FUNCTIONS OF THE STAFF SECRETARY'S OFFICE

Immediate Office of the Staff Secretary

Goal: To ensure that all documents forwarded to the President are correct in form and content and to ensure that the President's wishes for further action are respected.

All material for the President comes to this Office. It is then either reviewed and forwarded directly or staffed for senior staff comment and clearance before forwarding.

Staffing:

- speeches for the President
- "enrolled bill memos" from OMB are staffed for senior staff clearance before the President signs a bill
- Economic Policy Council and Domestic Policy Council decision memoranda
- All reports transmitted by the President to Congress (once they have received OMB interagency clearance)
- Other documents as appropriate (e.g., draft Presidential memoranda, proclamations under the trade laws, Section 337 investigations of the International Trade Commission)
- Flag rank military nominations are cleared with NSC
- Clear off on "Statement by the President" press releases after staffing (as appropriate)

Daily Schedule:

- Prepare the President's copy of his daily schedule, both in Washington and on travel, and distributes copies to certain senior staff. We receive briefing papers for each event from the office responsible for the event.

Correspondence:

- Review correspondence from Presidential Correspondence before it is sent to the President
- Correspondence received by the Immediate Office of the President is sent to us for appropriate staffing and preparation of a response.

Immediate Office of the President:

- Work with this Office to ensure that material is delivered to the President on a timely basis and to ensure that the President's wishes for further handling of documents are respected.

Medals:

- Responsible for Presidential Medals (e.g., Medal of Freedom, Citizens' Medal, National Medal of Arts). Work with the President on securing his decisions on these medals and plan ceremonies.

Bush Administration Record:

- Coordinating a project to provide a comprehensive and easy to use reference on the accomplishments of this Administration, the "Bush Administration Record." These 1-2 page documents are prepared by an office and then sent to us for staffing and clearance. They will be distributed to Administration spokespersons.

Presidential Correspondence

The Office of Presidential Correspondence handles most correspondence received at the White House.

- Mail Analysis receives mail and either codes it for routine response or forwards more important mail to other offices for handling
- Special Letter Response prepares special letters for the President's signature or autopen (e.g., weekly mail sample, retirement letters, etc.). The writers in this office also prepare drafts of Presidential messages.
- Presidential Messages clears these drafts within the White House and then forwards to either Shirley Green or Phil Brady for final approval.
- Typing is the central typing unit for Presidential Correspondence.
- Personal correspondence of the President may be handled through Correspondence (Rm. 18)
- Correspondence prepares and staffs drafts of Presidential proclamations (final cleared with Staff Secretary)

Executive Clerk

The Executive Clerk is the institutional link between the President and other officials of the United States Government. The Clerk ensures that all official documents for the President are in proper order before they are signed and maintains precedents of official actions taken by Presidents.

- Receives bills from Congress
- Transmits personnel nominations, reports, treaties, and veto messages to Congress
- Prepares commissions and certificates of appointments
- Prepares Presidential awards (e.g., Medal of Freedom) and maintains records of awards
- Transmits Presidential Memoranda to officials in the Executive Branch
- Transmits signed Executive Orders, proclamations, and other official documents to the Federal Register

Records Management

Records Management maintains the records of this Administration in an orderly fashion for easy recall and is responsible for archival conservation. These records will form the nucleus of the Bush Presidential Library.

- Maintains all records of the President (and staff members as appropriate)
- Physically controls the President's autopen; use of the autopen is governed by the Staff Secretary
- The autopen is also used, for their own signature, by such offices as Personnel and Correspondence
- Works with Correspondence to ensure that mail is sent out in a timely fashion

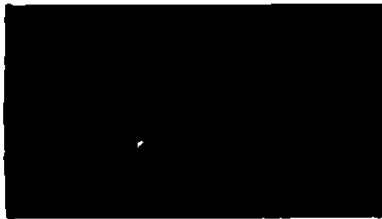
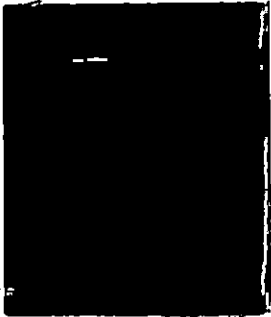


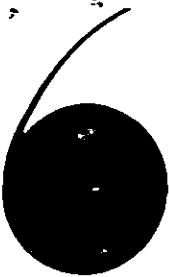

Your constant efforts to keep your speech on a serious level were laudable. You contained the crowd and controlled them well.

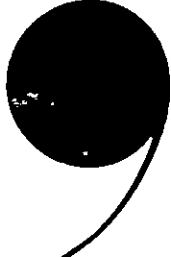
Your sensitivity of the remembrance of your youth compared to the youth you see in the audience was very moving. Your demands on Congress were very dramatic.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

Over the past year the United States and the former Soviet Union have agreed to cut their strategic nuclear arsenals by two-thirds and to eliminate most of their tactical nuclear weapons, including all ground-launched systems. As a result of these dramatic reductions, thousands of nuclear warheads are being dismantled in Russia and the United States. The United States and Russia are cooperating closely to help ensure the safe and secure transport, storage and dismantlement of former Soviet nuclear weapons.

I am pleased to announce that the Russian Federation and the United States have now also initialed an agreement to ensure that highly-enriched uranium from dismantled nuclear weapons will be used only for peaceful purposes. Our two governments have initialed an agreement, which we expect to sign quickly, providing for the conversion of this material into civilian reactor fuel. We have also agreed to establish measures to ensure that the nonproliferation, physical security, material accounting and control, and environmental requirements covering this material are fully met.

Under the agreement, the United States and Russia would seek within the next twelve months to conclude an implementing contract, establishing the terms of the purchase of weapons-grade uranium by the U.S. Department of Energy and the dilution of that material to reactor-grade uranium for sale as commercial reactor fuel. The contract would also provide for the participation of the U.S. private sector and the use by the Russian Federation of a portion of the proceeds to increase the safety of nuclear reactors in the former Soviet Union.

Abroad, this agreement will help ensure that nuclear weapons-grade material does not fall into the wrong hands, while providing funds to promote economic reforms and the transition to a market-based economy. At home, this agreement will secure long-term supplies of less expensive fuel for U.S. nuclear power stations to the benefit of American consumers, with no adverse impact on American jobs. Thus, this U.S.-Russian agreement illustrates how foreign policy accomplishments can promote our domestic economic well-being while making the world a safer place to live.

FACT SHEET ON U.S.-RUSSIAN AGREEMENT ON HIGHLY-ENRICHED URANIUM

An agreement concerning the disposition of highly-enriched uranium (HEU) from the dismantlement of nuclear weapons in Russia has been initialed by Major General (Retired) William F. Burns, representing the United States of America, and Deputy Minister of Atomic Energy Nikolai Yegorov, representing the Russian Federation. The agreement requires formal approval by both governments, after which it will be signed and enter into effect.

The agreement is in two parts. The first part establishes the parties' objectives. It commits them to cooperate in the conversion, as soon as practicable, of the HEU resulting from dismantlement of nuclear weapons in Russia into low-enriched uranium (LEU) for use as commercial reactor fuel. It also calls on the parties to establish appropriate measures to ensure that this transaction is executed in a manner consistent with all applicable nonproliferation, physical security, material accounting and control, and environmental requirements.

The second part of the agreement commits the parties to seek to enter into an implementing contract within twelve months to accomplish the objectives set forth in the first part. The agreement specifies that the implementing contract will provide, among other things, for the following:

- Annual conversion of no less than 10 metric tons of HEU in the first five years and no less than 30 metric tons thereafter;
- The purchase by the U.S. Department of Energy of HEU for conversion in the United States to LEU and sale for commercial purposes;
- The purchase by the U.S. Department of Energy of LEU converted from HEU at facilities in Russia and the sale of such LEU for commercial purposes, if so agreed;
- The participation of the U.S. private sector; and
- The use by the Russian Federation of a portion of the proceeds of HEU sales to upgrade the safety of nuclear reactors in the former Soviet Union.
- The use by the Russian Federation, at its discretion, of a portion of any proceeds from the sale of HEU to finance the construction and operation of facilities in Russia to convert HEU to LEU.

Implementation of the agreement will be budget neutral for the U.S. Government on a year-by-year basis. Payment for purchase of HEU would come from savings in the Department of Energy's enrichment operations. Purchase of HEU from nuclear warheads dismantled in Russia would have no adverse impact on U.S. consumers or jobs in the uranium mining or processing industries. The Department of Energy would use the HEU to reduce the electricity costs at its enrichment facilities, while continuing to operate at current employment levels and to process domestically-produced uranium. The agreement will not be funded under the Soviet Nuclear Threat Reduction (Nunn-Lugar) Act of 1991.

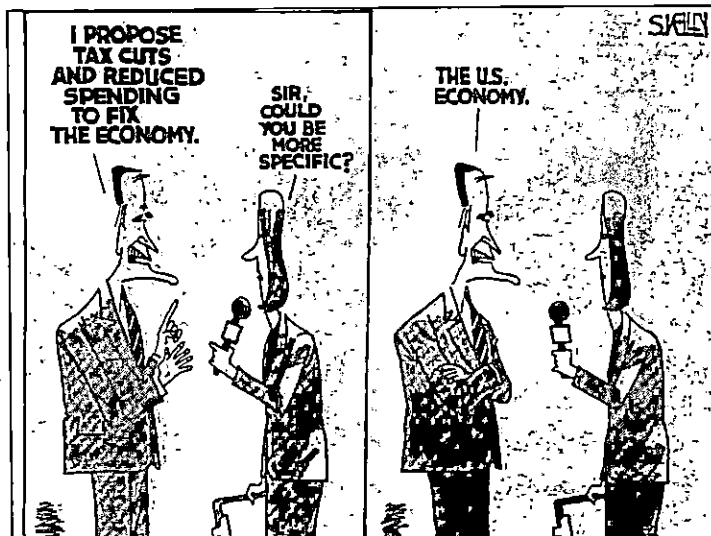

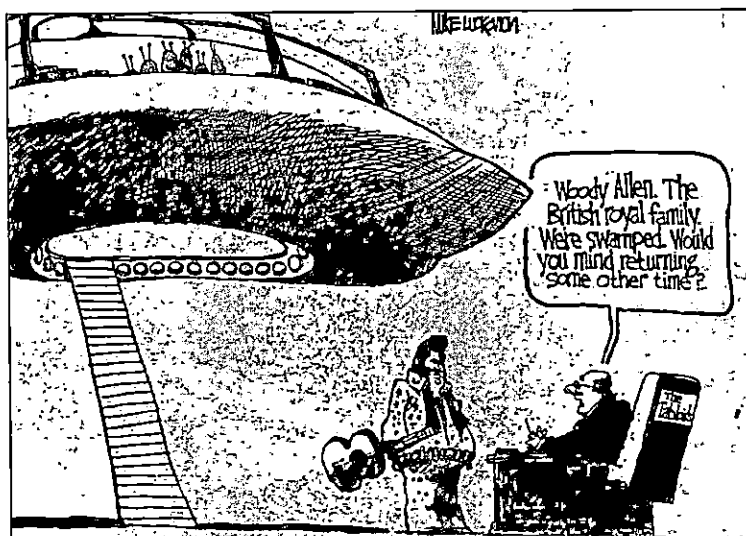

Administration Criticized For Focus of Crime Fight

ABA President Sends Letter to White House

The president of the American Bar Association has sharply criticized the Bush administration for focusing on "get-tough edicts" to deal with violent crime while ignoring gun control and drug treatment.

In a letter to President Bush last week, Miami lawyer Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte, head of the 70,000-member ABA, waded into the election-year crime debate by blasting a recent Justice Department report.

Released last month by Attorney General William P. Barr, the report calls on states to combat violent crime with tougher bail, sentencing and parole policies, as well as stiffer treatment of youthful offenders. The report said that states need to jail more defendants before trial, adopt mandatory minimum sentences for violent crimes committed with a weapon and limit parole, but it did not make recommendations on how states could pay for such changes.

D'Alemberte disagreed vehemently with the report's focus and recommendations, charging that it was filled with "quick fixes" and that it ignores the "broad societal" causes for crime.

He criticized the "emphasis on building prisons" as a solution to the nation's corrections crisis and the administration's failure to endorse gun control.

Barr quickly fired back, saying he was "extremely disappointed," although not surprised at D'Alemberte's criticism.

"Last year, [D'Alemberte] defended the broken system of civil justice in America; now he defends a revolving door system of criminal justice," Barr said in a statement.

"I am concerned that these criticisms are further evidence that the ABA, rather than seeking to strengthen the criminal justice system, has merely become the mouthpiece for the criminal defense bar in order to promote its tactical advantage," Barr added.

The ABA, which opens its annual meeting Monday in San Francisco, has been feuding with the Bush ad-

ministration since its convention last year. Vice President Quayle spoke at the meeting, criticizing lawyers and laying out the administration's plan to reduce the nation's legal bills.

As its 1992 meeting was about to open, the ABA also released two justice system reports that echoed some of the themes of D'Alemberte's letter.

One, done in the wake of the Los Angeles riots that erupted after the verdicts in the Rodney G. King police beating trial, found that the justice system intentionally or unintentionally treats minorities inequitably and that efforts at reform have been "relatively ineffectual."

The report asserted that the disproportionately high number of minorities in prisons is "linked to poverty and lack of family structure and education that plague the lives of the urban poor."

In a separate report, the ABA said "the justice system in many parts of the United States is on the verge of collapse due to inadequate . . . and unbalanced funding."

Incoming ABA president Michael McWilliams, a Baltimore lawyer, said this "justice deficit" has "real victims," people who are unable to get access to the system.

An ABA-commissioned survey of the justice system in the District and 50 states found what the report called "alarming" examples of the crisis, including:

- In New Jersey, more than 500 police were laid off in 1991.

- Georgia and Michigan undertook massive reductions in their corrections forces.

- Five states reported that, because of lack of funds, public defenders were turning away poor people.

- Twenty-four states reported increased prison crowding or the use of early release programs to ease overcrowding. Florida was forced to release 3,000 inmates after a midyear budget cut of \$45 million in the 1991-92 fiscal year.

- Ten states reported "undue delay" in the wait for a civil trial, and in Philadelphia the delay was up to five years. More than 15 states and the District raised fees charged to file civil cases.

Dear Mr. Trotter:

Thank you for your invitation to attend the National Corn Growers Association board of directors meeting being held this week in St. Louis.

I regret that prior commitments prevented me from joining you in person. However, I know that foremost on your minds is the issue of ethanol. For almost a decade I have led the fight to use ethanol to improve air quality -- and I am proud that my Administration produced and championed both the historic Clean Air Act and the National Energy Strategy that promise new opportunities for ethanol. Let me say it in plain English: I support ethanol.

In just the last four years, we have extended the ethanol gas tax waiver and the production tax credit until the year 2000, extended the tax credit to ETBE, launched major increases in research and development programs involving ethanol, created an oxygenated fuels program, consistently pushed for special CAFE incentives for the use of alternative fuels, and supported a tax amendment that will allow ethanol blends to receive a pro-rated gas tax exemption. From a fledgling industry a decade ago, ethanol production has grown to 800 million gallons last year and 900 million gallons this year. I am confident that ethanol use will increase significantly in the years ahead as a result of the Clean Air Act.

As you know, the reformulated gasoline program created by the Clean Air Act is a very complicated program. It was extremely helpful for me to be brought up to speed by several farm leaders I met with last weekend in Springfield, Illinois on the critical issue of ethanol's role in this program. I am committed to resolving this matter and have asked my top staff to bring it to closure as soon as possible, and in a manner that ensures ethanol is competitive in the reformulated gasoline program.

Again, thank you for the kind invitation. Best wishes.

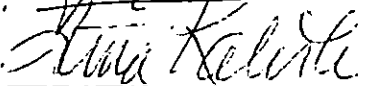
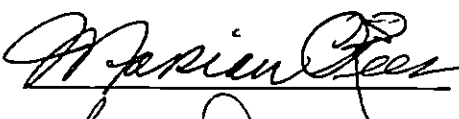
Dear President Bush:

MEMORANDUM FOR THE SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY

This memorandum confirms my oral instructions on August 24, 1992, at which time I directed that the United States Secret Service provide protection to White House Chief of Staff James A. Baker. You are additionally authorized and directed to make necessary arrangements to fund these activities from the proper appropriations.

PRESIDENT'S PLAN:
QUESTIONS RE SPENDING

Mandatory Cap

- Q. How much would the President's proposed cap on the growth of mandatory spending save?
- A. \$294 billion over 5 years.
- Q. Does this mean that Social Security would be cut?
- A. The President has specifically exempted Social Security from both the 5-year cap and from the associated enforcement mechanism (the sequester that would be triggered if the cap were exceeded).
- Q. Does the cap require cuts in benefits for poor people, Medicare recipients (earning less than \$100,000), farmers (earning less than \$100,000), or veterans?
- A. No. Such cuts are not required to meet the cap, and the President has not proposed them. The Midsession Review of the Budget includes an appendix with a list of options for meeting the cap. These options are from many sources. Many of them can be implemented without adversely affecting benefits for poor people, veterans, etc. (as above). Additional savings are to be achieved by implementing the President's health plan. These health savings result from malpractice reform, administrative reforms, coordinated care, and competition. Such savings would count toward meeting the requirements of the cap -- and they would not reduce health benefits for beneficiaries.

NOTE: The Clinton health plan says health costs will not grow "any faster than the average American's income." This implies about the same rate of growth as would be called for under the proposed cap. But the Clinton health savings would be achieved by government rationing and government price controls -- rather than by malpractice reform and competition (as in the President's plan).

Tax Check-off for Debt-and-deficit-reduction

Q. How much would the tax check-off produce for debt-and-deficit-reduction?

A. If all individual income taxpayers elected the full 10 percent, it would reduce the debt and deficit by about \$50 billion in the first year.

Q. Does this mean automatic reductions in all programs?

A. No. It means the legal spending ceilings ("caps") would automatically be reduced by the amount people check off. But within those lowered ceilings, Congress and the President would still set priorities -- raising spending for some things, lowering it for others, but meeting a total spending limit that is lowered.

Q. But doesn't this mean draconian cuts somewhere?

A. The federal budget is at about \$1.5 trillion. Savings of \$50 billion would be only 3 percent of that. Federal spending has been growing at about 8 percent per year. So, even with the proposed "cut", spending could still grow; it would just grow more slowly.

New Spending Initiatives

Q. How are initiatives like the new training programs squared with the proposed restraint on spending?

A. The new training programs are not "entitlements"; they are discretionary spending. Total discretionary spending is already subject to an enforceable legal cap. The President's proposals are intended to be within the total cap. Initiatives are a reflection of the President's intended priorities within the cap. (NOTE: The new training initiatives begin in FY '94. In that year, the "firewalls" come down; and the cap is on total discretionary spending. So some domestic spending increases may be offset by defense decreases -- although others will be offset by reductions in low-priority domestic programs.)

"Specifics"

Q. Why hasn't the President proposed specific spending cuts -- in addition to the overall caps?

A. The President has proposed almost \$70 billion in specific spending cuts for "mandatory" programs (FY 93-97). (Governor Clinton has specifically proposed less than \$5 billion.) The President has also proposed the outright elimination of 246 specific discretionary programs. (Governor Clinton has specifically proposed to eliminate only one such program -- the honey bee subsidy program, which Senator Gore voted to retain.)

If specific cuts in "mandatory" programs previously proposed by the President (but not yet enacted) were combined with this year's specific cuts, they (alone) would total about \$132 billion (over five years).

Relationship to Tax cuts

Q. Isn't the promise of a tax cut tied to specific spending cuts a phony -- since specific spending cuts have not been identified?

A. More than \$130 billion in specific spending reduction has been identified and formally proposed by the President. This alone could finance an across-the-board rate cut of one percent, and a reduction in the small business tax rate from 15% to 10%, and an increase in small business expensing of investment in equipment, and a reduction in the capital gains tax.

Additional savings from the mandatory cap and the check-off (an additional 200-billion-dollars-plus) would be available for further tax relief and deficit reduction.

The President today recognized the volunteers of the Margaret Hudson Program of Tulsa, Oklahoma, as the 873rd Daily Point of Light for the Nation. The volunteers provide teenage parents quality health care and a sense of well-being.

More than 40 volunteers serve over 400 teenage parents each year through a variety of programs at the three Margaret Hudson Centers. At the Tulsa campus, volunteers in the Training for Life program are prepared to help teenagers avoid becoming pregnant. They also provide crisis counseling and lead educational programs for parents and teenagers.

The Huggers Program matches senior citizens with babies up to two years of age. Both infants and seniors benefit from this one-to-one interaction, while senior-supported child care enables teen parents to attend school regularly.

The Margaret Hudson Program also coordinates the Pregnant and Parenting Teen Program, through which volunteers tutor teen parents to prepare them for graduation. Volunteers also monitor the mothers' pre-natal care. The Margaret Hudson Program conducts two-year, ongoing evaluations of each teen parent.

According to Executive Director Jan Figart, when the Margaret Hudson Program began in 1968, 80 percent of all teenage parents dropped out of high school. Today, nearly 95 percent of the teens participating in the Program graduate from high school. The many services offered by Margaret Hudson volunteers have opened the doors of opportunity for hundreds of teen parents.

The President today recognized the volunteers of Students Against Violence Everywhere (S.A.V.E.) of West Charlotte, North Carolina, as the 875th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. S.A.V.E. is committed to making its community a decent, safe place to live.

Formed in April 1989 after the shooting death of a student who had tried to break up a fight at an off-campus party, S.A.V.E. works to prevent violence among young people. Twenty percent of the West Charlotte High School student body is actively involved in the group's activities, and over 1,000 students have joined since its inception. Members meet every other week to study alternatives to violence, guided by law enforcement officers, trained mediators, psychologists, and authors. The Charlotte police officer who works regularly with the organization is widely trusted for advice on how to avoid violence in conflicts between boyfriends and girlfriends and between groups of students.

S.A.V.E. members also lead workshops on resolving conflicts and stemming violence at other schools. In addition, the organization conducts extensive awareness campaigns to illustrate the consequences of violence and the benefits of non-violence. S.A.V.E. members write scripts for local television programs and prepare materials for local parades and exhibits. They develop exhibits, school workshops, t-shirts, and newsletters to promote their message of non-violence.

According to the Office of Communications of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg school district, S.A.V.E. has proven effective in decreasing the number of students expelled for violence or weapons violations. Today, there are S.A.V.E. chapters in more than 30 high schools in four states.

Jim, pursuant to our conversation today, I checked on the Advance for the Branson rally, which has to be one of the greatest rallies of all times. The advance was headed by Lynn Kennelly, who is on White House payroll and doing a good job. I had thought that perhaps they had brought in some of the oldtimers -- not so.

The Gulfport rally was done by Craig Ray, who was until recently on White House payroll but was transferred to the campaign. Everyone agrees the Gulfport rally was also upbeat.

I think we need more specifics on Clinton's quotes. For example, he is against right to work in one place and for it in another. I would then use it in subsequent speeches to get the campaign in focus.

Also, we need more examples like I used in the Convention speech such as "on such and such a day, I ordered the planes over Baghdad and 43 days later we won the war." On that same day, I sent the energy bill to Congress and _____ days later there is still no action. We should do the same on crime, jobs, tort reform, health care etc. We can always find a date when I sent a message to Congress and stress the number of days they've had it with no action. The more specific I can be on these, the better. Comparisons to Desert Storm are firstclass. There is still the feeling of pride in our accomplishments on Desert Storm, although Andrew Rosenthal may not get it.

These are just some thoughts on day two of the campaign.

The President today recognized the volunteers of the Jersey Battered Women's Service (JBWS) of Morris County, New Jersey, as the 874th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. JBWS volunteers provide a safe refuge and a sense of well-being to women and children who are victims of domestic violence.

Originally established as a hotline, JBWS soon expanded its services to include a 24-hour women's shelter and safe, temporary housing for victims of domestic violence. Some 50 volunteers operate several counseling and rehabilitation programs for abused women and children.

Since 1986, JBWS has addressed the problem of domestic abuse by going directly to the source: the abuser. Abuse Ceases Today (ACT), a psycho-educational program operated by men for men, serves many of the husbands of women who seek help from JBWS. Through ACT, they learn to accept responsibility for abusive and violent behavior. Two volunteers, one of whom is a former client, facilitate ACT's group counseling sessions. Three or four groups, with an average size of nine, meet two or three times each week. The program is free and the men are welcome to continue beyond its 26-week term or return as needed. Fifty to seventy percent of the men enrolled in the program are self-referrals, while the rest have been ordered by the court to attend. The program concentrates on education, skill development, and non-violent communication skills.

JBWS also operates a Legal Advocacy Program, in which volunteer legal advocates and lawyers assist with court preparation and provide representation and support for victims. The organization also offers children's services, community education, teen dating violence information, and an outreach program for victims in the community.

Mrs. Warsow, who is also recovering from cancer, participates in four monthly support groups, offering encouragement to over 200 cancer patients. She helps transport patients to chemotherapy treatment, informs them of what to expect from treatment, and provides emotional support.

The President today recognized the volunteers of Turning Point of Roanoke, Virginia, as the 877th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Turning Point offers a safe place to live and a sense of well-being for battered women and their children.

Turning Point, the largest emergency shelter in the state and the only one in Roanoke Valley, opened in 1984 to provide a caring environment for victims of domestic violence. The volunteers offer shelter, food, and counseling to some 30 boarders a night. Residents stay an average of 30 to 45 days, until they have found employment and housing.

Three times a week, Turning Point volunteers lead group meetings that focus on counseling, combatting drug-abuse, and building self-esteem, as well as teaching financial planning, parenting, and job skills. Other volunteers babysit for mothers who are at job interviews, court hearings, or counseling sessions. Hundreds of professionals volunteer their talents and expertise, including attorneys who offer free legal consultations and beauticians who offer makeovers and new hairstyles which enhance the residents' self-esteem. In 1991, nearly 550 volunteers helped 335 women and 425 children at Turning Point.

After the women leave the shelter, the Outreach Program offers them transitional counseling. Turning Point also offers a 24-hour emergency hotline for women who are at home in dangerous situations. Three formerly battered women serve as crisis monitors, offering advice from their own experiences.

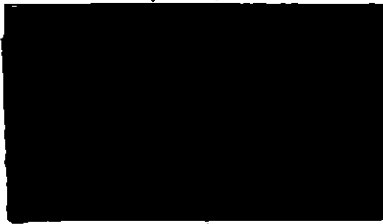

SUBJECT: APEC Education Ministerial

In January of this year, while visiting Australia, you issued an invitation to the Asian Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) Education Ministers to meet here this summer. Never before has there been an APEC Education Ministerial. We've just concluded that Ministerial and related activities, and I want to provide you with a brief report.

The Ministerial was held on August 5-6. Fourteen of fifteen APEC societies attended, Malaysia being absent. The theme of the Ministerial was Education Standards for the 21st Century, one very much related to our AMERICA 2000 effort to develop World Class standards and a voluntary national examination system. The ministerial was preceded by a two-day symposium on the same theme that brought together experts from the same APEC societies.

The meeting resulted in a Declaration agreed to by all APEC participants creating a new APEC Education Forum. The Forum will coordinate joint activities including the exchange of information and people for education related purposes. It identified seven priority areas for cooperative activities.

The Ministerial came at an important time for the United States. Under your leadership, for the first time in the history of our Nation we have begun developing national education standards for all our children -- definitions of what they need to know and be able to do to live, work, and compete in today's world. It was fascinating to find the same conversation in so many societies: what should we be teaching; how do we change our schools so our children can learn; and how do we change in a way that affirms, not weakens, our culture and values.

The Ministerial was an important first step. We'll continue to work with the new APEC Education Forum on issues of mutual concern.

Finally, the Ministers thoroughly enjoyed their dinner at Blair House!

Thanks for your leadership in issuing the invitation and making this possible.

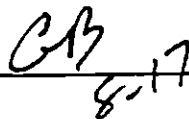

Dear Mr. President:

This past week, I have been in Indianapolis, Minneapolis, Fargo, then across country to Portland and Spokane, and then back across for two speeches in Florida.

I am getting a very good reaction from audiences when I talk about what has been accomplished, rather than what the Democratic Congress is blocking us from doing. Examples that I use are:

- * Farm debt has been reduced \$54 billion since 1984.
- * The four years of the Bush administration have been the best four year presidential term ever for net farm income.
- * Our agriculture exports to Canada are 44 percent higher annually than they were before the Canadian free trade agreement.
- * Our total agriculture exports are 17 percent higher than they were under the previous 10 year average.
- * We are terminating the Farm Credit Assistance Board established in 1987 because it is no longer needed.
- * And, if we include forest products in the region of the country where that is of interest, our agriculture exports to Canada are actually up 63 percent.

People react very positively to these remarks and come up after to tell me that this is what they want to hear -- that something is being done -- and something is being accomplished.

I am now off for California and Nebraska this week with the same message in the agricultural areas.

I have to believe that every department of government has favorable comparisons like this that can be made, and that we need to be talking about our accomplishments, so that people know that we are getting something done.

Fact: People are dismayed and disgusted by what they see going on now.

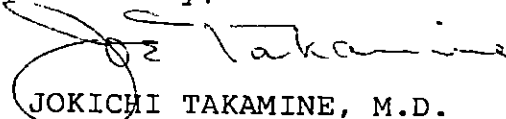

WHERE THE BUCK STOPS

Last week's downbeat unemployment numbers, stunningly at odds with George Bush's earlier upbeat economic forecast, have added to the political woes of the White House. Now that the cold war is over, the president seems unaware of what is happening in America. The foreign-policy emperor has no domestic clothes. Americans see Mr. Bush as a decent and moderate man, but they find him wanting as the nation's chief executive. That's why he continues to sink in the polls.

Bush inherited from Ronald Reagan the notion that government was the problem, but today it is the failure of government and its leader to address our wrongs that is the problem. Recession? Don't worry about it! Critical of economic performance? People haven't realized there is an improvement. Accountability? Blame it on Congress for not passing more tax cuts for the rich. By reiterating these responses, Bush signals that he just doesn't get it, that he does not have an agenda. He says, with astonishing transparency, "I will do what I have to do to be re-elected." He gives the impression that his political survival is above the national interest. We have a deficit of \$400 billion, soaring costs to service it and a national debt that has quadrupled over the past 12 years, placing a hamperlock on the ability to govern. But all that Bush can say is that violating his pledge on taxes was a mistake because it cost him too much politically. What of the national interest?

Bush suggests that domestic issues get special attention "every four years," when he has to run for office. A series of knee-jerk reactions does not add up to a policy. The U-turn on the budget added flip-flop-flip to the political lexicon. Bush also seems amazingly out of touch for a chief executive. His incredulous response to the L.A. riots, which he described as a learning experience, had an echo of President Carter's response to the 1979 Soviet invasion of Afghanistan: that it taught him the true brutality of the Communists.

Thus, Bush comes across as a politician who substitutes campaigning for governing; who uses polling instead of judgment, pandering instead of policies, attacks on Congress instead of real debate. He seems

more worried about losing his job than about the fact that millions of Americans have already lost theirs.

Bush blames others. He blames the media for not giving him credit. He blames Congress. Neither excuse will suffice. Listen to John Sununu, his former chief of staff, who said in 1991: "There's not a single piece of legislation that need be passed in the [next] two years for this president. In fact, if Congress wants to come together, adjourn and leave, it's all right with us. We don't need them."

People in the middle class worry because Bush does not seem to understand their anxieties over the decline in their quality of life. At the same time, there has been a vast upward transfer of wealth to the rich. Alienated Reagan Democrats and middle-class suburbanites are asking: How many times do you have to be hit on the head before you find out who is hitting you? It's hardly surprising that they blame Bush. He promised to continue the five years of prosperity that he claimed as the legitimate heir to Reagan. He is more than 29 million jobs short of the 30 million jobs he promised in 1988. Now, millions of Americans fear for their economic future.

Long satisfied with the status quo, Bush has failed to establish a new direction for the country. Yet, with a straight face, having grown up inside the political system, having been president for four years and vice president for eight, he insists that Washington must be reformed! He seeks to recast himself as the agent of change. The only things he seems to change are his own positions, calling to mind the comment that like the feather cushion, he bears the impression of the last person who sat on it. Even President Reagan was quoted as having said of Bush: "He doesn't seem to stand for anything." Air Force One is now a glider. See which way the wind is blowing, and you will know which way it is coming from . . .

Bush cannot redeem himself simply by attacking other candidates and Congress. The electorate will conclude that the next four years will continue to be marked by stalemate, gridlock and deadlock and will be wasted because Bush does not know what to do. He has yet to offer the public a reason to re-elect him. ■

The President today recognized the volunteers of Susquehanna County Volunteer Literacy Council as the 864th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. The volunteers offer educational opportunities for adult non-readers and contribute to a culture that fosters lifelong learning in this rural county.

Established by 12 volunteers in 1982, the Volunteer Literacy Council was inspired by a founding members who had a relative who could not read. Nearly 200 volunteers give of their time to run the program and make tutoring available to non-readers in the area. In 1991, the program served over 100 adults.

Currently, 134 trained tutors are matched individually with students. The tutoring takes place weekly for one to two hours and ranges from beginning reading to more advanced skills needed for the GED exam or job tests. One volunteer offers English as a Second Language tutoring; others provide mathematics and problem-solving assistance. Each student sets a goal to achieve a certain level of literacy. According to Eleanor Highfield, the Council's Outreach Coordinator, between 50 and 75 percent of the participants successfully reach their goals. Two new readers have even become trained tutors.

Other volunteer tutors include six individuals who work with inmates in the county jail. The Friends of Literacy volunteers are 40 professionals, including lawyers, bankers, and accountants, who offer their expertise free of charge. Nearly 150 other volunteers are among the Family of Literacy, which provides administrative and organizational help to the Council when needed.

The President today recognized Carol and Hurt Porter and the volunteers of We Care About Kids, Kid Care, Inc., of Houston, Texas, as the 866th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Mr. and Mrs. Porter and the Kid Care volunteers offer a sense of well-being to children and families while providing nutritious meals and educational opportunities.

Kid Care, founded by the Porters in 1986, operates a food pantry for low-income families in Houston's public housing projects. The pantry, located in the Porters' home and supported by donations of food from businesses and community members, serves hot meals daily in the summer as well as during the school year. In addition to serving 9,000 meals each month, some 20 volunteers from area companies and colleges teach communication skills and nutritional information to the children and their families.

Mrs. Porter and two volunteer instructors from the Texas A & M Agricultural Extension Service conduct nutrition classes for 12 adults. Participants are taught inexpensive ways to prepare healthful meals. A bilingual volunteer instructor from the Fort Bend Independent School District teaches English as a Second Language classes for 15 adults each week. Students learn to read and speak properly by using practical tools, such as job applications and newspaper articles. During the summer months, the Porters chaperon 50 children on weekly field trips. Local businesses sponsor many of the activities, including a recent trip to the circus for 120 youths and a summer camp for 45 kids.

The Porters devote seven days a week to Kid Care and have developed lasting relationships with many of the families they have served. They are a constant source of support and guidance, and have even found full-time jobs for three mothers.

The President today recognized Community Caring Volunteers of Billings, Montana, as the 868th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. The volunteers provide support and a sense of well-being to mothers and young families.

Founded in 1989, Community Caring Volunteers works with parents before and immediately after the birth of a child to prevent child abuse. Currently, over 30 women volunteer to serve 21 families, most of whom are from low-income neighborhoods.

Volunteers are matched individually with mothers based on similar interests, personalities, or personal histories. Although many of those served are new mothers who need help with basic parenting skills, some have step children or have recently lost a child. Volunteers spend time each week with the mothers and babies, offering support and advice about child-rearing problems, loneliness, and other difficulties. On average, their relationships last for six and a half months, although many remain friends outside the program.

In addition to serving as role models, the volunteers provide parenting information through videos and pamphlets on topics ranging from discipline to how to put on a diaper. When necessary, they make referrals and help their clients fill out paperwork. In 1991, Community Caring Volunteers served more than 50 families.

The President today recognized the volunteers of the Committee Against Domestic Abuse (CADA) of Mankato, Minnesota, as the 870th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Volunteers reach out to battered women and their children, providing shelter, support, and a sense of well-being.

Established in 1981, CADA serves over 1,000 women and children annually through its shelter, Empowerment Group, child care program, and legal services. Some 30 to 40 volunteers support these efforts by giving an average of 20 to 25 hours of service each week.

At the shelter, "relief pool" volunteers answer crisis calls, assist the police, care for children, and help the staff with administrative duties. They facilitate regular support group meetings and discussions for the women and plan monthly outreach events, such as barbecues and movies, for mothers and their children. By running the child care program, the volunteers provide structured activities each week for children, including field trips and other community activities. Some also serve as legal advocates, writing orders of protection, attending court with the women, and offering emotional guidance and support.

Because roughly 80 percent of the volunteers have been battered themselves, they are often able to form strong bonds of friendship and understanding with clients. According to one group volunteer, these close relationships enable them to help battered women "stay in touch with each other and show there is more to life than their bad situation."

By offering battered women opportunities to change their lives, CADA has become a powerful force for good in the community. The organization estimates that between 50 and 60 percent of the program's participants improve their domestic situation after they leave.

The President today recognized the volunteers of Rainbow House of Trenton, New Jersey, as the 869th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. The volunteers offer shelter and a sense of well-being to homeless adolescents who have tested positive for HIV or who have AIDS.

Founded in May 1991, Rainbow House provides a home and supportive care to homeless, abused, and HIV-infected youth ages 12 to 21, many of whom are pregnant or have infants. The shelter, which currently houses four young people and is equipped for as many as eight, offers individual and group counseling, medical care, alternate education, and GED preparation. Residents are referred by state child-care agencies, AIDS testing sites, hospitals, and maternity homes.

Some 28 volunteers, including high school and college students and women affiliated with the Knights of Columbus, befriend and support the residents of Rainbow House. Princeton University students have formed long-term relationships with many of the young people by serving as buddies and mentors. By joining with the residents on a weekly basis to attend basketball games and movies, bake cookies, go ice skating, and learn arts and crafts, volunteers help the young people accept themselves, develop self-confidence, cope with the physical and emotional difficulties of their illness, and maintain a positive outlook.

SUBJECT: Interstate Branching

This is a follow-up to your recent conversation with Lud Ashley on this subject.

A Group of six large regional bank holding companies, led by NationsBank, is still pushing a compromise on interstate branching. That effort had died down a couple of months ago, but now seems to have been at least partially resurrected.

The group claims to have struck a deal that will bring the insurance industry on board, and they are now soliciting the support of other bank groups, such as the ABA and the Independent Bankers. To the best of my knowledge, these groups have not yet taken a position on the recent proposal. As you know, Lud's group is opposed, and there'll still be opposition from others such as the securities industry.

There was some push to have a mark-up on this proposal in the House before the August recess, but Chairman Gonzalez is resisting, so it probably won't happen.

Treasury is staying out of the fight at the moment, awaiting the reaction of the ABA and the independent bankers. Treasury is properly giving a higher priority to your bill to roll back the regulatory excesses of last year's FDIC Improvements Act. That bill now has 25 co-sponsors, a mix of Members from both parties in the House.

I'll follow all of this for you when Congress returns in September.

Dear Mr. President:

It is with pride and a sense of accomplishment that I submit my resignation to you as Secretary of State effective August 23. It is also with a sense of gratitude to you, Mr. President. Gratitude because you have placed great trust and confidence in me and do so again by asking me to work with you to build a safe, strong America at home and abroad. Gratitude, also, because you gave me the high honor of serving you to shape American foreign policy during a period of extraordinary and revolutionary change.

I have little doubt that when we look back on these last three years and seven months, we'll understand we've lived through a fundamental watershed in world politics. In this short period of time the strategic verities of the post-World War II era were shattered. The Cold War ended. The division of Europe was undone. The Soviet empire collapsed, and the Soviet Union dissolved.

Changing those verities created new hopes and new possibilities -- and what was unthinkable before became achievable through very active and dynamic diplomacy that you mandated. Germany was unified in NATO, something we were told at the time was impossible. Central America has been transformed through a policy based on free elections and peaceful reconciliation of long-standing differences. A peaceful settlement has been developed for Cambodia. Iraqi aggression was defeated in Kuwait with an unprecedented coalition that would never have been possible in the bipolar world of the past. And, in the aftermath, in defeating Iraq and rescuing Kuwait, it became possible to break the historical taboo and produce Arab and Palestinian partners to talk peace with Israel.

Nothing was inevitable, and managing these historic transformations both to create new possibilities and to ensure a peaceful transition to a new, vastly safer world required very active American leadership. You provided it, Mr. President.

Working with Presidents Yeltsin, Kravchuk, and others, we managed to help shape a peaceful dissolution of the Soviet Union and empire; to ensure there would be no new nuclear states emerging from the breakup of the USSR; to assure that tactical nuclear weapons would not fall into dangerous hands; and to negotiate ground-breaking START and CFE agreements that drastically reduce both nuclear and conventional arms.

On top of this, Mr. President, we were able to conclude the most far-reaching understanding on strategic arms reduction in history at your June Summit with President Yeltsin. We came into office with the US having 13,000 strategic nuclear arms and the Soviets about 11,000. Your agreement with President Yeltsin means we will slash those levels by over 75 percent by the year 2003. In addition, we will eliminate all MIRVed ICBMs, the most destabilizing strategic weapons.

There is still much to be done and new international challenges to deal with. The tragedy that is unfolding in the former Yugoslavia is a reminder of one of the new dangers in the world caused by the explosive mix of extremist nationalism and ethnicity in politics. As you have led the way in ending the Cold War, so too we must lead in building a new peace, developing the collective means to defuse these kinds of conflicts before they begin; contain those where they can't be defused; and employ peacekeepers and monitors to preserve ceasefires and ensure conditions for peacemaking. That's a tall order, and it will require American leadership. But it will be necessary if we are to mobilize the coalitions that can be useful and effective in dealing with a challenge we and others are sure to face in the years ahead.

Active American leadership will also be necessary as we continue our efforts to stop and undo the proliferation of nuclear, chemical, and biological weapons and the missiles that might deliver them. This will increasingly dominate the arms control agenda of the 1990's.

Of course, we will also have to continue accelerating our efforts to promote free markets and free trade and facilitate the work of American businesses and investors overseas. Free markets and free trade do not simply reflect our values, they promote our economic growth and well-being. The more we open markets to our goods and services internationally, the more we will expand economically and generate good jobs domestically. NAFTA can be a model for the future.

I look forward to supporting your efforts to more strongly integrate domestic and foreign policy and to build our strength here at home. Mr. President, we have been friends for 35 years, and I have always known you to finish the jobs you've begun. Work remains to be done and I look forward to helping you complete the job you started.

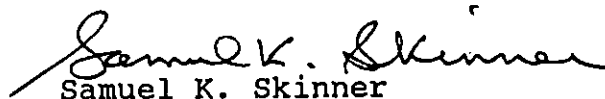
Dear Mr. President:
