Florence,

John Gordon asked me to look into the request by Tom Neal of Cubic Corp to set up a meeting for Admiral Lee Baggett with General Scowcroft to talk about sales of aircraft combat maneuvering instrumentation (ACMI). I've called around and found out the following:

- There is no issue of contention between Defense and State concerning ACMI sales. Dick Clarke worked on this issue while at State and assures me that sales of ACMI through FMS does not place excessive restraints on sales and allows Defense to protect critical technologies.

- Defense has communicated to concerned congressmen that it is not opposed to the sale of ACMI hardware, but the associated software is classified. There is some reluctance by Navy and Air Force aviation officials about releasing knowledge of warfighting capabilities that give U.S. aircrews a decisive edge in modern air combat. However, Defense has undertaken a review of its sales policies with regards to ACMI and stated that it feels that it can meet the concerns raised to keep U.S. industry competitive in this area. (I can send you a copy of Undersecretary Atwood's letter, if desired).

It appears that both State and Defense are alert to this issue, have communicated with Congress on it, and are taking appropriate steps to deal with Cubic Corp's concerns. I see no reason for General Scowcroft to meet with Admiral Baggett at this time.

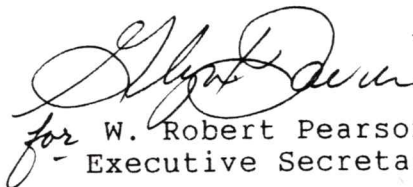

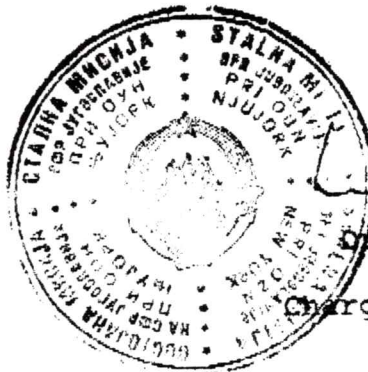

Dear Mr. Secretary:

The London Conference was a turning point for the peace process in Yugoslavia, and now we have taken action on delivering deeds.

On August 17, 1992, I forwarded to you a plan of what we were going to do. Now we can see what has actually been accomplished.

Enclosed is a brief account of what my government has done.

In light of this list of deeds, I formally request you consider these results during the deliberations at the United Nations on the current state of affairs in Yugoslavia.

Please accept the assurances of my highest consideration.

**NOTES CONCERNING THE STEPS TAKEN TO FULFILL THE REQUIREMENTS
OF THE U.N. SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION 752**

ITEMS OF THE RESOLUTION:

STEPS TAKEN:

1. Request for halting the fighting and observance of the cease-fire of 12 April 1992

Prime Minister of the FR Yugoslavia, Mr. Milan Panic, visited Bosnia and Herzegovina three times. He publically called on the representatives of the Moslem, Croatian and Serbian peoples to stop all fighting and to observe the cease-fire immediately.

According to the Agreement between Karadzic and UNPROFOR, observers have been already deployed on 11 sites around Sarajevo, where the heavy weapons of the Bosnian Serbs are stationed.

2. Constitutional order of Bosnia and Herzegovina -- continuation of negotiations among the three national communities in Bosnia and Herzegovina within the framework of the European Community.

Prime Minister Panic called upon the representatives of all three peoples, Karadzic, Boban and Izetbegovic, to negotiate under the auspices of the European Community (Ambassador Cutileiro) on the constitutional order of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Prime Minister Panic stated that Yugoslavia has no territorial claims towards anybody, including Bosnia and Herzegovina.

He is opposed to changing borders by force.

3. Request for the non-interference in the withdrawal of the military forces from Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Pursuant to Prime Minister Panic's order, all units of the Yugoslav Army have been pulled out of Bosnia. The last of 92 Yugoslav soldiers were withdrawn recently. General Nambiar informed the U.N. Security Council accordingly.

4. "

By order of the Yugoslav Government, the border between the FRY and B/H has been supervised so as to avoid any military interference and movement of

para-military units whatsoever.

Prime Minister Panic has repeatedly invited the U.N. to send observers to control all military airfields in Yugoslavia and border crossings between Yugoslavia and Bosnia.

5. Disbanding all para-military units.

Prime Minister Panic has called for the disbanding of all para-military units in Bosnia and Herzegovina. His intervention resulted in the arrest of 80 persons by Serbian authorities in Bosnia.

6. Request for the discontinuation of the violent resettlement of the population.

Prime Minister Panic has strongly opposed ethnic cleansing of territories. Six persons have already been arrested in Hrtkovci (Serbia), under the suspicion that they have been involved in ethnic cleansing (Ostoja Sibincic, President of the Local Community, and others).

On August 30, 1992, the Government of the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia intervened and prevented the forcible resettlement of the population at Kozarac in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Prime Minister Panic dismissed the Assistant Federal Secretary for the Interior, Kertes, for opposing government policy on ethnic cleansing.

7. & 8. Urgent need for providing humanitarian need, material and financial, above all to refugees and displaced persons and ensuring conditions for their return home.

The government of the FR Yugoslavia urged the authorities of Bosnian Serbs:

- a) To stop shelling Sarajevo
- b) To open Sarajevo Airport for the delivery of humanitarian aid.
- c) To secure the Split-Sarajevo road passing through the regions controlled by the Bosnian Serbs.

The government of the FR Yugoslavia

has offered free and unlimited use of the Belgrade Airport as well as all its facilities for the supply of aid by air via Yugoslavia to Bosnia. Prime Minister Panic met with Prime Minister of Croatia, Greguric, in Budapest (on 7 August 1992). The result of that meeting was the mutual exchange of 1500 prisoners according to the principle "all for all."

The Government of FRY asked the authorities of the Bosnian Serbs to carry out the exchange of war prisoners with the principle "all for all."

At London Prime Minister Panic had a meeting with the representatives of the Albanians from Kosovo (Rugova). He invited them to participate in the political, economic and cultural life of the Republic and assured them of his full and active support for their civil and human rights. The Prime Minister personally provided the bulk of the financing for a Doctors of the World vaccination program for 170,000 children in Kosovo.

The federal government has adopted and maintained a cooperative relationship with UNPROFOR.

Prime Minister Panic obtained the release to the custody of the American Embassy of two American mercenaries who had been taken prisoner by the Yugoslav Army while fighting in the ranks of the Croatian Army.

The Yugoslav government formally recognized independent Slovenia on August 12.

MINUTES OF THE TENTH ANNUAL MEETING
OF
THE GERALD R. FORD FOUNDATION

June 3, 1991

Capitol Hill Club

Washington, D. C.

The tenth annual meeting of the Members and Trustees of the Gerald R. Ford Foundation, a nonprofit Michigan Corporation (hereafter referred to as "the Foundation") convened at the Capitol Hill Club, Washington, D. C. on June 3, 1991, pursuant to written notice to the Trustees dated and mailed April 16, 1991.

Chairman Martin J. Allen, Jr. called the meeting of the Members and Trustees (hereafter referred to as "the Board") to order at 4:15 p.m. Secretary Warner reported that a quorum was present and circulated a memorandum of attendance. The Chairman then directed the Secretary to record the names of those who were present:

Donald W. Wilson, Archivist of the United States, and Frank H. Mackaman, Director of The Gerald Ford Library and Museum were present as Ex Officio members of the Board. Jim Kratsas of the Ford Museum also attended.

The Chairman called for additions or corrections to the Minutes. There being none, the Minutes were approved.

Election of Members and Trustees

The Secretary read the list of Trustees of the Class of 1991. These were Richard Cheney, Richard M. DeVos, Max Fisher, Steven M. Ford, George Grassmuck, Robert T. Hartmann, Robert L. Hooker, Richard G. Katzenbach, Thomas E. Kauper, Lawrence B. Lindemer, Paul O'Neill, Brent Scowcroft, William E. Simon, Jay Van Andel, Frank Zarb. President Ford moved election of the Class of 1991 to three-year terms ending in 1994. Seconded by Justice Griffin and passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report and Proposed Budget

The Chair called upon John Baab, Treasurer, to review the financial status of the Foundation. Mr. Baab reported that the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 1990 had been audited by Arthur Andersen and a "clean opinion" was received. Mr. Baab presented his Treasurer's Report (attached) showing the budget approved for July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991 and the actual expenditures from July 1, 1990 to March 31, 1991. The Treasurer noted again that despite some paid obligations the budget would end with a surplus in excess of \$300,000 which would be applied to the principal of the Foundation. Chairman Allen reminded the Board again that by previous Board action expenditures could not exceed income. President Ford and Chairman Allen thanked the Treasurer for his report. Justice Griffin moved acceptance for the Treasurer's report and adoption of the budget for the current year. Motion was seconded by Trustee Hartmann and passed unanimously.

Program Committee: Terrence O'Donnell

Mr. O'Donnell reported on the highly successful Colloquium held in Ann Arbor in April commemorating the Tenth Anniversary of the Ford Library. He noted that University President James Duderstadt had opened the Colloquium before an overflow crowd. The theme of the conference was "German Reunification, the Atlantic Alliance, and American Foreign Policy." The program had been organized under the leadership of George Grassmuck who chaired the panel which featured a keynote address by William Highland. The panel produced lively discussion in a real positive atmosphere. Chairman Allen noted that he had attended and felt that the program was extremely successful and could be a model for other similar kinds of activities. He especially noted the diversity of the audience - a good mix of students, faculty and townspeople. Mr. O'Donnell said that plans are already underway for next year's colloquium which will again be held in the spring.

He pointed out that the last William E. Simon Lecture was held on January 30, 1991 and plans were progressing for the next one to be held in Ann Arbor in the Fall or early next year. At this time Chairman Allen asked President Ford to comment on the possible speaker. President Ford noted that negotiations with former Prime Minister Thatcher had not produced a commitment and he therefore

proposed for discussion President Havels of Czechoslovakia as the speaker. The Board responded very positively. It was agreed that the best time for such a lecture would be in October or January and the President Ford would use Ambassador Shirley Temple Black to initiate the contact.

Continuing his report, Mr. O'Donnell noted that \$35,000 had been supplied by the Foundation to mount a series of exhibits in the Museum. In addition to two short-term exhibits, Foundation funds were spent to design and fabricate a feature exhibition, "Hobbies of Presidents". Mr. O'Donnell also reported on upcoming exhibits ranging from a collection of Pat Oliphant's editorial cartoons to "Entertaining in Style," an exhibit about state dinners and entertainment in the White House.

Mr. O'Donnell concluded his report by citing a modest increase in Museum attendance (up 2% in FY 90 to a total of 82,043) following two years of double-digit declines.

Awards and Grants Committee

Chairman Allen asked Trustee Thomas Kauper to report for the Awards and Grants Committee in the absence of Brent Scowcroft. Mr. Kauper reported the Committee had met twice and had awarded the full \$20,000 for research grants to 17 different individuals representing a wide variety of institutions. The Committee was pleased with the quality of the applications, which was a stronger group this year. He said the funds for this activity were sufficient for the time being and recommended that the funding for the program should be continued at its present level.

Mr. Kauper reported there had been 19 applications for the Gerald R. Ford Prize for Distinguished Reporting on National Defense and 9 nominees for the Gerald R. Ford Prize for Distinguished Reporting on the Presidency. Receiving the \$5,000 cash awards were James Kitfield, writing for Government Executive, and Susan L. Page of Newsday for her writing on the Presidency. Trustee Marsh raised the issue that there is a considerable difference between those writing for the daily press and those contributing for monthly or bi-monthly publications with the latter having an advantage. Chairman Allen noted that a similar topic had been discussed by the Executive Committee and that the matter would be examined by Director Mackaman who would prepare recommendations on the subject.

Development/Endowment Committee: Robert Hooker

Trustee Hooker reported that the issue of last year's Board Meeting concerning \$1,000,000 of endowment being handled by the University of Michigan had been resolved. He noted that correspondence had been exchanged between Chairman Allen, President Ford and the President of the University of Michigan. University President Duderstadt agreed upon the University's commitment to the

\$1,000,000 endowment and perpetuity. This exchange has resolved the issue satisfactorily. Mr. Hooker stated that the University's endowment was providing approximately \$60,000 annual income.

He then turned to the subject of additional endowment needs. At this time Mr. Hooker was joined by Mr. Barrett in summarizing the discussions of the Executive Committee earlier in the afternoon and the new goals for the Foundation. They noted that while the government would continue its support for the major operating activities of the Museum and the Library, there is still need by the Foundation to fund important enhancements for the Institution. A major need, for example, is \$2,000,000 to rehabilitate and renew the permanent exhibits which have now been in place for 10 years. Other needs will most surely arise in the future which would require additional funding beyond those funds supplied by Federal appropriation. The Executive Committee recommended a \$7,500,000 fund raising goal which would increase the endowment principal by \$5,500,000 and an additional \$2,000,000 to renovate the permanent exhibits. Trustee Barrett proposed a goal of 24 months. He noted that this was a propitious time in which to raise such a fundraising effort with former Ford Administration officials and friends currently serving in very high positions in government. He would see the program focusing on a selected potential donor pool of approximately 50 persons, many of whom would be capable of contributing \$150,000 or more. The Board unanimously accepted the Executive Committee's recommendation to raise \$7,500,000.

Tenth Anniversary Celebration - Robert Barrett

Trustee Robert Barrett outlined plans for the Tenth Anniversary Celebration of the Museum which will occur on September 5, 6, and 7 of 1991. The major theme of the program would be the changes that have taken place in Europe and would include prospective participants former West German Chancellor Schmidt and former British Prime Minister Callaghan. Also a feature of the event would be a dedication of a large section of the Berlin Wall which had been donated to the Museum by Frederik Meijer. Trustee Barrett said that the plan would be to try to bring about a reunion of the Ford Cabinet at this time, and that appropriate social events were being developed both for former officials of the Ford Administration and for the general public in Grand Rapids. He outlined various possibilities for entertainment and other activities to make this a memorable and exciting event.

Archivist of the United States: Don Wilson

Don Wilson brought the group up-to-date on the theme he enunciated last year of the public/private partnership as it relates to Presidential Libraries. He reported that negotiations had been initiated with the Senate Appropriation's Committee for the Presidential Libraries. He noted that libraries were working together very cooperatively and his special committee of representatives from all the libraries had actively assisted him in

this cooperative endeavor. He indicated that the National Archives itself was considering establishing a membership foundation which he saw as assisting all the Presidential Libraries. For example, private fundraising efforts had already succeeded in bringing about \$1,300,000 for a World War II Exhibit which would travel to all the Presidential Libraries, including the Ford Museum. He emphasized that, whereas he saw no likelihood of the government ever abandoning its basic support for the Presidential Libraries, there would be an ongoing need for enrichment beyond what Federal appropriations could provide. For libraries to excel they will need their own foundations to make this possible.

He noted that important additions had occurred in the presidential library system with the Reagan Library becoming operational with its dedication on November 4th and the decision of President Bush to locate his library on the campus of Texas A & M. Archivist Wilson's remarks led to some discussion of the clarification of the government's role in exhibit funding and suggestions of Trustees O'Neill, Marsh, Seidman on various possible exhibit themes reflecting the Ford Administration's pioneering work on spearheading technology developments of great usefulness in the recent gulf war. Chairman Allen thanked Archivist Wilson for his report.

Director's Report: Frank Mackaman

Mr. Mackaman distributed a report (attached) summarizing key measures of performance: collections development, collections processing, reference, museum use, and budget. Among the highlights, he mentioned the following: 661 collection solicitation contacts yielding 20 new collections and more than two dozen commitments; 70% of collections processed, with 110 collections described in a unique computer database; more than 1000 researchers in the current year with four months to go; an increase in Museum attendance; and, strong budget support in the appropriated and trust funds.

Election of Officers

Philip Buchen, Chair of the Nominating Committee, nominated Martin J. Allen, Jr. as Chairman; Michael G. Ford, as Vice Chairman; Robert M. Warner, as Secretary; and John G. Baab, as Treasurer. He moved that the rules be suspended and the slate of officers elected. The motion was seconded by Frank Zarb and approved unanimously.

The Chair then asked the Secretary to introduce the following resolutions:

Resolved:

That the following named officers and Trustees shall constitute and they are hereby designated as the Executive Committee of this Corporation:

Martin J. Allen, Jr., Michael G. Ford, Robert M. Warner, John G. Baab, Robert E. Barrett, Richard A. Ford, Robert P. Griffin, and Peter F. Secchia.

Resolved Further:

That except as limited by law, the Executive Committee between meetings of the Board of Trustees shall possess and be authorized to exercise the power and authority of the Board.

Secretary Warner moved adoption of the resolutions, President Ford seconded and they passed unanimously.

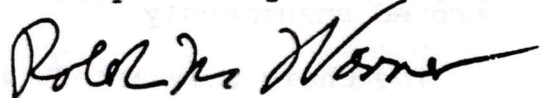
President Ford: Remarks

President Ford, on behalf of himself and Betty Ford, thanked all those present for their attendance at the meeting and for their strong support of the Foundation. He strongly endorsed the proposal to double the Foundation's principal through a vigorous fundraising effort. He emphasized that such action was essential and important for the long-term health and wellbeing of the Institution. He reported on his great pleasure with the progress in securing additional papers for the Gerald R. Ford Library. He urged all those present and other participants in the Ford Administration to seriously consider presenting their papers to the Library or copies of them as this is important for future generations to have the Administration fully documented and the record of achievement known in this important way. He cited the example of William E. Simon who had copies of his papers made for deposit in the Ford Library. President Ford thanked the Chairman and the Officers of the Foundation and all of its members for their work during the past year.

There being no further business Chairman Allen announced the meeting adjourned at 5:10 p.m.

Note A - During 1986, The University of Michigan set aside a \$1,000,000 endowment fund and committed to make the income from the fund available to the Foundation in perpetuity. The University retains control over the fund, and, as such, the fund is not reflected in assets of the Foundation. The income received from the fund (approximately \$60,000 annually) has been reflected as contribution income.

Note B - Investment income during the nine months ended March 31, 1991 includes \$52,032 which reflects gain on a zero-coupon bond which matured during the period. In the budget for the year ending June 30, 1992, \$49,488 of investment income will result from the maturity of another zero-coupon bond during the period.

Note C - The Foundation expended \$100,000 of designated funds for the purpose of sponsoring a Group of Four Conference which was held in England in February, 1990. The unused portion of these funds (\$40,761) was returned in the current year and is available for other Foundation expenditures.

Note D - During 1991, Fred Meijer donated \$15,000 to fund the gift of a section of the Berlin Wall to the Museum.

Note E - Certain actual expenditures vary from budgeted amounts due to the timing of when invoices were submitted for payment (i.e., expensed when paid under the cash basis of accounting rather than when accrued).

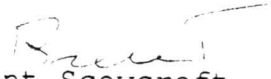
