An evaluation of the system of internal accounting and administrative control of the Securities and Exchange Commission in effect during the year ending September 30, 1989, was performed in accordance with the Guidelines for the Evaluation and Improvement of and Reporting on Internal Control Systems in the Federal Government, issued by the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, in consultation with the Comptroller General, as required in the Federal Managers' Financial Integrity Act of 1982 (Act). This effort included an evaluation of the system of internal accounting and administrative control within the SEC for compliance with the standards prescribed by the Comptroller General.

Enclosure A provides a statistical summary of the performance of the Commission's evaluation efforts since passage of the Act. Of thirty-one material weaknesses and three material non-conformances identified, twenty-five and three, respectively, have been corrected. A description of the Commission's internal control and financial system review processes are included as Enclosure B. Descriptions of the four material weaknesses identified this year and the weaknesses pending from prior years are provided in Enclosure C, along with efforts taken or planned to strengthen the internal controls involved. No material non-conformances were identified in 1989.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND PLANS IN THE INTERNAL CONTROL EVALUATION PROCESS

Since 1982, the Commission has made considerable progress in identifying and correcting material weaknesses and non-conformances. Accomplishments included:

- Achieved overall compliance with Sections 2 and 4 of the Integrity Act in 1983.
- Identified thirty-four material weaknesses and non-conformances. Twenty-eight of these have been resolved.
- Implemented corrective actions that significantly improved program and administrative controls.

- Installed a new primary accounting system using standardized software. This will facilitate the integration of obsolete financial management systems in the future and maintain conformance with core financial management system requirements.
- Identified four material weaknesses, one in personnel and organization management, one in ADP security, one in document management, and one in program management, during 1989; no material non-conformances were identified.
- Transferred responsibility for the program to the Office of Executive Director when the Office of Inspector General was created in March 1989.

Future plans call for an agency-wide risk assessment in 1990. The overall program will be modified to include alternative internal control reviews conducted by the responsible managers.

INTERNAL CONTROLS (SECTION 2 AND A-123)

The objectives of the system of internal accounting and administrative control of the SEC are to provide reasonable assurance that:

- Obligations and costs are in compliance with applicable law;
- Funds, property, and other assets are safeguarded against waste, loss, unauthorized use, or misappropriation; and
- Revenues and expenditures applicable to agency operations are properly recorded and accounted for to permit the preparation of accounts and reliable financial statistical reports and to maintain accountability over the assets.

The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of internal control should not exceed the benefits expected to be derived therefrom, and that the benefits consist of reductions in the risks of failing to achieve the stated objectives. Estimates and judgments are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of control procedures. Furthermore, errors or irregularities may occur and not be detected because of inherent limitations in any system of internal accounting and administrative control, including those limitations resulting from Congressional restrictions and other factors. Finally, projection of any evaluation of the system to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may be inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

The results of the evaluation described in the first paragraph, assurances given by appropriate SEC officials, and other information provided indicate that the system of internal accounting and administrative control of the SEC in effect during the year ending September 30, 1989, taken as a whole, complies with the requirements to provide reasonable assurance that the above mentioned objectives were achieved within the limits described in the preceding paragraph. The evaluation, however, did disclose the following weaknesses:

- The number and frequency of problems involving lack of knowledge and failure to comply with Commission payroll regulations have been steadily increasing; a material level was reached this year. Failure of staff to comply with payroll regulations weakens safeguards against waste and misappropriation of funds. While loss to the agency thus far is unknown, it is not believed to be substantial. Enhanced controls with an emphasis on employee training are planned to correct this weakness.
- Commission ADP security controls need to be enhanced and strengthened. The lack of comprehensive security controls and failure to certify systems have the potential to significantly impair the mission of the agency. To date, however, no impairment of mission has occurred as a result of these deficiencies. Corrective actions will include the issuance of an ADP security policy and procedures, and an assessment of A-130 certification requirements.
- Controls over confidential Commission documents have proven inadequate on occasion. Disclosure of sensitive documents could impair the fulfillment of the agency's mission. The agency plans to assess the overall risk and the costs and benefits of tighter controls.
- The management of ADP systems development projects needs to be strengthened, particularly conflict resolution and contract administration. Corrective actions planned include issuance of guidelines for project management, system design, task plans, milestones, budgets, documentation, and enhanced controls for contract administration procedures.

In addition, as to weaknesses identified previously:

- Management reports from the Complaint Tracking System have been improved to provide adequate support for management tracking of investor complaints. However, long-term plans are to replace the existing system. The new system will provide necessary statistical information concerning consumer complaints.

- The Commission is developing alternative systems for a comprehensive long-term disaster recovery plan for the mainframe computer. The Commission has prepared a detailed statement of work to provide alternative disaster recovery approaches which was submitted to GSA contract authority. Funding for the development of alternatives has been authorized in the 1990 budget. The alternatives will be presented to the Commission in mid-1990, and a cost-effective solution selected by the end of the fiscal year.

Finally, the following weaknesses identified in 1988 were resolved in 1989:

- Personnel problems in the New York Regional Office have been addressed, principally by installing a new management team and relocating the office.
- The processing of formal complaints in the Equal Employment Opportunity program has been accelerated so that agency decisions are now rendered more expeditiously; the agency's 1989 performance is now consistent with 1988 government-wide averages (the most recent year for which government-wide data are available).

Additional details of the material weaknesses identified in 1989, the pending weaknesses, and the resolution of other pending weaknesses are contained in Enclosure C.

CONFORMANCE OF FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS (SECTION 4 AND A-127)

Pursuant to Section 4 of the Federal Managers' Financial Integrity Act, the accounting systems in use during fiscal year 1988 have been reviewed. The review was made in accordance with the Guidelines for Evaluating Financial Management/Accounting Systems issued by the Office of Management and Budget, and based on the principles and standards developed by the Comptroller General and implemented through OMB Circular A-127.

Since the review process is a continuous one, the agency has not completed detailed evaluations of all systems during this past year. The primary accounting system was replaced on October 1, 1988 and is scheduled to be evaluated in 1990. Staff conducted a limited review of each of the other systems. Two detailed evaluations were performed, one of the payroll system and one of personnel. Furthermore, detailed evaluations of each of the systems will be undertaken at least once every three years. The completed evaluations rely on tests of transactions, not on a review of all transactions.

The results of the review described above, assurances given by agency officials, and other information provided indicate that the accounting systems, taken as a whole, generally conform to the principles and standards developed by the Comptroller General and implemented through Circular A-127. The reviews did not disclose instances of material non-conformance. There were not any instances of material non-conformances pending from last year.

In general, we believe our accounting systems assure accountability over the resources entrusted to our care.

Dear Governor Sununu:

It was a pleasure to attend the commencement ceremonies at the college last May, when you delivered the keynote address and were awarded recognition for your many accomplishments.

A new decade is here and with it a number of unresolved issues concerning Latin America; namely, Colombian drugs and their lethal influence upon U.S. society; the debt repayment threat upon the U.S. banking system; the now endemic problems of Cuba and its Nicaraguan satellite; the lack of effectiveness of the I.M.F. and the O.A.S.

Colombia drugs and the debt repayment crisis are at heart but symptoms of deep economic confusion: reaching for short run financial rewards by using the wrong means. The deadly potential influence of Cuba and Nicaragua may be linked, in no small measure, to the long run economic frustration of millions of Latin Americans. Recognition of economic confusion and frustration need to be the focus, if effective solutions are to come from the I.M.F. and the O.A.S.

The White House could serve the best interests of the U.S. by establishing a Latin American Economic Advisor to promote:

First. Diversification of Latin American exports to gradually dispel the prevalent confusion as to how to grow economically.

Second. Economic integration, once export diversification and macro entrepreneurship are in place. This economic integration will be facilitated by the fact that Latin America is already one homogeneous cultural entity in search for sound economic development.

Perhaps you may recall that we sat side by side a couple of years ago at a Washington conference on State rights.

The murder of an American soldier by Noriega's forces prompts me to suggest a fresh approach to dealing with him: abrogate the treaty.

While only the President and Senate can make a treaty, Article IV of the Constitution provides that "Congress shall have power to dispose of . . . Territories or other Property belonging to the United States." "Congress" means both Houses; the House was not consulted. When the issue was submitted to the Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, the court, Judge McKinnon dissenting, held the treaty constitutional. Certiorari was denied by the Supreme Court.

I thought the opinion wretched, and wrote the enclosed critique. Both the situation and the Court are different today. Were the Attorney General to file suit to declare the Treaty unconstitutional, I believe a different result might be anticipated.

Dear John:

As Chairman, Board of Directors of the National Council Against Health Fraud, Inc. (NCAHF) I endorse and urge you to support Victor Herbert, MD, JD as Commissioner of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. He is a man of action in medical research, medical legal-affairs, and voluntary efforts for health consumers. He has worked along with and within the FDA and has criticized it when he saw fit. I have enclosed a brief resume prepared by Dr. Herbert.

As your fraternal friend and sharer in beliefs of the role of government I feel my insights are of value. In our conversations in 1979 I was struck by the parallels we had taken in consumer affairs. The common thread is our adherence to the scientific process. I, as a founding director, believe NCAHF addresses health consumerism with the same principles and criteria that your Consumer Alert addresses its consumer concerns.

An important aspect of my role as chairman, NCAHF, is to encourage the networking and exchange of ideas among our directors. The foundation of the NCAHF is its adherence to the belief that the scientific process is essential to discovering truths and validating health claims and information. As a member of our board Dr. Herbert's integrity to that process and principle is unmatched. He has the respect and ear of our directors.

While credentials are important, Dr. Herbert's uniqueness is integrity: integrity to the scientific process, integrity to facts, and integrity to statutory requirements of the FDA in certifying the safety and effectiveness of our food and drugs. Knowing both you and him, I see Dr. Herbert bringing to the FDA the enthusiasm and conviction of principle that you bring to the administration. You will find his advice and counsel valuable.

The FDA is at a crossroad, and you can significantly influence its direction by your choice and support of its next commissioner. It has done a commendable job but most recently needlessly contributed to public panic and misinformation.

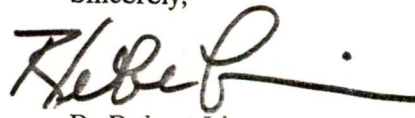

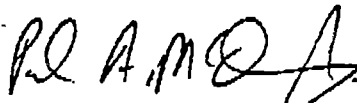

Dear Mr. Sununu:

I am writing to invite you to be the guest speaker at the Lehigh County Republican Committee's upcoming March fundraising dinner. This will be our major fundraising event for the year. We plan for it to take place in the Allentown area on one of the following three Thursdays, March 15, 22, or 29, depending on which date fits your schedule. We expect about three hundred people at \$150 per couple. In addition, we would also like to set aside 45 minutes for a private reception of about fifty people for our Chairman's Club members (those who contribute \$1000 to our county party each year.)

Of course, we well remember your last visit to our area, during the 1988 campaign, when you spoke at a regional Victory Breakfast. Realizing that this is an unorthodox way to apply for a position such as this, I ask that you not trash-can it but to approach this as a possible new avenue. To say that the Federal Emergency Management Agency suffers a public image crisis would be an understatement. Since my entry into the emergency management field in 1980, FEMA has been viewed at the local and state levels as much as a hindrance to our jobs as a help. This coupled with the fact that it is an unknown federal agency until disaster strikes and then witnessed as a stratified bureaucracy by the public, especially those affected, all leads to a poor perception both by the public and emergency response professionals.

Headlines in South Carolina tells the story.

"FEMA Itself Is Seen As A Disaster"

I enclose an article from today's Los Angeles Times. I cannot attest to the validity of the article, but I can attest to my own sense of frustration after reading it.

I resigned from Public Storage in June of this year. My career in private sector organization and management systems had spanned a period of approximately 20 years. I am motivated by a sense of service to the public sector. Now that I am almost half a century old, it is important to me that I attempt to make a meaningful difference in a world beyond the narrow horizons of the private sector.

I have spent the past five months exploring the possible options for this transition to take place. I have ruled out being of service to my government in Washington. This is not because I am not grateful and proud to be an American citizen or because I do not have the greatest respect for the current administration or because I do not consider my passport to be among my most valuable possessions. It is because after writing to both my senators, my congressman and Mr. Untermyer and never receiving the courtesy of a reply from ANY of these fine gentlemen, I decided that, with all my experience in revitalizing staid bureaucratic systems and with all my expertise in management, this was one bureaucracy in which even I could not increase efficiency or serve to the benefit of all.

Sir, I am a part of the "half a generation" to which the article refers. I am 48 years old, my children have graduated or are about to graduate college, I have no mortgage, am willing to relocate, am aware that compensation in the public sector is lower than the private sector, am willing to make the transition regardless, am accountable, ethical, loyal, relatively intelligent, well informed and truly desire to serve my Country and my World. I am involved with international and educational institutions on a volunteer basis, but now desire to make a commitment on a full time professional basis as well. If it helps, I am a minority on two counts.

As previously stated, I am in the process of exploring options. I have compiled the enclosed resume for you, in case you should be interested in my professional history. I will fully respect your opinion that my qualifications do not meet the needs of any department in the government. However, as a responsible business person, it is my opinion that someone owes me the courtesy of a reply and possibly the opportunity for a personal interview.

Global climate change is an important public policy issue that deserves much attention, reasoned discussion, and appropriate action. On this, and a host of other environmental issues, the President is providing much leadership and action.

The President has proposed a dramatic increase in expenditures for research and monitoring to resolve critical scientific questions. We plan to spend about a half billion dollars for this purpose in the coming year. The President invited other countries to participate with us in this research at the Paris Economic Summit last summer.

The President's comprehensive Clean Air proposal calls for sharp reductions in the burning of fossil fuels from stationary sources, automobiles, factories, and a host of other commercial establishments. It also provides strong incentives for conservation, a major element in any global climate response.

The President also has approved increasing corporate average fuel economy standards for U.S. automobiles. He has announced U.S. support for a worldwide phase-out of (chlorofluorocarbons) by the year 2000. And he has directed the development of a comprehensive national energy strategy.
