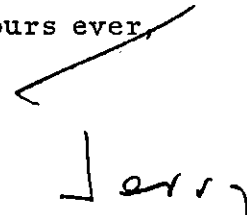
Dear George,

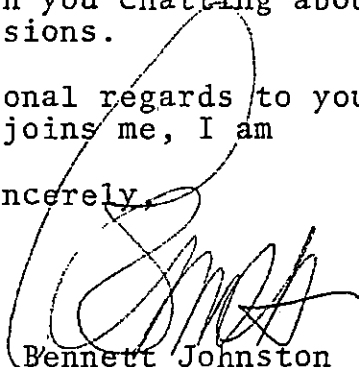
I want you to know how much I appreciated your warm letter of October 27 and your very kind offer to provide me with a briefing prior to my leaving for China.

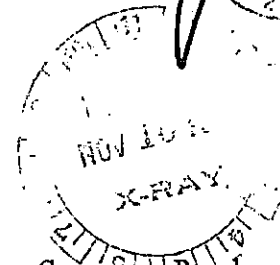
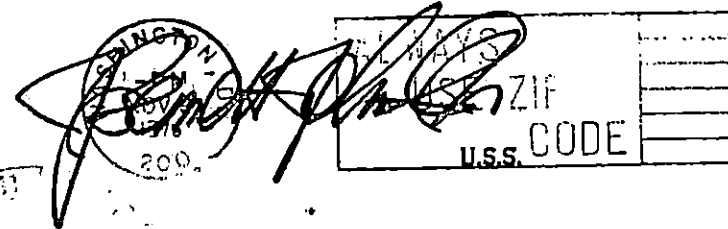

Your able assistance is urgently needed as soon as your busy schedule will permit. After careful consideration I have decided to apply for appointment to the U. S. Parole Commission. Commissioner Maurice Sigler just announced his retirement from the Commission, effective October 8, 1976, and no action has been taken to fill his vacancy. Mr. Douglas P. Bennett, Director, Presidential Personnel Office, is processing my application and a strong endorsement from you would be extremely helpful. He should be contacted directly at the White House as expeditiously as possible.

Appointments are made on a bi-partisan basis and Texas should be represented on the Commission by an imminently qualified republican. It should be noted that Texas has not been represented on the Commission in the past twenty years.

I worked my way through the College of William and Mary and the University of Virginia Law School. I majored in psychology as an undergraduate and earned a Bachelor of Laws Degree. I served as an Infantry Officer during World War II and was awarded the Purple Heart, Bronze Star with Cluster, Combat Infantry Badge and several other citations. I am presently a field grade officer in the U. S. Air Force Reserve.

After release from active military service, I spent eight years as a Chief Probation and Parole Officer, seven years as Case Manager with the Federal Bureau of Prisons and I am now in my fourteenth year with the U. S. Parole Commission as a Senior Hearing Examiner. This position ranks just below a Commissioner. Extensive and responsible administrative experience on the federal and state levels in criminal rehabilitation is a unique qualification. The decorum and depth of understanding characteristic of institutional hearings as a Commission Examiner have merited commendations from administration and prison officials. In the prime of my professional career, I could benefit the government imminently if given the opportunity to exercise my full potential on the appropriate level.

I am happily married, have three wonderful children and own the home in which we live. I have traveled in eleven foreign countries, hold membership in a church, law freaternity, P. T. A. Veterans Organization, Professional Associations, National Rifle Association, Reserve Officers Association, have had several professional articles published, conducted college lectures and am a former adviser to the Boy Scouts.

Many distinguished men in Texas political and professional circles have sufficient personal confidence and respect for my administrative ability, expertise and party loyalty to voluntarily recommend appointment to the President. I am very grateful for their endorsements but I am relying chiefly on your support to place a uniquely qualified Texas republican on the U. S. Parole Commission for the first time in over twenty years.

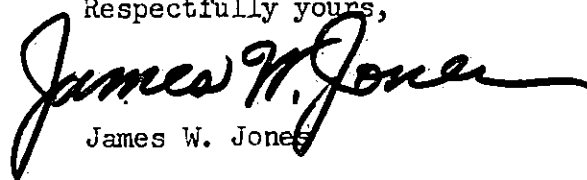

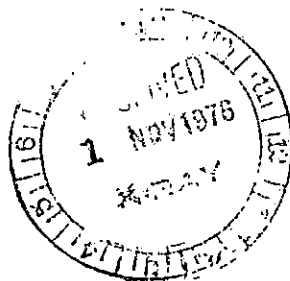
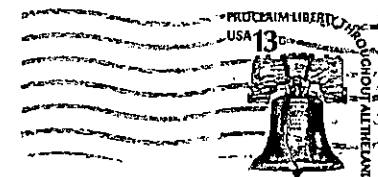
