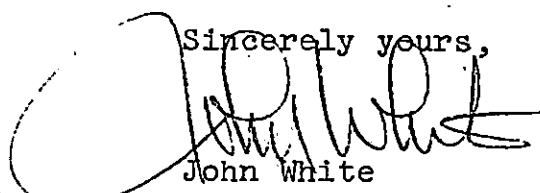

Our young people are preparing a patriotic musical for presentation during the coming Bicentennial year. It has been suggested that perhaps you will need this type of presentation for your convention program.

Jimmy Allison, Publisher of our local paper, and former Deputy Chairman of the Republican National Convention and Mrs. Juandelle Lacy, a member of our church and also State Chairman of the Congressional Committee "Group 76" suggested that we contact you. Hence, this letter.

The First Baptist Church, Midland, Texas, has 6,000 members which include over 700 active participants in its Music Ministry. The group preparing the patriotic musical consists of both Junior and Senior high school students (grades 7-12) and total some 165 in number.

The musical being prepared is entitled "I Love America" by John W. Peterson and Don Wyrzten of Grand Rapids, Michigan. The presentation consists of chorus, soloists, narration, drama, multimedia slides and taped orchestra accompaniment and lasts approximately one hour, but could be edited to fit your needs.

and its flag. The final and (3) Prayer for America--presents a plea for the future of our country that the United States of America will turn back to its spiritual foundations.

The Music Ministry of First Baptist Church has been involved in various musical programs. Groups have performed at such meetings as the Texas Baptist Evangelism Conference in Fort Worth, Texas with 12,000 in attendance; at Glorieta Assembly in New Mexico with 3,000 in attendance; at Youth Evangelism Conference with 15,000 in attendance. Local presentations have included musical dramas such as "Amahl and the Night Visitors"; "The Seven Last Words of Christ" dramatized (which was televised) and several other musicals and cantatas. We also have been involved in many mission endeavors including trips to Washington State, Wisconsin, California, and Mexico.

We feel young people expressing patriotism and their love of America would be appreciated. It is indeed a rewarding experience to hear this many voices praise our God and country.

If you are interested, please let me know. We would like to send you a copy of the musical and a recording for your review.

Dear George:

You are probably no more surprised to receive this letter than I am to be writing it, but sometimes very odd things happen.

This is prompted by a letter from a friend of mine in Greenwich, "Buzz" Gerli, who in turn is a friend of your brothers Prescott.

As you may or may not know The Eisenhower Trophy (men) and the Espirito Santo Trophy (women) currently known as the World Cup (amateur) are to be held in the Algarve in October, the Women's to be at our club, Vilamoura, 2 October - 9 October and the Men's immediately following at another club, Penina, 9 October - 16 October.

"Buzz" wrote to me that apparently your brother has something to do with these tournaments and is planning to come over for them.

We would like for you to tell him to be certain to look us up as we will certainly want to entertain him in some way. In fact we are planning to entertain the American teams and the officials accompanying them sometime during the stay here. I have written to P.J. Boatwright, Executive Secretary of the U.S.G.A. extending the invitation but as yet no dates have been set.

Mary Jane and I have followed your career with great interest and pride and are confident that you will do an excellent job in your present "hot seat" in spite of the stupidity of the Congress. Under any circumstance, we certainly wish you well.

Equally important, we have noted that Barbara has been right with you and knowing her are certain this has been a great asset for you in doing your various jobs with such

success.

We are delighted with our choice of Portugal as a place to retire. There have been no problems for us here during the so-called Revolution. As one of our friends said who had spent a great deal of time in South America, this revolution, compared to those down there, would not have made Nr. 1 on the Richter scale.

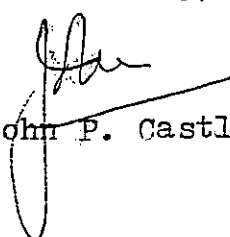
We were extremely disappointed that Ford and Kissinger did not give moral support to those trying to get the job done here until about October of last year, but apparently they had a mental block that Portugal was going Communist. That could not have been further from the truth.

The main problem here now is that first the Portuguese are not a very intelligent people and those with most of the brains have left the country. Those left have practically no experience in foreign affairs, not only politically, but economically and commercially. Second, the Portuguese are a very proud people and to ask for assistance, except for money, is admitting they do not know and they will never admit that on any subject. So, they will probably fumble their way along, and delay by many years the recovery. This is unfortunate, because it is a delightful country and offers a great deal in many ways to the world wide community.

No more from here. Do not bother to reply to this letter as I know you are extremely busy. Just tell your brother to let us know when he is coming and when he arrives to get in touch with us.

Mary Jane joins me in sending our very best to you and Barbara and we wish you the best of luck and continued success.

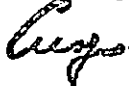

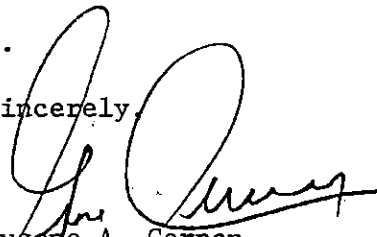
Barbara and I have been following your career with interest over the past several years -- in fact, we hoped that somehow we could have found our way to China, but that hasn't happened yet.

Dear Mr. Bollinger:

After our meeting on 21 August 1975 I ordered the Inspector General to conduct an investigation of the entire set of charges which you have recounted. You may recall that Mr. Lawrence Houston, the former General Counsel, at the behest of Director Helms, had conducted an investigation of similar allegations in mid-1967. The record shows that on 15 May 1967 Director Helms discussed the matter with Mr. Alexander H. Flax, the Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Research and Development (1964-1969) who assured Director Helms that there were no misrepresentations and that the Helio Aircraft Company got a full and free hearing on all points.

The Inspector General has recently completed the investigation and reported the findings to me. It is true that the Tainan facility did manufacture needed airplane parts. I am informed that this is permissible in the industry. The Tainan facility, however, manufactured needed parts solely for repair and restoration of our own aircraft. The Tainan facility did not build an entire Helio aircraft as alleged. The Inspector General has informed me that the investigation has not produced evidence to substantiate the other allegations. The findings, in fact, support the conclusion reached by Mr. Houston in 1967 that the allegations were unfounded.

I regret that I cannot follow through on your specific requests. I do not believe it would be appropriate for the Director of Central Intelligence to intercede with the U. S. military establishment on behalf of a private corporation. Further the Central Intelligence Agency cannot consider the granting of financial assistance to the Hélio Aircraft Company for the development of its twin engine Hélio model.

This month a \$25 million claim for damages in your behalf is being filed with the CIA. Had it not been for the long concealed and seriously damaging interference of the CIA's aviation "proprietary" organizations, we believe it is demonstrable that your investment could have been built to well over the \$25 million level by now. As it is, after suffering inexplicably prolonged losses, your company is now technically insolvent (has a negative book value) and has been forced to close its factory -- continuing to operate only its contract sheet-metal production facility, Helio Precision Products, Inc. in the greater Boston area.

For a number of years, we have been experiencing extraordinary and unexplainable difficulties in selling our aircraft. Prior to 1960, regulatory barriers had been established by the CAB within the United States, which effectively protected helicopters from STOL competition in and out of established commercial airports. Consequently, the Helio product line and marketing strategy had already been shifted to overseas and military products. After experiencing gratifying initial successes in those markets, deeply puzzling rejections have been encountered.

The reasons for these difficulties have now become apparent. Proceedings before Congress during the past year, together with other investigations, have disclosed that the proprietary companies which the CIA organized and controlled, and the personnel of both the Agency and of such companies, have for many years covertly used our company's name to carry on activities throughout the world. These activities were not only illegal, but were so nefarious in nature that the countries involved and their officials have systematically excluded our company and its products from any consideration. The involvement of CIA proprietary companies in improper competitive sales activities has also been found to have seriously misled procurement evaluations within the United States as well as foreign military procurement

Photocopy Preservation

With the recent discovery of the impact of these facts -- which had been well concealed in the covert activities of the Central Intelligence Agency and its agents -- our company decided to take action against the Agency, its proprietary companies, and its responsible personnel under provisions of law. We intend to press vigorously for the recovery of the very substantial investment which was lost as a result of these improper government activities.

Nevertheless, the losses have been so disastrous and the proposed legal processes required for recovery appear to be so time consuming that it could be fatal to wait for the proceeds to reinstate the marketing and production of our still viable Helio designs. Therefore, despite the fact that we may be unable to obtain more than a small fraction of the inherent value, we appear to have no choice but to offer to sell our aircraft assets to an independent group that can market and service the product-line in its principal markets without appearing thereby to be opening the door to purveyors of the CIA's most deeply resented "dirty tricks."

Before we learned how and why our sales and service personnel had become so persona-non-grata overseas, you were advised in our June 15, 1974 Special Action Report that:

"After a decade of encouraging progress during the 1960's financial results during the 1970's to date have indeed been disappointing. Strong corrective action is clearly needed. The customary first corrective step is to change the lead horse."

Accordingly, your company's founding chairman, Lynn Bollinger, had at that time already turned the top management role over to Robert Kimnach. Subsequently, Mr. Kimnach also attributed the still disappointing sales under his regime to some probably shortcoming in the management and/or the resources being applied to the task.

Consequently, Mr. Kimnach contracted the Helio aircraft sales-management responsibility to John Roberts, Ltd., whose highly successful worldwide aircraft marketing experience and ample resources appeared well suited for the job. Thereafter, none of us could adequately understand the still continuing rejections in area after area where our aircraft appeared to be ideally suited. Often, they had also been successfully used there before.

The actions of the CIA and its proprietaries and personnel disrupted and discredited your company's activities so that profits were severely constricted during the latter part of the 1960's and were turned into ruinous deficits during the 70's. As a result, the cumulative losses have exceeded your equity investment and the company's debts now exceed its total assets.

Liquidation of the company may be inevitable unless sufficient damages can be recovered from the CIA to make possible the company's restoring of profitable aircraft production and sales -- albeit in a section of the market that will not compete with the existing Helio product line. When and as a reasonable award is attained, we will try to have a complete and viable reinvestment plan ready for your consideration as

an alternate to a possible voluntary dissolution and return of those funds to you stockholders.

In the meantime, to help alleviate the company's present "technical" insolvency, the Founding Chairman has offered to negotiate substantial modifications in the large debt due him for his cumulative loans, advances and deferred compensation over a twenty year period. However, since no interest payments or other cash withdrawals have been made on that debt during the company's recent deficit years, even a complete elimination of the debt would do nothing to arrest the company's now threatened cash exhaustion and resulting financial insolvency. Consequently, your company's Founding Chairman believes he is acting in the best interests of all concerned in asking that substantive decreases in the company's cash-flow deficit be pursued concurrent with any major modification of his debt claims.

To clear the decks for such negotiations and to avoid any risk of apparent conflict-of-interest in his role as a creditor, Mr. Bollinger has asked to be dropped from the new slate of Directors nominated for election at the pending annual meeting, with whom he may thereafter be negotiating. His successor, Mr. Kimmach, will remain the only member of the proposed new Board who was originally selected by the former Chairman. Mr. Bollinger has indicated that if the proposed negotiations on capital structure and cash-flow changes can be accomplished to the satisfaction of all concerned, he would be pleased to stand for reelection to the Board at a later date. He will continue to be the company's largest stockholder as well as creditor.

In considering the now apparently disproportionate size of the company's debt payable to the company's Founding Chairman, all concerned should recognize that before the impact of the operating losses now clearly attributable to improper CIA interference with the company's business, that "debt-to-officer" amounted to only a modest 5% of the company's equity. More importantly, if a reasonably normal rate-of-earnings and the maintaining of inventory values (i.e., in real physical quantities vs nominal dollar price) had not been so impaired, today's debt would still be equal to only about 5% of equity. The company's real problem, we both therefore conclude, is not one of debt, but of CIA induced losses that have destroyed the company's earnings and equity. The company's survival thus now appears to depend almost entirely on the rectification of that damage.

In the meantime, we believe you will concur that in the event our public corporation cannot remain solvent during the period required to obtain fair rectification from the CIA, the Board will have an obligation to take every other action possible -- without thereby penalizing our stockholders' or creditors' legitimate interests -- to seek to preserve the jobs and community contributions of the loyal work-force at our original Massachusetts developmental facility, now known as Helio Precision Products, Inc.

We are convinced that at least this minimum goal should be attainable, and also that a recovery and reinvestment in company operations or else a repayment to you of most, if not all, of your investment is more than justified and is thus well worth pursuing.
