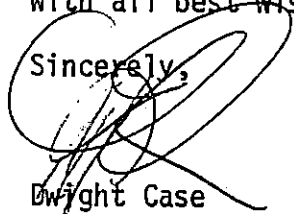

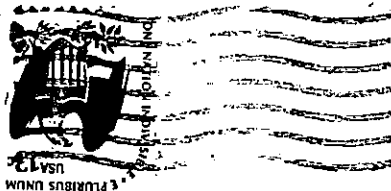

My interest in Latin America dates back to World War II when I was stationed in Panama with the Navy. It has been my privilege to travel in all countries of Central and South America. Therefore, I feel somewhat qualified to comment on political and economic activities in this part of the world.

Recently, I have been disturbed by certain newspaper articles concerning Nicaragua and President Somoza in particular. I travel in all countries of Central America and have excellent contacts in government and the business sector. I am more impressed with the order, progress and opportunity in Nicaragua than any of the other Central American countries. Those, such as Jack Anderson, who write critical articles of Nicaragua and President Somoza simply are ignoring the facts. I am enclosing a copy of a report by the U.N. Economic Commission for Latin America. This report indicates that for the year 1974, Nicaragua had more real economic growth than any country in Central America and the projection for 1975 places the country second only to Guatemala.

As you might know, I endeavor to meet and communicate with people from all walks of life. In the main, the people are happy and they are proud of their President and of their country. Within two days after the earthquake of December 1972, I was in Nicaragua. Even those who opposed the President said, "Thank God for Somoza because he is the only man who can hold the country together". He is that kind of a leader and that kind of a man.

Dear Mr. Ambassador:

With the risk you may take this letter to be somewhat audacious and presumptuous on my part, I am writing to ask you to pass on to the essential Presidential or Department of State assistant the request that my name be included among those being considered for appointment as Ambassador to the Court of St. James.

I recognize that historically such an appointment has gone only to a vast contributor to the Party campaign chests. I feel such is not now the case (in fact, the first question of a Senator at the hearing would be in this direction), and the Presidential image would be increased if such appointment was made to one residing in the hinterland and based on his past department experience and local area prestige. Party loyalty and participation for well over 30 years is taken for granted. I was a member of the delegation to two National Conventions. I might add that Mrs. King is a most delightful and charming hostess, well known in Denver for her work in philanthropic activities, and would carry through in excellent fashion the duties one would expect of the wife of an Ambassador.

I was in Washington last week and in two instances had separate visits with the respective former Deputy Chiefs of Mission at Dublin (Roger Sorenson) and Earl L. Sohm, Minister as well as Deputy Chief of Missions at the Embassy in London. Mr. Sohm is now head of the Department of Management Operations in the State Department in Washington. I served under both of these men. Without answering a request on my part, each separately and in a personal manner (certainly not official in anyway) suggested that their experience in working with me and with the experience I

had gathered in serving at both the Dublin Embassy for one month and the London Embassy for approximately two months (I was also a member of the High Councilors at each Embassy) that I possibly should put in my hat for consideration of this very high appointment. I know the workings of the London Embassy, the men who head up its respective divisions, and the nature of my work, at each Embassy, called for me to have daily contact with the leading local citizens in the financial and commercial field. After turning in my report at the conclusion of the mission, I received a nice letter of commendation from Robert Ingersoll, Deputy Secretary of State.

I am very humble in asking that you pass my name on with the suggestion that it be included among those under consideration for this important and high office.

I recognize that any serious consideration could only be given after I have been interviewed in Washington and some expression of my philosophies be imparted. At a recent meeting of the 'Center for the Study of the Presidency' held at the War College in Carlisle, Pennsylvania, my remarks included the statement that "the purpose of that organization should be for the sustaining of the dignity and high office of the President and corollary to this the support of the CIA, which is the main protection of our people away from the shores of this country. Great Britain has the monarchy on whom people of all walks of life look up to. Heretofore, we have had the Presidency for this purpose but with the adverse publicity and the tearing down of the image, it would take great effort and period of time to restore the former respect held by the citizens of this country. Some organization must come forward to lead the fight, and I can see none better than the Center."

While in London, since I had complete security clearance, I had occasion to become acquainted with Mr. Cord Meyer, Jr., the head of the CIA for the European Region, spreading from Denmark down to the Mediterranean. As I had the opportunity to observe the wonderful work this organization is carrying on in behalf of the citizens of this country, it has been a great blow to me to see the efforts made in Congress to tear down the image of this tremendous organization. I think the President is wise in selecting a man of your stature to help restore this image. (In fact, it seems to me you have had to take on a couple of jobs in the last several years for the same purpose.)

After looking me over and indicating that some consideration might be given to me for this important appointment, I could gather excellent support

in my own local area from the publisher of our largest newspaper on down, including, believe it or not, our senior Democratic U. S. Senator from Colorado. From my own earnings over the years, and not by inheritance, I am so situated financially as to ably handle the well known extra expense the Ambassador to Great Britain is expected to bear.

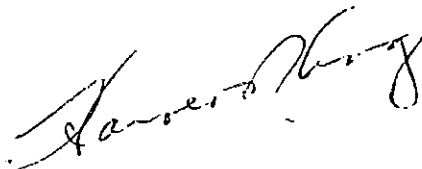
As an example of the reputation I have in my own community, on my return from Europe in the Fall of 1974, I was elected to the Board of the Capitol Life Insurance Company, the largest life insurance company in the Rocky Mountain area and, subsequently, was appointed to its Executive Committee. I have for many years been Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Board of a half billion Savings and Loan Association in this area.

On three occasions, commencing in 1960 when President Eisenhower appointed me to the Board of the then new Air Force Academy, in 1970 when President Nixon appointed me U. S. Representative to UNESCO in Paris, and in 1974 with the State Department appointment, I have gone through full investigation by the FBI and received full clearance in each instance.

Should you feel I am overstepping my bounds, you may feel free to drop this in the wastebasket, but should you feel I should be given a running chance, I will appreciate all your efforts, since I must depend entirely on you as being a direct contact to the President of the United States.

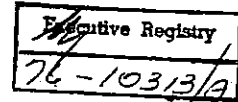

Dear George:

My apologies to you for my letter of September 29th and the time taken by you to receive and answer. My sole purpose was the thought that you would pass on to one of the President's debate advisers the point that Great Britain, to receive all of the benefits that Mr. Carter said that he would give to the American people, brought on its existing economic situation which is tantamount to bankruptcy, and which would have resulted if the five big unions that control the Labour Party had not finally realized their demands were so confiscatory that this year they reduced pay raise requests to 5%. Additionally, the income tax, while progressively heavy, becomes confiscatory at the low point of earnings, which affects every so-called middle class earner in England.

The heavy statistics are too much for the people to absorb, but when the President said, "The lowest unemployment years cited by his opponent were during years of war", the people caught that. I simply wanted to add one other point that I felt the people would catch as these are the things the unseen majority will make up their minds on.

I did not intend to take your time on ordinary correspondence. I hope it would not be embarrassing to you to have one of the President's advisers give consideration to the point that I mention about confiscatory taxes and which is backed up by the written tax law which should easily be available at the State Department. I imposed on you because I felt a simple matter had been overlooked, and you could pass the word on being so close to the President's advisers.

Please do not take the time to answer.

I am particularly pleased with the reproduction of the first recorded passport issued in 1778 under United States authority, written in French and signed jointly by Benjamin Franklin, Arthur Lee and John Adams.

You will be interested in the statistical profile of the modern American traveler and our predictions and descriptions of the role and nature of the passport in the future.

It is my hope that The United States Passport - Past, Present, Future will find a place on library shelves throughout the country so that historians, researchers,

students and U.S. citizen travelers will have access to the very interesting history of this official document.

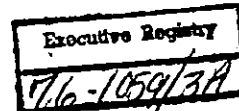

Once again, thank you for providing us with a most memorable occasion.

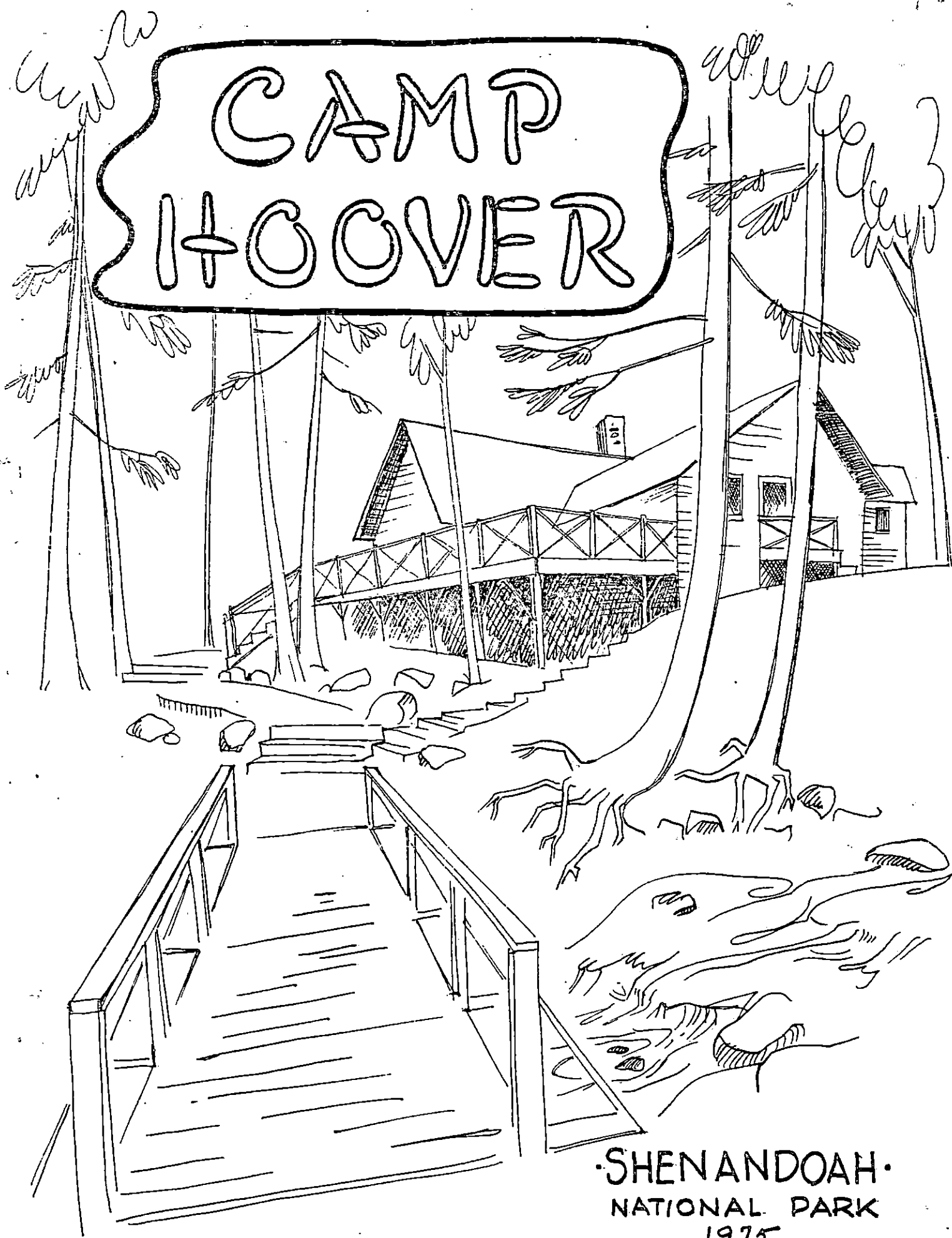

CAMP HOOVER

LOCATION: Camp Hoover is located 27 miles from the intersection of U.S. Highway 211 and the Skyline Drive at Thornton Gap (Panorama). To reach Camp Hoover, travel 20 miles south on Skyline Drive to Big Meadows and through a locked gate 7 miles east on a gravel road to Camp Hoover. NOTE: Stop at Harry F. Byrd, Sr., Visitor Center at Big Meadows to meet a Ranger and/or pick up a key. If anticipated that arrival at Big Meadows will be after 5:00 P.M., notify the Superintendent or Chief Ranger.

DESCRIPTION: There are cabin facilities for a maximum of 18 people; however, optimum capacity is 11.

The President: Single story, 2-bedroom, enclosed sun porch, kitchen with modern equipment, sleeping accommodations for 8, optimum occupancy 5.

The Creel: Single story, 1-bedroom, kitchen with modern equipment, sleeping accommodations for 4, optimum occupancy (when cooking privileges are required) 2.

The Prime Minister: Single story, 2-bedroom, no kitchen, sleeping accommodations for 6, optimum occupancy 4.

Copies of floor plans are attached. Hot water and showers are provided in each cabin. Linens, blankets, towels, cooking utensils, and dinner service for 16 people are provided. Charcoal grills are available; however, guests must provide their own charcoal. A list of household facilities furnished is attached. Fishing with barbless hooks is permitted in nearby streams. Guests should bring their own fishing tackle. Fishing licenses are required, and are available at Big Meadows Wayside. A copy of the fishing regulations is attached. Heavy clothes are recommended for the cool nights of spring and fall. Pets must be under physical restrictive control at all times.

SUPPLIES: There is a campers supply store at Big Meadows Wayside where a variety of food can be purchased.

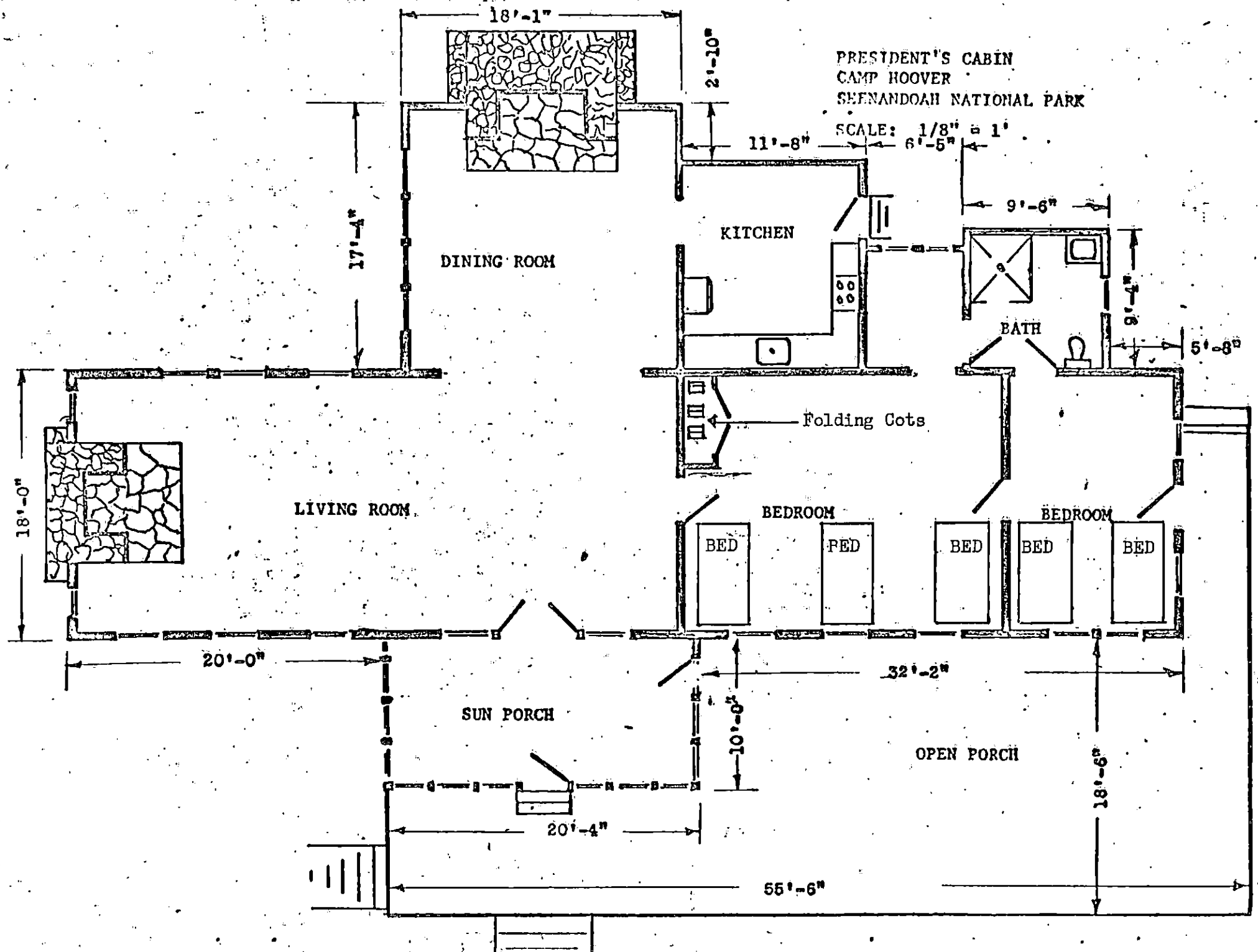
When Camp Hoover is used exclusively by a single group or organization as a conference center, the daily rate is \$6.33 per person or \$79.20, whichever is greater.

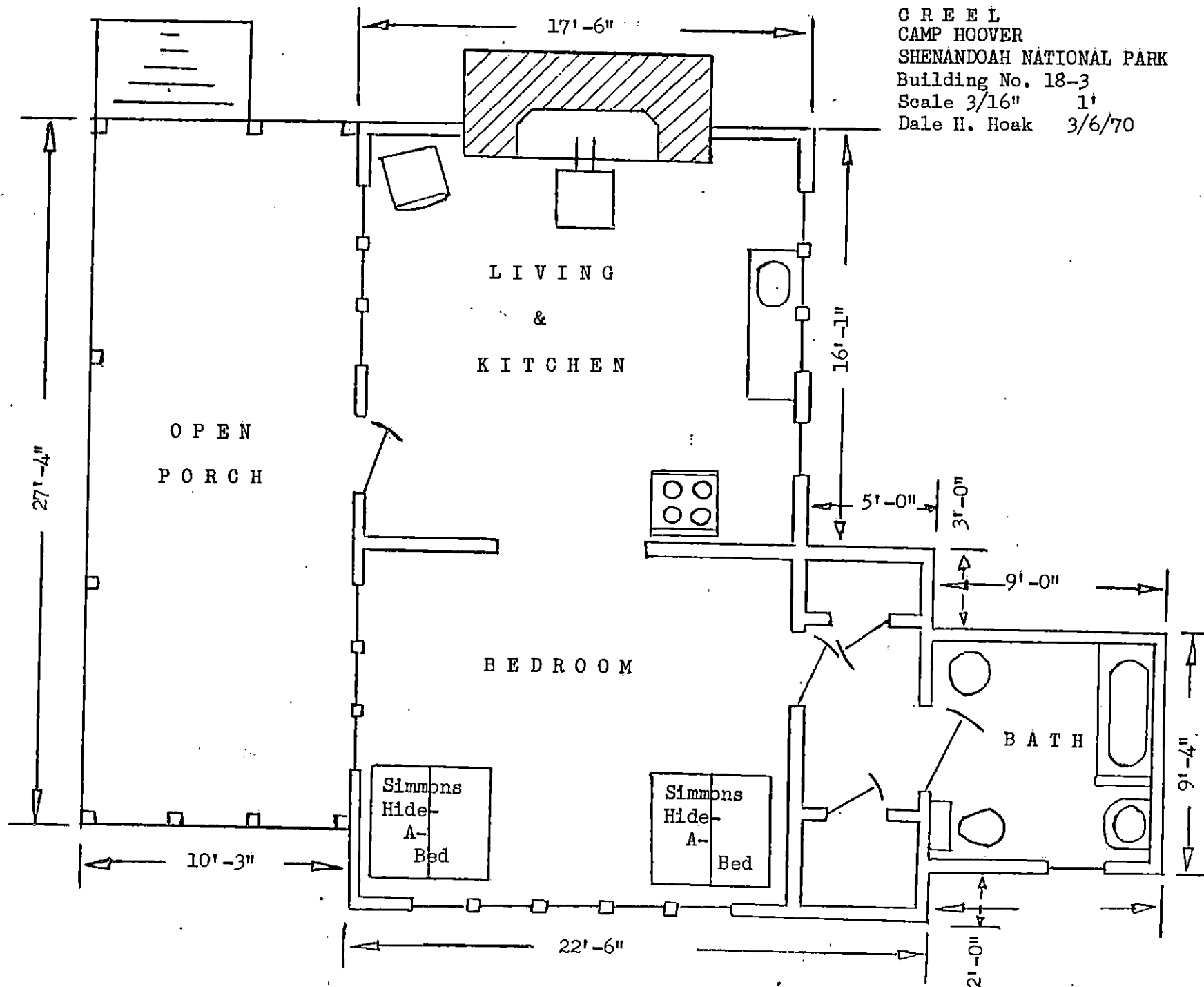

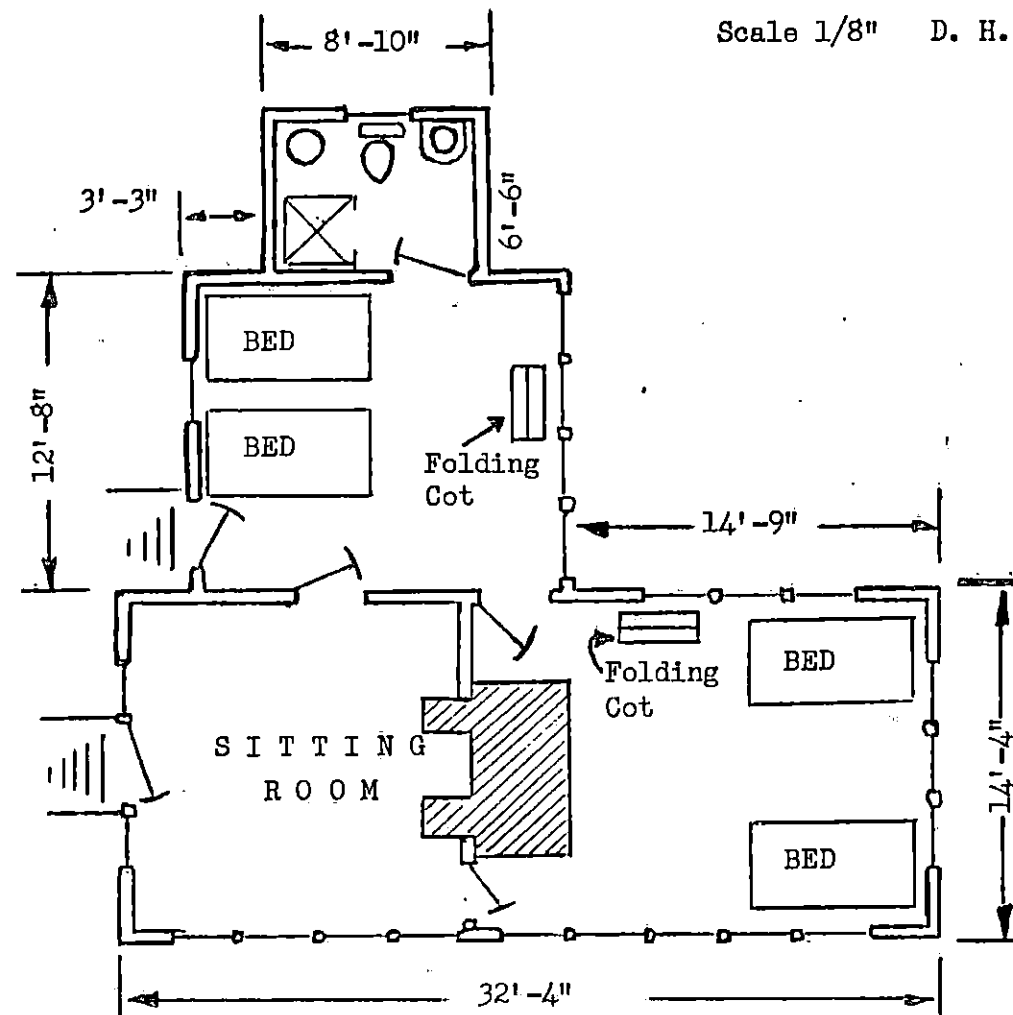

1975 - FISHING REGULATIONS - 1975

I. General Fishing Regulations. Only trout fishing is permitted in Park waters. No trout under eight (8) inches may be creeled. Artificial lures with single hook only may be used. No bait of any kind is permitted. The creel limit is five (5) trout per day. The season is from 12:00 Noon DST, April 5 through October 15. Fishing is permitted from one hour before sunrise until one hour after sunset.

Fishing must be by angling with hand-held tackle. A hand landing net may be used to land fish legally hooked. No trout caught in Park waters may be sold.

It is unlawful to fish in Park waters after the daily creel limit of trout has been caught. Also, it is unlawful to feed, bait, seine, or snag trout in Park waters.

II. FISH-FOR-FUN. On the Rapidan and Staunton Rivers and their tributaries within the Shenandoah National Park boundary, anglers are limited to the use of artificial lures with a single barbless hook. All fish caught must be immediately and carefully returned to the stream. No fish of any size may be in possession at any time on the Fish-for-Fun streams. The season is open year round.

III. Fishing License Required. Unless anglers are under 16 years of age or 65 years of age and older, they must have in their possession one of the following licenses: 1) Valid Virginia state resident or non-resident license; 2) Valid Virginia county resident license (restricts fishing to that portion of Shenandoah National Park within the county of the license); or, 3) Temporary 5-day, \$3.00 license, which may be purchased at any concession unit within the Park, or may be ordered by mail from the following address: ARA Virginia Sky-Line Company, Inc., Attn.: Mrs. Hilliard, P. O. Box 727, Luray, Virginia 22835. Information necessary with mail order: (a) Name, address, weight, height, age, race; (b) Specify the 5 consecutive days license is to cover; and (c) \$3.00 by check or money order payable to ARA Virginia Sky-Line Company, Inc., must accompany order of license.

IV. Emergency Closing of Park Waters to Fishing. During any period of emergency, or to prevent overuse by fishermen of waters open to fishing in Shenandoah National Park, the Superintendent, at his discretion, may close to fishing all or part of such open waters for such periods of time as may be necessary, PROVIDED: the notice thereof shall be given by the posting of appropriate signs, notices, and markers.

V. Penalties. Violators of these regulations are subject to penalties as prescribed by the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 36, Sec. 1.3 and/or Title 16, U. S. Code, Sections 403c-3 and 403c-4.

SHENANDOAH NATIONAL PARK, VIRGINIA

Astride the Blue Ridge Mountains in one of the most beautiful and historic regions of the southeast, Shenandoah National Park is an elongated park, some 80 miles long and containing approximately 300 square miles. Spur ridges branch out from the mountain crest and blend into the rolling land of the Shenandoah Valley on the west, and into wooded hills, orchards, and fields of the Piedmont Plateau on the east. Between these ridges are deep hollows, well timbered, and drained by streams.

The Blue Ridge is more than a billion years old, time to smooth rising peaks into gentle slopes that, on a clear day, seem never to end as they stretch into the distance in a cloak of blue haze from which we derive the "blue" in Blue Ridge. The highest peak, Hawksbill, is 4049 feet.

The famous Skyline Drive winds for 105 miles along the crest of the Blue Ridge throughout the length of the Park. There are many overlooks and parking areas along the Drive, and visitors are encouraged to stop and view the rich valleys and mountain slopes from chosen vista points. The Skyline Drive reaches its highest point, 3680 feet, at Mile 41.7. (Mileposts are numbered from north to south along the Drive.) The lowest point, 600 feet, is near the north entrance at Front Royal, Virginia.

Although traveling along the Drive by car is the most popular way to see the Park, visitors are encouraged to increase their enjoyment by exploring some of the more intimate features along 400 miles of foot trails, including a 95-mile section of the Appalachian Trail. Some of the features reached by trail include mountain peaks, sparkling trout streams, cascading waterfalls, greenstone cliffs, dense forests, spacious mountain meadows, and unspoiled wilderness.

Visitors are encouraged to stop at the two Visitor Centers where exhibits, orientation programs, and Ranger-Naturalists introduce the major Park features and suggest what to see and do. Conducted hikes and evening campfire programs are conducted daily from mid-June until Labor Day. During the spring and fall, a Park Naturalist gives illustrated talks on Tuesday through Saturday evenings at 8:00 P.M. at the Byrd Visitor Center at Big Meadows. For the do-it-yourself visitor, self-guiding nature trails are popular.

Shenandoah Natural History Association, Box 387, Luray, Virginia 22835, sponsors the sale of maps, slides, and colored pictures - also guides and publications on the history and the natural history of the Park. All profits are used to assist the Park's interpretive program. A list of publications is available on request.

Facilities include overnight accommodations, restaurants, camper supplies, rental horses, and gas stations located throughout the Park and operated by the ARA Virginia Sky-Line Company, Inc., Luray, Virginia 22835. The Potomac Appalachian Trail Club, Inc., 1718 N Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20036, has a concession permit for rental of six trail cabins.

Camping in automobile campgrounds is limited to 14 days between the period of June 1 through October 31, and sites are assigned on a "first-come, first-served" basis. - Overflow camping along the Park roads or in public areas is not permitted. While there are no utility connections for trailers, sewage disposal stations for self-contained units are located at Big Meadows, Loft Mountain, and Matthews Arm. Camper supplies are available within the Park year round. Visitors planning to camp in the backcountry of the Park must secure a camping permit. Information on permits may be obtained at any Ranger Station or Visitor Center or by mail from Park Headquarters.

All Park waters are open for trout fishing from noon on the first Saturday in April until one hour after sunset on October 15. Only artificial lures with a single hook may be used, except for the fish-for-fun streams along the Rapidan and Staunton Rivers, which are open year round and where only artificial lures with single barbless hooks are permitted. A Virginia fishing license, or a special five-day license is required. There are no opportunities for swimming or boating.

Pets are permitted in the Park when on a leash or otherwise under physical restrictive control. Pets are not allowed in the Visitor Centers or where food is sold and served - seeing eye dogs excepted.

The Park speed limit is 35 miles per hour unless otherwise posted. Summer temperatures usually are in the 80's in the daytime, dropping into the 40's at night. Spring and fall temperatures are about 10 degrees cooler. About three inches of rain fall each month.

While the summer months usually have highest visitation, October consistently brings record weekend crowds because of the fall color.

Hunting with any kind of weapon is prohibited. Firearms must be made inoperative and packed away before entering the Park.

Shenandoah National Park is a Federal fee area, with an entrance fee charged for all private, noncommercial vehicles. A per person fee is charged visitors using other than private, noncommercial vehicles.

Join a Ranger-Naturalist in exploring the world of Shenandoah

The summer schedule of conducted activities offers a variety of opportunities to get to know your world a little better. Take a walk - from a one-half hour stroll to a four-hour hike. Do something different at an outdoor lore session. Enjoy the fellowship of an evening campfire program. Let's discover Shenandoah together.

The National Park Service also offers guidance in your personal discovery of Shenandoah.

Visitor Centers, at Dickey Ridge and Big Meadows, are staffed by naturalists who can answer your questions and assist you in planning your visit. Exhibits and slide programs help introduce you to this recycled wilderness. Trail information, maps, and guidebooks are available. Publications, including field guides, histories, and pictures may be purchased to enhance your visit. The Byrd Visitor Center at Big Meadows is open daily except on Christmas day.

Bulletin Boards, throughout the Park, list activities and schedules and give directions to nearby attractions.

Self-guiding Trails, used by reading signs or a trail booklet, are located at five places off the Skyline Drive:

Traces Trail (2 miles) starts at Matthews Arm Campground Amphitheater, Mile 22.3. A walk through the past.

Stony Man Trail (1.5 miles) starts at parking area on the north entrance road to Skyland, Mile 41.8. Great views on clear days.

Swamp Trail (2 miles) starts in Picnic Area, one mile from Skyline Drive, near Big Meadows Amphitheater, Mile 51.3. Forest, meadow, and swamp.

Deadening Trail (1.3 miles) starts across Drive from Loft Mountain Wayside, Mile 79.5. Nature heals some old wounds.

Big Flat Trail (1.5 miles) starts near Loft Mountain Campground Amphitheater, Mile 79.5. Some glimpses of man and nature.

DISCOVER SHENANDOAH YEAR-ROUND

Fall (Labor Day through October)

The days stay mild - the nights turn cool, as the Blue Ridge prepares for the fall spectacular of color. Oaks, hickories, maples - each species

has its own hue in this annual foliage display. The visitor centers remain open through late October, with naturalists on duty to help make your autumn excursions more meaningful and memorable.

Winter (November through February)

With their cloak of leaves removed, the mountains show their true ruggedness and grandeur. The air is crisp and clean, and new vistas are revealed. A visit to Shenandoah after a snowfall is a trip to a world of white on blue. Big Meadows is the center of winter activities, with information obtainable at the Byrd Visitor Center. Rooms and meals are available at the Wayside.

Spring (March through mid-June)

Shenandoah comes alive. The earliest wildflowers appear in March, followed by a colorful progression of blossoming and re-growth. The mountains - and spring-time visitors - are equally renewed. The visitor centers are open full time by Easter. Consult the bulletin boards for current information on programs and activities.

FACT SHEET
GRAND TETON NATIONAL PARK
BRINKERHOFF HOUSE

LOCATION: The house is situated on the shore of Jackson Lake, conveniently near the Teton Park Road, 7 miles south of Jackson Lake Lodge, about 14 miles north of Moose, the park headquarters.

DESCRIPTION: The Brinkerhoff is a one and a half story log lodge. The entry way opens into a large living room-dining room combination, picture windows open to the west overlooking Jackson Lake and the Teton Range. A balcony extends along the eastern interior wall. The balcony gives access to three bedrooms and bath, below which, are located the kitchen, a bedroom, and a bath.
