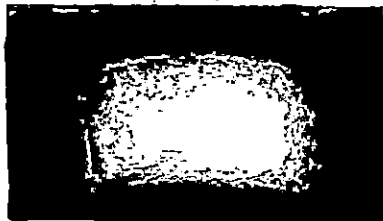

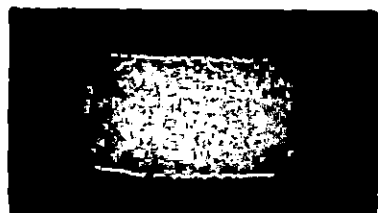

The President today named Lynn Minick, of Fayetteville, North Carolina, as the 593rd Daily Point of Light for the Nation. In 1984 after the brutal murder of her pregnant daughter, Ms. Minick, 70, formed the group People Assisting Victims.

During the murder trial of her daughter's assailant, Ms. Minick realized a need for victims and their family members to be well-educated about the judicial system and to know what to expect during their time in court and what support services are available to them. She responded by launching People Assisting Victims and began counseling crime victims and their family members, teaching them ways to expedite the court process.

Since then, Ms. Minick's efforts have expanded to include a wide variety of support services. She convinced a local psychiatrist to volunteer his time to counsel victims, and she made arrangements with a local motel to provide rooms to victims and their families at no cost while they are in town for their court hearings. With her encouragement, local attorneys formed a network that provides free legal services for low-income victims.

Through her own experience, Ms. Minick is deeply aware of the needs of crime victims and their families. She spends many hours helping families cope with the trauma of losing a loved one to crime. She has inspired a group of people in her community to host crime victims in their homes, provide transportation for them to and from the courthouse, and comfort them during trials. Ms. Minick has also written two books on the topic of brutal crime and its victims. Her fervent desire to help others makes her continuously available to those in need.

The President today named the volunteers of Eldercare Access Center Mobile Meals, of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, as the 594th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Mobile Meals is a community-wide initiative to prepare and deliver meals to frail, homebound elderly people.

In 1971 Ruth Fugitt responded to the hunger of the elderly in her community by establishing the Mobile Meals Program. Over the past 20 years, the program has grown from 12 volunteers, serving 14 clients one meal each week, to 1,758 volunteers, serving 9,000 meals to 550 clients each month. The program is now a combined effort of 59 churches and community organizations which are committed to ensuring that elderly men and women receive nutritious meals daily.

The work of the Mobile Meals volunteers extends beyond preparing and serving meals. Many also repair homes, provide transportation, and build lasting friendships with the clients. Seventy percent of the volunteers are over the age of 60, and some clients are themselves former volunteers.

Mobile Meals serves anyone who expresses a need for help in obtaining or preparing a meal. Although some clients do pay a small donation for their meals, the service is provided free of charge for those who cannot afford to pay.

A lifelong Barrio resident, Ms. Rodriguez is regarded as an advocate, role model, and friend by her neighbors. Her strong character and perseverance have left an indelible mark on those around her.

Ms. Rodriguez, having galvanized community support for the Logan Heights Family Health Center in 1970, worked to build it into a facility with an 8 million dollar annual budget. Each year, dental, optometric, and medical professionals provide health care to nearly 150,000 patients at the center. Ms. Rodriguez still opens the clinic each morning and spends half-days there, supporting patients with her cheerful smile and words of encouragement.

In her spare time, Ms. Rodriguez serves lunches to school children and mentors and counsels Barrio residents. She often helps neighbors complete applications and paperwork and translates for them when needed. Her unwavering commitment to what she believes is illustrated by her longstanding participation in community service.

Today the President named the volunteers and staff of the Delaware Pre-Release Program at the Delaware Correctional Center, of Smyrna, Delaware, as the 596th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Since February of 1989, the Pre-Release Program has provided the necessary skills for inmates to make a smooth transition back into society once they are released from prison.

Working together, the Corrections Alternatives and Concepts Division of the Clark McConnell Foundation, the counseling staff of the facility, and the inmates themselves developed teaching materials and structured the pre-release classes, giving birth to the program. Praised by state officials as the most unique program in the state's correctional system, it is run by the prisoners and offers inmate-to-inmate instruction.

For those chosen to participate, the Pre-Release Program begins 60 days prior to work release. Classes of 30 to 40 students are taught by inmate volunteers five nights a week for 90 minutes. The focus of discussion is a workbook, written, illustrated, and published by the inmates, about the challenges they will face during their work release from the facility. Subjects covered by the workbook range from relapse prevention to alternatives to drug sales, and from family issues to employment theory and practice.

Veteran volunteers from the State Department of Labor, the State Attorney General's Office, the State court system, and local businesses come in nightly to monitor the classes, give input about the issues discussed, and team-teach with the inmate instructors. A videotape, produced by the inmates, is sent to their families upon work release. This enables each inmate to display some of the skills learned in the program.

In 1981 Ms. Roy began working with the Duration Club, a volunteer organization which supports children and young adults who have mental and physical disabilities. Through the Duration Club, Ms. Roy has played an important role in activities such as the Special Olympics and the Very Special Arts Festival.

By 1988, Ms. Roy's commitment to helping those in need became an integral part of her daily life. Realizing the need to prepare children with disabilities for the future, she established an employment workshop for young adults. Full time, six days a week, she devoted her energy to teaching essential job skills to and exploring employment opportunities for these capable individuals. In addition, Ms. Roy helped establish a thrift shop to fund the employment program and provide hands-on experience for the trainees. In 1990 alone, 12 of the workshop participants found jobs in local businesses. Ms. Roy's work has given hope and opportunity to a vast number of individuals with disabilities in the Memphis area.

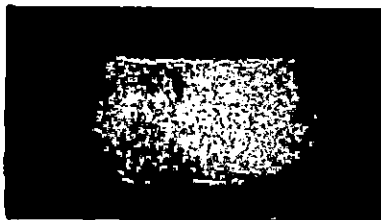

Dear Mr. President:

I just wanted to write to you in a personal and heartfelt way to elaborate on the views I expressed at the recent EPC meeting. While the recent steps to address the "credit crunch" are important and useful, I continue to believe that your capital gains tax reduction remains absolutely central to restoring economic growth and helping the American economy achieve its full potential over the next five years of your presidency.

We all agree that there is a problem with the economy and the capital, credit and financial markets. Notwithstanding some of the good news about inflation, interest rates and a more stable dollar, in my view, what needs to be clearly articulated is how government tax and regulatory policies caused the recession and continue to be major impediments to stronger economic growth and deficit reduction. Here, in my opinion, are the reasons for this dilemma:

1. Labor costs have been driven higher by the 1988 and 1990 payroll tax hikes, minimum wage increases in 1990 and 1991, the expansion in the tax base for Medicaid, and the phase out of exemptions forced upon you as a result of the 1990 budget act.

2. The cost of capital has increased markedly by the 1986 Tax Reform Act and the increase in capital gains taxes. Depreciation lives have been lengthened, and the tax burden on equipment is now higher than before 1981. Our unindexed capital gains tax is now higher than in any other industrial nation, especially punishing to the entrepreneurial, financial, and real estate sectors of the economy. The passive loss provisions and the alternative minimum tax increases have virtually shut down the real estate and homebuilding sectors of the economy, which represent almost one quarter of our GNP.

3. New regulations, mandates, and taxes have dramatically increased the real cost of production, notwithstanding the valiant efforts of Vice President Quayle and Governor Sununu to bring common sense and balance to the regulatory bureaucracy. While advancing important social causes, the Clean Air Act, wetlands

regulations, FIRREA, and provisions of the 1990 budget agreement have all depressed economic growth by raising the cost of either doing business or going into business for the potential entrepreneur.

These recently enacted government policies have smothered incentives for capital investment and depressed the entrepreneurial and risktaking sectors of the economy. Burdened with these disincentives, the economy, in my view, will not respond to calls for "easing" by the Federal Reserve and "consumer confidence" will not be restored to the extent you have the right to expect. In fact, if the entrepreneurial economy continues to be depressed, simply trying to expand "money supply" would be inflationary, and, even worse, would threaten to restore the soft money and high tax policy of the Carter years which created stagflation of unprecedented proportions.

Mr. President, in my opinion, the question is not how to get out of recession. The real question for us is what kind of an economy America will have in the year 2000. You've articulated a vision for our nation in education with America 2000; you've articulated a vision of a competitive workplace in the year 2000; and equally visionary is your Enterprise for the Americas free trade zone from Canada to Latin America. I sincerely believe we need a similar vision of domestic economic prosperity that would include more jobs, more entrepreneurship, more minority ownership and boundless opportunity for all.

We must broaden our appeal to all people by crafting a bold domestic package, including your capital gains proposal together with a pro-labor and pro-family tax cut. Such a package, like the Gramm-Gingrich proposal, could be modest at first, but would expand as the economy begins to grow. I would hope that we would also consider the idea of eliminating the capital gains tax on assets held for more than three years for it would signal your profound determination to restore entrepreneurial capitalism. Enterprise Zones have proven to be a populist idea to increase growth and jobs in the inner city, and Chairman Rostenkowski has given us strong signals that he endorses the concept. Rolling back the last one or two payroll tax increases, as suggested by many in Congress, could be a part of this package. We could also move forward on your IRA initiative and an expansion of the family exemption without breaking the budget by using a dynamic analysis instead of static revenue thinking.

I believe this type of growth package would receive strong bipartisan support from Congress and the public. However, there seem to be two key objections to offering this type of aggressive

growth package within your Administration. First, some argue very sincerely that you would get hit with the fairness issue once again. In my view, you were on the mark at the EPC meeting to reject the argument that we are on the wrong side of the fairness issue. The fairness issue only works against us if we get caught in the debate over which and whose taxes to raise. You fought the fairness issue against Dukakis virtually every day in the 1988 presidential campaign when you ran on the capital gains tax cut issue. Another campaign waged along those same ideological fault lines will win just as convincingly, particularly if the Democrats continue to pursue class envy politics.

The second concern is whether the tax cut package would destroy the budget agreement or increase the deficit. But what the American people need to hear is that the single greatest reason for deficit spending today is the failure of our economy to grow enough to reach its potential of full employment at low levels of inflation. Speaker Foley hinted at a trade of cutting capital gains for a higher income tax rate. It seems to me that someone could explore with congressional leaders a slight percentage increase in income tax rates for people with over \$1 million in income for a 50% cut--or the outright elimination--of the capital gains tax rate on long term assets.

Mr. President, I don't believe it's heresy to say that it will require reopening the budget agreement. I was pleased to see Director Darman say he too would reopen the budget agreement under certain conditions. I hope our preconditions are not so strict, however, as to preclude the possibility of getting anything done. The world has changed considerably since the original budget agreement, not least of which has been the debilitating stagnation of the economy. The budget agreement's requirement that any tax reductions be matched dollar-for-dollar by tax increases must not straightjacket vital economic initiatives, impede stronger growth in the economy, or prevent us from attacking the root causes of the deficit.

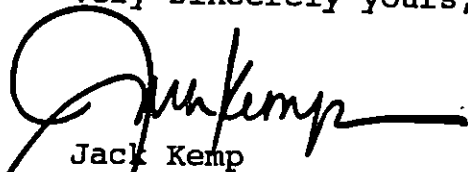
In my view, the bottom line is simply this: your pro-growth agenda cannot wait any longer, because economic growth in and of itself the precondition for any substantial effort to reduce spending and increase revenues.

As your Administration's resident "capital gains fanatic," I appreciate the opportunity to serve with you and the great team you have assembled. I particularly appreciate the encouragement you give to all of us in your Cabinet to speak candidly and forthrightly about our views. I look forward to working with you to create the vigorous, prosperous and progressive economy of

boundless opportunity for all people that you and our party's founder, Mr. Lincoln, envisioned. Mr. President, since I have quoted Winston Churchill at the outset of your successful Desert Storm operation, I want to close this letter with one of my favorite quotes from Abraham Lincoln.

"I don't believe in a law to prevent a man from getting rich, it would do more harm than good ... I want every man to have the chance ... in which he can better his condition -- when he may look forward and hope to be a hired laborer this year and next, work for himself afterward, and finally to hire men to work for him! That is the true system."

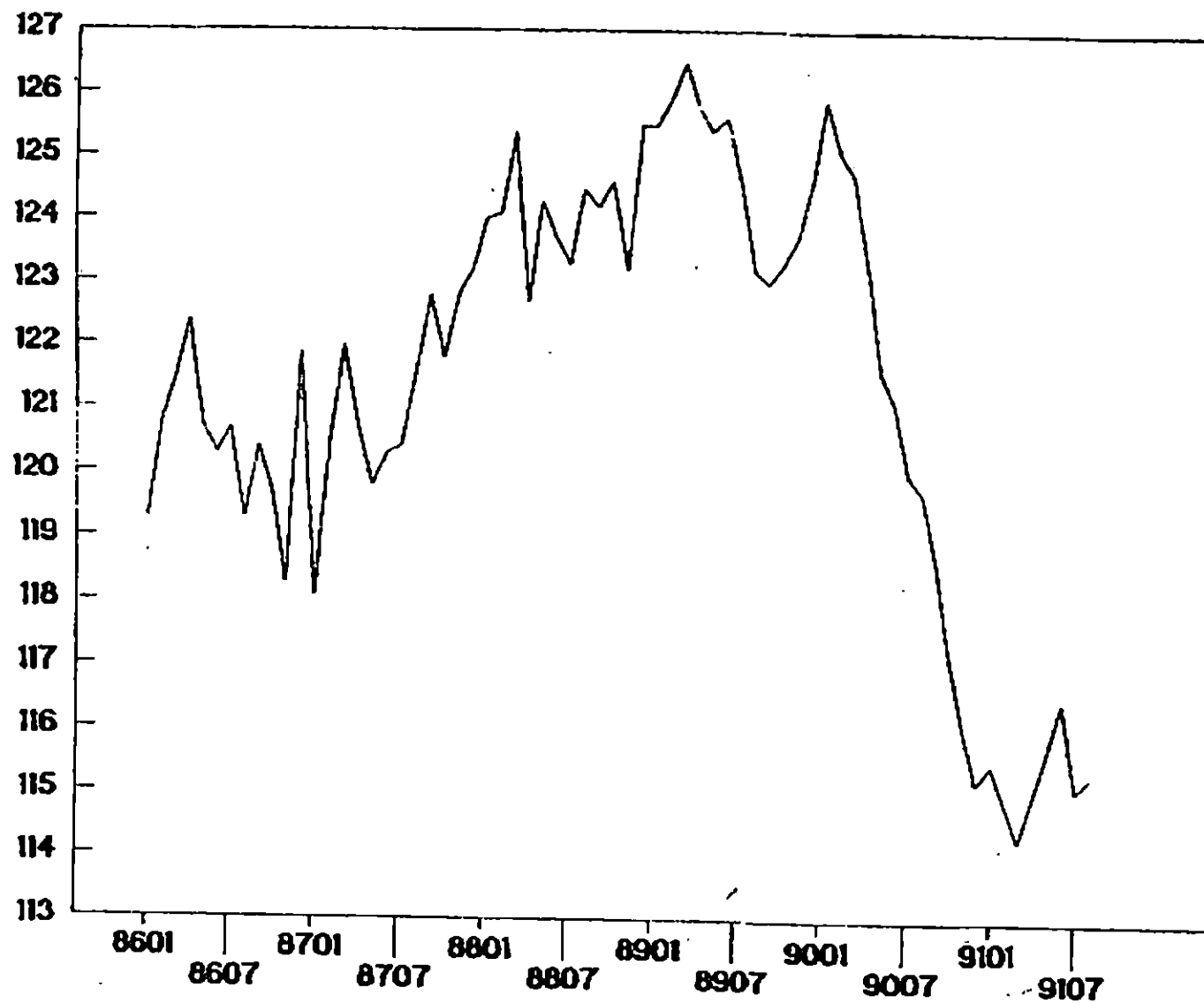

MR. FITZWATER: I have no idea. We certainly would point to the quality of our nominations.

Q How does the President know that Judge Thomas is going to surprise a lot of people who think they know what his positions are on social issues?

MR. FITZWATER: It's because he's a very independent man who has very strong feelings about issues, and we think he'll be an independent member of the Judiciary. He, by the way, was -- the President signed his commission this morning, so he is now effectively Justice Thomas.

Q Wait a minute. Could you explain what --

Q He's got a couple of oaths to take first, as I recall.

Q What's the legal process?

MR. FITZWATER: Once the Senate votes its confirmation, the President signs the document called the commission which makes him a justice, and that is the official, legal process by which becomes a justice. Then he has a swearing-in at the Court, which will be next week, and he has our swearing-in here. But it's the signing of this commission that is the document.

Q The Court was adamant about that yesterday, Marlin, indicating something different, saying --

Q Saying he has to take a judicial oath.

Q They were stating flatly that he was not justice until he takes the judicial oath.

MR. FITZWATER: Well, maybe he has to take them all. I don't know.

Q Was he present when it was signed?

MR. FITZWATER: No, it's just a signing of the documentation. I don't know the exact way they relate to each other legally. There may be legal requirements on both sides. In other words, it may be that he doesn't actually assume the bench until he takes that -- you might call. Judy, why don't you give a call to Boyden and ask the difference between assigning this commission and being called justice and what he has to do on Capitol Hill.

I'll try and get an answer for you before we leave.

Q Does this put him on the payroll more or less?

MR. FITZWATER: Judy will have to find that out. All I was told was that he'll be referred to in the swearing-in today as Justice Thomas, and I wanted to explain why.

Q Marlin, back to the President's Texas trip. Do you know how much Republicans hope to raise from those fundraisers?

MR. FITZWATER: Jillions and jillions. I guess I don't have total amounts. The dinner is 1,100 to 1,200 attendees, but I don't have how much they hope to raise.

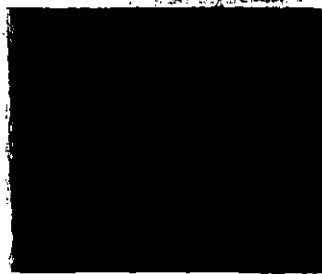

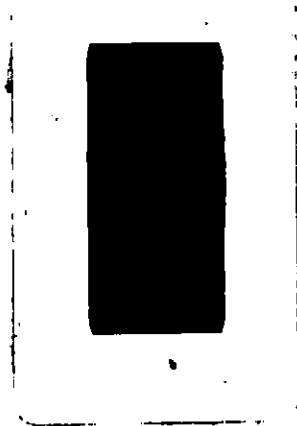
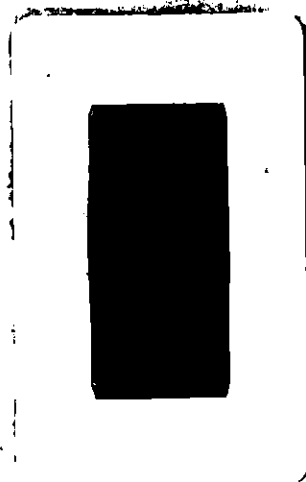

SUBJECT: Staff Gifts From Foreign Officials

I would like to enlist your assistance in conveying the staff gift restrictions to the foreign ministries with which you visit on your advance trips for the President.

Any gift over the amount of \$200.00 (Washington, D.C. value) is automatically considered property of the U. S. Government. Multiple gifts from a single donor to a single individual are considered one gift, but up to \$200.00 can be kept from that presentation.

The problem we experience, more often than not, is that the gifts are overvalue and have to be disposed of with GSA. In the case of multiple gifts, an inordinate amount of paperwork and conversation is required to decipher which combinations of gifts can be kept and which ones the staff member wants to keep. Once again, the others must be disposed of with GSA.

If your advance people, or the appropriate State or Embassy officers, could convey the restrictions to the foreign ministry, it might improve the possibility of staff members being allowed to keep more of their gifts.

In addition to visiting Japan, the Republic of Korea (South Korea) and Australia beginning in late November, the President will also travel to the Republic of Singapore. Further details will be forthcoming closer to the time of the visit.

MR. FITZWATER: We have a lot of confidence in the committee in this time of healing and coming together.

Q Ohhh.

Q To coin a phrase.

MR. FITZWATER: We look to the committee to provide leadership on this matter.

Q Will there be a spill-over with the Gates nomination or your choice of a new Attorney General? Will the Thomas incident have any effect on them at all?

MR. FITZWATER: It's impossible to say whether there will be any effect. We hope not. Every nomination should be considered on its own merits, and we would look forward to going ahead with all these. We don't have an Attorney General nomination yet, but I expect we will soon. And these matters will go forward as regularly scheduled.

Q If you could discuss a little bit more the plan to let the Senate take the lead on this investigation of the leak. The President seemed to say the other day on the golf course very strongly that the people who work at the FBI or FBI leaks -- these are federal employees. And he wanted to know -- he could do something about that because they worked for him. So I just sort of wonder if he decided, no, this did not come from the FBI, but from somewhere else or --

Q Marlin, the President express concern about the leaks. Is he satisfied with the proposal for an investigation made by Senator Mitchell yesterday, or does he plan to pursue it in another way through the FBI?

MR. FITZWATER: We don't have any reaction to the comments last night. I don't think we've had a formal request or a formal indication of what the Senate wants to do. There were some comments by Senator Mitchell and others yesterday, but we'll wait to see what specifically they want to do in that regard. Essentially, this is a matter for the committee.

Q So you will not pursue it until -- you'll let them take the lead on that? You don't plan to have a separate track on that?

MR. FITZWATER: No, I think they expect to take the lead in this. They said they are, and that's where it should come from.

Q Marlin, will the President's unhappiness with the confirmation play in at all in his argument that there should be term limitations?

MR. FITZWATER: I don't have any idea what the President's thinking is. He has not generally shared that and we'll have to see -- although that seems a little far afield, but I don't really know.

Q Does the President believe that any federal laws were broken by the leak of that FBI report?

MR. FITZWATER: We have no idea. We'll have to talk to the committee.

Q Is there a timetable for Secretary Madigan meeting with the President on Soviet food aid and a decision on that?

MR. FITZWATER: There's not a meeting scheduled, but the President has received some reports already and will be talking with him more. Also, he'll want to talk with Secretary Brady when he returns from the G-7 meeting. So there are a number of consultations that are going on between the President and members of the Cabinet and others about food aid and humanitarian assistance. But I don't have anything scheduled yet.

Q Marlin, do you anticipate that the Thomas hearings will have any spill-over onto the negotiations over the civil rights bill? I mean, might there be any change or rethinking or new approaches in the White House especially to try to maybe come to some understanding with Danforth, with whom you worked so closely in the hearings?

MR. FITZWATER: We'll continue to judge all legislation on its merits and take our positions accordingly.

Q I'm confused about the mechanics on the FBI leaks. Is what you said about leaving this for the moment to the Senate, does that imply or do you mean that the Justice Department is not going to pursue this?

Q What is she whispering about, Marlin? (Laughter.)

MR. FITZWATER: This is a CBS secret between us.

Q Questions for the hard of hearing. (Laughter.)

Purpose

To express objections to Senator Mitchell regarding the proposed "Glenn Amendment" to the Intelligence Authorization Act.

Background

Dick Kerr has forwarded the attached letter, recommending your signature. It expresses objections to the so-called Glenn Amendment (S.1003) to the Intelligence Authorization Act (S.1539).

S.1003 would require Senate confirmation of the CIA Deputy Directors and the CIA Legal Counsel. The proposed letter makes clear the nature of our objections.

The letter uses the term "strongly oppose" rather than "veto" because we think it important for you to retain some flexibility for a final determination.

Dear Senator Mitchell:

The Intelligence Authorization Act (S.1539) will shortly be considered by the Senate. I understand that an amendment will be offered that would require Presidential appointment and Senate confirmation of six senior positions at CIA. Before the Senate takes action on the legislation, you should be aware of my strong opposition to this proposal.

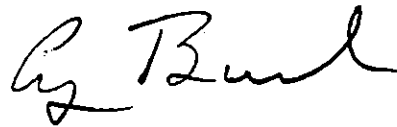
The proposed amendment is unnecessary and would create the opportunity for the politicization of the intelligence process. Politicization of intelligence is unacceptable, and I am pleased that the intelligence provided by CIA to me and my predecessors has been straight and objective. CIA has been able to provide objective intelligence by being insulated from political pressure. The Director's ability to appoint his immediate subordinates has been critical in insulating CIA from political pressure. As a former DCI, I know how critical it is that these positions be filled with qualified individuals irrespective of their political associations or beliefs. My concern is that the confirmation process itself will inevitably create pressure on qualified candidates -- either real or imagined -- to conform their views to correspond to those that are perceived to be necessary to win confirmation.

My objections to this amendment are shared on a bipartisan basis. I agree with Senators Hollings and Chafee that it is "premature to enact such legislation at a time when the Senate Intelligence Committee has just begun a comprehensive review

of the structure and organization of the U.S. Intelligence Community." At the very minimum, the Senate Intelligence Committee should closely examine the need for this proposal and its possible unintended adverse consequences before action is taken by Congress.

I hope that I can count on your support to defeat this amendment when the Intelligence Authorization Act comes to the floor.

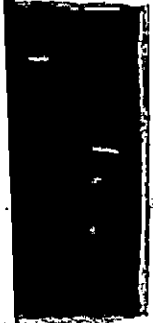
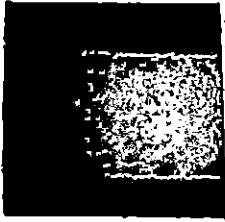

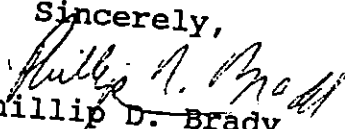

America's Heritage

Think about what makes America great. Vast natural resources. A democratic system of government. An emphasis on human rights and individual freedom. And philanthropy -- voluntary action for the public good.1

Philanthropy is a universal phenomenon which is practiced in all civilized societies. But nowhere is it more a part of the ethos of society than in America. It is viewed as a tradition, a spirit, and a sector of our society -- alternatively referred to as the third sector, the independent sector, the voluntary sector, and the nonprofit sector.2

American philanthropy dates from the earliest colonists, who established "voluntary collaborative activities" to provide basic social services before governments were there to care for public needs. Throughout our nation's history, philanthropy has shaped our institutions and our way of life. Its broad concern is improving the quality of life for all citizens by promoting their welfare, happiness and culture. Its influence extends from caring for the disadvantaged to protecting the environment, preventing disease, improving education and enhancing the arts.3

"When I was a child, a Presbyterian minister in my school gave a prize for the student who contributed the most money to the church," says Ethel Hawkins of Pine Bluff, Arkansas, who was recognized as the 1991 winner of the Outstanding Philanthropist

of the Year Award by the National Society of Fund Raising Executives. "I always won the prize. But as I matured, I began to realize that it wasn't enough to give just to get a prize. I wanted to help people in need, and I found a way to do that by contributing to programs that give people an opportunity to help themselves." Mrs. Hawkins, a former teacher of modest means, has given nearly \$100,000 to philanthropy in her lifetime.

Mrs. Hawkins, and others like her, contributed more than \$114 billion in 1989 to support philanthropic causes. It is estimated that 98 million adults in America volunteered a total of 20.5 billion hours to voluntary organizations in 1989, with a dollar value of \$170 billion. Through their cooperative efforts, museums were built, research was made possible, educational services were provided, and food and clothing was distributed to those in need.

What a tremendous example these humanitarians provide for all of us. They personify the values inherent in our democracy. They truly demonstrate that "America Cares!"

The Challenge at Hand

Because philanthropy has had, and continues to have, such a profound positive impact on our society, it is important to nurture the philanthropic tradition. And it is important to encourage all of our citizens to become involved in voluntary action for the public good. As President Bush has said, "From

now on in America, any definition of a successful life must include serving others."

On to Solutions

To help Americans appreciate the importance of philanthropy in our society, and to motivate more individuals to get involved in giving and volunteering, the National Philanthropy Day Committee proposes a four-part plan:

- (1) Develop a statement on philanthropy in America.
- (2) Disseminate information on the importance of philanthropy to American citizens via the media, celebratory events and other means.
- (3) Encourage community celebrations for recognizing and thanking those who give and volunteer.
- (4) Provide role models of philanthropic action for the public good as examples for others to emulate.

National Philanthropy Day Provides Leadership

National Philanthropy Day was first proclaimed in 1986 by a small group of leaders from a variety of organizations whose work centers on philanthropy. The stated purpose of National Philanthropy Day is "to recognize and advance the tremendous contribution philanthropy makes to improve society, and to thank those who give and volunteer to make it happen." National Philanthropy Day's function is to inspire increased volunteerism

and philanthropy by emphasizing their importance and heritage.

In that initial year, a Joint Congressional Resolution was passed declaring November 15 as National Philanthropy Day, and President Reagan hosted a signing ceremony at the White House. It was truly a momentous beginning for a program that has since experienced considerable growth.

Growth of the National Philanthropy Day Program

1986:	32 celebrations, 11,000 participants
1987:	53 celebrations, 18,500 participants
1988:	69 celebrations, 24,000 participants
1989:	86 celebrations, 30,000 participants
1990:	101 celebrations, 40,000 participants

In 1986, 32 cities held National Philanthropy Day celebrations, ranging from awards luncheons to day-long philanthropy/fund-raising workshops, and involving an estimated 11,000 individuals. By 1990, the number of participating cities had increased to 101, with an estimated 40,000 individuals involved.

Celebrities have assisted with publicity for National Philanthropy Day. In 1987, comedian Bob Hope was honorary chair of National Philanthropy Day, in 1989 Art Linkletter recorded a public service announcement and an introduction to a videotape on philanthropy, and in 1990 George Burns and Betty White recorded a public service announcement which was distributed to 197 television and radio stations throughout the country. All of

these efforts have helped to increase public recognition of National Philanthropy Day.

Joint Congressional Resolutions were passed in 1989 and 1990, and in each of those years, a Presidential Proclamation on National Philanthropy Day was issued. Congressman Dan Burton of Indiana, the originating co-sponsor of the Resolution on the House side, said in introducing the bill, "Our nation has always been blessed with individuals who knew the importance of philanthropy and did something to better their fellow man. Philanthropy is largely responsible for enhancing our quality of life. It fills a great void where the government is oftentimes unable to venture. I believe it is appropriate that, as a nation, we set aside a day to recognize those who have so unselfishly given of their time to aid the elderly, the disadvantaged, the sick.... National Philanthropy Day will formally recognize philanthropists' contributions while encouraging them to continue and expand their efforts."

Much of the success of the National Philanthropy Day program can be attributed to the collaborative efforts of the organizations that have sponsored it over the years. The American Bar Association, the American Cancer Society, the American Association of Fund Raising Counsel, the American Red Cross, the Association for Healthcare Philanthropy, Brakeley, John Price Jones Inc., the Council for Advancement and Support of Education, the Council on Foundations, Freeman, Freeman & Smiley,

The Foundation Center, Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., INDEPENDENT SECTOR, the National Society of Fund Raising Executives and its Foundation, the Russ Reid Company, the United Negro College Fund, the United Way of America and the World Conference of Seventh-day Adventists have all played a role in shaping the program, supporting it financially, and promoting it among their members. "National Philanthropy Day is valuable," says Del Staecker, CFRE, chair of the National Society of Fund Raising Executives. "It allows all philanthropic organizations to speak with one voice about the importance of philanthropy in addressing society's needs. National Philanthropy Day provides an annual tide of awareness that lifts all boats in the philanthropic basin."

National Philanthropy Day Goals for 1991 and Beyond

National Philanthropy Day, now in its sixth year, has reached a milestone. We have laid the foundation for a continuing campaign to increase public awareness of philanthropy, through collaborative efforts by a variety of philanthropic organizations and through promotion of National Philanthropy Day celebrations in communities throughout the nation. Now it is time to take a closer look at the big picture of philanthropy in America, to develop a stronger infrastructure so as to provide more assistance to communities planning National Philanthropy Day events, and to help sponsoring organizations demonstrate the power of giving and volunteering through their own philanthropic

endeavors.

Specifically, the national NPD Committee will seek funds to:

- (1) Develop a statement on philanthropy. There is a great need for philanthropic organizations to work together toward common goals. Development of a statement on philanthropy is a first step in that process. The statement can be used by all participating organizations as an educational tool which describes the meaning and purpose of philanthropy.
- (2) Provide more planning and public relations assistance to local communities, e.g., produce and disseminate a "how-to" guide for planning and publicity for a National Philanthropy Day event; publish an "information-exchange" newsletter which allows communities to describe their successful NPD events and learn from others; publish and disseminate media kits; and develop and distribute public service announcement videotapes featuring a prominent spokesperson.
- (3) Assist National Philanthropy Day sponsors in local communities in developing public service projects that demonstrate their organizations' commitment to philanthropy. Such projects might include providing scholarships for individuals to attend workshops on philanthropy and fund-raising, or providing mentoring services to struggling grass roots organizations in the community. Many organizations are already doing this kind of community service -- above and beyond their primary mission as an organization. A

recent survey of National Society of Fund Raising Executives chapters for example, reveals that 39 out of 46 responding chapters give, or plan to give, scholarships for minority or other individuals in the fund-raising profession to attend professional development workshops; and 35 out of 46 responding chapters provide, or are considering providing, consultative services to individuals or organizations requiring assistance.

Opportunities to Support the National Philanthropy Day Effort

National Philanthropy Day is a true partnership program. The organizations that comprise the NPD Committee have contributed to provide moderate support for this effort. But it is critical that the NPD Committee raise additional funds to continue and expand promotional efforts for NPD. We ask for financial assistance in four critical areas:

- (1) For production and wide distribution of public service announcement videotapes on philanthropy in America --
 - \$26,500. Dissemination of this public service announcement will allow us to reach a broad spectrum of the American public with our message about the value and rewards of philanthropy.
- (2) For development of materials that can be used by local event planners to make National Philanthropy more visible in the community, e.g., media kits, "how-to" manual, brochures,

stationery, bookmarks, NPD buttons, banners -- \$34,000.

- (3) For production and distribution of models for public service projects that could be undertaken by organizations -- \$15,000.

National Philanthropy Day is a way to reach out and touch every American. Its key message is, "You don't have to be wealthy to be a philanthropist; you just have to care." Not only will National Philanthropy Day promote and recognize the generous spirit of the American people; it will also help ensure that future generations carry on the vital tradition of giving. You are invited to share in realizing this goal with your generous support of National Philanthropy Day.

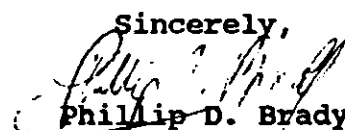

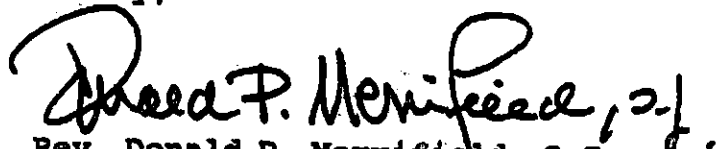

The President today named Ambrose Elliott, Jr., of Des Moines, Iowa, as the 589th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Affectionately known as "Grandpa," Mr. Elliott spends his free time as a Foster Grandparent, caring for infants with special needs at the Valley Children's Center in West Des Moines.

At 65 years of age, Grandpa Elliott gets up early every morning and rides the bus across town to the Valley Children's Center, a medical treatment facility for children, where he spends four hours a day seeing to the needs of the infants. Mr. Elliott, who has been deaf since the age of eight, cannot share songs or stories with the children but instead gives them his care and attention.

The children at the center have a wide range of medical and special needs and spend many hours each day receiving treatment and therapy. Often the staff at the center are unable to provide each child with individual attention; thus they rely on Mr. Elliott to fill unmet needs. He plays with groups of children, walks them outside in the sunshine and fresh air, and quietly rocks infants to sleep after a long day of therapy. He focuses his time and effort on the individual needs of each child in the nursery. Children are inspired and motivated by the attention they receive during Mr. Elliott's visits, and the staff at the children's center feel that his love and affection have benefitted many children.

The President today named the volunteers of Project C.A.R.E. (Caring Always Reaps Enjoyment), of Wanamassa, New Jersey, as the 590th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Nearly 350 students, 25 teachers, PTA parents from Wanamassa School participate in community service efforts through Project C.A.R.E.

Seeing a need for community and school involvement in local volunteer efforts, parents and teachers from Wanamassa School, an elementary school for children in kindergarten through fourth grade, started Project C.A.R.E. in September of 1990. Supervised by parents and other community members, the student volunteers perform a wide array of volunteer services. They collect food and clothing for needy and homeless persons, assist at local shelters and soup kitchens, and work with a local Alzheimer care facility where they entertain and correspond with the patients.

Project C.A.R.E. has also organized "Trash Pick-Up Days," where the volunteers travel throughout the community and clear away trash and litter that has accumulated in public areas. Volunteers also correspond with terminally ill children in the local area. Monthly events are organized to inspire the students and others to participate in volunteer activities, and the school also implements an annual volunteer project theme. This year's theme is "Share Your Heritage," which encourages volunteers to work with elderly persons in order to share experiences of past and present generations.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: ROGER B. PORTER *RBP*
SUBJECT: George Washington and the Presidency

Gordon Wood in his lecture on George Washington last Monday repeatedly drew attention to how Washington was viewed in his day. He also emphasized how striking was Washington's precedent in limiting himself to two terms.

The debates about the Presidency at the Constitutional Convention revealed the fears of some delegates that the office would become too powerful. The idea of a plural executive was seriously advanced and only narrowly rejected after much debate. Likewise, the idea of limiting the number of terms a president could serve was advanced by those concerned about excessive power in a single office.

The experience of several states, not least New York which had the constitutionally most powerful Governor, fueled their concerns. George Clinton was first elected governor of New York in 1777. By the time of the Constitutional Convention he had been elected to four consecutive terms. He eventually served six consecutive three-year terms (1777-1795), did not run in 1795 or 1798, and then was elected to a seventh three-year term (1801-1804).

Thomas Jefferson, in France at the time of the Constitutional Convention, was distressed about two features of what the Convention produced. The first was the lack of a Bill of Rights. The second was the failure to limit the number of terms a president could serve. He believed this would result in an individual holding office for life.

In a letter to James Madison, Jefferson wrote:

The second feature I dislike, and greatly dislike, is the abandonment in every instance of the necessity of rotation in office, and most particularly in the case of the President. Experience concurs with reason in concluding that the first magistrate will always be re-elected if the Constitution permits it. He is then an officer

for life. (Paris, December 20, 1787. Thomas Jefferson -- Writings, New York: Library of America, 1984, p. 916.)

Earlier, he had written to John Adams supporting limiting an individual to a single four-year presidential term:

Their President seems a bad edition of a Polish king. He may be reelected from 4 years to 4 years for life. Reason and experience prove to us that a chief magistrate, so continuable, is an officer for life. When one or two generations shall have proved that this is an office for life, it becomes on every succession worthy of intrigue, of bribery, of force, and even of foreign interference. ... I wish that at the end of the 4 years they had made him for ever ineligible a second time. (Paris, November 13, 1787. Thomas Jefferson -- Writings, p. 913-914.)

Interestingly, Jefferson's concerns did not extend to George Washington. He wrote to Francis Hopkinson that he would willingly make an exception for Washington because of "the confidence reposed in his perfect integrity."

With respect to the reeligibility of the president, I find myself differing from the majority of my countrymen, for I think there are but three states out of the 11 which have desired an alteration of this. And indeed, since the thing is established, I would wish it not to be altered during the life of our great leader, whose executive talents are superior to those I believe of any man in the world, and who alone by the authority of his name and the confidence reposed in his perfect integrity, is fully qualified to put the new government so under way as to secure it against the efforts of opposition. But having derived from our error all the good there was in it I hope we shall correct it the moment we can no longer have the same name at the helm. (Paris, March 13, 1789. Thomas Jefferson -- Writings, p. 942.)

Finally, in his Autobiography, Jefferson expressed a preference for a single seven-year presidential term:

...the reeligibility of the President was not proposed by that body. My fears of that feature were founded on the importance of the office, on the fierce contentions it might excite among ourselves, if continuable for life, and the dangers

of interference either with money or arms, by foreign nations, to whom the choice of an American President might become interesting. ... My wish therefore was that the President should be elected for 7 years & be ineligible afterwards. (Thomas Jefferson -- Writings, p. 72.)

As in so many other matters, Washington, by voluntarily limiting himself to two terms, established a precedent that was observed for over a century.

Award said result of favoring Spanish interests

Puerto Rico received the Prince of Asturias literary prize as a result of concerted efforts by Gov. Rafael Hernández Colón to favor Spanish interests on the island, a San Juan mayoral hopeful said Saturday.

"It's the result of a strategy developed in Puerto Rico, which includes creating favorable conditions for Spanish banks to establish themselves here. The strategy has an influence on the final decision," said Carlos Díaz Olivo, president of the New Progressive Party's San Juan municipal committee.

Earlier this year, Spain allowed Puerto Rico to broadcast Spanish television programs on the island's public television station. In exchange, Puerto Rico agreed to give priority in its public channel to programming that promoted upcoming 1992 events in Spain such as the Barcelona

olympics and the Seville World's Fair.

The Prince of Asturias prize, normally reserved for writers, was granted to the people of Puerto Rico in April after the governor signed a controversial law making Spanish the only official language of the island's government.

Hernández Colón left Friday with a delegation of about 20 for a two-week visit to Spain. He will receive the award on Friday in Oviedo, Spain.

"The award ends up being a farce, especially when the governor is going to use it for political purposes," Díaz Olivo said in a press conference.

The language law replaced a 1992 statute that said both Spanish and English could be used in government business.

The NPP charged the law is an attempt by Hernández Colón to distance Puerto Rico from the United States and hurt the statehood movement.

Among those who will be joining the

Puerto Rican delegation is Elías López Sobá, the head of Puerto Rico's cultural affairs office in Madrid.

López Sobá has erroneously been called the ambassador from Puerto Rico in the Spanish press.

On Friday, U.S. Ambassador to Madrid Joseph Zappala visited Hernández Colón in a private meeting, and later announced an official from the embassy would accompany the governor to the award ceremony.

Hernández Colón will meet Monday

with a group of Spanish bankers and businessmen as well as the director of the Spanish government's news agency, Antonio Colmanares.

On Tuesday, he will have lunch with King Juan Carlos and Queen Sofía.

Wednesday, he will meet with President Felipe González to talk about developing closer ties between Latin America and Spain.

The University of Oviedo will grant him an honorary doctorate, and he will also deliver a lecture on law at the University of Granada.

Honduras delegation seeks 936 loan

A Honduran delegation is in Puerto Rico looking to open a consulate here and seeking 936 loans for industrial projects.

Ramón Medina Luna, Honduras trade and economic minister, and five Honduran industrialists, who are in Puerto Rico until Saturday, are meeting with local bank and industry officials to strengthen commercial ties between the two countries.

"We want to develop greater economic and financial ties with Puerto Rico," said Medina Luna.

Honduras' desire for closer relations comes after the Honduran legislature ratified in September a Tax

Information Exchange Agreement with the United States, a required step before the country can receive 936 funds.

An exchange of diplomatic notes is expected by month's end, finalizing the eligibility process.

The so-called 936 funds are profits of U.S.-based manufacturers with Puerto Rico operations invested in local banks and brokerages. Those profits are exempted from federal taxes.

There are now more than \$3 billion in such funds, and Puerto Rico is required by federal law to lend \$100 million annually in 936 funds to eligible Caribbean Basin nations.

Medina Luna accompanied Honduran President Rafael Leonardo Ca-

llejas during a visit here for a Caribbean Basin business conference sponsored by the Commonwealth.

Honduras will be the second Central American country, after Costa Rica, to join a group of eight countries that have signed the tax agreements.

Medina Luna said his country was in a "full" economic recovery, which prompted it to look for greater commercial interchange.

Other countries that have entered into tax accords with the United States include Barbados, Dominican Republic and Jamaica. The U.S. Virgin Islands also is eligible for 936 funds.

Since 1985, Puerto Rico has lent more than \$320 million in 936 loans to Caribbean Basin countries.

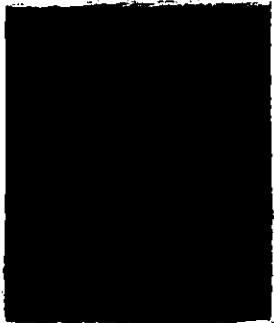

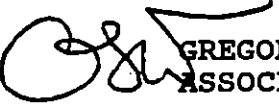

SUBJECT: Disposition¹ of Gifts to the President²

1. Domestic gifts to the President are considered to be the personal property of the President, subject to his use and disposition, unless declined or accepted on behalf of the United States. Unless (1) declined and returned, (2) given to Archives for the Bush Presidential Library, (3) given to GSA for disposition, or (4) reported to GSA and transferred, a gift accepted by the President is subject to the reporting requirements of the Ethics in Government Act, as amended.

2. Foreign gifts to the President of more than minimal value (currently \$200) are automatically deemed property of the United States and may be temporarily retained by the White House for "official use," or turned over to GSA for disposal. Foreign gifts turned over to GSA for disposal may be purchased personally by the President, consistent with 41 C.F.R. Part 101-49. Foreign gifts valued at \$200 or less may be personally retained by the President if "tendered and received as a souvenir or mark of courtesy," and disposed of as he sees fit, or they may be treated as Government property and temporarily retained for official use, given to Archives, or turned over to GSA for disposal.

3. The President, like all other Federal employees, has inherent authority to accept gifts on behalf of the United States. When a gift of personalty is accepted on behalf of the United States, it becomes property of the Federal government, and is not subject to the reporting requirements. Under 41 C.F.R. 101-43.307-5, "if the receiving agency has specific authority to use the property, it may then be used for any authorized purpose by that agency." The White House has no general gift acceptance authority. But a

gift of "furniture" or "furnishings" may be accepted for use in the White House under the National Park Service's gift acceptance authority, 3 U.S.C. 110, and gifts of food, beverages or flowers may be accepted for use by the White House Mess under the Navy's gift acceptance authority. All other gifts accepted on behalf of the United States must be turned over to Archives for the Bush Library (44 U.S.C. 2111-2112), to GSA for disposition (40 U.S.C. 484-486),³ to the Secret Service for destruction, or reported to GSA and transferred, as indicated below.

4. Under 41 C.F.R. 101-43.307-5, unconditional gifts to the President that are accepted on behalf of the United States and not given to Archives are to be reported to GSA using SF 120 and SF 122. Such property need not be physically given to GSA for disposition but may be transferred from the White House Gift Office to another agency (e.g., National Park Service, Secret Service, Camp David, White House Communications Agency) as an official Government transfer. Although an agency does not need to have gift acceptance authority to receive an official Government transfer, it must demonstrate to GSA that it has a Federal need for the property. GSA will usually accommodate a White House Gift Office request that the property be transferred to a specified agency.

5. Gifts of personalty to the President will seldom fall within the definition of "Presidential records" as that term is used in 44 U.S.C. 2201. Although "Presidential records" means "documentary materials," which is in turn defined to include "works of art, models, pictures, photographs, maps, films, and motion pictures," such materials are "Presidential records" only if received "in the course of conducting activities which relate to or have an effect upon the carrying out of the . . . duties of the President."

6. If a gift to the President is considered "historical material" as that term is defined in the Presidential Libraries Act, 44 U.S.C. 2101(2), then that gift may be accepted by the Archives if the Archivist determines that it is in the public interest to do so. The White House Gift Office considers "Archivable" personalty given to the President if the property relates to a Presidential trip or event or issue handled by or of interest to the Administration, or the property is of personal interest to the President. Before the President elects to accept gifts personally (Presidential property) or on behalf of the

United States (Government property), the White House Gift Office may transfer this property to the Archives for storage and preservation. Until the election is made, all property should be considered to the Presidential property and handled accordingly.

7. The Archives has developed the practice of accepting physical custody of historical materials without transfer of title by use of a deposit agreement. Deposit agreements typically provide that materials remain the property of the donor but with the clear intent that title to the property will be later conveyed to the United States at the donor's future convenience, i.e., by a deed of gift. Gifts to the President that are sent to the Archives are "deposited" with the Archives under an implicit deposit agreement, and remain Presidential property until either a deed of gift is executed, or, before then, the President elects to accept the property on behalf of the United States for donation to the Archives and eventual use by the Library.

8. The formal transfer of title to the Archives of gifts that the President accepts and retains personally for use during the Administration is accomplished by a deed of gift, executed by the President. A deed of gift historically has been executed at or after the conclusion of an Administration, and covers all property intended to go to the Presidential Library.

9. The transfer to Archives of individual gifts to the President may be accomplished before the end of the Administration by an election made by the President no later than March 15 of the year following the year receipt of the gift. Gifts to the President that are deposited with the Archives for later display in the Presidential Library are considered to be Government property at the time of the President's decision to accept them on behalf of the United States for donation to the Archives. Gifts received by the President in a calendar year and neither deeded to Archives nor formally accepted on behalf of the United States and given to Archives by May 15 of the following year are subject to the reporting requirements under the Ethics in Government Act. Given the volume of gifts to the President, and the President's schedule, the President must be given a reasonable amount of time to determine whether to retain a gift or accept on behalf of the United States for later display in the Presidential Library.

10. As a practice, gifts to the President under the reporting threshold are retained by the President, who may use or dispose of this property as he sees fit. The President may retain the gift and keep it at the end of his Administration, or give it to Archives at any time for later display in the Presidential Library, or give it to charity or to any other person. Gifts over the reporting threshold are usually deposited with Archives,

to be accepted on behalf of the United States and later transferred to the Presidential Library, or in some cases transferred to another agency by an official government transfer. In some cases, a domestic gift over the reporting threshold is retained by the President and subject to the reporting requirements.

11. Where the President accepts a gift personally, he may display it in the White House or give it or loan it to any other person or entity. Where the President accepts a gift on behalf of the United States, the property may be displayed at the White House (or Camp David or Kennebunkport or private museums) only temporarily and only with the approval of the Archives (because the White House does not have gift acceptance authority). As a technical matter, the gift is Government property, and not Presidential or White House property. Where a gift has been deposited with the Archives but has not yet been accepted on behalf of the United States, the property remains Presidential property and may be loaned at the discretion of the President. As a practical matter, regardless of whether title to the property rests with the President or the United States, the Archives will store and preserve the gifts until they are transferred to the Presidential Library, and so the Archives will agree to any White House request to retrieve a gift for display in the White House or other location. However, a gift accepted by the President on behalf of the United States may not thereafter be returned to the President and considered to be President's personal property.

Conditions governing loan

1. **Preservation.** It is understood that property loaned pursuant to this agreement shall remain in the condition in which it is received. It shall not be altered, cleaned or repaired except with written permission of the National Archives. Should loss, damage, or deterioration be discovered, the National Archives should be notified immediately, followed by a written report and photographs, if requested. No conservation may be undertaken without express permission.

2. **Security.** Property shall at all times be given proper care to insure them against loss, damage or deterioration. Objects must be maintained in a fire-proof building under 24-hour security. The borrower must undertake to maintain constant and adequate protection of the property from: fire; exposure to extreme or deteriorating light; extreme or unusual temperatures and humidity; insects, vermin, and dirt; theft; and mishandling or handling by unauthorized or inexperienced persons or by the public. Property shall not be loaned or moved from the location specified on this form without express approval of the National Archives, in consultation with the Director of the White House Gift Office.

3. **Insurance.** Borrower is to insure this property under an all-risk, wall-to-wall policy during the period of this loan for the value stated on the front of this form. The borrower must furnish a certificate of insurance or a copy of the policy made out in favor of the National Archives and Records Administration, or, in the case of Presidential property, in favor of the President, before the property may be shipped to the borrower. Insurance may be waived for U.S. Government agencies, but such agencies shall be responsible for the cost of repair of any object damaged during the period of the loan.

4. **Shipping.** Shipping and handling arrangements for this property must be approved in advance by the Director of the White House Gift Office. Repacking must be done with either original

or similar materials and by the same methods as the objects were received. The borrower agrees to pay all costs for the packing, shipping and handling of this property.

5. **Photography.** Unless otherwise noted in writing, photographing or filming of this property is prohibited, with the exceptions of photographs for official registrarial purposes and candid photographs for news media concerned directly with exhibition publicity. Photographic materials obtained from the National Archives and Records Administration or White House Gift Office are restricted to use in non-commercial publications and publicity directly associated with the exhibition. Examples or copies of all materials in which such photographs are reproduced shall be provided to the White House Gift Office without charge.

6. **Return.** Property must be returned in satisfactory condition by the stated termination date, unless because of irreparable damage or loss, the Federal Government receives the insurance value thereof. Any extension of this loan must be approved in writing, and be accompanied by an extension of insurance coverage. The National Archives retains the discretion to recall objects from loan at any time and will make every effort to give reasonable notice.

Special conditions

It is expressly understood by the borrower that the property loaned under this agreement is and remains throughout this agreement Presidential property/the property of the United States, intended for future disposition and use by the National Archives and Records Administration at the George Bush Presidential Library. It is further understood that, consistent with Executive Branch standards of conduct and in order to maintain the integrity of the Presidency, this property may not be used, directly or indirectly, for any commercial purpose. It is further understood that no reference may be made to the White House, the President, or the Office of the President in connection with this property except the following statement, "This property is Presidential property/property of the United States, intended for future use and disposition by the National Archives and Records Administration at the George Bush Presidential Library." Any varying language or description must be approved in advance by the Director of the White House Gift Office.

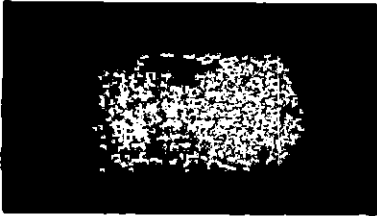
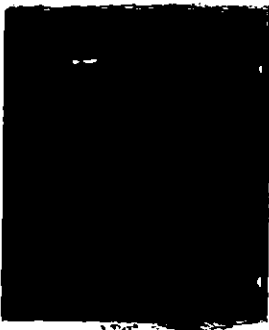

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

On Tuesday the House passed the following legislation by voice vote: H.R. 2698, the FY 1992 Department of Agriculture Appropriations bill; H.R. 2426, the FY 1992 Military Construction Appropriations bill; H.R. 1724, a bill lifting restrictions on the importation of goods from Czechoslovakia and Hungary; and H.R. 2629, the Women's Business Development Act of 1991.

On Wednesday the House passed H.R. 3033, Job Training Reform Amendments, by a vote of 420 to 6, and the conference report to accompany H.R. 2942, the FY 1992 Department of Transportation Appropriations bill by a vote of 374 to 49.

On Thursday the House passed H.R. 1470, the Price Fixing Prevention Act, by voice vote. During consideration of the bill, Republicans helped pass a "killer" amendment offered by Representative Tom Campbell (R-CA) that, in effect, exempts a huge percentage of businesses that would otherwise be covered by the bill. The vote was 218 to 195. Passage of the amendment eliminates the need to threaten a veto of the bill; however, should the bill come back from Conference without the Campbell amendment, our Members understand that we will revert to veto status.

On Friday the House Rules Committee reported a rule to begin consideration of the crime bill on Tuesday. The rule makes in order over 40 amendments including all of the Administration's key provisions.

SENATE

On Monday the Senate passed S. 1583, legislation to curb environmental damage from natural gas and hazardous liquid pipelines, by voice vote. The bill would require the Transportation Department to consider potential harm to the environment when it sets pipeline safety requirements.

The President today named the volunteers of Life Issues for the Elderly (LIFE), of Charlottesville, Virginia, as the 588th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. LIFE is a nonprofit organization that provides senior citizens the opportunity to counsel their peers on issues that affect the elderly.

Concerned for the increasing number of elderly residents in the community and their need for support services, LIFE was designed through the Charlottesville Area Retired Senior Volunteer Program in 1988. Over 50 volunteer counselors spend five to seven hours per week offering support to individuals 60 years of age and older. These counselors, who are themselves 60 years and older, help with issues such as housing, insurance, retirement, and loss of a spouse.

"Friendly Visiting" is one of the programs offered by LIFE. Through it, trained volunteers share their time and friendship with lonely and isolated individuals on a weekly basis. In the "Telephone Reassurance Program," volunteers make telephone calls to ill, disabled, or isolated people who live alone. Through this program, callers may discover emergency situations in time to prevent a tragedy.

LIFE volunteers also offer peer support information through "Senior Health Insurance Benefits Advisors" and "Consumer Housing Information Services for Seniors." Through these programs, volunteers provide information concerning Medicare, long-term care guidance, and affordable housing options for the elderly. LIFE's Guardianship Program allows volunteers to become legally appointed guardians to needy elderly persons.

The President salutes the volunteers of LIFE for their community service efforts and for demonstrating his belief that, "From now on in America, any definition of a successful life must include serving others."

The President today named the student volunteers of DePauw University, of Greencastle, Indiana, as the 592nd Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Student volunteers of DePauw University engage in community service in an attempt to meet the diverse needs of their local community.

Seventeen years ago, the Community Service Program at DePauw grew out of the students' desire to augment the level of volunteerism at the university. This student-run effort provides information about volunteer programs to all students at the university. It places an average of 600 students per year on weekend group service programs in the Indianapolis inner-city and matches 400 students per year in one-to-one voluntary activities in rural Putnam County. Last year over 65 percent of the student population participated in volunteer activities through the Community Service Program.

An important aspect of the community service effort at DePauw is the one-to-one volunteer programs in which the students participate. In 1990 nearly 700 students were matched with individuals in need of on-going companionship or support. Volunteers have the opportunity to visit prison inmates, serve as Head Start classroom aides, "adopt" senior citizens, and provide parenting training for unwed mothers. Students must commit between one to four hours per week and are specially trained for their particular program.

Residents of dormitories and members of fraternities and sororities often participate in group service projects. These campus groups spend weekends rebuilding homes, working for the nature conservancy, or participating in other community efforts. The January Winter Term service project allows groups of students to travel to Third World countries, as well as to depressed areas of the United States, where they perform activities such as building construction and repair, public health education, and dental care instruction.

The President salutes the student volunteers of DePauw University for their community service efforts and for demonstrating his belief that, "From now on in America, any definition of a successful life must include serving others."

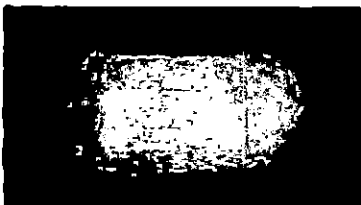

There has been a Japanese delegation in Tokyo this week and things appear to be changing almost daily in the system and with key players.

In addition to the above development of high confidence level reserves, an aggressive exploration and delineation program would be carried out. The cost is estimated at \$800 million. Under the joint venture structure, as outlined in the proposal, the Soviet share of the exploration program would be fully funded by Exxon and SODECO. It is anticipated that such a program would result in the discovery of an additional 350 million tonnes (2.7 billion barrels) of liquids and 600 billion cubic meters (21 trillion cubic feet) of natural gas. These reserves would be produced utilizing the integrated offshore/onshore facilities planned for the production of the existing high confidence reserves.

Following the feasibility study, project work would commence with a target of installing the first offshore platform in 1997. Additional platforms would be installed, one in each following year, through to 2003. This schedule is considered to be realistic and achievable. A faster development schedule can be prepared using very optimistic assumptions, but this generally leads to disappointment if the schedule is not met.

As an expression of the Exxon and SODECO commitment to a corporate responsibility to the citizens in the communities where they operate, the proposal has included a sum of \$30 million which would be directed to appropriate welfare sphere projects upon agreement to a venture as envisioned in the proposal.

**DEVELOPMENT AND EXPLORATION OFFSHORE SAKHALIN ISLAND
SUMMARY OF EXXON/SODECO PROPOSAL**

In response to an invitation to bid on the development and exploration of offshore northeast Sakhalin Island, a joint proposal was prepared and submitted by Exxon Neftegas Limited and Sakhalin Oil Development Cooperation Co. Ltd. (SODECO).

Founded in 1882, Exxon is one of the largest multinational companies in the world and has over 100 years of experience operating internationally. Exxon currently has operations in 80 countries encompassing petroleum exploration, production, refining, marketing, chemicals, and mining, as well as pipeline and tanker transportation of oil, natural gas, and products. In 1990 Exxon had over 270 thousand m³/day of oil production, 150 million m³/day of gas production, and 740 thousand m³/day of petroleum product sales. This volume of production, coming from fields around the world, gives Exxon unsurpassed experience in overcoming diverse reservoir, production, climatic, and offshore challenges. As reported in its 1990 annual report, Exxon has assets of \$87.7 billion. In 1990, Exxon generated \$5 billion of net income from revenues of \$116.9 billion. Capital and exploration expenditures were \$8.3 billion in 1990. Net earnings in the 1st half of 1991 are \$3.4 billion.

SODECO is a jointly-owned private company established in 1974. Its shareholders include the Japanese government agencies such as Japan National Oil Corporation; other shareholders include significant private corporations such as Overseas Petroleum Corporation, C. Itoh & Co., Ltd., and Marubeni Corporation.

SODECO, in submitting this proposal jointly with Exxon, has the full backing of the Japanese government agency, Japan National Oil Corporation. This support will allow project financing for the Soviet share of development as required. Financing of \$3.4 billion will be required.

Significant hard currency cash flow will be generated under the proposed development of the existing high confidence reserves (excludes exploration potential). Cumulative cash flow of \$310 billion would be generated assuming a U.S. Department of Energy reference price. About \$200 billion of this project total would be retained by the Soviets.

The proposal is for an integrated regional development and exploration program including both the area outlined in the bid invitation as well as two additional fields, Chayvo and Odoptu, which were discovered through joint exploration by the Soviets and SODECO. An estimated \$16.3 billion expenditure would be made to develop reserves of 300 million tonnes (2.3 billion barrels) of crude and condensate and 700 billion cubic meters (25 trillion cubic feet) of natural gas. Gas production would commence in 1998 and would reach a peak production rate of 21 billion cubic meters per year (2 billion cubic feet per day). This level is sufficient to meet the minimum volumes for export sales to Japan while responding to the domestic requirements on Sakhalin Island and the Far East Region of Russia. Crude production would also commence in 1998 and would reach a peak rate of 15.6 million tonnes per year (325 thousand barrels per day).

It's simply unclear whether, over time, this will become the umbrella group for Indian American businessmen or whether another group will emerge. Ms. LeBlond may wish to speak with someone in Counsel before deciding whether she wishes to be Honorary Chairman of this group.

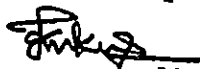

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

On Monday the House passed by voice vote, H.R. 3576, which amends the Cranston-Gonzalez National Affordable Housing Act to provide block grants for low-income housing to four U.S. territories omitted when the bill passed last year.

On Tuesday the House passed H.R. 3371, the Omnibus Crime Control Act of 1991, by a vote of 305 to 118. On five key Administration amendments the House took the following action:

- approved Representative Bill McCollum's (R-FL) amendment, which includes your exclusionary rule reforms, by a vote of 247 to 165.
- approved Representative George Gekas' (R-PA) amendment, which strengthened the death penalty language in the bill by substituting the language from your bill, by a vote of 213 to 206.
- approved Representative Bill McCollum's (R-FL) amendment to eliminate objectionable racial justice provisions, by a vote of 223 to 191.
- approved Representative Henry Hyde's (R-IL) amendment to strike Representative Howard Berman's language, which would have allowed more than half the current death row inmates to challenge their sentences because of supposed racial discrimination, by a vote of 238 to 180.
- defeated Representative Henry Hyde's (R-IL) habeas corpus amendment twice. After the first negative vote on the Hyde amendment, House Republicans attempted to recommit the bill to include his language, but failed by a vote of 201 to 221.

1. A great president?

■ In one vital area, George Bush could have great impact without big spending: education.

George Bush knows the difference between reaching for greatness and just muddling through. That is evident in his rhetoric when he commits U.S. troops to a Mideast war, and when he takes the lead in nuclear arms reduction and invites Mikhail Gorbachev to follow suit.

But no matter what the president's intent, neither of those initiatives will assure him much space in the history books: The Mideast remains a gurgling morass of ethnic and historic hostilities. His military foray, however timely, is likely to disappear in the desert sand. And his bold offer on nuclear arms is only a footnote to the larger story — the breakup of the Soviet empire — in which Mr. Bush won't merit much more than a footnote.

There is, however, one area of vital importance in which Mr. Bush has the opportunity to make a historic difference: education.

What's needed isn't money. America spends 1½ times as much per pupil as Japan and Germany and comes nowhere close to achieving similar results. The federal government provides only 7% of the nation's education budget anyway; most of the rest comes from state and local sources.

What's needed is leadership. A president committed to action might shake parents and state governments out of their lazy assumption

that their schools just need a little tinkering. The fact is that America's system of education isn't working. There are too many dropouts, too many undereducated graduates. Our schools won't provide a work force capable of making this country competitive in the international marketplace of the 21st century, nor will they provide the educated citizenry essential to the health of a democracy.

Mr. Bush already calls himself the education president. He and Education Secretary Lamar Alexander have advanced some good ideas. But staking out a position is one thing; seizing the initiative is quite another.

A committed president could rally public support for grass-roots reform. He could encourage public opposition to the turf-guarding tendencies of politicians and educators. He could make the case for toppling the education bureaucracy, reorganizing our schools, improving and empowering teachers and increasing parental and community involvement. He could focus attention on the necessity of tending to the needs of children: One out of four of America's preschool children, for example, is living in poverty. Who knows, he might even scare parents into making their children spend less time on television and more on homework.

In a world where economic and political power are more and more closely linked to brain power, education is a classic big issue. Education for all is a powerful moral issue as well. Mr. Bush would benefit if he adopted it as the theme of his next presidential campaign and, if he is reelected, his next presidency. So would America.

East High teen gives Lujan an earful on schools

When a member of President Bush's Cabinet asked an East High School audience Thursday how to make schools better, 16-year-old Audrey Powers jumped up from her chair and gave him a mouthful.

How is she supposed to learn biology with a book that's 20 years old and missing half its pages? How come Alaska teachers want more money if they're already the best paid in the nation? Why doesn't her school offer courses in geology and religion?

"We should have more books, more programs, more of everything," said the 10th-grade Native student.

And when U.S. Secretary of the Interior Manuel Lujan and Gov. Wally Hickel asked their audience, several dozen East students in all, how to make sure that teen-agers

finish school, Powers piped up again.

"Make it a law," she said.

Like most of the students who met with Lujan during his brief visit to Anchorage on Thursday in connection with the Alaska Federation of Natives annual convention, Powers is part of Ellknaurvik Within East.

It's a special "school-within-a-school" program designed to help Native students succeed, and it won high marks when the Bush administration named East one of the top 225 high schools in the nation last spring.

Lujan came armed with a short speech about Bush's plan to reform schools, a speech that might have been well-suited for an audience of legislators, but the East students were clearly more interested in a frank discussion of their own experiences.

They had lots to say about the difference between good and bad teachers, the importance of extracurricular activities like the Native Culture Club and the need for more academic tutoring and greater parental involvement in school.

"Some teachers are quite unhappy teaching and seem to be just waiting for retirement," said Rory Perron, a junior.

Sophomore Kattie Recken said "part of the problem is that learning should start at home with parents," and junior Susan Es-sayyad said it is the students themselves who are ultimately responsible for their own education.

"My parents tell me, 'You have to do it for yourself,'" she said. "Since we're the Nintendo generation, we're getting lazier and lazier. But I don't want to end up flipping burgers, so I push myself."

When the half-hour discussion was over, Lujan remarked to reporters that he'd have a message for the president: "We have to make schools more interesting for the students, because the more involved they are, the better students they'll be."

Lujan's visit coincides with a push in the Anchorage School District to promote the school-within-a-school concept, in which an entire day or a half day of a student's class schedule is spent with a core group of teachers and a small number of students who share common academic interests. East and Steller are the only schools that currently offer the optional programs.

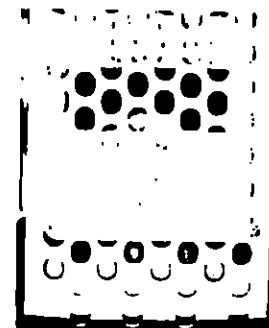
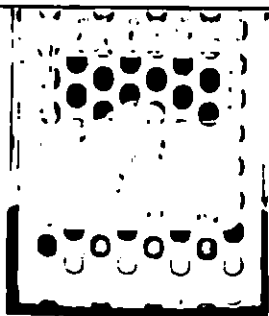
But in recent weeks, other high schools have drafted proposals for their own programs, each with different themes, varying from fine arts at West High to interna-

tional studies at Service High to science and technology at Dimond High. Start-up costs for the programs are estimated to be \$100,000 to \$400,000.

Principals say the programs appeal to students because they offer more latitude for independent study; appeal to teachers because they allow greater flexibility for group projects and field trips; and appeal to parents because they encourage parents to get involved with school activities.

"The students have indicated they want a somewhat more personalized educational experience and parents want a more flexible learning environment," said Service principal Marilyn Conaway.

The draft proposals are to be presented to the school board on Monday as the board begins to discuss a budget plan for the 1992-93 school year.

Dear Mr. President:

I accepted the appointment to the Commission on Civil Rights out of my commitment to the ideas expressed in the Declaration of Independence and my conviction that under your leadership the country would learn that the goals of equal opportunity and dignity for all Americans could be furthered by the Republican Party.

You have an unusual and unprecedented opportunity. That is, the opportunity to lead the country, not along a divisive path that can be characterized by a fear of "quotas" and a fear of our differences, but along a path of opportunity, economic expansion and affirmative action.

This country is in a unique historical moment. The power of your office, as well as the personal virtues you possess, position you to lead the country in an absolutely different direction.

This direction would unify the country in a way that has not happened in decades. It would make the Republican Party the representative party for those of us who seek opportunity for economic advancement, freedom and progress. In domestic policy I am afraid that you are following the polls. You have allowed yourself to be positioned to run against quotas, using the country's legitimate concerns about unfairness to drive a wedge between ethnic groups. You have also let the Democratic Party undermine your program for economic growth, including your sound proposal for a reduction in the capital gains tax rate, by failing to respond forcefully to their misguided notion that high tax rates are fair. In so doing, you have conceded the correctness of their position and abandoned the moral high ground.

The third step is to continue your policy of education reform by bringing choice to education. Such reform would affirm the rights of all Americans to equal educational opportunity.

Standing for the civil rights of all Americans, for economic growth and opportunity, and for choice in education constitute the first principles for political realignment of the country.

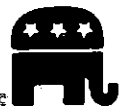

FROM: CLAYTON YEUTTER

I just did the Sperling breakfast this morning to a big turnout of reporters. That evidences a heating up of the political situation. About 90 percent of the questions related either to the economy or to David Duke.

As we've seen in recent days, Duke is a very skillful demagogue, and it appears that he has effectively conned both the media and the people of Louisiana. It is too early to judge the probable outcome of his runoff with Edwards, but he certainly has a chance. He's a populist, protest candidate and anyone of that ilk has considerable appeal when things aren't going well. And they haven't been going well economically in Louisiana for several years. In my view that is the primary reason that Roemer lost this past week.

We need to stay out of the line of fire in Louisiana for the next four weeks, but we also need to be prepared to react should Duke win. I'll coordinate with Governor Sununu on that as the time approaches.

As to the economy, there is a great deal of unrest, but we shouldn't rush into something that could do more harm than good. The Democrats will engage in class warfare on the issue, contending that they wish to tax the rich and give to the middle class. What they are really proposing is to tax everybody, and give to their special interests! The basic intent of their proposals is still to redistribute income, and to breach the budget agreement. The reaction of the financial markets to Senator Bentsen's recent proposal was instructive; the stock market declined 16 points and the bond market took a very heavy hit. If the Bentsen proposal were ever enacted, the hit would be even greater -- and much of it would be on the middle class, the people he is allegedly trying to help.

What should we do in the short run? I still feel it would be desirable to have another down tick in interest rates at the Fed, even if that wouldn't expand loans a whole lot. Deflation is much more of a threat than inflation at the moment, especially in real

estate, and another move in monetary policy would help both investor and consumer psychology.

Second, it is important for you to continue to be visible on the domestic scene, as you have been recently. That alone gives a boost to consumer confidence. You don't have to resolve the economic ills of the nation overnight; no one expects that. But you must be perceived as being on top of the situation. We're making progress in that regard, but we're not there yet. That suggests constraining your international travel over the next few weeks as best you can, and I know all of you are assessing that.

Third, it is useful to have the country hear that the Administration is evaluating a potential economic growth package, irrespective of what ultimately emerges. My personal view is that the Democrats are unlikely to pass tax policy legislation acceptable to you, because they want an issue, not a positive legislative outcome in 1992. They believe that economic gloom and doom works to their advantage. I still believe we should take our case to the American public next year -- on a package including capital gains, IRAs, R&D credits, and perhaps a redesigned investment tax credit and/or depreciation provisions, with sufficient offsets that we do not breach the budget agreement. If properly crafted, I believe we can surface a package that will win that policy debate.

Fourth, we need to be as positive as we can, while retaining credibility, in statements emanating from both the Executive Branch and Republican Members of Congress. The Democrats are giving us a lot of talk about the cup being half empty; we need to counter with the cup being half full. For example, most of the world would envy a 6.8 percent unemployment rate. I was in Ireland a few weeks ago, and it is 20 percent there.

Fifth, Republican Members of Congress need to spend more time challenging the middle class populism and demagoguery that is emerging on the Democratic side of the aisle. They've been pretty quiet and we'll try to stimulate them. B. Jay Cooper of my staff has now begun to meet with the House Republicans on a weekly basis, but we may have to accelerate that.

Sixth, you may eventually need to jawbone bankers re passing the benefits of interest rate reductions on to their customers. I get lots of comments suggesting that is not now occurring.

Your speech today in the aftermath of the Thomas proceeding was excellent. I've been finding tremendous antipathy in the country to what transpired, and the Democratic Congressional leadership is paying a big price for that already. It has given a huge boost to the term limits movement, and is feeding the general anti-Congress mood as

well. We have had a substantial number of phone calls from Democrats wanting to switch parties after the Thomas hearings.

A close friend of mine in New York called yesterday to say that Cuomo is now clearly leaning toward a Presidential race. The economic situation apparently has persuaded him that he can at a minimum make a respectable showing, and perhaps win.

Finally, I know you had a tough day yesterday, so thanks for taking so much time at the President's Club dinner. The attendees were really appreciative.

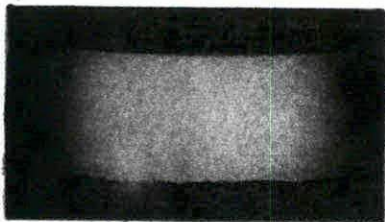
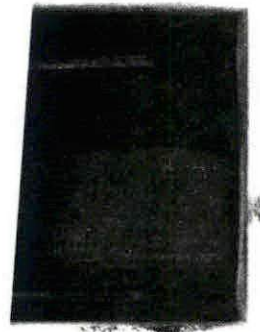

THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF AM. HISTORY
THURSDAY, OCTOBER 24, 1991

I am delighted to join you this morning. I would like to discuss two issues we all care about deeply: Public service and public faith in government.

Like many of you, I have devoted much of my adult life to public service. I, too, cherish public service as a special honor -- and personal obligation. My father served for years as moderator of a Connecticut town meeting, for instance. It convened once a month, and people talked about whatever concerned them -- as they always do at town meetings. It could be rowdy, or boring, but the meetings always gave the people a special sense that their opinions made a difference, and that they shared something special with their neighbors and friends. Those meetings impressed upon me what we mean when we talk of a government of the people, by the people, and for the people.

The notion of public service always has motivated Americans to be -- Americans. More than 150 years ago De Tocqueville noted with some astonishment more that "When an American needs the assistance of his fellows, it is very rare for that to be refused, and I have often seen it given spontaneously and eagerly." He did not mistake us for saints. He understood that freedom demands such service to others.

It also demands that public servants must lead by example. Americans will not tolerate hypocrisy. People in other countries wonder why we make such a fuss when our leaders violate our normal standards of behavior. The reason is simple: As

✓ Americans, we feel that we have a destiny to lead, to show the way by ideals -- not just to ourselves, but to the entire world.

✓ Yet while our government rests upon unchanging principle, it cannot rest upon past achievements. Government, like everything else, must evolve. Our long and sturdy tradition of tolerance enables us to test new ideas through public debate. When Congress considers issues, no one minds a tough, honest discussion. We expect it. By the same token, we want and expect our free press to look beneath events, take account of people's motives, and to ask tough questions rather than numbly repeating partisan propaganda or baseless rumor. We demand integrity in public behavior and discourse, and when we don't get it, we react angrily.

The recent hearings on Justice Thomas stirred that kind of anger. The American people saw some of the seamier sides of Washington life, and I'm not talking about the testimony. I'm talking about proceedings that degenerated into target practice against good men and women. Ronnie Perry of Brunswick, Georgia wrote me to say, "It is my fear that good, honest moral men and women in this country will no longer subject themselves to the ridicule that Judge Thomas had to face." Likewise, Anita Hill's backers might wonder how anyone might be expected to come forward

in the future if public officials cannot maintain proper confidentiality -- such as the confidentiality promised to Professor Hill. ~~Maybe these hearings up in these hearings that captivated them yet deeply offended~~

The bruising hearings showed what happens when political factions let agendas overwhelm a sense of personal decency. Some people have tried to drag public debate to a new low, searching openly for dirt -- any dirt -- without regard to people's rights to privacy, sometimes with less concern for the facts. While crusading pressure groups talk about their favorite issues, they forget that human beings sit beneath the glare of the spotlight, vulnerable to assault from all quarters. The pirhanna tactics of smearing the individual and ignoring the issue have no aim but to destroy lives and wreck reputations.

Many Americans, frankly, were stunned and repulsed when they saw the recent hearings. The scenes from the Senate bore little resemblance to the tidy legislative process we studied in school, and that we describe to our children. X-rated statements and cross-examinations pushed aside the soaps and Saturday cartoons. On television, the process seemed unreal -- more like a satire than like the government in which they take great pride; more like a burlesque show than civics class.

The hearings also showed that politicians must contend with a host of different forces and influences. The public saw outside pressure groups exhorting and twisting arms. The public saw Congressional staffs -- everywhere.

Congress is critical of the Executive Branch all the time so I hope it will be understood when I criticize Congress.

Not just children but others who might serve are turned off

I worry that the hearings sent our children this false message: If you want to make a difference, don't enter public service. Join a special interest group. That way, you can fight as hard as you want, ~~clean or dirty~~ without any responsibility for the results.

Now, I served in Congress and I know the incredible pressure and difficulty of working there. But public faith in Congress is absolutely vital for our form of government. I think we can all work to help Congress strengthen its image and build greater public support. Let me suggest several steps.

First, given the outrageous nature of the leaks and the Senate's announced intention of going after them, the Senate must determine who leaked the information -- and turned what should have been a confidential investigation into what many people who wrote me described as "a circus" and "a travesty."

Here's a proposal that I support: The Senate should ^{immediately} appoint an investigator to find out who leaked what, and for what reasons. The public cares very much about this case, ^{The investigation should focus on the case} and the investigator should receive unfettered access to all relevant records and witnesses, and the Senate ought to set a clear goal for finishing up the investigation. I suggest January 3, when it returns for a new session. (Subpoena powers)

Second, we must promote more tolerant, less viciously partisan debate. I have heard complaints that the White House does not consult sufficiently with Congress in matters of nominations.

Frankly, we have worked hard to cooperate with Congress and
we welcome closer consultation. Much of what I have to say today
has been sharpened by discussions with members of Congress. But
I will not surrender Presidential authority or powers any more
than Congress will surrender its power. ^{To sum it up} For instance, the Senate
has a duty to advise and consent in Presidential nominations, but
it has no right to select members of an administration. [[In any
event, no one ought to accept the charge of insufficient
consultation as an excuse for this unforgiveable leak.]]

Third, the hearings made it clear that we must redouble our
efforts to combat sexual harassment. On March 1 our
Administration submitted a civil rights bill that contains
language to strengthen penalties against sexual harassment.
Congress will act soon on a bill -- I hope by passing the
administration version. At the very least, I hope Congress will
pass the portions on which we have reached agreement.

But legislation alone can't solve the problem of sexual
harassment in the workplace. Sexual harassment is ugly,
^{obscene} ~~ridiculous~~ behavior. Together, we must eradicate prejudices --
not just through laws, but through simple respect for other human
beings. In the end, laws can punish prejudice, but they cannot
produce enlightenment. Only we can do that -- by acting on our
convictions.

The Thomas hearings also raised concerns about the
confirmation process generally. Let me offer several specific
recommendations for reforming that process.

First, shorten the time lapse between nominations and confirmation votes to six weeks. It takes four times as long to secure a vote today as it did just 30 years ago, during the presidency of John Kennedy. It took the Senate an average of 63 days to confirm our appointees sent up in 1989; 65 days for the group nominated in 1990. We now have a large group of people waiting for the Senate to vote on their nominations, and they have been waiting an average of 80 days.

At the beginning of this week, more than 150 nominations remained pending before the Senate. A few examples: I nominated Robert Clarke for reappointment as Comptroller of the Currency on January 23 -- more than nine months ago. I nominated Larry Lindsey for a seat on the Federal Reserve Board on February 28. In times of economic concern, we need the service of these men. If members of the Senate don't like my nominees, they should vote against them. But they should not stall progress by resorting to the old -- and obsolete -- technique of placing a hold on nominations.

We in the White House ^{must} ~~will~~ do our part. We will redouble our efforts to ensure that nominees complete all their required paperwork promptly, and will respond promptly to requests for further important information.

Second, we will work with committees in Congress to ensure the confidentiality of information. I suggest, for instance, that FBI agents carry FBI reports directly to committee chairmen and any members designated by the chairman, that the members of

Congress examine the documents in the presence of the agents, and that the agents return the information to FBI headquarters immediately after the elected officials have reviewed the documents. Committees ought to have access to summaries of investigations, but only on the grounds that ~~staff~~ members ^{only} see them. FBI reports and summaries should go only to members of Congress, not to staffs.

This preserves confidentiality. It protects nominees. It protects potential witnesses against the nominees. And it protects members of Congress.

Third, Congress should establish a mechanism for investigating congressional leaks thoroughly, professionally and promptly. I have met this week with Senate leaders from both parties. They agree that we must prevent future leaks, and establish a suitable mechanism for investigating them swiftly, and bringing culprits to justice.

Fourth, Congress ought to follow the same laws it imposes upon everyone else. At least 14 major laws apply to everyone -- the White House, the public, everyone -- except Congress. This includes the Equal Pay act of 1963. It includes Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 -- a title that prohibits sexual harassment, and discrimination on the basis of race, color, sex, religion and national origin. It includes the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990. The Fair Labor Standards Act. The Criminal Conflict of Interest provisions of supreme court statutes. Title Six of the Ethics in Government Act of 1978 --

Congress should not exempt itself from the very laws it writes for the nation. This practice shakes public confidence in government. It encourages special interest groups to press for reckless regulations, knowing that Congress might adopt them for everyone else ^{but not for Congress.} It creates the appearance and reality of a privileged class of rulers who stand above the law.

This violates our most cherished assumptions about our government. In the Federalist Papers, number 57, our founders asserted that elected officials "can make no law which will not have in full operation on themselves and their friends, as well as on the great mass of society." The writer of that paper also noted ominously, "If this spirit shall ever be so far debased as to tolerate a law not obligatory on the Legislature as well as on the people, the people will be prepared to tolerate anything but liberty."

Well, the people have begun to speak. They hear about bounced checks; they watch saucy hearings -- and they get angry. Americans expect better of themselves and their leaders.

Today I call upon Congress to take a simple step toward increasing public confidence: submit to each and every law it has imposed upon everyone else, and do so by the year's end. Sen. Charles Grassley has insisted that any new civil rights bill apply to Congress, and I support that move. But Congress also

must submit to the laws that it has imposed upon the executive and judicial branches of government.

And all of us should demonstrate our commitment to clean and effective government. From the very start of my Administration, I made it absolutely clear that I expect my appointees to follow strict standards of propriety, so the American people would have full confidence in our ability and integrity.

I established a Commission on Federal Ethics Law Reform in January, 1989. I pushed for initiatives that resulted in the Ethics Reform Act of 1989. I signed an Executive Order in April 1989 setting forth the principles of ethical government service. I charged the Office of Government Ethics with issuing a "single, comprehensive and clear set" of "objective, reasonable and enforceable" standards. Those standards will be ready soon.

In the Executive departments and the White House we strive to set and meet high standards of public service, and we invite Congress to do the same. Sometimes we protest too much, and reform too little. Now is the time to act.

Finally, we all must remember that our business is to do the public's business. That becomes increasingly difficult for a Congress that contains more than 300 committees and subcommittees, and makes use of nearly 40,000 workers.

It becomes increasingly difficult for a Congress that answers to no one with respect to its budget, its staff, its perks, even the enforcement of its own rules.

The business of doing the people's business gets even more difficult when committees make broad and unfocused demands. For example, the Judiciary Committee asked Clarence Thomas to submit more than 32,000 pages of documentation prior to his hearings. A defense bill routinely runs a gamut of committees and subcommittees.

I support the efforts of Sens. Boren and DeConcini, and Representatives Hamilton and Gradison to trim this overgrown thicket of committees and subcommittees. Senator Boren framed the matter when he said, "No one doubts that Congress is in trouble as an institution. In poll after poll, Americans describe Congress as inefficient, unresponsive, wasteful and compromised by the way it finances its campaigns. It's time for Congress to take another look at itself. It's time to go beyond piecemeal efforts and to enact comprehensive, bicameral reforms."

I support the efforts of the Congressional reformers. A system originally designed to help Congress do the public's business has turned into a machine so complex and bewildering that the public doesn't understand it. Many members of Congress do not fully understand it. Only specialists and lobbyists can pick their way through the labyrinth.

The American people want more. They want a government that will foster economic growth, fight crime and drugs, work to improve schools, build better roads, and answer to the people's concerns. They want a government that listens, not one that commands.

In the end, taxpayers won't be impressed with reforms if members of Congress pay greater heed to Beltway lobbyists and pressure groups than to constituents. If people feel powerless, they will find ways to recover their just powers.

Our founders handed down to us the finest system of government in history, one in which the legislature and executive do battle as part of our system of checks and balances. But we must remember who is servant and who is master. Noah Webster asked in 1802: "If all officers of government are the servants of the people, how can it be expected that the masters should not, at times, take the government out of the hands of the servants."

The reforms I've proposed today will help us do the people's business. They will rein in a government that seems distant and complex; they will bring it back to the people, and give citizens the feeling of power that we felt at those town meetings long ago. We must remember: We come here to serve. A few simple reforms can go a long way toward building the public faith upon which our entire democracy depends.

Dear Mr. President:

It was with pride and pleasure that I heard your remarks this morning as you signed the Executive Order on Civil Justice Reform. It was most appropriate for you to note that this is far less a problem about lawyers than it is a grass roots problem involving competitiveness, new products and, most of all, employment.

This was brought home to me profoundly last week when I was in London debating law reform and meeting with people who are affected internationally by the American legal system. It is clear, for example, that the reinsurance industry upon which American business depends for large case coverage has been substantially threatened by the randomness and unpredictability of our litigation. Where once contract was the ending point of a dispute, now it is just the beginning. And the problem is showing up on the bottom line.

Your Hulk Hogan story also put me in mind of the comment of the English author and barrister, John Mortimer, who observed that his father had told him that "if someone tries to steal your watch, fight him for it and knock him down. But if he threatens to sue you for your watch give it to him immediately and count yourself lucky to have got out of a dangerous situation so cheaply.

SUBJECT: "The Bush Record"

We see no legal objection to the "Bush Record" project described in your memorandum of September 25. To the contrary, the President has a duty under the Presidential Records Act to "take all such steps as may be necessary to assure that the activities, deliberations, decisions, and policies that reflect the performance of his . . . official or ceremonial duties are adequately documented." 44 U.S.C. 2203. The project you describe would be one means of discharging this statutory obligation. On its face, therefore, the project has an obvious official purpose.

Your memorandum also suggests an additional and equally sound official purpose: enabling Administration officials, acting in their official capacities, to explain to the public what the Administration has done and is doing on a number of different fronts. That is why, as you indicate, the document is to be distributed to "Administration spokespersons and members of the White House staff."

The only potential difficulty arises from the perception that such a document might have some utility in the President's re-election campaign. If, for example, the document were used in the campaign as a "source book," critics could charge that the document had a political rather than an official purpose ab initio. As you know, our long-standing interpretation of 31 U.S.C. 1301(a) prohibits the use of appropriated funds for purely political purposes. And the Hatch Act prohibits most federal employees from drafting campaign materials, even if appropriated funds are not used. See 5 U.S.C. 7323, 7324.

As a technical legal matter, we do not believe that incidental use by the campaign of a document prepared originally for a valid, official purpose would retroactively render the project (including participation by "hatched" employees) illegal. However, we believe all reasonable efforts should be made to avoid the perception of a violation. Such efforts would include, among other things, appropriate limits on distribution.

We would be happy to consult with you and your staff on these matters as the project proceeds.

The President today named the Bone Marrow Transplant Volunteers of the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC), of Omaha, Nebraska, as the 597th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. The volunteers provide support and companionship to bone marrow transplant patients and their families.

In 1985, a member of the Faith Christian Church recognized the need for a support program for bone marrow transplant patients. Many of the transplant patients who come to UNMC travel far from their homes, often from other states, to receive treatment and are left without any means of traditional support. Also, due to the reduced capacity of the immune system during treatment, the patients must spend long periods of time in isolation. The church and UNMC worked together to establish the program in 1986. Since then, over 350 bone marrow transplant patients have been assisted, and currently 30 community members serve as volunteers.

In order to participate, volunteers must attend an eight hour training program. They study topics such as the bone marrow transplant process, listening skills, confidentiality, and the emotional impact of the treatment. The volunteers continue to meet every other month for support and additional training.

Volunteers commit to meeting one-to-one with patients at least twice a week to provide emotional support and friendship. They also assist the patients' families with transportation needs and diversionary activities. With the help of the volunteers, patients and families are able to successfully cope with the pressures of the risky and sometimes lengthy transplant process. In many cases, the relationships that are built last long after treatment has ended.

The President salutes the Bone Marrow Transplant Volunteers for their community service efforts and for demonstrating his belief that, "From now on in America, any definition of a successful life must include serving others."

EXECUTIVE ORDER ON CIVIL JUSTICE REFORM

The President today signed an Executive order to apply immediately the reforms proposed in the Council on Competitiveness report "Agenda for Civil Justice Reform in America" to civil litigation involving the United States Government. The Executive order requires agencies to implement discovery and expert witness reforms and to adopt the Fairness Rule (also known as the English Rule), whenever feasible. The Executive order also requires agencies to attempt to settle disputes prior to litigation, and to employ settlement and Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) techniques in order to avoid prolonged litigation.

In August 1991, the President's Council on Competitiveness recommended 50 specific changes to our current civil litigation system. These recommendations were aimed at achieving swifter justice and reducing the costs of litigation. The proposals facilitate more timely and efficient handling of civil cases.

This Executive Order on Civil Justice Reform seeks to produce a more fair American legal system by making Federal litigators a model for parties in the private sector involved in dispute resolution. Although the Executive order requires the Federal Government to implement many of these legal reforms unilaterally, the Administration expects this Executive order to be a catalyst for civil justice reform in the Congress, State legislatures, and the courts.

Background

The tremendous growth of civil litigation in the past 30 years, including litigation involving the United States Government, has overburdened the American court system. Excessive litigation imposes high costs on American individuals, small businesses, industry, professionals, and government at all levels. With 70 percent of the world's lawyers, it is not surprising that the number of lawsuits filed in the Federal courts each year has more than tripled in the last 30 years -- from approximately 80,000 in 1960 to more than 250,000 in 1988.

Excessive litigation puts America at a competitive disadvantage internationally and results in higher prices for American consumers for everything from household goods to medical treatment. Every year our legal system costs Americans, directly and indirectly, an estimated \$300 billion -- including wasted legal fees, court costs, and individual time and effort devoted to litigation.

Several current litigation practices add to these burdens and costs by prolonging the resolution of disputes, thus delaying just compensation and encouraging wasteful litigation. Although procedural changes alone cannot solve all of these problems, the excessive costs and long delays that have plagued our legal system may be reduced by encouraging voluntary dispute resolution, limiting unnecessary discovery, promoting judicious use of expert testimony and prudent use of sanctions, and where appropriate, modifying current fee arrangements.

Promoting Just and Efficient Civil Litigation

In order to promote more efficient litigation in actions involving the United States Government, the Executive order directs all Federal agencies with litigation authority to implement the following reforms:

- The Fairness Rule. Subject to appropriate legal authority, offer to adopt the Fairness Rule in contract disputes with the United States Government and in actions initiated by the United States, whereby the loser of the lawsuit pays an appropriate portion of the costs and fees incurred by the winner.
- Discovery Reform. Streamline and expedite discovery by offering to exchange core information with opposing parties, by eliminating needless discovery, and by discussing all discovery disputes with opposing counsel before seeking resolution in the courts.
- Expert Evidence Reform. Use expert testimony only if it is based on "widely accepted theories" and refrain from using contingency fees to compensate expert witnesses.
- Notice of Complaint. Where appropriate, notify parties whom the United States intends to sue, informing them of the nature of the dispute, before filing suit.
- Settlement Discussions. Attempt to resolve disputes by initiating settlement discussions.
- Alternative Dispute Resolution. Employ ADR techniques whenever appropriate.

Proposing Legislation and Regulations that Do Not Unduly Burden the Courts

The Executive order also contains provisions designed to reduce litigation caused by poorly drafted Federal legislation and regulations. Specifically:

- All legislation and regulations proposed by the Administration will be reviewed to eliminate drafting errors and to use clear and specific standards instead of more ambiguous general standards whenever practicable.
- All legislation and regulations will be reviewed against a "litigation checklist" of 15 specific issues (such as statutes of limitation, preemptive effect, retroactivity, etc.) that historically have led to needless litigation.
- Agencies proposing legislation and regulations must certify compliance with this checklist in their legislative submissions to the Office of Management and Budget.

Promoting Just and Efficient Administrative Adjudication

The Executive order also requires that, whenever reasonable and practicable, all agencies that adjudicate administrative claims employ more efficient case management procedures in administrative law proceedings.

Scope and Effective Date

This Executive order applies to civil matters only and is not intended to affect criminal matters. It shall become effective 90 days from the date of the President's signature, and will not apply to litigation commenced prior to the effective date.

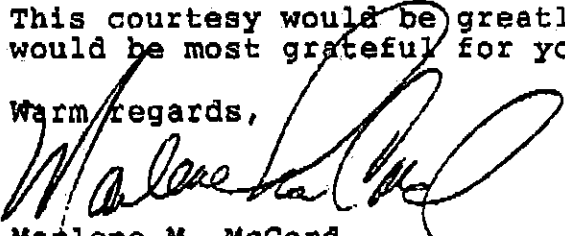

Martha Raye, 75, weds 42-year-old toy-boy in secret Vegas ceremony

Veteran funnypal Martha Raye eloped to Las Vegas to wed a 42-year-old man she's known less than two months — and shocked friends fear that her Svengali-like husband wants the 75-year-old star only for her money!

The lovable loudmouth comedienne and Polident spokeswoman — who's been wheelchair-bound with round-the-clock nurses since a stroke last year — traveled from her Bel-Air, Calif., home to Las Vegas

with new manager Mark Steven Harris without telling family or friends.

And on September 25 the two wed in a secret ceremony at the Golden Nugget Hotel. It was Martha's seventh trip down the aisle.

But within hours after the wedding, Martha collapsed, was rushed to the Desert Springs Hospital in Las Vegas and kept overnight.

Now her frantic daughter Melody is so concerned, she's seeing a lawyer to find out if the marriage can be annulled — and Martha's worried ex-agent Ruth Webb

has filed an emergency lawsuit to stop Harris from taking the entertainer's money!

When a friend told Melody, Martha's only daughter, about the wedding, Melody fumed: "My mother's not competent to get married. She's sick, stuck in a wheelchair — and doesn't know which day of the week it is. Frankly, I think she has Alzheimer's disease!"

"It looks like this guy is trying to rip her off. If my fears are confirmed, I think that this marriage should be annulled."

Added a pal: "Mark has cut off all her outside communication and her long-term friends are up in arms."

"In fact, Mickey Rooney has screamed that if someone doesn't call the FBI about this, he will!"

Martha — who has slurred speech and can't walk because of the stroke — was introduced to her groom about seven weeks ago by a mutual pal, say insiders. Within days, they were living together.

"Mark is a small-time producer and nobody, including Martha, knew much about him," revealed a source. "But she was lonely — and his attention was flattering."

"He tells her what to wear, who to speak with on the phone and what to do regarding her business affairs."

He's also handling her business and he canceled her scheduled appearance at a September 30 tribute to honor her for her 50 years in entertainment that included visits to troops during World War 2 and the Korean and Vietnam wars, say pals.

Ruth Webb, Martha's former agent and longtime

friend added, "Mark told me I was fired! I asked to speak to Martha, but he refused. I think this young man is exploiting this sick old lady."

"I've filed an emergency lawsuit through my attorney to prevent him from removing, spending or transferring any of Martha's assets until it can be determined if she is in control of her life. I don't believe she is — and

neither do a lot of her other friends."

On September 25, Mark took Martha to Las Vegas, where they got a marriage license from Beverly Swinn, deputy clerk at the Clark County Courthouse.

"Mark Harris filled out the application and explained that his bride was unable to walk," said Swinn. "I went with him to their limo. Mark kissed Martha during the signing of the license, then they drove off."

Later that day, Mark, who's Jewish, and Martha, a Christian, were married by a rabbi in a room at the Golden Nugget.

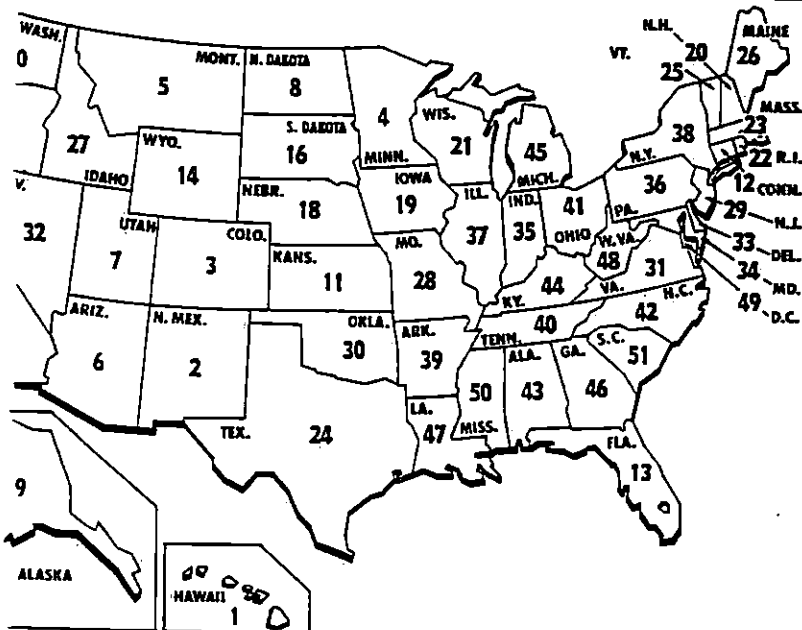

On behalf of President Bush, thank you for your message about the situation in Haiti. The President understands your concern, and he appreciates your suggestions.

The United States has strongly condemned the seizure of power by military forces in Haiti and has called for an immediate halt to the violence and for the restoration of the democratically elected government. President Bush, meeting with Haiti's President shortly after the coup, made it clear that the United States continues to recognize him as the duly elected President of his country. The Administration fully supports, and is complying with, the resolutions that were passed by the Organization of American States (OAS) in the wake of the coup, which recommended that all members suspend their economic, financial, and commercial ties with Haiti.

The Administration not only views the overthrow of the Aristide government as illegal, but also believes that it will not succeed. You can be sure that the United States will continue to work with the OAS in an effort to bring about the restoration of democracy in Haiti.

I will make every effort to complete the memorandum by the end of this week. I will probably retitle it a memorandum to the Director of White House gifts.

Conditions governing loan

1. **Preservation.** It is understood that property loaned pursuant to this agreement shall remain in the condition in which it is received. It shall not be altered, cleaned or repaired except with written permission of the National Archives. Should loss, damage, or deterioration be discovered, the National Archives should be notified immediately, followed by a written report and photographs, if requested. No conservation may be undertaken without express permission.

2. **Security.** Property shall at all times be given proper care to insure them against loss, damage or deterioration. Objects must be maintained in a fire-proof building under 24-hour security. The borrower must undertake to maintain constant and adequate protection of the property from: fire; exposure to extreme or deteriorating light; extreme or unusual temperatures and humidity; insects, vermin, and dirt; theft; and mishandling or handling by unauthorized or inexperienced persons or by the public. Property shall not be loaned or moved from the location specified on this form without express approval of the National Archives, in consultation with the Director of the White House Gift Office.

3. **Insurance.** Borrower is to insure this property under an all-risk, wall-to-wall policy during the period of this loan for the value stated on the front of this form. The borrower must furnish a certificate of insurance or a copy of the policy made out in favor of the National Archives and Records Administration, and, in the case of Presidential property, in favor of the President, before the property may be shipped to the borrower. Insurance may be waived for U.S. Government agencies, but such agencies shall be responsible for the cost of repair of any object damaged during the period of the loan.

4. **Shipping.** Shipping and handling arrangements for this property must be approved in advance by the Director of the White House Gift Office. Repacking must be done with either original

or similar materials and by the same methods as the objects were received. The borrower agrees to pay all costs for the packing, shipping and handling of this property.

5. **Photography.** Unless otherwise noted in writing, photographing or filming of this property is prohibited, with the exceptions of photographs for official registrarial purposes and candid photographs for news media concerned directly with exhibition publicity. Photographic materials obtained from the National Archives and Records Administration or White House Gift Office are restricted to use in **non-commercial** publications and publicity directly associated with the exhibition. Examples or copies of all materials in which such photographs are reproduced shall be provided to the White House Gift Office without charge.

6. **Return.** Property must be returned in satisfactory condition by the stated termination date, unless because of irreparable damage or loss, the Federal Government receives the insurance value thereof. Any extension of this loan must be approved in writing, and be accompanied by an extension of insurance coverage. The National Archives retains the discretion to recall objects from loan at any time and will make every effort to give reasonable notice.

Special conditions

It is expressly understood by the borrower that the property loaned under this agreement is and remains throughout this agreement **Presidential property**/the property of the United States, intended for future disposition and use by the National Archives and Records Administration at the George Bush Presidential Library. SUBJECT: Disposition¹ of Gifts to the President

1. Domestic gifts to the President are considered to be the personal property of the President, subject to his use and disposition, unless declined or accepted on behalf of the United States. Unless (1) declined and returned, (2) given to Archives for the Bush Presidential Library, or (3) given to GSA for disposition, a gift accepted by the President is subject to the reporting requirements of the Ethics in Government Act, as amended.
2. Foreign gifts to the President of more than minimal value (currently \$200) are automatically deemed property of the United States and may be temporarily retained by the White House for "official use," or turned over to GSA for disposal. Foreign gifts turned over to GSA for disposal may be purchased personally by the President, consistent with 41 C.F.R. Part 101-49. Foreign gifts valued at \$200 or less may be personally retained by the President if "tendered and received as a souvenir or mark of courtesy," and disposed of as he sees fit, or they may be treated as Government property and temporarily retained for official use, given to Archives, or turned over to GSA for disposal.
3. The President, like all other Federal employees, has inherent authority to accept gifts on behalf of the United States. When a gift of personalty is accepted on behalf of the United States, it becomes property of the Federal government, and is not subject to the reporting requirements. The White House has no general gift acceptance authority. But a gift of "furniture" or "furnishings" may be accepted for use in the White House under the National Park Service's gift acceptance authority, 3 U.S.C. 110, and gifts of food, beverages or flowers may be accepted for use in the White House Mess under the Navy's gift acceptance authority. All other gifts accepted on behalf of the United States must be turned over to Archives for the Bush Library (44 U.S.C. 2111-

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2112), to GSA for disposition (40 U.S.C. 484-486),² or to the Secret Service for destruction.

4. Under an agreement between the White House and GSA, gifts to the President that are accepted on behalf of the United States and not given to Archives need not be sent to GSA for disposal but may be transferred from the White House Gift Office to another agency (e.g., National Park Service, Secret Service, Camp David, White House Communications Agency) as an official Government transfer, using SF 122 and SF 120.³

5. Gifts of personalty to the President will seldom fall within the definition of "Presidential records" as that term is used in 44 U.S.C. 2201. Although "Presidential records" means "documentary materials," which is in turn defined to include "works of art, models, pictures, photographs, maps, films, and motion pictures," such materials are "Presidential records" only if received "in the course of conducting activities which relate to or have an effect upon the carrying out of the . . . duties of the President."

6. If a gift to the President is considered "historical material" as that term is defined in the Presidential Libraries Act, 44 U.S.C. 2101(2), then that gift may be "accepted for deposit" by the Archives if the Archivist determines that it is in the public interest to do so. The White House Gift Office considers "Archivable" personalty given to the President if the property relates to a Presidential trip or event or issue handled by or of interest to the Administration, or the property is of personal interest to the President. Property accepted by the Archivist for use in a Presidential Library is initially considered Presidential property, and not property of the United States at the time the Archives accepts the property "for deposit." The property is later transferred to the Presidential Library.

7. Gifts to the President that are sent to the Archives are "deposited" with the Archives under an implicit deposit agreement, and remain Presidential property until either a deed

²Gifts of cash must be sent to the Treasury. As a matter of White House policy, gifts of cash are declined and returned to the donor.

³This agreement apparently has not been reduced to writing. It is unclear whether the agreement permits the White House to transfer property to an agency without its own specific gift acceptance authority.

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of gift is executed, or the President elects to accept the property on behalf of the United States for donation to the Archives and eventual use by the Library. Deposit agreements provide that materials remain the property of the President but with the clear intent that title to the property will be conveyed to the United States at the President's future convenience, i.e., by a deed of gift.

8. The wholesale transfer to the Archives of the gifts to the President is accomplished by a deed of gift, executed by the President. A deed of gift historically has been executed at or after the conclusion of an Administration, and covers all property intended to go to the Presidential Library.

9. The transfer to Archives of individual gifts to the President may be accomplished before the end of the Administration by an election made by the President no later than March 15 of the year following the year receipt of the gift. Gifts to the President that are deposited with the Archives for later display in the Presidential Library are considered to be Government property at the time of the President's decision to accept them on behalf of the United States for donation to the Archives. Gifts received by the President in a calendar year and neither deeded to Archives nor formally accepted on behalf of the United States and given to Archives by May 15 of the following year are subject to the reporting requirements under the Ethics in Government Act. Given the volume of gifts to the President, and the President's schedule, the President must be given a reasonable amount of time to determine whether to retain a gift or accept on behalf of the United States for later display in the Presidential Library.

10. As a practice, gifts to the President under the reporting threshold are retained by the President, who may use or dispose of this property as he sees fit. The President may retain the gift and keep it at the end of his Administration, or give it to Archives at any time for later display in the Presidential Library, or give it to charity or to any other person. Gifts over the reporting threshold are usually deposited with Archives, to be accepted on behalf of the United States and later transferred to the Presidential Library, or in some cases transferred to another agency by an official government transfer. In some cases, a domestic gift over the reporting threshold is retained by the President and subject to the reporting requirements.

11. Where the President accepts a gift personally, he may display it in the White House or give it or loan it to any other person or entity. Where the President accepts a gift on behalf of the United States, the property may be displayed at the White

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House (or Camp David or Kennebunkport or private museums) only temporarily and only with the approval of the Archives (because the White House does not have gift acceptance authority). As a technical matter, the gift is Government property, and not Presidential or White House property. Where a gift has been deposited with the Archives but has not yet been accepted on behalf of the United States, the property remains Presidential property and may be loaned at the discretion of the President. As a practical matter, regardless of whether title to the property rests with the President or the United States, the Archives is simply a custodian of the gift until its transfer to the Presidential Library, and so the Archives will agree to any White House request to retrieve a gift for display in the White House or other location. However, a gift accepted by the President on behalf of the United States may not thereafter be returned to the President and considered to be President's personal property.

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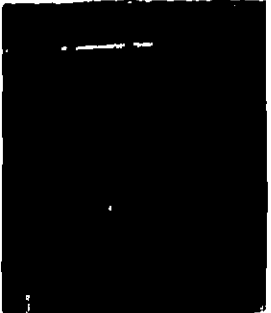

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

On Tuesday the House passed a number of bills including H.R. 1297, the Clean Vessel Act of 1991, which requires states to use a portion of federal sport fishing funds to improve port access.

On Wednesday the House began two days of debate on H.R. 3371, the Omnibus Crime Control Act of 1991. The attempt to defeat the rule, which Republicans opposed because it split Representative Henry Hyde's (R-IL) habeas corpus amendment into three separate votes, failed by a vote of 233 to 192. Representative George Gekas' (R-PA) amendment, which strengthened the death penalty language in the bill by substituting the death penalty language from your crime bill, passed by a vote of 213 to 206.

On Thursday the House defeated the Hyde amendment, which incorporated your habeas corpus reforms, by a vote of 208 to 218. Although the Republicans held firm, over seventy Democrats who supported this amendment last year, voted against it this year. The House also passed an amendment offered by Representatives Harold Volkmer (D-MO) and James Sensenbrenner (R-WI) which struck the assault weapons prohibitions from the bill, by a vote of 247 to 177. Finally, the House passed Representative Bill McCollum's (R-FL) amendment, which includes your exclusionary rule reforms, by a vote of 247 to 165.

SENATE

On Tuesday the Senate confirmed Clarence Thomas to be an Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court by a vote of 52 to 48. Of the 13 Democrats who expressed support for Judge Thomas before the vote was delayed, only three changed their votes to oppose the nomination: Richard H. Bryan (D-NV), Harry Reid (D-NV) and Joseph Lieberman (D-CT).
