Dear Ambassador Bush:

I hope that you are feeling better and that whatever was ailing you has ceased to be. The weather in Peking should be warming up and that should also improve things generally. I suppose it is cold and windy there in the winter, perhaps somewhat similar to the weather in the Texas panhandle in winter.

Although you may get a U. S. newspaper on a regular basis by courier, I have, nevertheless, enclosed a couple of commentaries which may interest you. Evans and Novak tend to be overly dramatic and I take their remarks with a bit of skepticism. I find, however, that David Broder tends to be fairly perceptive and generally more accurate.

President Ford is battling hard to keep the Congress from passing too many bills to provide big tax cuts and spend huge sums on public works and public service jobs as the recession continues. Now that the Senate can cut off a filibuster with 60 votes instead of 67, it will be easier to override a Presidential veto in the Senate.

Mr. John Rhodes should be able to give you more explicit details when he visits you during the Easter holidays.

The United States requires so much oil and natural gas to keep its economy going that when the price for oil and gas goes up as much as it has, the economy goes down. Motor vehicle sales are way down. The housing industry is very slow; particularly the home building part of it. These two industries have terrific side effects whenever they go up or down.

You can see the sharp contrast between the United States economy and the China economy. It doesn't take as much oil to run China because most people ride bikes and buses or walk. It's not as convenient as having one's own car, but then again, it is not as extravagant. The United States imported 37% of its oil last year and estimates it may import as much as 50% by 1980 if we don't impose a program to reduce the use of oil. Commuters continue to drive into the District of Columbia in gas guzzlers - one to a car.

Again, I hope you are well. All best wishes and warmest regards.

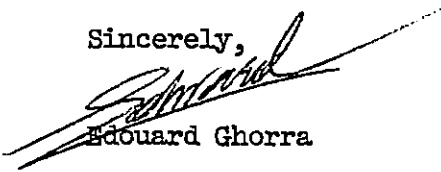

Dear Mr. Gibble:

I would love to be of some help to you with information about our little church in Peking. The congregation present on the day you attended was about par for the course. Unfortunately, very few people in the diplomatic community avail themselves of the opportunity of worshipping there. I will try to engage Pastor Yin in conversation from time to time and if I get information about him I will be delighted to pass it along to you. My only regret is that you did not get a chance to chat with him and the other pastors.

There is very little Christian community in Peking that we know of, or certainly that we see. This little service is tolerated by the system, and we are very pleased about that, but the participation is infinitesimal. I see no harm in your writing Pastor Yin, but it might well turn out that he will not feel free to write you back.

I am inclined to feel that books sent by you to him would be received by him, although there is no guarantee of this.

I am sorry this is so sketchy, but it is a subject about which very little is known in the diplomatic community.

Dear Mr. Bush:

My wife and I had the privilege of visiting the People's Republic of China for three weeks in June. Since I am an ordained minister I was interested in religious practice and freedom in the People's Republic of China and inquired of our Luxingshe guides regarding attending religious services or conversations with religious leaders in every town or city where we happened to be each Sunday. We received no satisfaction other than in Peking where we did participate in the service at the Rice Market Street Church. We happened to be at the service on June 29 when your daughter was baptised and had a few minutes to talk with you following the service and it is that conversation I would like to pursue further by correspondence.

As you may recall, I told you on that occasion that Pastor Yin received some of his education in one of the twenty-six schools my denomination helped establish and support in Shansi Province previous to liberation. He was also the son of the first Chinese minister ordained by the Christian community which emerged from the mission established by my church in Shansi. I was very eager to have time to talk with Pastor Yin but we were told by our interpreters that we needed to leave promptly even though we had been promised that the questions we had drafted in advance would be given to the pastor or pastors and that we would have time for conversations after the service. (Our request for conversations with representatives of the Three Self Movement, the Religious Affairs Committee and lay Christians were denied.)

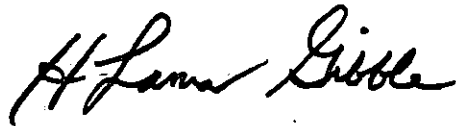
Since our time was so short with Pastor Yin following the service and since you mentioned in our conversations that "This is such a fine little church," I am eager to learn more about your experience with and evaluation of the Christian community in Peking. I would appreciate knowing your observations and impressions about religious freedom, the numbers participating in the life of the religious community, the services provided to parishoners by the church and the pastors, the source of support for the church's program and its pastors, and whether or not there are contacts with other Christians in China and outside. I would also be interested in your assessment of whether or not it would be advisable to continue correspondence with Pastor Yin and if he might be allowed to receive some of the newer theological volumes if I were to send them to him.

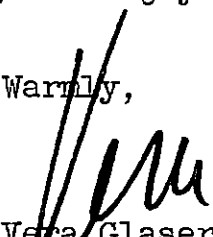

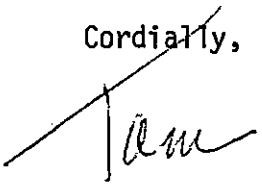

Dear George:

In response to your request of July 25 for information on treating paraffin in oil wells, I am enclosing a brief description of current practices in the U.S. prepared by one of our production chemistry specialists, an excerpt on paraffin from CONOCO training material, and some related commercial literature on chemicals. I must warn you that treating paraffin problems is really an art, not a science. "Paraffin problem" is used in reference to a whole array of organic solidification problems that arise from many different chemistry mechanisms. Providing solutions or comments on "paraffin problems" without knowing all the details may sometimes create more problems than they solve.

The enclosed comments and literature are based on the assumption that your request concerned only paraffin problems that do not involve asphaltenes. It is also assumed that the paraffin problems are naturally occurring and are not created by some system design inadequacy.

The U.S. petroleum industry also finds the paraffin problem very costly. If some "cure all" for paraffin deposition could be discovered, the industry could save millions of dollars in operating expense and lost production each year. In view of the complex chemistry involved, however, this seems unlikely.

Treating Paraffin in Oil Wells in the United States

There are two approaches to the problem of eliminating paraffin accumulation in oil wells:

- 1) Periodic removal after the paraffin has formed.
- 2) Preventing paraffin depositions.

Of these two, the first one is by far the most successful and most frequently used approach. Preventing paraffin deposition is highly desirable but is usually difficult or impossible to do. Finding ways to prevent paraffin deposition has been the most active research approach to treating oil well paraffin problems.

Paraffin deposition usually occurs in the 1800 to 2000 feet interval below the surface. Rarely is it deposited below 2000 feet. Removing paraffin from oil wells is usually done by one of two methods:

- 1) "hot oiling"
- 2) scraping

"Hot oiling" is commonly used on shallow (less than 3-4,000 feet) wells which do not contain a packer. Crude oil or some other suitable liquid is carried to the well site in a tank truck which also carries a portable heater. The oil is pumped through the heater then down the annulus of the oil well and back up the tubing to the surface. There are many arguments about how this method works; however, the hot oil flowing down the exterior of the production tubing probably promotes loosening of the paraffin deposit by melting and/or redissolving the paraffin which is then swept from the well by the flowing stream.

Scraping, usually with scrapers attached to the rods on a pumping well or with wireline tools on a flowing well, is used on wells which have a packer which isolates the annulus from the interior of the production tubing. In this method paraffin deposits are mechanically scraped from the tubing while the well is flowing or pumping and the produced fluids carry the loosened deposits from the well. Sometimes a small amount of solvent containing a detergent is pumped into a well prior to scraping with a wireline scraper. This helps to loosen and soften the paraffin.

Solvent or chemicals are almost never used to prevent or remove paraffin except as an aid to one of the methods mentioned above. Solvent by itself acts too slowly and too large a volume is required for it to be economical.

Prevention of paraffin deposits is attempted through the use of:

- 1) inhibitors (paraffin crystal modifiers that prevent growth or surface active materials that promote a weak bond to the deposition surface),
- 2) coatings (usually plastic which either insulate against heat loss and/or form a weak bond with deposited paraffin),

- 3) heat insulation practices (filling the annulus with an insulating material).

The only one of these categories which has any wide applicability is the use of inhibitors. Paraffin inhibitors must be present in the depositing liquid at all times. Therefore, inhibitors are either pumped continuously through a special treating string or are "squeezed" into the formation periodically where they adsorb on the formation and continuously feed a small amount of chemical back into the produced stream. The enclosed literature describes inhibitors available from several U.S. companies. This literature is presented to show the type of products currently available in the United States. The state of the paraffin inhibitor art is such that inhibitors generally have a very low effectiveness except in very special circumstances. We would not recommend the use of any of these inhibitors without a careful study of the particular application by an experienced production chemist.

The above comments assume that the paraffin problem has not been caused by poor system design, such as a pressure drop or flow restrictions that lead to unnecessary cooling. It is also assumed that the paraffin problems do not involve asphaltenes. Asphaltenes are another type of organic deposit which results from destabilization of heavy, dispersed compounds in some crude oils. When they occur, it is not uncommon for asphaltenes to be found at the wellbore face in the bottom of an oil well.

There is one other thought: Cooks Tours in London puts together periodic trips to China. Americans are accepted for such trips, and I suggest Mr. Rouse contact them. I hate to be less than helpful on any request you make.

Incidentally, a friend of mine returning from Daching oil fields told me that the responsible member there came up to him and told him to thank me for all the information we sent him on paraffin. Apparently, the material you sent through me did get there.

We will miss China, but the challenge of the new assignment is enormous.

Dear William:

I've just returned from a trip to Pakistan and Washington which left me in the hospital for much of my stay in the U.S. Please forgive the delay in answering your letter of January 21 on the question of the Smithsonian's filming pandas in the wild in China.

Although your project sounds like a great idea and would be a tremendous contribution to bringing more information about this unique animal to the American public, I am afraid I can't offer to much encouragement that you will be able to bring it to fruition in the near future. As I understand it, the native habitat of the panda is the forests of Szechwan. These remote areas are difficult to reach in the best of conditions and they are particularly sensitive areas for the Chinese. No foreigners have been permitted to travel in Szechwan except for carefully guided tours to major cities in the area.

On the other hand, I don't think it would do you any harm to register your interest in the form of a letter to the People's Republic of China Liaison Office in Washington. Since, as I say, there is little likelihood of such a trip being arranged, you might also express an interest in any films which the Chinese may have made on this subject and which might be available for sale or for use in a less ambitious production in the U.S.

When Dillon is here I will see if we can find a way to raise the question on this end. As a rule the PRC much prefers to have these matters handled through the PRC Liaison Office.

All's well here. Bar is fine and we are thoroughly enjoying our new life.

Dear George:

Let me preface my letter with a few remarks about your appearance and Barbara's on TV several weeks ago which Winnie and I enjoyed very much. You both looked so well and so natural we might have been talking to you in your living room in Houston instead of half-way round the earth. It was very reassuring to us both.

The purpose of my letter is to ask if you will use your good offices to encourage the China International Travel Service, called LUXINGSHE, in Peking, to grant permission for a group of American members of SERVAS, including the Greacens, to visit the Peoples Republic of China.

SERVAS is an international volunteer organization to which Winnie and I have belonged for seventeen years. Under its auspices we have entertained in our home well over a hundred people from many foreign countries including the Asiatic ones, and have ourselves travelled with SERVAS friends to Japan in 1967 and to India in January, 1975. SERVAS is, we feel, one organization through which ordinary citizens of any country can help to improve international relations by extending hospitality to people of other nations and by visiting other nations themselves and on their return recounting their experiences.

In response to an inquiry in November, 1973, from Mrs. Jeanette Slavin, Vice President of U.S. SERVAS, with which she enclosed information about SERVAS, LUXINGSHE courteously replied (Ref AM-74-1-14(67)166): "As too many requests are sent in by foreign friends to visit China and too limited are our facilities to accommodate them, we are not yet in a position to meet your request for a China-tour."

Because SERVAS is an organization of well-intentioned people who take the opportunity to become acquainted with people of other countries very seriously and who demonstrate their good will by entertaining in their homes people of all races and all nationalities, we believe we should be acceptable visitors. Although many American members of SERVAS would probably like to

come, I imagine a small group of twenty or twenty-five persons would be a fairly representative group. We could come almost any time after the first of June, 1976. We would, of course, expect to stay in public housing, inns or hotels and pay for the privilege.

FOUNDER - An international group of youths studying in Askov, Denmark in 1948. Servas took its name from the Esperanto word - "to serve."

SCOPE - Cultural organization - non-profit, interracial, and interfaith.

There are now Servas Hosts in 43 countries spread over six continents.

In the U.S.A. there are approximately 1800 active host families and about 500 approved foreign Servas travelers per year who average 5 to 10 host visits.

FINANCES - The primary source of income is a \$20 donation to Servas by a traveler upon approval. Contributions are sometimes made by hosts and friends.

All contributions are tax deductible.

Total income per year seldom exceeds several thousand dollars. This barely suffices to cover expenses for paper, postage, and increased prices for printing. Additional financial resources are urgently needed.

Servas has no paid staff anywhere in the world - all work is done by volunteers.

STRUCTURE - INTERNATIONAL The International Board of Sponsors composed of leaders invited because of their concern for peace and human relations. The current list of sponsors is attached.

Ms. Reva King (USA) and Ms. Denise Vollenweider (Switzerland) are international coordinator and assistant international coordinator respectively.

NATIONAL COMMITTEES - are responsible for implementing Servas programs in their respective countries

AREA REPRESENTATIVES - implement in-so-far as possible a local program and structure parallel with the National Committee.

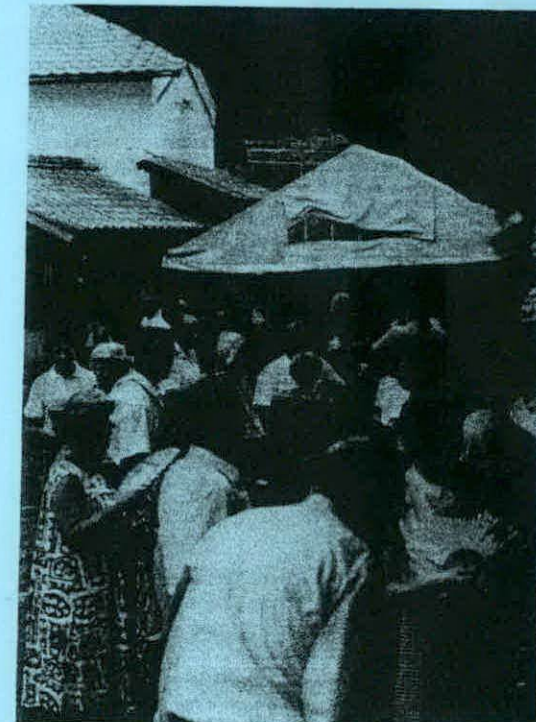

SERVAS is an international cooperative system of hosts and travelers established to help build world peace, goodwill, and understanding by providing opportunities for deeper, more personal contacts among people of diverse cultures and backgrounds. Foreign visitors are invited to share their concerns on social and international problems, their interest in creative activity, mutual responsibility to their fellow man, and to share life in the home and in the community. To promote an American transcultural exchange, we have embarked on an Americans-to-Americans Program.

SERVAS is nonprofit, nonpolitical, interracial, and interfaith. Contributions to SERVAS are tax deductible.

SERVAS was first conceived by an international group of youths studying at Askov, Denmark, in 1948. Originally called the "Open Door System of Work, Study, And Travel," the name SERVAS (Esperanto meaning "serve") was later adopted to denote the spirit of mutual international service which characterizes the movement.

You asked me this morning if we have any suggestions on how Mr. Grieve's firm should pursue its interest in buying Chinese sporting goods and toys.

The best approach is for Questor (or Spalding) to seek an invitation to one of the semi-annual Chinese Export Commodities Fairs which are held in Canton every April 15 - May 15 and October 15 - November 15. At the fair, the firm's representatives could see the whole range of Chinese products of these types, possibly make some purchases, and talk to Chinese trade officials about future possibilities. If the situation looks promising, the Chinese might subsequently invite Questor (or Spalding) to visit Peking or other cities where these products are manufactured for further talk.

In order to obtain an invitation to the Canton Fair, Questor (or Spalding) should write directly to the China National Light Industrial Products Import and Export Corporation, 82 Tung An Men Street, Peking, describing the firm and the types of items it would be interested in buying in as much detail as possible. A copy of the letter should be sent to us so that we can be alert for any opportunities to be of assistance here. Another copy of the letter should be sent to the People's Republic of China Liaison Office (PRCLO) in Washington, 2300 Connecticut Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20008, which has an interest in regard to which U.S. firms get invited to the fair. A personal visit to the PRCLO commercial office by an official of Questor (or Spalding) could also be helpful.

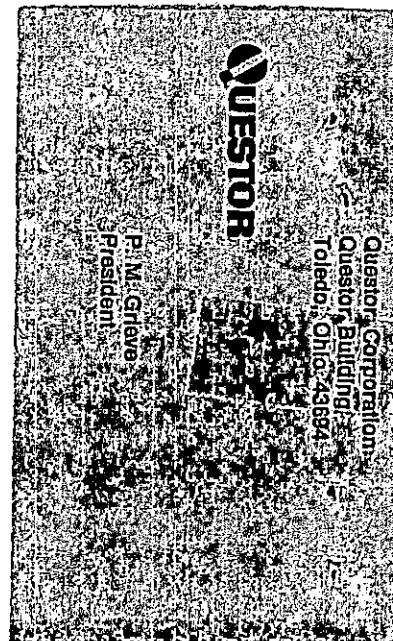

He sure had a long haul back to Houston from Peking - but if he was tired he sure didn't show it. And he sounded nearly as excited about going to Midland as he did about his visit with you.

I had hoped to be in China now myself, but it just hasn't worked out. I don't know if you remember or not, Mr. Bush, but last fall I came down to the Hyatt Regency, amid many friends and well-wishers, to say hello and that I'd see you in Peking for the celebration of their 25th anniversary. 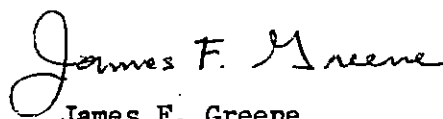
Dear Mr. Ambassador:

As you know, your letter of March 11, 1975 and its attached letter from Ms. Martha Grundy, was referred to me for reply since it concerns a matter which is, at least in part, within our jurisdiction.

In connection with the applications for permanent resident status filed by Mrs. Raquel Margarita Victoria Perez and her son Rodolfo Llorella, I have asked the District Director of our New Orleans office for additional information. When I have it, I will write to you again.

The predicament of Mrs. Perez' husband, Armando, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Armando Matilla, however, presents a more difficult problem. As you know, the United States maintains no diplomatic relations with Cuba and there is no direct transportation between Cuba and the United States. There is a procedure whereby the Service will parole into the United States from third countries Cuban refugees who are the parents, spouses, or minor children of Cuban refugees in the United States. Mrs. Perez' husband and parents appear to be eligible for such parole. However, it will be necessary for them to enter a third country, such as Spain, in order that they may be processed for parole at an American consulate in that third country.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service has reported to me concerning the adjustment of status from refugee to permanent resident of Mrs. Raquel Margarita Victoria Perez, and I am enclosing a copy of Mr. Adams' report herewith for your information.

As I'm sure you know, applicants from Western Hemisphere Countries are processed for immigrant visas on a first-come, first-served basis under the law, and no exceptions are made. Since Mrs. Perez and her son applied for adjustment of status on October 17, 1974, their name was added to the visa waiting list on that date. As the District Director indicates, applicants with dates earlier than December 1, 1972 are being processed for visas at this time and, inasmuch as the priority date moves a month or month and a half each month, Mrs. Perez will have to wait another year and a half approximately before the names of applicants with October 1974 priority dates are reached. As you can readily see in this instance, the problem has come about because Mrs. Perez did not file for adjustment of status with I&NS after she had been physically present in the United States for two years. Because she waited almost three years, her permanent residency has been delayed.

When her status is adjusted, however, you will note that her permanent residency will be established as of April 17, 1972. This means that she will be eligible to become a naturalized American citizen in April of 1977, should she desire to do so. Her permanent resident status and/or naturalized citizen status could have a bearing on her family's immigration to the United States, should they be permitted to leave Cuba and apply for admission to this Country through the procedure I outlined to you in my last letter.

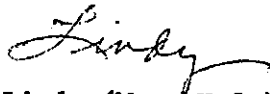

What Recession? Asks Director of SER-Jobs, Aiding Latins Seeking Work

Martha Grundy, director of SER-Jobs, says she pays attention to national unemployment rates and other indicators of an economic slump, but she's exposed to little of this negativism in her capacity as director of an organization designed to find jobs for New Orleans' Latin Americans.

"Apparently there's a lot of jobs in the city," says the pretty head of SER-Jobs, "because people are always calling us with jobs."

And SER-Jobs has placed 87 Latinos in positions since it was inaugurated here last October.

SER is a nationally active program originally set up by the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), which has a membership of more than 250,000 persons, and the American GI Forum. It features English classes, job placement, post job placement counseling, and on-the-job training.

Miss Grundy was hired by the City of New Orleans to set

up contacts between the Latin American community and the mayor's office. She was uniquely qualified, having studied in Mexico and Spain and having worked with Latinos in her native Texas.

The ESL Program and SER-Jobs were set up by her after research into successful operations in other states.

ESL (English as a Second Language), also teaches Latinos English and helps in job placement locally, but is associated with a federal skills program. It utilizes the resources of the State Department of Employment Security.

Both organizations are financed through federal revenue sharing funds via the city government.

SER has its own job placement division headed by Carlos Diaz Jr. The city requires of SER a 100 per cent job placement record, Miss Grundy says, and this acts as effective incentive measure.

In addition, SER has an informal working agreement with the state employment

service and also works closely with other public and private agencies.

"These relationships serve the dual purpose of connecting the Spanish-speaking community to help that is locally available and sensitizing old line agencies to the special needs of the Spanish-speaking," Miss Grundy said.

With a "minimum" knowledge of English, many Latinos are instantly qualified for available jobs, she said.

"Because of the extensive amount of trade New Orleans does with Latin American countries, bilingualism is becoming more and more of an asset," she said.

"Bilingualism could also play a major role in the tourist industry, with large numbers of Latin American tourists coming to the city."

"Many stores are beginning to hire Spanish-speaking employees to deal with their increasing number of non-English speaking customers."

Bilingual doctors, nurses and medical technicians are also

much in demand, especially since "many Latin Americans come to New Orleans to use the excellent medical facilities that we have here," she added.

Probably more serious than unemployment among Latinos here is the "underemployment" situation.

Studies indicate 23 per cent of the Latino work force here is underemployed, she said.

"It was for these reasons that I have developed a bilingual clerical and a bilingual accounting component," she said, adding that the class is "an open-exit structure," allowing each person to proceed at his or her own speed.

In addition, the organization offers classes in "job preparation," which conditions the prospective employees to North American hiring practices.

Many Latinos who had impressive work records in their native countries had never seen — for instance — a resume.

Testing is another factor rarely confronted by job seekers in Latin America, she said,

and the prospect of batteries of tests here is often frightening to New Orleans Latinos.

The job preparation classes utilize speakers from prospective employers in the public as well as private sector, she said. Often Latinos in these classes are happily shocked to learn of government guarantees such as workmen's compensation.

SER includes adult basic education classes, "because we have found that many of the Spanish speaking persons in our program only had an educational level of 7th or 8th grade."

"Because the Latin American culture is so drastically different from that of the United States, we are conducting job preparation classes and consumer education classes."

Demonstrating the example she sought to give the New Orleans employers, Miss Grundy hired a staff of Latinos.

Countries represented on her staff include Peru, Puerto Rico, Colombia, Cuba, Honduras, Spain and Mexico.

They operate "an incredibly inexpensive" organization out of offices rented from the Latin American Apostolate, 821 General Pershing St., one-half block from a distinctly Latin-flavored Magazine Street.

Corners were cut, the Archdiocese of New Orleans allowed the apostolate to lease the offices economically, and office furniture was found unused in a city government storage area, she said.

The end result was that SER had a surplus of funds and was rebudgeted accordingly. This meant that SER actually will lose some of the surplus funds available through revenue sharing.

If the as yet unfinalized rebudgeting includes even a portion of the funds SER has in surplus, Miss Grundy hopes to expand the program to serve more Latinos and this will mean more spacious facilities.

Currently, classes often are made up of more than 40 persons, counselors and clerical workers are housed in crowded conditions and a well-equipped

language laboratory badly needs more space.

But even with the current drawbacks, Miss Grundy feels SER is effectively serving the Latinos it can handle. She attributes this more to the willingness of the clients than to the organization itself.

The Latinos are willing to work for nominal wages — the \$2.10 per hour paid them while

enrolled is often in itself a respite from poverty and are generally very enthusiastic and energetic.

And no matter how the situation is, she says, her enrollees almost always display a pride and respect which makes the SER director's work a pleasure.

And Miss Grundy's satisfaction she relates this is proof of pleasure.

Amnesty Open to Undergrads

The University of New Orleans is offering scholastic amnesty to undergraduates with a poor academic record who dropped out of school for a five-year period.

Such students may elect—once only—to set aside all grades and course credits earned prior to the five-year period. While the grades will remain a part of the student's transcript, they will not be used to compute his grade point average nor his total number of credit hours

"Scholastic amnesty" apply only to students returning after a five-year absence," explains UNO Registrar Lance Woodliff. "A student can also be requested to re-enroll. Under the conditions of scholastic amnesty, grades earned prior to the five-year period—good and bad—will be eliminated. However, the student may attempt to gain lost credits by taking advanced standing examinations in courses previously passed.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Bush:

I've been meaning to write you folks ever since you went to China, to both congratulate you and wish you will during your stay over there, but just haven't taken the time. The congratulations are still deserved and I certainly do hope that things are going well for you in China. I know the Bushes have never had any trouble staying busy, but I do wonder sometimes if perhaps your ingenuity might be taxed to the limit without so many things in China that we here perhaps take for granted. I can't help but wonder what you do for entertainment and especially, how you manage to play tennis over there.

I'm happy to report that the Guillot Clan in Dallas are all in excellent health. My mother and father are doing great and Dad plays tennis religiously twice a week with his regular foursome in addition to playing at home all weekend long. I should be in as good a shape when I'm fifty-eight. My brother Pat and his wife Becky had their third child just a very few weeks ago. They now have two boys and a girl. My younger sister Andre and her husband in Dallas have had their second child also, within the last six months. My older sister Michelle and her husband Covey are living in Houston, and as you might have heard about a year and a half ago their family increased in size when Covey's brother was killed in a car wreck and his wife died in childbirth thirty days later. That left them with their own three children and Covey's brother's two...so they now have a girl, ten, two boys eight, and two boys six. They're doing quite well, however. Thank goodness Michelle has full time help. This is especially important since she found out last month that she has a mild case of Multiple Sclerosis. We're all so thankful that she does not have a serious case...that disease can be so very crippling and debilitating. The case that she has apparently will affect her only in that she'll have to get some rest every day.

Her symptoms that have shown up have been relatively mild... some tingling and numbness in her hand and feet. The worst episode that she had (although at that time we didn't realize she had MS) occurred five years ago when she all of a sudden lost sight in one of her eyes. It was gone for two or three days and was pretty frightening. MS, as you might know, is a disease that strikes the nervous system. All of our nerves are covered with a shield like substance called myolon. When a person has MS this myolon shield breaks down...disintegrates.. and is replaced with scar tissue. Consequently, the brain is unable to send impulses to some of the muscles (if the case is serious enough). Michelle is extremely fortunate, I think, especially in that the temporary blindness that she suffered went away completely and she is back to 20-20 vision. From what I've been able to learn this is quite unusual...there would normally be some permanent loss of vision.

Somehow I feel pretty certain that you folks probably hear fairly often from Neil Calnan in San Antonio and are therefore probably aware that he is planning on leaving the U.S. Attorney's office there to go into private practice with some San Antonio firm. I don't think he has made a decision yet as to who to go with. I personally feel like whoever gets him will certainly be most fortunate. My only hope is that he has politics so firmly ingrained in his life that he will someday run for public office. It's just a shame that he doesn't live in Austin... but that is San Antonio's gain.

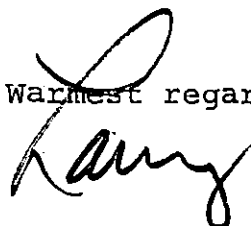
And speaking of public office, Mr. Bush, I'm sure the Chinese are wonderful people, but I for one feel we Texans deserve you more, and I'm sure I speak for my whole family when I say that we certainly hope that you one day find yourself back in Texas running for and winning some state wide office.

Texas politics is such a mess. I'm afraid the Democrats have been in power so long that they feel more than a little that they own the place. Perhaps those of us living in Austin are more keenly aware of the inadequacies of our State legislature because we are so close to that two ring circus that we see them more as they really are.

We all are hoping that your life during this period in China is not as dull as it seems to be for the Chinese themselves and, again, we look forward to having you back in Texas.

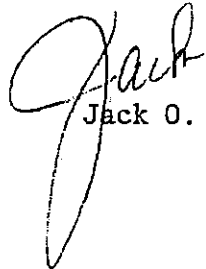
