Speaker Foley's Remarks On "Meet The Press"

This memorandum responds to three allegations made by Speaker Foley on last Sunday's Meet the Press regarding the application of certain statutes to the White House and Congress. (In so doing, it also discusses the application of the new civil rights bill to the Executive Office of the President, which you asked about in a recent note.) Foley's assertions are for the most part flatly incorrect or misleading.

1. Referring to the Ethics Reform Act of 1989, Foley asserted that you had asked for an exemption for yourself and the Vice President "from post-employment lobbying restrictions that apply to every member of Congress." Neither you nor your staff ever asked for an exemption for the Vice President, and the Vice President is covered by the same post-employment restrictions as apply to Members of Congress.

Both my staff and the Office of Government Ethics, however, did object to a provision of the Senate's initial draft extending those provisions to the President on the ground that subjecting former Presidents to a cooling off period would have a chilling effect on important communications of former Presidents and subsequent Presidents and senior Administration officials. This rationale was never challenged by any Member of Congress, and the President was accordingly excluded. Given that most Presidents have retired from active employment after leaving the Presidency, it is preposterous for Foley to suggest that former Presidents should be subjected to a risk of criminal liability for communicating with subsequent Administrations.

2. Foley also asserted that a number of the employment statutes you mentioned in your speech -- including the Rehabilitation Act, the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Equal Pay Act (which is part of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA)), and the Americans with Disabilities Act -- "have been applied to the House of Representatives, in both their objectives and their terms." Foley was wrong for two reasons.

First, the House has never even pretended to apply the Civil Rights Act of 1964 or the Rehabilitation Act to itself (although it passed a resolution in 1988 urging Members to adhere to the substantive standards of those statutes). By contrast,

Congressional bodies have purported to apply other employee protection statutes to themselves. In 1989, for example, Congress purported to apply the FSLA to the House, although not to the Senate. See 2 U.S.C. 60k. In Section 509 of the ADA, Congress purported to apply the ADA to both chambers. The same section also purported to apply the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rehabilitation Act to the Senate, but not to the House. Foley is therefore clearly wrong as to these two statutes.

Second, even where Congress has purported to apply employee protection statutes to itself, each such effort has been a charade. As shown in the attached summary, none of the measures discussed above gives congressional employees any legally enforceable rights -- not even the right to go to court. Each measure leaves congressional employees entirely in the hands of congressionally-appointed panels: in the Senate, the Select Committee on Ethics; in the House, the House-appointed Office of Fair Employment Practices and a Members-only Review Panel.

Thus, the statement in your speech -- that "Congress does not have to comply" with these laws -- was absolutely correct. Because the measures purporting to apply various employee-protection laws to the House or Senate create no judicially enforceable rights, they do not require Congress to comply, as private employers and the Executive branch are required to do.

3. Finally, Foley suggested (without stating directly) that White House staff are exempt from some or all of these employee protection statutes. Others have made this argument explicitly.

With respect to most of the larger entities within the Executive Office of the President (OMB, NSC, USTR, etc.), Foley is simply wrong. These entities have always considered themselves covered by these statutes to the same extent as other Executive agencies. Moreover, the Senate last week rejected an Administration-supported amendment by Senator Nickles that would have placed all employees of all Executive agencies, as well as Congress, on the same footing as private-sector employees. Thus, to the extent there is any difference between private-sector employees and Executive branch employees (or Congressional employees), that is Congress' fault, not yours.

With respect to a small number of EOP entities (e.g., the White House Office and the Office of the Vice President) the coverage issue has never been resolved. In the broadest sense, this is now a moot point. As shown in the attached summary, the new civil rights legislation will extend these employee-protection statutes to all Executive Branch employees except those serving in the military, on advisory boards, or in positions requiring Senate confirmation.

In a narrower sense, the coverage of various EOP entities under existing law retains considerable importance, but only because of the Senate's failure to adopt the Nickles amendment. As a result of that failure, the civil rights bill effectively results in three "tiers" of coverage. Private-sector employees have the greatest protection, including jury trials and punitive damages. Executive branch employees who are covered under existing law have somewhat less protection -- in particular, no punitive damages. Employees of the Senate as well as any Presidential appointees (with the exceptions noted above) who are not already covered fall into a third tier. Employees in this group are not only barred from seeking punitive damages, but also are not entitled to jury trials and are limited to a restrictive form of judicial review that requires the court to accord a presumption of validity to a decisionmaking body internal to the Senate or Executive branch, as the case may be.

As an administrative matter, therefore, it will be important to determine which EOP employees are covered under existing law and which are covered only under the new legislation. Because the legal issues are complex, I recommend we ask the Justice Department for a formal opinion addressing the application of existing employee-protection statutes to the White House Office and other units of the EOP.

The important point, however, is that any difference among Executive branch employees is Congress' fault. Congress clearly did not want to give its own employees the same protections currently enjoyed by employees in the private sector and most Executive agencies. Accordingly, contrary to your own strong recommendation, Congress created a new, bottom-tier category into which it placed some Presidential appointees in addition to its own employees. These Presidential appointees thus became the "fig leaf" by which Congress has attempted to conceal its inequitable treatment of its own employees.

Congressional Coverage of Existing Employee Protection Laws

Senate

- o Section 509(a)(2) of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) states that the "rights and protections" of the ADA, the Civil Rights Acts of 1964 and 1990, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967 (ADEA), and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 "shall apply to employment by the United States Senate."
- o However, these "rights and protections" are eviscerated by two additional provisions. Section 509(a)(3) requires that all claims under these statutes be investigated and adjudicated by the Senate Select Committee on Ethics (pursuant to S. Res. 338, 88th Cong.). And Section 509(a)(7) provides that "enforcement and adjudication of the rights and protections" of these statutes "shall be within the exclusive jurisdiction of the United States Senate." Thus, there is no independent review of the Senate's enforcement -- i.e., no review by the EEOC or any other agency of the Executive Branch, and no judicial review.
- o Section 509(a) of the ADA does not mention the Fair Labor Standards Act (FSLA) (or the Equal Pay Act, which is part of the FSLA). We are aware of no other provision applying the FSLA to the Senate.

House of Representatives

- o Section 509(b)(2) of the ADA purports to extend the "rights and protections" of that Act to employees of the House. However, Section 509(b)(2)(B) provides that the exclusive "remedies and procedures" for enforcing it are those provided in the Fair Employment Practices Resolution (H. R. 558, 100th Cong.) (as continued in force by H.R. 15, 100th Cong.). This Resolution requires aggrieved parties to bring their claims before an Office of Fair Employment Practices that is entirely under the control of the House, with appeals to a Review Panel composed entirely of House Members. There is no judicial independent review.
- o Unlike Section 509(a), which applies to the Senate, Section 509(b) does not extend the ADEA, the Rehabilitation Act, or either of the Civil Rights Acts to the House. We are aware of no other provisions applying those laws to the House.
- o Congress recently purported to extend the FSLA (including provisions of the Equal Pay Act) to the House. However, the exclusive enforcement mechanism is the House-controlled Fair Employment Practices Resolution described above. See 2 U.S.C. 60k. Again, there is no independent review.

Coverage of Senate and EOP Employees Under Civil Rights Bill

Senate

- o The bill declares that personnel actions are to be taken without discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or disability.
- o Senators are specifically permitted to consider domicile, party affiliation, and "political compatibility."
- o Complaints will be handled by a new Senate bureaucracy, with review available by the Ethics Committee (at its discretion). The bill purports to offer Senate employees the same remedies that private plaintiffs can seek, although there is no provision for jury trials.
- o Aggrieved parties could ultimately seek review by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit. However, the court is to grant a presumption of validity to whatever decision was made internally in the Senate. (This scheme may be unconstitutional.) Judicial review is therefore considerably narrower than in actions brought by employees of private-sector firms or Executive branch agencies.
- o Senators must reimburse the Government for any payments (apparently including the plaintiff's attorney fees) arising from unfair employment practices they commit.

Presidential Appointees

- o Except for members of the uniformed services and advisory committees, and positions requiring Senate confirmation, the bill extends protections against discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, and disability to every Executive branch employee who is not already entitled to bring an action under the relevant statutes.
- o The President will be responsible for assigning some entity (such as the EEOC) to adjudicate complaints for employees covered by the new statute. Judicial review will be available in the Federal Circuit, just as for Senate employees, and is similarly limited in scope.
- o Like Senators, the President must pay from his own pocket any judgments (probably including attorney fees) arising from unfair employment practices he commits.
- o In summary, the scheme the Senate has proposed for itself is a sham. The scheme it has proposed for Presidential appointees may not be, depending upon the body the President selects to adjudicate claims.

ECONOMY/PRESIDENT (New York/Gene Gibbons, Reuter) --- President Bush blamed Democrats who control Congress for America's economic problems, claiming they have buried his proposals for growth in a "liberal limbo." In a hard-hitting speech to a Republican luncheon that raised \$2.2 million for his re-election-year campaign, Bush also restated his opposition to an election-year tax cut to stimulate the economy. He called it a "phony action" that may or may not help the economy but would likely increase the U.S. budget deficit and raise interest rates. "This isn't a country that needs a quick fix. We need some confidence," he said. "We don't have to think that we can just spend our way into getting votes."
ECONOMY/PRESIDENT (New York/Rita Beamish, AP) --- President Bush, saying signals are mixed on the health of the U.S. economy, called today for banks and other financial institutions to lower interest rates on consumer credit cards. Speaking at a fundraising luncheon, Bush said his proposals had been "mugged by party leadership locked in the tired old liberal mindset and determined to go one up politically." He said that, despite low growth figures, inflation was low and most interest rates were low now compared to recent history. "I'm convinced we'll see these low rates kick in and boost this sagging consumer confidence," he said.
ECONOMY/PRESIDENT (New York/Thomas Ferraro, UPI) --- President Bush, saying the signals on the economy are mixed, appealed to American banks to lower interest rates on credit cards for a necessary boost to consumer confidence. Bush also again ruled out suggestions for a tax cut aimed at middle-income earners, calling it a "euphoric gimmick" that may or may not have an effect on the economy. But...the President conceded Americans continued to feel the effects of the recession, despite meager third quarter growth... Economists said they doubted a reduction in credit card rates...would have any longterm effect on consumer confidence... In addition, Bush's call for lower credit card rates, if complied with, would only further drain banks... said Robert Dederick, chief economist for Northern Trust in Chicago.
ECONOMY/KENNEDY (Detroit/Reuter) --- Sen. Kennedy attacked President Bush for paying more attention to foreign policy than the economy, renewed his calls for a national health care policy and predicted a Democrat will be the next President. "A President must be more than a Secretary of State," he said in a speech at the AFL-CIO convention. "Foreign policy is important, but it's no excuse for neglecting the home front." "This do-nothing Republican Administration is going to be replaced by a do-something Democratic Administration, starting Inauguration Day in 1993," he predicted. "The economy is in trouble, and so is the Bush Administration."
DEMOCRATS' DEBATE (Detroit/AP) --- The six major 1992 Democratic presidential hopefuls staged their first debate, each portraying President Bush as indifferent to the recession and himself as the best hope for quick economic revival.... "The President of the United States just doesn't seem to understand that there is a life-and-death struggle going on in America today," Sen. Kerrey said in his opening statement.... Sen. Harkin denigrated Bush and also took a poke at Kerrey by reminding the union leaders [in the audience] that Kerrey voted for "fast-track." -more-

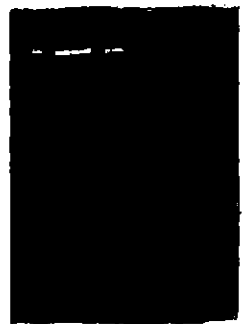

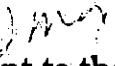

Subject: Correspondence Management System

As Phase I of the new Correspondence Management System installation is completed, I thought this would be a good point to advise you of our progress.

Phase I began on August 13 with the installation of the RISC 6000 and the running of cables to Mail Analysis. Training was conducted in Room 58 at the same time that new terminals were being installed throughout the Mail Analysis division. By the time I departed for vacation on September 12, Mail Analysis, Printing, and Typing divisions had been connected, trained, and were in production.

Upon my return on October 1, Phase I had progressed to include the Special Letters Response division (SLR). New PCs had been installed and training had been conducted within SLR. Although SLR was unable to print to the printers within their immediate office, they were able to send their work to the printers in Room 60. SLR did not get printer support until October 23, due to a two week delay waiting for a primary cable to be run into the building by C&P and waiting for some network connectors to be delivered. Once the cables were installed, the Director's office and Presidential Messages Division were quickly brought online. With the completion of the initial training in these offices, Phase I was completed.

Subject: Correspondence Management System

As with any installation of this size, problems did come up that caused delays. ISI, the primary contractor, did not fully appreciate the many different facets associated with doing the President's mail. They made changes to their software to correct problems "on the fly." For this reason, we felt it prudent to provide them some time between Phases I and II to properly correct their software and to ensure that the installed offices were comfortable with the new system. We are, therefore, continuing to install cable in the Phase II offices but we do not intend to begin bringing them online until January 6. We feel confident that this "settling period" will enable us to quickly integrate the remaining offices.

The Correspondence Department staff is pleased with the system, and I must tell you that we also have been very pleased with the work done by ISI. The patience and flexibility shown by their staff has made this transition extremely smooth for all the people involved. In addition, I would be remiss in not mentioning the work done by Bernie Silverstein. Bernie has done a yeoman job of managing this project from its inception about 18 months ago. We are indebted to him.

In closing, I would like to extend an invitation to you to see the system in operation since without your support, we never could have gotten this far. Informal liaison with your secretary indicates that 2pm on Tuesday, November 19 is available on your calendar. I sincerely hope you will allow us this opportunity to show you the Quorum system.

The purpose of this note is to provide a quick update on current strategy to deal with resurrection of the Energy Bill which failed the first cloture vote last week.

Our collective belief now is that going for a second cloture vote may give us the best hope of success. Before deciding, however, we must bring aboard about six Republican and six Democratic Senators. We believe this is possible provided we can work beforehand a variety of acceptable fixes to their concerns.

I have talked to Governor Sununu and he asked that we meet early next week and discuss our strategy in more detail. Shortly, thereafter, I would like to meet with you personally to provide my best last minute insights on next step. If our plan works, your support to encourage about six Republicans to come with us will be necessary. I understand, for example, you will be in St. Louis on Wednesday night doing a fundraiser for Kit Bond. Kit voted against us on the first round. Although we are working hard with Malcolm Wallop to turn him around, we will need your help.

Thanks for your continuing support and help for bringing the Energy Bill to legislative fruition.

Dear Mr. President:

Where the economy is concerned, you're getting best guesses from some and advice from all. So why should I be different?

The Department of Labor has just released our unemployment numbers. They're just marginally worse, but there's the potential of real trouble when you look further.

All of the job growth that occurred this summer when we talked about recovery is now gone. Manufacturing jobs are still in decline, and 10% of all construction jobs have been lost. The minimal growth in service jobs are in health care and social services, which is not encouraging either.

People are again talking about a double-dip. I think we never really came out of the recession are still in the trough. So, what to do? Of course the obvious. Alan Greenspan should do even more. He should be dropping the rates by more than picayune amounts. That change would be the fastest, best solution. So I called him to quietly rant (is that an oxymoronic phrase?)

We all must talk about your growth package. Every department can and should examine the danger of over-regulation. Adding costs to businesses and interfering with the market make little sense.

Life Magazine's survey showed 80% of Americans wanted changes to make saving easier. You're answering that with IRA changes. Businesses desperately need capital -- you're addressing that with capital gains and credit crunch abatement.

My department will be suggesting a worker training credit which fits into this general area and adds to your education push. It has a nice human quality, too. A training component gave something a real live working guy can feel might actually help him, or a divorced clerk can understand might make a difference.

But those actions, no matter how admirable are all in all, boring stuff, making Americans neither more confident nor more aware of how much you have done.

As you examine the categories that could lead us out of this stagnant time, it's clear the one based in either auto or real estate would be preferable for the quick action and for the broad group of Americans it could affect.

So I think it's time to look at a more direct injection in an area more unexpected and probably more contentious -- at least in the White House.

Why not a direct jolt in an area that could produce jobs, restore some confidence, and move where few would expect a Republican President to tread?

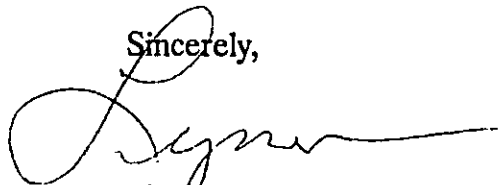
Why not a change in the code that would allow interest deduction up to 10,000 for the purchase of American cars? Such a change wouldn't just affect car-makers; it has implications for the millions of jobs that relate to the industry. It reaches into high paying blue and white collar areas and rewards production of tangible objects. It affects people not usually associated with us or our Party. It would have an enormous psychological effect.

I know; I know. I can hear the questions already. What about our allies? What about Japan in particular? What will it cost? Is this a step from free trade? Is there empirical evidence it would work?

Well, I don't have all the answers yet. But I'll quietly get them for you. If you want to dump the idea -- so be it. It certainly isn't a panacea; it might never pass. But it would certainly unnerve your critics and put to rest any idea that you don't care about the gut industries of America and that for you, this nation's economic welfare comes first.

I think an early foray into territory generally reserved for Democrats actually is part of a President Bush who always remains calm but is a very daring innovator.

We can expect the press to tie the President's reply to Baucus into the imminent conference on a conditional MFN bill for China as well as Secretary Baker's November 15-17 visit to China. We need to take the initiative in handling the media coverage of the President's reply to Baucus before critics of the Administration's China policy set the parameters for us of the discussion of this issue. Our policy is gaining support and we should make it easier for people to know what we are doing.

We would like to ensure that when the President's reply is sent, NSC and State officials provide simultaneous background interviews to the press, to be followed by release of the attached press release.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESS SECRETARY

The President today forwarded a reply to Senator Max Baucus' letter of September 24 concerning policy toward China, especially trade, prison labor exports, and Taiwan's GATT application. In his reply, the President stressed that the Congress and the Administration share objectives concerning our bilateral agenda with China. During their earlier exchange of views, the President and Senator Baucus agreed that we should cooperate with the Chinese where that is possible and at the same time we should promote American interests with the application of selective policy measures, such as Section 301 of the Trade Act, when necessary.

Our policy toward China seeks to promote political and economic reform and the advancement of human rights through a balanced mix of engagement and sanction. We favor unconditional renewal of Most Favored Nation (MFN) status for China because it serves clear U.S. interests and benefits the people of China and Hong Kong. Extension of MFN to China does not imply acquiescence to political repression or human rights violations. The sanctions we have imposed on China in selected areas clearly indicate our relationship with the authorities in Beijing is other than normal and promote our interest in human rights, nonproliferation, and free and fair trade.

Points to Make with the Press

- The President has recently responded to Senator Baucus' September 24 letter concerning the Administration's policy toward China.
- The President's message to Senator Baucus was that we are taking a very rational, business-like approach to the implementation of China policy.
- Secretary Baker will carry the same message to the Chinese government during his November 15-17 visit to Beijing. That visit is designed to engage the Chinese in a frank and coolly rational discussion of important objectives on our bilateral and multilateral agendas. Secretary Baker will pull no punches while in Beijing, but he will at the same time try to elicit movement on the Chinese side. We do not expect a sudden transformation of the Chinese position; rather, we hope to see gradual improvement in China's policies.
- We have told Congress, and Baker will explain to the Chinese, that where we can cooperate with the Chinese we are doing so:
 - in Middle East arms control talks;
 - in Geneva where we and the Chinese are participants in continuing work on a chemical weapons convention;

- in the Perm Five context with respect to UN nuclear inspections in and continued sanctions against Iraq; in reaching and implementing a comprehensive political resolution of the Cambodian problem; and in China's assistance in the smooth entry of North and South Korea into the UN;
- in efforts to stem illegal narcotics trafficking;
- and in scientific areas where there are clear American and international benefits, such as our Environmental Protection Agency's activities in the PRC.
- Where cooperation is not possible because of differences in our approaches to certain issues, we have not hesitated to press vigorously in selected target areas.
- Again, these will be points that Secretary Baker will convey in Beijing. For example:
 - On October 10 we self-initiated a 301 trade investigation designed to eliminate or substantially reduce Chinese market barriers. In our negotiations with the Chinese on market access issues, we are pressing for trade reforms aimed at protecting American commercial interests and encouraging changes that will lead to a Chinese economy compatible with the GATT.
 - On human rights, our sanctions imposed after the Tiananmen massacre in June 1989 remain substantially in place. These will remain in place until there is

positive action on the Chinese side to allay U.S. and other nations' human rights concerns.

- We have pressed for improvements in the situation in China both in general terms and in specific cases. Wang Juntao and Chen Ziming received improved treatment as a direct result of U.S. and other Western support for their cases, for example.
- We will continue to press for advances in individual cases. Moreover, we are seeking exchange of views through a variety of fora to underscore our different approaches to human rights issues and focus on areas where we can bridge the gap between us. The recent Chinese government white paper on human rights issues--without reference to the specifics it contains--is a step forward toward meaningful exchange of views between Chinese and Western interlocutors. We want to continue and deepen a dialogue on human rights issues with the Chinese.
- Naturally, we will continue to monitor the human rights situation in China, and will publish a straight-forward, objective account of the human rights situation in the PRC in our annual human rights report to Congress.

- On the more specific human rights issue of prison labor, China's stated national policies are positive and constructive, but we are not confident of uniform implementation of those policies. We are negotiating a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Chinese that should help us to more effectively follow-up on leads regarding possible prison labor exports to the U.S. Our Customs Office in Hong Kong is prepared to engage with the Chinese as soon as an MOU is finalized.
- Meanwhile, we are enforcing the law by doing our utmost to prevent prison labor exports from the PRC. On October 4 the Customs Service issued orders to detain any shipments of certain Chinese merchandise (wrenches and steel pipe) we believe may be produced by prison labor in China.
- It is difficult to track shipments of merchandise after they have been exported from China. We need the cooperation of authorities in the PRC and our own business people to eliminate prison labor exports at their source. The MOU we are negotiating gets at the PRC side of the equation. In order to raise the level of awareness about this problem in the trade community and among the American public, the Commissioner of the Customs Service held a public hearing on November 1 in Washington.

- Another issue the President and Senator Baucus have exchanged views on is Taiwan's application to the GATT. In his recent letter, the President assured Senator Baucus that we are working actively with other GATT contracting parties to resolve the issues relating to Taiwan's application for GATT accession.
- The point is that the Administration and Congress share objectives in our human rights, nonproliferation, and trade agendas with China. We need to engage the Chinese to advance our goals in these areas, and we intend to continue to do so in the manner we have thus far; with no illusions, with no hesitation to use the policy tools available to us, and with a strict sense of US interests and priorities.
- This is the message Secretary Baker will leave with his interlocutors in Beijing: We invite the Chinese to take positive steps that will lead to better relations and a more secure regional and international environment. We cannot make Beijing's decision for it, but we encourage it to take concrete steps to improve its record on these issues and thereby narrow its differences with the U.S. and other countries.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESS SECRETARY

Today we celebrate with the people and the Government of Kuwait as they complete a major step along the road to recovery. The extinguishing of the last of Kuwait's burning oil wells represents a remarkable achievement. In less than nine months, a unique international coalition capped nearly 700 wells, reversing Saddam's cruel efforts to achieve with sabotage what he could not do with his military -- the destruction of Iraq's peaceful neighbor and the fouling of an entire region in an act of mass ecological terrorism.

Upon the liberation of Kuwait last March, the President directed U.S. agencies to come to Kuwait's assistance in tackling the disaster perpetrated by Saddam's retreating army. 752 of the country's 1037 oil wells had been damaged and 610 were burning. Working closely with the Government of Kuwait, the United States lent vital support in engineering, transport and other areas -- support which was critical to the success in extinguishing the blazing wells. We are delighted to have been partners in every phase of the firefighting effort. We are particularly proud that three of the first four teams on the ground in March were American. It was these teams that laid the groundwork for the success that followed. American teams capped over half of the damaged wells in the effort that grew eventually to include firefighters from 28 countries.

We share Kuwait's joy and salute the brave men and women who met this historic challenge. We support Kuwait's demand for just compensation by Iraq for these and other war-related damages and we remain determined to stand with Kuwait and others against Saddam and his policies.

SUBJECT: Letter to FEC for POTUS Signature

On Thursday, October 31, 1991, the Federal Election Commission informed Bush-Quayle '92 of a change in the matching funds submissions filing schedule.

Previously, the FEC had notified Bush-Quayle '92 that the tentative first filing due date for a matching funds submission would be December 7, 1991. However, under the new schedule the campaign received from the FEC on October 31, 1991, the deadline for filing the qualifying, threshold matching funds submission is now Friday morning, November 8, 1991. The new deadline for filing the first regular matching funds submission has been changed to December 2, 1991.

Attached please find the form letter required by the FEC. This letter must accompany the qualifying, threshold matching funds submission. Without filing both the letter and threshold submission by Friday, November 8, 1991, the campaign will not be permitted to file its first regular matching funds submission on December 2, 1991, and would not be eligible for a matching funds payment in January, 1992.

This form letter is in accordance with the letter which then Vice President Bush filed with the FEC in 1987, and which President Reagan filed in 1984. Copies of both of these letters are attached. Please note that when then Vice President Bush submitted the letter and threshold filing on May 23, 1987, he was not a declared candidate for President, and did not declare his candidacy until September, 1987.

There was discussion at the time of the May 23, 1987 filing regarding the language of this letter. However, it was determined not to be problem, since the language is mandated by FEC regulations.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

As a candidate seeking to become eligible to receive Presidential primary matching funds, I certify and agree to the following provisions:

- I. I am seeking the nomination of the Republican Party for election to the Office of the President in more than one State. I and/or my authorized committee, Bush-Quayle '92 - Primary, Inc., have received matchable contributions which in the aggregate exceed \$5,000 from residents of each of at least twenty States which, with respect to any one person, do not exceed \$250.00.
- II. I and/or my authorized committee have not incurred and will not incur qualified campaign expenses in excess of the expenditure limitations prescribed in 26 U.S.C. Sec. 9035 and 11 C.F.R. Part 9035.
- III. I acknowledge that I have the burden of proving that disbursements made by me, and my authorized committee or agents are qualified campaign expenses as defined at 11 C.F.R. 9032.9.
- IV. I and my authorized committee will comply with the documentation requirements set forth in 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.11.
- V. Upon request of the Commission, I will supply an explanation of the connection between any disbursement made by me or my authorized committee and the campaign as prescribed by 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.1(b)(3).
- VI. In accordance with 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.1(b)(4), I and my authorized committee agree to keep and furnish to the Commission all documentation for matching fund submissions, any books, records (including bank records for all accounts), and supporting documentation and other information that the Commission may request.

- VII. As provided at 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.1(b)(5), I and my authorized committee agree to keep and furnish to the Commission all documentation relating to disbursements and receipts including any books, records (including bank records for all accounts), all documentation required by this section including those required to be maintained under 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.11, and other information that the Commission may request. The records provided for the post-primary audit shall also include production of magnetic computer tapes containing all information required to be maintained on my authorized committee receipts and disbursements, if my authorized committee maintains its records on computer. Upon request by the Commission, documentation explaining the computer software capabilities shall also be provided, and such personnel as are necessary to explain the operation of the computer system's software and the computerized information prepared or maintained by the committee shall also be made available. The production of all computerized information shall be in conformance with 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.12.
- VIII. I and my authorized committee will obtain and furnish to the Commission upon request all documentation relating to funds received and disbursements made on my behalf by other political committees and organizations associated with me.
- IX. In accordance with 26 U.S.C. Sec. 9038 and 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.1(b)(7), I and my authorized committee shall permit an audit and examination pursuant to 11 C.F.R. Part 9038 of all receipts and disbursements, including those made by me, my authorized committee, and any agent or person authorized to make expenditures on my behalf or on behalf of my authorized committee. I and my authorized committee shall facilitate the audit by making available in one central location, office space, records, and such personnel as are necessary to conduct the audit and examination, and shall pay any amounts required to be repaid under 11 C.F.R. Parts 9038 and 9039.
- X. Pursuant to 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.1(b)(8), the person listed below is entitled to receive matching fund payments on my behalf which will be deposited into the listed depositories which I have designated as the campaign depositories. Any change in the information required by this paragraph shall not be effective until submitted to the Commission in a letter signed by me or the Treasurer of my authorized principal campaign committee.

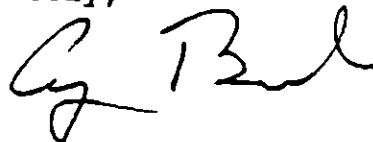

THE BUSH ADMINISTRATION DOMESTIC AGENDA

President Bush is determined to pursue domestic and economic policies that ensure that America remains strong and fiscally sound and that unleash the creative powers of the marketplace. He understands that people like you want Congress and the Executive Branch to produce results in meeting the challenges before us. His domestic agenda includes innovative programs to fight drugs and crime, to strengthen the power of and expand opportunities for individuals, to enhance protection of our environment, to provide quality education for our children, and to care for those who are in need. The President urged Congress last February to join him in tackling remaining domestic problems, and he continues to encourage action on his three-prong approach:

- I. To revitalize our economy.
- II. To make government more caring and more competent.
- III. To call all Americans to public service.

REVITALIZING THE ECONOMY

The economic boom of the 1980s -- the longest peace-time period of growth in history which expanded our economy by a third -- produced 21 million new jobs and 4.5 million new businesses. President Bush has proposed a series of measures to promote an entrepreneurial climate that will continue to foster the creation of more jobs and more opportunities for our citizens. The President's economic policies are focused on expanding the economic pie to include all Americans through the following initiatives:

1. The Enterprise Zone and Job Creation Act of 1991

Enterprise zones rekindle the economic dynamism of impoverished neighborhoods by converting these areas into centers of opportunity. This will be achieved by:

- * Eliminating the capital gains tax on development in the zone
- * Establishing zones as free-trade areas, allowing businesses to import materials from overseas duty-free

Unfortunately, Congress has failed to provide seed money for these innovative ideas.

2. The Community Opportunity Act of 1991

Allows low-income localities to tailor Federal programs to meet their individual needs.

3. Promotion of Savings and Investment

To give families greater control over their resources, the President has called for tax-free family savings accounts and penalty-free withdrawal from IRAs for first-time homebuyers.

4. Capital Gains Tax Reduction

Taxpayers should not be penalized for successful investments, but rather should be encouraged to reinvest their earnings into other job-creating ventures. Reducing the capital gains tax will actually stimulate entrepreneurship by both large and small investors, and provide new jobs and a healthier economy for all Americans.

5. Regulatory Reform

Regulations should be enacted only where necessary. They should not be so cumbersome as to stifle economic growth.

The Vice President's Council on Competitiveness is working to eliminate needless rules and red tape that bind the hands and the minds of entrepreneurs.

6. Civil Justice Reform

Unrestrained litigation exacts a terrible toll on the U.S. economy. A recent article in Forbes Magazine, for example, estimates that individuals, businesses, and governments spend more than \$80 billion on direct litigation costs and higher insurance premiums, and a total of up to \$300 billion indirectly, including the cost to avoid liability. In Federal courts alone, the number of lawsuits filed each year has almost tripled in the last 30 years -- from approximately 90,000 in 1960 to 250,000 in 1990.

The Council on Competitiveness has proposed a reform agenda to free our legal system of excessive cost and delays that hinder justice.

7. The North American Free Trade Agreement of 1991

The Fast Track Authority will allow negotiators from the United States, Mexico, and Canada to work not only for long-term economic expansion, but also for environmental ~~preservation~~ *stewardship.*

A free trade area encompassing all three countries is expected to create a North American market of 360 million people, with annual production of more than \$6 trillion. This agreement will also be the first dramatic step toward the realization of a hemispheric free trade zone.

American leadership in free trade agreements encourages a rejection of trade barriers worldwide and promotes job creation and opportunity.

8. Adherence to the 1990 Budget Agreement

The President believes it is vital to stick to the agreement in order to enhance economic growth and to reduce the Federal deficit. He urges policies that control Federal spending by mandating a 'pay-as-you-go' regimen, which will free capital for investment and will lead to a balanced budget.

9. The Financial Institution Safety and Consumer Choice Act of 1991

CARING AND COMPETENT GOVERNMENT

The President's policy of effective government focuses on promoting choice and opportunity. His approach advances programs with proven effectiveness in giving citizens the ability to make choices that will better their lives. The Administration will continue to oppose attempts to reinstate measures that have served to engender dependence.

Education Goals*

1. Education

President Bush believes that we must restructure and revitalize America's education system by the year 2000. Emphasizing that this effort is a national challenge, the President asks that all Americans take part in the crusade that counts the most -- the crusade to prepare our children and ourselves for the exciting future that looms ahead.

America 2000, the President's ~~National~~ ~~Education~~ Strategy, builds on four major themes. They are:

- * Creating better and more accountable schools for today's students
- * Creating a new generation of American schools for tomorrow's students
- * Transforming America into a nation of students
- * Making our communities places where learning can happen

President Bush calls on Americans in all segments of our communities to work together to help improve our schools based on world class standards and on the principle of accountability.

The President's strategy seeks to offer more choice in schooling for parents and for children. By infusing competition into the academic marketplace, more parents can be included in the decision-making process, and more children can be freed from limited, substandard education.

Finally, the President remains committed to increased funding for Head Start, a proven program that helps young students arrive at school ready to learn.

2. Housing

President Bush believes that creating the opportunity for low-income Americans to become property owners is a key to fighting poverty and to offering real hope to thousands. The cornerstone of the Administration's efforts to reduce the heavy hand of government is the idea of empowering people -- not bureaucracies.

The National Affordable Housing Act of 1990 gives people the best kind of government assistance: it provides opportunity and encourages responsibility. It recognizes that people have the best answers for themselves and their families.

Homeownership and Opportunity for People Everywhere (HOPE), a major initiative in the Act, is a springboard for independence because it:

- * Instills dignity in homeowners by providing them with a stake in the system
- * Fosters autonomy rather than perpetuating the despair of dependence

The Shelter Plus Care Program assists homeless persons, who have a drug abuse problem or other problems, to give them the support that they need to keep them from returning to a desolate life on the streets.

3. Crime

The Comprehensive Violent Crime Control Act of 1991, which the President sent to Congress in March, is designed to confront the spiral of lawlessness. It will strengthen our Nation's criminal justice system and protect our basic freedoms by increasing accountability and certainty of punishment. Areas of improvement include:

- * Habeas corpus reform
- * Added categories of firearm offenses and tougher penalties
- * Restoration of the Federal death penalty for certain crimes
- * New provisions to curb terrorism, racial injustice, sexual violence, and juvenile crime

4. ~~Drug Prevention~~ *Fighting Drugs*

Introduced in 1989, the National Drug Control Strategy has provided a unified and integrated national policy to address the complicated array of problems posed by illegal drug use. It includes roles not only for the Federal government, but also for our State and local governments, the private sector, and community leaders and citizens alike. Its goals are ambitious but straight-forward. They include:

- * Restore order and security to American neighborhoods
- * Dismantle drug trafficking organizations

- * Help people break the habit of drug use
- * Educate those who have never used drugs in order to prevent them from starting

To meet these goals, the Administration has boosted overall spending for drug treatment by 89 percent, so that the number of patients in programs funded by Federal help has increased by 30 percent.

According to a National Institute of Drug Abuse report, the President's Drug Strategy is working. Over an 18 month period, total drug use fell 11 percent, cocaine use declined 29 percent, and the number of cocaine-related casualties dropped 23 percent.

5. Health Care

During recent years, the costs of defensive medical practice and litigation related to health care disputes has skyrocketed. As a result, the access to quality care for significant portions of the population has been threatened.

The Health Care Liability Reform and Quality of Care Improvement Act of 1991, announced in May, will provide a pool of funds to help States adopt the following:

- * Quality assurance measures designed to reduce the incidence of negligence
- * Tort reforms -- including a reasonable cap on non-economic damages, prohibiting double recoveries by plaintiffs, and permitting health care providers to pay damages for future costs periodically rather than in a lump sum
- * Alternative means of resolving disputes

To improve health care for infants and children, President Bush has made Healthy Start a Presidential initiative and a top national priority. The Healthy Start program is designed to arrest potential health problems of our very young before they get out of control. Healthy Start encourages local governments to provide convenient and timely care to pregnant women while promoting the importance of a healthy and drug-free lifestyle.

While the President originally asked that \$57 million be diverted from other programs to fund the program, Congress has appropriated \$25 million in new revenue to be distributed in the 15 communities needing the most help. Nevertheless, the Administration has requested \$171 million for the Fiscal Year 1992 budget.

In addition, the Administration has also proposed budget increases for:

- * The Women, Infants, and Children Program
- * Childhood Immunizations

6. Child Care

The Child Care Act, proposed by the President and passed in 1990, expands earned income tax credits and places the initiative directly in the hands of parents. The Act ensures that States may not restrict parental choice by limiting the range of providers, and that the child care centers and employees will adhere to the religious tenets and teachings of the organization and comply with rules forbidding the use of drugs and alcohol.

The Administration [supports family leave], but opposes a 'Washington-Knows-Best' dictation of benefits. To stay competitive, businesses must keep their best employees. The Administration's position permits businesses and employees to tailor their benefits packages through individual negotiations to meet their particular needs.

7. Transportation

To meet the transportation needs of the future, President Bush announced the Surface Transportation Assistance Act of 1991 to ~~reform~~ existing highway programs and to increase funding for what works. It works by:

- * Building partnerships at all levels of government by loosening the Federal strings on the States' highway programs
- * Promoting adaptability and accountability
- * Calling for a 39 percent increase for Federal investment in the national highway system, which will be matched by greater State contributions for local highways

8. Energy

The National Energy Strategy is designed to meet the needs of continued economic growth, increased energy efficiency, strengthened environmental protection, and reduced dependence of foreign oil. The strategy relies on ~~the magic of the marketplace~~, the resourcefulness of the American people, and the responsible

leadership of government and industry to propel a larger economy in a more energy-efficient and environmentally sound way.

9. The Environment

In August, President Bush announced a comprehensive plan for improving the protection of our Nation's wetlands. The plan balances the protection, restoration, and creation of wetlands and the need for sustained economic growth and development by reforming the regulatory system to harness private, State, and local resources.

Passage of the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990, which broke a 10-year logjam, offers the private sector incentives to find creative, market-driven solutions to enhance air quality. It is a common sense approach that honors a respect for the environment consistent with economic growth.

10. ~~Basic Freedoms~~ *Equal Opportunity* → more?

Last March, the President sent to Congress a civil rights bill that advances equal opportunity in the workplace by removing the barriers such as race, sex, or disability in employment decisions. In late October, President Bush and Congress reached an agreement on the Civil Rights Act of 1990 that vigorously discourages prejudice on the job.

The President was extremely pleased that Congress passed the Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990 that he proposed and that brings the opportunity for new dignity and equality to these members of our society.

SUBJECT: U.S. Business Participation in Your Trip to Japan

During your November trip to Japan, I think it would be very worthwhile for you to invite a select group of U.S. industry leaders to accompany you. As of August, Japan accounted for 67 percent (\$40 billion) of the overall U.S. trade deficit for 1991 (projected at approximately \$60 billion), as compared to 40 percent at the same time last year. Japan posted an all-time record trade surplus with the world for the month of September (\$9.7 billion). Most analysts expect these figures to worsen as we move toward the coming election.

By inviting U.S. industry to participate in your trip as advisors, you could dramatically impress upon the American people your personal commitment to free and fair trade with Japan. We must ensure domestic support for a U.S.-Japan partnership is not eroded by concerns that U.S. goods are unfairly excluded from the Japanese market. Your trip is an opportunity to show the American public that the economic security interests of this country are equally important to us as our military security.

Including a select group of five or six corporate executives in your trip would send an unmistakable message to American business and workers that we will aggressively support the competitive economic interests of American industry. It would make your trip conclusively relevant to domestic issues. Attached is a list of potential invitees. We have particularly drawn from Federal advisory committees to avoid charges of partiality.

I believe it is essential for the American people to receive a strong message from you that foreign policy and domestic policy are entwined and inseparable, thereby showing how your global initiatives benefit the U.S. economy at home. The image of US business accompanying you to Japan is a good way to deliver that message.

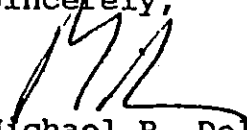

STATEMENT BY NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE ARTS CHAIRMAN
JOHN E. FROHNMAYER

Regarding Announcement of Fourth Quarter Grants

The Arts Endowment today announced 735 grants totalling \$16.85 million to support the efforts of talented artists and of meritorious arts organizations throughout the country. Prominent among them is \$6.2 million in grants to support arts programs in to benefit under-served areas from an inner-city to a rural region. These are wonderful and uplifting grants to support quality arts endeavors in virtually every state and territory.

However, you will likely hear a great deal about two grants of \$8,000 each to Tim Miller and Holly Hughes. They are two fellowships of the the 18 awarded to solo performance artists by the Endowment's Theater Program; they do not require a specific product but they are subject to a final report and all of the laws that govern the Endowment. --

You should know that:

Nine private citizens from seven states -- all of whom have expertise in the performance arts field -- served on the review panel which considered a total of 124 applications and recommended 18 fellowship recipients. Six panelists were new to this category and five were first time Endowment panelists. Among the applicants recommended for funding by the panel in this category are six puppeteers, two storytellers and a new vaudevillian. In their competitive ranking, Miller and Hughes finished second and fourth respectively.

The National Council on the Arts, whose eminence cannot be questioned, specifically considered these fellowship recommendations and approved them unanimously (with one abstention).

In the past year, I have tried, and believe succeeded, in making the procedures of this agency fair, inclusive and responsive to legislation approved by Congress. There is a layperson on every panel and the Endowment solicits names of qualified panelists widely, including requests for nominations from Congress, the arts community, and the general public. The Endowment has expanded its panels by one-third and rotates approximately 81.5% of its panelists each year. The panelists who each have considerable knowledge in a given arts fields are all private citizens.

As I have said earlier, I view my position not as an arbiter of taste or cultural czar, but analogous to a trial judge who rejects the people's verdict only if there is no substantial evidence to support it. Here, the evidence of artistic quality was and is substantial. The panelists reviewed the record of all of the applicants, evaluated their artistic work and made hard choices. I value their expert opinion, just as I value the collective judgment of the National Council.

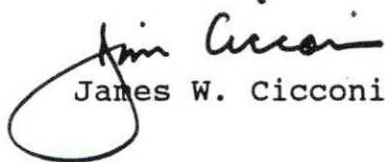

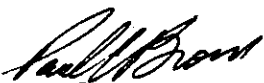

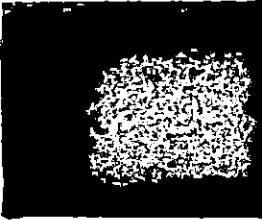
Perhaps you could determine if there is presidential interest in having her donated and if so, suggest to me an appropriate procedure of making this known to potential donors..

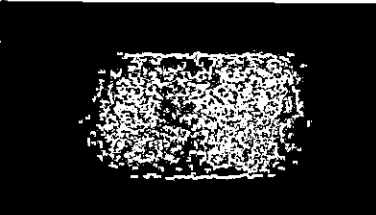

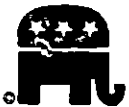

FROM: CLAYTON YEUTTER

The Houston speech played well. I was glad to see you take the critics head-on with your comments on international/domestic linkage. The way I've been putting it recently is that the skill demands on the President of the United States in global affairs will be much higher over the next decade than they've been over the past decade, and to suggest a pullback from that scene is just irresponsible. It is ironic, and reprehensible, that the Democrats have become political and economic isolationists.

I wanted to give you our best read at the moment on next week's election prospects.

We should reap the first benefits of our redistricting efforts in New Jersey. Helped by Florio's unpopularity, we expect to regain control of the New Jersey Assembly, and we could get the Senate as well.

The Thornburgh race is a toss-up. Wofford has been on the offensive with messages directed primarily at jobs and health care, and the Thornburgh folks have not countered effectively. Dick's campaign organization is now doing turnout phone calls to all Republican voters, and we believe our absentee ballot program will be better than Wofford's. TV buys from here on in are about even.

George Allen should win the Congressional seat in Virginia, and we'll do reasonably well in legislative races there even though the state is gerrymandered. (Virginia Republicans challenged the redistricting plan in court, but the judge ruled that it wasn't sufficiently distorted to justify rejection. This is about the only legal setback we've had anywhere this year on redistricting.)

Democrat businessman Bob Lanier is leading Kathy Whitmire in the Houston mayoralty race, so we are likely to have a new mayor at convention time. Steve Bartlett has a big lead in Dallas, and may win that mayor's race without a runoff. Our candidate, Goldsmith, should also win big in Indianapolis, and our candidate, Lashutka, should slip in in Columbus, Ohio.

As you know, Larry Hopkins had narrowed his gap in Kentucky to the single digit range, but that all collapsed with disclosure that he was a check bouncer. He'll likely lose by a large margin.

Our biggest upset potential on Tuesday lies with the Mississippi Governor's race. A Kirk Fordice win would be historic. We have five people helping on the race, and polls now show him down only three or four points. The anti-incumbent fervor of the moment will definitely help him. Briggs, our candidate for Lt. Governor, also has a good shot.

Finally, you'll want to watch the term limits vote in Washington. Notwithstanding Tom Foley's opposition, Rod Chandler told me yesterday he believes the measure will pass.

For a few days later, anyone who predicts a winner in the Edwards/Duke race is flying blind. Immense amounts of money are now flowing into that race, on both sides, with a lot of Jewish money going to Edwards and a lot of blacks having registered in recent days. But it should be obvious by now that Duke is a very skillful demagogue, particularly in mounting an economic protest appeal--just as Wofford has done in Pennsylvania. David Treen made an outstanding statement denouncing Duke, but whether that will translate to votes against him is conjectural. A heavy black vote for Edwards will probably wipe out nearly all, if not all, Republican candidates for other state offices.

As to the Democratic presidential candidates, the attached Germond/Witcover column says it all. The present candidates just aren't getting any attention. That works to our advantage, and to Cuomo's.

The incident pointed to a serious problem for the six Democrats now competing for their party's 1992 presiden-

tial nomination. They are still unknowns to most voters, and the television networks — the prime purveyor of political news — are paying so little attention to them that raising their recognition level is an uphill struggle.

To some degree, the problem is a function of the fact the campaign began so late while Democrats waited for the glow of the Persian Gulf war to fade. Over the summer and fall of 1987, seven Democratic candidates had held 13 debates, several of which received national television exposure on public and cable systems and heavy coverage from the networks. None of those debates was particularly memorable, but they did define some differences among the candidates and establish a rough pecking order.

But the Democratic imperative of getting themselves known also is a victim of economics. The television networks have cut back drastically on their coverage of presidential politics because they are operating with sharply reduced budgets. Thus, the best opportunity for any of the Democrats seems to be to do what Clinton did — bring their campaigns to a place the networks can easily and inexpensively cover them, which means New York or Washington.

Meanwhile, President Bush continues to enjoy the full coverage any president can expect. And if he

chooses to exploit that opportunity with de facto campaign events, the networks are not making any fine distinctions.

In the aftermath of the 1988 election, there was a flood of well-de-

served criticism of the way the networks allowed the Bush managers to set the agenda for the campaign by putting their candidate in visually attractive setting irresistible to the cameras and by using the kind of political sloganeering that fit "sound bite" journalism. Network executives responded with hand-wringing and promises that things would be different this time around.

Don't bet on it. When President Bush drops in on an elementary school classroom in Maine to show he is an "education president," all the networks use the film. When he visits the Grand Canyon to show he is an "environmental president," the cameras faithfully follow. The network correspondents may raise questions in their reports about the validity of those labels, but for candidate Bush the pictures are what matters and they are political gold.

The Democrats now have several events on the schedule that may attract some network attention. They all will be appearing at the New Hampshire party convention this weekend, and most are scheduled for other joint appearances next month in Michigan, Iowa and South Dakota. But what they need — and none is on the schedule this year — is some nationally televised debate. Even one carried live only on public stations would attract some audience and provide clips for the networks.

At this point, the importance of building broad name recognition may be overstated. The campaigning for the New Hampshire primary next Feb. 18 is still at the stage in which the target audience is first the 3,000 to 4,000 Democratic activists

in the state. But it is also true that challengers to an incumbent president need to make themselves familiar figures with whom voters at large are reasonably comfortable. It is axiomatic in politics that voters recognize there is some risk involved in choosing an alternative to any incumbent, so anything that reduces that risk is important.

The Democrats still have time to achieve that goal. They will be competing in caucuses and primaries while President Bush will be getting a pass. The candidate who wins in New Hampshire or on Super Tuesday three weeks later can expect intense media attention. And these days a candidate can be transformed from unknown into household word in just a few days.

Right now, nonetheless, the Democrats are making little impact on the electorate. The differences among them are significant but apparent to few potential voters. There is not even enough recognition to permit valid opinion polls to measure how they are doing

Dear ^F8^:

On behalf of President Bush, thank you for your message about grant-making policies of the National Endowment for the Arts. I am pleased to provide the following information.

The National Endowment for the Arts holds the view that while grant applications should be judged on the basis of artistic excellence and merit, it is in the public interest for the Endowment to fund diversity of expression. All grant applications are reviewed and recommended by a review panel, by the National Council on the Arts, and by Chairman John Frohnmayer.

President Bush strongly believes that the Endowment must be a conscientious steward of taxpayer funds. The Administration has worked with Congress to legislatively structure NEA's grant-making procedures in order to prevent Federal funds from being used for activities that clearly do not warrant taxpayer financing. As a result, the 1990 reauthorization legislation, the Arts, Humanities, and Museums Amendments, mandates that " . . . the Chairperson shall ensure that artistic excellence and artistic merit are the criteria by which applications are judged, taking into consideration general standards of decency and respect for the diverse beliefs and values of the American public."

Upon enactment of the reauthorization legislation, the Arts Endowment began the careful process of developing policies and procedures to implement all of the provisions of law, including the provision just cited.

Furthermore, once a grant has been awarded and the project that was funded has been completed, there is another mechanism by which the Endowment can verify that all terms and conditions of the grant were met in compliance with the law. All grantees are required to submit a Final Report to the Endowment at the conclusion of the grant award period. As with all Endowment grants, if the project did not comply with the terms of the grant, the Endowment has the authority to seek recoupment of Federal funds from the grantee. The same is true if a court were to deem the project, once completed, obscene. Proper oversight of all grants will be exercised by the Endowment to ensure compliance with its authorizing statute, Public Law 101-152, and with all other applicable Federal laws.

NEA recognizes that assertions about a number of its funded projects have been widely disseminated and that these assertions have created concern. You may wish to communicate directly with the Endowment concerning particular grants.

I hope that this information is helpful to you.

The Foundation began working with hearing impaired children in 1950, a time when there were no local treatment options for children with disabilities. It has since expanded to become a major regional center for the comprehensive treatment of children and adults with physical disabilities. The preschool is housed in the newly opened Siskin Hospital for Physical Rehabilitation.

There are currently 70 children, ranging from birth to six years old, enrolled in the preschool and early intervention program. Over the past two years, more than 200 volunteers have assisted children for whom simple activities -- such as speaking, eating, and moving -- are difficult and time-consuming tasks. The volunteers, many of whom are nursing and special education students at the neighboring University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, serve as classroom aides, offering much needed support to therapists and staff members.

Because of the special attention they receive from these volunteers, children at Siskin Preschool are able to develop their full potential in the critical early months and years of life. Their families learn how to help and support the children in meeting the severe challenges they face.

The President today recognized the volunteers of Casa de Amparo, of Oceanside, California, as the 608th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Casa de Amparo volunteers provide crisis care and support for abused children, striving to instill a sense of self-worth in each child.

Since 1978, Casa de Amparo, which means "House of Refuge" in Spanish, has served as a safe place of retreat for children who have been abandoned, neglected, or sexually or physically abused. Nearly 220 volunteers reach out to over 600 children a year through Casa de Amparo's programs, which are designed to emphasize self-esteem and responsibility. Currently, some 16 volunteers work in the Children's Unit, which serves children ranging in age from birth to 12 years. They play with and read to the children, teach arts and crafts, and participate in sports, science projects, and journal writing. The Teen Unit, which serves girls aged 13 to 18, relies on 6 volunteers to teach aerobics, cooking, etiquette and table manners, and to accompany the teens on field trips. Twelve volunteers help with the crisis day-care center. Community members also serve as speakers and role models for the youth. Birthday Brigade volunteers ensure that each child receives presents, a cake, and special attention on his or her birthday and at holiday time, the Holiday Brigade plans activities and celebrations.

The teenagers living at Casa de Amparo are themselves volunteers at T.E.R.I., Inc., a residential facility for individuals with disabilities. Twice a week, they assist the residents in recreational activities such as horseback riding. This initiative not only benefits the residents, but also provides Casa teens an opportunity to become caregivers and philanthropists, with the knowledge that someone needs and depends on them.

Camille Gerald, a professional nurse who has been involved with the medical care of children for 27 years, established the non-profit Up With Down Syndrome Foundation in 1986. Having adopted 15 Down's syndrome babies with her husband, Mrs. Gerald understood their need for 24 hour special care. Today, the Gerald family's center, consisting of their own home and a house purchased by the foundation, functions more as a family than as an institution. Currently it serves 19 infants and adults. Services provided include physical therapy, infant stimulation, counseling, job training, adult social groups, a summer camp, medical care, and overnight and day care. Adult residents wash laundry and dishes, while helping the staff care for and play with the children.

Dr. Gerald has provided medical care to some 10,000 Down's patients worldwide. With the exception of blood work, immunizations, and medication, he does not charge for his services. Dr. Gerald makes himself available to his patients at all times, giving them his home phone number and making house calls. The remainder of his practice of non-Down's patients supports the family and the foundation.

Dr. and Mrs. Gerald hope to buy a farm where they can work together to provide total care in one location to their extended family. Until that goal is reached, the Gerald family is committed to ensuring that members of their extended family lead full and happy lives.

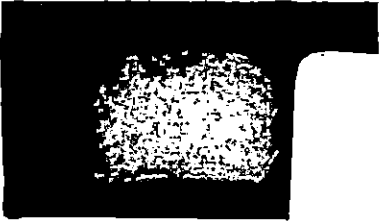

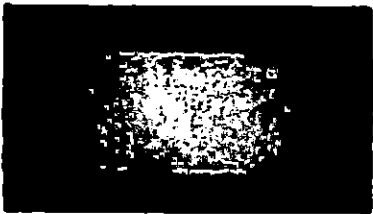

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

On Monday the House passed H.R. 3401, the Silvio O. Conte Disability Prevention Act Amendments of 1991, by voice vote. This five year reauthorization measure would provide grants to States for the development of disability prevention programs.

On Tuesday the House passed H.J.Res. 281, extending Most Favored Nation Status to the Mongolian People's Republic and H.J.Res. 282, extending Most Favored Nation Status to Bulgaria, by voice vote.

The House then passed H.R. 3543, the Dire Emergency Supplemental bill, by a vote 252 to 162. During consideration of the bill the House took the following action:

- approved Representative Patricia Schroeder's (D-CO) amendment, providing \$1.39 billion for Headstart, the Women, Infants and Children Program (WIC), and a child immunization initiative, by a vote of 243 to 180.
- approved Representative Jamie Whitten's (D-MS) amendment, providing an additional \$335 million to FEMA for recent disasters such as the California wildfires, by voice vote.

On Wednesday the House disapproved H.R. 2508, the FY 1992-93 Foreign Assistance Authorization bill, by a vote of 159 to 262. The Democrats were split on the vote with 131 supporting and 127 against. Only 28 Republicans voted for the bill. This bill is under a senior advisors' veto threat because of objectionable UNFPA, Mexico City policy, and cargo preference provisions.

SUBJECT: Letter to FEC for POTUS Signature

On Thursday, October 31, 1991, the Federal Election Commission informed Bush-Quayle '92 of a change in the matching funds submissions filing schedule.

Previously, the FEC had notified Bush-Quayle '92 that the tentative first filing due date for a matching funds submission would be December 7, 1991. However, under the new schedule the campaign received from the FEC on October 31, 1991, the deadline for filing the qualifying, threshold matching funds submission is now Friday morning, November 8, 1991. The new deadline for filing the first regular matching funds submission has been changed to December 2, 1991.

Attached please find the form letter required by the FEC. This letter must accompany the qualifying, threshold matching funds submission. Without filing both the letter and threshold submission by Friday, November 8, 1991, the campaign will not be permitted to file its first regular matching funds submission on December 2, 1991, and would not be eligible for a matching funds payment in January, 1992.

This form letter is in accordance with the letter which then Vice President Bush filed with the FEC in 1987, and which President Reagan filed in 1984. Copies of both of these letters are attached. Please note that when then Vice President Bush submitted the letter and threshold filing on May 23, 1987, he was not a declared candidate for President, and did not declare his candidacy until September, 1987.

There was discussion at the time of the May 23, 1987 filing regarding the language of this letter. However, it was determined not to be problem, since the language is mandated by FEC regulations.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

As a candidate seeking to become eligible to receive Presidential primary matching funds, I certify and agree to the following provisions:

- I. I am seeking the nomination of the Republican Party for election to the Office of the President in more than one State. I and/or my authorized committee, Bush-Quayle '92 - Primary, Inc., have received matchable contributions which in the aggregate exceed \$5,000 from residents of each of at least twenty States which, with respect to any one person, do not exceed \$250.00.
- II. I and/or my authorized committee have not incurred and will not incur qualified campaign expenses in excess of the expenditure limitations prescribed in 26 U.S.C. Sec. 9035 and 11 C.F.R. Part 9035.
- III. I acknowledge that I have the burden of proving that disbursements made by me, and my authorized committee or agents are qualified campaign expenses as defined at 11 C.F.R. 9032.9.
- IV. I and my authorized committee will comply with the documentation requirements set forth in 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.11.
- V. Upon request of the Commission, I will supply an explanation of the connection between any disbursement made by me or my authorized committee and the campaign as prescribed by 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.1(b)(3).
- VI. In accordance with 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.1(b)(4), I and my authorized committee agree to keep and furnish to the Commission all documentation for matching fund submissions, any books, records (including bank records for all accounts), and supporting documentation and other information that the Commission may request.

- VII. As provided at 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.1(b)(5), I and my authorized committee agree to keep and furnish to the Commission all documentation relating to disbursements and receipts including any books, records (including bank records for all accounts), all documentation required by this section including those required to be maintained under 11 C.F.R. Sec. 9033.11, and other information that the Commission may request. The records provided for the post-primary audit shall also include production of magnetic computer tapes containing all information required to be maintained on my authorized committee receipts and disbursements, if my authorized committee maintains its records on computer. Upon request by the Commission, documentation explaining the computer software capabilities shall also be provided, and such personnel as are necessary to explain the operation of the computer system's software and the computerized information prepared or maintained by the committee shall also be made available. 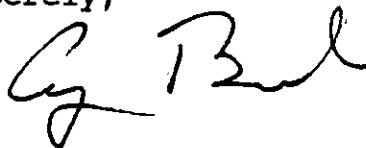

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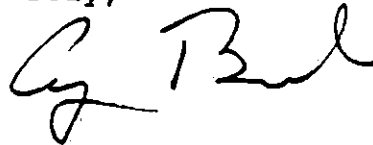

SUBJECT: Staff Secretary Functions and the Campaign

The prospect of a formal campaign organization presents a number of issues regarding staff secretary functions, which this memo seeks to address.

Presumably, the campaign will appoint someone to serve in a staff secretary role, and we would serve as the primary White House contact for that person. We propose that the roles of our office and the campaign's staff secretary should be divided as follows:

First, this office should continue to serve as the President's "in box" and "out box," i.e., all material for the President -- including material from the campaign -- should be forwarded through this office.

The staffing process on speeches should continue to work as it has in the past, assuming there is no legal prohibition. We would anticipate utilizing greater care in staffing speeches for campaign events to the agencies. Any speeches written in the campaign should be sent to us for appropriate staffing within the White House (e.g., NSC should see a speech on Middle East policy written by the campaign).

This last point is important: when the President speaks as a candidate, he is still speaking as President of the United States, and his pronouncements are authoritative. This is particularly the case in the area of foreign policy. Thus, simply because a speech is written at the campaign does not mean it is devoid of official purpose.

Second, With the possible exception of photographs of official campaign events, this office should retain control of the use of the President's signature. (We have already instructed the campaign to cease using the poor quality autopen matrix they have for fundraising letters.)

Third, the campaign will be responsible for forwarding all official correspondence to this office as soon as it is received. In other words, the campaign will not maintain an agency liaison function of any kind, nor will it be responsible for responding to letters which are primarily official in nature. Similarly,

we will forward to Political Affairs or the campaign all political correspondence.

Fourth, we propose that gifts be handled as at present. A gift presented to the President at a campaign event or through the campaign is still covered by the relevant statutes and should be handled by the Gift Unit.

Similarly, recommended telephone calls for the President should be handled as at present; i.e., submitted to this office and presented for your approval before they are forwarded to the President.

We believe the campaign should not have the authority to produce Presidential messages without White House approval. While we are happy to receive drafts from the campaign, there are so many issues to be considered in Presidential messages -- the reputation of the group, clearing the message with appropriate White House offices, consistency of policy -- that some White House approval is necessary.

The campaign should be responsible for the preservation of all records pertaining to the campaign. They will be handled in accordance with the relevant statutes. (Eventually, of course, this material would be sent to the Bush Presidential Library; even if the President were to lose the election, the campaign documents would be Federal property, since the President will receive major-party Federal financing for the campaign after the convention.)

Please let us know if you would like to discuss this further. Thank you.

SUBJ: Political Mail

The following guidance, which has been coordinated with White House Counsel and Political Affairs Offices, will apply to all mail concerning the convention, platform issues, or a prospective re-election campaign for the President, until further notice.

GENERAL GUIDANCE FOR WHITE HOUSE CORRESPONDENCE DEPARTMENT:

All primarily political CTRK and general public mail will be directed to the White House Political Affairs Office for handling.

All primarily official mail that also expresses general support for the President and his policies may continue to be answered in the current manner. Letters of response may include whatever substantive official reply is appropriate, as well as thanking the writer for his or her encouragement and continued support.

When answering issue-related mail, respond to the substance, not the politics. Use the following to guide your judgement:

- ♦ No reference to the writer's, or any other individual's future support, role or interest in the political campaign.
- ♦ No reference to any past, present or future contributions.

CATEGORIES OF MAIL/REQUESTS AND APPROPRIATE GUIDANCE:

The Bush-Quayle '92 Committee: The White House Staff may tell a caller the phone number and address of the committee in response to specific requests for that information: Bush-Quayle Primary Committee, Inc., P.O. Box 19992, Washington, D. C. 20036-0992, 703/739-4602.

Response to Official Mail: We may also supply the address if there is a request for information that requires providing the address to be responsive.

Cash/Checks: All cash and checks will be sent to Bob Houser in Mail Analysis who will return the money to the sender with an appropriate letter (ATTACHMENT 1). No reference to the political comments or the contribution can be made in the outgoing correspondence from the White House, but the address of the Exploratory Committee CAN be stated.

Bobby will send a copy of the incoming and "returned money" outgoing letter to Political Affairs for appropriate disposition. The President's close personal friends and special CTRK writers may receive, in addition to the letter above, a personal note signed by him. (ATTACHMENT 2). When Bobby is uncertain about close personal friends and CTRK letters, he should send a copy of the incoming and outgoing to me to determine appropriate handling. SMG 67, 67a, 67b that are currently being used for other money mail responses may continue to be used as appropriate. (COPIES ATTACHED)

SPECIFIC GUIDANCE FOR WHITE HOUSE CORRESPONDENCE DEPARTMENT:

1. Primarily Political mail: All CTRK and general public mail that primarily relates to the 1992 convention or campaign should be referred to the White House Political Affairs Office for appropriate disposition. This includes offers of assistance, resumes, offers of products/concepts, or other convention, platform or campaign suggestions. Send to Patrick Davis, Room 170.

2. Primarily Official mail: A combination of issues and support for the President during this period when he is a "legal" but not declared candidate should be answered by White House Correspondence in Mail Analysis or Special Letter Response (SLR) with appropriate approved language on the subject. Mail analysis may send a copy of letters with political support to Political Affairs for appropriate disposition.

One of the optional paragraphs listed in ATTACHMENT 3 may be added if required to be responsive to the writer. These paragraphs are not to be coded by Mail Analysis; they are to be used only by Special Letter Response or the front office.

3. Presidential mail referred to other White House staff offices:

A cover sheet with the following caution will be added to the correspondence that is scheduled to be answered by other White House departments. "For White House Handling: Please disregard any political comments included in this mail and respond only to the subject matter within your immediate jurisdiction." This mail that also expresses political support may be copied by Mail

Analysis to the White House Political Affairs Office for appropriate disposition.

4. Presidential mail referred to Executive Departments or other Federal Agencies: The standard correspondence tracking system will be used for CTRK letters which require an expanded explanation from the appropriate agency or department. The predominantly official Presidential letters will have a cover note with the following cautionary language. "For Agency Handling: Please disregard any political comments included in this mail and respond only to the subject matter within your immediate jurisdiction." Then the White House Interagency Affairs Office sends the mail to the appropriate agency for handling. Bulk mail referrals will also use a cover note. A copy of these letters that express political support may be sent by Mail Analysis to Political Affairs for appropriate disposition.

5. Requests for messages/greetings, etc.: All non-political requests for messages/greetings for organizations/general public will be handled as is customary. Requests from a political organization or official, or to a political organization or official, should be routed to the White House Political Affairs Office for appropriate disposition. Messages may continue to be handled between Political Affairs and Correspondence as has been customary.

6. Photos: Photo requests by the public are handled as customary. However, any requests by political organizations or officials should be sent to the WH Political Affairs Office for appropriate disposition. Photographs taken by an outside photographer at a Bush-Quayle event may not be incriminated, autopenned, or mailed by White House personnel.

7. Scheduling: All requests for the President's participation in any kind of an event will be forwarded to the Scheduling Office for appropriate consideration and handling.

8. Gifts: The receipt of any gifts of over nominal value (\$35) will be handled ONLY by the White House Gift Unit. Small political items of nominal value -- stickers, buttons, bumper stickers, etc. -- will be referred to Political Affairs.

9. Trip Thank Yous: Correspondence Department will prepare thank you notes for those persons who help on trips for any non-political portion of the President's trips and refer remainder of proposed thank you list to Political Affairs for appropriate referral. (ATTACHMENT 4)

As always, thanks for your cooperation and good work.

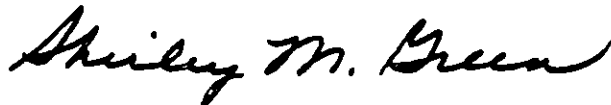

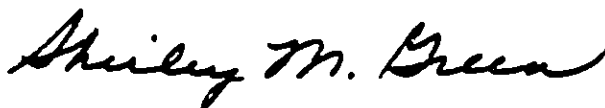
