art therapist prepare for sessions, work along side the therapist during the sessions, and then spend time afterwards discussing the children's progress and special needs. A volunteer must make a commitment to attend all ten meetings in order to develop a relationship of trust with the children.

The President today named Ada Cooper of Statesboro, Georgia, as the 574th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Ms. Cooper, 37, is founder and director of the Blitch Street Project in Statesboro which provides nearly 100 local youths with an opportunity to learn and develop outside school and the home.

A lifelong resident, Ms. Cooper had seen her community deteriorate at a drastic pace. Alcohol and drug abuse had become commonplace in the town's streets and parks, and academic achievement had given way to indifference among many young people.

Taking a town's burden into her own hands, Ms. Cooper set out to confront the ills which plagued the children of Statesboro. She engaged residents from all facets of the community. Parents, teachers, and ministers alike embraced her efforts to provide opportunities for Statesboro's youth. After researching, planning, and securing support from community leaders and businesses, Ms. Cooper recruited enough volunteers to initiate her program. The Blitch Street Center opened its doors to the community on April 16, 1990.

Currently, six days a week, over 140 volunteers teach area children, primarily from economically unstable and single parent homes, everything from math and literature to hygiene and self-esteem. Timely issues such as AIDS and teen pregnancy are addressed through special interest programs, while leisure and recreation serve as a critical outlet during the week. Donations from private organizations have also helped Ms. Cooper provide nutritious meals for the children.

The collective efforts of Ms. Cooper and the dedicated volunteers of the Blitch Street Project have given hope and opportunity to the young people in Statesboro.

The President salutes Ada Cooper for her community service efforts and for demonstrating his belief that, "From now on in America, any definition of a successful life must include serving others."
