

Dear Mr. Card:

During his recent visit to Mashpee I had the opportunity to speak with President Bush about a problem of grave concern to the Town. The President expressed a willingness to assist the Town and suggested that I contact you.

Otis Air Force Base abuts the Town and is the source of numerous hazardous waste plumes which have contaminated groundwater in Mashpee and Falmouth. Of particular concern is contamination from the base which has required the installation of a public water system in the Briarwood section of Mashpee. This neighborhood had relied on private wells for domestic water supply. Once the wells were contaminated by the Base the Town responded by establishing a water district which installed several miles of water mains to connect to the Falmouth water supply, acquired land for water supply sources, identified and installed water supply wells, installed a distribution system to serve the area and designed a storage tank. The cost ongoing between this and remediation exceeds several million dollars.

For over three years I have been attempting to negotiate a settlement on behalf of the Town and the District with representatives of the Department of Defense, Mr. Ron Watson of the National Guard Bureau and Lt. Colonel Paul Brogna of Otis. Achieving an equitable settlement for the contamination caused by the Base has been an elusive objective. The Town and its people have suffered great financial loss due to the contamination and looks to the National Guard Bureau to pay for the water system required to remediate the health threat to the people of Briarwood.

The Guard Bureau has taken an overly conservative and unsupportable position in refusing to accept responsibility for contamination in all of Briarwood. While accepting responsibility for contaminating East Briarwood, it has refused to live up to the reality that West Briarwood too has been contaminated by the Military. Even by the Guard Bureau's admission West Briarwood is surrounded by contaminants emanating from the Base. It defies commonsense and hydrologic principles that West Briarwood could have escaped contamination. I think you would find that both the Environmental Protection Agency and Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection concur with this conclusion.

In acting responsibly to protect the health of its citizens and installing a water system to all of Briarwood, the Mashpee Water District is being penalized by the Guard Bureau's interpretation of what portion of the system it should pay for. The District taxpayers are presently looking at absorbing roughly \$350,000 in costs that rightfully belong to the Base.

Despite numerous and lengthy attempts to achieve a settlement the negotiations are at an impasse. Were I not extremely pessimistic about the willingness of the Guard Bureau to treat Mashpee fairly, I would not have gone to the extraordinary measure of raising this to the President's attention. Any intervention on Mashpee's behalf by your office would be greatly appreciated. 
Dear Congressman Lent:

Joe Nealon, founder of the Eight Point Club, says good driving means using common sense and courtesy.

Retired trucker campaigns for greater highway safety

WEYMOUTH — Retired truck driver Joe Nealon is trying to make a point for road safety.

Eight points, really.

Nealon has launched a one-man campaign to improve driving habits with the Eight Point Club.

Drivers should be more polite; he suggests they offer each other thank-you waves.

"Basically, it's courtesy that makes for safe driving," Nealon said. "It will go a long way in preventing accidents."

Nealon has seen plenty of accidents in the 42 years he spent driving a truck for Howard Johnson's, where safety was stressed. The safety habits he learned as a professional driver would serve everyone well, he said.

"They never rushed us. They always stressed safety," recalled Nealon. "And I guess, psychologically, it's still with me."

There are Eight Point Club membership cards and window decals. Nealon can't bring himself to ask people for \$1 to cover printing costs, so he's given away the 400 cards he's distributed.

"Last year, there were more than 25,000 deaths on highways, and if my club reduces it, that will be my reward," he said.

The club's small, blue sticker adorns his own car, a gold Renault Alliance.

He's sent posters to town halls and police departments on the South Shore, and has spoken to social groups, fellow truck drivers and friends.

Nealon's insurance agent was so enthusiastic about the club that he sent Nealon a \$50 donation and letter of reference.

After Nealon left the seminary in the 1940s, he found a childhood bout with polio kept him from serving in World War II.

He longed to travel, so he decided to become a truck driver. He drove 2 million miles for Howard Johnson's from 1943 to 1985.

He says he doesn't particularly like to drive. Nealon has never been in a serious car accident, nor have any of his family, he said.

He is hoping to also spread his message through safety officers, driving schools and driver education classes.

Nealon chose eight points to coincide with the number of sides on a stop sign. They are: Obey speed limits, traffic lights and stop signs; stop for school buses; yield to emergency vehicles; use directional signals; don't let seat belts do all the work; use courtesy to avoid accidents; keep drugs and alcohol off the road; do not litter.

Anti-drug leaders urge booklets, logo

WASHINGTON (AP) — Leaders of the President's Drug Advisory Council said Friday that President Bush should speak on television twice a year to reinforce his commitment to the war on drugs.

They also urged the country's 500 richest businesses to pay for anti-drug booklets for each of the nation's 32 million grade-school children, and they said all professional sports team uniforms should carry anti-drug patches.

"There needs to be a national image, a national symbol, a national logo that everyone can look at like the American flag," said Orange County Sheriff Brad Gates, founder of California's Drug Use is Life Abuse program.

The council's National Leadership Forum heard from the heads of three substance abuse programs in California, Florida and Washington singled out as national models.

Edward "Thad" Foote, president of the University of Miami and chairman of The Miami Coalition, said his group has determined that some old assumptions about drug abuse were wrong.

"We found out this problem wasn't going to go away by building more jails or sending more ships to the

Caribbean," Foote said.

Dade County has demolished 700 crack cocaine houses in Miami in the past two years and boasts a "virtually unheard of" 4 percent recidivism rate in an alternative "drug court" that expunges criminal records of drug abusers who complete treatment-education programs within a year, Foote said.

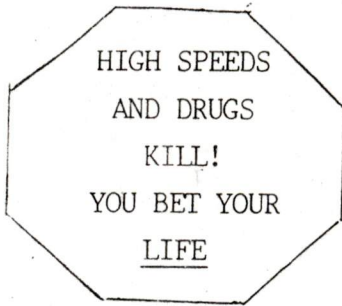
"And we finally figured out if you want to break the cycle of addiction for poor sick people, you've got to find them a job," he said.

Gates said Orange County has beefed up law enforcement but also made a priority of changing attitudes about drugs with a marketing approach modeled after anti-smoking campaigns.

The California program has made popular a logo using the slogan "Drug Use is Life Abuse." It also enlisted the help of Walt Disney Co. in developing a booklet with three animated animal characters, "Skippy, Spike and Wise Owl Mike," who preach against substance abuse through a rap song.

The booklets could be published for 10 cents each if the nation's top 500 companies would donate a total of \$3.2 million for 32 million copies, Gates said.

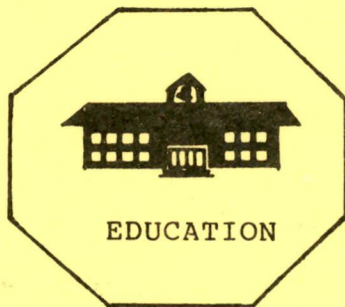

Dear Miss Brockman:

Thank you for your letter and your interest in my responsibilities in the Bush Administration. I serve President Bush as one of fifteen Assistants to the President and also as Deputy to the Chief of Staff. I advise the President on policy, politics and personnel, and I assist the Chief of Staff in managing the White House staff and the Executive Office of the President.

A typical day has me in my office at 6:15^{AM} meeting with the Chief of Staff's Executive Assistant. We go over the newspapers, discuss politics and prepare the agenda for the senior staff meeting. Governor Sumner, the President's Chief of Staff, generally arrives at the White House at 6:45^{AM}. We go over the day's news, schedule and policy concerns. The President arrives in the Oval Office at 7:15^{AM}. At 7:30^{AM} either Governor Sumner or I conduct the senior staff meeting in the Roosevelt Room just across from the Oval Office. Senior staff meetings include all Assistant to the President, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, the Chairman of the Council of Economic Advisors, the Chief of Staff to the Vice President, the Chief of Staff to the First Lady and the President's Scheduler. Meetings last thirty to forty-five minutes.

After morning meetings, my responsibilities basically have me "where Governor Sumner is not."

I frequently represent the Chief of Staff at policy sessions. My role is sometimes to be a "cattle prod" - stimulating the process to produce.

For the most part, either Governor Sununu or I are with the President. As a result I have had the opportunity to travel with the President on Marine One (helicopter) and Air Force One. I have visited, as part of the President's entourage, almost every state and many foreign countries.

My work day usually ends at about 8:30^{pm} unless there is a State Dinner or other social event.

I was born in Brockton, Massachusetts and still maintain my legal residence in my hometown, Holbrook, Massachusetts. I attended Holbrook public schools, the University of South Carolina, the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy and the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University. I am a trained Structural Design Engineer.

My wife and I have known each other since the fifth grade. In high school I was class president and Kathi was class secretary. We have three children, Tabetha (22) Rachel (20) and Andrew (Drew) (15).

Our family is very close and enjoy doing almost everything — together. Unfortunately it is not all that easy for us to get time to do all we want.

Politics has been a big part of the Card family activity. We enjoy campaigning and participating in government. I hope you will get involved too.

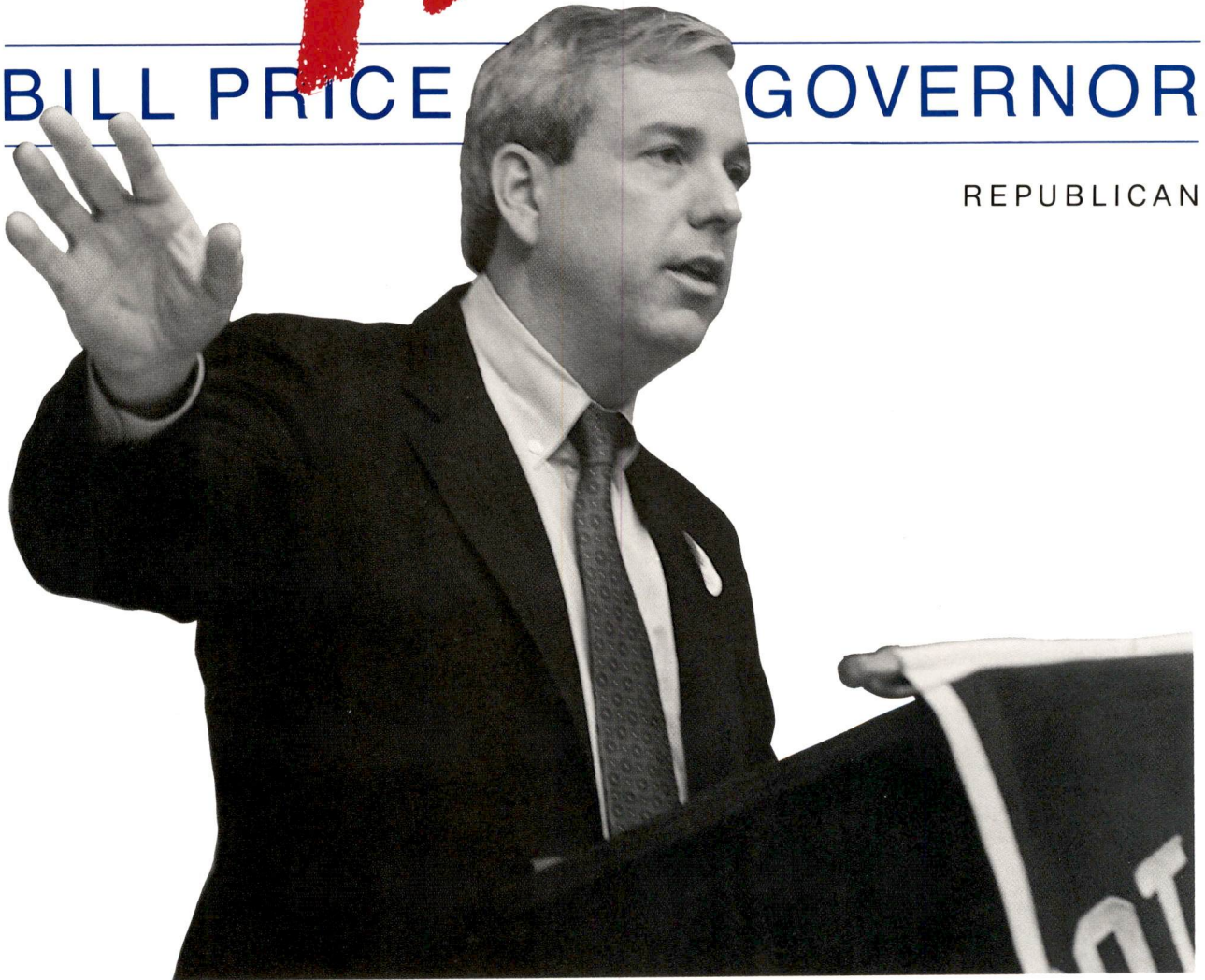

He has prepared well for the job. Bill Price already has made his mark on Oklahoma history as a conscientious and effective reformer of state government.

Bill Price has an excellent record of service to the Republican Party beginning when he was a teenager.

Bill Price has been an active leader in the battle against drug abuse, founding a statewide drug education program that has reached more than 40,000 young people.

In preparing for his candidacy, Price spent nearly a year traveling

Price's preparation for the job of governor is founded on training, experience and deep Oklahoma roots.

Bill Price is a native Oklahoman, grandson of Oklahoma pioneers who homesteaded in the Cherokee Strip land run.

His father, Dr. Joel Scott Price, was born on a farm in northwestern

Price is a graduate of the University of Oklahoma School of Law and holds an undergraduate degree from Georgetown in international affairs.

While an undergraduate, Bill met Mary Lynn Slattery, who became his wife. Bill and Mary have three children, Anne, 16, James, 14 and Eileen, 9.

In 1975 he joined the U.S. Attorney's staff as an assistant, and was later promoted to first assistant. In 1982, nominated by U.S. Senator Don Nickles, he was appointed federal prosecutor by President Reagan.

As chairman of the Law Enforcement Coordinating Committee, Price took the lead in helping pass 15 major pieces of anti-crime legislation at the State Capitol. As an advisor to the U.S. Sentencing Commission, he helped write national guidelines on mandatory sentencing without parole.

Price served on the National Environmental Enforcement Council, helping draft solutions to environmental problems.

Price reformed state and local government beyond the requirements of his sworn duties.

Bill Price is the reformer who cleaned up the longest-lasting corruption scheme in Oklahoma politics, the county commissioner scandal.

It started with some puzzling lumber invoices in a southwestern Oklahoma county — enough timbers to rebuild every bridge in the county five times. But there was no lumber around anywhere. No stockpiles. No warehouses full. No stacks. Nothing.

That was 1978. It was two years before Bill Price, then an assistant federal prosecutor, found the missing piece he needed — a woman's name.

Bill spearheaded the investigation that followed. The original name led to invoices and 300 secretly taped conversations. Then confessions, indictments, trials, prison sentences.

In the end 240 county commissioners, contractors and suppliers were prosecuted in a massive kickback scandal that was the largest public corruption investigation ever handled by the U.S. Justice Department.

When the cleanup ended, bid prices for grader blades, culvert pipe, bridge timbers and other supplies were estimated to be 40% lower. Savings to the taxpayers ranged upwards of \$200 million a year.

In many other cases Bill Price took on powerful public figures — prosecuting state senators, a district judge, a college president, a sheriff, a district attorney, the commanding general of the National Guard, a labor chief, and many others.

In 14 years of investigating numerous agencies of state government, Bill saw first-hand the waste, cronyism and inefficiency that has limited Oklahoma's progress.

At the federal level, Price led investigations into highway contractor bid rigging, FmHA and HUD loan fraud, and military and FAA procurement theft, saving the taxpayers millions of dollars.

Having witnessed the tragedy of the drug traffic in his official duties, Bill Price made it a personal project to found a statewide drug education program for school children and young people — the Oklahoma Alliance Against Drugs.

Not only did Bill have the dream that led to the reality of the Alliance, he served as the first president.

The Alliance is a nonprofit organization in which young people communicate a positive, convincing, zero-tolerance message to their peers.

In four years, the Alliance has expanded to 30 chapters, and has offices in Enid, Lawton, McAlester, Oklahoma City and Tulsa.

The Alliance has reached over 40,000 Oklahoma students through its rallies, symposiums and training sessions.

Emphasis is placed on building strong self-esteem and identity within young people. The goal of the Alliance is zero tolerance — no experimenting with any form of alcohol, drugs or tobacco. As their slogan says: “To know is to say no.”

during his successful race for Attorney General. Blankenship was the first Republican elected to that position in Oklahoma history.

In that same year Bill marshalled a corps of youthful campaigners who helped defeat J.D. McCarty, powerful Democratic Speaker of the House.

Bill was president of the College Republicans both as an undergraduate and at OU Law School.

On behalf of the Nixon reelection campaign, Price debated against Cleta Deatherage Mitchell and Eric Groves, representing George McGovern, in a series of debates on college campuses.

Bill was an alternate delegate to the Republican National Convention in 1972 and in that same year served as youth coordinator for Dewey Bartlett's U.S. Senate campaign.

Two years later he was campaign manager and state coordinator for Jim Inhofe's gubernatorial campaign.

In 1975 he became an assistant U.S. Attorney, thereby no longer able to participate actively in one of his real loves, Republican party politics.

The following excerpts from his announcement remarks delivered on March 26, 1990 highlight his concerns and proposals for bringing Oklahoma back:

ON EDUCATION: I favor the elimination of tenure for teachers. I favor career ladders for quality teachers.

I favor a reduction in the number of school administrators. I

favor granting local communities more authority in funding public education at the local level.

I believe we should dissolve the present state school funding formula, which is unfair and punitive to communities trying to fund education at a higher level.

I believe the Oklahoma Department of Education has twice as many employees as it needs and should be the object of intensive cost-cutting actions.

I favor the open transfer of school students, granting to parents the choice of the school their children will attend.

Taxpayers expect teachers to be held accountable for their ability to teach. Likewise, they expect school administrators, the legislature and their governor to work for cost-saving reforms. I embrace the challenge of being involved in cutting waste in our educational system and elsewhere in government... to help make our educational system second to none.

ON ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT: First, we must send some strong signals through our actions, not words, that we are serious about the business climate of Oklahoma.

I favor the enactment of a right to work law like every other state that

surrounds us... without it, we're hampered in bringing new businesses into Oklahoma.

We must reform our workers compensation laws. I favor, through reforms and judicial appointments, assuring that the truly injured worker is compensated swiftly but the abuses in our system are ended.

I favor tort reform. Our present tort laws are another mark against us in the terrific competition for new business and industry.

I favor an all-out effort to increase tourism in Oklahoma, recognizing that for each dollar we as taxpayers put into our tourism efforts, \$16 is returned.

As we change the reality of Oklahoma's economic climate, we must also change its perception inside and outside of Oklahoma.

I will be a governor who will recruit the best industrial development team to target and sell the advantages of locating or expanding

businesses in Oklahoma. There will be a coordinated program that will utilize the talents of Oklahoma’s business leadership in selling Oklahoma’s new business climate.

ON DRUG ABUSE: My commitment to the war against illegal drugs, pushers and users is a matter of record. As U.S. Attorney, I learned first-hand how pervasive and dangerous illegal drugs are. Their use shatters lives, splits families, destroys the fiber of a community, and puts millions of dollars into the hands of criminals.

The 15 major pieces of law enforcement legislation I have helped pass on a bipartisan basis were a beginning. The Oklahoma Alliance Against Drugs, which I founded as a private organization and which has provided programs for more than 40,000 young Oklahomans, was another beginning that we must encourage and assist.

ON GOVERNMENTAL REFORM: This is the fourth great issue of the 1990’s for Oklahoma. For 14 years, I have spent a large portion of my life investigating state government. I can’t imagine a better experience for the next governor of Oklahoma. I have seen first-hand the corruption, waste, cronyism and old guard politics in Oklahoma.

The integrity and professionalism of Oklahoma government means millions of dollars to Oklahoma taxpayers. More than that, it means restoring pride in Oklahoma government and gives us a government worthy of our people.

Many people think that the vision I’ve outlined is too bold, the issues too controversial, the goals too ambitious. I ask those people to think again.

We can’t afford not to be bold... controversial... ambitious.

This year, 1990, is the most pivotal election year in the history of our state.

Because of the issues and challenges facing Oklahoma, it is imperative for the governor's office to be filled by a Republican — and not just any Republican can win.
