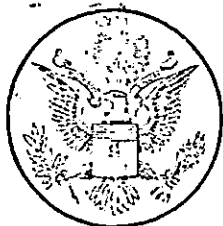

I hope your vacation turned out to be everything you wanted of it and that your mother as well as all the rest of the family are in good health. As you probably heard this has not been a very good summer weather wise for the Eastern seaboard. I thought I'd drop you a note just to let you know our situation and pose a few routine questions.

my budget sessions will be over by November?  
We can leave here any time after that. The best time is November but any time is fine as long as we are back by the end of the year. Have done a little research and I now know that we will fly New York to Athens on TWA and from Athens to Liking on Air France, Swissair or Pakistani Airways. We will be flying space available so that way we get 95% off the rate. There are several flights out of Athens so if space is not available the day we pick there's a good chance we will get out the following day. So far we have never missed a flight and we've been flying this way for three

years. We will have tickets on all three airlines.

As you know we really don't know the situation or travel restrictions. If it is possible we would like to go by train from Peking to Shanghai to Canton and on into Hong Kong. I think I would like to give  
back today. I was impressed. Just get  
back from Washington - an industry meeting -  
the National Association of Food Chains. We  
had Rhodes, Murphy, Dunlop and Ford  
addressing the group. I'll see you then -  
Hubert is a hell of a speaker - he had done  
his homework and I believe impressed  
a relatively hostile audience. Please come

These should be presented with yours and Skipper's applications for visa to the People's Republic of China Liaison Office, 2300 Connecticut Ave., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20008. By way of date, why don't you shoot for five or six days during the week starting October 13. I say five or six days because most guests find they can "do" Peking pretty well in that length of time.

One suggestion would be that you come in to Peking via Tokyo and that you exit via Hong Kong. You can request travel to Shanghai or some other interesting city after leaving Peking. You must do that once you are here, however. A suggested itinerary might be as follows: arrive Peking from Tokyo at 1500 hours on Monday, October 13 (JAL 786); stay in Peking until Saturday or Sunday, October 18 or 19; then take a train to Nanking or Shanghai (an overnight train trip), spend a day or so in Shanghai; then fly to Canton for one day and night; take the train to Hong Kong, exiting China that way.

If this is all too complicated, and you want to have everything locked in, you can simply make airplane arrangements to leave Peking for Tokyo the same way you come in. I am enclosing a sheet showing international air service to and from Peking, so just suit yourself.

The President's visit is still somewhat indefinite and so we've got to leave a small "escape hatch". Also there is a chance I could be called back on consultations, but I see no likelihood that Barbara will not be here. She is the sightseeing expert anyway.

We will try to work it that you and Skipper are our only guests at that time, but there could be another couple staying with us.

I'm sure this letter will bring to mind more questions, so please don't hesitate to send them along. Barbara will be in Kennebunkport starting August 1st for the entire month of August. Should you want to get hold of her there, her address is The Billows, Ocean Road, Kennebunkport, Maine, and her telephone number there is listed under my name.

We are looking forward to having you with us. I know you'll love Peking.

Dear George:

I got your letter of April 21. My only worry about the first half of September is that I may be in Washington for consultation then. How about the week starting September 15th? is that too late for you? The 7th through the 12th might be okay, but I will not know definitely whether I will be here for some time.

Suggestions, and answers to your questions:  
I would not plan to go to Taiwan on this same trip. If you do, you should have a separate passport. The Taiwan question is extremely sensitive here.

On exiting the PRC via Canton to Hong Kong, when you put in for your visa simply tell them you will come in via Tokyo and go out via Canton and Hong Kong. We can make the proposed train reservations here from Peking to Hong Kong. It is a fairly long trip, but a very interesting one.

On the official invitation, I will simply send you a letter of invitation which you should attach to your visa application. The visa application must be processed through the PRCLC, 2300 Connecticut Ave., N.W., Washington, D.C. To save time it might be well for you to write them now for a visa application.

There are no real cheap airline fares, except there is a package Air France 45-day excursion flight from New York to Paris and Peking and back. The price tag is around \$965.00 round trip tourist. I know of no package rates going from California west.

For communication in an emergency you can call Don Rhodes, who is living in our house in Washington: 966-6876 (home), 573-6730 (office).

Your letter of April 3rd arrived on April 18th and we were delighted to hear that "systems are go". We have pondered our calendar and now are prepared to give you our choice of dates. We would like to come the first week of September (1st through 6th) or the following week (7th through 12th), whichever is best for you. Please let us know so that we can make definite arrangements with Anne's employers (The Junior League) and flight reservations. Subject to your choice of these dates, we will leave either on August 23rd or August 30th, and visit some sights on the way, such as Japan, Taiwan or whatever. 
Dear Don:

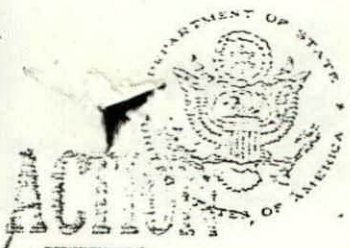

Dear Pete:

Good news about your visa. Barbara definitely will be gone for all of August. I'm trying to chisel out a couple of weeks in Maine at the end of August, but right now it looks like I'll be here on August 10, the day I assume you'll arrive in Peking.

First, I would love to have you and Brigid and young Brigid tuck right in in our house. It is not fancy, but I think you would enjoy it and it would give us an excellent chance to visit. Should my plans change, compelling me to leave Peking prior to your arrival, it would be very easy to rebook you for the hotel. Our whole staff at the house takes off when we do, so you would be much more comfortable at the hotel under those conditions. Inasmuch as the Chinese have welcomed you, you might want to ask the PRCLC very frankly whether there would be any problems on their end in having you stay with us. When one comes here under their auspices, they normally plan a full program and arrange every minute of every day; and so I would not want them to feel I was butting into arrangements they might have made for you.

If I read your letter correctly, you will only be in China a total of ten days. If that is all the time you've got, certainly half of it should be spent in Peking. Since time is so short, I would suggest the following: after leaving Peking, fly to Shanghai. It is less than a 2-hour flight non-stop. There you could request cultural performances, a Commune visit, seeing the Industrial Exhibition, touring the fascinating Children's Palace. I would think it might be better to do the Commune in Shanghai rather than in Peking, because there are so many historical sites here you should see.

If time permits, you should then request a train trip to either Soochow or Wushi.

On Sunday there is no plane from Shanghai to Tokyo, so you would have to come back to Peking in order to take Air France or Iran Air to Tokyo. Attached is an international

air service schedule that might be helpful to you.

In view of the shortness of time you will be in the PRC, I think you should settle for just Peking and Shanghai.

In terms of people to see, I will send you another letter shortly with suggestions of people in the financial circles you might request to see. It would be appropriate to tell the PRCLC in advance that "if convenient" you would like to call on the people I will suggest in my next letter.

We are delighted you are coming. I hope I'll be here. Don't bother bringing a racquet. We are fully equipped, thanks to Kendall; but we definitely can play.

Our plan is to leave New York on Friday, August 8th for Peking and after spending a few days there, see something of the rest of the country, planning to fly to Tokyo on the evening of Sunday, August 17th.

I had the good fortune of seeing your mother in Greenwich the other day, and she tells me that, alas, Barbara will not be in Peking in August. However, she tells me you will be there and that is good news for us. Needless to say, I would like very much to stop by and say hello and even, perhaps, play a game of tennis. I understand from Kendall you are now champion of the International Colony, so you may not be willing to play with the likes of me.

In your letter you said your office could be helpful in working on an itinerary. I wonder if you could ask them to do so on the assumption that we would spend whatever time is appropriate in Peking and a couple of days in Shanghai, doing whatever else they feel we might find interesting. If you can send me suggestions, I will then transmit them to the Travel Service.

I received your good letter of April 1st and I am delighted to know you will be in this part of the world. Please let me know what progress you have with your visa. I of course would like to be helpful.

Barbara will be gone for all of August, and there is now likelihood that I will be gone for some of August. If that isn't the case, I would love to have Brigid and your daughter and you stay with me here at our official residence. We have found that except for personal house guests we have no clout whatsoever when it comes to visas. If someone wants to come to China to travel, USLO hasn't been able to be helpful. Certainly if you get a visa, we would be delighted to be helpful with your itinerary. Clearly you should go to Shanghai, and then either Wu-hsi or Soochow, and also you would probably want to request Canton and Loyang.

If all else fails, and if I am in China, I think I could be helpful in arranging a visa for you to spend a few days sightseeing in Peking, but their visas are very restrictive and don't permit travel. They also don't permit calling on the Chinese here to talk business.



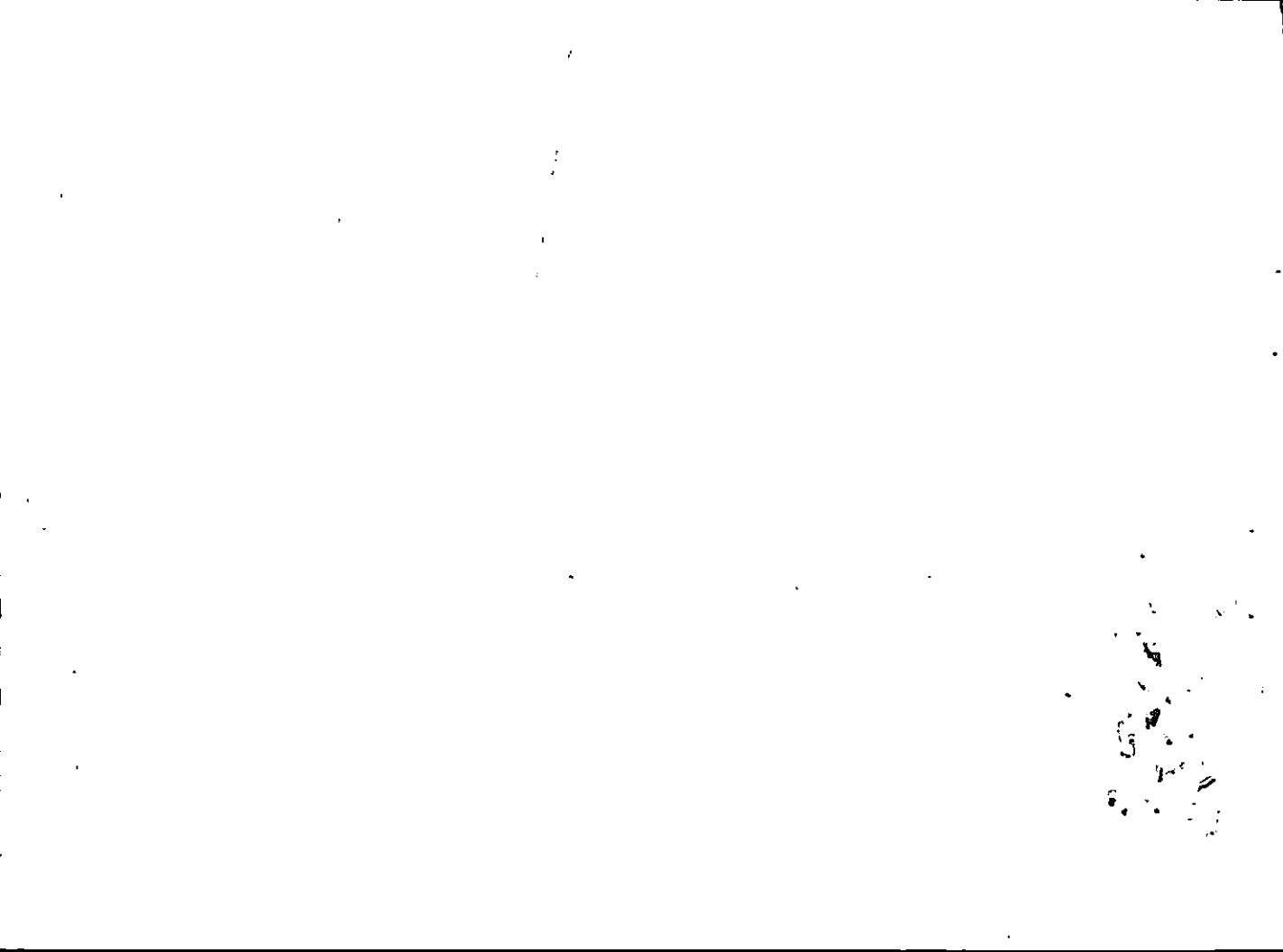

Dear Gregg,

Congratulations on the wonderful news. I am delighted for you and for Fitzie, who, in my opinion, is a very lucky girl.

Now about the summer. Jobs are out. There is just no way given the sensitivity of this post plus the budget restraints we are living under that we can work out anything in the job field. I wish it were very different.

As to visiting- we'd love it. Our kids will be filling our house to the brim until mid-July; but at that point we will have room and we are hoping you will decide to come on over. It will be quiet and peaceful and I guarantee you plenty of privacy, a place to think and to write, action on the courts, time at the seashore (6 hours by train from Peking) a chance to see this fabulous city with all its great historic places, and most fun a chance to observe as best a foreigner can how this place works.

Our plans are vague on the August end. I am trying to figure out how I can get to Maine for the last two weeks of August. It's vague now and unclear. Bar will probably go back earlier in August. I don't know what the ground rules are on guests being here with the host fleeing across the Atlantic so what this crazy letter boils down to is this: we'd love to have you come for about a month's visit commencing around Mid-July.

If from your point of view this long trip is worth it for this general game plan, here's what you do. Simply present the attached letter to the PRC Embassy there in London when you apply for a visa. It should work.

In coming here check with Air France and Pakistan Airline and Swissair. They all fly from Europe (indeed the US) into Peking. Air France has a 45 day excursion round trip USA to Peking and Back for \$950.00 ( It cost me one way first class \$1800 ) so check out these wierd specials.)

Air Iran is another line that flies into Peking just about empty and it's good.

The life here is pretty informal, so you won't need a lot of dress clothes ( no black tie ). It will probably be pretty warm then. The house has window air conditioners.

I will completely understand if the above schedule is too short or too vague. The door is open here - let me know your thinking and we can firm things up.

Again my heartiest congratulations.

Be sure to take the attached letter to the Embassy when you apply. Visas are almost impossible without such a letter. It is a question of limited hotel, interpreter, and travel facilities. Please do not make wide mention of the invitation at this point - we are deluged with 'help us on our visa' letters and we simply can't handle them all.

Dear Mr. Bush,

By now I expect you are back in Peking. Mother wrote that, in reading a news account of your visit to Washington, she saw that you had entered Bethesda Naval Hospital for what she thought was a check-up. But in a recent International Herald Tribune article concerning the possible up-grading of Sino-American diplomatic relations, I read that you had contracted a severe intestinal virus and had lost twenty pounds. If you were ill, I certainly hope the sickness was not as agonizing as it sounds and that you are now recovered.

Life in Oxford continues happily. My work is progressing. The various elements of the life here which I described in my letter before Christmas remain remarkable features particularly when contrasted with aspects of life at the White House or the Hudson Institute. I am having a fine time.

But I was glad to return home for Christmas, for the long vacation in the United States was highlighted by my becoming engaged. The girl I am to marry is a most marvelous individual by the name of Fitzie (for Fitzgerald), Grogan. We met at Harvard where she was a year behind me. She grew up in Boston and has been working in New York for the last year and a half. We will be married in Cambridge on September 27th. Next year we will live here in Oxford. If by remote chance you and Mrs. Bush are to be in the United States in the early fall, I would love for you to come to the wedding.

We chose a wedding date of late September because of my enormous interest in and hope of spending part of the summer with you. I remember your telling me that employment in China might pose a problem, but that you would have a feel for the situation by about this time. If employment is a possibility, as I hope that it is, it may make a difference that my "top secret" clearance is still active, because of my continued relationship with the Hudson Institute. But as we discussed in New York, if employment as a temporary State Department member is unrealistic, I am equally eager and delighted to come on my own. If my coming

to China unofficially is more reasonable, I will be in the middle of writing an interesting political philosophy thesis, so I would have plenty to keep me quietly busy, stay out of your way, and be anything but bored. But my tennis rackets are strung and ready for action!

Obviously I am anxious to hear from you. Practically speaking, and all of this presupposes that I can find housing that does not impose on you and your family, I would come from London arriving toward the middle of July. The length of stay would depend on your point of view. At the latest I would depart toward the end of August, because I should be home about the first of September in order to be helpful with the wedding preparations.

A week or so ago I wrote Pat Moynihan a letter. He was my thesis advisor at Harvard and we have maintained a friendship since then. I regretted not visiting with him in the United States. When I returned here on January 20th he had not yet returned from India via China. But I did say that "I would have loved to have listened to the conversations between you and Ambassador Bush, for you are two of the very finest men I have known." For this and many reasons, spending time with you this summer in China would be such a valuable and interesting personal experience and something for which I would be very grateful.

Please give my best regards to Mrs. Bush.
