Dear John:

For the first time since 1984, the Trilateral Commission is holding its annual meeting in Washington next year -- on April 21-23. Enclosed is the overall program, as outlined in a planning meeting I had with the European and Japanese and Canadian leadership of the Commission in Tokyo a few weeks ago.

I very much hope the President will be able to receive the Commission at the White House sometime in the course of the three days. While the Commission has had a certain notoriety in some circles in the United States -- which you may be more aware of than most given your experience in New Hampshire where the President's earlier membership in the Commission was used against him in the 1980 primaries -- I believe it is an extraordinarily useful group, and it symbolizes from an American perspective our working partnership with allies in Western Europe, Canada, and Japan. I am also enclosing here a Commission membership list. We expect somewhat over half of the membership to participate in the Washington meeting.

We are of course quite flexible with regard to the timing and the nature of the event with the President. In 1984, there was a late afternoon reception at the White House. President Reagan spoke briefly to the group (off-the-record) and shook hands with many members as he departed. In 1978, there was also a late afternoon reception at the White House. President Carter spoke briefly and then spent some time in discussion with the group. The ideal time for us next spring would be in the late afternoon or early evening -- perhaps around 6:00 p.m. -- of April 23 (Monday) before we go, hopefully, to the State Department, or April 22 before we go to the Capitol Building for dinner. But we are quite flexible.

Deukmejian, Wilson at Odds On Oil Drilling and Pesticides

Reflecting a simmering debate in the Republican ranks, Governor Deukmejian yesterday distanced himself from the environmental views of GOP gubernatorial candidate Pete Wilson.

Deukmejian opened a Capitol press conference with a report on the Huntington Beach oil spill and a defense of offshore drilling, which Wilson has long opposed.

Deukmejian praised the state's cleanup and said only 20 percent of the oil remained from the 400,000 gallons that gushed from a tanker last week in California's worst spill in two decades.

A storm packing gale-force winds on Tuesday night pushed much of the floating oil onto nearly 25 miles of the region's popular surfing and sunbathing beaches — from Anaheim Bay to Newport Beach. The storm generated rough

seas yesterday that forced a flotilla of oil skimming boats to seek refuge in port.

In response to questions, the governor said opponents of offshore drilling have "a very short-sighted view. They're not looking at the big picture of what's needed for our country."

President Bush is deciding whether to allow drilling off the California coast. Deukmejian has backed the continued drilling, saying California must reduce its dependence on imported oil. But Wilson insists that environmental concerns outweigh the need for the fuel.

"There's no question that he has a different view than I do on this subject," Deukmejian said of Wilson, who has a lock on the GOP nomination for governor in the June primary.

The opposing views reflect a split among Republicans. Traditional business and agricultural interests, who have a sympathetic ear in Deukmejian, are at odds with Wil-

son over his opposition to offshore drilling and stricter regulations of agricultural chemicals.

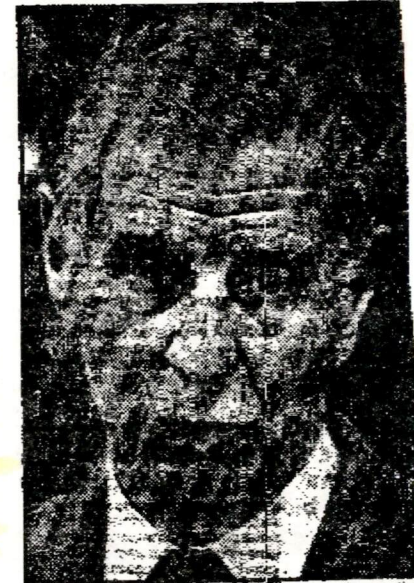
Sources say Deukmejian has grown testy about Wilson's campaign speeches in which the implication is clear that he would be a different kind of governor from Deukmejian.

Yesterday, Deukmejian also differed with Wilson over pesticide regulations.

The governor was asked to comment on a Senate report that state regulators had ignored their own scientists and approved chemical products with incomplete health studies. The report said the state Department of Food and Agriculture at least 20 times had approved pesticides and other substances against the advice of its own health experts.

"In general, I'm very satisfied with the way our Department of Food and Agriculture has monitored this program," he said.

Wilson has proposed creating a

state version of the federal Environmental Protection Agency that would oversee state regulation of pesticides. Environmentalists have long criticized the Department of Food and Agriculture as being too lenient in pesticide enforcement.

"I don't support making a change just to make a change," Deukmejian said. "At present, I don't think there is sufficient reason to make that kind of change."

Duke rips offshore oil critics

Calls views of Wilson, others shortsighted

Gov. Deukmejian leaped to the defense of offshore oil drilling Wednesday in the wake of last week's Southern California oil spill, saying U.S. Sen. Pete Wilson and others who want to ban drilling are shortsightedly ignoring the country's overall energy needs.

The Republican governor said the latest spill, which occurred when a tanker ruptured its hull off Huntington Beach, should not fuel efforts to halt drilling. Rather, he said, it points up the need to lessen California's dependence on tanker-shipped imported oil.

Wilson, who is the sole Republican bidding to replace Deukmejian as governor, has long differed with prominent members of his own party on the question of offshore oil drilling. Deukmejian did not try to downplay his disagreement with the senator's call for a ban on further development.

"I have said of those people who hold the view of wanting to continue a ban on any further offshore development, that I think it's a very shortsighted view," Deukmejian said at a Capitol press conference.

"I think that they're not looking at the bigger picture of the interests of our country and what the needs are at the present time."

Deukmejian said Californians use twice as much crude oil as is produced in the state.

"I don't hear them calling on residents of this state to cut the consumption of the amount of gasoline that they use in half," he said.

Wilson spokesman Bill Livingston said the senator is pushing now for increased development of alternative fuels. In the meantime, he said, Wilson does not believe the benefits of increased oil development are worth the environmental risks.

"The question is, should we sacrifice our coastline in order to have a marginal decrease in our foreign dependence on oil? Wilson says no," Livingston said.

President Bush, who is due to announce a national energy strategy soon, has also said the Southern California oil spill should not lead to a complete shutdown of offshore oil drilling.

can proceed with the exception of certain "environmentally sensitive" areas.

"I don't know what his final decisions are going to be, but I tend to feel that it will be along those lines," he said. "I don't think there will be much difference between their position and the position that we have held since the beginning of our administration."

That position is at odds with the one taken by most Californians, according to an August California Poll. Three-fourths of those surveyed said they were opposed to more drilling for oil and natural gas along California's coast, by far the highest level of opposition ever expressed in a state poll.

In addition, 57 percent of those questioned said they

didn't believe offshore oil drilling could be done in an environmentally safe way, while 38 percent said it could.

Deukmejian also was critical of Wilson's call for creation of a California Environmental Protection Agency, saying he is not convinced a new department is necessary. "I don't support making a change just to make a change," he said.

The governor had even harsher words, however, for one of the Democratic gubernatorial candidates, state Attorney General John Van de Kamp.

Van de Kamp announced last week that he would no longer defend state actions allowing the logging of old-growth timber, saying that has legal role conflicted with his gubernatorial campaign and his belief that the practice ought to be outlawed.

Deukmejian, who also declined to take cases when he

served as attorney general, said he believes it is "contrary to law" for Van de Kamp to withdraw from cases he previously had accepted. He also questioned Van de Kamp's logic, noting that the attorney general continues to handle capital punishment cases despite his personal opposition to the death penalty.

"On the other hand, when it comes to trees, he says to the middle of representing an agency that he's not going to continue to represent the state because he doesn't want those trees to be cut down," he said.

"I'm finding it a little hard to figure out whether people are more important to him than trees or are trees more important to him than people."

A spokesman for Van de Kamp said he disagrees with the governor's interpretation of the laws governing the attorney general's role.

Dear President Bush:

We have taken note of the extreme and negative statements which have been made in the wake of your major policy statement on global warming at Georgetown University and want you to know that we support your concerned, yet cautious approach to this possible problem.

The news media have reported that there were those who demanded immediate, draconian and expensive courses of action based upon doomsday predictions of one school of thought in the scientific community.

We applaud you for recognizing that there is another school of thought by others in the scientific community -- persons whose credentials are immaculate -- who disagree on either the existence or degree of the presumed problem.

We particularly appreciated your statement, as quoted in news media reports, that environmental protection and economic development must be balanced. We agree fully, but would like to point out that the same balance must be achieved between environmental values on the one hand and the ability of state and local governments to provide for the basic needs of people, such as water supply and highway infrastructure, on the other.

We must report that, across the nation, a serious imbalance exists and it has gotten much worse during your administration, and it has been because many of the same extremists who are now attacking you because of your cautious approach to global warming have been given almost carte blanche to stop essential public projects when -- as usually is the case -- Federal permits are required.

Perhaps a return to balance is on the horizon. Your responsible statements at Georgetown University have given us hope.

Bush delays action on environment

WASHINGTON — President Bush yesterday called for more research on global warming, angering environmentalists who thought he had promised action on what they consider a major threat.

In a major speech delivered at Georgetown University to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, Bush said environmental protection and economic development must be balanced.

"Our goal continues to be matching policy commitments to emerging scientific knowledge — and a reconciling of environmental protection to the continued benefits of economic development," Bush said.

Environmentalists raged against Bush yesterday. Sen. Albert Gore Jr., D-Tenn., said Bush is "moving like molasses when sure, steady leadership is needed." The Sierra Club rated Bush's speech a "gross disappointment."

Bush's remarks brought a subdued reaction from many of the participants at the international

conference sponsored by the United Nations and attended by representatives from some 60 nations.

Bush made a campaign pledge to forge an international agreement to prevent climate change.

According to theory, burning fossil fuels such as coal and oil,

which causes the emission of carbon dioxide, is raising the world's temperature and could cause coastal flooding and alter growing seasons and patterns.

WETLANDS

Developers gain in wetlands pact

What began as a presidential promise of "no net loss" of wetlands ended last week in what may be a big gain for those who want to build on them. A new pact between the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the Corps of Engineers will, in certain circumstances, allow wetlands to be developed without any requirement for mitigation or compensation.

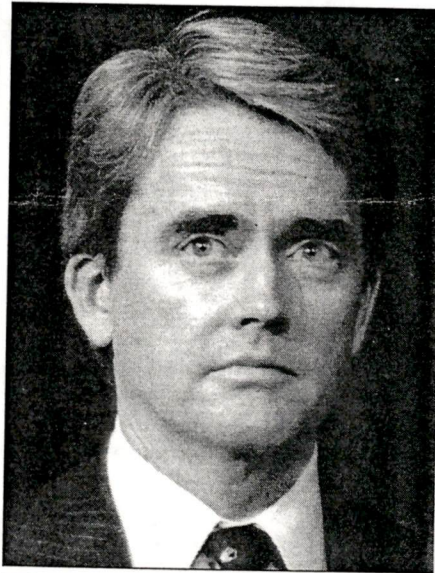
After months of delay marked by political fighting within the Bush administration, the White House finally approved the memorandum of agreement between EPA and the Corps that will govern implementation of Section 404 of the Clean Water Act—the dredge-and-fill program. But the OK came only after White House Chief of Staff John Sununu rammed through the agreement over the objections of EPA Administrator William K. Reilly.

Watered down? Conservationists hailed the original agreement, released in November, because it called for "sequencing" by developers when dredging or filling wetlands. It required that developers first attempt to avoid affecting wetlands and, failing that, to reduce the impact. As a last resort, they would have to compensate for unavoidable environmental loss through mitigation—restoring an existing wetland or building an artificial one.

Alaska's congressional delegation howled in protest, claiming that because much of the state is wetlands, the provisions would stifle development. The oil industry chimed in, worried that development of the North Slope oil fields would be curbed.

Their protests fell on Sununu's sympathetic ears. As governor of New Hampshire, he fought EPA when it invoked wetlands concerns over a state highway project. Through his intervention, the new agreement states that mitigation "may not be practicable where there is a high proportion of land which is wetlands."

The changes have enraged environmentalists. "They've added an enormous

loophole," says Hope Babcock, general counsel of the National Audubon Society. "The document that was finalized says, 'If you have a lot of wetlands, you don't have to sequence. You can fill with impunity.'"

The original agreement represented the first time that EPA and the Corps agreed on guidelines for the administration of the wetlands program. Symbolically, it meant even more because it was the first guidance from within the administration on how to proceed with President Bush's stated goal of "no net loss" of wetlands.

Kidneys. The government contends that about 500,000 acres of wetlands, which serve as natural "kidneys," filtering pollutants from water supplies, are destroyed yearly by development.

The 404 program has always been controversial because of dual roles played by the Corps and EPA. The Corps issues permits but EPA has the right to revoke them. Under Reilly, the environmental agency has become more aggressive in denying permits and has been criticized by developers who believe they have been wronged.

Developers now see hope. "The

original [agreement] set the tone that economic considerations take a back seat to the pure ethic of wetlands conservation," says Robert Tonsing, director of the Nationwide Public Projects Coalition, a group of developers and local government officials concerned with regulatory difficulties in obtaining 404 permits. "Now, to a degree, they've backed off."

Reilly downplayed the revisions and says the program will continue to be administered flexibly and that the new agreement provides "more predictability" to developers. But he admits that "we would have been satisfied with the November [agreement]."

Conservationists now worry that regional officials will find it harder to press for mitigation because the way the new agreement was formulated—through direct intervention by the White House. "Because this issue received so much visibility it clearly reflects the President's direction," says Babcock. "It goes beyond guidance."

The defeat for environmentalists was tempered somewhat by a court victory last week in San Francisco. The federal appellate court ruled that a 40-

acre parcel of land near San Francisco Bay was protected wetlands and could not be filled in by its owner without a 404 permit. The court overturned a lower court decision that the land did not fit the definition of a wetland and ruled that the Corps had jurisdiction.

But even so, conservationists worry. Bush's decision to approve the altered pact, coupled with his muted warning last week on global warming, arouse fears that the current actions of the "environmental President" don't match his earlier promises. ■

Proposal would require permits for borrow pits

Environmental proposals may make it difficult for contractors to meet starting dates for road projects in southwest Florida. The Southwest Florida Water Management District is considering a proposed rule change that would require a permit for mining activities in 16 counties. The district also will require restoration of wetlands disturbed by mining activities.

The rule exempts phosphate companies, which account for most of the mining activity, but it does cover aggregate mining by the state Dept. of Transportation and its contractors, says Charles J. Allen, FDOT administrator for environmental permits.

Under the proposed rule, contractors would have to obtain a permit for a borrow pit prior to beginning roadwork. Allen says, "We estimate that for a contractor to obtain a permit for a borrow pit would take about six months. That runs us 45 to 50 days over the time allowed between contract signing and start-up."

Robert G. Bursleson, president of the Florida Transportation Builders Association, says, "It's certainly going to drive up costs. Delays equate to money and so costs have to go up. If you overrun on time in Florida, you are declared delinquent and you can't bid on any other [FDOT] work."

Because of the wetlands mitigation that would be involved, Allen says it is doubtful that many contractors would arrange to have borrow pits in wetlands areas.

He says FDOT has 37 borrow pits in the 16-county area for road maintenance materials. Those pits could be grandfathered if they were made deeper but not wider, he says. ■

Corps revises basin program

The Corps of Engineers has unveiled a program for controlled flooding of farmland to create a waterfowl habitat in the sprawling Yazoo Basin in Mississippi. It reflects a new emphasis on enhancing the environment in addition to the Corps's primary job of flood control, say Corps officials.

The first test project uses an existing water control structure to pond 450 acres of farmland along Snake Creek near Belzoni. The structure was completed in 1976 and consists of two 5 x 5-ft box culverts through the Yazoo River flood control levee.

The Corps has been under fire from state officials and environmental groups for its handling of the \$1.6-billion Yazoo Basin program. Last year, its Vicksburg district agreed to halt some projects and reexamine others to address local concerns about degradation of wetlands and wildlife habitat (ENR 3/30/89 p. 10).

The agency has asked for a fiscal 1991 appropriation of \$5.9 million to conduct what it calls a "reformulation study" of the Yazoo Basin projects (ENR 2/8 p. 17). It will focus primarily on a reevaluation of environmental impact statements and mitigation efforts on two rivers in the basin, according to a spokeswoman for the Corps's Vicksburg district.

The new approach now implement-

ed could pond up to 30,000 acres using existing and future structures as part of the Yazoo projects, which are about 65% complete. "We have identified numerous additional water control structures along the Yazoo and Tallahatchie Rivers where we can pond water to improve and increase winter waterfowl habitat," says Capt. Chuck King, deputy project manager.

The ponding program is contingent on approval by affected landowners. "We will offer the program starting with a one-year trial at each structure," says King. "The landowners choose the level to be ponded within the design limits of the structure and time period for ponding."

"The Corps now seems to be focusing on a wider spectrum of environmental benefits than they used to—waterfowl habitat being one of them," says Ray Aycocock, a program manager with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service who helped coordinate the program.

But state officials still are skeptical. Timothy Waycaster, a special assistant in the Mississippi attorney general's office, says, "The program looks good on paper, but the Snake Creek project is just a drop in the bucket." He says a committee appointed by Gov. Ray Mabus will reassess the Corps's program, which could result in further friction between the Corps and the state. ■

GOVERNMENT FUNDING

Capitol debates capital for airports.

As a House subcommittee formally launched the Capitol Hill debate last week over reauthorizing federal aviation programs, it heard that airport capital needs are substantial. But key Democrats on the panel ranged from neutral to hostile toward aviation tax plans of the Bush administration.

Preliminary Federal Aviation Administration figures show \$23 billion in projects eligible for Airport Improvement Program funding over the next five years, not counting inflation, the agency said at a hearing of the House Public Works and Transportation Committee's Aviation Subcommittee.

Using a broader scope and counting

inflation, the Airport Operators Council International and American Association of Airport Executives projected \$50.5 billion in capital needs from 1991 through 1995.

The Bush administration has proposed allowing major airports to raise revenue with a local tax on passengers. This, it argues, would free a significant part of federal airport grants for projects to increase capacity. FAA is weighing a plan under which airports would give up 50¢ worth of federal entitlement grants for every dollar of passenger tax revenue, FAA Administrator James B. Busey said recently. The agency would use the forfeited funds

New Bush wetlands rules may swamp some developers

Developers cheered last week when the White House finally blessed a revised version of development-regulating guidelines that were first issued jointly by the Environmental Protection Agency and the Army Corps of Engineers (see p. 8). Although EPA and the Corps downplay the changes, the message is clear: Mitigation is not necessary when development occurs where wetlands are plentiful. The policy applies to about 20% of the nation's wetlands, located on or near navigable waterways.

Relieving developers of the responsibility to replace or build new wetlands is sweet music to their ears. Mitigation is expensive. They would be wise, however, to pick their projects carefully. It remains to be seen how liberally the Corps and EPA will apply the guidelines. And even in some areas where wetlands are plentiful, government officials are more concerned than ever about the impact of development because of the rate of loss.

Just as significant is that the wetlands issue shows the limited political clout of EPA Administrator William K. Reilly and environmentalists. White House Chief of Staff John Sununu outmuscled Reilly in his bid for stricter rules, arguing that not every acre of wetlands is sacrosanct when energy needs and economic interests are involved. That the issue was debated at the highest levels of the Bush administration shows how far the environmental movement has come. That it was diluted illustrates the political realities of this administration, despite its rhetoric to the contrary.

The ruling reflects the economic realities of building in certain areas of the country, primarily Alaska. We hope that developers will not interpret it as a sign that wetlands destruction is OK as long as a few soggy acres are left over when the building is completed.

Trading problems in dealing with products

Product manufacturers have been in a bind for a long time. They rightfully have been held responsible for defects in the goods that they produce and place into the stream of commerce. But juries faced with an injured person and a big company in a courtroom often make the latter insurers of last resort, regardless of issues of fault.

Reforms are needed in product liability law. But the proposal being debated in Congress would place part of the financial burden on the back of the workers' compensation system—a system that can barely hold itself up (see

p. 10). Construction workers are more prone to injuries than those in almost any other occupation, and contractors' premiums for workers' comp insurance reflect it. The situation is a crisis in some states.

Among other things, the product-liability proposal would require an employer to show that neither it nor any employee contributed to the injury of a worker. If they can meet this test, only then would the employer or its insurer be able to place a lien or otherwise recoup money paid out under workers' compensation when the worker also is successful in litigation against a product manufacturer.

This proposal runs counter to many of the principles of fairness embodied in the American judicial system, especially due process. It is unfair and expensive to have an employer prove its nonculpability with regard to an injury after a court has declared that another party has been negligent. It should be the other way around, with a manufacturer seeking to reap the benefit of the workers' compensation system by proving that the employer contributed to the injury.

The workers' compensation system eliminates a huge amount of litigation that otherwise would go on between employers and employees by operating on a no-fault basis. It is designed to benefit relatively helpless employees, not third parties that have contributed to an injury.

No room for sexism

The construction industry continues to be male-dominated, but men who believe that it belongs to them had best beware. Times are changing and they had better change, too. Women who cannot get respect from some men in the workplace are ready, willing and able to go to court when they believe their civil rights to work free of sexual harassment have been violated (see p. 12).

According to recent decisions, those rights are implied in Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. In 1985, the U.S. Supreme Court issued a ruling that allowed women to use harassment as grounds to file job-bias claims under Title VII.

Women in construction say they still are subject to a wide array of harassing action and discrimination. Incidents include everything from inappropriate sexual advances to being locked out of the decision-making process. The subtler forms of discrimination may not fall under the law. But more gross offenses can lead to big damage awards.

Such actions do little to disguise the anti-female prejudices that often motivate them. If anyone is looking for reasons why construction has problems attracting enough new talent, sexual harassment would be a very good place to start.




Dear Mr. President:

The year 1990 brings a sense of optimism at The Holy See that we are into a period when there is significant movement in countries that have known only totalitarian rulers, to governments based on political pluralism, religious freedom and human rights.

Since these values are the cornerstone of our government, we and The Holy See have seen a clear convergence of goals in the world. Our relationships are excellent and you are highly regarded by the Holy Father and his top aides.

I write to confirm two suggestions that I offered to John Sununu when I saw him on February 5.

1. This is an excellent time for the Vice President to make a trip. A top item on the agenda should be the struggle against drugs. The Pope and his aides are very receptive to our suggestions. A visit by Vice President Quayle could firm up the convergence and energize more direct anti-drug programs of The Holy See around the world. I know that such a meeting would be successful.
2. The Bush name is very respected here. In order to expand the "personal" aspect, I recommend that consideration be given for your brother, Pres, and his wife, Beth, to visit the Vatican. He could, for example, bring a letter from you to the Pope. It might be a personal/private visit where there would be an audience, a visit to Vatican cultural and charitable activities. As you know, Pres was a trustee of Sacred Heart University when I was President.

SUBJECT: Soviet Summit

You have informed Jack Matlock that our preferred timing is the week of 18-22 June. Gorbachev could arrive on the 19th, the President's official involvement (including a state dinner) would be on the 20th, and Gorbachev could have other appointments, including on the Hill, on the 21st. Then the President could invite him to Kennebunkport for the 22nd and 23rd. Gorbachev would then leave directly for the Soviet Union from Pease AFB on the 23rd (or 24th).

If setting the Party Congress date on July 2 causes the Soviets to want the Summit earlier, we could follow the above scenario just one week earlier. This would mean an arrival on the 12th, President's involvement on the 13th, other Gorbachev activities on the 14th, and going to Kennebunkport for some portion of June 15-17 -- with a departure for the Soviet Union from Pease. (This would involve rescheduling Prime Minister Chatchai of Thailand now scheduled for June 14.)

Needless to say this would give the summit a unique flavor in addition to sending some very useful signals.
