SUBJECT: President's Participation in the
San Jose Summit

THE CHIEF of STAFF
has seen

In light of the hour by hour changes to the format of the Costa Rica Summit later this month, I propose that we seek a venue at which the President would be able to address the leaders and outline his drug strategies for the Western Hemisphere. An address of this type would be the perfect primer for a constructive Andean Summit.

Even at this late date, we find ourselves with no discernable objective for the President to travel to Costa Rica. The President's role in this gathering is that of participation, and not leader. A drug address will allow the President to reiterate our country's commitment to the scourge of drugs upon the hemisphere.

At your direction, we will work through the National Security Council to find an appropriate setting for this address.

I would welcome the opportunity to discuss this with you further.

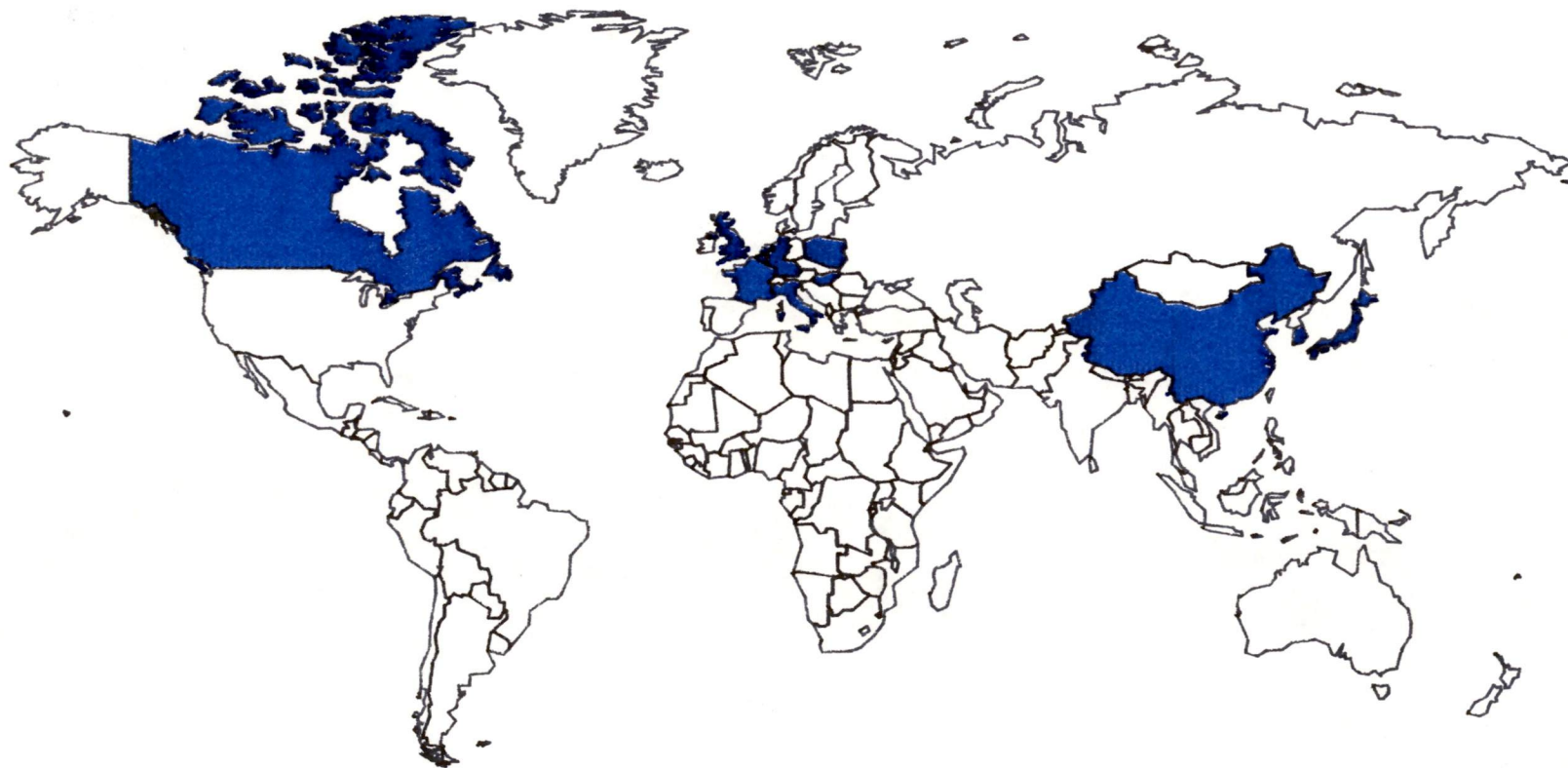

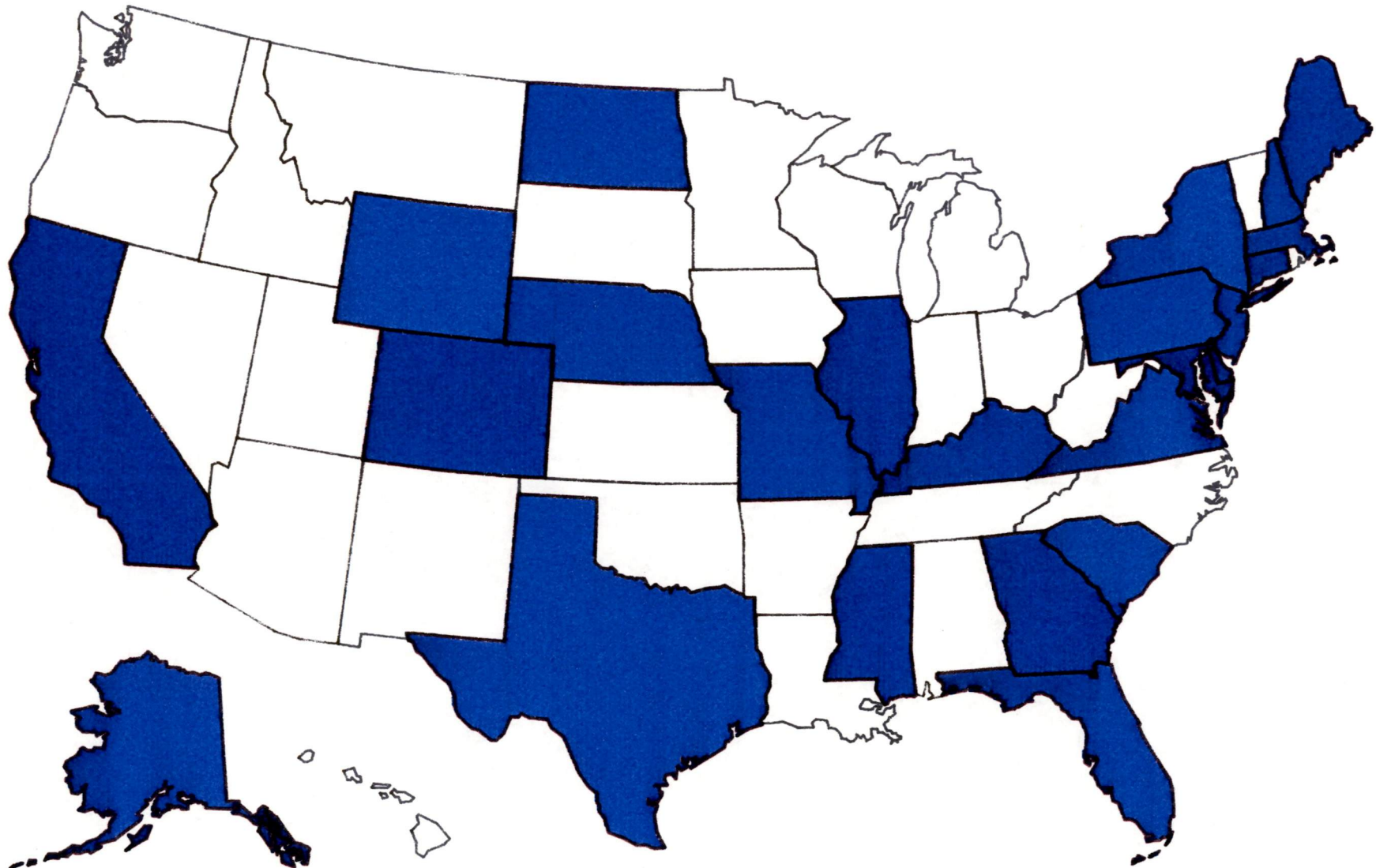

SUBJECT: CALIFORNIA

Although I have never seen the "Deukmejian letter," I thought you might want this background.

As soon as Long Range Scheduling tasked me with finding event options in California, I contacted Steve Merksmer, Deukmejian advisor and our key contact during the campaign. I described the environment theme objective; he said he'd check and respond. He did, advising to stay away from the environment now. I asked about drug/crime; he said fine.

I then called Rick Davis in Deukmejian's office and reviewed the entire notional schedule with him. We had two or three subsequent telephone conversations during the planning phase as the trip plan evolved.

When the scheduled events were determined, I again reviewed the schedule with Rick and inquired as to the Governor's desired participation. I was advised he had unchangeable schedule conflicts and that it was no problem.

Implementation action was then passed to the Advance team in the field. I do not know what communication any other White House unit may have had.

U. Fusion Researchers to Meet With Sununu

University of Utah chemists Stanley Pons and Martin Fleischmann returned to the nation's capital to help sell presidential chief of staff John Sununu on a national solid-state fusion research center in Utah.

The scientists were scheduled to meet Thursday afternoon with Mr. Sununu, a former engineering professor who has shown a strong interest in the controversial Utah experiment.

Dr. Pons said Wednesday the meeting will consist mainly of describing the research to Mr. Sun-

unu, but they will also encourage him to support the research center. "We simply want to do everything we can to get these funds."

U. President Chase Peterson asked for \$25 million during an appearance before the House Space, Science and Technology Committee last week. That money would be combined with up to \$100 million in private funds and part of the \$5 million in state funds to create the research center, U. officials said.

James Brophy, U. vice president for research, envisions the center as the administrative headquarters of a nationwide research

effort. He foresees the U. of U., Brigham Young University and Utah State University having research roles, but he estimated no more than 10 percent of the money would actually be spent in Utah.

U. officials have said the center would attempt to simultaneously pursue the scientific, engineering and commercial aspects of the research in order to stay ahead of foreign competitors.

Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, is planning to introduce legislation for the center in the near future.

Meanwhile, the two electrochemists remain confident despite a

firestorm of criticism from scientists at the American Physical Society meeting in Baltimore, and they are planning to answer those critics during a meeting of the Electrochemical Society in Los Angeles Monday.

"After 5½ years, I'm more convinced now than I ever was," Dr. Pons said of his experiment, adding that his confidence is "getting stronger by the day."

He said he and Dr. Fleischmann will give "a very thorough, clean analysis of the thermal portion of the experiment" at the Los Angeles meeting.

The "thermal portion" refers to the experiment's generation of ex-

cess heat, which has spawned both optimism and derision. A number of scientists have complained that this portion was not detailed well in the paper Dr. Pons and Dr. Fleischmann published.

Also speaking at the Los Angeles meeting will be California Institute of Technology chemist Nathan Lewis, who claims to have found flaws in the U. researchers' heat measurements, and BYU physicist Steven E. Jones.

U. spokeswoman Pam Fogle also said they were expecting several scientists to announce confirmations of the experiment during the meeting.

SUBJECT: Improvements to U.S. Ambassador's Residence
in Tokyo, Japan for the President's Trip

This memorandum is a summary of the improvements made to the Ambassador's residence, and related costs, prior to the President's visit to Japan on February 23 and 24. The information contained herein was provided by the U.S. Embassy Tokyo and Jeannie Bull from the State Department Bureau of Administration.

The State Department has estimated that it will take about two years and \$10 million for necessary restoration to the Ambassador's Residence in Tokyo. The needed restoration is mostly hidden, and efforts have been made to keep the ground floor areas presentable for the time being. However, it has been determined that the drapes, curtains, rugs, furniture and overall decor of the living areas must be refurbished in order to make the residence "liveable". Before restoration is complete, the entire electrical system must be replaced to prevent a possible fire hazard. Additionally, the plumbing is faulty and must be replaced throughout the residence, and the roof must be replaced. The kitchen must also be completely renovated. The concern over the plumbing and electrical system was great enough that the embassy contracted for an electrician and plumber to be on site at the residence during the visit at a cost of over \$500.

According to the embassy staff, the exterior and interior of the residence were unsightly and in need of painting. This was to have been done before the arrival of the new ambassador at a cost of \$75,000. In order to make the interior presentable for the bilateral meetings, the painting schedule was moved up at an overtime cost of approximately \$7,000. Additionally, the existing furniture in the functional rooms on the ground floor was inadequate, requiring rental of screens, chairs, etc., at a cost of about \$1,000.

The narrow driveways and limited parking at the residence presented another problem. Due to Secret Service concerns, we had to request that each government limit the size of its motorcade in order to accommodate our vehicles and to preserve emergency evacuation routes. This made it difficult to get two, or even one, visiting head of state motorcade in the driveway at any given time.

The Mitterand Luncheon at the residence was quite an undertaking, given that the kitchen was, for all intents and purposes, inoperable. Additionally, the residence staff had been dismissed upon the departure of Ambassador Mansfield, leaving no cooks, valets, stewards or housekeepers in residence. Consequently, Ron Jackson of the staff mess arranged for the entire luncheon to be catered through the Okura Hotel. The food service was primarily handled by Okura staff, with one of the White House steward's assistance.

After follow up discussions with the embassy, my impression remains that it was the general consensus that the residence was, for the most part, unusable. The work done to make the residence appear to be in working order for the bilateral meetings alone was quite extensive. Knowing what I do about the internal problems of the residence, I still cannot with good conscience say that we should have stayed there. In my mind, the fact that a possibility existed for a situation to arise that compromised the President's comfort, was enough to choose the safer route and not stay there.
