MR. VICE-PREMIER, MR. FOREIGN MINISTER, AND ALL
CHINESE FRIENDS HERE TONIGHT:

ON BEHALF OF MRS. FORD, OUR DAUGHTER SUSAN, THE
MEMBERS OF OUR PARTY, AND THE PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES
OF AMERICA, LET ME EXPRESS APPRECIATION FOR YOUR FRIENDLY
RECEPTION. IT IS SYMBOLIZED BY THIS GRACIOUS BANQUET
YOU HAVE ACCORDED US TONIGHT.

ALTHOUGH THIS IS MY SECOND VISIT TO THE PEOPLE'S
REPUBLIC OF CHINA, IT IS THE FIRST TIME I HAVE BEEN TO
YOUR COUNTRY AS PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES. IN 1972
I HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO MEET A NUMBER OF YOUR LEADERS,
INCLUDING PREMIER CHOU EN-LAI. I LEARNED SOMETHING OF
THEIR VIEWS, AND SAW THE IMPRESSIVE WORK OF THE PEOPLE
OF CHINA IN DEVELOPING THEIR COUNTRY. I RECALL YOUR

OFFICIAL MEMBERS ACCOMPANYING PRESIDENT FORD ON HIS VISIT ARE HIS WIFE BETTY FORD AND DAUGHTER SUSAN FORD; DR HENRY A. KISSINGER, SECRETARY OF STATE; GEORGE BUSH, CHIEF OF THE U.S. LIAISON OFFICE IN CHINA, AND HIS WIFE; JAMES LYNN, DIRECTOR OF THE OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET; AND HIS WIFE; ROBERT T. HARTMANN, COUNSELLOR TO THE PRESIDENT; RICHARD B. CHENEY, ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT; BRENT T. SCOWCROFT, ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT FOR NATIONAL SECURITY AFFAIRS; JOSEPH J. SISCO, UNDER SECRETARY OF STATE RON NESSEN, PRESS SECRETARY TO THE PRESIDENT; PHILLIP HABIB, ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF STATE FOR EAST ASIAN AND PACIFIC AFFAIRS; AND WINSTON LORD, DIRECTOR OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT POLICY PLANNING STAFF.

GREETING THEM AT THE AIRPORT WERE TENG HSIAO-PING AND LI HSIEN-NIEN, VICE-PREMIERS OF THE STATE COUNCIL; WU TEH AND LI SU-WEN, VICE-CHAIRMAN OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE OF THE NATIONAL PEOPLE'S CONGRESS; CHIAO KUAN-HUA, MINISTER OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS; LI CHIANG, MINISTER OF FOREIGN TRADE; HUANG CHEN, CHIEF OF THE LIAISON OFFICE OF CHINA IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA; AND MADAME LIN CHIA-MEI.

ON BEHALF OF THE CHINESE GOVERNMENT AND PREMIER CHOU EN-LAI, VICE-PREMIER TENG HSIAO-PING EXTENDED A WELCOME TO THE AMERICAN GUESTS.

PEKING AIRPORT TODAY FLEW THE NATIONAL FLAGS OF CHINA AND THE UNITED STATES. AT 3 P.M. THE U.S. PRESIDENT'S SPECIAL PLANE TOUCHED DOWN AT THE AIRPORT. A WELCOMING CEREMONY WAS HELD AT THE AIRPORT. THE BAND PLAYED THE NATIONAL ANTHEMS OF THE UNITED STATES AND CHINA. PRESIDENT FORD, ACCOMPANIED BY VICE-PREMIER TENG HSIAO-PING, REVIEWED A GUARD OF HONOUR MADE UP OF MEN OF THE GROUND, NAVAL AND AIR FORCES OF THE CHINESE PEOPLE'S LIBERATION ARMY.

ON THEIR ARRIVAL AT THE GUEST HOUSE, PRESIDENT AND MRS. FORD WERE GREETED BY MESDAMES KANG KO-CHING AND TENG YING-CHAO.

AMONG THE MORE THAN 200 PEOPLE GREETING THE AMERICAN GUESTS AT THE AIRPORT WERE ALSO LEADING MEMBERS OF GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS, THE PEKING MUNICIPAL REVOLUTIONARY COMMITTEE AND OTHER DEPARTMENTS CONCERNED WANG HAI-JUNG, CHU MU-CHIH, HSTEH CHING-I, YEN YU-MIN, LIU CHENG-CHING, CHIANG HUI-LIEN, LU CHIN-TUNG, LIU HUA-CHING, LIU TSUN-HSIN, TENG KANG, WANG YEH-CHIU, LIU CHUAN-HSIN, CHANG HAN-CHIH, CHU LIN, LIN PING, CHIN CHIA-LIN AND CHU CHUAN-HSIEN AS WELL AS PERSONAGES OF VARIOUS CIRCLES WHO HAD VISITED THE UNITED STATES.

((TEXT)) MORE THAN THREE YEARS AGO, PRESIDENT NIXON VISITED CHINA, AND THE CHINESE AND AMERICAN SIDES ISSUED THE FAMOUS SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE. THIS IS A UNIQUE INTERNATIONAL DOCUMENT. IT EXPLICITLY SETS FORTH THE FUNDAMENTAL DIFFERENCES BETWEEN THE POLICIES OF CHINA AND THE UNITED STATES, WHICH ARE DETERMINED BY THEIR DIFFERENT SOCIAL SYSTEMS, AND AT THE SAME TIME POINTS OUT THAT IN TODAY'S WORLD OUR TWO COUNTRIES HAVE MANY POINTS IN COMMON. AN OUTSTANDING COMMON POINT IS THAT NEITHER SHOULD SEEK HEGEMONY AND THAT EACH IS OPPOSED TO EFFORTS BY ANY OTHER COUNTRY OR GROUP OF COUNTRIES TO ESTABLISH HEGEMONY. THE COMMUNIQUE PROVIDES THE BASIS FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF SINO-U.S. RELATIONS AND INDICATES ITS DIRECTION AND GOAL. ITS ISSUANCE ACCORDS NOT ONLY WITH THE COMMON DESIRE OF OUR TWO PEOPLES BUT ALSO WITH THE INTERESTS OF THE PEOPLE OF THE WORLD. AND IT HAS MADE A DEEP IMPACT INTERNATIONALLY.

SINCE THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE, THERE HAVE BEEN ON THE WHOLE AN INCREASE IN THE CONTACTS AND FRIENDSHIP BETWEEN OUR TWO PEOPLES AND AN IMPROVEMENT IN THE RELATIONS BETWEEN OUR TWO COUNTRIES. SINCE HE TOOK OFFICE, PRESIDENT FORD HAS STATED MORE THAN ONCE THAT HE WILL ADHERE TO THE PRINCIPLES OF THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE AND WORK TO PROMOTE SINO-U.S. RELATIONS, A STATEMENT WHICH WE WELCOME. TO REALIZE THE NORMALIZATION OF RELATIONS BETWEEN OUR TWO COUNTRIES CONFORMS TO THE COMMON DESIRE OF THE CHINESE AND AMERICAN PEOPLES. WE BELIEVE THAT, SO LONG AS THE PRINCIPLES OF THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE ARE EARNESTLY OBSERVED, THIS DESIRE WILL EVENTUALLY BE REALIZED THROUGH THE JOINT EFFORTS OF OUR TWO SIDES.

AT PRESENT, A MORE IMPORTANT QUESTION CONFRONTS THE CHINESE AND AMERICAN PEOPLES -- THAT OF THE INTERNATIONAL SITUATION. OUR BASIC VIEW IS: THERE IS GREAT DISORDER UNDER HEAVEN AND THE SITUATION IS EXCELLENT. THE BASIC CONTRADICTIONS IN THE WORLD ARE SHARPENING DAILY. THE FACTORS FOR BONT REVOLUTION AND WAR ARE CLEARLY INCREASING. COUNTRIES WANT INDEPENDENCE, NATIONS WANT LIBERATION, AND THE PEOPLE WANT REVOLUTION -- THIS TORRENTIAL TIDE OF OUR TIME IS MOUNTING. IN PARTICULAR, THE THIRD WORLD HAS EMERGED AND GROWN IN STRENGTH, AND HAS BECOME A FORCE THAT IS PLAYING AN IMPORTANT ROLE IN THE INTERNATIONAL ARENA, A FORCE THAT MUST NOT BE NEGLECTED. ON THE OTHER HAND, THE CONTENTION FOR WORLD HEGEMONY IS INTENSIFYING AND, STRATEGICALLY, EUROPE IS THE FOCUS OF THIS CONTENTION. SUCH CONTINUED CONTENTION IS BOUND TO LEAD TO A NEW WORLD WAR. THIS IS INDEPENDENT OF MAN'S WILL. TODAY IT IS THE COUNTRY WHICH MOST ZEALOUSLY PREACHES PEACE THAT IS THE MOST DANGEROUS SOURCE OF WAR. WE BASE OURSELVES ON INDEPENDENCE, SELF-RELIANCE AND MILLET PLUS RIFLES.

-THE PEOPLE ARE THE MAKERS OF HISTORY. MANKIND ALWAYS ADVANCES IN STORM AND STRESS. THE ROAD IS TORTUOUS, THE FUTURE IS BRIGHT. WE ARE FULL OF OPTIMISM AND CONFIDENCE IN THE FUTURE OF MANKIND.

PRESIDENT FORD'S VISIT TO CHINA IS A MAJOR EVENT IN THE PRESENT INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS. IT IS BENEFICIAL FOR LEADERS OF THE TWO COUNTRIES TO HAVE A DIRECT EXCHANGE OF VIEWS ON ISSUES OF MUTUAL INTEREST. WE WISH PRESIDENT FORD A SUCCESSFUL VISIT.

((TEXT)) A RECEPTION WAS HELD IN PEKING ON 1 RPT 1 DECEMBER IN HONOR OF U.S. PRESIDENT FORD WHO IS CURRENTLY IN CHINA ON OFFICIAL VISIT. TENG HSIAO-PING SPOKE AT THE RECEPTION. HIS SPEECH WAS PUNGENT WITH ANTI-SOVIETISM AND PROVOCATIVE ARGUMENTS. OUR STATION POLITICAL OBSERVER GLEBOV WRITES IN THIS CONNECTION:

AS IS COMMONLY KNOWN, ANGER AND HATRED DO NOT LEAVE GOOD IMPRESSIONS ON PEOPLE'S MIND. NEVERTHELESS, IN THEIR CONVERSATIONS AND MEETINGS WITH FOREIGN POLITICAL ACTIVISTS AND STATESMEN, REPRESENTATIVES OF THE PEKING LEADERSHIP'S INNER CIRCLE ARE FULL OF ANGER AND HATRED IN THEIR PRONOUNCEMENTS. THIS NATURALLY PREVENTS THEM FROM MAKING AN OBJECTIVE ASSESSMENT OF THE INTERNATIONAL SITUATION. WE FIND NO EXCEPTION IN TENG HSIAO-PING'S SPEECH AT THE RECEPTION FOR U.S. PRESIDENT FORD. WHAT MAKES THE MAOIST LEADERSHIP SO ANGRY? PRIMARILY, IT IS THE PROCESS OF INTERNATIONAL DETENTE WHICH RUNS CONTRARY TO THE PEKING ADVENTURISTS' DARK PRONOUNCEMENT ON THE GATHERING STORM AND INEVITABILITY OF A NEW WORLD WAR. CONTRARY TO MAO TSE-TUNG'S PREDICTIONS OF "GREAT DISORDER" AND SO FORTH, THE PROCESS HAS GAINED MOMENTUM AND STRENGTH. WITH THE SOVIET UNION AND THE OTHER SOCIALIST COUNTRIES STANDING IN THE FOREFRONT OF THE DEFENDERS OF PEACE AND PEOPLES' SECURITY AND THE OBVIOUS IMPROVEMENT OF THE WORLD'S POLITICAL CLIMATE AND, TO A GREAT EXTENT, AS A RESULT OF THE UNTIRING ENDEAVOR OF THE SOVIET UNION AND THE OTHER SOCIALIST COUNTRIES AND THEIR STEADFAST SOCIALIST POLICY AND THE GROWTH IN REAL STRENGTH OF THE SOCIALIST COMMUNITY, ALL OF THIS HAS BECOME POSSIBLE. AND ALL OF THIS HAS INVITED THE ANGER OF MAO TSE-TUNG AND HIS CLOSE ASSOCIATES.

MAO TSE-TUNG AND HIS CLOSE ASSOCIATES' ATTEMPT TO IMPOSE THEIR HATRED FOR MANKIND AND THEIR ADVENTURIST POLICY ON THE LEADERS OF WESTERN COUNTRIES HAS BANKRUPTED. THIS, TOO, CAUSES THEIR ANGER AND HATRED. AS WE KNOW, THE PEKING LEADERS TRIED EVERY POSSIBLE MEANS TO SABOTAGE THE CONFERENCE ON SECURITY AND COOPERATION IN EUROPE ((CSCE)), BUT THEIR EFFORTS WERE IN VAIN. THE POLITICAL AND STATE LEADERS OF THIRTY-THREE 33 EUROPEAN COUNTRIES AND THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA DID NOT BELIEVE, IN THE PEKING PROPHETS, BUT, RATHER, INSCRIBED THEIR NAMES ON THE CSCE FINAL ACT. THIS DID NOT HELP MAO TSE-TUNG AND HIS FOLLOWERS TO SOBER UP. RATHER, THEY CONTINUE TO ATTACK THE RESULTS OF THE HELSINKI CONFERENCE AND PERSIST WITH THEIR ATTEMPT TO POISON THE POLITICAL CLIMATE OF EUROPE AND THE WORLD.

THEY TRIED TO FIND AN UNDERSTANDING EAR IN WEST GERMAN CHANCELLOR SCHMIDT, FRENCH FOREIGN MINISTER SAUVAGNARGUES AND U.S. SECRETARY OF STATE KISSINGER IN THEIR TALKS ABOUT THE INEVITABILITY OF WAR, IMPOSSIBILITY OF ELIMINATING TENSION AND DEFENDING PEACE. BUT, THEY FAILED TO WIN THEIR UNDERSTANDING AND SUPPORT. FOR INSTANCE, ACCORDING TO AFP, THE DEPARTURE POINT BETWEEN THE PEKING AUTHORITIES AND THE WESTERN LEADERS IS DRAWN ON THE KEY ISSUES OF WAR AND PEACE AND RELAXATION OF INTERNATIONAL TENSION.

THE FOREIGN PRESS IS FULL OF SHARP REMARKS ON THE MAOIST LEADERSHIP'S ATTEMPT ((? TO INFLUENCE)) OTHER COUNTRIES' POLICES AND POINTS OF VIEW. IT IS INTERESTING TO POINT OUT THE FOLLOWING: THE NEW YORK TIMES WROTE ON THE EVE OF THE PEKING RECEPTION FOR U.S. PRESIDENT FORD THAT "IN AN EFFORT TO UNDERLINE THE FACT THAT THE U.S. GOVERNMENT WILL NOT SACRIFICE DETENTE FOR U.S.-CHINESE RELATIONS, KISSINGER HAS SAID IN HIS SPEECH IN DETROIT THAT A COUNTRY'S POLICY CANNOT BE THE OBJECT OF DICTATE BY ANOTHER COUNTRY." IN THEIR COMMENTS ON THE SPEECHES BY TENG HSIAO-PING AND U.S. PRESIDENT FORD AT THE PEKING RECEPTION, ALL FOREIGN PAPERS AND NEWS AGENCIES HAVE CALLED ATTENTION TO U.S. PRESIDENT FORD'S REPLY TO TENG HSIAO-PING'S PROVOCATIVE REMARKS--THAT THE UNITED STATES IS PREPARED TO CONTINUE TO ENDEAVOR FOR PEACEFUL EXISTENCE.

WHERE DOES THE CAUSE OF THE SERIOUS FAILURES OF THE MAOIST CLIQUE'S FOREIGN POLICY GUIDELINE LIE? THE FAILURES ARE PARTICULARLY OUTSTANDING RECENT YEARS. BLIND WITH THEIR HATRED FOR THE SOVIET UNION AND SOCIALISM, MAO TSE-TUNG AND HIS SERVANTS EITHER FAIL TO SEE OR ARE UNWILLING TO ACCEPT THE OBVIOUS FACT. FOR INSTANCE, THEY DO NOT SEE THAT AS A RESULT OF THE OBVIOUS IMPROVEMENT OF THE INTERNATIONAL CLIMATE A PROFOUND CHANGE HAS TAKEN PLACE IN PEOPLE'S MINDS. PEOPLE HAVE LONGED FOR PEACE, BUT NOW THEY HAVE COME TO REALIZE THAT PEACE CAN BE MAINTAINED. THIS HAS BECOME AN OBJECTIVE POSSIBILITY UNDER SUITABLE CONDITIONS. THUS, THE ASPIRATION AMONG PEOPLE TO OUTLAW WAR FROM THIS AND NEXT GENERATIONS OF MANKIND IS STRONGER THAN EVER. MAO TSE-TUNG'S RIGID STAND ON THE INEVITABILITY OF WAR AND HIS UNCOMPROMISING STRUGGLE AGAINST PEACE AND DETENTE HAVE CAUSED CHINA TO BECOME THE ENEMY OF MANKIND AND HAVE INJURED THE GOOD NAME OF THE CHINESE PEOPLE AND THEIR PEACE-LOVING AND DILIGENT TRADITION IN THE MINDS OF PEOPLES. ALL THIS MAKES MAO TSE-TUNG'S FOREIGN POLICY LINE A MOST HARMFUL, REACTIONARY AND HOPELESS ONE.

HEREWITH SAMPLING LOCAL PRESS COMMENT FORD VISIT:

1. SOUTH CHINA MORNING POST (ENGLISH, CONSERVATIVE): "THE PRESIDENTIAL VISIT HAD THUS GONE SMOOTHLY, THOUGH ON A VERY MUCH MORE SUBDUED NOTE THAN THAT OF MR FORD'S PREDECESSOR, MR RICHARD NIXON. "THE TEMPO OF THE CURRENT PRESIDENTIAL VISIT WILL UNDOUBTEDLY CHANGE AS THE WEEK PASSES AND WHILE MANY A SEASONED OBSERVER HAS BEEN FIRM IN HIS OPINION THAT NO MAJOR BREAKTHROUGH COULD COME ABOUT, THERE COULD NEVER BE A NOTE OF ABSOLUTE CERTAINTY ABOUT SUCH A VISIT."

2. MR. MING PAO (CHINESE, NEUTRAL): "BOTH CHINA AND U.S. DO NOT WISH TO SEE THE OUTBREAK OF A MAJOR WAR; BUT SHOULD SUCH A WAR BE CONSIDERED AS INEVITABLE, CHINA WISHES THAT THE U.S. WILL FIGHT SOVIET RUSSIA FIRST WHILE THE U.S. WISHES THAT CHINA WILL FIGHT THE RUSSIANS FIRST. BUT IT IS NOTEWORTHY THAT LEADERS OF CHINA AND U.S. ARE SERIOUSLY DISCUSSING THE PROBLEM OF DETENTE, AND THIS MEANS THAT THEY ARE SERIOUSLY CONSIDERING A JOINT STRATEGY AGAINST SOVIET RUSSIA. THEIR STRATEGY MAY NOT AGREE, BUT THEIR MAIN COMMON TARGET OF DEALING WITH SOVIET RUSSIA IS SET. AND THIS CAN BE THE FOUNDATION OF A MILITARY ALLIANCE IN THE FUTURE."

3. TIN TIN (CHINESE, CONSERVATIVE): "KNOWING THAT THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE IS ABOUT A PIECE OF WASTE PAPER, FORD STILL GOES ON WITH HIS VISIT TO MAINLAND WITH THE HOPE THAT IT WILL PROMOTE HIS PRESTIGE IN THE COMING PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION AND HELP TO DEAL WITH SOVIET RUSSIA."

4. TIN FENG (CHINESE, PRO PRC): "THERE ARE PEOPLE WHO THINK THAT FORD'S CHINA VISIT IS OF NO IMPORTANCE. THIS IS A VERY CHILDISH VIEW. IN A REALISTIC WORLD, HOW CAN WE SAY THAT IT IS MEANINGLESS FOR SUCH AN IMPORTANT PERSON LIKE THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA TO CROSS THE OCEAN TO VISIT CHINA? CHINESE MEDIA TREATMENT OF PRESIDENT FORD AND HIS PARTY SINCE THEIR
ARRIVAL IN PEKING ON 1 DECEMBER THUS FAR HAS GENERALLY ADHERED TO
THE STRICT PROTOCOL PATTERN FOLLOWED DURING FORMER PRESIDENT NIXON'S
FEBRUARY 1972 CHINA TRIP. THE U.S. DELEGATION'S 2 DECEMBER
"FRIENDLY" MEETING WITH MAO, AS WELL AS INITIAL CHINESE COMMENT
WELCOMING THE VISITORS, UNDERLINED THE MEASURED IMPROVEMENT IN
SINO-U.S. RELATIONS THAT HAS TAKEN PLACE OVER THE PAST THREE YEARS.
HOWEVER, THE CHINESE COMMENT SOFTPEDALED THE NEED FOR FORMAL
NORMALIZATION OF BILATERAL RELATIONS AND STRESSED INSTEAD THE
IMPORTANCE OF COMPATIBILITY IN U.S. AND CHINESE INTERNATIONAL

CHU TE AND FOUR OTHER POLITBURO MEMBERS, INCLUDING MAO'S WIFE CHIANG
CHING, AND WAS THEN FETED AT A WELCOMING BANQUET HOSTED BY TENG
HSIAO-PING AND ATTENDED BY TWO OTHER POLITBURO MEMBERS. TENG LED
THE CHINESE SIDE IN WORKING-LEVEL TALKS WITH THE VISITORS ON 2 AND
3 DECEMBER. ON 2 DECEMBER MAO RECEIVED THE PRESIDENT AND HIS PARTY
FOR WHAT NCNA DESCRIBED AS "EARNEST AND SIGNIFICANT DISCUSSIONS . . .

THE NCNA CHARACTERIZATION OF THE MAO MEETING MARKED AN ADVANCE FROM
NCNA'S DESCRIPTION OF THE 1972 "SERIOUS AND FRANK" DISCUSSIONS MAO
HAD WITH PRESIDENT NIXON. OTHERWISE CHINESE MEDIA HAVE AVOIDED, AS
THEY DID IN 1972, CHARACTERIZING THE ATMOSPHERE AT SINO-U.S. MEETINGS
AND BANQUETS.

PEKING'S MEDIA TREATMENT AGAIN, AS IN 1972, HAS REFLECTED THE FACT
THAT THE U.S. PRESIDENT'S VISIT IS ONE BY A CHIEF OF STATE FROM A
COUNTRY WITH WHICH CHINA LACKS NORMAL DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS. THUS,
THERE WERE NO PEKING REPORTS OF EDITORIAL COMMENT ON THE VISIT OR
POPULAR DEMONSTRATIONS WELCOMING THE PRESIDENT, AND PEKING
CHARACTERIZED THE REMARKS AT THE WELCOMING BANQUET AS "TOASTS"

TENG HSIAO-PING'S REMARKS AT THE 1 DECEMBER BANQUET ECHOED STOCK CHINESE ASSESSMENTS OF SINO-U.S. BILATERAL RELATIONS WHICH HAD BEEN SET FORTH MOST RECENTLY IN FOREIGN MINISTER CHIAO KUAN-HUA'S REMARKS WELCOMING SECRETARY KISSINGER'S VISIT TO CHINA IN OCTOBER. TENG ASSERTED THAT "ON THE WHOLE" RELATIONS HAD IMPROVED, AND HE PRAISED NIXON'S 1972 VISIT AND THE RESULTING SINO-U.S. SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE, CALLING THE LATTER A "UNIQUE INTERNATIONAL DOCUMENT" WHICH UNDERLINED BOTH THE "FUNDAMENTAL DIFFERENCES" AND THE "MANY POINTS IN COMMON" HELD BY THE TWO SIDES. TENG EXPRESSED PEKING'S "WELCOME" TO PRESIDENT FORD'S PAST AFFIRMATIONS THAT THE UNITED STATES YOUTH ABIDE BY THE COMMUNIQUE AND IMPROVE SINO-U.S. RELATIONS, AND HE VOICED ROUTINE CONFIDENCE THAT RELATIONS WOULD BE NORMALIZED "EVENTUALLY" THROUGH BOTH SIDES' "JOINT EFFORTS."

2.) PRC-EDUCATIONAL POLICY: A NEW SHIFT AWAY FROM THE IDEOLOGICALLY MOTIVATED EDUCATIONAL REFORMS ANNOUNCED DURING THE CULTURAL REVOLUTION APPEARS UNDERWAY IN CHINA, AS INDICATED BY RECENT CHINESE PROVINCIAL BROADCASTS URGING IMPROVEMENT IN THE QUALITY OF EDUCATION IN LRI SCHOOLS. THE NEW DRIVE TO RAISE THE QUALITY OF EDUCATION AND ACHIEVE A BETTER BALANCE IN THE SCHOOLS BETWEEN TRADITIONAL ACADEMIC SUBJECTS AND POLITICAL STUDY BEGAN LAST MONTH IN SHANGHAI WITH AN UNUSUALLY FRANK 10 NOVEMBER BROADCAST WARNING THAT IT WAS NOT PERMISSIBLE TO RELAX "INTELLECTUAL EDUCATION." FOLLOWING UP ON ITS ENDORSEMENT OF INTELLECTUAL TRAINING, SHANGHAI RADIO ON 29 NOVEMBER NOTED THAT THE PRESENT OBJECTIVE OF "OPEN DOOR" EDUCATION, A PRINCIPLE USED IN THE CULTURAL REVOLUTION TO ADMIT MANY SCHOLASTICALLY UNQUALIFIED BUT HIGHLY POLITICAL STUDENTS, IS TO DEVELOP A "WELL PLANNED AND WELL ARRANGED PROGRAM SO THAT THE SCHOOL NOT ONLY OPENS ITS DOORS TO SOCIETY BUT ALSO IMPROVES THE QUALITY OF ITS EDUCATION IN THE PROCESS." SHANGHAI'S INITIATIVE IN OPENLY UPGRADING THE QUALITY OF EDUCATION IN LOCAL SCHOOLS WAS EMULATED IN A 29 NOVEMBER BROADCAST FROM NEIGHBORING ANHWEI PROVINCE. THIS BROADCAST CALLED UPON LOCAL SCHOOL OFFICIALS TO PLACE MORE STRESS ON SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH AND TO URGE TEACHERS "TO IMPROVE THEIR PROFESSIONAL LEVELS IN ORDER TO DO THEIR PART IN ACHIEVING THE MODERNIZATION OF AGRICULTURE, INDUSTRY, NATIONAL DEFENSE AND SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY."

3.) PRC-EAST TIMOR: PEKING HAS RESPONDED CAUTIOUSLY TO THE 28 NOVEMBER PROCLAMATION OF EAST TIMOR INDEPENDENCE FROM PORTUGAL AND THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF EAST TIMOR BY THE REVOLUTIONARY FRONT FOR INDEPENDENCE OF EAST TIMOR (FRETELIN). CLAIMING THAT FRETELIN "ACTUALLY GOT CONTROL" OF EAST TIMOR IN MID-AUGUST, A 1 DECEMBER NCNA REPORT FAVORABLY CHARACTERIZED FRETELIN'S ADVOCACY OF THE FORMATION OF A "DEMOCRATIC, ANTICOLONIAL AND ANTI-IMPERIALIST REPUBLIC" AND OF A NONALIGNED FOREIGN POLICY AS "IDEAS WHICH HAVE WON THE SUPPORT OF THE PEOPLE OF EAST TIMOR." 2. ENGLISH LANGUAGE SOUTH CHINA MORNING POST FEATURE STORY INCLUDES FOLLOWING PARAGRAPHS: "THE ICE HAS BEEN BROKEN". THE THIRD DAY OF PRESIDENT GERALD FORD'S CHINA VISIT YESTERDAY PASSED IN A MORE RELAXED MANNER, WITH ALL PARTIES FAR MORE READY TO SPEAK FREELY.

3. "AND THIS OCCURRED, AS EXPECTED, AFTER THE ONE-FOUR-AND-50 MINUTE MEETING PRESIDENT FORD HAD HAD WITH THE AGEING CHAIRMAN MAO TSE-TUNG LATE ON TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

((TEXT)) PEKING, DEC 4 (AFP)--THE ABSENCE OF AN OFFICIAL COMMUNIQUE AT THE END OF PRESIDENT GERALD FORD'S VISIT TO CHINA MARKS THE BEGINNING OF A NEW STYLE IN SINO-AMERICAN RELATIONS. WHEN THEY OPENED THEIR THIRD SESSION OF TALKS AT THE NATIONAL PEOPLE'S CONGRESS HALL HERE TODAY MR FORD AND ACTING LEADER OF THE CHINESE GOVERNMENT, VICE PREMIER TENG HSIAO-PING PLAYED DOWN THE IMPORTANCE OF A FINAL COMMUNIQUE. MR TENG REFERRED TO A COMMUNIQUE AS A "SUPERFICIAL THING" AND FOR MR FORD IT WAS JUST A "PIECE OF PAPER."

MR TENG ADDED THAT THE IMPORTANT THING WAS THE "VISIT ITSELF" AND THE "CONSTRUCTIVE" TALKS WHICH WERE TAKING PLACE.

ONE CHINESE OFFICIAL EMPHASISED THAT THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE ISSUED AT THE END OF FORMER PRESIDENT NIXON'S VISIT IN FEBRUARY 1972 REMAINED THE FUNDAMENTAL DOCUMENT WHICH STILL GOVERNED RELATIONS BETWEEN THE TWO GOVERNMENTS.

TODAY'S MEETING WAS ALSO ATTENDED BY SECRETARY OF STATE HENRY KISSINGER AND CHINESE FOREIGN MINISTER CHIAO KUAN-HUA. WHEN MR FORD ARRIVED FOR THE MEETING MR. TENG GREETED HIM WITH THE WORDS "DID YOU HAVE A GOOD REST." MR FORD REPLIED THAT HE HAD AND SAID HE HOPED THE FINAL SESSION OF TALKS WOULD BE "VERY HELPFUL AND CONSTRUCTIVE AND SIGNIFICANT AS THE ONES BEFORE." MR TENG COMMENTED, "AND WE ARE ALSO VERY HAPPY ABOUT THE FACT THAT THE TWO SIDES ARE SETTING A NEW STYLE THIS TIME, THAT IS, WE DON'T THINK WE ARE COMPELLED TO ISSUE A COMMUNIQUE."

HE ADDED, "WE THINK THE IMPORTANCE LIES IN THE VISIT ITSELF AND THAT OUR TWO SIDES HAVE HAD SIGNIFICANT DISCUSSIONS. WE DON'T THINK THE IMPORTANCE LIES IN SUCH A SUPERFICIAL THING AS A COMMUNIQUE."

BEGIN TEXT:

MR. NESSEN: OVER THE PAST COUPLE OF DAYS YOU HAVE
RECEIVED SUCH A WEALTH OF COLORFUL DETAIL AND SUB-
STANTIVE INFORMATION ABOUT THESE MEETINGS, I DON'T KNOW
WHETHER YOU REALLY NEED TO TALK TO THE SECRETARY TONIGHT.
BUT, IF YOU FEEL THERE ARE ANY SMALL DETAILS YOU HAVEN'T
GOTTEN OVER THE PAST COUPLE OF DAYS, WE HAVE THE SECRETARY
OF STATE. I THINK HENRY WILL HAVE A FEW THINGS TO SAY
TO YOU IN SUMMARY OF THE MEETINGS AND THEN WILL RESPOND TO
YOUR QUESTIONS.

SECRETARY KISSINGER: LET ME SUMMARIZE WHAT HAS GONE ON,

THERE ARE THREE ASPECTS OF OUR RELATIONSHIP. THERE IS
THE ATTITUDE OF BOTH THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC AND THE UNITED

AND SCIENTIFIC EXCHANGES.

RELATIONSHIP IS THE CONCEPTION OF THE INTERNATIONAL

WITH RESPECT TO THE BILATERAL RELATIONSHIPS, WE HAVE AGREED TO PURSUE THEM, AND WE WILL BE IMPROVING THEM. THEY WILL BE IMPROVED STEADILY IN THE CHANNELS APPROPRIATE FOR THEM; THAT IS TO SAY, TRADE, IN THE TRADE CHANNELS, AND THE OTHERS IN THE CHANNELS THAT ARE APPROPRIATE.

THERE HAS BEEN A GREAT DEAL OF SPECULATION THAT RELATIONS BETWEEN THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC AND THE UNITED STATES HAVE COOLED. THIS IS NOT THE PERCEPTION OF THE UNITED STATES, AND I AM CONFIDENT IT IS NOT THE PERCEPTION OF THE CHINESE LEADERS.

WE BELIEVE THAT THE RELATIONS BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA ARE GOOD, AND WE ARE CONFIDENT THAT THEY WILL BE IMPROVED STEADILY IN THE MONTHS AND YEARS AHEAD.

WE REVIEWED THE GLOBAL SITUATION IN CONSIDERABLE DETAIL, BOTH IN THE TALKS BETWEEN THE PRESIDENT AND THE VICE PREMIER, AS WELL AS IN THE RATHER SEARCHING AND DETAILED TALKS THAT TOOK PLACE BETWEEN CHAIRMAN MAO AND THE PRESIDENT.

WHILE OBVIOUSLY THERE ARE SOME DIFFERENCES, THERE ARE ALSO MANY COMMON APPROACHES, AND THE TALKS WERE EXTREMELY USEFUL IN ENABLING THE LEADERS OF BOTH SIDES TO UNDERSTAND THE PERCEPTIONS OF THE OTHER AND TO SEE WHERE PARALLEL POLICIES CAN BE PURSUED.

WITH RESPECT TO THE PROCESS OF NORMALIZATION, THERE IS REALLY LITTLE TO ADD TO WHAT HAS ALREADY BEEN SAID IN THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE AND TO THE FUNDAMENTAL STATEMENTS WHICH WERE MADE THERE EXCEPT TO CONFIRM THAT DIRECTION AGAIN.

AS FOR TRADE, THE EXCHANGES, AS I HAVE SAID, THEY WILL BE CONTINUED AND DEVELOPED IN THE FORUMS THAT ARE APPROPRIATE FOR THEM.

WE ARE SATISFIED WITH THE VISIT. WE THINK THE TALKS HAVE BEEN CONSTRUCTIVE. THE ATMOSPHERE HAS BEEN EXCELLENT. I WAS SOMETIMES SHAKEN WHEN I READ SOME ACCOUNTS OF THE "/LOCAL RESIDENTS" BUT I WAS REASSURED AGAIN WHEN I WENT TO THE MEETINGS. SO, THE ATMOSPHERE WAS GOOD AND THE TALKS WERE, AS I SAID, EXTREMELY USEFUL.

I THINK WITH THIS, I WOULD RATHER GET TO YOUR QUESTIONS AND SEE WHAT MORE I CAN SAY.

I WOULD LIKE TO MENTION ONE THING. DURING THE COURSE OF TODAY, THE VICE PREMIER, IN CONVERSATION WITH THE PRESIDENT THIS MORNING, RESPONDED TO SOME REQUESTS WE HAD MADE TO THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OVER A PERIOD OF MONTHS WITH RESPECT TO INDIVIDUALS THAT HAVE BEEN MISSING IN ACTION IN OR NEAR CHINA OVER THE LAST DECADE, AND WE RECEIVED SOME DETAILED INFORMATION WITH RESPECT TO SOME OF THE REQUESTS THAT HAVE BEEN MADE AND ALSO INFORMATION ABOUT THE REMAINS OF TWO MISSING IN ACTION.

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OBVIOUSLY, WE WILL WANT TO NOTIFY THE NEXT OF KIN, BUT WE APPRECIATE VERY MUCH THIS GESTURE BY THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC.

Q: WILL ANY OF THEM TURN UP ALIVE, DR. KISSINGER?

SECRETARY: NO. WE ARE TALKING ABOUT TWO BODIES AND INFORMATION ABOUT SEVERAL OTHERS. THE BODIES WILL BE RETURNED.

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Q: HOW MANY OTHERS?

SECRETARY: I THINK THE INFORMATION CONCERNED EIGHT PEOPLE ALTOGETHER.

Q: YOU WILL RELEASE INFORMATION ON THE TWO DEAD?

SECRETARY: YES. AS SOON AS THE FAMILIES ARE NOTIFIED, WE WILL RELEASE THAT INFORMATION.

Q: HOW SOON WILL THEY BE NOTIFIED?

SECRETARY: WITHIN THE NEXT 48 HOURS.

Q: WHAT WAS THE TOTAL?

SECRETARY: SEVEN--TWO DEAD, FIVE MISSING.

Q: IF THE 1972 VISIT BY PRESIDENT NIXON WAS THE WEEK THAT CHANGED THE WORLD, HOW WOULD YOU CHARACTERIZE THIS ONE?

SECRETARY: IN 1972, WE ESTABLISHED A NEW RELATIONSHIP, AND IN 1975, THE PROBLEM WAS TO FIT THAT RELATIONSHIP AND TO ELABORATE THAT RELATION IN AN EXISTING ARCHITECTURE. IT, THEREFORE, OBVIOUSLY BY DEFINITION COULD NOT HAVE THE CHARACTER OF A NEW DEPARTURE, BUT IT IS NOW A MORE MATURE RELATIONSHIP IN WHICH ONE NOW DOES NOT DISCUSS HOW TO BEGIN, BUT HOW IN THE PRESENT ENVIRONMENT THE UNITED STATES AND THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA CAN PURSUE PARALLEL POLICIES WHERE THEIR INTERESTS CONVERGE.

Q: CAN YOU, DR. KISSINGER, GIVE US ANY INFORMATION TO ITEMIZE THIS LAST REMARK YOU MADE, SIR?

Q: MAY WE HAVE THE QUESTION AGAIN, SIR?

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SECRETARY: THE QUESTION IS, COULD I GIVE EXAMPLES OF WHERE WE HAVE PARALLELED POLICIES. I WOULD THINK THAT THE UNITED STATES' PERCEPTION AND THE CHINESE PERCEPTION OF THE IMPORTANCE OF EUROPEAN UNITY AND EUROPEAN CO-OPERATION AND EUROPEAN COOPERATION WITH THE UNITED STATES WOULD BE ONE. I THINK THE PERCEPTION OF BOTH COUNTRIES ABOUT THEIR RELATIONSHIP WITH JAPAN WOULD BE VERY SIMILAR, AND IN MANY OTHER PARTS OF THE WORLD, THERE WOULD BE, AS I SAID, PARALLEL CONCEPTIONS. I JUST WANTED TO GIVE SOME EXAMPLES.

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Q: WOULD YOU REJECT THE SUGGESTION THAT THE PARALLEL POLICIES SEEM TO CONVERGE PRIMARILY ON A MUTUAL FEAR OF WHAT THE SOVIET UNION MIGHT BE DOING?

SECRETARY: I WOULD SAY THAT THE PARALLEL POLICIES CONSIST, OR THE PARALLEL VIEWS CONSIST, OF THE PERCEPTIONS OF WHAT IS NEEDED TO MAINTAIN WORLD PEACE AND EQUILIBRIUM?

Q: COULD YOU MENTION HOW MUCH TIME THAT YOU SPENT NEGOTIATING WITH THE CHINESE THAT YOU SPENT ON THE SUBJECT OF SOVIET DETENTE, AND CAN YOU GIVE US SOME INFORMATION ABOUT WHAT THE CHINESE WERE REQUESTING OF THE UNITED STATES AND HOW THE UNITED STATES RESPONDED?

SECRETARY: I DO NOT INTERPRET--FIRST OF ALL, THE CHINESE DID NOT REQUEST ANYTHING OF THE UNITED STATES WITH RESPECT TO DETENTE, AND WE DIDNT REQUEST ANY OF THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA. THE CHINESE, AS IS KNOWN FROM THEIR PUBLIC STATEMENT, AS CANNOT BE AVOIDED IN THEIR PUBLIC STATEMENTS, HAS SOME VERY FIRM VIEWS IN THE NATURE OF THE THREAT THAT THEY BELIEVE THE WORLD FACES.

WE ARE NOT AS CONVINCED OF THE INEVITABILITY OF WAR. BUT, SHOULD THE CHINESE INTERPRETATION BE CORRECT, AND SHOULD THERE BE MILITARY EXPANSION, I BELIEVE THAT THE UNITED STATES WOULD SEE THE PROBLEM QUITE SIMILARLY.

THE UNITED STATES IS OPPOSED TO MILITARY EXPANSION AND WERE IT TO HAPPEN, THE UNITED STATES, AS OUR WHOLE RECORD IN THE POST-WORLD WAR PERIOD MAKES CLEAR FOR 30 YEARS WOULD RESIST IT. WE BELIEVE THAT WE HAVE AN OBLIGATION TO OUR PEOPLE, TO OUR ALLIES, TO SEEK TO IMPROVE INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS.

BUT, WE HAVE ALWAYS MAINTAINED THAT WE WILL NOT DO SO AT THE COST OF VITAL INTERESTS OR THAT WE WILL NOT BUY TIME BY SACRIFICING OTHER COUNTRIES. SO, I THINK WE CAN LET THE FUTURE DETERMINE WHOSE PREDICTION WAS RIGHT.

NOT MUCH TIME WAS SPENT ON THIS. THE STATEMENTS OF BOTH SIDES HAVE SPOKEN FOR THEMSELVES, BUT IT IS NOT A CONTENTIOUS ISSUE AND IT IS NOT ONE IN WHICH EITHER SIDE IS TRYING TO CONVINCE THE OTHER TO ADOPT ITS PREFERRED POLICY.

Q: MR. SECRETARY, COULD YOU SPECIFY WHAT OTHER SUBJECTS THE CHINESE WERE INTERESTED IN, BESIDES IMPRESSING UPON US THE UNWISDOM OF DETENTE?

SECRETARY: I WOULD HAVE TO SAY THAT IN THE CONVERSATIONS THAT TOOK PLACE--YOU ALL HEARD THE TOAST OF THE VICE PREMIER THE FIRST NIGHT. BEYOND THAT STATEMENT, THERE WAS NO OTHER FORMAL STATEMENT OF THIS POINT OF VIEW.

THERE WERE OBVIOUSLY DISCUSSIONS. THERE HAVE TO BE

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DISCUSSIONS WHEN YOU TALK ABOUT THE WORLD SITUATION,
ABOUT THE SOVIET ROLE IN VARIOUS PARTS OF THE WORLD.

THERE WAS A GREAT DEAL OF DISCUSSION, AS I SAID, ON
EUROPE, AND INDEED ON EACH AREA OF THE WORLD, BUT THE
DEBATE ABOUT DETENTE WAS NOT A CENTRAL FEATURE OF THE
DISCUSSION.

Q: DID THE CHINESE DISCUSS THE NEW US GRAIN DEAL WITH
THE SOVIET UNION?

SECRETARY: IT WAS MENTIONED IN PASSING.

Q: WERE THEY CRITICAL OF IT?

Q: QUESTION, PLEASE.

SECRETARY: THE QUESTION WAS WHETHER THE CHINESE WERE
CRITICAL OF THE GRAIN DEAL WITH THE SOVIET UNION.

I WOULD SUPPOSE THAT IF THEY WERE REQUESTED TO SELL GRAIN,
THEY MIGHT MAKE A DIFFERENT DECISION, BUT SINCE WE ARE NOT
TELLING THE CHINESE HOW TO CONDUCT THEIR RELATIONS WITH
THE SOVIET UNION, YOU SHOULD NOT BELIEVE THAT THE MAJOR
THRUST OF THESE DISCUSSIONS IS FOR EITHER SIDE TO TELL THE
OTHER HOW THEY SHOULD CONDUCT THEIR RELATIONS WITH SOME
THIRD PARTY.

SO, THIS WAS MENTIONED IN PASSING AS AN ILLUSTRATION,
BUT IT WAS NOT A CENTRAL FEATURE.

Q: HOW MUCH TIME WAS SPENT ON ANGOLA?

SECRETARY: IT WAS DISCUSSED.

Q: HOW MUCH TIME, SIR?

SECRETARY: THERE WAS AN ANALYSIS OF THE SITUATION.

Q: MR. SECRETARY, WOULD THAT BE AN AREA THIS PROCESS
OF PARALLEL INTEREST COULD BE INCLUDED IN?

SECRETARY: I THINK IT IS NOT APPROPRIATE FOR ME TO
SPEAK FOR THE CHINESE SIDE, BUT I THINK ANGOLA IS A
QUESTION ALSO OF CONCERN HERE.

Q: MR. SECRETARY, HOW MUCH OF THE TIME WAS SPENT IN
DISCUSSION OF THE TAIWAN ISSUE?

SECRETARY: THERE WAS A REVIEW OF THE TAIWAN ISSUE.
THE CHINESE SIDE EXPLAINED AGAIN ITS WELL-KNOWN
POSITION WITH RESPECT TO NORMALIZATION. WE MADE CLEAR
THAT WE REMAIN COMMITTED TO THE PRINCIPLES OF THE

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SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE AND IT IS CLEAR THAT SOME TIME WILL BE NEEDED TO BRING THE PROCESS OF NORMALIZATION TO A FINAL CONCLUSION BUT ALSO THAT THE PROCESS WILL BE CONTINUED TO A FINAL CONCLUSION.

Q: TO FOLLOW THAT, WE WERE TOLD THAT YOU EXPECTED PROGRESS TOWARD NORMALIZATION AND YOU JUST MENTIONED THIS SPECIFIC POINT. SPECIFICALLY WHAT PROGRESS WAS MADE TOWARD NORMALIZATION AND WITH SPECIFIC REFERENCE TO TAIWAN?

SECRETARY: OF COURSE UNTIL NORMALIZATION IS COMPLETED, THERE IS ALWAYS SOME PROGRESS STILL TO BE MADE. AS I HAVE SAID, I EXPECT THAT OVER THE MONTHS TO COME OUR RELATIONS WILL BE IMPROVED IN A NUMBER OF AREAS. THAT IMPROVEMENT BY DEFINITION WILL BE A STEP TOWARDS NORMALIZATION.

THE UNITED STATES, IF YOU READ THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE, IN WHICH WE STATED CERTAIN EXPECTATIONS ABOUT OUR ACTIONS IN THE AREA, AS TENSIONS DIMINISH WITH RESPECT TO OUR TROOP LEVELS, FOR EXAMPLE, WE WILL CONTINUE THAT PROCESS. SO I BELIEVE THAT THE PROCESS OF NORMALIZATION CAN BE SAID TO CONTINUE.

Q: TO WHAT EXTENT DOES THE DIPLOMATIC POSITION OF THE CHINESE COINCIDE WITH THEIR PROPAGANDA?

SECRETARY: ON WHAT SUBJECT?

Q: ON ALL SUBJECTS.

SECRETARY: THE QUESTION IS: TO WHAT EXTENT DO THE PRIVATE POSITIONS COINCIDE WITH THEIR PUBLIC PROPAGANDA?

OF COURSE I DON'T FOLLOW THE PUBLIC PROPAGANDA AS MUCH AS THOSE OF YOU WHO ARE HERE AND I AM MORE FAMILIAR WITH THE PRIVATE COMMENTS AND, THEREFORE, I AM NOT A GOOD WITNESS ON THIS SUBJECT.

Q: SIR, YOU ARE SPEAKING IN CODE WORDS ON THE SUBJECT OF TAIWAN. WHAT DOES NORMALIZATION MEAN? WHAT DO THE CHINESE EXPECT US TO DO, AND WHAT IS NECESSARY BEFORE THAT ISSUE CAN BE NORMALIZED?

SECRETARY: I THINK THE CHINESE HAVE MADE CLEAR THAT THE GENERAL MODEL THAT THEY WANT IS SOMETHING SIMILAR TO THE JAPANESE MODEL. I THINK WE HAVE ALSO MADE CLEAR THAT IT WILL TAKE TIME FOR THIS PROCESS TO MATURE AND FOR CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES TO EXIST. WE HAVE POINTED OUT OUR INTERESTS IN A PEACEFUL SOLUTION, IN AN ULTIMATE PEACEFUL SOLUTION TO THE PROBLEM.

Q: MR. SECRETARY, DID YOU HAVE ANY DISCUSSION--

SECRETARY: WE MADE THAT CLEAR IN THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE.

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Q: -- ABOUT POSSIBLE ASSISTANCE TO THE CHINESE IN DEVELOPMENTS OF THEIR OFF-SHORE OIL?

SECRETARY: QUESTIONS LIKE THAT WOULD BE DISCUSSED IN THE TRADE CHANNELS.

Q: DID KOREA COME UP AT ALL?

SECRETARY: KOREA WAS DISCUSSED, BUT I WOULD SAY OUR VIEWS ON THAT SUBJECT ARE NOT IDENTICAL BUT THEY ARE UNDERSTOOD, AND WE HOPE THAT BOTH SIDES WILL EXERCISE RESTRAINT IN THE KOREAN PENINSULA.

Q: WERE THERE POLICIES BEFORE THESE MEETINGS THAT SEEMED TO BE CONVERGING THAT ARE NOW BACK ON WHAT YOU CALL PARALLEL TRACKS AS A RESULT OF THESE TALKS AND, IF THEY WERE, CAN YOU BE SPECIFIC WHICH ONES?

SECRETARY: I BELIEVE THAT EVEN PRIOR TO THIS MEETING THERE WAS A PERHAPS EXCESSIVE EMPHASIS ON CERTAIN PARTIAL PUBLIC STATEMENTS, SO I HAVE NEVER SUBSCRIBED TO SOME OF THE INTERPRETATIONS THAT WERE MADE, EVEN PRIOR TO THE MEETING, BUT I WOULD SAY WHATEVER MAY HAVE BEEN THE SITUATION PRIOR TO THE MEETING, I MAINTAIN MY POSITION.

IT IS MY FIRM IMPRESSION THAT THIS IS SHARED BY OUR CHINESE HOSTS, THAT OUR RELATIONS ARE GOOD AND THAT IN CERTAIN AREAS WE WILL BE PURSUING BETTER ACCORDS.

Q: DID YOU SENSE ANY CONCERN ON THE PART OF THE CHINESE ABOUT THE ABILITY OF THE AMERICAN EXECUTIVE BRANCH TO CARRY OUT ITS FOREIGN POLICY AS PLANNED BY YOU AND THE PRESIDENT?

Q: QUESTION, PLEASE?

SECRETARY: THE QUESTION IS WHETHER I NOTICED ANY CONCERN ON THE PART OF OUR CHINESE HOSTS IN OUR ABILITY TO CARRY OUT OUR POLICIES, OR OUR DECLARED POLICY.

I THINK YOU WILL AGREE WITH ME OUR CHINESE HOSTS ARE EXTREMELY POLITE AND THEY WOULD NOT EXPRESS SUCH THOUGHTS.

Q: IN VIEW OF THE FACT SO LITTLE SEEMS TO HAVE HAPPENED HERE, COULD YOU EXPLAIN THE SECRETIVENESS OVER THE PAST FOUR DAYS?

SECRETARY: PETER, IT DEPENDS ON YOUR DEFINITION OF "LITTLE."

Q: EVEN IF A GREAT DEAL HAPPENED, COULD YOU EXPLAIN THE SECRETIVENESS ON OUR PART OVER THE PAST FOUR DAYS?

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SECRETARY: WE HAD AGREED WITH OUR CHINESE HOSTS, AND WE HAVE TENDED TO FOLLOW IN THESE MATTERS THE PRACTICES OF OURS THAT THE BRIEFING SHOULD TAKE PLACE ONLY AT THE END OF THE VISIT.

THIS WAS APPROPRIATE BECAUSE THE DISCUSSIONS WERE IN GREAT DETAIL AND ON A RATHER BROAD SCOPE, AND WE COULDN'T HAVE SAID MORE AT THE END OF EVERY DAY THAN I AM SAYING TONIGHT, AND I THINK TONIGHT WE ARE IN A BETTER POSITION TO DRAW THE RESULTS OF IT.

Q: MR. SECRETARY, WERE THERE ANY AGREEMENTS REACHED WITH THE CHINESE FOR POSITIVE ACTIONS IN ANY FIELD FOR TRADE OR INTERNATIONAL POLICY?

SECRETARY: I THINK WHEN THE LEADERS OF TWO COUNTRIES REVIEW THE INTERNATIONAL SITUATION AND APPROACH A CLEARER UNDERSTANDING OF WHAT PARALLEL INTERESTS THEY HAVE, THAT THIS IS BOUND TO HAVE PRACTICAL RESULTS.

WITH RESPECT TO THE SPECIFIC ISSUES LIKE TRADE, AS I POINTED OUT, THERE WAS AGREEMENT REACHED TO PURSUE THOSE, TO PURSUE POSSIBLE INTENSIFICATION IN EXISTING CHANNELS.

Q: DR. KISSINGER, I WONDER IF YOU COULD CLARIFY ONE POINT, PLEASE. YOU TALKED ABOUT THE CHINESE MAKING CLEAR THE JAPANESE POSITION VIS-A-VIS TAIWAN. YOU SAID, "WE MADE IT CLEAR IT WILL TAKE TIME FOR THIS PROCESS." DOES THAT SUGGEST THERE IS SOME SORT OF CALENDAR WHEN THE UNITED STATES WILL BREAK DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS WITH TAIWAN?

SECRETARY: NO, THERE IS NO AGREED CALENDAR.

Q: IN THAT RESPECT, DID OUR SIDE, THE AMERICAN SIDE, SAY ANYTHING ABOUT THE FACT THAT DOMESTIC POLITICS, AS DEVELOPING OVER THE NEXT YEAR, MAY HAVE SOME DELAYING EFFECT ON THIS PROCESS?

SECRETARY: OBVIOUSLY, ALL OF THESE MATTERS HAVE DOMESTIC COMPONENTS ON BOTH SIDES AND BOTH SIDES HAVE TO BE SENSITIVE TO THE -- EACH SIDE HAS TO BE SENSITIVE TO THE NECESSITIES OF THE OTHER.

Q: THIS IS THE END OF THE --

Q: PLEASE FINISH THAT ANSWER.

SECRETARY: I HAVE FINISHED THAT ANSWER.

Q: THIS IS THE END OF THE FIVE-YEAR PLAN. DID THEY SPEAK ABOUT THE NEXT FIVE-YEAR PLAN OR WHAT IT WOULD CONCERN?

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SECRETARY: NOT IN MY HEARING.

Q: MR. SECRETARY, CAN YOU TELL US WHEN THE DECISION WAS TAKEN NOT TO HAVE A COMMUNIQUE? WAS IT HERE OR IN WASHINGTON BEFORE YOU LEFT WASHINGTON?

SECRETARY: THE DECISION WAS TAKEN IN A PRELIMINARY WAY AT THE END OF MY LAST VISIT, AND IT WAS CONFIRMED ON THE FIRST DAY IN MY DISCUSSIONS WITH THE FOREIGN MINISTER.

Q: WHY WAS IT DECIDED THERE WOULD BE NO COMMUNIQUE?

Q: QUESTION?

SECRETARY: FIRST OF ALL, WE HAVE BOTH SAID IT IN THE VARIOUS TOASTS.

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Q: WHAT WAS THE QUESTION?

SECRETARY: THE QUESTION IS, WHY WAS IT DECIDED TO HAVE NO COMMUNIQUE.

ONE REASON, NOT NECESSARILY IN ORDER OF IMPORTANCE, WAS THAT THE SUBSTANCE OF WHAT I SAID HERE HAS ALREADY BEEN SAID IN VARIOUS PUBLIC STATEMENTS. SECONDLY, WE DID NOT WANT TO SPEND THE TIME THAT IS NEEDED TO PREPARE SUCH A COMMUNIQUE. BUT MOST IMPORTANTLY, SINCE ON THE BASIC PRINCIPLES, ESPECIALLY ON TAIWAN, THERE REALLY ISN'T MUCH THAT CAN BE ADDED TO WHAT WAS SAID IN THE SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE AS TO THE DIRECTION. IT DID NOT SEEM APPROPRIATE OR WORTHWHILE TO TRY TO FIND SOME NUANCES ON THAT PARTICULAR ISSUE.

Q: NEITHER SIDE SEEMS PREPARED TO CHANGE ON THE TAIWAN ISSUE. HOW CAN YOU SAY THIS WHOLESOME RELATIONSHIP WILL IN FACT KEEP GOING ON LINE IN THE FUTURE?

SECRETARY: I HAVE SAID THIS IS OUR INTENTION, WHICH WE HAVE REPEATEDLY REAFFIRMED IN PUBLIC STATEMENTS, AND THAT WE WILL WORK OUT WITH DILIGENCE OVER TIME.

Q: IS THERE INDICATION THAT EITHER SIDE IS WILLING TO CHANGE AT ALL?

SECRETARY: I SAID WE WILL WANT TO WORK THIS OUT OVER TIME.

Q: DID PRESIDENT FORD EXTEND ANY INVITATION TO THE CHINESE LEADERS TO VISIT THE UNITED STATES?

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SECRETARY: THEY HAVE A STANDING INVITATION, AND THEY HAVE REAFFIRMED A STANDING OBSTACLE.

Q: MR. SECRETARY, ON THE SUBJECT OF KOREA --

Q: WHAT ARE THE OBSTACLES?

SECRETARY: THAT THEY DON'T WANT TO VISIT WASHINGTON UNTIL FULL NORMALIZATION HAS BEEN ACHIEVED.

Q: MR. SECRETARY, CAN YOU ELABORATE ON THE KOREAN QUESTION? WAS THERE ANY EXPLICIT REQUEST THAT THE UNITED STATES WITHDRAW FORCES FROM SOUTH KOREA?

SECRETARY: I THINK THE CHINESE POSITION ON KOREA HAS BEEN STATED REPEATEDLY. I THINK IT IS CLEAR THAT IN THE PRESENT INTERNATIONAL CONTEXT, ANY EXACERBATION OF THE SITUATION BY EITHER SIDE WOULD NOT SERVE COMMON PURPOSES, AND WE THINK THAT THIS IS UNDERSTOOD BY BOTH SIDES.

Q: SIR, IN DISCUSSING THE KOREAN QUESTION, WAS THERE A SUGGESTION THAT CHINA AND THE UNITED STATES HAD A COOPERATIVE ROLE IN PERHAPS RESTRAINING THEIR RESPECTIVE FRIENDS IN THE NORTH AND SOUTH?

SECRETARY: I THINK I HAVE POINTED OUT THAT OUR PERCEPTIONS IN KOREA ARE NOT IDENTICAL. WHAT CONCLUSIONS EACH SIDE SHOULD DRAW FROM THE NEED FOR RESTRAINT I THINK IS FOR EACH SIDE TO DETERMINE.

IF YOU DON'T LET ME OUT OF HERE SOON, I AM GOING TO BE DECLARED PERSONA NON GRATA. I HOPE YOU REALIZE THAT.

Q: BY WHOM?

Q: NO MATTER HOW VALUABLE AN EXCHANGE OF VIEWS MIGHT BE, WOULD YOU SAY THIS MEETING AMOUNTED TO AN EXCHANGE OF VIEWS AND NOTHING MORE THAN THAT?

SECRETARY: NO, I WOULD SAY THIS MEETING AMOUNTED TO A VERY DETAILED, TO A VERY SUBSTANTIAL, AND IN MANY AREAS VERY CONCRETE DISCUSSIONS THAT WENT BEYOND AN EXCHANGE OF VIEWS, BUT GIVEN THE SCOPE OF IT, IT IS NOT NECESSARILY SOMETHING THAT CAN BE ENCOMPASSED IN ONE DOCUMENT.

Q: HAS THE DECISION IN FACT BEEN MADE NOW THAT WHEN THERE WILL BE NORMALIZATION WITH TAIWAN -- I MEAN, NORMALIZATION BETWEEN PEKING AND WASHINGTON -- THAT IT WILL BE CONDUCTED ON THE BASIS OF THE JAPANESE MODEL?

SECRETARY: I THINK THAT WILL HAVE TO BE DECIDED WHEN THE NORMALIZATION IN FACT TAKES PLACE.

Q: YOU SUGGESTED THAT BEFORE.

SECRETARY: I SUGGESTED THIS IS THE CHINESE POSITION, WHICH WE UNDERSTAND.

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Q: WHAT DO WE DO ABOUT THE DEFENSE TREATY?

SECRETARY: I THINK CHINA HAS MADE CLEAR ITS VIEW AND OBVIOUSLY, IF WE WERE PREPARED TO ANSWER ALL THOSE QUESTIONS NOW, WE COULD HAVE SETTLED THE ISSUE RIGHT NOW.

Q: DR. KISSINGER, DID THE PRESIDENT INDICATE TO THE CHINESE LEADERS THAT, IF HE IS STILL IN OFFICE IN 1977, THAT THE TIMING WOULD BE BETTER TOWARD MAKING SPECIFIC PROGRESS TOWARD NORMALIZATION?

SECRETARY: THE DISCUSSION DID NOT REACH THAT DEGREE OF CONCERN ABOUT SPECIFIC EVENTS ON OUR DOMESTIC CALENDAR. BUT, AS I SAID, BOTH SIDES HAVE TO BE SENSITIVE TO THE DOMESTIC REQUIREMENTS OF THE OTHER.

Q: WHY DOES THE UNITED STATES DISAGREE WITH THE CHINESE POSITION ON THE INEVITABILITY OF WAR?

SECRETARY: BECAUSE WE BELIEVE THAT WAR CAN BE AVOIDED BY A COMBINATION OF FIRMNESS, PREPAREDNESS AND WILLINGNESS TO SETTLE OUTSTANDING ISSUES, AND THAT IS OUR POLICY.

MR. NESSEN: LET'S HAVE TWO MORE QUESTIONS.

Q: WHAT IS THE DATE ON WHICH YOU ARE GOING TO MOSCOW?

SECRETARY: THE DECISION ABOUT GOING TO MOSCOW HAS NOT YET FINALLY BEEN MADE, BUT IT WILL BE DECIDED WITHIN THE NEXT WEEK OR SO. BUT, THERE IS A GOOD CHANCE THAT I WILL GO.

Q: YOU SAID THERE WILL BE SOME IMPROVEMENT NOT TOWARDS NORMALIZATION, BUT SOME IMPROVEMENT IN THE RELATIONS BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES IN THE MONTHS TO COME. YOU MENTIONED BROAD AREAS LIKE CULTURAL EXCHANGES AND TRADE. CAN YOU BE A LITTLE BIT MORE SPECIFIC ABOUT WHAT WE CAN EXPECT.

SECRETARY: THAT WILL HAVE TO BE WORKED OUT IN DETAIL.

Q: YOU SAID THERE WAS NO COOLNESS IN THE MEETINGS. DID YOU DISCOVER ANY WARMNESS IN THE SPEECH BY MR. TENG HSIAO-PING TONIGHT?

SECRETARY: I THINK FOR THOSE WHO UNDERSTAND THE ENTIRE CHINESE CONTEXT, THE REQUIREMENT OF THE CHINESE SITUATION AND THEIR METHOD OF EXPRESSING THEMSELVES, I

BELIEVE IT EXPRESSED WHAT I HAVE STATED: THE CHINESE COMMITMENT TO GOOD RELATIONS WITH THE UNITED STATES.

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I AM CONFIDENT OUR CHINESE HOSTS, IF YOU ARE IN CONTACT WITH THEM, WILL CONFIRM THIS.

Q: MR. TENG DEVOTED ONLY ONE SENTENCE OF HIS TOAST TO THE TALKS. THERE IS ONLY ONE SENTENCE IN THAT TOAST IN WHICH HE DEVOTED HIMSELF TO THE TALKS.

SECRETARY: I HAVEN'T COUNTED THE NUMBER OF SENTENCES THAT THE PRESIDENT DEVOTED TO THE TALKS AND I HAVEN'T ANALYZED WHAT MR. TENG SAID WITH THAT CARE. I CAN ONLY TELL YOU WHAT OUR IMPRESSION IS, AN IMPRESSION WE TOOK OBVIOUSLY SINCE WE ARE BRIEFING HERE IN CHINA, WE TOOK SOME CARE TO CHECK WITH OUR CHINESE HOSTS AND I AM CONFIDENT WHAT I HAVE SAID HERE REFLECTS A VIEW THAT WILL NOT BE DISPUTED.

MR. NESSEN: LET'S HAVE THE LAST QUESTION FROM BOB.

Q: BEFORE THE TRIP YOU SAID SOVIET-AMERICAN RELATIONS WERE NOT A BAR TO BETTER RELATIONS WITH CHINA. DO YOU STILL FEEL THAT WAY?

SECRETARY: I STILL FEEL THAT WAY, YES. ANY MORE THAN WE WILL PERMIT -- WHEN WE ARE IN MOSCOW, WE DO NOT DISCUSS OUR RELATIONS WITH CHINA. BUT I WOULD MAINTAIN WHAT I HAVE SAID.

Q: IS THERE ANYTHING MORE YOU CAN TELL US ABOUT THE FRIENDLY FORD MEETING WITH CHAIRMAN MAO, THAT IS BOTH AS TO ATTITUDE AND SUBSTANCE AND CAN YOU TELL US WHETHER HE HIMSELF MADE ANY EXPRESSION ON THE CHINESE POSITION ON DETENTE?

SECRETARY: THE ATMOSPHERE -- THIS WAS THE FIFTH MEETING WITH CHAIRMAN MAO THAT I HAVE HAD AN OPPORTUNITY TO ATTEND. I WOULD DESCRIBE THE ATMOSPHERE AS FRIENDLY AND CORDIAL. THE DISCUSSIONS DID NOT CONCERN DETENTE EXCEPT IN A VERY MINIMAL WAY, A REALLY MINIMAL WAY.

OF COURSE, I HAD THE BENEFIT OF THE CHAIRMAN'S VIEWS ON THAT SUBJECT A FEW WEEKS EARLIER. THE OVERWHELMING PART OF THE CONVERSATION CONCERNED A REVIEW OF THE WORLD SITUATION BUT NOT OF AMERICAN DETENTE POLICY, WHICH PLAYED A VERY MINIMAL ROLE IN THE DISCUSSIONS.

Q: CAN YOU GIVE US AN IDEA OF WHAT SUBSTANTIVE AREAS WERE DISCUSSED IN THAT MEETING?

SECRETARY: IT WAS A GENERAL REVIEW OF THE WORLD SITUATION IN ALMOST EVERY PART OF THE WORLD.

SUBJECT: Your Participation in Mrs. Ford's Visit

On December 3, Mrs. Ford will visit the Palace Museum and the Peking Dance School. She boards the motorcade at Guest House Number 18 escorted by a Chinese official. You should be there at approximately 10:15 A.M. You will ride in Car Number 2 with Sheila Weidenfeld who works with Mrs. Ford on press (The advance man, Mr. Sorum, and her photographer, Mr. Kinley, will be in the second car.) The visit will end at 11:30 A.M. when Mrs. Ford concludes her tour and boards the motorcade to return to the Guest House.

At 1:30 P.M., Mrs. Ford will leave the Guest House for the Peking Dance School. You should arrive approximately at 1:15 P.M. At the Dance School, she will be given the tea and explanation after which she will visit classrooms on the Fourth Floor. She then will come back down to the auditorium where she will watch a short performance. At some point, the students will teach her a dance step. The motorcade will leave the Peking Dance School to return to the Guest House at 3:05 P.M.

On Thursday, December 4 due to the President's visit to the USLO Residence, you will not accompany Mrs. Ford to the carpet factory. She will arrive at USLO Residence from the carpet factory at 11:50 A.M. accompanied by Susan Ford. She will enter to greet USLO personnel. The President will arrive at 11:55 A.M. A scenario for his visit is attached. We do not yet know whether Mrs. Ford and her party of seven will remain for lunch. If she does remain, she and Susan may prefer to eat upstairs. We also have not been informed whether Secretary Kissinger, General Scowcroft, Mr. Habib, Mr. Lord and Mr. Solomon will remain. Nor do we know whether Mr. Hartmann and Mr. Sisco will accompany the motorcade. The list of those who may be present is attached. The President will lunch separately with Mr. Bush in the USLO office building conference room. Since they will be alone, sandwiches and soup will be the best solution to the logistic problem.

The President will leave at 1:30 P.M. to go directly to the Summer Palace. You and Mr. Bush should escort him to his automobile directly in front of the USLO Residence.

the direction and goal defined in the Shanghai Communique. Both sides agree that the Shanghai Communique is a document of historic significance and constitutes the basis of Sino-U.S. relations. As facts prove, it remains full of vitality today.

President and Mrs. Ford and their party have also visited places of interest in Peking and come into contact with people of various circles in our capital. Our American guests must have found that the Chinese people are friendly to the American people. On the eve of the departure of President and Mrs. Ford from China, I would like to take this opportunity to convey the best wishes of the Chinese people for the American people.

I wish President and Mrs. Ford and their party a pleasant journey.

In conclusion, I propose a toast
to the friendship between the Chinese and American peoples,

to the health of President and Mrs. Ford,
to the health of the other American guests, and
to the health of our comrades and friends present!

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PRESIDENT'S TOAST AT RETURN BANQUET

December 4, 1975

Mr. Vice Premier, Mr. Foreign Minister, and all Chinese friends here tonight.

On behalf of Mrs. Ford and all the Americans present, I extend to you a warm welcome.

Tomorrow morning we leave China. It has been a significant visit.

The wide-ranging talks which I have held with Chairman Mao and with Vice Premier Teng have been friendly, candid, substantial and constructive. We discussed our differences, which are natural in a relationship between two countries whose ideologies, societies, and circumstances diverge. But we also confirmed that we have important common points.

We reviewed our bilateral relationship. The visit confirmed that although our relations are not yet normalized, they are good; they will be gradually improved because we both believe that a strengthening of our ties benefits our two peoples. I am confident that through our mutual efforts we can continue to build a relationship which advances the national interests of the United States and the People's Republic of China. In our talks, I reaffirmed that the United States is committed to complete the normalization of relations with the People's Republic of China on the basis of the Shanghai Communiqué.

Our bilateral ties are important. But both of us attach even greater significance to the international aspects of our relationship. It was certain common perceptions and common interests which brought our countries together four years ago. Among these is our agreement not to seek hegemony over others and our fundamental opposition to the efforts of others to impose hegemony in any part of the world. This reflects the realism which is a hallmark of our relationship. And realism is a firmer basis than sentiment for sound and durable ties.

It is only natural that the People's Republic of China and the United States will follow their own policies and tactics, governed by their perceptions of their own national interests. The United States is firmly dedicated to an international order of peace, justice and prosperity for all. The task which confronts us -- which confronts all peoples of the world -- is not easy. It requires both firmness of principle and tactics adapted to particular circumstances. It requires national strength and the will to use it, as well as prudence to avoid unnecessary conflict. It requires acceptance of peaceful change to accommodate human aspirations for progress. All must help to build a durable and equitable international system, though inevitably contributions will often be diverse.

I believe that our discussions this week have significantly promoted those objectives we share concerning both our bilateral relations and the international

scene. They will benefit our two peoples as well as the peoples of the world.

In closing, I wish to express the sincere appreciation of Mrs. Ford and myself, and those traveling with us, for the warm hospitality we have received. Mr. Vice Premier, I hope that you will convey my personal thanks to all who have helped to make our visit so pleasurable.

I ask you to join me in a toast:

- to the health of Chairman Mao;
- to the health of Premier Chou En-lai;
- to the health of Vice Premier Teng Hsiao-ping;
- to the health of all Chinese friends here tonight;
- to the friendship between the American and Chinese people.

Monday Afternoon: Airport arrival (incl. children)

Monday Evening: Welcome banquet

Tuesday Evening: Ballet

Wednesday Evening: Sports event (incl. children)

Thursday Noon: Reception at USLO (incl. children)

Thursday Evening: Return banquet

Friday Morning: Airport departure (incl. children)

Attached is the USLO bus transportation schedule, except for the airport arrival ceremony. You must be prepared to leave USLO for each event at the time indicated.

Monday afternoon airport arrival: The President arrives at 3:00 p.m. and airport ceremonies will last about 25 minutes. USLO bus will depart at 1:35 p.m. You should arrive at USLO at least 10 minutes before this. After arrival at the airport, you will be conducted to the tarmac to a special USLO section. After the President leaves, you will return to USLO by bus, arriving back here before 4:30.

Monday evening welcome banquet: Your bus departs USLO at 1830 and arrives at the northern entrance of the Great Hall of the People, ~~between 1840 and 1950~~. Go inside, but stay together so that when called you can move as a group to the stand at the top of the grand staircase where, around 1930, you will be photographed with the President and his official party, some other visiting Americans, and the principal Chinese hosts. After the picture is taken, remain in place until you are invited to go into the Banquet Hall. As you enter the Banquet Hall, go directly to your assigned table but remain standing until the President and Vice Premier are seated. At the conclusion of the banquet, remain at your table for five minutes after the principals depart. Leave by the grand staircase and north entrance.

Tuesday evening ballet: Your bus departs USLO at 1820 and will take you to the eastern entrance of the Great Hall of the People. On entering you will be guided to elevators to the third floor, and then to a waiting area outside the auditorium. There, stay together and await invitation to go into the auditorium, where there will be open seating except in the area down front reserved for the President's party and the principal Chinese hosts. At the conclusion of the show, remain at your places for a few minutes until a signal is given. Leave by the same route as on entering.

Wednesday evening sport event: On arrival at the stadium, you will be shown directly to the seating area (which is expected to be in the upper tiers of the enclosed area of the grandstand). Everyone will be expected to be seated well before the President and the official party enter the stadium at approximately 7:55 p.m. The combined pingpong, martial arts and gymnastic show is expected to last one hour and 15 minutes. When the event concludes, the USLO group will wait until the President and the official party have left the stadium before leaving as they came in and returning to USLO.

Thursday noon reception at USLO: USLO staff, with wives and children should be at the residence at 11:30 a.m. Mrs. Ford, the President and Mr. Bush, plus some White House staff and members of the official party, will arrive at USLO starting at about 11:50. They will remain in the residence until about 12:40. At the residence, the President will informally greet USLO staff and families and may say a few words to the staff. Some USLO staff members may be asked to stay on at the residence after 12:40. A small press and TV pool will remain at the residence for the first five minutes or so after the President arrives.

Thursday evening return banquet: The USLO bus departs at 1800 and will take you to the northern entrance of the Great Hall of the People. Wait downstairs in a group until invited to proceed to the Banquet Hall (no picture this time). As you enter the Banquet Hall, go directly to your assigned table. At the conclusion of the banquet, remain at your table for about five minutes after the principals depart. Leave by the grand staircase and north entrance.

Friday morning airport departure: The USLO bus will leave at 7:30. The President's plane is scheduled to lift off at 9:30.

Guest House: Attached is a list of automobiles that have been cleared for access to the Guest House. No others will be permitted to enter the grounds.

Guest House control office: Mr. Ogden will man the USLO Guest House control office throughout President's visit, assisted by Jan Hunt. This telephone is neither a White House phone number nor an extension of the Minzu Hotel. It is a direct dial Chinese system telephone.

Gift Officer: Mr. Thomas will serve as liaison with both the State Department gift officer and the Chinese on all questions related to gifts.

Use of cameras: Limited and discreet use of cameras by USLO staff will be permitted at the airport, ballet and sports events, providing no flash shots are attempted. Cameras also may be similarly used during the President's visit to USLO.

THRU: GENERAL SCOWCROFT ONLY

Brent, please pass the following to the President. I hope it will be shared only with SecState and not be passed to NSC staff or Department. It is pure politics, but I feel strongly about it.

QUOTE: Dear Mr. President:

After talking to Rog Morton when he was out here about domestic politics, I have a better feel for what is happening at home. It is his impression and mine that there is little focus in the US on the political aspects of your trip to China.

The Taiwan issue is on the back burner right now as it relates to domestic politics. I am very concerned that as your trip to China approaches this will change dramatically. Your own personal interests dictate that serious thought be given to what is possible from a purely political standpoint.

Answers to the Taiwan question that may have been possible before the collapse in Cambodia and Viet Nam may no longer be any answers at all. I would strongly suggest the following:

(a) An in-depth poll be taken to measure public opinion on various solutions to the Taiwan question (the last poll, I believe, was by Gallup late last year). The poll should probe into opinion of conservatives and liberals and should sound out attitudes towards various solutions. Obviously this polling should be done in great confidence and commissioned by outside sources.

(b) An in-depth research job be done on what the Conservatives in the US have said and are likely to say on this issue.

A similar study should be undertaken on what the leading Democrats have been saying. N.B.: It seems to me that your political problems arising from this issue are quite different pre-GOP convention compared to post-GOP convention.

(c) Thought be given as to how to keep this issue from building into a major weapon for your opponents be they Republican or Democrat. Some will try to paint a China visit without a final solution to Taiwan as a diplomatic failure, an inability to solve the tough problems. Others, particularly the right wing, will soon start criticizing the visit itself and will be on guard to immediately criticize any concessions as a sell-out of Taiwan.

In this communication I am not attempting to go into the foreign policy merits of China options. I firmly believe, however, that your coming to Peking this year, whatever the concrete results, is the right thing to do. What is done at this stage to assess the politics of the visit should be separate from the foreign policy machinery and not in any way inhibit the thinking and planning which undoubtedly is going forward at the State Department and NSC. I am suggesting that a trusted confidant, who would not be involved with this planning be encouraged to think out the domestic political implications of your China visit.

I have already discussed with the State Department my concern that work need be done fairly soon to minimize expectations. Many journalists are saying, "The President can't possibly go to China without solving the Taiwan problem."

It is to your advantage to have this talk dampened, so that expectations be realistic not euphoric and that a visit that does not solve the big Taiwan problem will not, post facto, be considered a diplomatic failure.

Pardon my intrusion on your busy schedule, but, based on my own political past, I worry that this issue can build into a political nightmare unless a lot of pure political thought gets into it soon.

Barbara and I are happy out here. We feel we are most fortunate to be in this fascinating job in this fascinating land.
