As a friend of your father, I suppose I should write an enthusiastic letter telling you how happy I am that you obtained the position which you apparently wanted and got. You would have received that kind of letter were the job anything but Director of the CIA. Let me hastily say, I have no objection to the CIA as such. I might say here that I was a chicken colonel in the Army's Intelligence Service during the war and after the war for that matter. Even as President and Publisher of the Courant, I commanded all Connecticut's Military Intelligence personnel in Connecticut until I retired.

I know General Walters and was associated with him on one project during World War II. I think he is a very able fellow. My concern is due to the beating that the CIA has taken from publicity hungry and politically ambitious members of Congress during the past couple of years. And, I am still concerned about the plans of some members of Congress to set up some kind of supervisory agency to pass on covert, and I suppose, all CIA planned activities. If the members of this Advisory Committee were people, for example, like Senator Stennis, there might be no problem, but, the way CIA classified information has leaked from Congressional Committees, and the staffs of these Committees, makes me very apprehensive indeed. Whether the members of Congress like it or not, you cannot conduct secret intelligence in a fishbowl. //

I think the revelations that have come out so far have already limited the information which we might expect to get from the Secret Service Agencies of other countries. A couple of years ago, I was in England and had a long talk with the then

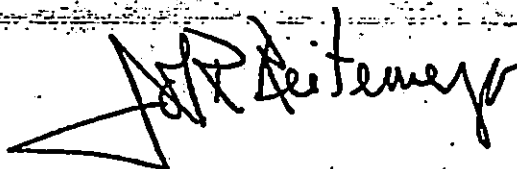
Editor of the London Daily Telegraph. I discussed with him some of the problems of the CIA and I think our conversation was helpful because the Telegraph had been very friendly in its editorial comments. We also, at that time, discussed the British Secret Service which definitely does not operate in a fishbowl. He felt, as I do, that the British Secret Service cannot afford to have its activities publicized in the American press.

As I see it, before you get around to any pure CIA activities, there are two major tasks before you. The first of these is to restore the morale and the esprit de corps of the CIA. The second is to do what you can to limit congressional interference. I suppose I might add a third point and that is to urge something like the British Official Secret act would prevent disaffected former CIA employees in telling all they know to the world.

I do wish you every success in this new position. It is going to be tough but I have every assurance that you will do everything humanly possible.

Dear Mr. Bush:

I have been asked to reply to your letter of November 15 to George Bush concerning the 1978 World Amateur Golf Council championship.

The State Department is prepared to issue visas to representatives from all legitimate countries to participate in international sporting events in the United States. However, we would not at this time be able to issue visas to members of the Rhodesian Golf Union.

The presence of Rhodesian residents in the United States for the purpose of representing that territory in an international sporting event is specifically excluded by U.S. visa regulations. These regulations implement the terms of United Nations Security Council Resolution 253 and the Executive Order issued in connection therewith, all in accordance with the provisions of the Immigration and Nationality Act. Essentially, the pertinent U.S. resolution calls for economic sanctions and travel controls against the illegal Southern Rhodesian regime.

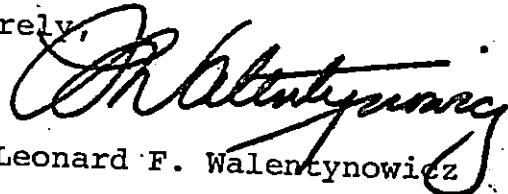

Over the years our policy has been to refuse entry to Rhodesian citizens and residents who hold certain official positions, are engaging in certain commercial activities, are members of sporting teams representing Rhodesia, or others who intend to further or encourage the unlawful actions of the illegal regime of Southern Rhodesia. The current interpretation of these regulations would prohibit the granting of visas to any athletic team representing Rhodesia. Although they would not be sponsored by the Rhodesian regime, because of past custom and practice of identifying athletic teams by country, they could not avoid being labeled in the public view as the "Rhodesian team." If there should be some change in this system of identifying teams by country, then we will be pleased to review the situation again.

Of course, should the current negotiations in Geneva prove successful, and a new interim government be formed, the question of sanctions, including travel restrictions, would be modified.

Dear George:

The World Amateur Golf Council (copy of Membership Roster attached) is comprised of the Golf Associations or Golf Unions of 59 countries. They govern the game of amateur golf in their countries and send teams to international competitions. Every two years the team championship of the World Amateur Golf Council is played. The golf world is divided into three zones - American, European-African and Asian. The championship is played in a different zone each year.

The articles of the Council provide that the championship will be played only in countries that will admit all of the teams of member associations or unions that want to compete. The Council is non-political. It seeks to promote amateur golf as a game and to increase goodwill and understanding amongst golfers of all nations. It is tragic that in recent years one or more governments have prohibited their golf associations from sending teams or have refused to admit teams from certain countries.

There is a possibility that the USGA may want to host the 1978 championships in October of that year. Therefore, we would appreciate receiving a formal opinion from our Department of State to this effect: since no teams attend the championship of the WAGC in the USA will represent the government (they represent only the golf union or association) and since the World Amateur Golf Council is non-political and aims only at fostering increased international competition, fellowship and sportsmanship through golf, the United States Government will not prohibit entry in the U.S. of the teams and official parties of any of the member countries of the WAGC.

Thank you for your assistance in endeavoring to obtain "a ruling" on this matter for us.

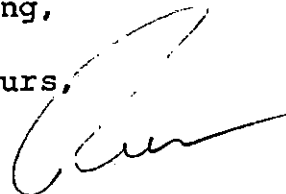

You are probably no more surprised to receive this letter than I am to be writing it, but sometimes very odd things happen.

This is prompted by a letter from a friend of mine in Greenwich, "Buzz" Gerli, who in turn is a friend of your brothers' Prescott.

As you may or may not know The Eisenhower Trophy (men) and the Espirito Santo Trophy (women) currently known as the World Cup (amateur) are to be held in the Algarve in October, the Women's to be at our club, Vilamoura, 2 October - 9 October and the Men's immediately following at another club, Penina, 9 October - 16 October.

"Buzz" wrote to me that apparently your brother has something to do with these tournaments and is planning to come over for them.

We would like for you to tell him to be certain to look us up as we will certainly want to entertain him in some way. In fact we are planning to entertain the American teams and the officials accompanying them sometime during the stay here. I have written to P.J. Boatwright, Executive Secretary of the U.S.G.A. extending the invitation but as yet no dates have been set.

Mary Jane and I have followed your career with great interest and pride and are confident that you will do an excellent job in your present "hot seat" in spite of the stupidity of the Congress. Under any circumstance, we certainly wish you well.

We are delighted with our choice of Portugal as a place to retire. There have been no problems for us here during the so-called Revolution. As one of our friends said who had spent a great deal of time in South America, this revolution, compared to those down there, would not have made Nr. 1 on the Richter scale.

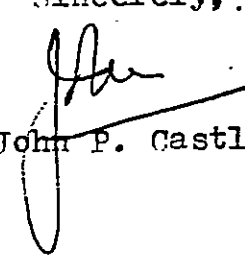
We were extremely disappointed that Ford and Kissinger did not give moral support to those trying to get the job done here until about October of last year, but apparently they had a mental block that Portugal was going Communist. That could not have been further from the truth.

The main problem here now is that first the Portugese are not a very intelligent people and those with most of the brains have left the country. Those left have practically no experience in foreign affairs, not only politcially, but economically and commercially. Second, the Portugese are a very proud people and to ask for assistance, except for money, is admitting they do not know and they will never admit that on any subject. So, they will probably fumble their way along, and delay by many years the recovery. This is unfortunate, because it is a delightful country and offers a great deal in many ways to the world wide community.

No more from here. Do not bother to reply to this letter as I know you are extremely busy. Just tell your brother to let us know when he is coming and when he arrives to get in touch with us.

Mary Jane joins me in sending our very best to you and Barbara and we wish you the best of luck and continued success.

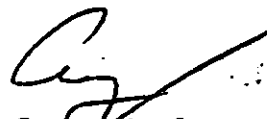
It was great hearing from you again. I am glad that you and Mary Jane are so happy there.

We had thirty five countries fielding teams of four players, and it was a tremendous success. It is almost a United Nations without politics.

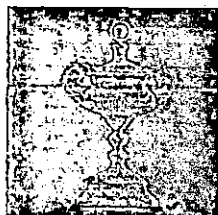

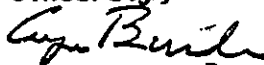

Dear Mr. Bush:

As a former American newsman in Moscow I would like to register a complaint. During all those years when the CIA was recruiting U.S. foreign correspondents as intelligence sources, I was totally and incomprehensibly ignored by your agency. In fact, I believe the CIA was discriminating against me by not permitting me the opportunity to serve as a simple soldier in the Cold War.

These are the facts: I have twice reported from Moscow for two major U.S. news organizations (UPI and Newsweek) for almost five years. I speak (or spoke) fluent Russian, learned through much agony at Columbia University, the Sorbonne and arguments with the waiters at the Russian Tea Room in New York. I wore a brown leather coat with a high fur collar, and a fur hat. In Moscow, my appearance was so Russian that even the natives would come up to me and ask me how to get to Red Square or to the nearest public toilet facility. Perfect for a CIA operative.

And yet -- NOT ONCE did the CIA ever ask me to serve my country (and my employers) by furnishing the Station Chief in Moscow with secret information. And I had the real stuff, too. Information I never filed to Newsweek or the United Press. Information that would have provided the CIA with critical insights into the state of Soviet military preparedness, the economy, or what was going on in the Kremlin.

For instance, did anyone in your vast establishment know what size shoe Krushchev wore? (This was before his shoe-thumping appearance at the UN.) Wouldn't the CIA Station Chief have given a pot full of rubles to find out? Had he known, he would have better understood the full political impact left by Krushchev when he booted Molotov and Bulganin out of their jobs.

Other than Mrs. Krushchev, the Kremlin cobbler and Krushchev himself, I was the only one in Moscow who knew he wore size 6½D shoes. And how did I obtain this important information? Very simply. At an Indian Embassy reception, I found myself standing next to Krushchev talking about the weather (more useful information!). I furtively compared our shoes and observed that his black shoes were a wee bit smaller than my size 7D black shoes. Ergo: 6½D.

And did the CIA Station Chief ever ask me about this? Never!

And there were other items of unusual political, strategic, and economic interest that I could have passed along to the CIA. For instance, did the CIA know about the Great Moscow Diaper Shortage? I uncovered the Kremlin's vulnerability in this significant economic sector thanks to my two-month old daughter Fern (born in New York) who was running out of the supply of disposables we had imported along with her.

Of course, this shortage could only have meant one thing: the Soviet Union was preparing for war! All the diaper material was being used to make bandages.

On the other hand, it could have meant that the Russians were better at producing babies than diapers. Even this information would have been useful to the CIA!

And when I returned to the U.S. on leave, not once did my phone ring and not once did a flat, calm, authoritative voice say, "This is the CIA. We understand that you just returned from Moscow and wondered if you would like to talk to us about your experiences." Not a flicker of interest!

As you may know, even though the CIA was not interested in my perceptive observations of the Soviet scene, the Russians were. In August, 1962, they threw me out of the country for having "violated the rules governing the conduct of foreign correspondents in the Soviet Union." As usual, there were no specifics.

Seven days later, as I boarded the Copenhagen-bound plane and waved goodbye to the band of diplomats and journalists (Western) gathered at the airport, much to my surprise, I saw the CIA Station Chief. Recognition at last, I thought.

And guess who the CIA sent to meet me when the plane landed in Copenhagen? Nobody! Nor at Kennedy in New York! Nor anywhere else!

Now, when I read that the CIA used U.S. correspondents to collect intelligence, I fail to understand why I was ignored at a time when I could have been a most useful source of information. I am angry and confused. I feel that somehow I was unworthy of your trust. As a taxpayer, I am entitled to know why your organization treated me with such benign neglect.

Oh yes, my expulsion from Russia was finally explained to me by Sam Jaffe, then ABC's Moscow correspondent who has since admitted working for the FBI. Just before I left Moscow he confided that his Russian "friends" had told him that I was expelled because they were convinced I worked for the CIA.

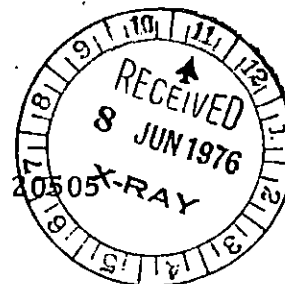

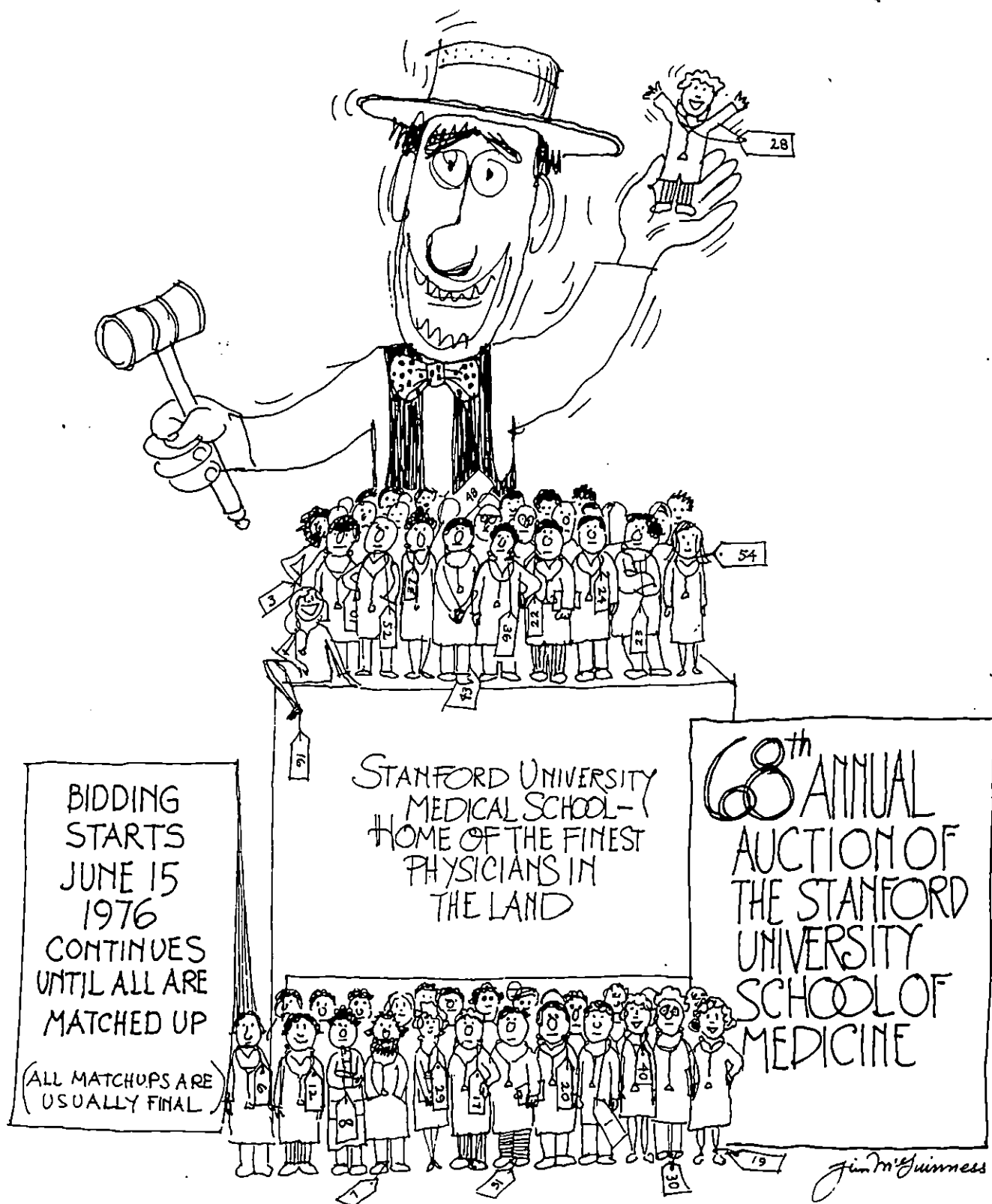

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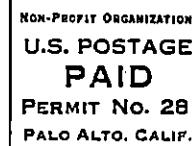
