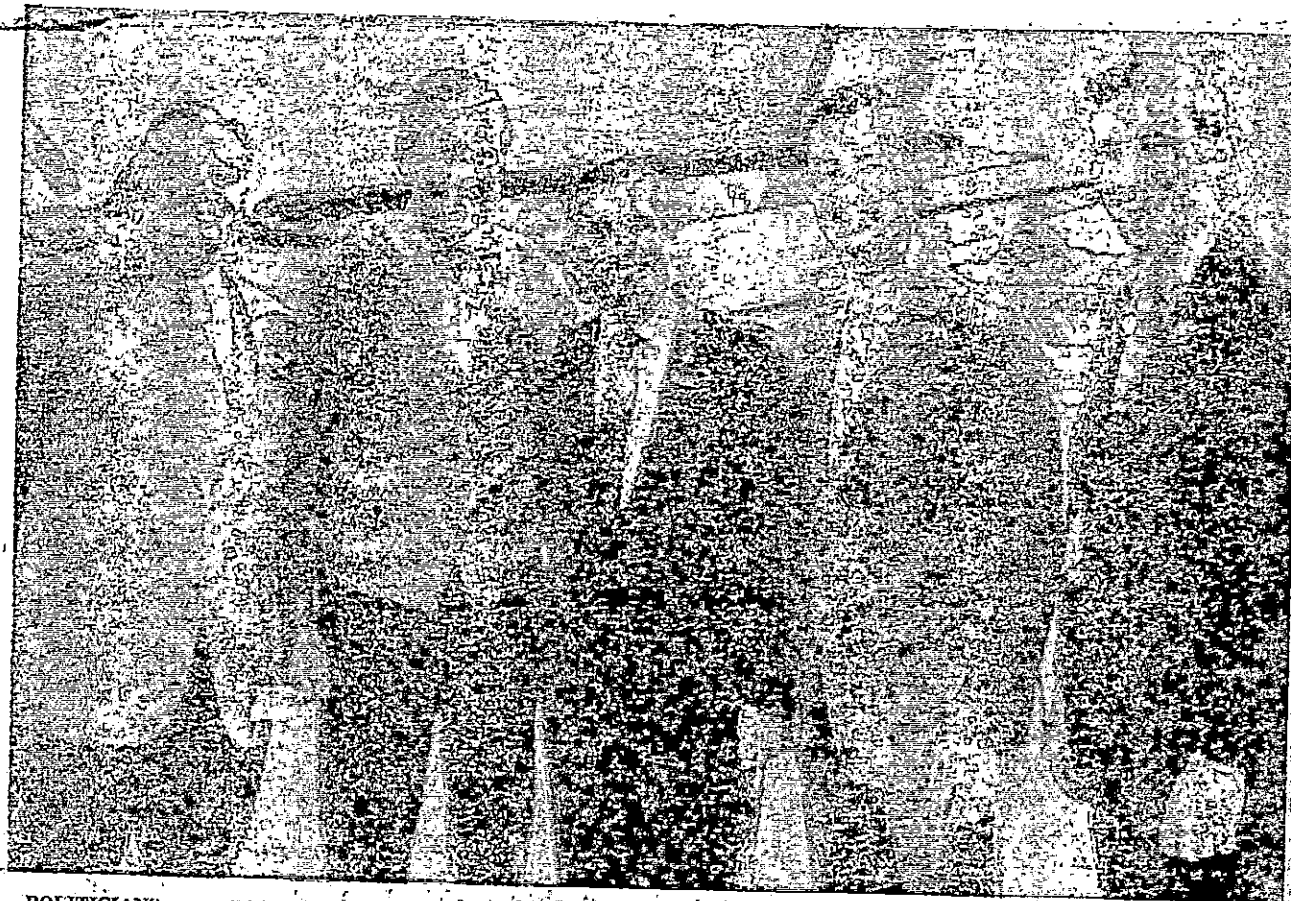

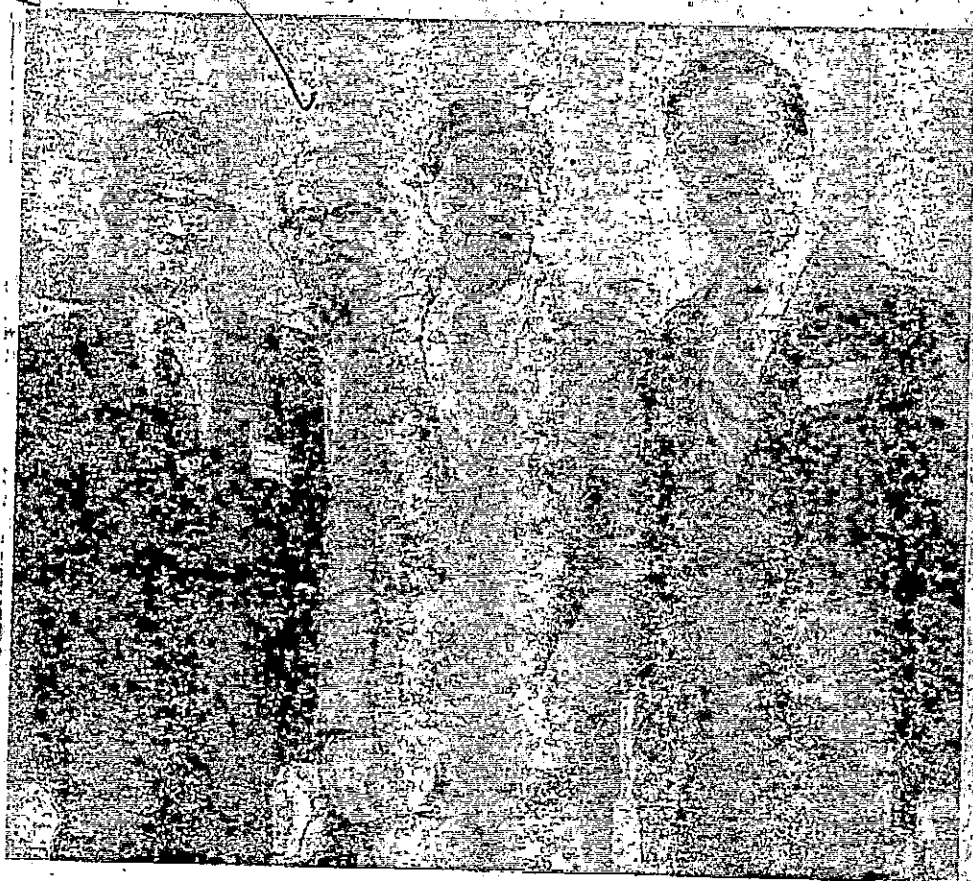

The text should be depicting the fact that "we've moved." The new address is: 5838 Indian Trail, Houston, Texas 77057. We would like to send these cards out late in February.

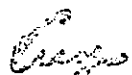
