Dear Gov. Sununu:

For the last twenty years, presidential candidates have proclaimed what as president they would accomplish but have refrained from specifying how they would achieve their objectives. Not since Eisenhower has a president conscientiously tried to balance the budget or the balance of payments. As a result, the indebtedness of the nation both internally and externally may produce consequences which could make any individual wish that he had never been elected to the presidency.

Needed is a specific plan detailing the steps which the government must take to eliminate the hazardous situation now existing. No layman has the knowledge or the investigatory opportunities to judge the feasibility of particular recommendations but something similar to the suggestions enclosed with this letter seems necessary.

Enclosed with this letter are:

1. An outlined plan for the Reduction of Military Expenditures.
2. An outlined plan for the Reduction of Domestic Expenditures.
3. A plan to achieve Balance of Payments.

I submitted approximately this plan to the late Senator Javitz in 1970, I lived in New York State at the time, His opinion was that improving productivity, realignment of currencies, antidumping laws etc. would correct the imbalance. Twenty-eight years later, the negative imbalance has grown to ten billion dollars per month. What is more important, completely Free Trade or the Elimination of a staggering Foreign Debt?

A program including specific actions such as those in these attachments will meet strong opposition. However, if the country is to meet its internal problems such as environment, homelessness, education etc., either similar actions or substantial new taxes are necessary. The consequences of failure to take strong action include evergrowing interest expense and its robbing of other programs and even an inability of the government to borrow sufficient funds to meet its needs.

The creation of a plan presentable to Congress will never result from one individuals ideas but could concepts such as these be the basis for the research, discussion, negotiation and writing of a presentation to Congress perhaps a year from now which if accepted could achieve a balanced budget.

Governor:

I think the time has come to turn certain sensitive political issues over to the people rather than having Congressmen deal with them.

When societies are small, it is possible to have a democratic one-man/one-vote town meeting type of government. With a large populace and a clumsy voting procedure, a republic seems to work best, people voting for representatives who then carry out the business of government.

But representatives have problems. How can they find out what their constituents really want on each and every issue? Canvassing can be faulty, therefore they might not be able to get a good feel for what their people want. The representative who guesses wrong on a certain issues stands to face problems in re-election.

Representatives also have problems with pressure groups. Pressure groups can't lobby all the citizens in a true democracy, but they know who to get to in a republic. The representative who fails to deal effectively with pressure groups is also in trouble at election time.

On the other hand, how can people make sure that their representatives are voting to suit the people and not themselves? It is possible, for example, for politicians to create de facto state religions if they insist on voting according to their religious convictions. The people might need to control their representatives in sensitive issues by more direct means than writing letters, making individual phone calls, and waiting for primary elections to make their needs and displeasures known.

For everyone, how can things be speeded up so issues get decided and everyone can get busy trying to make things work instead of arguing?

We now have electronic help and can streamline the voting process down to where I think it is now possible to turn sensitive issues back to the people.

As you are aware, the Treasury Department is currently reviewing the tariff classification for imported multipurpose vehicles. This issue is of critical importance to the domestic auto industry, and to the Administration, as it implements the new trade law.

We fully expect the Treasury Department will conclude that the Customs Service acted in accordance with the law and U.S. tariff procedure when it classified these vehicles as trucks. It would be unfortunate if the matter were decided under pressure from our overseas trading partners. Foreign manufacturers or governments should pursue their objections with U.S. Customs decisions either through the Court of International Trade, or the dispute settlement process established by the Harmonized Tariff System.

We are taking the liberty of forwarding to you several letters to Secretary Brady from members of Congress, including Speaker Wright, Minority Leader Michel and Senate Majority Leader Mitchell.

I have what I believe is an important suggestion for President Bush's Inaugural Address.

I believe it would be very valuable for the future of President-Elect Bush's Strategic Defense Initiative program--to which he has expressed full commitment--if he made some mention of it and its importance in the speech. He said some very good things about it on the campaign trail.

I have two major policy recommendations:

1. Preserve SDI Budget

I strongly urge you to support maintaining or increasing the FY 90 budget request of \$5.9 billion for SDI which President Reagan had submitted. SDI is too important to America's future peace and security to be cut further.

This figure already reflects a significant cut from earlier administration funding plans and is adding several years of delay to the deployment of Phase I of SDI (see enclosed chart). Further cuts and subsequent delays could be dangerous to SDI's future and that of the United States if deployment is pushed back beyond the mid to late 1990s.

On a related issue, let me point out that there is good public support for the President's admirable commitment to "deploy SDI as soon as it is ready." A nationwide poll by Yankelovich in November (enclosed) found that by 58% to 31% the public approves the proposal that the U.S. "implement Star Wars or SDI on a full scale as soon as it is technically feasible to do so."

The poll also found that general support for SDI and a strong defense increased during the course of the campaign as candidate Bush spoke out forcefully on these issues.

The public definitely wants to be protected from nuclear attack, and the more presidential leadership and educational effort there is on the subject, the more the public will rally politically and affect Congress on the issue.

2. SDI in the February 9th Congressional Address

To head off Congressional efforts to slash SDI's budget, it would be very useful to include some discussion of SDI in the Feb. 9th address to Congress. The President could talk about SDI and its importance to peace and the safety of the American people.

The President has already committed himself to deployment per se. At this stage, it would have a very energizing effect on public support (and thus Congressional) if he dwelt on SDI in the Feb. 9th speech and set a goal to work towards for initiating deployment. The date of 1995 is consistent with the Pentagon rough timetable for beginning deployment of Phase I of SDI.

President Bush is extremely anxious that the bill pass on to the Senate where it appears to meet with acceptance. But this morning's Washington Post has an analysis spread over eight columns of page one taking a view opposed to the bill. It is your responsibility to gain passage of the bill in the House. How do you proceed?

In a similar situation, Speaker O'Neill offered President Carter thirty names that he should call for some personal stroking. The issue was one of the energy bills; Carter refused the advice ... replied instead that he had just convinced the American public of the merits of the bill with the speech he had just delivered ... that the speech itself would be sufficient to pass the bill; he lost the bill. To this day, the Speaker insists that, had Carter made those calls, the final verdict on the bill would have been reversed.

Moral: the personal approach is vital to the survival of a cause.

But thirty calls, at only ten minutes per call, would take five hours of a President's valuable time. Show me the President who can afford such an expenditure of time.

We're talking communication here; yet communication need not be ORAL. As a matter of fact, oral communication, except for a casual comment here and there, has been shown most inadequate. Studies show 90% of oral information is forgotten in hours. And, worse yet, in a spoken exchange between two people, much of the speech never even reaches the consciousness of the other person because his/her mind is occupied with the response.

(John, you're a former professor; you know how little of the spoken word was retained by the student. You know that the information had either to be chalked on the board or handed out in notes if it was to be assimilated by the student.)

I would like a position as a policy analyst or staff aide. I have a Master of Arts Degree in Political Science and an honorable discharge from the army.

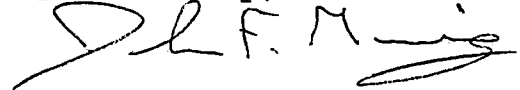
