NUCLEAR WEAPONS DISMANTLEMENT:

AN OPPORTUNITY TO ADVANCE THE GOALS OF NON-PROLIFERATION

U.S. and Post-Soviet Commonwealth Nuclear Challenges

As the United States and the fragile post-Soviet Commonwealth move forward on the path of nuclear weapons reductions, starting with reciprocal decisions to eliminate and destroy tactical nuclear weapons, they face a number of challenging tasks.

- ▶ The assembling, transfer, and safe storage of the involved nuclear weapons. This appears to be well underway.
- ▶ The dismantling of the nuclear warheads, a task that may prove to be formidable and require, in the case of Russia, financial support.
- ▶ Dealing with the discharged fissile material—will it continue to be held in military stockpiles or permanently committed to exclusively peaceful use? There are powerful arms control and non-proliferation arguments in favor of permanently removing this material from military use and for making formal and verifiable commitments to this effect.
- ▶ Agreement on and implementation of a system to verify that all dismantled warhead material remains in storage and, should it be withdrawn, to account for its exclusively peaceful use or eventual disposal.

The Salient Issue: Military Nuclear Material

The two most pressing tasks facing the U.S. and Russia, the **management of disposal and verification** of military nuclear material, have **implications** that reach beyond bilateral nuclear arms control and disarmament. They present a **unique opportunity** to **advance** the cause of **non-proliferation** internationally,

an issue of increased importance in the wake of the Cold War. The nuclear reductions measures now underway provide the occasion for achieving a system effectively to control and verify weapons usable nuclear materials. Two recommendations have emerged recently to achieve these tasks. The recovered material could be stored under joint Russian-American supervision, or a new institution, perhaps under UN

auspices, could be created to take custody of the plutonium and highly enriched uranium involved.

However, neither recommendation addresses the longer term question of the **ultimate use or disposal** of this previously military nuclear material. Moreover, neither makes the obvious **linkage between controlling and safeguarding** nuclear material retired from the military stockpile, on the one hand, and the problem of **growing stocks of safeguarded, but nevertheless separated, plutonium** in civil nuclear programs on the other. Finally, neither approach, as a result, takes into consideration the potential role in dealing immediately with this critical issue of an **existing international organization**, the **International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA)**.

Origins of International Plutonium Storage

In 1953, President Eisenhower launched his **Atoms-For-Peace** initiative in the United Nations General Assembly and proposed the creation of an IAEA whose **main purpose** would be to serve as a **repository** to which "the Governments principally involved" [the United States, Soviet Union and United Kingdom] would "make joint contributions from their stockpiles of normal uranium and fissionable materials." The new agency would "devise methods whereby this **fissionable material would be allocated to serve the peaceful pursuits of mankind**," linking arms control and the **peaceful uses of atomic energy**.

In negotiations on the IAEA statute, the United States proposed that the agency have the **right to require that fissile material surplus to the civilian needs of its members be deposited to prevent national stockpiling**, thus advocating for the peaceful activities sector a concept that originated in arms control. After some **dilution**, the U.S. proposal was incorporated in **Article XII.A.5 of the statute**.

1982 IAEA Study

The concept of the IAEA as a **repository** for nuclear material discharged from weapons stockpiles, and the **provision for placing excess civil fissile material under**

an **IAEA-administered storage regime** have lain **dormant, with one exception**. In 1978, the IAEA, recognizing the proliferation implications that a projected increased presence and use of separated plutonium raised, initiated a **study on international management and storage of plutonium** to generate formal proposals for implementing the provisions of Article XII.A.5.

More than **thirty IAEA member states** participated and prepared a **1982 report** on three approaches to a storage regime, reflecting different perspectives on the relationship between the IAEA and potentially involved states, in particular the procedures for withdrawing deposited plutonium. Consensus could not be reached on one formulation, and no formal action was taken.

There has been, however, continuing international interest in the concept as reflected in the **Third NPT (Non-Proliferation Treaty) Review Conference [1985]** call on the IAEA to "establish an internationally agreed effective **system of international plutonium storage** in accordance with A.XII.A.5 of its Statute."

Reprocessed Fuel

The NPT parties' concern is not with military material in the nuclear weapon states, but with a potentially **large surplus of separated reactor-grade plutonium** that will result from the **reprocessing of fuel discharged from civil reactors**, primarily in Europe and Japan. By the end of the 1990s the total inventory of separated plutonium in non-nuclear weapon states may reach **100 tons**. Little more than **6 kilograms** of plutonium was used in the bomb that destroyed **Nagasaki** in 1945—there is deep and growing concern about the verification and management of this material, and some urge that plans to proceed with reprocessing be terminated.

Although most of the separation work would be carried out in France and Great Britain, two of the five nuclear weapon states, all the material will be **returned to its non-nuclear weapon state owners**. Japan will account for **more than half** of this material and plans to build a large reprocessing plant for operation by the end of this decade.

Emphasis has **shifted to recycling plutonium in existing light water reactors in the form of mixed oxide fuels** and away from the **commercial fast breeder reactors** that originally justified a program of plutonium separation. Although an abundance of relatively low-cost uranium has made it economically impractical, states that have made commitments to utilize plutonium to serve their energy needs remain **reluctant to rescind those plans**. For many of these states reprocessing is a **form of waste management**, and national legislation in several cases conditions approval of reactor construction on acceptable arrangements for spent fuel disposal.

International Storage & Verification

Regional or international spent fuel storage as an alternative, the subject of extensive discussion in the IAEA, failed to provide a viable solution, largely due to the **difficulties of identifying politically acceptable locations for such storage**. While breeder reactors were likely to exist in only a small number of advanced industrial states and involve limited transfer of plutonium across international boundaries, **recycling in thermal reactors** could be more widespread and entail **substantial international commerce in plutonium**.

This creates a **double risk**: on one hand, a government might decide to **abrogate its non-proliferation commitments and to appropriate stockpiled plutonium**; on the other, **terrorists or organized criminal groups might seize plutonium**, especially at its most vulnerable point, **in transit**.

The **storage and verification problems and solutions** associated with separated civil plutonium are **no different** from those associated with plutonium or highly enriched uranium that will accrue from the dismantling of nuclear warheads. The nuclear disarmament measures now underway will provide for a system to effectively control and verify weapons usable nuclear materials. While **consignment of such material to exclusively peaceful use** would be preferred, even the **placement of withdrawn fissile material in internationally verified storage**, without

resolving its eventual disposition, will be encouraged.

Committing **all retired warhead material** to an international verification and control regime would demonstrate the **feasibility of international fissile material storage and verification**, and establish a **powerful precedent** for dealing with all fissile materials not actually in civil use.

Establishment of such a regime would not ensure the end to problems of separated plutonium and highly enriched uranium, but would create an **added barrier** to national diversion or abuse of nuclear material and activity, and **further reduce** the risk of terrorist seizure of weapons-usable material.

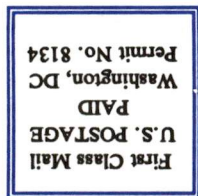
The Role of the IAEA

It is certain that both the weapons states directly concerned and the international community will have to be **satisfied that discharged fissile material does not find its way back into warheads**. Weapons states may be assured of this by **bilateral monitoring**, as in INF. The international community, however, will require **international verification**.

Here the IAEA **becomes directly relevant**, because of its existing safeguards responsibilities, and also the **statutory provisions** granting authority to create a storage arrangement for excess fissile material.

Verification of peaceful use is the IAEA's business and its responsibility as assigned under the NPT and in the **voluntary safeguards agreements** negotiated with the five nuclear weapon states. Non-nuclear weapon states have been sensitive about **discrimination** inherent in NPT and its extension to anything related to non-weapons activity. Recommendations toward meeting those concerns include:

- ▶ Placing **retired military nuclear material** under IAEA verification.
- ▶ Calling on the IAEA to **implement its authority** regarding storage of fissile material excess to civil requirements is a **logical act**, and a measure that could have **profound positive implications** for the

non-proliferation regime.

In the interim before the **1995 NPT extension conference**, these actions could help to **ensure the long-term future** of NPT and the regime that it anchors.

IAEA Director General Hans Blix offered as early as 1989 to Soviet Foreign Minister Shevardnadze, and recently in a letter to Russian President Yeltsin, **the services of the IAEA for safeguarding plutonium and enriched uranium discharged from dismantled Soviet nuclear warheads**. Insofar as the material is **committed to exclusively peaceful use**, the offer is **fully consistent** with the statutory authority of the IAEA and with the original purposes of its conception.

Conclusion

The United States and Russia now have an unparalleled opportunity for farsighted initiative to advance

non-proliferation and underscore their confidence in the IAEA safeguards system. A **joint U.S.-Russian rededication** of the original underlying concept of **Atoms-for-Peace** would be a bold contribution to consolidating the new international order. Three immediate measures would initiate **a new process of nuclear reductions**:

- ▶ **commit** all fissile material from dismantled nuclear warheads to exclusively peaceful use, and when acceptable use cannot be found, to terminal disposal;
- ▶ **establish** for purposes of storing dismantled warhead material, a **fissile material storage regime** subject to national physical protection and verified by the IAEA alone or in conjunction with a bilateral verification arrangement;
- ▶ **undertake** that any material withdrawn from storage will be used for **exclusively peaceful purposes** and be subject to IAEA verification.

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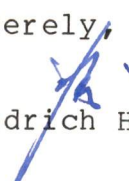

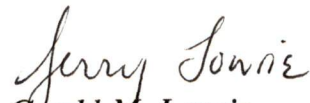

Finalists of the 51st Annual Westinghouse Science Talent Search

The forty finalists of the 51st Annual Science Talent Search, among whom \$205,000 of Westinghouse Science Scholarships will be distributed, represent about 2.3% of those who entered this scientific and educational competition.

Designed to discover and develop scientific and engineering ability among high school seniors, the Science Talent Search is conducted annually for the Westinghouse Science Scholarships by Science Service, 1719 N Street, N.W., Washington, DC 20036.

These 9 females and 31 males are being invited to Washington, D.C. for an all-expenses-paid trip from March 5 through March 9, 1992, to attend the Science Talent Institute. Here 10 of the finalists will be selected by the board of judges to receive one of the following four-year Westinghouse Science Scholarships: one \$40,000 (\$10,000 per year), one \$30,000 (\$7,500 per year), one \$20,000 (\$5,000 per year), three \$15,000 (\$3,750 per year), four \$10,000 (\$2,500 per year). 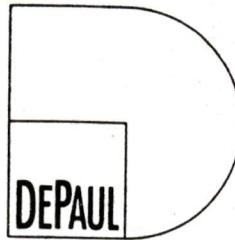

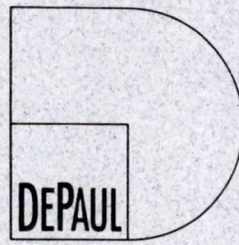

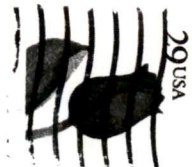
