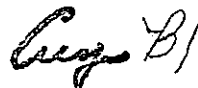
Dear Quenan Family,

Dear George:

I enjoyed our brief visit when you addressed the Commonwealth Club last summer. I thought it was a particularly effective speech. I'm sending along a clipping from the San Francisco Chronicle (November 30) which you may not have seen.

You'll notice from the letterhead that I have a new position of sorts. Until last April, I was with Attorney General Evelle Younger. As Attorney General, he has one appointment to our California Fair Political Practices Commission, which oversees our campaign spending laws much as the Federal Election Commission does on the national level. His position became vacant, and he appointed me to the Commission. This necessitated my leaving his office, and since the Commission post is part time, I decided to return to graduate school and get a doctorate. I have some friends at Claremont who suggested I come here. I will be here for about a year working on my Ph.D. at the graduate school while also working at the Rose Institute. We do research on political demographics, and have just completed an analysis of the Tunney-Hayakawa race--really a fascinating upset.

I gather from the press that you were more than disappointed by the election results. I've about come to the conclusion that Republicans needed to lose the White House, since the wretched state of the party was getting worse, not better. I am astounded that we lost House seats from 1974, and yet in California we lost a Congressman and seats in both houses of the Legislature. I felt badly about Ford because I admired much that he did on the policy level, but it is hard to find a more inept political operation. Almost everything they did had a negative aspect to it, from picking Bob Dole to the whole way the early campaign was structured. From everything I read, it seems that Jim Baker did a fine job, but he was just up against too many early mistakes.

It is just remarkable to realize that the only people to profit politically this year from an association with Nixon and Ford were two Democrats, Dixie Lee Ray and Pat Moynihan, and that Ford may have lost the Presidency because of the coattails Moynihan provided for the Democrats in New York. We really need to be out of power for a while, to cut the final cords with Watergate if nothing else.

I am not sure what the future portends for the GOP in California. We have some potentially attractive candidates for 1978, and now the Democrats are fully in charge of everything. Perhaps we are not that badly off since we did carry California for Ford, although many feel Carter lost the state rather than Ford winning it. Tunney really tossed away his Senate seat by ignoring the state for six years. For myself, since my Commission work is non-partisan, I'll be able to sit on the sidelines and watch things for a while.

Have you decided what you will do after January 20? Are you planning to return to Texas? I'll be anxious to hear. Be sure to give my very best to Bar. Hope everyone is well. Have a good holiday season.
