





Enclosed is a letter to Governor Sununu from our client, Mr. James Thompson, CEO and Chairman of Glenmore Distilleries, which is based in Louisville, Kentucky. The letter addresses the proposal before the Summiteers that would increase the current tax on spirits by \$3.50 per proof gallon.

Mr. Thompson's letter speaks for itself. He realizes that the Summiteers must devise a credible revenue package that does not put undue pressure on the economy. I hope that you will look closely at the point in his letter concerning the shortfall in the revenue estimate for the 1985 spirits tax increase. Treasury and Joint Tax were short by nearly \$2.7 billion. Another tax hike on spirits will surely put an unfair burden on this industry and will probably not achieve the revenue being attributed to it.

Dear Governor:

As you continue the Budget Summit process, I want to call to your attention the matter of excise taxes, particularly the proposal to increase by \$3.50 per proof-gallon the tax on distilled spirits. As you know, our products are now taxed at a rate of \$12.50 per proof-gallon, which makes them already the most heavily taxed consumer good, with approximately 46 percent of the retail price represented by Federal, State and Local taxes.

You will recall that in 1985 the excise tax on distilled spirits increased by \$2.00 (approximately 19 percent), as part of a deficit-reduction package. Actual tax receipts have fallen short of the Joint Committee projections by \$2.7 billion for the period 1986-89, because of a decline in sales compounded by the tax increase. Industry economists tried to explain in 1985 that this would happen, but still our products, alone, were singled out for a tax increase.

The proposed further increase would raise our tax to \$16.00 per proof-gallon, which amounts to a 28 percent additional increase. This, combined with the 1985 tax, would represent a 52 percent tax increase on our industry within the past 5 years. The Distilled Spirits Council of the United States (DISCUS) has projected an additional tax would cause sales to decline by 6.4 percent in the first year alone. This, on top of the industry sales trend of 2 percent average annual decline for the past nine years, would have a devastating effect on our industry and would not produce the revenue you seek.

Further, I point out to you that excise taxes on general consumer goods are regressive. Our company is one of the smaller members of our industry, yet we currently pay \$4 million a week in federal excise tax. There must be a limit on the tax burden a single industry should have to bear in order to reduce the deficit. I believe, from my personal experience of years in this business, that any further tax increase on the spirits industry would cost thousands of jobs in ours and related businesses, and would yield minimal net increase of Federal revenue. I rely on your good judgment to reject this unfair proposal when the Summit reconvenes.

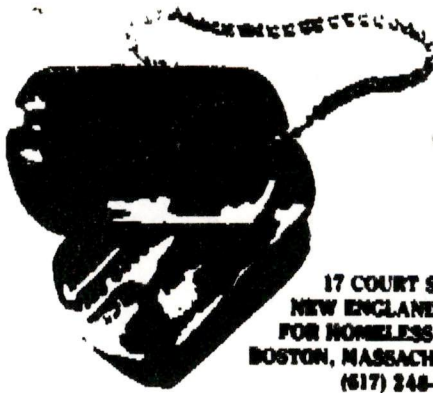

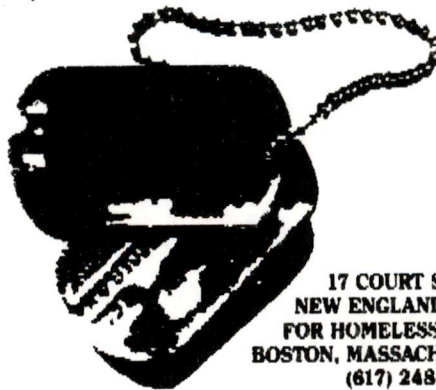

Pardon Poindexter

IF PRESIDENT Bush has an ounce of guts, he will pardon Admiral John M. Poindexter, the former national security advisor who was made the scapegoat for the Reagan administration's botched attempt to give arms to Iran in exchange for Americans held hostage.

Pardoning Poindexter wouldn't even entail any great political risk for the president. On the contrary, a presidential pardon would meet with the approval of the vast majority of Americans — the same Americans who deluged the Reagan White House with telephone calls, cards and letters supporting Lt. Col. Oliver North, who was Poindexter's subordinate during the Iran-Contra fiasco.

If Americans had no desire to see North locked up, it's logical to assume that they feel the same way about his boss.

Like North, Poindexter has devoted his life to the country he has served, as both a sailor and a civilian, for more than 30 years.

Like North, Poindexter acted not out of personal gain or self-aggrandizement, but out of patriotism and a sincere belief that he was acting in the best interests of his country.

Such a man does not belong behind bars.

Obviously, Special Prosecutor Lawrence Walsh and U.S. District Court Judge Harold Greene think otherwise.

A self-righteous and vindictive prosecutor, Walsh has finally gotten his pound of flesh — even if he did blow close to \$30 million of the taxpayers' hard-earned money hounding Poindexter into the slammer.

As for Judge Greene, the remarks he made before passing sentence indicated he might have been more disposed toward leniency had Poindexter's demeanour during the course of the trial been more remorseful. Put another way, the judge wanted Poindexter to grovel, to beg for forgiveness, to apologize profusely for having done his duty as he saw it.

But that's not Poindexter's style. The man's not a whiner. Even after being sentenced, he kept his own counsel, declining to blubber to the reporters who mobbed him outside the courthouse.

Poindexter does not belong in prison. Prisons are for criminals, not victims of political persecution. Bush knows that. He also knows, as a former head of the Central Intelligence Agency, that intelligence agencies cannot function effectively if they are subject to constant congressional scrutiny.

Knowing that, Bush should show a little gumption and pardon Poindexter. If he does, the caterwauling that will ensue in liberal circles will be worth the price of admission alone.

Johnny Kelley, 82, spreading the word

BOSTON — Johnny "The Elder" Kelley is like an old-time preacher, spreading his word wherever he goes, to whomever he meets, at every chance he gets.

Only Kelley's message is not spiritual. It's physical.

Kelley, at 82, is a walking, talking advertisement for the body beautiful. This spring he ran — and finished — the Boston Marathon, one of dozens he has completed over recent decades.

Kelley's mission to promote fitness, however, is not a once-a-spring rite. At every opportunity he spreads the word about the virtues of healthy living.

"The most important thing is to keep in shape physically, and not necessarily with running in marathon races," Kelley said recently. "Running marathons is OK if you want to, but I advocate soccer, or walking, swimming, baseball or basketball, anything at all to keep in shape."

Every April, Kelley's name is splashed across headlines as the octogenarian announces his plans to run in yet another Boston Marathon.

Runners and spectators alike regard Kelley with awe. He has run in 59 of the annual 26.2-mile races, a record for the 94-year-old marathon.

When Kelley crossed the finish line this May 16, with a respectable time of 5 hours and 5 minutes, a hush fell across the crowd.

Then the cheers began, drowning out Kelley's words to his wife, Laura, 79, who had staked out a place on the sidelines to greet her husband. Everybody knows Johnny.

"When I finished the Boston Marathon this year I had two nurses look me over and I was in better shape than everybody else. My pulse, my blood pressure, everything, was absolutely perfect," he said. "It's hard to believe but it's true."

Kelley ran his first marathon in 1928 and won the race in 1938, at age 27. He won again 10 years later. Since then he has finished it 56 times. He came in second in seven marathons.

Kelley's physician, Kenneth Cooper, who is credited with coining the word "aerobics" and runs the Aerobics Center in Dallas, says his patient is in remarkable physical condition.

"Physiologically, he's about 30 years younger," Cooper said. "He performs on the treadmill like a man who would be in a good category of fitness at 50 years of age."

Cooper added, "His heart is as solid as a rock."

The energetic Cape Cod resident was born Sept. 6, 1907, in Waltham, a Boston suburb.

"When I was a young boy between the ages of 11 and 15, I used to be a caddie. I used to walk, walk, walk, carrying those heavy golf bags. I was just a young boy."

In his teens, Kelley walked a mile to school and back, another mile to track practice, and another mile to his job at a gas station.

In 1936, Kelley was a part of the American track team at the Olympic Games in Berlin. In the marathon competition, Kelley finished 18th. In 1948, Kelley competed in the Olympics in London, placing 21st in the marathon.

Kelley is an artist by trade, and the couple has a gallery in their home devoted to his oil paintings.

Kelley also takes time out a few times a year to speak to young people about fitness. The John Hancock Running and Fitness Clinics, an educational program of John Hancock Financial Services, sponsors lectures by Kelley and Bill Rodgers, a four-time Boston Marathon winner.

Kelley said he tells the students to get away from television.

"I say to try and do something, if possible, for exercise every day of your life. The easiest thing is walking, which we don't do very much, we watch TV," he said. "Try swimming or walking in moderation. Something. Every day. It's not necessarily taking part in sports like football or hockey. That's for the professional teams. But try to do something in your own way, that will keep you in condition."

Not a day goes by that Kelley does not partake in physical exercise — except the day before the Boston Marathon.

"I'm trying very hard to stay alive and the way I can keep going is to keep up my activity. My doctor down in Dallas says 'You don't wear out, you rest out.'"

Cooper met his star patient while running the Boston Marathon in 1963.

"He's amazing, that's all I can say. There will never be another Johnny Kelley," Cooper said.

Kelley said he would like to speak to President Bush about the country's fitness.

"They say if Michael Jackson can go (to Washington D.C.), why can't Johnny Kelley go?" he said. "President Bush is also an advocate of physical fitness. He's a jogger, and I don't like broccoli either. So I think we'd have a lot to talk about."

Gary Jones has written you several times regarding an International Conference on Education and World Economy which he and Terrel Bell proposed be held in conjunction with the Houston Summit. I wanted to give you an update, should you hear from him again.

The Department of Education is currently working with NASA and the National Science Foundation on another international conference -- a joint international ministerial-level meeting to address the critical need for more highly-trained scientific and technological personnel. This Conference on the Education and Development of the Scientific and Technical Workforce for the Twenty-first Century would be held in the Spring of 1991. It would be jointly planned by the G-7 nations and provide a substantive dialogue on ways of increasing cooperation in this field.

Education therefore does not support the International Conference on Education and the World Economy. They believe a math/science conference to be more of a priority at this time.

Dear Andy,

It was a pleasure speaking with you at the reception earlier this year at Davis, Malm, & D'Agostine in Boston. It is gratifying to see that the President's China policy resulted in the release of Fang Lizhi, as we both hoped it would when we spoke.

Of course, the President faces even more complex and difficult times now in the Persian Gulf, and my thoughts are with him, as well as with you and the rest of the Administration, as he confronts this challenge.

Because of the difficulties of the time, I am reluctant to bring a problem my company is having to your attention; but I would appreciate a moment's consideration if at all possible.

We recently applied to the Treasury department for a license to facilitate travel arrangements in Vietnam and Cambodia for a delegation from the University Museum of the University of Pennsylvania. It was my understanding that, while regulations in general forbid our making such arrangements, a license could be obtained if the purpose of the delegation were sufficiently consistent with Administration policy in the region.


Given the recent changes in the situation in Southeast Asia, it seems to me that the delegation's visit would fit nicely with developing trends in Administration thinking about the region by contributing to the development of non-diplomatic, cultural ties with both Cambodia and Vietnam.

It is not our intention to circumvent Administration policy nor to get out ahead of the President on this issue, but it seems to us that the delegation's purpose as outlined in the application for the license, a copy of which is enclosed, is not in conflict with Administration policy. That's why I am a bit perplexed about being denied the license, and I wonder if you would be able to help clarify the issue for me.

I apologize for impinging on your time, especially during this period of crisis, but I am under a deadline if the delegation is to work.





China Educational Tours, Inc., hereby applies for a license to coordinate travel services in Cambodia and Vietnam for a delegation from The University Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology, the University of Pennsylvania. The delegation will be formed as a part of the Museum's ongoing program of cultural exchanges. The trip, which will include Thailand and Laos as well as Cambodia and Vietnam, will take place in January and February of 1991.

Participation in the delegation will be by invitation only. Invitations will be extended to Museum officers, members, staff, and supporters. Invitations will not be issued until a license has been granted. Therefore, membership in the delegation has not yet been determined.

The University Museum, located at Thirty-third and Spruce Streets, Philadelphia, PA 19104, is devoted to the study and dissemination of knowledge about the history and diversity of human cultures and societies. Founded one century ago, The University Museum has comprehensive archaeological and ethnological collections, amounting to nearly 1 million objects, under the supervision of eight curatorial sections.

The University Museum is a research institution that has sponsored, wholly or in part, several hundred archaeological, ethnological, and historical field research projects. The Museum's Asian Section contains ethnographic and archaeological material from India, Southeast Asia and East Asia. Current research focuses on connections among the various parts of Asia as illustrated in a recent exhibit "Buddhism: The History and Diversity of a Great Tradition." The excavations carried out at Ban Chiang, Thailand, and the subsequent continuing program of metallurgical investigations in Southeast Asia continue this emphasis on larger themes connecting Asian cultures and civilizations.

For a number of years starting in the late 1970s, the Museum sponsored a Graduate Program in Anthropology for Southeast Asian Archaeologists funded largely by a five-year Ford Foundation grant. Participants included archaeologists from Burma, the Philippines, Indonesia, and Thailand. The Ford Foundation grant provided the basis for an ongoing educational relationship with anthropologists from Southeast Asia. Word was sent to Hanoi that a Vietnamese archaeologist would be eligible, although none has yet enrolled.

The Museum maintains a full complement of service, support, and research facilities, and the Museum's research is shared with its members in a number of ways. In the course of a year some 200,000 persons (excluding students of the University) come to the University Museum to view its permanent and changing exhibitions and to attend the many events that it sponsors. The magazine Expedition, as well as other popular and scholarly publications, reach many more thousands of people throughout the world. And the Museum sends delegations of staff specialists and museum members to areas of the world in which the museum conducts research projects or has a research interest.

The delegation for which a license is requested is designed to continue and expand the Museum's cultural and educational ties with Southeast Asia and to provide its members with a opportunity to better understand the cultural and historical interrelations of all the countries occupying the region. The delegation will investigate ways in which The University Museum may contribute in the future, when the political situation is settled, to the preservation of endangered historic and cultural artifacts in the region. (This policy is in line with that taken by UNESCO and other international cultural organizations.) To this end, the delegation will be comprised of Museum members who are instrumental in the development and implementation of Museum policy and programs and will be led by two anthropologists with vast experience in the region.

Heather Peters, Keeper of the Asian Collections and Research Associate of The University Museum, has an ethnographic research project centered in the Sipsongpanna region of Yunnan Province, China. Although the area today falls within the political borders of China, the history and culture of the people living in this region are closely linked with those found in Laos and northern Thailand. Dr. Peters has conducted survey visits in both Vietnam and Cambodia.

David Feingold is an anthropologist and film maker who has pursued major documentary film and research projects in Cambodia and Vietnam, as well as in Thailand. His films include one on the restoration of Cambodia's historic Angkor Wat for National Geographic Television, as well as programs for ABC, NBC, MacNeil/Lehrer, and PBS. This trip with the University Museum will be Dr. Feingold's ninth to Cambodia since 1985. His first was in 1961.

The delegation's preliminary itinerary is attached. This itinerary reflects the programmatic desires of the Museum, but logistical and political considerations may require some alteration as planning continues. Any changes are not expected to alter the content of the program substantially.

The University Museum has asked China Educational Tours, Inc. (CET), to administer travel logistics for the delegation. CET is a Massachusetts corporation located at 1110 Washington Street, Boston, MA 02124. CET was founded to provide educational travel services to universities, secondary schools, museums, professional organizations,

and community groups. CET's programmatic mission is to promote international understanding through cultural exchange and travel.

CET and the Museum have worked together in the past on projects similar to this one. In 1987, CET administered a program focusing on China's Yunnan Province, including the Sipsongpanna, where delegation members from The University Museum were acquainted with Dr. Peters' ongoing research project there. In 1990, CET administered a program in Indonesia that examined the cultures of both the Toraja and the Dayak peoples in situ. This program was run in conjunction with the Museum's exhibit of Dayak artifacts and was headed by the exhibit's curator, Dr. William Davenport.

CET's role as operator and booking agent for the delegation to Southeast Asia will require both direct and indirect contact with the respective travel services, hotels, restaurants, etc., in Cambodia and Vietnam, as well as in Thailand and Laos, the other two countries included. We expect most of CET's contact with these agencies to be made through Orbitours Pty Ltd., 7th floor Dymocks Building, 428 George Street Sydney, NSW 2000, Australia, although some direct contact will be required.

CET will also be required to make payments, predominately through Orbitours, to these organizations in exchange for travel services provided. The total amount to be paid to these organizations is not expected to exceed 100,000 USD and may be significantly less. The exact amount will not be known until all bookings are completed, and confirmed bookings will not take place until the appropriate license has been issued to CET.

In addition to travel organizations, both CET and The University Museum will contact cultural organizations, primarily via the cultural ministries of the countries involved. Museums, related institutions, and archaeological sites are the highest priority because of their importance to the archaeological and anthropological interests of The University Museum. It is not anticipated at this time that substantial payments will be made to these cultural organizations, although CET may be required to pay them for incidental expenses incurred on behalf of the delegation.


After discussing my application with Jeff Braunger of your office, it appears to me that there may be some misunderstanding concerning the constitution of the delegation to Southeast Asia from the University Museum.

In particular, Mr. Braunger indicated that the method of forming the delegation as described in my application violates the prohibition against promoting tour programs to Southeast Asia. He stated further that had the museum approached me with an already constituted group and asked me to provide services this prohibition would not likely be seen to be violated.

However, The Museum was aware of the prohibition against promoting travel to Vietnam and Cambodia and consciously decided not to formulate its delegation list until receiving authorization from the Treasury Department to do so. The Museum did not, and does not, wish to violate the Treasury Department regulations, and it assumed that with the approval to proceed would come clear guidelines about who could and who could not be considered an appropriate delegation member, guidelines which the Museum did not wish to violate. In no event is there to be a public solicitation.

Given these factors, we would respectfully request a reconsideration of the decision to deny the license.

Dear Mr. May:

This is in response to your letter of June 21, 1990, requesting a license to coordinate travel services for the University Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology at the University of Pennsylvania, for their travels to Vietnam and Cambodia.

The Foreign Assets Control Regulations, 31 C.F.R. Part 500 (the "Regulations") prohibit, among other things, unlicensed transactions by persons subject to U.S. jurisdiction, involving property in which Vietnam, Cambodia, or nationals thereof, have an interest. Specifically, section 500.563(c) prohibits persons subject to U.S. jurisdiction from arranging, promoting, or facilitating group or individual travel to these designated countries. This includes facilitating travel to Vietnam and Cambodia as described in your letter, and may not be undertaken unless authorized by a specific license. It is contrary to current U.S. Government policy to authorize this transaction and your request is hereby denied.




