WHITE HOUSE TRANSPORTATION AGENCY RULES

The White House Transportation Agency is available to assist the Staff in moving throughout the Washington area on official business. Since the number of vehicles and drivers is limited, it is necessary that members follow the established rules to assure fair and equitable use.

Accordingly, the Agency has been instructed to provide portal to portal transportation for those persons designated as Group A members. Portal to portal transportation is defined to include all official trips as well as transportation to and from work.

Restricted official use is authorized for those persons designated as Group B members. Restricted official use includes official trips in the Washington area between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m., but not transportation to and from work. Such trips must be scheduled not to impinge on our operations during the hours of peak demand, which are (Monday thru Friday):

6:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m.

11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

Female staff members who work after 8:30 p.m. may request transportation home if a genuine requirement for such service exists. This special courtesy will be extended only when doing so will not interfere with normal car operation commitments. This service is not available to female personnel whose normal working hours began after 4:00 p.m.

To assure availability of transportation for official use, it is necessary that all members of the staff observe the following rules:

a. Do not ask drivers to wait more than 20 minutes. Drivers are instructed to return to the Garage for subsequent trips after discharge of passengers.

b. Do not request transportation to or from restaurants, hotels or to private homes for social purposes.

c. Do not request transportation for members of your family or guests. Persons on the Group A list may request transportation for their wives to attend official and social functions at the White House. Transportation will not be provided to any other place.

d. Group A members may authorize official use of cars for members of their staffs.

Because the number of vehicles is limited and to provide service in the immediate Washington area, we do not routinely accept requests for trips to Dulles, Baltimore-Washington International Airports, Andrews AFB or other areas outside the Washington metropolitan area. However, if cars are available, transportation to these airports may be provided to Group A members in conjunction with official travel.

All requests for transportation outside the Washington metropolitan area will be referred to the Military Assistant's office.

Due to the location of the Garage, you should allow ten minutes for a car to arrive at the White House.

RE: Meeting with Professor Edwin O. Reischauer to discuss the Solarz-Fraser amendment on gradual U.S. troop withdrawal from South Korea

We have scheduled a meeting for Monday, January 19 at 2:00 p.m., in H-236 for Members and their staff to meet with Professor Reischauer and address questions to him regarding the Solarz-Fraser amendment for gradual U.S. troop withdrawal from South Korea. It is expected the Committee will consider this amendment on January 20, 1976.

Professor Reischauer is one of our foremost scholars on Asian affairs. He is currently professor of history at Harvard University. He served as our ambassador to Japan. Enclosed is a copy of the letter he sent to Congressman Fraser concerning our amendment.

The Solarz-Fraser amendment calls for a phased withdrawal of all U.S. military forces from South Korea with a significant reduction to be made as early as practicable but not later than fiscal year 1978. Removal of all forces would not take place until the "modernizing of the armed forces of the R.O.K. has been substantially completed and the R.O.K. has thereby achieved the military capacity to defend itself against an attack by the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK)." The plan for withdrawal could be revised if the DPRK "significantly alters the military balance in a manner which impairs the defense capability of the R.O.K." Continuation of all forms of military aid and sales is dependent upon the President complying with the above amendment.

We hope you will be able to attend the meeting. Would you please call Jeanne Salvia on X55318 by Thursday, January 15, to advise as to whether or not you will be able to attend.

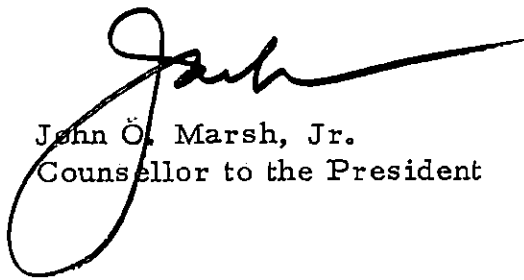
