² a) Li Ch'uan, Vice President of CCPIT and Delegation Head, has been VP of CCPIT since April 1962 or possibly earlier. He has traveled to Latin America, Eastern and Western Europe, Africa, North Korea and the USSR. Prior to 1962 he may have worked on Sino-Soviet trade affairs, since he once told a USLO officer that he had traveled to the Soviet Union many times "when relations were good and when they were bad."

³ Li appeared to have chief responsibility in CCPIT for dealing with Americans when USLO first opened, but in the fall of 1973 he fell ill and apparently for that reason did not host the NCUSCT delegation which visited China that November (instead CCPIT VP Li Yung-t'ing did the honors). For about a year now, it has been evident that Li was fully recovered from his previous illness and his appearances have again suggested that he is CCPIT's top U.S. man. Li is a ~~gas~~ quiet, reserved, but friendly man who has often given us the clear impression that he hoped to lead this mission. He seems to understand some English but has not been heard to speak it. He is deaf in his right ear.

4. b) T'ien Kuang-t'ao is General Manager of the China ~~Import and Export Corporation.~~
National Metals and Minerals / We have seen little of

T'ien since USLO was established but in an initial call our C/E officers found him friendly, outgoing, and interested in promoting a diversified range of exports to the U.S. We do not know if T'ien speaks English.

We have no other information on Han except that he served as deputy head of this year's Chinese delegation to negotiate the PRC's annual trade agreement with Mongolia.

6. d) Ch'eng Chi-hsien is Deputy General Manager (for imports) of the China National Machinery Import and Export Corporation which we believe makes him the ~~high~~ ~~and~~ second highest ranking official in this important corporation. He is a slightly crusty individual but has a ~~very~~ ^a good sense of humor. In a recent conversation with a ~~the~~ USLO officer he appeared pleased at/prospect of visiting the U.S. ~~has not heard him speak in English, though he may understand some.~~

7. e) Liu Shao-shan is a member of CCPIT's Legal Affairs Department.

7. f) Han Li-fu, Deputy Manager of MACHIMPEX Fourth Department (Instruments and Telecommunications) is an impressive man, both for his sharp intellect and his erect, almost military bearing. He has dealt with a number of U.S. firms including RCA, and recently played a role in hosting an American delegation from the Electronics Industries Association (Peking 1979). Han has a good command of English.

8. g) Yeh Chung-ch'ix is a CCPIT staff member who has been regularly involved in U.S. matters since the establishment of USLO. He is competent and friendly, and will be remembered by members of the 1973 NCUSCT delegation whom he escorted on their trip to Shanghai, Hangchow and Canton. He speaks English well.

9. h) Wang Ken-liang is a CCPIT English interpreter with a good command of English and a friendly, personable manner. Like Yeh, he has been working on U.S. affairs for some time, and he served as interpreter during the NCUSCT visit in 1973.

10. USLO has no information on Kao Feng and Ho Chi, the two remaining members of the delegation, but will report any information which may become available. Although this message is classified LOU we assume full

1. In formal discussions with CCPIT DURING April 22-24

visit to Peking, I was advised that the return delegation
will consist of approximately ten members and will arrive
in the first part of September 1975 to spend approximately
two weeks in the U.S. It will be led by a leading member
of CCPIT and be composed of CCPIT representatives and
persons from appropriate corporations. Time and size
of the delegation were approximate, but fairly firm.
Details such as names of leader and members, corporations
represented, port of entry, desired itinerary, attitude
on agenda for discussion and joint statement, etc., are
unavailable at this time.

2. My recommendation is that we promptly prepare a final

Itinerary for CCPIT covering about eighteen days and submit it through PROLO with a statement inviting their views but advising that we will consider it final in all material respects and will plan accordingly as of the tenth of July at latest. I have already mentioned this prospect and have indicated our determination that the delegation arrive first in Washington on September 5 or 6 for a rest with program beginning on September 8 to include visits to New York, Chicago, possibly farm states, California and home via the Pacific. The Chinese indicated informal acceptance of this outline but offered no specific suggestions, saying only that they viewed the visit as a general introduction to the U.S., similar to the Council's mission to China in November 1973.

3. As for agenda for discussions with the Council, we reviewed many subjects including program of fixed exchanges; progress on reciprocal exhibitions; annual Council-CCPIT meetings alternating between countries; working groups paralleling FTCS; Council representation in Peking; CCPIT or FTC representation in USA; joint statement at end of CCPIT visit; and non-governmental trade agreement including elements thereof. The CCPIT said it would discuss all these subjects during the visit, commenting only that: 1) a joint statement is not their usual practice on foreign visits; 2) they would be interested in seeing possible

sites for a Chinese exhibition in USA; 3) they believe in expanded delegation exchanges; and 4) a non-governmental trade accord is premature. A draft agenda for discussions should accompany the itinerary to CCPIT.

4. The atmosphere for our discussions has been very cordial and I have met with CCPIT Vice Chairman Li Chuan with whom Bob Malott met a few weeks ago. Li Tung-ting is not in Peking. Now that formal talks are over CCPIT has arranged for me to meet with Packaging Corporation, TECHIMPOR and China Commodities Inspection Bureau and return to Kwangchow via Shanghai for further visits with Shanghai officials. I expect to return to Kwangchow by April 30 and spend a couple of days briefing Arne and winding up my part at the fair before returning home. Will advise by cable precise return travel plans. Have seen a lot of George and Barbara Bush in Canton and Peking and they send warmest greetings to you and Mabel.

5. On the whole I am not downcast about discussions here even though some details are still hanging. I think we simply must fix a program, give them a fair chance to comment and then stick with it. A final note: I was elaborately and formally advised of China's displeasure at U.S. stand on the Arts Troupe's proposed song on Taiwan. All of this is by way of summary, and you will have a full report on my return.

6. On a different subject, George Driscoll should advise Jack Cunningham of AMA that the Canadian speaker for the Quebec City conference in August will be John Higginbotham, First Secretary, Commercial, Embassy of Canada in Peking. Mr. Higginbotham will be in western Canada on home leave at that time. Herb Horowitz is willing but reluctant to confirm his availability since he will have just begun his new job in Washington at that time. I think, however, your call to his new boss at INR could spring him loose. I really think Herb would be an absolutely perfect addition to the program. George Driscoll might also advise Jack Cunningham of possible assistance from Roger Hatch, President of Canadian Exporters Association, who has visited China. Warm regards, Gene Theroux.

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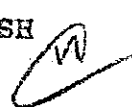

SUBJECT - CCPIT Reception

I promised to give your section and others some background on previous Sino-U.S. trade missions and the China Council for the Promotion of International Trade (CCPIT) delegation which is leaving for the U.S. September 4 as guests of the National Council for the U.S.-China Trade (NCUSCT). Mr. Bush has invited this group to a reception August 28 at 5:30 P.M.

Previous Delegations

The first Sino-U.S. trade delegation came from NCUSCT which sent its Chairman, Donald Burnham, President, Ambassador Chris Phillips, and other top NCUSCT leaders here in November, 1973 at CCPIT's invitation. The group visited Peking, Shanghai, Hangchow and the Canton Fair. Other U.S. trade groups which have traveled here since 1973 have included delegations from the American Importers Association, American Arbitration Association and the Electronics Industries Association, (which was here this summer). The American Chamber of Commerce in Hong Kong has also received invitations to send a delegation to each of the past two Canton Fairs.

On the Chinese side, we had no delegations for a long time, and then only small technical groups which went to the U.S. for training or other purposes in connection with contracts concluded with Boeing, M.W. Kellogg, Bucyrus-Erie, etc. These were not trade missions. The only actual trade mission from China to precede the CCPIT group was a delegation from the China National Textiles Import and Export Corporation (CHINATEX) which went to the U.S. this past spring at the invitation of NCUSCT. That delegation

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was led by CHINATEX Deputy General Manager, Madame Han Fang-yu who will be attending Mr. Bush's Thursday reception. In addition to Madame Han's group and the CCPIT mission the China National Light Industrial Products Import and Export Corporation has accepted an NCUSCT invitation to send a delegation to the U.S. this September.

Probable Activities of Li Ch'uan's CCPIT Delegation

The delegation will visit Washington, New York, Moline, Chicago, Houston, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Seattle. Judging from talks NCUSCT has had with PRCLC, it also appears that efforts will be made to ensure that some delegation members with specialized interests may pursue those interests by at times separating themselves from the group (e.g. the MINMETALS man may make a special trip to Pittsburgh to see a U.S. steel mill). In Washington NCUSCT will probably try to pin Li Ch'uan down on dates for an exchange of trade exhibitions between NCUSCT and CCPIT and will undoubtedly want to talk about further exchanges of trade missions under NCUSCT-CCPIT auspices.

Bio Information

Information on most delegation members is included in the attached cable. The ranking guest at Mr. Bush's reception will be Mr. Wang Yao-t'ing, President of CCPIT. Wang himself will soon be going abroad to lead a CCPIT mission to Scandinavian and other European countries. A guest list for the reception is also attached.

a) Li Ch'uan, Vice President of CCPIT and Delegation

Head, has been VP of CCPIT since April 1962 or possibly earlier. He has traveled to Latin America, Eastern and Western Europe, Africa, North Korea and the USSR. Prior to 1962 he may have worked on Sino-Soviet trade affairs, since he once told a USLO officer that he had traveled to the Soviet Union many times "when relations were good and when they were bad."

2. Li appeared to have chief responsibility in CCPIT for dealing with Americans when USLO first opened, but in the fall of 1973 he fell ill and apparently for that reason did not host the NCUSCT delegation which visited China that November (instead CCPIT VP Li Yung-t'ing did the honors). For about a year now, it has been evident that Li was fully recovered from his previous illness and his appearances have again suggested that he is CCPIT's top U.S. man. Li is a ~~man~~ quiet, reserved, but friendly man who has often given us the clear impression that he hoped to lead this mission. He seems to understand some English but has not been heard to speak it. He is deaf in his right ear.

4. b) T'ien Kuang-t'ao is General Manager of the China Import and Export Corporation, National Metals and Minerals. We have seen little of

7. f) Han Li-fu, Deputy Manager of MACHINPEX Fourth Department (Instruments and Telecommunications) is an impressive man, both for his sharp intellect and his erect, almost military bearing. He has dealt with a number of U.S. firms including RCA, and recently played a role in hosting an American Delegation from the Electronics Industries Association (Peking 1979). Han has a good command of English.

8. g) Yeh Chung-ch'ix is a CCPIT staff member who has been regularly involved in U.S. matters since the establishment of USLO. He is competent and friendly, and will be remembered by members of the 1973 NCUSCT Delegation whom he escorted on their trip to Shanghai, Hangchow and Canton. He speaks English well.

9. h) Wang Ren-liang is a CCPIT English interpreter with a good command of English and a friendly, personable manner. Like Yeh, he has been working on U.S. affairs for some time, and he served as interpreter during the NCUSCT visit in 1973.

10. USLO has no information on Kao Feng and Ho Chi, the two remaining members of the Delegation, but will report any information which may become available. Although this message is classified LOU we assume full

PEKING CRITICIZES U.S. STANCE OVER CANCELLED TROUPE VISIT

1.) PEKING HAS TAKEN PUBLIC ISSUE WITH THE ADMINISTRATION'S REFUSAL TO ALLOW A CHINESE ENTERTAINMENT TROUPE TO PRESENT A SONG ABOUT THE LIBERATION OF TAIWAN DURING ITS PLANNED TOUR OF THE UNITED STATES--A POSITION WHICH LED TO THE CANCELLATION OF THE TROUPE'S VISIT--BUT AT THE SAME TIME HAS DECLARED ITS CONTINUED INTEREST IN PROMOTING SINO-AMERICAN CONTACTS. NCNA ON 2 APRIL PUBLICIZED A STATEMENT BY THE CHINESE PEOPLE'S ASSOCIATION FOR FRIENDSHIP WITH FOREIGN COUNTRIES AND THE SPOKESMAN OF THE INFORMATION DEPARTMENT OF THE FOREIGN MINISTRY WHICH DIRECTLY CHARGED THE UNITED STATES WITH TAKING AN "UNWARRANTED" STAND CONTRAVENTING THE "SPIRIT" OF THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE AND INCOMPATIBLE WITH THE "PRINCIPLE" THAT TAIWAN'S LIBERATION IS AN INTERNAL CHINESE AFFAIR.

THE STATEMENT REPRESENTS THE FIRST AUTHORITATIVE CHINESE CRITICISM OF U.S. POLICY OVER THE SENSITIVE TAIWAN ISSUE SINCE PRESIDENT NIXON'S 1972 VISIT TO PEKING, AND APPEARS DESIGNED TO COUNTERACT ANY IMPRESSIONS IN CHINA ABROAD THAT PEKING WILL ACQUIESE TO THE U.S. TAIWAN STANCE. HOWEVER, WHILE THE STATEMENT REAFFIRMED PEKING'S DETERMINATION TO PROTECT THE "PRINCIPLE" OF TAIWAN'S LIBERATION, IT DIRECTED ONLY MILDLY WORDED CRITICISM AT WASHINGTON, AVOIDING ALL REFERENCE TO U.S. OFFICIALS, AND REAFFIRMING PEKING'S RESOLVE TO ABIDE BY THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE AND PROMOTE BILATERAL CONTRACTS.

PEKING CLAIMED THAT THE U.S. DEMAND FOR THE DELETION OF THE CONTROVERSIAL SONG WAS "ENTIRELY GROUNDLESS" AND THAT "NO FAULT CAN BE FOUND" WITH THE CHINESE TROUPE FOR INCLUDING A SONG ABOUT TAIWAN'S LIBERATION--THE CHINESE PEOPLE'S "INTERNAL AFFAIR, IN WHICH NO OTHER COUNTRY HAS THE RIGHT TO INTERFERE." THE STATEMENT ACKNOWLEDGED THAT THE SONG HAD NOT BEEN INCLUDED IN THE ORIGINAL CHINESE PROGRAM SUBMITTED TO THE UNITED STATES, BUT CLAIMED THAT IT WAS CONTAINED IN A "SUPPLEMENTARY LIST." DECLARING INCORRECTLY THAT THE U.S. GOVERNMENT HAD "AGREED" IN THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE THAT "THERE IS BUT ONE CHINA AND THAT TAIWAN IS PART OF CHINA," THE STATEMENT ASSERTED THAT WASHINGTON'S OBJECTION TO THE SONG INDICATES THAT IT WAS "RETREATING FROM THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE." THE U.S. POSITION AS STATED IN THE COMMUNIQUE ACTUALLY READS: "THE UNITED STATES ACKNOWLEDGES THAT ALL CHINESE ON EITHER SIDE OF THE TAIWAN STRAIT MAINTAIN THAT THERE IS BUT ONE CHINA AND THAT TAIWAN IS A PART OF CHINA. THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT DOES NOT CHALLENGE THAT POSITION."

WHILE FOCUSING PUBLIC ATTENTION ON THE CANCELLATION OF THE TOUR, THE STATEMENT CONCLUDED ON AN UPBEAT NOTE OF CHINESE "ACTIVE SUPPORT" FOR CONTINUED CONTACTS WITH THE UNITED STATES. IT REAFFIRMED CHINESE DETERMINATION TO ABIDE BY THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE AND NOTED THAT PEKING IS EAGER TO PROMOTE SINO-U.S. CONTACTS IN ORDER TO ENHANCE "MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING AND FRIENDSHIP." PEKING HAD EARLIER UNDERScoreD THIS POINT FOLLOWING THE ANNOUNCED CANCELLATION OF THE ENTERTAINMENT TROUPE'S VISIT WHEN A 31 MARCH NCNA REPORT ON THE CLOSING OF THE CHINESE ARCHAEOLOGICAL EXHIBIT IN WASHINGTON PLAYED UP THE FACT THAT UNPRECEDENTED NUMBERS OF VISITORS HAD SEEN THE SHOW, INCLUDING MRS. 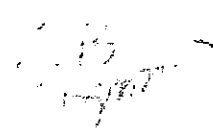

US. She specifically mentioned planned visit to Monsanto "from whom we buy artificial fiber", and said she is amenable to contacts during the visit with representatives of the US cotton industry. She added, however, that there might not be time to meet all of the Americans who would like to see ^{the} delegation. First stop is New York, where Madame Han thought the delegation would spend the most time "because so many of CHINATEX customers are located there." She emphasized that NCUSCT is handling all arrangements in the US, and that the exact itinerary will be decided upon after the mission's arrival in the US.

3. Reftels provided information on ^{some} ~~the~~ members of the delegation: Madame Han, Wang Ming-sheng (who is responsible for silk) and Huang Chien-mo (interpreter with certain substantive responsibilities for textile exports to US). We can now add that Tsung Wen-chih is responsible for cotton piece goods. He is in late forties, grey-haired, from ~~Shank~~ Shantung Province, and does not speak ~~English~~ English. Ma Hung-sheng, who is tall and in his mid-forties, handles exports of garments. His English is good and, like Huang Chien-mo, visited Canada as a member of the PRC export delegation that went there in late 1973.

4. In conversation with Cheng to-pin, the latter took exception to USLO officer's remark that this is first Chinese trade mission to the US. Cheng emphasized

that it was merely "a small group" (hsiao tzu), suggesting to us that Chinese hope the visit will be low key and not widely publicized affair.

5. We would appreciate receiving information from the Department about the mission's itinerary and activities as it becomes available.

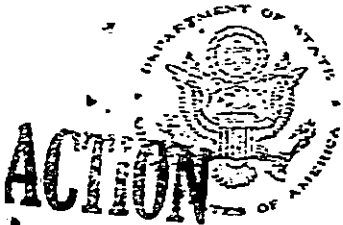

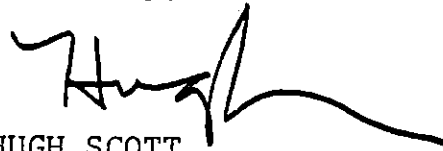

NCUSCT's proposed itinerary was discussed with PRCLC Commercial Counsellor, Chang Tsien-hua, while he was on home leave and Chang had already communicated CCPIT's few requests for changes to the National Council, Li said.

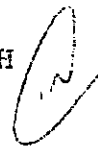

This is not conducive to friendly contact between the peoples of the two countries. We have already informed the U.S. side that the Delegation will stop in Washington first and then go to Boston for the Conference. The Delegation will leave the U.S. for home after all activities related to the International Conference are over. These are the Delegation's plans for traveling to the Conference site from Washington and its complete itinerary. The Chinese Liaison Office in Washington, therefore, has nothing more to inform the U.S. Department of State. END QUOTE.

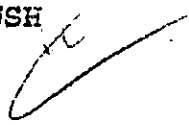
