JULY 23, 1976

LET ME TELL YOU SOMETHING OF THE MECHANISM THAT HAS BEEN CREATED BY THE U.S. GOVERNMENT TO GATHER AND PRODUCE INTELLIGENCE. AS YOU KNOW, IT WAS THE SECOND WORLD WAR -- AND SPECIFICALLY PEARL HARBOR -- WHICH FOCUSED AMERICAN ATTENTION ON THE NEED NOT JUST FOR INFORMATION, BUT FOR A UNIFIED, NATIONAL INTELLIGENCE SERVICE. BEFORE THE WAR, WE HAD WHAT COULD BE CALLED DEPARTMENTAL INTELLIGENCE. THE WAR DEPARTMENT HAD MILITARY INTELLIGENCE, THE NAVY DEPARTMENT HAD NAVAL INTELLIGENCE, AND SO ON.

BUT IN TODAY'S TERMINOLOGY, NO ONE WAS "GETTING IT TOGETHER." ALL OF THE INFORMATION THAT MIGHT HAVE LED AN ANALYST TO CONCLUDE THAT JAPAN INTENDED TO ATTACK PEARL HARBOR WAS AVAILABLE IN WASHINGTON. BUT IT WAS NOT IN ONE PLACE FOR AN ANALYST TO STUDY; IT WAS INSTEAD IN SEPARATE BITS AND PIECES CAREFULLY CONTROLLED BY EACH DEPARTMENT.

AFTER THE WAR, IT WAS CLEAR THAT AMERICA REQUIRED CONTINUING INTELLIGENCE ON DEVELOPMENTS AND TRENDS ABROAD AND THAT A CENTRAL ORGANIZATION WAS NEEDED TO ENSURE THAT WE HAD ALL OUR FACTS TOGETHER AND WOULD NEVER AGAIN BE CAUGHT BY SURPRISE.

IN 1947, PRESIDENT TRUMAN SIGNED INTO LAW THE NATIONAL SECURITY ACT WHICH CREATED THE CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY. THE AGENCY WAS INTENDED TO BE -- AND IS -- THE CENTRAL POINT FOR PRODUCING NATIONAL INTELLIGENCE, THAT IS, INTELLIGENCE PRODUCED TO SERVE NATIONAL POLICYMAKERS AND INTELLIGENCE OF INTEREST TO MORE THAN ONE DEPARTMENT OR AGENCY.

THE AGENCY WAS NOT INTENDED TO TAKE OVER THE VERY VALID FUNCTIONS OF THE VARIOUS DEPARTMENTAL INTELLIGENCE ORGANIZATIONS. THOSE ORGANIZATIONS EXIST TODAY AND ARE ESSENTIAL PARTS OF THE DEPARTMENTS AND AGENCIES THEY SERVE.

THE NATIONAL SECURITY ACT ALSO CREATED THE POSITION OF DIRECTOR OF CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE -- THE DCI. THE DCI IS THE NATION'S SENIOR FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE OFFICER AND THE PRESIDENT'S PRINCIPAL ADVISOR ON FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE. IT WAS INTENDED THAT THE DCI SHOULD WEAR TWO HATS: ONE AS DIRECTOR OF THE CIA AND THE OTHER AS HEAD OF THE INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY AS A WHOLE.

IN THE EARLIEST DAYS, THE DCI TENDED TO CONCENTRATE ON HIS ROLE AS HEAD OF THE CIA. BUT OVER THE YEARS, AS THE PROBLEMS WE FACED ABROAD GREW IN COMPLEXITY, SO, TOO, DID THE INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY. ~~PEOPLE AND RESOURCES IN ALL OF THE VARIOUS PARTS OF THE COMMUNITY INCREASED.~~

IN 1971, THE PRESIDENT INSTRUCTED THE DCI TO TAKE A MORE ACTIVE ROLE IN COORDINATING THE RESOURCES AND ACTIVITIES OF THE COMMUNITY. IN THE PAST FIVE YEARS WE HAVE MADE MAJOR STRIDES IN BUILDING A TRUE INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY -- WITH A CAPITAL I AND A CAPITAL C. THE COMMUNITY NOW CONSISTS OF THE CIA; THE DEFENSE INTELLIGENCE AGENCY; THE NATIONAL SECURITY AGENCY; AND THE INTELLIGENCE COMPONENTS OF THE MILITARY SERVICES, THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE, THE FBI, THE TREASURY DEPARTMENT, AND THE ENERGY RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION.

IN FEBRUARY, AS YOU PROBABLY REMEMBER, PRESIDENT FORD ISSUED AN EXECUTIVE ORDER THAT STRENGTHENED THE DCI'S ROLE AS THE LEADER OF THE NATION'S INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY. THAT ORDER ALSO DIRECTED NEW ORGANIZATIONAL ARRANGEMENTS TO STRENGTHEN THE DCI'S MANAGEMENT OF THE COMMUNITY.

~~THESE NEW ARRANGEMENTS HAVE MADE SOME VERY IMPORTANT~~
~~HAVE BEEN MADE~~ ^{SIGNIFICANT} CHANGES, AND I WOULD LIKE TO TAKE JUST A MINUTE TO OUTLINE SOME OF THEM. ~~I THINK~~ IT IS VERY IMPORTANT FOR YOU TO UNDERSTAND THESE RELATIONSHIPS IN ORDER TO SUPPORT THE MISSION OF YOUR INTELLIGENCE SERVICE AND TO REPOSE TRUST AND RELIANCE IN THE MANNER IN WHICH WE CONDUCT OURSELVES AND OUR BUSINESS.

A COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE, WHICH I CHAIR, HAS BEEN CREATED BY THE PRESIDENT. IT CONTROLS BUDGET PREPARATION AND RESOURCE APPLICATION FOR THE ENTIRE NATIONAL FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE PROGRAM. IT MANAGES OUR INTELLIGENCE ACTIVITIES AND ESTABLISHES POLICY FOR THE COLLECTION AND PRODUCTION OF NATIONAL INTELLIGENCE.

AN OPERATIONAL ADVISORY GROUP HAS BEEN ESTABLISHED TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE PRESIDENT CONCERNING SPECIAL INTELLIGENCE ACTIVITIES IN SUPPORT OF NATIONAL FOREIGN POLICY OBJECTIVES -- THAT IS, COVERT ACTION. THE GROUP ALSO REVIEWS AND APPROVES SENSITIVE INTELLIGENCE COLLECTION OPERATIONS. THE MEMBERS OF THIS BOARD INCLUDE THE ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT FOR NATIONAL SECURITY AFFAIRS, THE SECRETARIES OF STATE AND DEFENSE, THE CHAIRMAN OF THE JOINT CHIEFS OF STAFF, AND THE DIRECTOR OF CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE.

IN RESPONSE TO THE INVESTIGATIONS OF U.S. INTELLIGENCE ACTIVITIES CONDUCTED BY THE ROCKEFELLER COMMISSION AND BY THE SENATE AND HOUSE SELECT COMMITTEES, THE PRESIDENT ALSO HAS CREATED AN INTELLIGENCE OVERSIGHT BOARD OF THREE PROMINENT PRIVATE CITIZENS. THIS BOARD RECEIVES AND CONSIDERS REPORTS BY THE INSPECTORS GENERAL AND GENERAL COUNSELS OF THE INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY CONCERNING ANY ACTIVITIES THAT RAISE QUESTIONS OF LEGALITY OR PROPRIETY. IT IS THE BOARD'S RESPONSIBILITY TO ENSURE THAT THE ATTORNEY GENERAL AND THE PRESIDENT ARE PROPERLY ADVISED.

IN ORDER TO ENABLE ME TO DEVOTE MORE ATTENTION TO FORMULATING AND CARRYING OUT POLICIES FOR THE COMMUNITY, THE PRESIDENT ALSO HAS DIRECTED THAT I HAVE TWO DEPUTIES. ONE IS RESPONSIBLE TO ME FOR THE DAY-TO-DAY OPERATION OF THE CIA AND THE OTHER IS RESPONSIBLE TO ME FOR ACCOMPLISHING MY ROLE AS HEAD OF THE INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY. LEGISLATION TO ESTABLISH THESE POSITIONS WILL BE INTRODUCED IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

* * * * *

HAVING GIVEN YOU THE OUTLINE OF THE INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY AND OF ITS CONTROL MECHANISM, LET ME SPEAK VERY BRIEFLY ABOUT THE SPECIFIC ROLE OF THE CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY. THE CIA IS THE NATION'S RESOURCE FOR PRODUCING NATIONAL INTELLIGENCE. AND IT TRULY IS A NATIONAL RESOURCE -- OUR TRAINED, SKILLFUL, AND IMAGINATIVE ANALYSTS ARE A WEALTH BEYOND PRICE.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY PROVIDE US TODAY WITH MEANS OF COLLECTING INFORMATION THAT IS BEYOND THE WILDEST IMAGININGS OF EVEN A FEW YEARS AGO. YET DESPITE THE MIND-BOGGLING ADVANCES MADE IN THIS AREA, THERE IS STILL AN ESSENTIAL NEED FOR INFORMATION FROM PEOPLE. TRAINED AND EXPERIENCED PEOPLE ARE NECESSARY TO ACQUIRE INFORMATION THAT IS ONLY AVAILABLE THROUGH ACCESS TO KNOWLEDGEABLE FOREIGN OFFICIALS AND TO THE PLANS AND INTENTIONS OF FOREIGN GOVERNMENTS THAT MAY BE ADVERSE TO U.S. INTERESTS.

I AM A COMPARATIVE NEWCOMER TO THE INTELLIGENCE BUSINESS, BUT I HAVE BEEN IMMersed LONG ENOUGH TO HAVE NO HESITANCY IN SAYING TO YOU THAT THE CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY IS AN ORGANIZATION OF WHICH THE ENTIRE NATION CAN BE PROUD.

* * * * *

ON MY WAY HERE TODAY, I WAS REMINDED OF SOMETHING THAT WAS WRITTEN BY JOHN BUCHAN IN 1940, A TIME OF DESCENDING DARKNESS ON EUROPE AND THE FREE WORLD, WHEN GREAT BRITAIN STOOD VIRTUALLY ALONE AGAINST THE SEEMINGLY IRRESISTIBLE ENEMY. JOHN BUCHAN, AS YOU REMEMBER, IS THE FAMILY NAME OF LORD TWEEDSMUIR, THEN GOVERNOR GENERAL OF CANADA AND ALSO AUTHOR OF SOME NOW CLASSIC TALES OF ESPIONAGE AND ADVENTURE. JOHN BUCHAN WROTE THEN:

"THE UNITED STATES IS THE RICHEST, AND, BOTH ACTUALLY AND POTENTIALLY, THE MOST POWERFUL STATE ON THE GLOBE. SHE HAS MUCH, I BELIEVE, TO GIVE TO THE WORLD; INDEED, TO HER HANDS IS CHIEFLY ENTRUSTED THE SHAPING OF THE FUTURE. IF DEMOCRACY IN THE BROADEST AND TRUEST SENSE IS TO SURVIVE, IT WILL BE MAINLY BECAUSE OF HER GUARDIANSHIP. FOR, WITH ALL HER IMPERFECTIONS, SHE HAS A CLEARER VIEW THAN ANY OTHER PEOPLE OF THE DEMOCRATIC FUNDAMENTALS."

THAT WAS WRITTEN IN 1940, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, AND SURELY IT IS AS TRUE TODAY AS IT WAS THEN. TO BE SURE, MANY THINGS HAVE CHANGED, LARGELY BECAUSE OF THE WAY THAT

WE DID DISCHARGE OUR RESPONSIBILITIES AFTER WORLD WAR II. LARGELY BECAUSE OF OUR OWN POLICIES AND ACTIONS, "WE ARE NO LONGER IN THE POSITION OF FOOD SUPPLIER TO THE FREE WORLD; WE ARE NO LONGER IN THE POSITION OF THE REBUILDER AND SUPPORTER OF WAR-SHATTERED ECONOMIES OF THE WORLD; AND, LARGELY BECAUSE OF THE SUCCESS OF OUR POLICIES, WE HAVE RELINQUISHED WHAT TOLERANCE WE HAD FOR BEING THE WORLD'S POLICEMAN.

BUT THE WORLD IS NOT YET SUCH AS WE WOULD WANT IT TO BE. MAYBE IT NEVER WILL BE. IT CERTAINLY IS NOT LIKELY TO BECOME A UTOPIAN WORLD WITHIN OUR LIFETIME OR EVEN IN THE FORESEEABLE FUTURE. AND WHILE WE ARE STRIVING TO MAKE OUR CONTRIBUTION TO A WORLD OF PEACE AND SECURITY AND TRUST, WE FIND THAT WE STILL NEED -- QUITE CONSISTENT WITH THIS STRIVING -- TO HAVE NATIONAL SECURITY SECOND TO NONE IN THE WORLD.

IN PEACE, PRESIDENT FORD HAS SAID, THERE IS NO SUBSTITUTE FOR INTELLIGENCE. IN ORDER TO PROTECT THE COUNTRY THAT WE LOVE AND THE SYSTEM OF FREEDOM IN WHICH WE BELIEVE, WE MUST ABOVE ALL HAVE KNOWLEDGE. KNOWLEDGE OF WHAT THE INTENTIONS ARE OF THOSE THAT WOULD WISH US HARM, KNOWLEDGE OF WHAT POTENTIAL FOR DOING US HARM THEY MAY POSSESS. WE NEED THAT KNOWLEDGE TO PROVIDE IT TO THOSE WHO MAKE POLICY FOR OUR NATION SO THAT WE MAY BE PREPARED WITH POLICIES AND ACTIONS OF OUR OWN, AND SO THAT WE MAY ADOPT POLICIES AND ACTIONS THAT PROTECT AND PROMOTE OUR

NATIONAL INTERESTS WITHIN THE FRAMEWORK OF PEACE AND SECURITY, AND, HOPEFULLY, TRUST. FOR THE ONLY ALTERNATIVE TO ACTING ON THE BASIS OF KNOWLEDGE IS ACTING ON THE BASIS OF IGNORANCE AND THAT IS NOT WHAT WE WISH FOR OURSELVES, EITHER IN OUR PRIVATE LIVES OR IN OUR INTERNATIONAL DEALINGS.

THE ONE ELEMENT OF THE PROFESSION OF INTELLIGENCE, THAT ESSENTIAL COMPONENT OF NATIONAL SECURITY AND FOREIGN RELATIONS, THAT HAS TROUBLED US AS CITIZENS OF A FREE NATION IS THE NECESSARY -- ^{WHAT WE DO} INDEED, ESSENTIAL -- ELEMENT OF SECRECY THAT IS INHERENT IN ~~OUR PROFESSION~~. IT IS NO WONDER THAT EVEN THE VERY FACT OF SECRECY TENDS TO STIMULATE SUSPICION AND GIVE AN AURA OF SENSATIONALISM, AND THEREFORE OFTEN AN ENTIRELY ERRONEOUS PERSPECTIVE TO VARIOUS DISCLOSURES AND FINDINGS, OCCASIONALLY, IF I MAY SAY SO, WITHOUT DUE REGARD FOR THE AMOUNT AND QUALITY OF EVIDENCE.

IF SECRECY IS ESSENTIAL, SO TOO, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, ^(??) IS ACCOUNTABILITY. NO ACTIVITY OF OUR GOVERNMENT MAY BE CONDUCTED WITHOUT BEING SUBJECTED TO A RELIABLE AND RESPONSIBLE SYSTEM OF CHECKS AND BALANCES. BUT, ~~MY FRIENDS~~, ACCOUNTABILITY IS ONE THING; RECKLESSNESS IS ANOTHER. IT IS NOT THOSE WHO DISCLOSE THE NAMES OF OUR INTELLIGENCE OFFICERS SERVING ABROAD THAT ADD TO THE SECURITY OF A FREE SOCIETY. IT IS NOT THOSE WHO BELIEVE THEY CAN ON THEIR OWN JUDGMENT DISCLOSE INFORMATION WHICH HAS BEEN CLASSIFIED IN THE INTERESTS OF OUR SECURITY THAT CONTRIBUTE TO THE

RESPONSIVENESS OF GOVERNMENT TO THE PEOPLE. AND IT IS NOT THOSE WHO DETERMINEDLY DENY THE GOOD WILL AND RESPONSIBILITY OF PEOPLE IN AND OUT OF GOVERNMENT BY DWELLING ON ABUSES OF THE PAST THAT ENHANCE THE MECHANISM OF ACCOUNTABILITY WHICH THIS FREE SOCIETY HAS CREATED FOR THE CONTROL OF LEGITIMATELY SECRET GOVERNMENT RESPONSIBILITIES.

THE GREAT MAJORITY OF US, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, HAVE FAITH IN THE STRENGTH AND EFFECTIVENESS OF OUR DEMOCRATIC INSTITUTIONS, FOR WHILE DEMOCRATIC INSTITUTIONS MAY BE USED TO SOW SEEDS OF WEAKNESS AND DISTRUST, THEY EXIST IN ORDER TO MAKE US STRONG AND SELF-RELIANT, AND THEY HAVE PROVED THEIR EFFECTIVENESS IN THE 200 YEARS OF OUR HISTORY.

* * * * *

YOU ALL KNOW SOME OF THE PROBLEMS I FACE IN THIS JOB. I WISH YOU COULD ALSO SHARE IN THE PRIDE I FEEL FOR OUR INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY AND THE COMFORT I GET, AS AN AMERICAN, IN SEEING THE TREMENDOUS TALENT WE HAVE IN THE CIA AND ACROSS THE WHOLE COMMUNITY.

I WISH YOU COULD TALK TO SOME OF OUR EMPLOYEES WHOSE HEADS ARE HIGH AFTER A COUPLE OF YEARS OF VICIOUS BATTERING. THEY ARE AS VIGOROUSLY OPPOSED TO THE MISTAKES OF THE PAST AS OUR STRONGEST CRITICS, BUT THEY HAVE RETAINED A PERSPECTIVE. THEY KNOW THE NEED FOR A STRONG INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY, AND THEY ARE PREPARED TO WITHSTAND THE BATTERING, IF THAT IS NECESSARY, TO WORK FOR A CAUSE THEY BELIEVE IN.

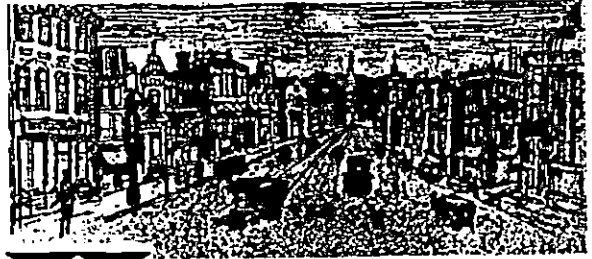

History

At the turn of the century a San Francisco newspaperman, Edward F. Adams, believed our state needed a citizens' group to study public questions impartially and to publish reports, giving *all* sides of the issues, with the Club's recommendation. When a University of California president, a future Supreme Court Justice, a newspaper editor and a State College president joined him at the 1903 founding meeting, he knew the Club was on its way. A few years later the famous Friday forum feature of the Club—presenting distinguished speakers of a wide diversity of viewpoints—was established. Adams' basic ideas are still followed.

membership

Membership of the Commonwealth Club of California is concentrated in California, but there are members in all parts of the world. The primary qualification is that an applicant be a good citizen, concerned with matters of importance to the state, the nation, and the world; and recognized as such by his peers.

Headquarters are in San Francisco and the majority of members live in the San Francisco Bay Region. Some 40% live in other parts of the world.

The dues structure reflects the fact that those at a distance are usually not able to participate as fully as those who live closer to San Francisco. There is a lower rate for members living more than 40 miles from San Francisco, as well as a special rate for those through 29 years of age.

activities

New ways of carrying out Founder Adams' basic ideas have been added to the Club's activities from time to time. But the Club still relies primarily on its Sections which study public questions, its Friday forums where the viewpoints of men of national stature are aired, and its research projects which "get the facts" on long-term fundamental issues. The published results of these activities are available to all members. There are also 3 language classes and foreign study tours designed to

supplement the work of the Club's Study Sections.

friday speakers

Some four thousand speakers, many of international renown have addressed the world-recognized Friday meetings of the Commonwealth Club of California. Scientists, statesmen—nearly all the Presidents of the United States since 1903—educators, religious leaders, military chiefs, labor officials have brought their messages, uncensored, to the Club's audiences. Many heads of state have also been included.

People from all walks of life and points of view have spoken—those with the capes of a dozen honored degrees and those of no wide renown but with a significant message.

Even in the face of public opposition, the Club has maintained the position that it has the right to have speakers representing controversial points of view. Some of these speakers have included Sgt. Ben Kuroki, whose Commonwealth Club speech in the midst of World War II has been judged the most important factor in the peaceful return to this Coast of interned Americans of Japanese descent.

The Club is also unique, in that during Presidential election years, the membership has the opportunity to see and hear virtually every major Presidential candidate.



study sections

Unduplicated anywhere are the Study Sections of the Commonwealth Club of California—nineteen individual "clubs within the Club," each dedicated to finding the facts in an important field of public concern. The unique nature of the Study Sections is that they always insist on *all sides*—always demand both the affirmative and the negative of any proposal and always include in their final report on any subject of study a summary of the most important arguments.

In the process the Club's Study Sections hear from the experts, from people in and out of government who know the most about a given issue. So, even to the member who can

attend only occasionally, Section talks are a significantly rewarding experience.

And when the experts appear before Study Sections they find many experts within their audience, for the Club's membership includes an unusually high percentage of California leaders—of men and women who know—and the Sections provide a place where laymen and expert meet together and where each may frequently enlighten the other.

The diversity of Study Sections is illustrated by the titles of a few of them: Administration of Justice; Agriculture; Business Economics; Environment & Energy; Governmental Finance; Transportation; International Rela-



tions; Local & Regional Government; Urban Affairs; Water; the complete list appears elsewhere.

When a Section has heard "all sides" on an issue, a report is prepared, the information summarized pro and con, a vote taken by secret mail ballot on the most important aspects of the question. The report is then presented to a general meeting of the Club—with further discussion from all sides invited. The comments of the meeting are condensed and published, along with the complete report, and mailed to every member.

Characteristic of the Commonwealth Club is this secret mail ballot. It is the device whereby a Section determines its study topic, agrees upon its conclusions, and it is also used by the Club's membership as a whole to decide whether a Section's conclusions shall be the official recommendations of Commonwealth Club of California's membership. It is a precept of the Club that all these steps are taken on the basis of full information, pro and con, distributed to every member voting.

ballot issues

In even-numbered years, California voters are normally faced with from 15 to 20 state constitutional amendments, initiative acts, and referenda. For over half a century, one of the most sought after voting aids has been the compilation of reports and recommendations

by the Club's Study Sections, with the official vote of the entire Club membership. The Sections hear leading pro and con spokesmen and their reports contain the essential arguments on both sides, as well as the Section's recommendations. The Commonwealth Club Reports on state ballot measures are generally considered the most authoritative information available.

research & education



A fund named Fund for the Commonwealth is maintained by the Club.

One of the main functions of this fund has been to conduct research on important state and national problems. Some of the subjects researched with Commonwealth

Club financing have been the Legislature of California, Compulsory Automobile Liability Insurance, the Population of California, California Social Welfare, "The Powers of the President in Foreign Affairs," and the recently published report "Land Use, Open Space and the Government Process."

Extreme care is given to selection of a topic for research. A special committee of the Club's Board of Governors is appointed and, with the assistance of scholars, surveys the field. When the topic is determined, a research director is selected and a preliminary study made before the final study is undertaken. The work is always done by professional research people. The results have been widely influential in bringing about a better understanding of the important problems examined.

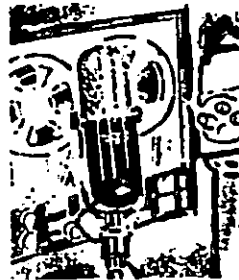
This Fund is also utilized to extend the range of the radio broadcasts of the Club's Friday speakers' talks.

the weekly commonwealth

To many members, one of the most valuable services the Club offers (particularly to those unable to attend meetings very often) is *The Commonwealth* — a news-letter carrying every week, in highlight form, the essence of the message of the preceding Friday's speaker and answers to the more probing audience questions; also the most significant and instructive of the many talks before the Club's

Study Sections. *The Commonwealth* also advises members of forthcoming speakers at both the general meetings and the Sections, and other information of importance.

radio network



The Friday talks of the Commonwealth Club are brought to listeners throughout 43 states, plus the District of Columbia; in addition they are heard overseas on the Voice of America. These stations carry the talks every week as a public service. National Public Radio has the largest number of radio stations — approximately 135. The Club also has a regular radio station network in eleven western states of over 100 radio stations. All of the stations advise their listeners of the availability of free talk condensations published in *The Commonwealth*. Requests for these have come from every state in the Union.

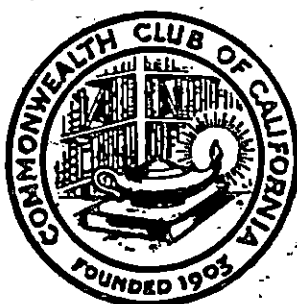
accomplishments

The Club's influence has been felt largely via its Reports, as the Club does not engage in legislative activity. Copies of the important Reports, with their pro and con analyses, are sent to Congressmen and Legislators for their information. Commonwealth Club studies and analyses have covered such problems as:

- Establishment of the office of Public Defender.
- The State Judicial Council to unify the State's courts.
- The sponsor system of candidate nomination.
- Permanent voter registration.
- Permanent civilian defense and disaster preparedness statutes.
- Voters' pamphlet on ballot measures.
- General revision of Code of Criminal Procedure.
- Convenient voting hours law.
- Election of non-partisan officers receiving primary majority.
- Examination, before licensing automobile drivers.
- Absentee Voters Law.
- Regional government for San Francisco Bay Area.
- Rapid transit.
- Solid waste disposal methods.
- Regulation of the quality of public waters.
- Insurance for natural disasters.

library

The Club's Library is maintained as part of the headquarters in the Monadnock Arcade, 681 Market Street. It includes 5,000 volumes largely concerned with those matters which the Club has studied through its Sections, such as subjects relating to state and local government. There is a fine quick reference shelf, an excellent news and periodical index, and one of the best collections of current biography in the area. Also included are many works by California authors, accumulated as entries in the Club's annual California literature contest.



club transactions

The reports of the Study Sections of the Commonwealth Club of California, are frequently in demand by scholars and government officials seeking to find the background of a piece of legislation, for often these are the only published materials on important California issues. The bound volumes of the Club's Reports since 1903, and those of Study Section minutes since 1924, are available to members in the Club Reading Room. A microfilm edition of the Club's publications is also available through University Microfilms of Ann Arbor, Michigan.

literature awards

One of the highlights of the year is the Literature Awards—the Club's gold and silver literature medals are presented to those California authors whose books published the preceding year are deemed "most worthy." The awards are preceded by a series of selection sessions by the Club's Literature Award Jury, made up of some of the State's foremost literateurs. In over four decades, the Commonwealth Club book contest has become recognized as one of the outstanding regional literary awards.

the board of governors and elected officers

Responsible for continuing the Club's tradition of service to state and nation, and for conducting the Club's affairs, are the members of the Board of Governors. They are selected from the membership based upon service to the Club and recognition in the community. A nominating committee consisting of the five immediate past presidents proposes the candidates, and election is by secret mail ballot of the entire Club. The Club's Executive Committee, selected from the Board, deals more closely with Section problems and financial matters. The President is chief executive officer.

distinguished speakers

Since our 1903 founding most U.S. Presidents have addressed our membership. All California Governors from Pardee to Brown have accepted invitations to speak to the Commonwealth Club of California.

"President Created Intelligence Oversight Board In Response to Recent CIA Inquiries," says Bush

FRIDAY FLASHES — JULY 23rd

From Address by

THE HONORABLE GEORGE BUSH,
Director, CIA

"Let me tell you something of the mechanism that has been created by the U.S. government to gather and produce intelligence. As you know, it was World War II—and specifically Pearl Harbor—which focused American attention on the need not just for information, but for a unified, national intelligence service. Before the war, we had what could be called departmental intelligence. The War Department had military intelligence, the Navy Department had naval intelligence and so on.

Warning for Pearl Harbor?

But in today's terminology, no one was 'getting it together.' All of the information that might have led an analyst to conclude that Japan intended to attack Pearl Harbor was available in Washington however, it was not in one place for an analyst to study; it was instead in separate bits and pieces carefully controlled by each department.

After the war, it was clear that America required continuing intelligence on developments and trends abroad and that a central organization was needed to ensure that we had all our facts together and would never again be caught by surprise.

In 1947, President Truman signed into law the National Security Act which created the Central Intelligence Agency. The Agency was intended to be—and is—the central point for producing national intelligence, that is, intelligence produced to serve national policymakers and intelligence of interest to more than one department or agency.

DCI Wears Two Hats

The National Security Act also created the position of Director of Central Intelligence—the DCI. The DCI is the nation's senior foreign intelligence officer and the President's principal advisor on foreign intelligence. It was intended that the DCI wear two hats: one as Director of the CIA and the other as head of the intelligence community as a whole.

In 1971, the President instructed the DCI to take a more active role in coordinating the resources and activities of the community. In the past five years we have made major strides in building a true intelligence community. The community now consists of the CIA; the Defense Intelligence Agency; the National Security Agency; and the intelligence components of the military services, the Department of State, the FBI, the Treasury Department, and the Energy Research and Development Administration.

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"Secrecy and Accountability: Essential Components Of National Security and Foreign Relations in U.S."

In February, as you probably remember, President Ford issued an Executive Order that strengthened the DCI's role as the leader of the nation's intelligence community. That order also directed new organizational arrangements to strengthen the DCI's management of the community.

These new arrangements have made some very important changes, and I would like to take just a minute to outline some of them. I think it is very important for you to understand these relationships in order to support the mission of your intelligence service and to repose trust and reliance in the manner in which we conduct ourselves and our business.

A Committee on Foreign Intelligence, which I chair, has been created by the President. It controls budget preparation and resource application for the entire national foreign intelligence program. It manages our intelligence activities and establishes policy for the collection and production of national intelligence.

Covert Action Reviewed

An Operational Advisory Group has been established to make recommendations to the President concerning special intelligence activities in support of national foreign policy objectives—that is, covert action. The group also reviews and approves sensitive intelligence collection operations. The members of this board include the Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs, the Secretaries of State and Defense, the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and the Director of Central Intelligence.

In response to the investigations of U.S. intelligence activities conducted by the Rockefeller Commission and by the Senate and House Select Committees, the President has created an Intelligence Oversight Board of three prominent private citizens. This Board receives and considers reports by the inspectors general and general counsels of the intelligence community concerning any activities that raise questions of legality or propriety. It is the Board's responsibility to ensure that the Attorney General and the President are properly advised.

In order to enable me to devote more attention to formulating and carrying out policies for the community, the President also has directed that I have two deputies. One is responsible to me for the day-to-day operation of the CIA and the other is responsible to me for accomplishing my role as head of the intelligence community. Legislation to establish these positions will be introduced in the near future.

Role of CIA

Having given you the outline of the intelligence community and of its control mechanism, let me speak very briefly about the specific role of the Central Intelligence Agency. The CIA is the nation's resource for producing national intelligence.

Science and technology provide us today with means of collecting information that is beyond the wildest imaginings of even a few years ago. Yet despite the mind-boggling advances made in this area, there is still an essential need for information from people. Trained and experienced people are necessary to acquire information that is only available through access to knowledgeable foreign officials and to the intentions of foreign governments that may be adverse to U.S. interests.

National Security Essential

I am a comparative newcomer to the intelligence business, but I have been immersed long enough to have no hesitancy in saying that the Central Intelligence Agency is an organization of which the entire nation can be proud.

The world is not yet such as we would want it to be. Maybe it never will be. It certainly is not likely to become a utopian world within our lifetime or even in the foreseeable future. And while we are striving to make our contribution to a world of peace and security and trust, we find that we still need—quite consistent with this striving—to have national security second to none in the world.

The one element of the profession of intelligence, that essential component of national security and foreign relations, that has troubled us as citizens of a free

nation is the necessary element of secrecy that is inherent in our profession. It is no wonder that even the very fact of secrecy tends to stimulate suspicion and give an aura of sensationalism, and therefore often an entirely erroneous perspective to various disclosures and findings, occasionally, if I may say so, without due regard for the amount and quality of evidence.

Recklessness Threatens Security

If secrecy is essential, so too is accountability. No activity of our government may be conducted without being subjected to a reliable and responsible system of checks and balances. But, accountability is one thing; recklessness is another. It is not those who disclose the names of our intelligence officer serving abroad that add to the security of a free society. It is not those who believe they can on their own judgment disclose information which has been classified in the interests of our security that contribute to the responsiveness of government to the people. And it is not those who determinedly deny the good will and responsibility of people in and out of government by dwelling on abuses of the past that enhance the mechanism of accountability which this free society has created for the control of legitimately secret government responsibilities.

Seeds of Strength

The great majority of us have faith in the strength and effectiveness of our democratic institutions, for while democratic institutions may be used to sow seeds of weakness and distrust, they exist in order to make us strong and self-reliant.

You all know some of the problems I face in this job. I wish you could also share in the pride I feel for our intelligence community and the comfort I get, as an American, in seeing the tremendous talent we have in the CIA and across the whole community.

I wish you could talk to some of our employees whose heads are high after a couple of years of vicious battering. They are as vigorously opposed to the mistakes of the past as our strongest critics, but

they have retained a perspective. They know the need for a strong intelligence community, and they are prepared to withstand the battering, if that is necessary, to work for a cause they believe in.

Reassurance and Pride

I wish you could have met the son of Richard Welch, who was gunned down following disclosure of his name by people bent on destroying the CIA. This young man knew well that his father had died for a cause in which he deeply believed.

And I hope that increasingly also you will draw reassurance and pride from the manner in which the intelligence community not only responds to the direction of the elected chief executive but also is accountable to the elected representatives in Congress.

I believe that America's intelligence service is a great national asset. We are working hard to make it even better. Your understanding, support and trust are essential for our success." (JMR)

Answers to Written Questions from Floor:

Q: Why aren't recent Congressional disclosures and leaks treated as violations of the Federal Espionage Statutes? A: Federal Espionage Statutes don't cover them. New legislation is required to tighten up on this problem. Before Congress now are laws aimed at those who leak information rather than receive it.

Q: Who should control secrecy in the national defense? A: Director of CIA is charged under law with protection of sources and methods of intelligence. Various departments also have internal regulations governing classification and secrecy.

Q: Is Director informed of all CIA activities? Is it true that Congress has no knowledge of funds expended by CIA? A: Director had better be informed! As in any management position, there are certain things you stay informed on and certain things you don't. After all, it's a big operation. The question, to me, has connotation of are you sure you know what's going on in terms of activities that may be illegal? I hope that I do. There is machinery for oversight that will hopefully guarantee that I do. And, as to second part of question, Congress does have knowledge of CIA's expenditures.

Q: Have Congress and press destroyed CIA's effectiveness by too much publicity? A: There has been excessive publicity as it is popular to expose and blame CIA. It has

complicated the lives of our people. I was a member of Congress and I respect their inquiries as they were in accordance with our Constitution. Some sources abroad and some officials abroad have held back, but it is a manageable situation. It will vanish with proper management.

Q: Under present laws, whose responsibility is it to uncover a hypothetical Congressman engaged in both foreign and domestic subversive activities against the U.S.? **A:** What is this hypothetical Congressman's name? It would be responsibility of FBI.

Q: What should be done to control Jack Anderson's release of sensitive confidential information? **A:** I don't know what can be done within our Constitution. We don't need official Secrecy Act but do need some controls over abuse of security.

Q: Could U.S. intelligence community mount and execute successfully a deliverance of hijacked hostages such as Israel did recently? **A:** We have important role to furnish such information but we are not in the position to perform such a rescue. One of our top priority concerns is increasing use of terrorist activity for political motives.

Q: Although the U.S. seems publicly to have washed its hands of Lebanon, the CIA must be watching closely: what is the current U.S. overview of the situation? **A:** I don't accept premise that U.S. has washed its hands. As for myself, I am terribly concerned for Lebanon. I know that is also the view of U.S. policymakers. The crisis there involves complicated cross-currents—Christians, USSR, PLO, etc. (JMR)
