FOR AMBASSADOR BUSH FROM CONSUL GENERAL

1. AMBASSADOR BYROADE HAS TOLD ME OF YOUR PAKISTAN TRAVEL PLANS. WE ARE DELIGHTED THAT YOU AND MRS. BUSH WILL BE OUR GUESTS HERE IN KARACHI THIS WEEKEND. WE UNDERSTAND YOU WILL BE COMING DOWN HERE FROM ISLAMABAD ON PK 309 ARRIVING KARACHI AT 2255 HOURS ON SUNDAY, 19 JAN., THAT MRS. BUSH PLANS TO LEAVE ON AIR FRANCE 180 AT 0500 ON 21 JAN. TO RETURN TO PEKING, AND THAT YOU PLAN TO LEAVE ON PAN AM 0018 AT 0820 HOURS THE SAME MORNING FOR NEW YORK.
2. AMBASSADOR BYROADE TELLS ME THAT YOU PREFER YOUR KARACHI STOPOVER TO BE COMPLETELY PRIVATE AND HE HAS GOP'S AGREEMENT THAT THIS WILL BE THE CASE. HOWEVER, BASED ON PREVIOUS EXPERIENCE, I THINK WE CANNOT RULE OUT POSSIBILITY THAT LOCAL OFFICIALDOM WILL MAKE SOME OVERTURES AND POSSIBLY PROPOSE FUNCTIONS IN YOUR HONOR. IF SO, I WILL TRY TO CONVEY INFORMATION ABOUT SUCH THINGS TO YOU IN ISLAMABAD ON 18-19 JAN. AND WILL RESPOND IN ANY WAY YOU DIRECT.
3. IF YOU APPROVE, WE WOULD ENJOY HOSTING A VERY SMALL, INFORMAL AND (IN VIEW OF TUESDAY DEPARTURE TIME) EARLY DINNER ON MONDAY NIGHT TO INCLUDE A FEW OF OUR COLLEAGUES HERE. IF YOU HAVE ANY FRIENDS IN KARACHI AMONG THE AMERICAN, PAKISTAN OR THIRD COUNTRY COMMUNITIES, PLEASE LET ME KNOW AND WE WILL TRY TO INCLUDE THEM AT DRINKS, DINNER, OR SOME OTHER TIME DURING YOUR DAY.
4. WE HOPE YOU WILL HAVE A RELAXED AND ENJOYABLE TIME HERE IN PREPARATION SERIES OF ARDUOUS ONWARD JOURNEYS. THIS IS A LOVELY TIME OF THE YEAR IN KARACHI, AND THERE ARE RELAXING THINGS TO DO LIKE VISITING PEACEFUL AND QUIET ARABIAN SEA BEACHES, CRABBING FROM A BOAT IN THE HARBOR, ETC. IF YOU AND MRS. BUSH HAVE ANY PREFERENCES ALONG THESE LINES OR ANY OTHER LINES, PLEASE LET ME KNOW AND WE WILL MAKE APPROPRIATE ARRANGEMENTS.

China adopts revised constitution: New 21-man Presidium

PEKING, Jan. 18: The People's Republic of China has adopted a revised constitution, announced a new 21-member Presidium and a new Government.

This was announced today in a Press communique after the first session of the Fourth National People's Congress formally held here from Jan. 13 to 17.

The agenda of the session was revision of the constitution and election and appointment of the leading personnel of the State.

The Press communique said: The Congress was held in the Great Hall of the People. On the rostrum was a huge portrait of Chairman Mao Tse-tung, with bright red flags on either side. The Congress elected a Presidium composed of 21 deputies. They are Mr. Chu Teh, Mr. Tun Pi-wu, Mr. Soong Ching-ling, Mr. Liu Po-cheng, Mr. Wu Teh, Mr. Wei Kuo-ching, Mr. Saifuddin, Mr. Kuo Mo-ao, Mr. Hsu Hsiang-chlena, Mr. Nieh Jung-chi, Mr. Chen Fun, Mr. Tan Chen-lin, Mr. Li Ching-chuan, Mr. Chang Ting-cheng, Mr. Tsai Chang, Mr. Ulan U, Mr. Ngapo Ngawang, Mr. Chou Chien-jen, Mr. Hsu Teh-heng, Mr. Hu Cheueh-wen, Mr. Li Su-wen, Mr. Yao Lien-wei is Permanent Chairman of the Presidium and Mr. Wu Teh Secretary-General.

Shih-yu, Mr. Hua Koo-feng, Mr. Chen Yung-kuai, Mr. Chen Hsi-lien, Mr. Li Hsien-nien, Mr. Li Teh-sheng, Mr. Yao Wen-yuan, Mr. Su Chen-hua and Mr. Ni Chih-fu.

Chairman Chu Teh declared the Congress open. This was greeted by the deputies with enthusiastic applause. The band played the national anthem.

Comrade Chang Chun-Chiao made the report on the revision of the constitution on behalf of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of China. Premier Chou En-lai made the report on the work of the Government.

Before the formal opening of the Congress, preliminary meetings were held from Jan. 5 to 11, when the deputies discussed the main documents for the Congress and other preparatory work. Reuter adds: The new Deputy Minister will be Yeh Chien-ying. Mr. Chou En-lai has retained his Premiership.

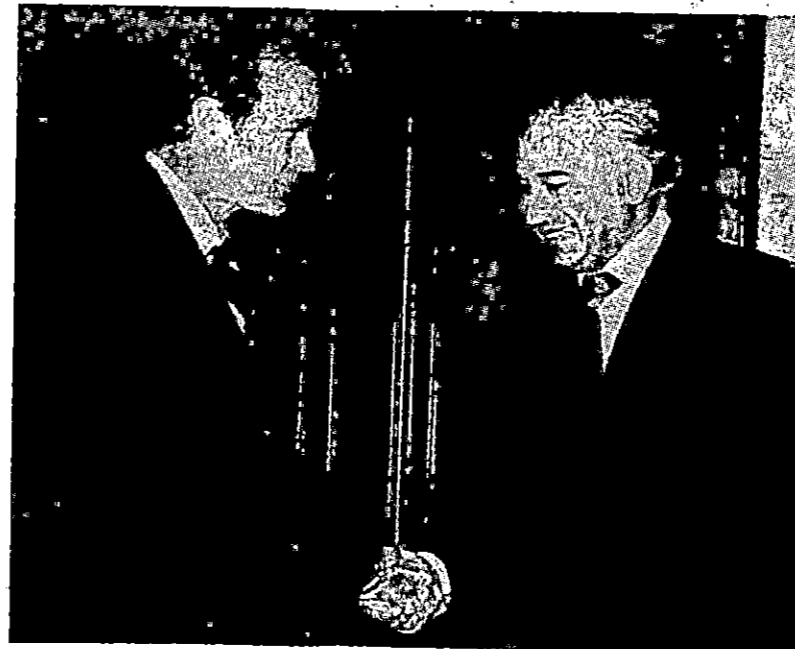
The Congress—the nation's highest legislative assembly—is the first to be held since 1964-65.
