NOMINATION OF MARTIN R. POLLNER AS U.S. CANDIDATE FOR ELECTION TO THE INTERNATIONAL NARCOTICS CONTROL BOARD

Secretary of State William P. Rogers today announced the nomination of Martin R. Pollner, Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Treasury for Enforcement and Director, Office of Law Enforcement, as the U.S. candidate for election to the International Narcotics Control Board (INCB) for a 3-year term to begin March 2, 1974...

The International Narcotics Control Board, established by the 1961 Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs, is the UN body which reviews and monitors the licit drug requirements of all nations, and is empowered to take semi-judicial measures and call upon governments for remedial action of treaty violations involving diversion of drugs into illicit channels. Election to the INCB is by vote of the UN Economic and Social Council. The 11 members of INCB are elected for 3-year terms from among candidates proposed by Member Governments and the World Health Organization.

Mr. Pollner has been with the Treasury Department in his present position since 1970. He headed several U.S. Delegations to INTERPOL General Assemblies and was the Treasury Department Representative on the Working Group of the Cabinet Committee on International Narcotics Control. Mr. Pollner will leave U.S. Government service before assuming his INCB duties. He will become a member of the law firm of Amen, Weisman and Butler in New York.

Prior to joining the Treasury Department in June of 1970, Mr. Pollner was an attorney with Mudge, Rose, Guthrie and Alexander in New York. In 1960, he was selected by the then Attorney General, William P. Rogers, to participate in the Attorney General's Program for Honor Law Graduates. He served in the Department of Justice in the Office of Deputy Attorney General Lawrence E. Walsh and his successor, Byron R. White. From 1963 to 1966, he was a Federal prosecutor with the United States Attorney's office for the Eastern District of New York.

He was Executive Director of President Nixon's Advisory Council on Crime and Law Enforcement in 1968.

Mr. Pollner is a graduate of the City College of New York and the Brooklyn Law School. He served on the Brooklyn Law Review. He was admitted to the Bar in November, 1960.

He is married to the former Mildred Brenner. They have two children ages 12 and 10.

Dear George:

Jo and I were sorry not to have heard you Sunday on national television. I read with interest - and admiration - the news account of what you said. It is a shocking thing that some individuals, even in sensitive government positions, have such a warped sense of duty and responsibility.

I also heard, on radio, a portion of what Don Rumsfeld said with respect to the now apparent intention of the Soviet Union to attain a military superiority of such magnitude as to give it a range of options seriously detrimental to our country and the Free World.

This prompts me to send you a copy of the Supplemental Statement that six of us joined after serving on the Blue Ribbon Defense Panel in 1969/70. As you will note, Bill Clements was one of those who joined in the statement. I wrote the statement in my law office in Richmond - with no assistance from anyone in the Pentagon or from the staff of the Panel. We did have access, in the course of our study, to the information I used. In addition, I was on a subcommittee that had top secret clearance, and I saw a good deal of intelligence that I did not reveal in the Supplemental Statement.

Although I was the drafstman of the statement, others who signed it - especially Bill Clements - were quite helpful.

The statement may seem a bit "alarmist", and yet the truth is I was deeply concerned by what I

learned on the Panel. To be sure, I did not have access to all that was available to the National Security Council, but I did see enough to be convinced - as I am now - that the goal of the Soviet Union is military superiority in a total sense: in nuclear and conventional weapons, and in forces on land, sea and air. As I view it, the attainment of this goal could well be inevitable in view of the constraints that limit national action (especially on defense and foreign policy issues) in a democracy.

But I do think the chance to avoid a repressive and threatening Soviet hegemony would be enhanced if our leaders recognized publicly, with greater frankness and emphasis, the capabilities of the Soviet Union and what these may portend for the future.

In this connection, I recall that the first lesson an intelligence officer is taught is to focus on the potential enemy's capabilities and recognize that speculating as to his intentions is very risky business.

Writing to you along these lines, as you leave the CIA, may seem a bit curious. Yet, in view of my position on the Court I do not feel free to speak in this vein to officials - even warm friends - in the other branches of government. I know that you also have not been free to express views publicly. Perhaps when you are a private citizen you will be able to make a contribution to wider public understanding by writing and speaking.

We hope to see you and Barbara in the near future.

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FOR Jimmy Carter Presidential Campaign

For America's third century, why not our best?
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All through his primary campaign, Jimmy Carter liked to boast that he was beholden to no one for his votes. But when Georgia Congressman Andrew Young (the first black Southern congressman elected since Reconstruction), makes a nominating speech for Carter this week, he will symbolize that Carter does owe at least one outstanding political debt—to the nation's black voters. Although some black leaders remain skeptical of Carter, it was blacks in Florida and North Carolina who helped him scuttle George Wallace's candidacy, blacks in Michigan who provided his narrow win over Morris Udall and blacks throughout the country whose support gave Carter respectability among white liberals. Now, they hope to win support from him for special black programs and Administration jobs. "He's indebted to [us]," says Georgia State Rep. Bobby Hill. "I can't believe he would forget that. We wouldn't let him."

Wary: Partly because of Carter's Baptist background and his record as governor of Georgia—he appointed 53 blacks to supervisory boards ranging from the university regents to cosmetology—some of the black vote came naturally his way. But he relied heavily on people like Young and deputy campaign manager Ben Brown to win over wary voters and to bring blacks onto his campaign staff (13 per cent of his payroll is black). A soul handshake from Martin Luther King Sr. and renewed pledges of fidelity from Young also helped Carter through his "ethnic purity" crisis last April.

Carter has already begun responding. He has made commitments to national health insurance, aid to cities and majority rule in Africa, all issues of special importance to blacks. Now, at Carter's invitation, influential black leaders have begun compiling a list of jobs they would like blacks to fill in a Carter Administration, among them several Cabinet-level positions. Black strategists say they will also ask for important posts in the Office of Management and Budget and at the Under Secretary and Assistant Secretary levels throughout the government.

Few people took seriously Carter's offer to consider a black Vice President. "He shouldn't have talked about that,"

says Urban League executive director Vernon Jordan. "He wasn't going to do it and he knew it." But blacks do intend to hold Carter to his promise to appoint blacks to jobs in regulatory agencies and as Federal judges. "What Carter did in Georgia is the best indication of what he'll do in the White House," says campaign director Hamilton Jordan. "You'll see a dramatic attempt to involve blacks

to Carter. Julian Bond (page 25) says Carter's "unpredictableness" bothers him and Rev. Jesse Jackson worries that his anti-Washington statements may be "code words" for cutting federally funded social programs. Even blacks within the campaign have complaints about their candidate. Some staffers resent the fact that Brown and other blacks behind the scenes in Atlanta have been denied the media attention accorded Hamilton Jordan and press secretary Jody Powell.

Recently Carter hired a black press spokeswoman and he plans to sign on a black traveling aide. Supporters believe this reaction to staff complaints is a sign of things to come. "I don't know that Carter's going to beat LBJ in social programs," says Bobby Hill, who credits both Johnson and JFK with supporting black causes. "But Carter will offer a different opportunity for blacks than ever before. The difference is that we know him personally... and he'll hear us out."

Cosmetic: Vernon Jordan seems convinced that Carter's rapport with blacks will win him support even if he doesn't always vote their way. "He will do a lot of things that will be cosmetic—but that's important. For example, he may find it difficult to go all the way for Humphrey-Hawkins [the full-employment bill] but I think [his lack of support] may go down easier with the brothers if he's just come from praying at Walter Fauntroy's church in Washington."

Even Jackson concedes that he urges blacks to vote for Carter over Ford or Reagan, and New York Congressman Charles Rangel, a former Udall supporter, now enthusiastically backs Carter. To make sure their man gets all the way to the White House, Carter's black supporters have begun organizing voter-registration drives in eleven key industrial states, including New York and Pennsylvania. As a result, Carter may be even more indebted to black support in November than he was in the spring primaries. A recent New York Times poll indicated that if a Carter-Ford race were held today, the two men would split the white vote. But Carter would carry 73 per cent of the black vote—more than enough to make him President.

in policymaking positions. You'll see blacks in the Cabinet."

The names most frequently mentioned for Carter's Cabinet are Young and Vernon Jordan, though Jordan claims he isn't interested and Young insists he wants to keep his seat—and his steadily expanding influence—in the House. Economist Andrew Brimmer comes up as a possible Secretary of the Treasury or Commerce. Blacks may also ask Carter to consider Atlanta businessman Jesse Hill, National Urban Coalition president M. Carl Holman and attorney Marian Wright Edelman for jobs.
