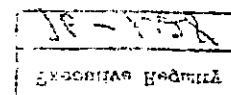

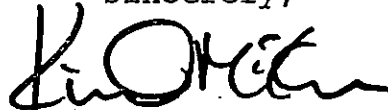

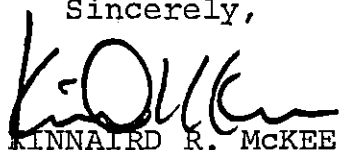
It is anticipated that, in addition to the midshipman participants, the Conference will be attended by student delegates from more than 130 colleges and universities throughout the United States.

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HISTORY OF NAFAC

The inspiration to hold a Naval Academy Foreign Affairs Conference (NAFAC) dates back to 1956 when Midshipman First Class James Sterling, together with Professor Rocco Paone, submitted a request to organize the conference. After five years of coordination and consultation, approval was finally given by the then Superintendent of the Naval Academy, Admiral John Davidson, to hold the first conference. After receiving an enthusiastic response from those first delegates in 1961, the decision was made to continue the conference on an annual basis. NAFAC has grown so that today between 110 and 120 colleges and universities located throughout the nation participate by sending delegates. This year 126 schools were invited to attend.

The topic for the conference has varied from year to year over the entire spectrum of political and international affairs. Disarmament, U.S. Economic Policies, National Security, U.S. Policy Toward Latin America, Strategy for Peace--Third World, and Strategy for Peace--Europe have been discussed at NAFAC. Speakers at the conference have been as varied as the topics themselves. Russell Train, Head of the EPA; Kenneth Rush, Deputy Secretary of State; Congressman Bradford Morse; and Congressman H. R. Gross have all delivered addresses at NAFAC. Other conference speakers have included John Kenneth Galbraith, noted economist; Victor Reuther, union leader; Walter Percy, Executive Vice President of Standard Oil; James Chace, editor of FOREIGN AFFAIRS; and Seantors Church, Tower and Muskie.

Over the years NAFAC, entirely funded from private sources, has received major support in procurement of funds from the U.S. Naval Academy Alumni Association and such private organizations as Ford Motor Company, Sarah Scaife Foundation, Standard Oil Company (now Exxon), General Foods, Marjorie Merriweather Post Foundation, Olmsted Foundation, Allegheny Ludlum and Litton Industries, among others. The U.S. Department of State, by supplying some of its top personnel for the conference, has also been instrumental in the success of NAFAC. With the help of these and other people and groups, NAFAC has served as an important forum for information and discussion about political science and international relations among American college students.



Welcome aboard to the sixteenth annual Naval Academy Foreign Affairs Conference. The theme of this year's Conference, STRATEGIES OF U.S. FOREIGN POLICY: THE NEW REALITIES, was selected to stimulate an exchange of thought concerning our foreign policy in a time when it is under as intense a scrutiny as it has ever been. The purpose of the Conference is to discuss the focus of U.S. foreign policy in view of the "new realities" of the international system.

In pursuance of this year's theme, the world has been divided into five geographic areas, and each geographic area into two round tables. One round table will be tasked with analyzing our foreign policy from an international perspective, and the other round table from a national overview. As a highlight to this separation of perspective between round tables, the sixth round table session is to be a merger of the two round tables to discuss differences and similarities, and perhaps even achieve a synthesis of the two outlooks. Presentations by a number of ambassadors to the United States, a panel discussion on our first evening, and the formal addresses of our keynote and banquet speakers will complement the work of the round tables.

While attending the Conference, you are encouraged to tour the Academy grounds and visit historic Annapolis. As much information as possible has been included in the program to answer your questions, but if you ever happen to find yourself lost among the "monuments and the cannon," please do not hesitate to ask anyone for help. I hope your stay here is a pleasant and rewarding one.

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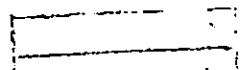
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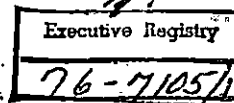
