SUBJECT: U.S. Sentencing Commission

Senator Thurmond may raise at your 2:30 p.m. meeting today the issue about filling vacancies on the Federal Sentencing Commission.

The U.S. Sentencing Commission's current chairman, William Wilkins, strongly favors having judges on the Commission. The statute only requires three judges on this Commission.

For your reference, three vacancies exist. These are "non-Republican" candidates. The first nominee is Julie Carnes of Atlanta up for Federal Prosecutor. The other two vacancies are judges, one candidate for this slot is supported by Senator Kennedy, and there is a strong lobbying effort by Chairman Wilkins on his behalf.

Senator Biden's candidate is a former Judiciary Committee staffer and is currently practicing law in Delaware. According to Senator Thurmond's staff, Senator Biden's candidate is okay philosophically; for example, he supports the death penalty.

Senator Thurmond will report that Senator Biden feels very strongly about his candidate, and that it is a "personal" matter with him. Senator Biden has talked to Senators Thurmond and Dole and is threatening to hold up Judiciary nominees over this issue.

Because it is against Chairman Wilkin, privately Senator Thurmond will recommend that we go with Senator Biden's nominee.

SUBJECT: National Critical Materials Council

Upon further reflection of the membership of the National Critical Materials Council (NCMC), I suggest that Henson Moore, Deputy Secretary of the Department of Energy (DOE), be substituted in lieu of Richard Schmalensee, Member of the Council of Economic Advisors (CEA). Both DOE Deputy Secretaries Danny Boggs and William Martin served previously.

I make this suggestion because DOE would bring to the Council its substantial knowledge, expertise, resources and insights in areas such as new materials and advanced technologies relating to energy production, distribution, transmission, and consumption; in programs such as superconductivity; and in coordinating energy policies with national materials policies essential to this Nation's national security and industrial competitiveness.

With DOE's contribution, T. Ary's knowledge of the natural availability of the earth's raw materials, and Dr. Bromley's keen understanding of the economic impact of scientific decisions, the Council will have the necessary balance to establish a national coherent materials policy.

I want to suggest Secretary Moshbacher to serve as an executive branch Member of the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations.

I understand that there are two vacancies in the category of "Officers of the Executive Branch, U.S. Government" and wanted to indicate Secretary Moshbacher's appropriateness to serve on the Commission.

The Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations was established, in part, because "population growth and scientific developments portend an increasingly complex society in future years." This statement, taken from the Declaration of Purpose in the 1959 Act, mirrors much of the Secretary's mission at the Department of Commerce today.

As you know, Commerce is the department that, among other things, focuses on economic opportunities for business and for state and local governments. Our State Initiative Program and U.S. and Foreign Commercial Service offices aim to provide Governors and the states with expertise to help them compete more effectively. Commerce programs promote science and technology in developing U.S. industrial capacity and states' increased ability to export.

Dear Mr. President:

One of the most difficult tasks which you will soon undertake is to nominate new members of the board governing the Legal Services Corporation. As we are all well aware, the Corporation has been the subject of controversy since its creation in 1974. The problem, as we see it, is there has not been a consensus concerning the proper role of the Corporation or a vision of how Federal legal services should be provided or tax dollars spent to help poor clients.

There have been those who advocate utilizing Legal Services funds to engage in "law reform" in the guise of defending the downtrodden for the purpose of changing our society to conform to a liberal view of America. We reject that approach, as we know your Administration and a majority of the members of the current board do as well. We believe that these funds should be used, in accordance with the original congressional intent, to carry out its proper mission, that is, to meet the current and on-going practical concerns and needs of indigent Americans who genuinely require and cannot afford legal representation and other legal services.

We know that during the period of 1978 through 1984 federal legal services programs spent over 28,000 hours on redistricting and reapportionment cases designed to promote the political fortunes of liberal candidates. This is one example of the kind of political activity that the current Board has tried to stop, that should never have been tolerated, and that the next Board must prevent from happening again. The Board has the authority and responsibility for ensuring that the Corporation's funds are channeled toward the mission of providing essential legal services, not permitting legal services attorneys to pursue unauthorized and illegal activities and to promote their own political agenda.

In the FY 1989 legal services appropriations, the Congress conditioned the implementation of competition and certain restrictions on lobbying activities upon the confirmation by the Senate of a board to be nominated by the new President. It is imperative, therefore, that those whom you appoint to serve on


the new Board are persons of recognized ability, integrity, dedication and fortitude to govern and direct the Corporation according to the letter and spirit of its charter.

Each of the eleven prospective Board members whose resumes we are enclosing meets the qualifications for service on the LSC board. Each is committed to continuing the reform of federal legal services programs begun under the Reagan Administration to ensure that potential eligible clients are not turned away because the Corporation's funds are spent on illegitimate, wasteful or partisan political activities. Each is a strong candidate with strong Congressional support.


Accordingly we urge you to nominate these candidates as a group so that you and we can be assured that the genuine legal needs of the poor will be met.

Independent

AUTHORITY: P.L. 98-375, August 7, 1984

METHOD: Appointed by the President and see below

MEMBERS: THIRTY as follows:

Secretary of State,
Archivist of the United States,
Librarian of Congress,
Chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts,
Chairman of the National Endowment for the Humanities,
Secretary of Commerce, and

TWENTY-FOUR appointed by the President:

SEVEN upon the recommendation of the majority leader of the Senate in consultation with the minority leader of the Senate,

SEVEN upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives in consultation with the minority leader of the House of Representatives,

TEN who shall be broadly representative of the people of the United States, and not otherwise officers or employees of the United States.

All the above appointments shall be made within ninety days after the date of the enactment of this Act (by 11/5/84).

In addition, the President is authorized and requested to invite the governments of Spain and Italy each to appoint, within ninety days after the date of the enactment of this Act (by 11/5/84), one individual to serve as a nonvoting participant in the activities of the Commission. Also, the Commission may appoint honorary members and may establish an Advisory Council to assist the Commission in its work.

CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS QUINCENTENARY JUBILEE COMMISSIONIndependent

TERM: Pleasure of the President

CHAIRMAN AND

VICE CHAIRMAN: Elected from among the ten public members appointed by the President. (NOTE: The Secretary of State shall call the first meeting, the purpose of which is to elect a Chairman and a Vice Chairman.)

SALARY:

The 30 appointed and ex officio members shall serve without compensation, but may be reimbursed for travel, subsistence, and other necessary expenses incurred by them in the performance of their duties. All other persons appointed, designated, or invited to assist the Commission shall serve without compensation and shall not be entitled to reimbursement for travel, subsistence, or other expenses incurred by them in the performance of their duties.

PURPOSE:

Prepare a comprehensive program for commemorating the quincentennial of the voyages of discovery of Christopher Columbus, and to plan, encourage, coordinate, and conduct observances and activities commemorating the historic events associated with those voyages. The Commission shall particularly examine the historic role of the government and people of Spain in order to promote a greater public awareness, understanding, and appreciation of the contributions made by Spain with respect to those voyages.

REPORTS AND
TERMINATION:

Within two years after the date of the first meeting, the Commission shall submit to Congress a comprehensive report incorporating its recommendations for the commemoration of the quincentennial of the voyages of discovery of Christopher Columbus. Further, the law states that the President shall transmit this report to the Congress together with such comments and additional recommendations for legislation and administrative actions as the President deems appropriate. The Commission shall also prepare and submit to the Congress an annual report on its activities. A final report shall be made to the Congress no later than November 15, 1992, upon which date the Commission shall terminate.

Recent actions by the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of the United States government have greatly accelerated the contemporary shift in power from the States to Washington, D.C. Although the elected officials who serve in the Congress and the White House, and who appoint the nine members of the U.S. Supreme Court, constitute only 0.1 percent of all the elected officials in our federal union, they now exercise broad powers over the 99.9 percent of the nation's elected officials who directly serve the people of our fifty States and numerous local communities.

Most significant, perhaps, for the erosion of balance in our federal system are recent decisions of the United States Supreme Court. *Garcia v. San Antonio Metropolitan Transit Authority* (1985) and *South Carolina v. Baker* (1988) in particular have virtually eliminated the Tenth Amendment of the United States Constitution as a legal shelter for State authorities. The Court has held that State and local governments cannot find protection against national regulation in such substantive provisions of the federal Constitution as the Bill of Rights, but only in the procedural bargaining of the national political process. This national political process, however, has preempted significant portions of State authority and produced a broad array of mandates, regulations, and grant-in-aid conditions that affect every facet of State and local governance, while also shifting costs and responsibilities to State and local governments and very nearly reducing those governments to the status of special interest groups.

Although it is widely recognized that, as a group, State and local governments are now the nation's leading centers of innovation, experimentation, fiscal discipline, and governmental competence, the weakening of our country's historic constitutional and political safeguards for federalism and intergovernmental comity has enabled the nationalization of power to continue apace. Yet the national political process itself has developed serious problems, including debt, inertia, policy confusion, and an inability to focus effectively on truly national concerns. Equally disturbing is that voter participation and confidence in the national political process have declined to historic lows, while the power and wealth of public and private interests located in Washington, D.C., have reached historic highs.

The Council of State Governments and the U.S. Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations believe, therefore, that there is a serious imbalance of power between the national

and State governments, which threatens the future of our federal system. The purposes of the regional public hearings being held in 1989—the 200th anniversary of our federal republic—are to sound out citizen views, examine the sources and seriousness of this imbalance of power, inform elected officials and the voting public about the issues facing our federal system, and seek agreement on strategies and language to redress the erosion of state and local governmental powers.

Effective strategies for reform to be considered include:

- Substantive and/or procedural amendments to the Constitution of the United States;
- Legislative initiatives to be undertaken by the Congress of the United States;
- Administrative initiatives to be undertaken by the President of the United States;
- Legal initiatives to be undertaken by State and local governments in the courts of the United States; and
- Education programs and political action to be undertaken by private citizens and associations of State and local governments.

Future steps to be considered in promoting reform include Congressional hearings on intergovernmental relations, a White House conference on federalism, creation of a clearinghouse on initiatives for intergovernmental reform, and convening a Commission of the States for Constitutional Revision.
