RE: Women's Senate Republican Victory Committee

The Women's Senate Republican Victory Committee (WSRVC) held its second organizational meeting this morning with 45 women in attendance from around the country. Our list of National Co-Chairwomen and State Co-Chairwomen is growing on a daily basis, and we already have 96 women committed to achieving our goal.

We will be doing a mass mailing in the next few days. The National Republican Senatorial Committee has a stake in the success of this committee. They will be giving to us for our use the names of women who have made donations to their committee. They are also giving us for our use their \$1,000 Inner Circle file.

The National Federation of Republican Women is turning over to us a list of women who have been \$1,000 donors, and we have been told the Republican National Committee will send a mailing to Eagle members urging support of this committee.

It's important to underscore the critical nature of furthering the momentum of this project. To help get the program moving with the greatest velocity, P/M Consulting Corporation has volunteered their resources on a strictly pro bono basis.

If you would talk with Congresswomen Pat Saiki, Claudine Schneider or Lynn Martin, they will tell you that they're counting on us to take over the burden of the national fundraising while campaigning in their home states during the month of October.

We have already been able to assist Senator Phil Gramm for Congresswoman Pat Saiki last week raising a little over \$50,000 for her campaign.

Enclosed is a packet of materials from this morning's meeting. This includes a newly printed brochure and an overview of how the WSRVC is functioning, as well as the explanation of the fact that it is not a PAC but a joint fundraising committee.

We are committed to doing a day-long briefing in Washington for our \$1,000 donors and a special event for \$10,000 donors.

We hope you can do everything possible to secure us a date in October and would hope that the date would be thirty days or more from today. This is necessary to allow us the time we need to get the WRSCV running in full momentum.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS YOU MAY HAVE
CONCERNING CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE
"WOMEN'S SENATE REPUBLICAN VICTORY COMMITTEE"

1. What is the WSRVC?

The WSRVC is a "joint fundraising committee" recently formed by six Republican Women candidates for the U.S. Senate in conjunction with the National Republican Senatorial Committee (NRSC). Its purpose is to assist those candidates' campaigns to raise funds from individuals who have demonstrated their commitment to Republican Senate candidates.

2. Who are the candidates who will benefit from my contribution?

The candidates that formed and will benefit from the WSRVC are Representatives Lynn Martin (IL), Patricia Saiki (Hawaii), and Claudine Schneider (RI), Senator Nancy Kassebaum (KS), Christine Whitman (NJ), and Jane Brady (DE).

3. How much of my contribution will go to each of the candidates?

Under a formula agreed upon by the candidates, your contribution will be divided as follows: the campaign committees of Lynn Martin, Claudine Schneider, and Patricia Saiki will each receive twenty-eight (28) percent and the campaign committees of Nancy Kassebaum, Jane Brady and Christine Whitman will each receive five (5) percent. The NRSC will receive the remaining one (1) percent.

4. What are the limits on contributions to the WSRVC?

Contributions to the WSRVC are not subject to any specific limit because, as a joint fundraising committee, contributions are attributed to the candidates. However, to reduce the risk of donors inadvertently exceeding the annual and individual candidate limitations imposed by Federal law, we are suggesting a \$3,500 limitation on contributions to the WSRVC.

The annual limitation on contributions prohibits any individual from contributing more than \$25,000 in total to Federal candidates and Federal political committees in a given year. The individual candidate limit prohibits individuals from contributing more than \$1,000 per election to a Federal candidate. This limit applies separately to the primary and general election. The WSRVC will attempt to identify and return any checks that exceed this limit.

5. Are contributions to the WSRVC tax deductible?

No. Since the Tax Reform Act of 1986, political contributions are not tax deductible.

6. Does the WSRVC accept corporate contributions?

Yes. Although Federal law generally prohibits contributions from corporations and labor unions (any incorporated organization -- profit or nonprofit), political committees are allowed to maintain a "nonfederal account", which may accept corporate contributions and use them for certain limited activities. Corporate contributions to the WSRVC will be allocated to the NRSC's nonfederal fund.

Nonfederal corporate or individual contributions should be "designated" accordingly either by notation on the face of the contribution check or in an accompanying letter.

7. Who should I make my contribution check payable to?

Your check should be made payable to the "Women's Senate Republican Victory Committee".

8. Can I earmark my contribution to the WSRVC for a specific candidate?

Yes. Donors to the WSRVC may designate (earmark) their contributions to a specific candidate. To do so, a donor should indicate the name of the candidate and/or the amount of the contribution earmarked thereto on the contribution check (e.g., "earmark my contribution for _____", or "earmark \$500 of my contribution to _____"). Alternatively, this information may be provided in a letter accompanying the contribution check.

9. Are any individuals prohibited from making contributions to WSRVC?

Yes. Foreign nationals are prohibited from making contributions (this prohibition does not apply to foreign citizens who are lawfully admitted for permanent residence in the U.S. -- those who have "green cards"). In addition, individuals under contract to the Federal government are prohibited from making contributions (but if you are merely employed by a business with Federal government contracts, you are permitted to make contributions).

JOINT FUNDRAISING COMMITTEES

Federal election law permits political committees to join together for the purpose of raising funds. Participants to a joint fundraising activity may include candidate committees, political party committees, and non-connected political committees (federal and non-federal).

To engage in a joint fundraising effort, participants must sign a written agreement specifying the formula for allocating fundraising proceeds and expenses. In addition, the participants must designate a "fundraising representative", who is responsible for administering the written agreement, handling financial transactions (receiving contributions and paying expenses), maintaining records and filing reports of financial activity with the Federal Election Commission (FEC).

The fundraising representative may be one of the political committees participating in the joint fundraising effort or, more commonly, the participants may create a new political committee to serve as the fundraising representative, commonly referred to as a "joint fundraising committee".

Although registered and required to file reports with the FEC, a joint fundraising committee is not subject to federal contribution limitations ordinarily applicable to political committees. Instead, contributions to a joint fundraising committee count against the donor's contribution limits to the participant political committees -- candidate, party or non-connected -- as allocated pursuant to the agreed upon allocation formula. Thus, contributions to a joint fundraising committee are limited to the amount that a donor may give to all of the joint fundraising participants.

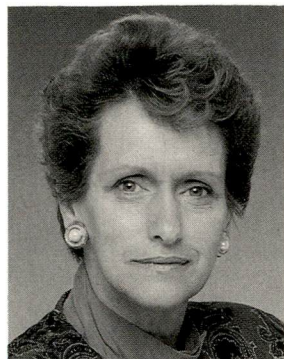

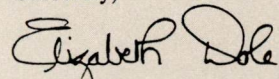

As Honorary Chairman of the Women's Senate Republican Victory Committee, Senator Kassebaum is set to lead this team of Republican women to victory — and lead the Republican Party to a Senate Majority — on election day.

As a five term Congresswoman, Claudine Schneider has been at the forefront of national efforts to encourage policies that promote economic growth, productivity and international competitiveness. In addition, she has a strong record on environmental issues.

Although Claudine trails Senator Pell by less than 6%, poll watchers predict a victory for her on November 6.

FINANCIAL SITUATION:

Claudine is still \$1.3 million short of the funding needed to defeat an entrenched incumbent who receives the bulk of his contributions from Washington Political Action Committees.

Christine faces a tough battle against likely Democrat Presidential nominee, Senator Bill Bradley. Nevertheless, the Bradley campaign reveals major weaknesses in the Senator's opposition to calls for a Constitutional Balanced Budget Amendment and the enforcement of the Gramm-Rudman Deficit Reduction Act.

FINANCIAL SITUATION:

New Jersey has no major media market of its own. As a result, the Whitman campaign is working to raise money to finance radio and T.V. ads on New York and Pennsylvania stations to expose Bradley's anti-Bush record.

Budget target: an additional \$335,000 to be raised before October

ISSUES:

- ★ Avid supporter of Presidential line-item veto.
- ★ Concerned with prenatal and dependent care legislation.
- ★ Strongly advocates environmental protection.
- ★ Proponent of the death penalty for drug kingpins and police homicides.



M. JANE BRADY

BACKGROUND:

- ★ Chief prosecutor, Sussex County, Delaware, 1987-Present

COMMENTS:

If Brady can defeat ultra-liberal Senator Joe Biden, she'll remove

from the Senate one of President Bush's leading adversaries.

As Chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, Senator Biden has been a major obstacle to many of the President's crime and drug programs. However, as Deputy Attorney General of Delaware and later as Chief Prosecutor of Sussex County, Jane Brady has waged a personal campaign to prosecute drug dealers and impose maximum sentences.

FINANCIAL SITUATION:

As one might expect, Biden holds a commanding lead in funds raised. However, due to the small size of Delaware, inexpensive voter outreach and get-out-the-vote programs can quickly change the course of the campaign. The Brady campaign is projecting \$275,000 as the amount needed to help finance several of the outreach programs in key voting precincts.

ISSUES:

- ★ Seeks to reform government spending, bureaucracy and ethics.
- ★ Supports the implementation of a Balanced Budget/Tax Limitation Constitutional Amendment.
- ★ Believes in the advancement of peace through strength.
- ★ Supports the death penalty and tougher sentencing for criminals.
