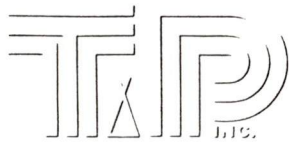

Re: Four Former Presidents' Interviews

Dear Mr. President:

For some months we have been working very quietly on a Bicentennial project which could be one of the most significant long-range contributions in the programs of the Commission on the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution. We observed that for the first time since Abraham Lincoln was elected there are four living past presidents; indeed, in 1861, there were five living past presidents.

It seemed to us that it would be of great importance and particularly of long-range historical significance to have the four past presidents separately discuss the presidency and problems of the presidency. It would not be the purpose of the interviews to examine the policies and programs of any one of the presidents but rather the functioning of the institution in our increasingly complex society.

I have discussed this with each of the past presidents within the last few months and they have all agreed to go on the program. We have had a number of meetings with experts of long experience in broadcasting and with historians. These interviews would be conducted with each of the presidents separately, and we would probably begin soon after the first of the year at the convenience of each.

We have not yet selected an interviewer or worked out the details but we anticipate that there will be several interviews with each one and all of it will be done under the direct control of a producer employed by the Bicentennial Commission and subject to Commission direction. We hope, too, that at the end of these interviews we will be able to prevail upon each of these men to write a substantial piece on the subject and publish this in a volume, possibly with commentary by contemporary observers of the national government. Our planning has been confined to a small group to avoid premature publicity about the program.

If you would like to have one of your staff discuss this I would be glad to arrange to do so at any time so as to keep you informed.

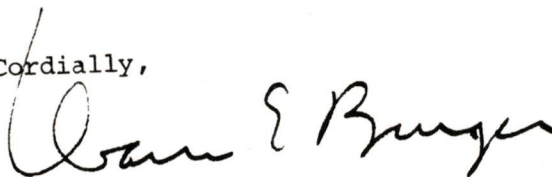

Fred Ryan called me today to say that President Reagan has decided not to send the letter to Mikhail Gorbachev that was previously reviewed here. Instead, President Reagan has sent a letter saying that circumstances are such that he and Mrs. Reagan would love to accept the Gorbachev invitation to come to Moscow, but would prefer that the visit take place sometime in the early fall. The former President felt that a visit to Moscow prior to the summit might raise expectations inconsistent with our objectives.

There is no reference in the letter to any invitation for Mikhail Gorbachev to visit California.

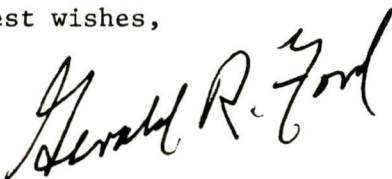

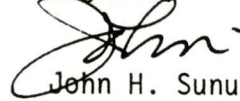
