Dear Andy:

Thank you for your letter of December 18. I am very
pleased to accept the invitation to speak on Monday,
April 12th.

I hate to throw in any caveats, but I just can't foresee the entire spring schedule. The only reason for cancellation would be some crisis that kept me from making the deadline, and I hope that is unlikely, or the necessity of being out of the country. To the degree I control my own schedule I will, of course, try to see that the latter does not occur.

There is one other thing. I will be glad to give my views on China, but I would prefer that you not pin me down to a title. It may well be that there could be some high-level embarrassment for the Director of the CIA to be speaking about China, so if we could leave the subject matter loose we would be protected. It might be that I would have to swing over and talk about something related to the CIA. In any event, I want to be there.

It's kind of like the mongrel at the Westminster Club pet show. -- "I'll be in some damm fine company." Thanks for asking me.

My dear Mr. Ambassador:

I understand from Don Kendall that you have tentatively agreed to be the speaker at the Harvard Business School Club's 1976 International Dinner in New York. The date, as Don indicated, is Monday, April 12, 1976.

Let me tell you something about the affair. The dinner is an annual event. Roughly 1,500 men and women attend, largely senior corporate executives. Last year's speaker was Dr. Gvishiani of the Soviet Union, whom you probably know personally. In previous years, we have alternated between major foreign business leaders and quasi government leaders such as the head of the EEC. Yours will be the only speech at the dinner. In addition, a Business Statesman Award will be given, but that is a very brief ceremony. Previous awardees have included men such as Bob McNamara, Walt Wriston, and David Rockefeller. Dean Fouraker, whom you know, will also be present, but he will not be giving a talk.

Since this is an international dinner, we would be keenly interested in your observations as chief U. S. liaison in Red China. This could include your thinking regarding the present commercial development of China, the future trade outlook, and any insights into effective ways to do business in that complex country. We would, of course, understand that you will not draw on the resources of the CIA for your talk.

Assuming your answer is yes, I would be very happy to meet with you to give you any background or flavor of the group if you think that might be helpful.

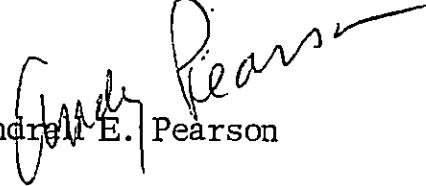

Dear George:

I am delighted you will be our guest speaker for the April 12 HBSC International Dinner.

We understand that you may be restricted in discussing China, so we will try to be as general as possible in billing your talk. Where it is necessary to say anything specific, we will merely say we've asked you to discuss the outlook for trade with China. If you decide to switch subjects, you can let me know before hand, or even at the last minute.

As I indicated to you in my letter, the dias for this event is a first-rate group of chief executives from most of the major companies in the east. Last year, Dr. Gvishiani invited a number of diplomats, both Soviets and others. We would be happy to include any business leaders, diplomats or government officials you would like on the dias for this event. Toward that end, if you have an administrative assistant, or someone with whom we can work, maybe it would be good to have the person's name and phone number. Deke DeLoach, whom you know, handles that kind of thing for Don Kendall and me, so the two of them can work out matters like that without taking up your time.

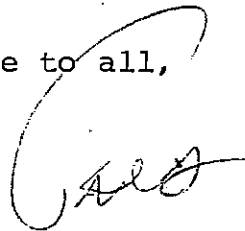
Dear Pop:

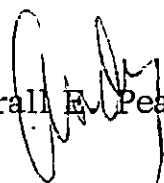

Keynote Speaker Named

GEORGE BUSH TO ADDRESS INTERNATIONAL DINNER

The club is honored to announce that the keynote speaker of our most popular annual event—the International Dinner—this year will be Ambassador George H.W. Bush. The black-tie event, where presentation of the annual Business Statesman Award is made, will take place in the Imperial Ballroom of the Hotel Americana at 7:00 p.m. on Monday, April 12th.

The ambassador will discuss trade prospects and commercial development in China. Mr. Bush is a broad-gauged international figure having served as head of our U.N. delegation and as chief U.S. liaison in Red China where he was exceptionally popular.

A graduate of Yale University, he rose from an oil salesman to co-founder to Zapata Off-Shore Company. He began his political career as congressman for the Seventh District in Dallas, Texas, and in 1971 he was appointed permanent representative to the United Nations. After serving as chairman of the Republican National Committee in 1974, he was appointed to the important post in China. He has recently been nominated by President Ford to head the Central Intelligence Agency.

Last year the dinner attracted more than 1200 guests including HBSC members, distinguished business leaders, government officials, and important educators.

The recipient of this year's Business Statesman Award will be announced in the

More specifically, Mr. Ramsbotham will talk about Britain's economic prospects and its economic future in terms of the immediate and near future. He will briefly describe problems facing Britain putting them into their international context. He'll describe steps taken to deal with these problems, the progress which is being achieved, and the attitudes which underlie this progress.

The ambassador will conclude by discussing the factors affecting Britain for the

Panel to Discuss

A UNIQUE PROGRAM FOR EX-OFFENDERS

A unique program which removes ex-addicts and ex-offenders from the welfare roles and makes them employable will be the subject of an unusual panel discussion sponsored by the HBS Club on Wednesday, February 18th at 5:30 p.m. at the Harvard Club. The panelists will discuss the concept of "supported work" as a substitute for the current welfare approach which keeps people unproductive.

Supported work, similar in function to the "sheltered workshops" for the physically or mentally disabled, is the brainchild of Herbert J. Sturz, director of the Vera Institute of Justice. One embodiment of this concept is the Wildcat Service corporation,

Sees Itself As Having Broad Functions

THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

One of the chief aims of the Education Committee is to serve as a clearinghouse for educational opportunities in the metropolitan area that may be of interest to club members. But the committee does not see itself merely as a depository of information. It views its function as one of actively bringing these educational opportunities to the attention of members and encouraging them to take advantage of the offerings.

"Who does not feel that more training and education would enhance our careers and lives and how many of us, somehow, just don't get around to seeking out courses and taking them?" asks Education Committee chairman Jerry Good. "The work of our committee may serve as a catalyst and energizer."

Over 100 Courses

To this end the committee is publishing its first "Guide to Advanced Educational Opportunities in the Greater New York Area." It will list over 100 courses offered by professional organizations, colleges, and universities. Mr. Good says the guide will be updated twice a year and this first one is only a rough beginning. "We hope to gain access to little-known educational opportunities and we'd like to have more critical and explanatory comment about courses given at regular schools. Also, we expect that the membership at large will contribute a valuable input by informing the committee of courses they have taken and seminars they know are being offered," Good said.

Another activity of the committee is to organize programs on subjects that will be beneficial to the members' professional lives. One possibility, presently under consideration, is a series of discussions led by experts on executive health. The committee views its potential range of programs as being rather broad and thus, in a sense, overlaps the function of the Program Committee. And similar to the Program Committee, it welcomes program suggestions from club members. It is hoped that members will undertake to organize

programs they might suggest and Good guarantees assistance from his committee.

Offering more and continued contact with the Business School is yet another activity of the committee. Good would like to see faculty members come to the New York area and lead at least three seminars a year. The sessions envisioned might be: 1) a case study; 2) a rap session; and 3) a talk on research and late developments in the faculty member's field. Last year such a session, which was well attended, was held on the energy crisis.

At the present time the committee consists of six members (three women and three men) but Good would like very much to enlarge the group. They meet informally about every six weeks—usually in his office at McKinsey & Co., 245 Park Avenue. A small inducement is that afternoon meetings include a lunch on the house. The meetings usually last about one hour.

One reason more volunteers are wanted is to help identify new areas in education in which the club and the committee may participate. Members who would like to come and see the committee in action are urged to call Jerry Good at his office: (212) 692-8668.

a nonprofit organization which provides employment on public works projects for thousands of "unemployables." Nearly half their wages come from the diversion of welfare benefits to which they would be entitled if they weren't working. Wildcat provides close supervision. Self-confidence, skills and good work habits are developed through counseling, peer pressure, and positive reinforcement. Wildcat participants become able to find and hold conventional jobs.

Chemical Bank Participates

Another experiment with supported work began in 1973 when Chemical Bank began hiring ex-offenders who were screened by and received counseling from Wildcat. An HBS case has been written on the bank's experiences. Copies of this case will be mailed to everyone who makes a reservation for this event.

The panelists will be Herbert J. Sturz, director of Vera, Kenneth Marion, president of Wildcat, and C. Douglas Ades, a vice president of Chemical Bank deeply involved with the program.

Club members, especially those with experience in personnel development, are encouraged to offer their own views on the subject.

This panel discussion will take place at 5:30 p.m. at the Harvard Club, 27 West 44th Street. The price is \$3.00 for members; \$4.00 for nonmembers. A cash bar will be available.

Ramsbotham, ambassador to this country since March 1974, was educated at Eton and Oxford where he read modern history at Magdalen College. His education was interrupted when he contracted polio. Making an almost complete recovery, he enlisted as a private in the army in 1942 and was discharged as a lieutenant colonel in 1946.

In the Foreign Service since 1948 he has spent two years in Berlin during the blockade, headed the international oil section and participated in negotiations with Iran. He served with the British delegation to the U.N. and as High Commissioner in Cyprus from which post he became Ambassador to Iran.

SUBJECT : Newsweek Lunch

Hal Bruno says that the following persons -- with possibly a few late minute additions -- will be at the Newsweek luncheon in New York on Tuesday, April 13:

- ✓ Edward Kosner, Editor - He is your host. He came up through the writing side of the magazine.
- ✓ Ken Auchincloss, Managing Editor - Also came up from the national affairs side.
- ✓ Ed Klein, Assistant Managing Editor - He was formerly the foreign editor.
- ✓ Larry Martz, Assistant Managing Editor - He came up through the business news side although he has been in national affairs as well.
- ✓ Russell Watson, Foreign Editor.
- ✓ Tony Marro, Washington Bureau - Former Newsday investigative reporter who covers us as part of his beat. Last Friday, Tony told me he thought there would be a pro-forma invitation to Katharine Graham to be present but she may not actually come.

Hal Bruno hopes he will be present but isn't quite sure. He may be out on a campaign trail. He's been talking with your New York hosts. They are interested in the role of CIA; where it's going; what its future is, in your view. They have no fixation on past nor are they intending to zero in on all that.

We should have in mind whether this is on the record, or background, or what.

Hal did say that if the Middle East -- for example -- were terribly hot just at the moment you arrived in New York, they would probably want to give you a little squeeze on that. You might want to keep that in mind as a possible subject on which to have a last minute update.

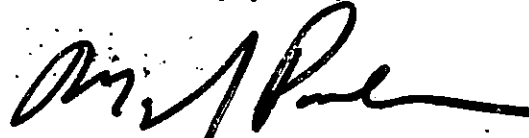

As per my phone conversation with Ms. Fitzgerald, this is to confirm your luncheon date with the editors of Newsweek on Tuesday, April 13, in New York.

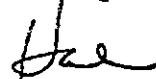

We are naturally distressed by the degree to which the use of reporters by the CIA reflects upon and endangers our reporters all over the world. I mentioned to you Welles Hangen, missing seven years next May in the fighting in Cambodia. During our early and still unavailing efforts to find out anything about him, we were advised to make the strongest representations on his credibility as nothing more than a working newsman and not an agent of a government. We would like to discuss anything that is on your mind, but this is certainly one of the things on our minds.

We enjoyed being with you at the Washington Press Club dinner January 28, and my wife asked me to convey her apologies for her early departure, but (no reflection on women's lib) Lee Valeriani's cigar was beginning to get to her.
