MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: PHILLIP D. BRADY *PNB*

SUBJECT: Citizens Medal

Four years ago, at the close of his Administration, President Reagan presented the Citizens Medal at two separate events. The first was in the Blue Room, where he presented the Medal to 35 recipients, including various members of his Administration. (A complete list of the individuals to whom President Reagan awarded the Citizens Medal is attached at Tab A). The second, was in the Oval Office, where he presented the Medal to Senators Dole and Thurmond, and Representative Michel. President Reagan made informal remarks at both events.

We have attached for your consideration at Tab B, a list of candidates that includes the names we provided to you in August. We have also attached at Tab C a list of several additional categories of possible recipients (with illustrative candidates noted) to assist you in your review of this matter. The Chief of Staff may have some additional suggestions with respect to the categories set forth at Tab C but hopefully the attached materials will be helpful to begin the process.

PRESIDENTIAL CITIZENS MEDAL

Dr. Solomon Buchsbaum *Research Scientist/Physicist Recommended by Dr. Allan Bromley*
Solomon J. Buchsbaum is Senior Vice President, Technology Systems, at AT&T Bell Laboratories, Holmdel, New Jersey. He is responsible for quality, technology, and process research, government systems, architectural framework for AT&T products, systems, and services and R&D in support of manufacturing. Dr. Buchsbaum has published over 50 papers in plasma and solid-state physics and has been issued eight patents. Born in Poland, Dr. Buchsbaum received his B.S. and M.S. degrees from McGill University and his Ph.D. degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Dr. Buchsbaum began his AT&T career with Bell Laboratories in 1958, initially engaging in experimental and theoretical research in gaseous and solid state plasmas. During his tenure there, he became Head of the Solid State and Plasma Physics Research Department and Director of the Electronics Research Laboratory. In 1968, Dr. Buchsbaum became Vice President in charge of research at the Sandia Laboratories. After returning to Bell Laboratories in 1971, he served in a number of executive positions until assuming his present position.

Clement E. Conger *Foreign Service officer, Curator Recommended by Wiley C. Grant*
Mr. Conger served as the Curator of the Diplomatic Reception Rooms, Department of State, from 1961 until 1992. He also was Curator of the White House from 1970 to 1986, and Curator of Blair House from 1976 until 1992. Prior to these assignments he served several positions with the State Department, including two tours as Assistant Chief and Deputy Chief of Protocol. He initiated the program of securing prestige furnishings for the State Department rooms by gifts and loans. The collection of fine period American furniture, historic American paintings, and decorative arts is valued at \$50m. It is acknowledged to be the most important collection of 18th and 19th century American furniture in Washington. While at the White House, Mr. Conger was responsible for refurbishing 27 rooms, restoring most of them more authentically than ever before to the elegance they may have had in the first quarter of the 19th century.

Willis Conover *Music Broadcaster Recommended by Congressman Robert Michel*
On January 6, 1955, Willis Conover began a radio program on the Voice of America that would eventually endear him -- and American jazz -- to hundreds of millions of music enthusiasts around the world. Though he is little known in this country, Conover's work over the past 37 years has brought the works of jazz artists to peoples in the now-former Soviet Bloc to Latin America and elsewhere. In turn, he has inspired countless musicians worldwide to study and pursue this distinctly American musical genre. Today, his "Music USA" program captures 100 million listeners. (Incidentally, Conover is a contracted employee at the VOA. He is not, nor has he been, an employee of the United States Government.)

More than a "disc jockey," Conover is a scholarly authority on jazz, whose association with the music and musicians precedes his acclaimed work at the VOA. His efforts during the 1940s and 50s to arrange and promote jazz performances in Washington, D.C. -- which was segregated at the time -- benefitted the careers of Charlie Parker, Thelonius Monk, and others, while helping to break down the color barrier. His commitment to the best in jazz has touched countless lives for the better.

Marjory Stoneman Douglas *Environmentalist* *Recommended by Shirley Green*

Ms. Douglas turned 100 years old in April of 1990 and continues her efforts to educate the public on the importance of the Everglades to the survival of South Florida. She is an author and environmentalist. Her work, *The Everglades: River of Grass*, was published in 1947, and this work catapulted her into fame as an environmentalist. She has actively fought for controls against development that would intrude on the Everglades, claiming that the Everglades were the only thing standing between the beauty of South Florida and the deserts of South Florida.

John Hope Franklin *Educator* *Recommended by John Gardner*

Mr. Franklin is a historian, well known for his work on Black History. He has taught at Howard, Fisk University, Alabama State Teachers College, and Brooklyn College. Mr. Franklin has written numerous articles and many full-length books on Black History. He currently is teaching constitutional history at Duke University Law School.

J. Peter Grace *Businessman* *Recommended by Mary Ann Bellamy*

Mr. Grace is a respected corporate executive who has served on various committees for the U.S. Government. He is deeply committed to charity work. His foundation supports 600 organizations, including some 2,000 colleges. His resume spans about six pages and is largely a listing of the substantial number of humanitarian acts that he and his organization have performed throughout the world.

Donald Henderson *Medical Research* *Recommended by Dr. Bromley and the
president of the National Academy
of Science*

Dr. Henderson is the Dean of the Johns Hopkins University School of Hygiene and Public Health. He directed the World Health Organization global campaign to eradicate smallpox. Under his leadership, more than 700 advisers from 69 countries and over 200,000 national health staff and volunteers worked together on one of medical history's most ambitious undertakings. On May 8, 1980, the World Health Assembly officially declared that smallpox had been eradicated, the first time humanity has succeeded in completely eliminating a disease.

Wilhelmina Holladay *Philanthropist; museum founder* *Recommended by S. Green
and president*

Founder of the National Museum of Women in the Arts, which officially opened its doors to the public in Washington, D.C., on April 7, 1987. Some 20 years earlier, while touring the art galleries and museums of Europe with her husband, Mrs. Holladay discovered to her dismay that, with a few exceptions, women artists were virtually unrecognized by the art establishment and the general public. In the years that followed, Mrs. Holladay collected a substantial number of works by female artists, which form the

basis of the permanent holdings of the National Museum of Women in the Arts. Responding to feminists who insist that women's art should not be segregated, Mrs. Holladay has said that the National Museum of Women in the Arts constitutes "a forum for greater awareness of women in the arts and their contribution to the aesthetic aspect of life." She maintains that the "intent is not to separate art into male and female, but to uncover and celebrate the hidden contribution of women in the history of art." Mrs. Holladay is expanding the scope of the museum in order to expose the public to outstanding work by women in other disciplines, including musical composition and performance, architecture, landscape design, poetry, playwriting, acting, choreography, and dance.

Paul MacCready *Aviation Engineer* *Recommended by MaryJo Lewis
and a host of other individuals*

Dr. MacCready was born in New Haven, Connecticut in 1925. Received his B.S. in Physics from Yale in 1947, a Master's Degree and Ph.D. from Cal Tech. His career has been marked with many exceptional accomplishments, including: named "Engineer of the Century" by the American Society of Engineers; first American to win the International Soaring Championship; conceived the Gossamer Condor and Albatross; developed the solar challenger which flew from England to Paris on solar power; led the AeroVironment-GM team in developing the Sunraycer -- a solar-powered vehicle that won the international solar race across Australia; pioneered "wind forms" for the creation of clean, renewable, energy making it into a commercially viable business during the early 80s. He was also honored with the Charles Lindbergh award, which goes to individuals who have devoted their life in pursuing a balance between technology and the environment.

Bill Mauldin *Cartoonist* *Recommended by David Bates*

An American hero at age 19 with his wartime cartoons (Willie and Joe) from the Italian front. He put a human face on the war. He's won the Pulitzer Prize twice, run for Congress, written 14 books, a couple of plays, and is currently nearing retirement from cartooning.

Arnold Palmer *Sports Figure* *Recommended by C. Horvath*

He is considered one of the greatest golfers ever to play the game. Born September 10, 1929, in Youngstown, PA, he learned the game from his father. After early success as an amateur, Palmer turned professional in 1954 and has since won over 90 tournaments, including 4 Masters. Arnold Palmer's personality and his golfing abilities brought golf to the forefront as a spectator sport and into television.

Rosa Parks *Civil Rights Activist* *Recommended by J. Gardner*

A seamstress who refused to give up her seat on a public bus in 1955 and thereby started a boycott which resulted in the outlawing of segregation on city buses in Montgomery, Alabama. She has been called the "Mother of the Modern Civil Rights Movement."

James W. Rouse *Housing Advocate* *Recommended by C. Gregg Petersmeyer*

For over five decades, Jim Rouse has endeavored to make the American dream of affordable and decent housing a reality for all Americans. In both the private and nonprofit sectors, as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the Rouse Company and as founder and Chairman of the Enterprise Foundation, Mr. Rouse has brought an uncommon commitment and innovative solutions to the housing problems of the poor. In the public sector, he has served as a member of President Eisenhower's Advisory Committee on Housing, President Reagan's Task Force on Private Sector Initiatives, and chaired the National Housing Task Force. Mr. Rouse was also a founder and President of the ACTION (American Council to Improve Our Neighborhoods), President of Urban America, a founder of the National Urban Coalition, and currently serves as a Director of the Points of Light Foundation.

George W. Romney *Civic Leader* *Recommended by C. Gregg Petersmeyer*

George Romney has been an active civic leader, businessman, and volunteer. Throughout his distinguished and varied career that has included serving as three-term Governor of Michigan, Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of American Motors, Chairman of VOLUNTEER -- the National Center, Director of the Points of Light Foundation, and Board Member of the Commission of National and Community Service, Governor Romney has been a tireless advocate of the importance of voluntary community service and the need to link volunteers with community service opportunities.

SUBJECT: Salt Lake City's Olympic Bid Effort

In 1991, Salt Lake City, by a narrow margin of three votes, lost its bid to host the 1998 Olympic Winter Games to Nagano, Japan. The result was a near miracle, due to the fact that Atlanta had unexpectedly won the 1996 Summer Games nine months before, which placed a very difficult burden upon Salt Lake. The President was very supportive of Salt Lake's candidacy (sending 100 letters and later signed Presidential photographs to the members of the International Olympic Committee) in connection with its candidacy.

Salt Lake has continued its pursuit of the Olympic Games and is now a candidate for the 2002 Winter Games which will be decided in June of 1995. The outcome of this election looks very promising. For your information, I have attached a copy of a recent Sport Intern article relating to Salt Lake City's candidacy.

One thing which would be very helpful to their effort would be if the President, as he leaves office, would send a letter to the International Olympic Committee members in Saudi Arabia and Kuwait, asking for their support of Salt Lake's candidacy. In the hopes that the President will be willing to do so, I have prepared and enclosed a suggested letter for these members.

Please let me know if he will be able to accommodate this request. It will mean a great deal to the people in Utah who have been so supportive of the President.

PANORAMA

A heated struggle is in the offing among South Africa's major cities for the nomination as a candidate for the **2004 Olympic Games**. Following **Capetown** and **Johannesburg**, **Durban** has now also expressed its interest. The management committee of Durban city council has already applied for the provision of 340,000 Rand (approx. 120,000 US\$) for the national candidature campaign. The NOCSA will probably name the South African candidate as early as in April 1993. - An eventual candidature by **South Africa** for the 2004 Games is something that is already a matter of concern to the cities bidding to host the **2000 Games**. It is claimed that the losers of the IOC vote in September of next year would hardly have a chance against a South African bid - above all, because the Games have never taken place in Africa. The 2004 Games will be allocated by the 1997 IOC Session.

The so-called Lex Nebiolo has raised an interesting legal question within the Olympic Family: can the IOC President subsequently **exclude** the IOC members which he himself appointed? In principle, yes, the lawyers say. At least at such a time as their mandate as the president of their respective federation runs out.

Japan's Ministry of Finance has been asked to budget a total of **6.6 billion Yen** (approx. 54.12 million US\$) in the government's 1993 fiscal year for the construction of Olympic sports facilities for the **1998 Winter Games** in Nagano. The request was made by the Ministry of Education, Science and Culture which will allocate 50 % of the building costs. Of the total 2.69 billion Yen will be used for building the **speed skating rink**, 922 millions for the **bobsleigh and luge run** and 3.00 billion Yen for the **main hockey stadium**.

In the midst of speculation that **General Electric** is planning to part with **NBC**, NBC sports chief **Dick Ebersol**, also Senior Vice-President of **NBC News**, is being talked about as the future Chief Executive of the **NBC Group**. The "Advertising Age" magazine refers to "conversation in the corridors" suggesting that current NBC chief **Robert Wright** will return to **GE** and be replaced by Ebersol. A spokeswoman for the network ruled out both possibilities and suggested that the background for the rumor was the fact that Ebersol's contract is about to run out. Up to now it was believed that the wealthy NBC sports chief would retire to private life. Speculation

NBC from **RCA** in 1986, **NBC Television** has fallen from 1st to last place among the three major networks both in terms of ratings and profits. Possible buyers of the media group are said to be **Paramount Communications** and **Barry Diller**, the former chairman of **Fox Broadcasting**.

No chance, owing to lack of state support, that is what **Myriam de Rodriguez**, NOC president of **El Salvador**, bemoans. And because this fact is not just valid for his country alone but also for many **Ibero-American** countries and for the states of the **Third World** in general, he wants to bring the subject up at the forthcoming **ACNO Congress** in **Acapulco**. A joint resolution dealing with this matter on the part of all Ibero-American countries is to be prepared for the **1994 Olympic Congress** in **Paris**. De Rodriguez sees a gleam of hope in the readiness of the Salvadorian government to provide financial aid for the **Central American Games** (in January 1994 in San Salvador). It is only to be hoped that now, after the ending of Civil War, the government will make funds available, and that foreign coaches can be employed and sports facilities renovated or newly built.

Ex-mayor Andrew Young has accused the press in Atlanta of evoking a crisis of confidence within the **ACOG** organizing committee. As the result of the media coverage "Our city panicked after Barcelona", the former U.S. ambassador to the United Nations and ex-governor of Georgia told the Board of Directors of the **U.S. Olympic Committee**: "The media gave some Atlantans credit for winning the Games and now we're catching hell for it". In the papers of the future Olympic city in recent weeks critical articles have appeared about the ACOG's apparent failures (**SPORT INTERN** 19/92). It was, however, a fact that the work of the ACOG was "moving along very well", said Young, who is also chairman of the organizing committee. He claimed it could not be the job of the ACOG to solve all the city's problems, but it could demonstrate to the world what Atlanta and its people were capable of.

Only 4.5 million pounds sterling (at present currency exchange rates 7.12 million US\$), that is what **Manchester** has budgeted for its bid campaign for the **2000 Games**. The British Government is contributing two million pounds to the budget. The **Major Government** is however providing 53 million pounds for new sports facilities in Manchester, on the construc-

The NOC of Russia has concluded bilateral treaties with the Olympic Committees of **Armenia**, **Belarus**, **Latvia** and **Tajikistan** governing cooperation on the level of joint sports events, training programmes, sport science and sport medicine. Also planned are the joint use of sports facilities and joint ventures for the production of sports equipment. The four contracts are the first agreements of this kind between former Soviet republics. In the meanwhile other member-states of the **CIS** have signalled their interest in agreements with the **Russian NOC**.

Competing against Salt Lake City for the **2002 Winter Games** is already being widely regarded as a lost cause. After the Swedish town of **Ostersund** had declared that, following two defeats, it would at the earliest submit a bid for 2006, right from the start **Finland's** ski center **Lahti** decided to concentrate its bid on **2006**. The Spanish Pyrenean town of **Jaca** that unsuccessfully bid for the 1998 Games and has plans to bid again, is being advised, at least by **Javier Gomez Navarro**, the Spanish Secretary of State for Sport, not to climb back into the ring before 2006, when the Games will certainly be awarded to Europe once again. **Salt Lake City** already made the best bid for the **1998 Winter Games** in 1991, but lost out to **Nagano** because the majority of IOC members feared worldwide indignation if two years after Atlanta, the Olympic Games were to be awarded to the USA again. It is seen as an expression of embarrassing effrontery, therefore, that **Canada** will probably also submit a bid for 2002; **Calgary** (venue of the 1988 Winter Games) and **Quebec City** are the rivals in the national contest for the bid. The **2002 Winter Games** will be awarded by the 1995 IOC Session in **Budapest**.

Barcelona and Spain will for another 13 years be repaying loans which were taken out to finance the building costs of facilities for the **1992 Olympic Games**. The repayment period originally granted to the Olympic holding company **HOLSA**, 51 % of which was owned by the city and 49 % by the Spanish government, has been extended from 1999 to 2005. The total construction costs amounted to 101 billion Pesetas (about 926 million Dollars), of which 6.5 % is covered by revenue from the sale of apartments in the **Olympic Village**.

The AIPS sport world association was accepted as an associate member of the **AGFIS** association of international sports federations. The **AGFIS** General

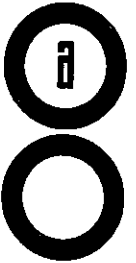

STATEMENT BY THE PRESS SECRETARY

In the past, U.S. national security interests required that measures be taken to control the access of certain foreign flag vessels to U.S. ports and internal waters. The principle objective of this control was to protect U.S. vessels, ports, harbors, and waterfront facilities from sabotage or other activities intended to hazard their safety. In addition, these steps were taken to protect sensitive operations and U.S. defense facilities in waterfront areas from espionage and intelligence.

In light of our evolving relationship with the countries of the former Soviet Union, the following changes have been made to the U.S. port access regime:

- New London/Groton, Port Canaveral, Kings Bay, Port Hueneme, and San Diego, formerly closed ports, are now open for visits by merchant ships registered in the independent states of the former Soviet Union, subject to a request seven days in advance of the desired entry and subject to the concurrence of the appropriate naval authority.
- Charleston, Hampton Roads, Honolulu, Port St. Joe, Panama City, Portsmouth (N.H.), and Pensacola, formerly open on seven days advance request, are now open on three days advance notice.

GLENN RELEASES REPORT OUTLINING MISMANAGEMENT AND ABUSE AT THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES

Senator John Glenn (D-Ohio), Chairman of the Committee on Governmental Affairs, today released a Committee report detailing mismanagement and abuse by the Inspector General (IG) of the National Archives. The report, entitled "Serious Management Problems at the National Archives and Records Administration," is the result of a year-long investigation undertaken by Glenn as part of his ongoing oversight of IG offices.

"While I fully support the work of the IG's in ferreting out waste, fraud and abuse in the government, I will not tolerate misconduct by any IG office," Glenn said. "This is clearly what happened at the National Archives and I see the need for a new IG."

"In my continuing oversight of all IG offices, some serious questions arose about the conduct of the IG at the National Archives. These involved problems with the statutory responsibilities of impartiality, confidentiality and the separation from agency program operations."

"The question of independence, particularly, is critical to the effective operation of any IG office."

Glenn said that the Committee uncovered a number of instances of mismanagement and misconduct at the National Archives, including:

- The Archivist did not exercise care or diligence in selecting the IG for the National Archives. The Archivist virtually surrendered his nondelegable statutory duty to select the IG to the Deputy Archivist.
- Of the 19 eligible IG candidates referred to the Archivist, only one, the eventual choice and former employee under the Deputy Archivist, was interviewed.
- The IG has repeatedly ignored the statutory requirements of impartiality, confidentiality, prohibitions on engaging in agency operations and reporting to or taking supervision from anyone other than the agency head.
- The IG acted as an agency official in overseeing the transfer of archival material into the Reagan Presidential Library.

- The IG often ignored the need to recuse himself from conflicts of interest created by his former employment at the National Archives.

"On the whole, the IG's within agencies are an independent voice fighting to wipe out waste, fraud and abuse. I have worked to place IG's in all government agencies. Last year alone, the IG's uncovered billions of dollars in waste at federal agencies," Glenn continued.

"However, at the National Archives, a situation existed where the IG continued to act in a subordinate position to his previous bosses, the Deputy Archivist and Assistant Archivist. When you have a situation such as this, it is virtually impossible for the IG office to exhibit impartiality in its work."

"I am referring this report to the office of the President, the President's Council on Integrity and Efficiency and the Department of Justice. I call on these offices to take the necessary steps and end these abuses at the National Archives," Glenn concluded.

Phil:

I have mulled over your request for my thoughts on the attached letter.

My response is affected by a number of conflicting emotions. I feel honor-bound to make you aware of them.

I was first hired into the Federal Government by NARA. I have some warm and fond memories of my NARA years 67-75.

When first brought on board, I was part of a trainee corps that included people with whom I have stayed in contact because of friendship and/or government needs. Two of them are John Fawcett, Assistant Archivist for Presidential Libraries, and Claudine Weiher, the Deputy Archivist.

My detail to the White House at the beginning of the Nixon Administration was the stuff that dreams are made of. Had Nixon finished his term I would be an archivist in San Clemente at his Presidential library. I have always half-jokingly told my NARA friends that I remain interested in going to a Presidential library, if one was placed in a part of the country that appealed to my wife and me. Being from Kansas, I have made inquiries on occasion about positions at the Eisenhower Library in Abilene, my first visit there being during Don Wilson's tenure as Deputy Director of the library. Don was kind enough to give my wife and me a tour of the library and later a tour of his Victorian home. I had no further contacts with Don until he became Archivist and had a get-acquainted meeting with Jim Cicconi. I sat in on the meeting along with Jim Hasting, a NARA person who was David Alsobrook's predecessor. Since then, I have had one or two contacts with him, nothing of great substance.

My contacts with John have been quite frequent since he returned to Washington D.C. from West Branch where he spent several years working for the Hoover Foundation.

Claudine Weiher and I have not talked with each other more than a dozen times since I was detailed to the White House.

I don't know Larry Oberg, the Inspector General.

I have met Jim Megronigle, the Assistant Archivist for Management and Administration, on one occasion during a tour of the new NARA facility in College Park.

All of these people, and perhaps others, would be affected if the allegations mentioned in the John Glenn news release have substance.

I am attaching copies of two documents that have made their way to me. One is Don Wilson's "Notice" to all NARA employees, dated November 9. The other is a newsletter of the National Coordinating Committee for the Promotion of History, dated November 5, of which only the first page is relevant. Dr. Page Miller has generally been supportive of Don and of NARA.

Unfortunately, I understand that John Glenn is not the only legislator interested in NARA's management history. Congressman Bob Wise, Chairman of the House Subcommittee on Government Information, Justice, and Agriculture has written a letter to Don asking for answers to a number of questions. Here again, if there is substance to the underlying allegations, Don and several of the NARA managers mentioned above, and others, will be at least embarrassed, or worse.

In conclusion, would there be any merit in contacting Republican members of the two legislative Committees and discreetly inquiring as to the merit of the concerns being raised by Glenn and Wise? I would think that they would have access to more solid information than most other sources. Further, would it be worthwhile to ask Don or someone for copies of the investigations conducted by the FBI, the GAO and the Office of Government Ethics?

As you are probably aware, the Committee on Governmental Affairs of the United States Senate has issued a report containing charges about the management of the National Archives. I am reviewing the report carefully and preparing a formal response to the Committee. I take these charges very seriously and welcome the Committee's recommendation of an independent review.

The Committee has forwarded its report to the Attorney General and to the President's Council on Integrity and Efficiency. I have written a letter to these officials urging action and pledging our support in their review of the issues raised. Although most of these matters have already been investigated or reviewed by the FBI, the GAO, and the Office of Government Ethics, I think the National Archives will be well served by an independent evaluation. I know that the individuals named in this report are anxious too for an independent review of the allegations and a resolution of the issues.

On Thursday, I visited with Committee staff members to begin discussions on these matters. I have placed the Inspector General on administrative leave as a preliminary step to further actions, and named Debbie Guentzel as Acting I.G. until some of these issues are resolved. Upon the conclusion of these reviews, as additional measures are warranted or recommended, I will proceed to take appropriate action.

It is important for all of us in this difficult situation to keep in mind that the history of professionalism and integrity of this institution is larger than these specific concerns. It is a tradition in which you have played a part and of which you can be proud.

In these past few years, we have served millions of researchers at our over 30 facilities nationwide. Through your hard work we have identified, preserved, and made available to the public millions of pages of records which document our nation's history. Millions of visitors to the National Archives in Washington, DC, and around the country

have learned about history and have a greater appreciation for the democratic process thanks to the outreach efforts of the exhibition and education staffs and the field operations. Scholarship has been furthered, books have been written, military pensions have been received, and documents rescued from oblivion thanks to your efforts.

Your active cooperation has made the new archives facility in College Park, MD, the largest and most comprehensive of its kind in the world, a reality.

The staff of this institution is its richest resource and each of you has contributed to our central mission of preserving and making available the records of this nation. I urge you to continue your efforts while we work through the issues raised in the report. I will keep you informed of developments relating to the Committee report.

Congressional Report Outlines Mismanagement at the National Archives. On November 2, Senator John Glenn (D-OH), Chairman of the Committee on Governmental Affairs, released a report, following a year-long investigation, titled "Serious Management Problems at the National Archives and Records Administration," (S.Prt. 102-108). Glenn undertook this study as part of his ongoing oversight of Inspector General Offices. In 1988 Congress amended the Inspector General Act to include the National Archives as one of 33 additional agencies that should establish Inspector General offices. The law required the agency head to select an Inspector General who could act in an impartial and independent manner to detect and prevent fraud, waste, and abuse in the agency. The report focuses on a flawed selection process at the National Archives that gave inflated recommendations to an internal candidate who had neither the training nor experience of many of the other nineteen applicants for the position of Inspector General. The report also details subsequent examples of inappropriate conduct by Lawrence Oberg, who headed the National Archives' new Inspector General Office. The report states that Oberg violated statutory requirements calling for impartiality and confidentiality and a prohibition against engaging in agency operations and taking supervision from anyone other than the agency head.

In a strongly worded conclusion, the report states that "the management of the National Archives and Records Administration has, during the years 1989-1992, reflected a pattern of expedience and control which has been regularly substituted for sound management." The report attributes part of the problem to the U.S. Archivist having "removed himself unduly from management responsibilities" and failing to provide needed supervision. In a series of recommendations, the Committee urges a review of the Archivist by the President; a review of the Inspector General by the Archivist; and a review by the Archivist of the conduct of other National Archives' officials. Some in the historical profession have expressed disappointment that the Archivist, Don Wilson, has not provided needed leadership and has, in many ways, isolated himself and the agency, from users, the Congress, and other agencies. But while there is a desire for stronger leadership, even some of Wilson's critics have voiced concern that this report, coming at the time of a Presidential transition, not lead to the politicization of the position of U.S. Archivist.

The Clinton Presidency. On this second day after the election, there are only very general speculations about the impact Clinton may have on issues of special concern to historians. Historians, who have been frustrated since 1982 by an Executive Order on classification that increased secrecy and ended systematic declassification of records over 30 years old, have received some indications that Clinton would favor increased openness of historical records. There is every intention within the historical community to work vigorously with the Clinton administration for a new federal policy toward access to historical records. The two government appointments of key interest to historians are the Chair of the National Endowment for the Humanities and the U.S. Archivist. There is a year and a half remaining in Lynne Cheney's second four-year term as Chair of NEH. There is no term for the office of U.S. Archivist -- a nonpartisan, professional position. The President may remove the Archivist if the reasons for any such removal are communicated to the Congress.

Amendments to the National Historic Preservation Act Passed in Last Days of the 102nd Congress. On October 30 the President signed into law a major water conservation bill, the Reclamation Projects Act, which in Title 40 included amendments to the Historic Preservation Act. The historic preservation amendments, frequently referred to as the Fowler/Bennett bill for the sponsors Senator Wyche Fowler (D-GA) and Rep. Charles Bennett (D-FL), have been under consideration since 1988. Following considerable revisions, the new law emphasizes the partnership between the National Park Service, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, the National Trust for Historic Preservation and the State Historic Preservation Offices. Yet this law does include provisions that will allow State Historic Preservation Offices, meeting certain standards, to assume additional responsibilities in the identification and preservation of historic properties. The law also provides added protection for properties listed on the National Register and calls for the establishment of a National Center for Preservation Technology within the National Park Service. A section on professional standards was of special concern to historians. Early versions of this legislation focused primarily on the need for professional standards for archeologists. Through the efforts of historians and the support of Representative Bruce Vento (D-MN) the final legislation strengthens the professionalism of all federal employees and contractors involved in historic preservation work. The law describes the role of the Office of Personnel Management in revising qualification standards for a number of disciplines, including history. This section states that "the standards shall consider the particular skills and expertise needed for the preservation of historic resources" and clarifies that there shall be "equivalent requirements" for all the disciplines involved. For many years historians have worked to change the Secretary of Interior's Cultural Resource Management Standards which required only a bachelor's degree for historians but a graduate degree for archeologists.

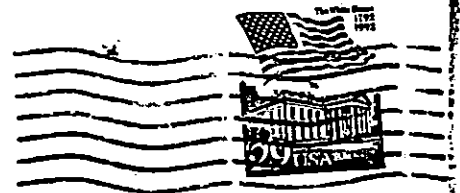
President Signs Law to Open JFK Assassination Records. Last week the President signed into law legislation that will require the public disclosure of most of the government's secret files relating to the 1963 assassination of President Kennedy. However, in a signing statement President Bush asserted that the legislation was not consistent with his "authority under the Constitution to protect confidential executive branch materials and to supervise and guide executive branch officials." The law calls for a five person review board that will serve as an independent agency to ensure and facilitate the review, transmission to the Archivist, and public disclosure of government records related to the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. The Board will have the responsibility of obtaining assassination records from any government office, including the CIA and the FBI, and will have the authority to hold hearings and subpoena witnesses or documents. One provision of the law of specific concern to the President is the section stating that "the President shall make nominations to the Review Board after considering persons recommended by the American Historical Association, the Organization of American Historians, the Society of American Archivists, and the American Bar Association." In response to this portion of the law, the President criticized the legislation for requiring him to consider names supplied by specified organizations. "These provisions," the President asserted, "conflict with the constitutional division of responsibility between the President and the Congress. The President has the sole power of nomination, the Senate has the sole power of consent." After receiving the President's signing statement, Leonard Weiss, Staff Director for the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee, stated: "For the President, at the last second in signing the bill, to suddenly assert authority not in keeping with the letter or spirit of the bill, is to do violence to the legislative process."

Organization of American Historians Passes Resolution on Restricted Access At the Library of Congress. Last Spring the Library of Congress closed the stacks to all scholars and closed the Manuscript Reading Room on Saturdays. Although the scholarly community recognizes that some additional measures are needed to deal with security and budgetary constraints, there is a strong sense that the effectiveness of the Library of Congress as a center for scholarly research has been diminished by the rigidity of restrictions on stack access and the closing of the Manuscript Reading Room on Saturdays. On October 31 the Board of the Organization of American Historians passed a resolution urging the Librarian of Congress to reconsider the current policy and encouraging its members to contact members of Congress. National Park Service Publishes a Directory of Cultural Resource Management Training Opportunities. A Directory of Training Opportunities in Cultural Resource Management (Short Term) identifies workshops, courses, seminars, and classes held from October, 1992 through December 1993 on cultural resource topics offered by federal and state agencies, universities, and other organizations through out the United States. The classes range in duration from one day to several weeks. In addition to the course listings, the directory provides four indexes that enable the reader to find course information by topic, state, date, or title. The directory also provides addresses where information on longer term courses and degree programs may be obtained. Roger Kennedy To Step Down As Head of the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History. For the last 13 years Roger Kennedy has served as Director of the National Museum of American History. He was both a pioneer and a risk-taker. He commemorated the bicentennial of the Constitution with an exhibit on the internment of Japanese Americans during World War II. Spencer R. Crew will become acting director on December 1 and serve while a national search is undertaken.

He became president of Rockwell International following the merger with North American Aviation. He has been awarded the Aerospace Pioneer of the Year Award in honor of his 60-plus years of achievement in the aerospace industry (1988), and the Wright Brothers Memorial Trophy.

Earl E. Bakken

Businessman

Mr. Bakken is one of the fathers of cardiac pacing. As an inventor, entrepreneur, and educator for the 40 years since pacing therapy moved from the lab to the doctor's office, he has provided dedicated support and expertise to the project. The cardiac pacemaker is considered one of the ten most outstanding engineering achievements in the last 50 years.

Father Alfred Boeddeker

Religious leader

Recommended by James Scatena

Father Boeddeker has worked with the needy, the poor, and the underprivileged for 45 years. He has established chapels, dining rooms, schools, and medical clinics for the needy in Tijuana, Mexico; San Francisco, California; and Santo Domingo.

Dr. Solomon Buchsbaum

Research Scientist/Physicist Recommended by Dr. Allan Bromley

Solomon J. Buchsbaum is Senior Vice President, Technology Systems, at AT&T Bell Laboratories, Holmdel, New Jersey. He is responsible for quality, technology, and process research, government systems, architectural framework for AT&T products, systems, and services and R&D in support of manufacturing. Dr. Buchsbaum has published over 50 papers in plasma and solid-state physics and has been issued eight patents. Born in Poland, Dr. Buchsbaum received his B.S. and M.S. degrees from McGill University and his Ph.D. degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Dr. Buchsbaum began his AT&T career with Bell Laboratories in 1958, initially engaging in experimental and theoretical research in gaseous and solid state plasmas. During his tenure there, he became Head of the Solid State and Plasma Physics Research Department and Director of the Electronics Research Laboratory. In 1968, Dr. Buchsbaum became Vice President in charge of research at the Sandia Laboratories. After returning to Bell Laboratories in 1971, he served in a number of executive positions until assuming his present position.

Clement E. Conger *Foreign Service officer, Curator* *Recommended by Wiley C. Grant*
 Mr. Conger served as the Curator of the Diplomatic Reception Rooms, Department of State, from 1961 until 1992. He also was Curator of the White House from 1970 to 1986, and Curator of Blair House from 1976 until 1992. Prior to these assignments he served several positions with the State Department, including two tours as Assistant Chief and Deputy Chief of Protocol. He initiated the program of securing prestige furnishings for the State Department rooms by gifts and loans. The collection of fine period American furniture, historic American paintings, and decorative arts is valued at \$50m. It is acknowledged to be the most important collection of 18th and 19th century American furniture in Washington. While at the White House, Mr. Conger was responsible for refurbishing 27 rooms, restoring most of them more authentically than ever before to the elegance they may have had in the first quarter of the 19th century.

Willis Conover *Music Broadcaster* *Recommended by Congressman Robert Michel*
 On January 6, 1955, Willis Conover began a radio program on the Voice of America that would eventually endear him -- and American jazz -- to hundreds of millions of music enthusiasts around the world. Though he is little known in this country, Conover's work over the past 37 years has brought the works of jazz artists to peoples in the now-former Soviet Bloc to Latin America and elsewhere. In turn, he has inspired countless musicians worldwide to study and pursue this distinctly American musical genre. Today, his "Music USA" program captures 100 million listeners. (Incidentally, Conover is a contracted employee at the VOA. He is not, nor has he been, an employee of the United States Government.)

More than a "disc jockey," Conover is a scholarly authority on jazz, whose association with the music and musicians precedes his acclaimed work at the VOA. His efforts during the 1940s and 50s to arrange and promote jazz performances in Washington, D.C. -- which was segregated at the time -- benefitted the careers of Charlie Parker, Thelonius Monk, and others, while helping to break down the color barrier. His commitment to the best in jazz has touched countless lives for the better.

Ulrike (Uli) Derickson *Stewardess* *Recommended by C. Horvath*
 Purser on TWA Flight 845 during the 1984 hijacking in which Robert Stethem was killed. According to passenger accounts following the ordeal, she was solely responsible for preventing further loss of life. She stopped the hijackers from beating another serviceman to death and ensured that all passengers were provided with food and water. Only negative report came from Israelis and U.S. supporters of Israel who claimed she provided the hijackers with the passports of Jewish passengers. This was proven to be incorrect. Ms. Derickson was a West German citizen at the time of the hijacking, but became a U.S. citizen in April 1987.

Marjory Stoneman Douglas *Environmentalist* *Recommended by Shirley Green*
 Ms. Douglas turned 100 years old in April of 1990 and continues her efforts to educate the public on the importance of the Everglades to the survival of South Florida. She is an author and environmentalist. Her work, *The Everglades: River of Grass*, was published in 1947, and this work catapulted her into fame as an environmentalist. She has actively fought for controls against development that would intrude on the Everglades, claiming that the Everglades were the only thing standing between the beauty of South Florida and the deserts of South Florida.

John Hope Franklin *Educator* *Recommended by John Gardner*
 Mr. Franklin is a historian, well known for his work on Black History. He has taught at Howard, Fisk University, Alabama State Teachers College, and Brooklyn College. Mr. Franklin has written numerous articles and many full-length books on Black History. He currently is teaching constitutional history at Duke University Law School.

Stanley H. Fryczynski, Jr. *Volunteer* *Recommended by Frank Guarini*
 He holds two volunteer positions -- president of the Deborah Heart and Lung Center and chairman of the Children of the World Program of the Deborah Foundation. The organization provides care in the medical fields of heart valve transplants, industrial pulmonary disease, clinical research, and continuing progress in cardiac imaging. No bill for services has ever been given to its patients.

J. Peter Grace *Businessman* *Recommended by Mary Ann Bellamy*
 Mr. Grace is a respected corporate executive who has served on various committees for the U.S. Government. He is deeply committed to charity work. His foundation supports 600 organizations, including some 2,000 colleges. His resume spans about six pages and is largely a listing of the substantial number of humanitarian acts that he and his organization have performed throughout the world.

Donald Henderson *Medical Research* *Recommended by Dr. Bromley and the president of the National Academy of Science*
 Dr. Henderson is the Dean of the Johns Hopkins University School of Hygiene and Public Health. He directed the World Health Organization global campaign to eradicate smallpox. Under his leadership, more than 700 advisers from 69 countries and over 200,000 national health staff and volunteers worked together on one of medical history's most ambitious undertakings. On May 8, 1980, the World Health Assembly officially declared that smallpox had been eradicated, the first time humanity has succeeded in completely eliminating a disease.

Wilhelmina Holladay *Philanthropist; museum founder* *Recommended by S. Green
and president*

Founder of the National Museum of Women in the Arts, which officially opened its doors to the public in Washington, D.C., on April 7, 1987. Some 20 years earlier, while touring the art galleries and museums of Europe with her husband, Mrs. Holladay discovered to her dismay that, with a few exceptions, women artists were virtually unrecognized by the art establishment and the general public. In the years that followed, Mrs. Holladay collected a substantial number of works by female artists, which form the basis of the permanent holdings of the National Museum of Women in the Arts. Responding to feminists who insist that women's art should not be segregated, Mrs. Holladay has said that the National Museum of Women in the Arts constitutes "a forum for greater awareness of women in the arts and their contribution to the aesthetic aspect of life." She maintains that the "intent is not to separate art into male and female, but to uncover and celebrate the hidden contribution of women in the history of art." Mrs. Holladay is expanding the scope of the museum in order to expose the public to outstanding work by women in other disciplines, including musical composition and performance, architecture, landscape design, poetry, playwriting, acting, choreography, and dance.

Joseph John Jova *Diplomat* *Recommended by S. Dillon Ripley*

During a 30-year foreign service career, he served as Vice Consul in Iraq, Morocco, and Portugal; as Deputy Chief of Mission and Charge d'Affaires in Chile; and as Ambassador to Honduras, the Organization of American States, and Mexico. As president of Meridian House, he oversaw a private organization that works to improve relations with other countries through a myriad of activities.

Max M. Kampelman *Diplomat* *Recommended by Anne Armstrong*

Ambassador Kampelman has served his country well in a wide range of positions -- legal counsel to Senator H. Humphrey, senior advisor U.S. Delegation to UN, ambassador and chairman U.S. Delegation to the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe, counselor at the Department of State, and as Head of the U.S. negotiating team on nuclear and space arms.

Paul MacCready *Aviation Engineer* *Recommended by MaryJo Lewis
and a host of other individuals*

Dr. MacCready was born in New Haven, Connecticut in 1925. Received his B.S. in Physics from Yale in 1947, a Master's Degree and Ph.D. from Cal Tech. His career has been marked with many exceptional accomplishments, including: named "Engineer of the Century" by the American Society of Engineers; first American to win the International Soaring Championship; conceived the Gossamer Condor and Albatross; developed the solar challenger which flew from England to Paris on solar power; led the AeroVironment-GM team in developing the Sunracer -- a solar-powered vehicle that won the international solar race across Australia; pioneered "wind forms" for the creation

of clean, renewable, energy making it into a commercially viable business during the early 80s. He was also honored with the Charles Lindbergh award, which goes to individuals who have devoted their life in pursuing a balance between technology and the environment.

Bill Mauldin *Cartoonist* *Recommended by David Bates*

An American hero at age 19 with his wartime cartoons (Willie and Joe) from the Italian front. He put a human face on the war. He's won the Pulitzer Prize twice, run for Congress, written 14 books, a couple of plays, and is currently nearing retirement from cartooning.

William L. Mellon, Jr. *Philanthropist* *Recommended by Henry Kimelman*

Developed a modern medical facility and hospital in the remote and poverty-stricken Artibonite River Valley in Haiti known as Deschapelles. He was a disciple of Dr. Albert Schweitzer and spent 35 years in Haiti establishing this facility. (Posthumous award)

Arnold Palmer *Sports Figure* *Recommended by C. Horvath*

He is considered one of the greatest golfers ever to play the game. Born September 10, 1929, in Youngstown, PA, he learned the game from his father. After early success as an amateur, Palmer turned professional in 1954 and has since won over 90 tournaments, including 4 Masters. Arnold Palmer's personality and his golfing abilities brought golf to the forefront as a spectator sport and into television.

Rosa Parks *Civil Rights Activist* *Recommended by J. Gardner*

A seamstress who refused to give up her seat on a public bus in 1955 and thereby started a boycott which resulted in the outlawing of segregation on city buses in Montgomery, Alabama. She has been called the "Mother of the Modern Civil Rights Movement."

James W. Rouse *Housing Advocate* *Recommended by C. Gregg Petersmeyer*

For over five decades, Jim Rouse has endeavored to make the American dream of affordable and decent housing a reality for all Americans. In both the private and nonprofit sectors, as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the Rouse Company and as founder and Chairman of the Enterprise Foundation, Mr. Rouse has brought an uncommon commitment and innovative solutions to the housing problems of the poor. In the public sector, he has served as a member of President Eisenhower's Advisory Committee on Housing, President Reagan's Task Force on Private Sector Initiatives, and chaired the National Housing Task Force. Mr. Rouse was also a founder and President of the ACTION (American Council to Improve Our Neighborhoods), President of Urban America, a founder of the National Urban Coalition, and currently serves as a Director of the Points of Light Foundation.

George W. Romney *Civic Leader* *Recommended by C. Gregg Petersmeyer*

George Romney has been an active civic leader, businessman, and volunteer. Throughout his distinguished and varied career that has included serving as three-term Governor of Michigan, Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of American Motors, Chairman of VOLUNTEER -- the National Center, Director of the Points of Light Foundation, and Board Member of the Commission of National and Community Service, Governor Romney has been a tireless advocate of the importance of voluntary community service and the need to link volunteers with community service opportunities.





Of course it will house your papers and gifts to the office, but I would like you to consider a departure in the conceptual design of the contents and method of presentation since it will be completed late in the century and millenium. It should serve the prescribed purposes and then depart from the other presidential libraries to reflect the state of the art exhibiting in telling the story of the presidency and your interaction with foreign heads of state and US decisionmakers, using hands-on, computer linked interative exhibits that truly will identify you as the "education president" by the manner in which you provide an exciting impact on young and old who come to understand the

In order to better inform you about the character of such a museum/library, I enclose a copy of the November-December issue of ARAMCO WOLRD, published by Saudi Aramco, in which is told the story of Aramco, oil development, the science that underlies the oil industry and Arab technical heritage. You will note responses from Margaret Thatcher and Malaysian Prime Minister Mahathir Mohammad, who is already building a similar facility in his country. I was Planning Coordinator for the project and collaborated with Dan MacMasters, President Emeritus of the Chicago Museum of Science and Industry, using US design and fabrication firms. I would be most willing to introduce you or your representatives to the appropriate people to assure that you could produce a library unique and befitting its destiny to tell the presidential and Bush story.

East meets West: Saudi art's alive and well in Lone Jack

Lone Jack is a long way from Saudi Arabia.

Yet in this rural Missouri community sits a green metal building crammed to the rafters with remarkable artifacts and exhibits from that ancient desert land. Called the Nance Museum & Library of Antiquities, this 2,250 square foot facility is a valuable learning center for students of Arabian culture. It's also an act of love and the fulfillment of a remarkable couple's personal vision.

Within the museum's walls, visitors discover an impressive collection of everyday objects, textiles, costumes, jewelry, curios and photos from Saudi Arabia and such nearby Middle Eastern countries as Egypt, Syria and Yemen. As one of the most complete collections of Arabian artifacts in the United States, it includes one of only three collections of Bedouin artifacts accessible to the American

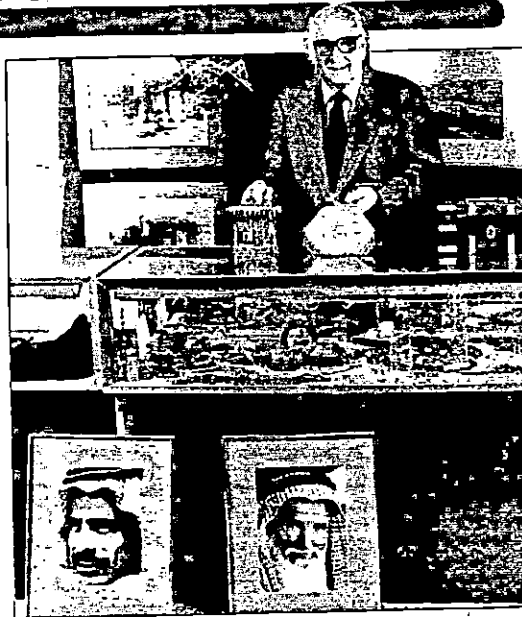
public. The setting is a series of ethnic gardens highlighting early civilizations.

This unique museum reflects the dedication of Paul and Colleen Nance, a warmly outgoing American couple who lived in Saudi Arabia for 31 years and came home to the Show-Me State to share their experiences and love for the Middle East with family, friends and neighbors in their native Midwest.

In 1952, the young couple moved to Saudi Arabia after Paul joined the Arabian American Oil Company (Aramco). The Nances found the company's Arab employees striving to improve the lives of their own families in a harsh and difficult environment with much the same determination and faith which they themselves had known back in the States.

While in Saudi Arabia, the

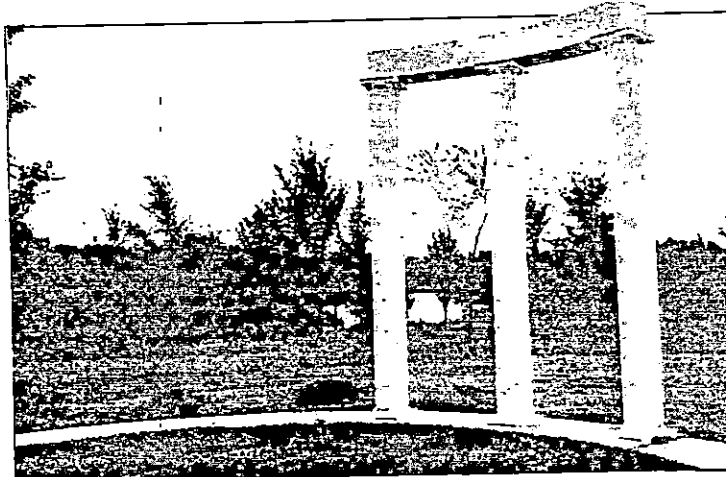
years passed, the Nances grew to respect and admire the richness of Arab culture and traditions. At first they collected Saudi Arabian artifacts and souvenirs of their travels strictly for their own enjoyment.

Gradually, though, an idea began to germinate. Soon they were devising ways to share with those at home what they had seen and learned — and acquired — during their years abroad. So some 10 years before they were to leave Saudi Arabia, the Nances began to fill gaps in their collections, adding to their pieces of Bedouin jewelry, traditional clothing, woven baskets and hand-loomed rugs, and hand-crafted objects of wood, leather, copper and brass.

They searched for unique paintings and bought Arabian books. Their youngest son, James, made photographic prints of 250 lithographs of Middle Eastern scenes. And soon they acquired the ultimate prize in their collection: a 22-by-55 foot Bedouin goat-hair tent, complete with most of its furnishings.

"The Bedouin tent was used by the Bani Khalid tribe in Northern Arabia for over 40 years," Mr. Nance said. "It is completely outfitted as used on the desert, showing many similarities with crafts of the American Indian."

In 1983 — when the Nances arrived home in Missouri — they formally established a private non-profit foundation, assembled a board of trustees and

The President today recognized Richard Cushman of Auburn, California, as the 962nd Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Mr. Cushman creates educational opportunities and hope of economic advancement for adult non-readers and individuals with low incomes.

Mr. Cushman, a retired business executive, serves as a volunteer with the Placer Adult Literacy Program (PALS) and the Tax-Aide Program. For five years he has tutored a businessman who had never learned to read. They meet together weekly, for about two hours, working on reading skills that will enable the student to succeed in his career and increase his self-esteem. Mr. Cushman also serves as the Treasurer of PALS and participates in its support group.

The Tax-Aide Program, sponsored by the American Association for Retired Persons, relies heavily upon volunteers to help senior citizens and people with low incomes complete their tax returns. Mr. Cushman, who has a Masters in Accounting, has coordinated the efforts of 12 volunteer tax advisors in his area for the past three years. He meets with people one day a week to explain their tax forms and file them properly. From February to April, he helps them with Federal returns, and from May to August, he works on their State returns. Without his voluntary assistance and counseling, these individuals might not file their taxes correctly or receive benefits to which they are entitled.

The President today recognized the volunteers of the Oregon Human Development Teen Parent Special Friends Program of Hillsboro, Oregon, as the 963rd Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Special Friends volunteers enable pregnant adolescents and teenage parents to achieve independence and greater self-esteem while learning healthy parenting skills.

Special Friends was founded in 1987 in response to the high rate of child abuse in the Portland area. Through the program, teenage mothers with low incomes request to be matched with a Special Friend, who provides regular, ongoing support for at least one year. These trained adults serve as positive role models, offering emotional support, childbirth preparation instruction, parenting skills training, and a break from the everyday stress of parenting. The teenage mothers are between 13 and 20 years of age, pregnant or new parents, and enrolled in high school or a GED program.

The volunteers spend time with their friends weekly for meetings, recreational activities, and outings. Personalized activities are developed to meet the needs of each teen mother, such as education and job counseling, interview training, peer support networks, child birth education classes, academic tutoring and gang prevention projects. Many relationships have continued beyond the official duration of the program.

Service Guild encourages family involvement with the mental and physical progress of each child. Several times a year, volunteers lead parental support groups aided by therapists. This peer support strengthens the relationships between parents and children.

She often comes to the Center on holidays with visiting family and friends and, on Christmas Day, enlists them to help distribute presents.

One of the residents' highlights each week is Mrs. Meadors' sing-along, which she leads with the help of a volunteer pianist or organist. She also assists with regular cookouts and outings to the mall, restaurants, and the circus. She engages each resident in Success Therapy, which allows for a rewarding personal experience each day. For many residents who have lost self-esteem through debilitating illnesses, simple tasks such as matching colors or stirring cookie batter can provide sensory stimulation and a renewed sense of satisfaction. Of her work with these senior citizens, she says, "They have added a beautiful dimension to my life and have in a sense become my extended family."

Retired from her career as an elementary school teacher since 1988, Mrs. Meadors still volunteers as a reading teacher for two and a half hours three times a week with elementary students in need of extra assistance, as well as with "gifted" kindergarten students. She also teaches reading to two women from West Virginia for an hour and a half twice a week as part of an adult literacy program.

Mr. Shive travels to seven different care centers or retirement villages each week in New Jersey and Pennsylvania to present his 45-minute musical program to some 200 enthusiastic seniors. His program includes old show tunes, hymns, and patriotic songs accompanied by piano and harmonica. Afterwards, he meets with each resident to lend encouragement and provide companionship. The performances promote a social atmosphere among the residents, increasing interaction and alleviating loneliness. These one-to-one visits are the highlight of many residents' weeks. Mr. Shive also visits performs for people who are seriously ill and can not attend the performance. He encourages the residents to act as a supportive family, caring for each other.

Mr. Shive continually adds centers to his ministry. When he discovers that a friend or family member has relocated to a particular institution, he approaches its activities director about incorporating his "Music Therapy" program. Besides working with the residents, he encourages the employees to project uplifting attitudes that will eventually affect the elderly. Mr. Shive himself is on-call at all times to offer personal encouragement, and he maintains that this has been the most rewarding work of his life.

Asked to coach on a volunteer basis, he accepted the challenge and, with the help of four to five volunteers who assist him during practice and tournaments, he has brought the Rollin' Razorbacks back from an initial losing season to four consecutive national championships.

Currently, 14 players participate in the wheelchair basketball league. The players ages 14 to 36 are either in school or employed locally. They are referred to Mr. Vines by physicians and rehabilitation hospitals.

Mr. Vines holds practice two evenings a week for two to three hours at a local high school. The Rollin' Razorbacks have games every weekend and often participate in weekend tournaments across the nation. Whenever possible, Mr. Vines and his volunteers take them to out-of-state tournaments a day early so they are able to see sights and spend leisure time together.

Mr. Vines not only coaches the team in basketball, but takes a personal interest in each of the players. He has helped several of them overcome drug and alcohol problems and become more responsible, productive citizens. Many of his former players have returned to help with practice or just to encourage the team.

The President today recognized the Literacy Volunteers of America, Maine, Dover-Foxcroft Affiliate as the 968th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. The Literacy Volunteers provide excellent educational opportunities for adult non-readers in this rural area of Maine.

The Dover-Foxcroft Affiliate, established in 1975, is operated by 34 volunteers, 12 of whom currently serve as literacy tutors. Most volunteers are matched with one student, some with as many as three. Meeting once or twice a week, they help the students learn to read or improve their reading skills. Tutors often use the "experience story" method of instruction, in which a student tells a story and the tutor transcribes it. Every week they work together on certain words until the student can read his or her own story.

Most students seek literacy assistance to increase their employment opportunities or to read to their children and help them with their homework. Each sets his or her own goals, such as obtaining a driver's license or a GED or writing letters to friends and family. They receive help from their tutors for varying lengths of time, up to five years or more, depending on their reading levels and goals. Tutors and volunteers form close, supportive friendships that extend beyond scheduled lessons and often include trips to restaurants to learn how to order from menus, as well as other social activities.
