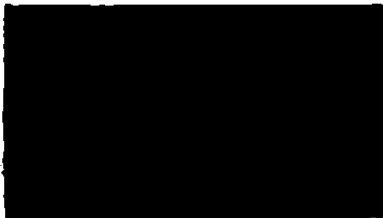

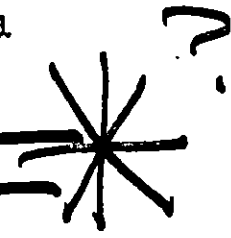

I greatly appreciate your assistance in having President Bush sign the attached document.

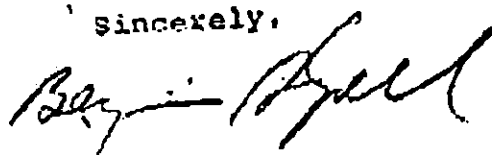

If not dated, then it could perhaps be argued that it was signed after the President left office- and therefore not really signed during the Columbus 500th anniversary. 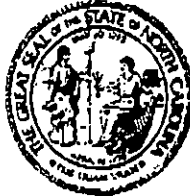

Dear Mr. President:

As you prepare your budget for FY 94, I ask that you keep in mind a project that is of vital importance to North Carolina.

In 1973, the Corps of Engineers supposedly completed a bar deepening project in the Cape Fear River near the Port of Wilmington, North Carolina. Congress authorized the channel to be deepened to 40 feet. Due to a surveying error, the channel was deepened only to 38 feet. The Corps now recognizes their error and has scheduled the deepening for FY 98. The federal share is estimated at \$38 million; the State share is estimated at \$12 million. The Corps indicated, however, that if the money were appropriated this year for FY 94, they could proceed with the project.

I am requesting that the money be allotted in the coming fiscal year's budget. A recent grounding there drove home the immediate importance of correcting the Corps' error for the safety of those vessels using the Port of Wilmington and for the continued economic viability of the Port.

Thank you for your attention to this matter.

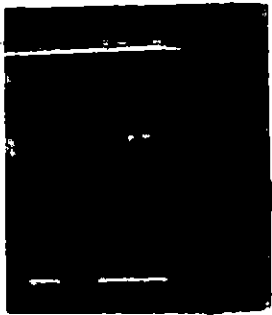

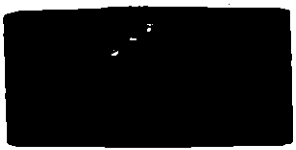

Dear Mr. President and Mrs. Bush,

I have just finished listening to your speech this evening with a very heavy heart and tearful eyes. I am a sort of quiet campaigner. I guess. I try to teach my children correct principles and help guide them in their political decisions. (I think a mother's influence is quite often underestimated.) My youngest daughter (14) watched the results of the election with me tonight and we both wept at your loss, and our great country's loss.

I may be babbling, but I thought it important that I write to you tonight and let you know how much our family has appreciated your leadership. My husband is a Flight PA with the Army, stationed at Ft. Riley, Kansas. He served with valor in Desert Storm, and was decorated for his bravery and service. (He is in HHF 174 Cavalry, -- the first part of 7th Corps to cross the berm into Iraq.) He has been with the military for some 20 years (with time in Reserves), and we have been through a Democratic President who thought the military was a superfluous organization. Frankly, we are frightened by Bill Clinton; for ourselves and our job, and especially for the nation and the world. Thank you, Mr. President, for keeping us strong as a nation and for giving us back our dignity. The world began laughing at us during Jimmy Carter's time, and you helped to restore us as THE world leader. People and nations will always look to us for leadership, and I only hope and pray, we can still deliver.

If I may just tell your wife something. I think the whole earth loves Barbara Bush. Because of you and your husband asking us as a nation to volunteer to help our communities, and because of your push for literacy, I for the first time in my life last summer, volunteered for something outside of my church or the children's schools. I learned how to become a reading tutor and had a very rewarding summer teaching a fellow to read and comprehend. 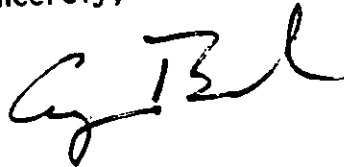
Dear Henry:

Could we set a time in the next weeks to meet?

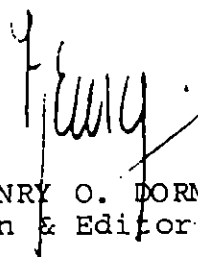

FOOD LABELING REGULATIONS

This presents for your decision three issues concerning food labeling regulations that must soon be issued by the Secretary of Health and Human Services and the Secretary of Agriculture. The Secretaries and interested agencies have striven over many months to reach agreement on the issues raised by these complex and important rules. All of these issues have now been resolved except for three: (1) the most appropriate definition of the term "light;" (2) the scope of regulation of restaurant foods; and (3) the format of the nutrition label for food products. The Secretaries have not been able to agree on these issues. The issues are therefore presented for your decision.

Background.

The Nutrition Labeling and Education Act (NLEA) requires the Secretary of Health and Human Services (HHS) to issue regulations governing labeling of food products. The NLEA provides that the regulations must require food products to carry a nutrition information panel on the label. The regulations are also required to define the types of comparative nutrition claims that can be made on the label (such as "light," "low" or "reduced").

The NLEA only applies to foods regulated by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Products containing more than a de minimis (two percent) meat content are regulated by the Department of Agriculture (USDA). Secretary Madigan has proposed a labeling regimen for meat food products that parallels the HHS proposal for other food products. (The food processing industry and consumer groups prefer a common rule for both types of products.)

The food labeling rules as a whole encompass 29 distinct HHS rules and one parallel USDA rule. The HHS rules alone will consume over 1,000 pages in the Federal Register. The regulations are expected to have a major impact on nutrition and health, as well as impose significant costs in the food production, food marketing and restaurant industries.

The NLEA contains a "hammer provision" that required the proposed rule (issued by HHS one year ago) to become the final rule automatically if the final regulations were not issued by November 8, 1992. The hammer fell when the final rule was not issued by that date. The proposed rule now given final effect by the hammer provision is not supported by either HHS or USDA or any other agency. When the three issues presented here are resolved, the final regulations will be published and supersede

the proposed rule. However, it may be necessary to have a short public comment period before the final regulations are published. Whether or not a comment period is provided, expedition is warranted since there is a strong public interest in issuing these important rules as soon as possible. (The regulations will have a delayed effective date to allow for planning and implementation.)

Issues For Decision

Issue One: Use of Term "Light"

✓ The NLEA requires the issuance of rules that provide definitions for a variety of comparative claims such as "less," "low" and "light." The NLEA prohibits use of these terms unless the food product to which they refer meets the definitions. Both USDA and HHS agree that the definition of "light" should refer to a minimum reduction of two key elements: fat and/or calories. The following issues remain concerning the definition of "light".

| Sodium. USDA proposes that the term "light" also may be used when the product contains 50 percent less sodium. HHS maintains that only reduced fat and calories, and not reduced sodium, should qualify a product as "light." HHS argues that the term "light" is such an important signal to consumers that it should apply to only the most important elements of a food. HHS believes that the value of the term "light" would be diluted by allowing it to refer to a reduction only in sodium, an element HHS believes is less important than fat or calories. HHS also points out that there are other terms available to describe lower salt products, such as "low sodium" or "lightly salted."

✓ USDA argues that, in view of the importance of sodium consumption to many consumers, usage of the term "light" in connection with sodium should be permitted. USDA also urges that use of "less" and "lower" to describe salt content would not be as valuable as a descriptive term as the term "light." To meet HHS' concerns about retaining the value of the term "light," USDA proposes that when a product has only reduced sodium it must be identified as "light in sodium," although USDA also proposes that "light" may in such cases also be in the name, such as "light bologna." USDA also proposes that the words "in sodium" be of equal size, to avoid disproportionate emphasis on the term "light."

Decision:

_____ HHS position: "light" refers only to fat or calories.

_____ USDA position: "light" refers to fat or calories, or sodium if labeled "light in sodium."

_____ Other: _____

Fat and/or Calorie Reduction. USDA would define "light" as one-third less in calories or 50 percent less in fat. HHS would define "light" the same way, except that, for a food that has more than 50 percent of calories from fat, only a 50 percent reduction in fat (not one-third less calories) would qualify as "light." HHS argues that products should not be labeled "light," even if the calorie count has been reduced one-third, where fat content remains the dominant source for the remaining calories. HHS points out that descriptive terms are available in this situation other than "light," such as "reduced calories." USDA believes that consumers are provided useful information by use of the term "light" where calories have been reduced by one-third, even if fat remains the dominant source of calories (which will be the case for many meat and poultry products). USDA is concerned that the HHS definition will serve as a disincentive for producers to develop meat and poultry products that reduce calories by one-third even though the fat in those products cannot be reduced by 50 percent.

Decision:

✓ _____ HHS position: one-third less calories or 50 percent less fat; 50 percent less fat required where more than 50 percent of calories are from fat.

_____ USDA position: one-third less calories or 50 percent less fat.

_____ Other: _____

Printing of Factual Information. HHS believes that the defined term "light" (as well as others such as "reduced" or "low") should be the only permitted statements about nutrients. HHS thus would not permit any factual nutrient statements, even if accurate, unless the product also met the requirements of

the terms defined by HHS or the label stated that the product did not meet the terms. For example, if a product did not meet the definition of "low calorie," the seller could not state the number of calories the product contains anywhere (other than on the nutrition panel) unless the product label also stated "not a low calorie product."

HHS contends that allowing use of such information, although factually accurate, would lead to confusion and proliferation of accurate but misleading claims. Others maintain, however, that allowing factually accurate statements will, on balance, benefit consumers. Restricting simple, accurate statements in the market place denies the consumer quick access to truthful information with which to make informed choices on his own. The restriction on accurate statements may also reduce the incentive to make improvements that are not as great as the thresholds set by the terms defined by the regulation. For example, a producer may be less likely to reduce fat in a product by 20 percent if, as HHS proposes, the reduced fat content could not be shown on the product label.

Decision:

_____ HHS position: allow factually accurate nutrient claims, only if (a) the product meets the terms defined by HHS, such as "reduced" or "light," or (b) the label states that the product does not meet the terms.

_____ Alternative position: allow factual nutrient statements without HHS provisos.

_____ Other: _____

Issue Two: NLEA Application in Restaurants.

✓ The NLEA specifically exempts restaurants from its requirement that all food products carry a nutrition information label. However, the Department of Justice has advised, and USDA and HHS agree, that nutrient claims by restaurants are subject to the NLEA. There is no question, therefore, that some regulation of nutrient claims by restaurants is required as a matter of law.

USDA and HHS disagree about the extent to which nutrient claims by restaurants should be regulated. Specifically, the

agencies disagree on (1) whether menus should be covered; and (2) about the scope of regulation of restaurants.

Menus. HHS proposes that all nutrient claims by restaurants be regulated, including claims on menus. USDA proposes that claims on menus be exempted. USDA believes that there would be a chilling effect on provision of information by restaurants, perhaps leading restaurants to provide no health information or to be required to retain lawyers to review their menus. The Department of Justice advises that the NLEA does not unambiguously require that menus be treated as labeling, so some form of exemption for menus may be permitted but that this is not yet resolved. HHS expresses concern, however, about whether exempting menus would be sustained by the courts as reasonable, since menus do contain descriptions of items served by the restaurant. Indeed, menus are the primary and often the only information provided by a restaurant about the food it serves. Moreover, HHS strongly asserts that not covering menus as labeling could undermine its enforcement of all food and drug laws, since it has covered as "labeling" items similar to menus such as pamphlets, signs and placards.

✓ Scope of regulation. To the extent that menus are covered, HHS proposes that a restaurant need only be able to show some "reasonable basis" for the restaurant's nutrient claim on a menu (such as a claim that an item is "low calorie"). HHS also proposes that certain claims on a menu be exempt, such as "light fare" as a description of a category of menu items.

✓ USDA proposes that mitigating measures be added to the HHS proposal. USDA urges adoption of a small business exemption for menus, so that the rules would not apply to the menus of single-location restaurants or chains of ten or fewer restaurants. While the NLEA provides a small business exemption for the requirement to place a nutrition label on all food products, it contains no such exemption for the nutrient claims provisions at issue here. This suggests that no such exemption was intended for nutrient claims, although it should not preclude granting a limited, de minimis exemption, such as an exemption for menus of small restaurants.

✓ As an alternative to a small business exemption, USDA proposes that the "reasonable basis" test of HHS should be only a general guideline, not the sole means of avoiding a violation for small businesses. To the extent of its enforcement discretion, FDA would take action only if the menu is materially misleading and the restaurant personnel preparing the menus knew that the descriptions were materially inconsistent with the guidelines, or knew the actual

composition of the food items described in the nutrient claim was materially different from the item's description. This enforcement guideline would provide some mitigation for small business; however, FDA laws are primarily enforced by state and local governments that would retain discretion to enforce the law in a manner that could weaken the mitigating effect of the standard. HHS opposes a small business exemption and mitigating enforcement measures, even for chains of ten or fewer restaurants. HHS maintains that even such small chains or single location restaurants should be required to demonstrate a reasonable basis for nutrient claims on a menu.

Decision:

_____ ✓ USDA: exempt restaurant menus (to the extent permitted by law)

_____ HHS: regulate restaurant menus

To the extent menus are covered:

_____ USDA: (a) include small restaurant exemption for menus, or

_____ (b) include mitigating enforcement provisions as described above.

_____ HHS: do not include small restaurant exemption or mitigating enforcement provisions.

Issue Three: Nutrition Label Format

Under the NLEA, every food product (except food served in restaurants) must carry a nutrition information panel. The NLEA also specifies the nutrient items that must appear on the panel, e.g., total fat, carbohydrate, cholesterol, etc. The statute requires that the label must be designed so that (a) the public can readily observe and comprehend the information on the label, and (b) the relative significance of the nutrients can be understood in the context of a total daily diet. USDA and HHS agree that the panel should state the amount of each of the listed nutrients that is found in the food, e.g., 13 grams of total fat. There remain two fundamental differences between the agencies, however.

HHS proposes that, in addition to listing nutrients and amounts, the panel should state the total daily amount a person should have of each nutrient (called the "daily value") and the

percentage of that daily total found in the food. (The HHS proposed format is shown at attachment 1.) USDA contends that the total daily amount and the percentage for each nutrient should not be listed on the panel; instead, only general dietary guidelines would be stated in a footnote. (The USDA proposed format is shown at attachment 2.)

The two differences between HHS and USDA are thus whether a daily reference value should be shown, and, if so, whether the percentage of the value should also be shown. HHS argues that showing a total daily amount and a percentage that the food supplies of the total daily amount enables consumers to understand the relative value of a serving of the product to their total diet. Without this relative value information, HHS maintains, the consumer would not know the significance of a particular amount of a nutrient.

Moreover, according to HHS, public health research demonstrates that percentages have a utility to the consumer. Use of a percentage, HHS believes, allows consumers to take advantage of the information provided in a practical way, permitting them to make their own choices quickly and effectively.

USDA believes, however, that the HHS approach excessively regulates or prescribes the diet, and that the USDA proposed label is less confusing and more informative. USDA argues particularly that by requiring that a single percentage of daily value be shown for a nutrient, HHS must base the daily value on a single average diet (set by HHS at 2,000 calories per day). USDA asserts that any one daily value level is incorrect for most of the population, as shown by the fact that only 25 percent of the population has a dietary need at or below the 2,000 calorie level.

HHS replies that the 2,000 calorie level is justified because it errs on the side of a lower, rather than a higher intake of fat. HHS also asserts that it would be inappropriate to use a range of calorie intake levels, rather than a single level (such as 2,000 calories). While use of a range would take account of the range of dietary needs in the population, HHS believes that consumers would, unjustifiably, tend to place themselves in a higher part of the range, and thus to consume higher amounts of fat and calories.

During discussions on this issue, a third, compromise option was developed. It is shown at attachment 3. Under the compromise option, daily values are indicated, as HHS seeks. However, instead of a single value (as proposed by HHS), a range of daily values is shown. A percentage of daily value is

not shown, so all information is in the same unit, making it easier to follow. (The format also uses the HHS footnote that explains daily value and the USDA format information showing equations of grams of a nutrient and calories.) This proposal combines the USDA proposal to eliminate the percentage and the HHS proposal to include daily values, and resolves the one-size-fits-all, single daily value problem by showing a range of values. Inclusion of daily values would permit consumers to evaluate the food product in terms of their total daily intake of food. Elimination of the percentage enables a range of daily values to be displayed, allowing consumers to more adequately relate the information to their own situations.

Decision:

- _____ USDA format: content disclosure alone
(with dietary guidelines).
- _____ HHS format: content disclosure, single
daily value and percentage of daily value.
- _____ Compromise format: content disclosure,
range of daily values, all in the same unit
(but with no percentage).

He struck a resonant chord with a voting public tired of business as usual and alienated by Republican negative campaigning and talk about so-called family values.

At the New York convention, Clinton emerged as the leader of a new, moderate Democratic Party, which severed its ties to the old special interest groups. Together with his appealing young running mate, Al Gore, with whom he formed an instant, palpable bond, he was the candidate of the baby-boom generation. While George Bush rejected MTV as a show for "teeny boppers," Clinton was communicating his message of change to the new generation at Arsenio Hall. In the debates, both Clinton and Gore proved themselves as masters of Oprah-style television, which transformed this year's campaign. By comparison, George Bush seemed listless, tired, looking at his watch, as if to see when the ordeal might be over. His jibes at "Mr. Ozone" rang hollow, like notes on an untuned piano. In the closing days, Bush began to fight a bit, thanks to prodding by James Baker, who left his post at the State Department to attempt an emergency rescue. But it was too late for even Baker to save him.

The future lies ahead. As the torch is passed, the new president faces a changed world—and a changed America. With the fall of the Berlin Wall and the collapse of the Soviet Union, a revitalized Democratic Party will have to meet the challenges ahead with all the vigor—and glamour!—of that young challenger thirty-two years ago.

A trace of self-pity crept into President Bush's stump speeches as Armageddon neared. In Columbus, Ohio, on October 28, he complained, "This has been a terrible year." By the next day the year had gotten worse. Appearing on public television in Grand Rapids, Michigan, for an "Ask George Bush" session, he offered a long lament. "This has been the ugliest year I can ever remember in terms of politics," Bush said. "It has been terrible.... Why in God's name would anybody in his right mind want to be in this arena, when anybody can take a cheap shot at you? And it's the worst." On election eve, November 2, he declared at an airport rally in Louisville, Kentucky, that this was "probably the worst year of my life."

Bush can drop the "probably" now. On election night, his dream of matching Harry Truman's upset in 1948 dashed, Bush grew palpably depressed. He talked by phone with Vice President Dan Quayle—Bush was in Houston, Quayle in Indianapolis—to coordinate their concession statements. But the conversation was perfunctory, almost mechanical. And when he delivered his short speech congratulating Bill Clinton, he stumbled a half-dozen times over simple words. He looked awful. And why not? The election brought his worst fear to life. The voters weren't anti-Republican or anti-incumbent. The GOP lost but one Senate seat and gained in the House. And unless you consider Republican Senator Bob Kasten of Wisconsin and Democratic Senator Terry Sanford of North Carolina, no prominent incumbent was ousted. Except Bush. The electorate, it turned out, had one thing on its mind: giving Bush the heave-ho.

As one who thought a Bush upset was possible, I should have known better. Bush desperately wanted a second term in the White House. Just as desperately he didn't want to run another campaign. He never had his heart in the race, not the way Clinton did. O.K., his ego was engaged, but that's different. Bush's ambivalence permeated his campaign: it was undisciplined, unfocused and unattractive. He proclaimed time after time in the final days that he'd "talk trust" and "talk character," though the "national talking-head media" don't like it. "There's no reason my holding back anymore," Bush said in Akron, Ohio, on November 2. But, in fact, he held back.

During the weekend before Election Day, phone calls were exchanged furiously between Air Force One and Air Force Two, Quayle's plane. The subject was the "Tower test." This is what Quayle and his chief of staff, Bill Kristol, called the standard used by Democrats to deny John Tower confirmation as secretary of defense in 1989. They argued that Tower's disheveled private life, including bouts of womanizing, disqualified him. Quayle applied the test to Clinton in an appearance in Denver, Colorado, on October 30. He cited the words of Democratic Senator Tim Wirth of Colorado. "Everybody has a right to behave the way that they want in their own private lives," Wirth said in 1989. But "there are also times when what you do as an individual sets an example." Tower didn't set a good enough example to be defense secretary, Wirth concluded. Quayle argued that Clinton didn't set a good enough example in his private life to be president.

Quayle first called James Baker, the White House chief of staff, in hopes of prompting Bush to raise the Tower test. Baker was intrigued. Air Force One called back later to get a string of old quotes by Democratic senators about Tower's private life. Bush was primed, but he didn't fire. Instead, campaign manager Bob Teeter called Quayle and urged him to repeat the Tower test at his next appearance. Quayle complied, raising it at a press conference in Chicago. But the press was largely ignoring him by that time. The Tower test never caught on. Nor did the story alleging that allies of Clinton's seized the only copy of his ROTC file in 1974 to

keep it from public view. Bush mentioned this fleetingly on November 1, then dropped it.

Perhaps Bush was too fastidious, but I think not. Actor Bruce Willis joined Bush at some rallies and began his brief remarks with this crowd-grabber: "I'm pissed off." Bush wasn't campaigning on upbeat themes either. His attacks on Clinton and his running mate, Al Gore, were shrill. "You know why I call [Gore] Ozone Man?" Bush asked a crowd in a Detroit suburb on October 29. "This guy is so far off in the environmental extreme, we'll be up to our neck in owls and out of work for every American. This guy's crazy. He is way out, far out. Far out, man."

This was pure Bush, adopted after he bombed in the second debate in Richmond, Virginia, on October 15. His first words to aides as he left the stage were, "Who got me into this?" Bush decided to brush aside his handlers and say what he wanted in stump speeches. He spoke longingly of his days after politics when the handlers will have "vanished." Bush "was like a pitcher, waving off the catcher's signals," said a White House official. For the remainder of the campaign, he delivered two high-toned speeches (one to Ace Hardware store owners, the other to Kentucky Fried Chicken franchisees). All the others were free-wheeling assaults on Clinton. The only zinger he abandoned

on advice of handlers was the reference to Clinton and Gore as "bozos." Both a focus group and Barbara Bush were turned off by that. So Bush, in his umpteenth appearance on "Larry King Live," apologized for using the word.

Even when it behooved Bush to go positive, he stuck with the attacks on Clinton's trustworthiness and character. The crowds loved them. A speechwriter, Dan McGroarty, made a heroic effort to persuade Bush to wind up the campaign with serious speeches touting his domestic proposals. McGroarty didn't have an opportunity to talk to Bush directly ("face time," as Bushies call it). So he recruited intermediaries, first Texas Bush-Quayle coordinator Jim Oberwetter, then Ray Siller, a

joke writer and Bush pal who met with the president occasionally during October. Neither made any headway. Bush stayed negative.

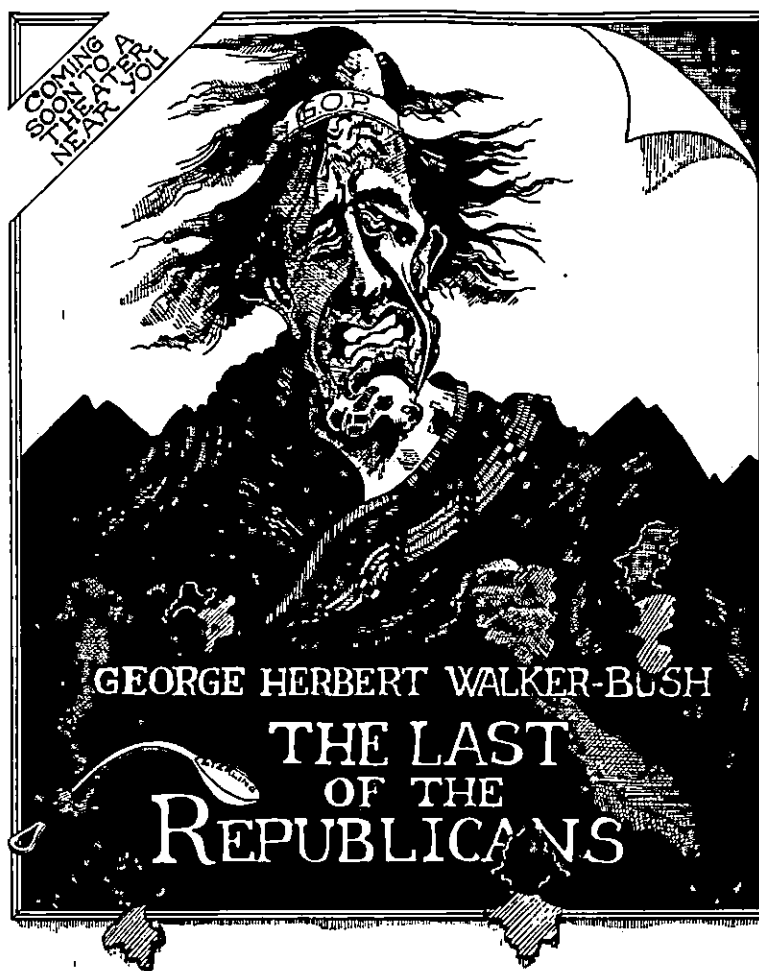
The logical step for Bush would have been to trumpet his economic message: tax cuts, spending cuts, deregulation, legal reform. It was essentially Jack Kemp's economic growth message, though, and Bush is no Kemp. He was uncomfortable emphasizing it. And Baker and Richard Darman, the budget director and campaign strategist, had no confidence in Bush's ability to drive home economic themes. In August Kemp met with White House officials to urge the president to stress tax

cuts, etc. Darman's response, as quoted by a participant in the meeting, was revealing: "You've got to remember this is a 68-year-old man and he can't change his thinking on these things." In other words, Bush had embraced Kemponomics but didn't believe in it enough to make it the focus of the campaign.

Ted Forstmann, the Wall Street takeover artist who'd flirted with Ross Perot, got a similar impression. He conferred with Baker in early October and signed up as a co-chairman of the Bush campaign. He concluded that Baker didn't think Bush could carry the economic theme. "I think this is a guy who doesn't have much confidence in his boss," Forstmann told an associate. Confidence may not have

been justified. Bush showed no inclination to defend any economic decision he or Ronald Reagan had made.

Like Bush, Baker was torn about the campaign. "He found it hard to get his hands dirty after being secretary of state," says a senior White House aide. Baker never visited Bush-Quayle headquarters, only four blocks from the White House. GOP Representative Vin Weber of Minnesota, another Bush co-chairman, found Baker aloof from the campaign nitty-gritty. In their conversations, Baker talked about policy. He almost never granted press interviews, though Baker is skillful in spinning reporters. Following the first debate in St. Louis, however, Baker was questioned by Bernard Shaw on CNN. Baker insisted that he was White House chief of

GOOD RIDDANCE

Well, we asked for it. The decisive victory for the Clinton-Gore ticket, as our colleague TRB elaborately details it this week, is grist for glee. On this Wednesday morning, as we go to press, we might as well let rip the sublime emotions that now surge through the veins. Good riddance to George Bush, to his negligence, recklessness, and cynicism. Good riddance to his incompetent excuse for a foreign policy, to his ignorance and avoidance of the social ills of our country, to his failed economic agenda, and to his incoherent verbiage that sensible people had to accept as public discourse for four long years.

And good riddance to James Baker, whose desperate alliance with the clueless Bush failed, even with the most dextrous of campaign tactics, to perpetuate his hold on power. And good riddance to the entire throng of gray mediocrities that peopled this administration: to the bloodless Brady and Skinner, Darman and Boskin, and the sanctimonious Tutwiler and odious Sununu. Good riddance too to all the fanatical hangers-on, whose loyalty to Bush was paper-thin, but whose disproportionate power within the Republican coalition allowed them to poison the atmosphere in this country for the last twelve years: to Helms and Buchanan, Dan-nemeyer and Bennett, Gingrich and Dornan. The list of clods, mediocrities, blue-haired bigots, egomaniacs, suck-ups, empty suits, and do-nothings goes on and on. Good riddance to them all. They now have virtually nothing, except a mediocre Supreme Court, to perpetuate their fantasies of being in the "mainstream" of America.

This Democratic victory came from the hands of a new Democratic coalition. It was framed some time ago by the beleaguered stalwarts of the Democratic Leadership Council, who understood, as we have long argued, that the Democratic Party had to return to the center of American politics and society if it was to have a hope of regaining power. It was a victory won by an economic

agenda that talked about the practical needs of most Americans—education, retraining, health care—and clearly endorsed the free market as the key to economic growth. It explicitly rejected entitlement liberalism and rebuked Jesse Jackson's vision of the Democratic future. It won back many Americans who had long defected to Republican ranks: white males, Southern Protestants, the young. But it also managed to bring into the victorious coalition the votes and hopes of many in old Democratic ranks: working women, blacks, Jews, Catholics, and gays. And it held out the fragile hope that the barriers of race, gender, and sexuality could be overcome not by the cynicism of the right or the balkanization of the left, but by the integration and opportunity of the liberal center. This, then, was more than a victory of one old side in the Democratic Party over another. It was a synthesis of the new ideas of the last twelve years and the old alliances that give meaning to the Democratic Party's once-faded claim to represent middle America and those who live outside the circles of the powerful and the affluent.

Soon this flush of victory will wear off. But we should remember the feeling of this moment. It is one of both euphoria and a sudden sense of responsibility. There will be many moments in the next few years in which a soft cave and an easy compromise could betray the hope for a reformed, energetic liberalism. For our part, the excuses are over. The easy days when we could attack Republicans with impunity and skewer Democrats with equal zeal are now gone. Finally, we have something to answer for, and we are glad of it. In the coming months and years, we will scrutinize the new administration and pressure it to live up to the faith its supporters have placed in it. But we will do so as allies and friends.

For now, though, we'll celebrate; and give Bill Clinton and Al Gore the credit they so richly deserve. •

SUBJECT: Medal of Freedom

Pursuant to our discussion, it would be appreciated if you could call Ambassador Shlaudeman to advise him of the President's desire to award him the Medal of Freedom on December 11th. His home number is 333-0620.

The tradition has been that it's necessary to be personally present to accept the Medal which is awarded at an East Room Ceremony followed by a State Room luncheon. Assuming Ambassador Shlaudeman is available to accept the Medal, the Social Office will follow up with the details on the number of guests he can invite (typically around 5) and the specifics on where and when. Also, although the Press Office will make the official announcement on the recipients of the Medal a couple of days before the event, the selectee can advise family and friends of the honor.

Finally, attached are a paragraph on Ambassador Shlaudeman and a paragraph on the Medal of Freedom to facilitate your call.

Addendum: FYI -- The President is making a number of the calls, and it turns out that Ambassador Strauss already received the Medal of Freedom from President Carter.

PRESIDENTIAL AWARDS

Listed below are the civilian awards the President issues by law, Executive Order, or on his own initiative:

PRESIDENTIAL MEDAL OF FREEDOM: Originally established as the Medal of Freedom by President Truman by Executive Order 9586 of July 6, 1945, the Medal was re-established as the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Kennedy by Executive Order 11085 of February 22, 1963. It is the highest civil award of our Government. It may be awarded only by the President of the United States to persons who have made especially meritorious contributions to the security or national interests of the United States, to world peace, or to cultural or other significant public or private endeavors. The Medal may be awarded to citizens of other nations and may be awarded posthumously.

The recipient receives a medal and a citation signed by the President.

PRESIDENTIAL CITIZENS MEDAL: Established by Executive Order 11494 of November 13, 1969, for the purpose of recognizing citizens of the United States who have performed exemplary deeds of service for their country or fellow citizens. This is generally recognized as the second highest award of our Government.

The recipient receives a medal and a citation signed by the President.

NATIONAL MEDAL OF SCIENCE: Established by P.L. 86-209 of August 25, 1959, as amended (42 U.S.C. 1881), to provide recognition to individuals who make outstanding contributions in the physical, biological, mathematical, engineering, behavioral, or social sciences.

Not more than twenty individuals shall be awarded the Medal in any one calendar year. The President's Committee on the National Medal of Science receive, on behalf of the President, the recommendations made by the National Academy of Sciences.

The recipient receives a medal and a citation signed by the President.

Born May 21, 1921 in Moscow and Died in 1989. Sakharov was a brilliant physicist, noted as the father of the Soviet hydrogen bomb, before embarking in the 60s on his lifelong pursuit of, first, educational and scientific reform in the Soviet Union, and later, intellectual freedom and a democratic socialism that would bring the U.S. and the former Soviet Union together in cooperative efforts.

Harry W. Shlaudeman *Diplomat* *Recommended by Jim Baker and Brent Scowcroft*

Ambassador Shlaudeman came out of retirement at the President's personal request to serve as the U.S. envoy to Nicaragua and to the newly elected Chamorro Administration. He helped that government in its efforts to achieve national reconciliation, in spite of the Sandinistas' vow to "rule from below." He was the "hero and mainstay" of our Contadora efforts; Ambassador to Argentina during the Falkland War; Deputy Chief of Mission in Chile during the Allende regime; Chief Political Officer during the Dominican coup; at the side of the Secretary of State during the invasion of Czechoslovakia.

Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn *Soviet novelist* *Recommended by B. Gray*

Born December 11, 1918. Soviet novelist and Nobel Prize winner who achieved international fame in the early 60s with his book describing life in a forced labor camp during the Stalin era. Fought in WW2 and later arrested for writing a letter criticizing Stalin. Imprisoned for more than 8 years after which he spent 3 additional years in a detention camp. Rehabilitated in 56, allowed to settle in central Russia where he became a mathematics teacher. He wrote *One Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich* in 1962. The book was a political sensation abroad and in the Soviet Union, and inspired others to write. He was exiled from the Soviet Union on February 13, 1974 and currently resides in Vermont.

Isaac Stern *Musician* *Recommended by Laurie Firestone*

Born July 21, 1920 in Kreminiecz, Soviet Ukraine. Considered to be the first American violin virtuoso. His taste and facility are said to be unsurpassed, and his energy is legendary. He has played as many as 200 concerts in a year, made some 100 recordings, and performed in virtually every major country in the world, although he has refused to play in Germany. He is also credited with helping to save Carnegie Hall from the wrecking ball. Mr. Stern was awarded the National Medal of the Arts in 1991.

Elie Wiesel *Scholar* *Recommended by Shirley Green*

A survivor of the German death camps, the Romanian-born and French-educated author and journalist has been called "the spiritual archivist of the holocaust," and "the messenger of the Jewish dead to the living." The

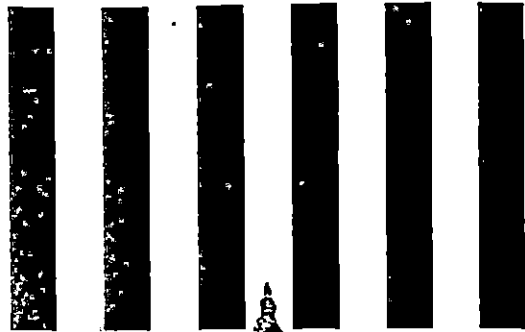

Equally discomfoting, if the parties are unknown to each other, the caller may not be who he/she claims to be.

As a reminder, the Executive Clerk, Ron Geisler, needs to know as soon as possible how President-elect Clinton will sign his name to documents upon assuming office on January 20th.

The most important documents are the parchment Presidential commissions, which are mandated by the Constitution as the means by which the President commissions officers of the Government. They bear the President's name at the top in bold script and are printed from engraving plates cut by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. The commissions must be available to the new President at noon on January 20, 1993. In honor of American Education Week, the President today recognized the volunteers of Vietnamese Social Services' Elders Program of St. Paul, Minnesota, as the 956th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. The volunteers provide educational opportunities and a sense of well-being for newly arrived Vietnamese senior citizens in St. Paul.

To reduce the frustration of initial language barriers and culture shock, Vietnamese Social Services (VSS), established in 1987, offers English as a Second Language (ESL) classes to elderly refugees. Four volunteers each work four hours weekly, tutoring seniors in a classroom setting. Seniors who are uncomfortable with group lessons receive individual or small group tutoring weekly in their homes from one of four other language volunteers. These classes help ease the transition to a new language and lifestyle and help reduce the loneliness, depression, and isolation that many Vietnamese refugees feel after leaving their homeland and moving to the United States. VSS language tutors have helped over 120 seniors learn to read and speak English, as well as to understand American culture.

In addition to the ESL program, VSS also organizes recreational activities for Vietnamese seniors. Volunteers conduct regular cooking classes and take the elderly on recreational and educational excursions. Nurses volunteer their professional skills, checking the seniors' blood pressure and monitoring common health concerns. Volunteers also help seniors with grocery shopping and simple household chores.

In honor of American Education Week, the President today recognized the volunteers of The A+ Coalition of Austin, Texas, as the 957th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Volunteers ensure students better educational opportunities by teaching parents to foster learning and good values in the home.

The A+ Coalition, a partnership between local businesses and the Austin Independent School District, was founded in 1988 to develop an excellent education system in the city by the year 2000. In 1990, it implemented the MegaSkills program, which teaches parents ten skills to instill in their children for success in life and school: confidence, responsibility, initiative, perseverance, motivation, effort, caring, teamwork, common sense, and problem solving. Over 250 volunteers lead a series of five to eight biweekly workshops for parents in more than 50 schools and five businesses. The volunteers are parents who have been recruited by other parents. The program especially targets individuals from low-income families whose children are having difficulty in school.

The workshops, conducted in Spanish with bilingual materials for Hispanic parents, teach parents to become positive academic influences on their children. At each workshop, parents are given "recipes" or home learning activities to teach essential skills and values to their children and to increase interaction and communication. According to Kathy Monte, the Coordinator, after three sessions parents begin to address their children's academic and behavioral problems in new, effective ways.

Since 1990, The A+ Coalition volunteers have served over 8,000 parents. According to the Austin Independent School District, students whose parents participated in MegaSkills workshops improved their standardized test scores over the previous year. In addition to achieving higher scores in reading, writing, and math, these students were involved in a lower number of disciplinary incidents and had a higher rate of attendance and a lower rate of failures than other students in the district.

Colby Friends was established five years ago at Colby College. Each year, 30 to 50 student volunteers are matched with children ages five to eleven, many of whom are from single-parent families or abusive home situations and have behavioral problems. Volunteers meet with their young friends on Sundays and organize structured recreational activities, such as soccer games, craft projects, and holiday parties.

Ms. Vultee, now a fourth year student at Colby, became involved with the program during her first year. She has been the program's coordinator for the last year and is training two assistants to continue her work after she graduates. In addition to a full course load and a part-time job, she spends ten hours a week overseeing the Sunday group activities of Colby Friends.

The Big Brothers/Big Sisters organization of Augusta/Waterville refers children to Colby Friends and provides training to help volunteers recognize signs of child abuse and handle behavioral disorders. First aid training is provided by local paramedics. Jeff Janell, Director of Big Brothers/Big Sisters, feels the program has been very beneficial for the children. Not only do they look forward to interaction with a supportive, older friend, but they often return to the program the next year with their younger siblings. Both parents and teachers have reported improvement in the behavior and attitudes of participating youngsters, and the program has fostered good relations between Colby students and the local community.

Long Island Youth Guidance, a non-denominational, church-based mentoring program established in 1981, enables youth ages 8 to 16 to form solid, nurturing relationships with adult role models. Local churches mobilize some 165 volunteers to provide one-to-one guidance and emotional support for 300 young people each year who have been physically and sexually abused and are at risk of becoming involved in crime.

Volunteers join the youth in a wide variety of activities, including tutoring, baking, and sports. They introduce the youngsters, many of whom have been raised in broken homes where violence and disrespect are the norm, to values such as sharing and respect for adults and their peers. Many volunteers include their young friends in their own family gatherings.

Long Island Youth Guidance also meets the needs of broken, struggling families, focusing primarily on mothers. Volunteers lead discussion groups for these single mothers, teaching them parenting skills, ways to ease loneliness, and techniques for coping with anger to avoid abuse. In addition, volunteers hold monthly budgeting sessions individually with the mothers to ensure they pay their bills and buy nutritious groceries for their children.

The President today recognized the volunteers of Casa de los Niños of Tucson, Arizona, as the 960th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Casa volunteers provide excellent care and a sense of well-being for children in crisis situations and their parents.

The Nation's first crisis nursery, Casa de los Niños, was founded in 1973 by Sister Kathleen Clark to prevent child abuse and promote family stability. Over 200 volunteers provide short-term crisis care to some 50 children from birth to 11 years. Volunteers in the Angel Nursery create a loving environment for young children, many of whom are victims of abuse and neglect.

Some Casa volunteers assist with the children's morning routine, waking them up, helping with breakfast, and preparing them for the day, while others bathe the children, read stories, and tuck them in at night. Other volunteers provide preschool education at the Casa for the toddlers. "Cuddler" volunteers help feed, diaper, and rock the infants throughout the day, providing much needed affection. High school and University of Arizona students spend time with the older children, playing ball and other games after school and chaperoning weekend outings.

Volunteers also serve families outside the Casa. Parent Aide volunteers are trained to provide assistance to troubled families in their homes. The volunteers counsel families on household management, parenting, problem-solving, and communication skills and arrange medical appointments. Volunteers in the Judicial Supervision program assist divorced families referred by the courts, working out custody details to the benefit of their children. Through Therapeutic Supervision, volunteers accompany children on visits to their non-custodial parents to ensure their safety in cases of suspected abuse. At the Casa, one volunteer physician and three nurses provide free physical examinations in addition to other medical care.

Dear Mr. President:

I cannot tell you how sorry Jackie and I are that you didn't win the election. I hope, in time, you do not feel too discouraged. You've done grand things for the country and history will so record. There have been other similar messages. Here is one excerpt "...Put God back in this country. Put God back in your schools, in your government, in your leaders, in every man, woman and child. Then, and only then, will you be the great Nation under God..."

Again, Mr. President, Jackie and I want to thank you for having allowed me to serve you in the Reagan and Bush administrations, to wish both you and Mrs. Bush well, and to convey our belief that you have much yet to offer your country and the world.

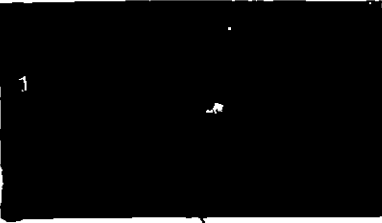

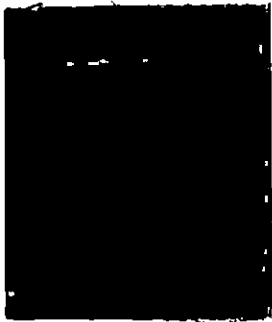
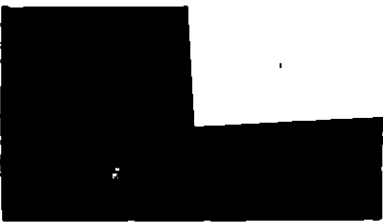

As we discussed, please find attached the lists of employees in the Staff Secretary's Office, Scheduling, the Executive Clerk, Records Management, and Correspondence.

We realize this is a large group. But ours is by far the largest group of employees within the White House Office. You are familiar with the work of our Office and Scheduling; I wanted to elaborate on the work of the other offices.

The Executive Clerk is responsible for all preparing all official documents for the President's signature and transmitting official documents to and from Congress and the agencies. That office is generally agreed to be among the most professional in the White House.

The staff of Records Management, with a reduced workforce, handles roughly double the correspondence and records of the Reagan Administration.

Correspondence includes a number of offices with direct responsibilities in support of the President, such as Presidential Gifts and Presidential Messages. Special Letter Response is responsible for the many thousands of greetings sent in the President's name each year and for letters prepared for the President's signature. Agency Liaison directly helps people who write the President with a problem such as immigration status or Social Security benefits. Mail Analysis handles all incoming mail to the White House and tracks it for handling to the various White House offices.

Each of these offices -- in particular Mail Analysis, Special Letters, and the Mail Room -- have had extraordinary duties this past year because of the extremely high volume of mail from Operation Desert Storm.

In Correspondence, titles do not necessarily correspond with individual responsibilities. Someone listed as a "secretary" may have spent half the year working in the West Wing for Andy Card

or Marlin Fitzwater. The typists have all done super work, above and beyond the call of duty, often on very short notice.

All in all, the volume of work this past year -- and the dedication of all these employees -- has been such that we would hope to have the maximum number of individuals possible invited to one of the Christmas receptions. In that regard, all these employees work in the White House Office, not any other part of the Executive Office of the President. John Gardner and Shirley Green would be pleased to work with your office in accommodating whatever limitations exist. Thanks for your consideration.

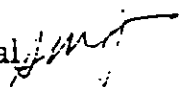

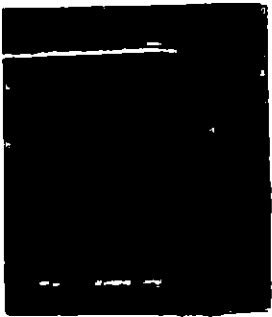

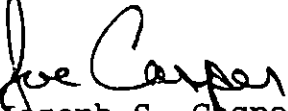

Solomon J. Buchsbaum is Senior Vice President, Technology Systems, at AT&T Bell Laboratories in Holmdel, New Jersey.

A physicist by training, Dr. Buchsbaum has been active in national science policy advisory circles, serving on more than a dozen advisory councils concerned with defense, energy and the state of American science. He has published 50 papers in plasma and solid state physics and has been issued eight patents.

In his current position Buchsbaum is responsible for quality, technology, and process research, government systems, architectural framework for AT&T products, systems and services and R&D in support of manufacturing.

Dr. Buchsbaum joined Bell Laboratories in 1958 and performed theoretical and experimental research in gaseous and solid state plasmas. He became Head of the Solid State and Plasma Physics Research Department in 1961 and Director of the Electronics Research Laboratory in 1965. Dr. Buchsbaum left Bell Laboratories in 1968 to become Vice President in charge of research at the Sandia Laboratories of Sandia Corporation, then a subsidiary of Western Electric Company. He returned to Bell Laboratories in 1971 as Executive Director, Research, Communication Principles Division; that same year he was named Executive Director, Research, Communications Science Division. In 1975 he became Executive Director of the Transmission Systems Division and in 1976, Vice President of the Network Planning and Customer Services Area. Dr. Buchsbaum assumed his present position in May 1979.

Dr. Buchsbaum is currently serving as a member of the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology and as a member of the Defense Science Board. He is also a member of the MIT Corporation Development Committee, the MIT Corporation Physics Dept. Visiting Committee, the Stanford University School of Engineering Advisory Council, and director at Draper Laboratory Corporation, Sandia National Laboratories as well as a trustee of the Rand Corporation. He has been Chairman of the White House Science Council, of the Energy Research Advisory Board and of the Defense Science Board; and a member of the MIT Lincoln Laboratory Advisory Board, the Board of Governors for the Argonne National Laboratory, the Energy Research and Development Agency's Fusion Power Coordinating Committee, the President's Science Advisory Committee, the Naval Research Advisory Committee, the White House Advisory Group on Technical Advances, the Office of Technology Assessment's Health of the Scientific and Technical Enterprise Advisory Panel, Council of the National Academy Engineering and a trustee of Argonne Universities Association.
