Further, in order to receive the benefits of the Act in question, she must have occupied the status toward a particular deceased member of the military or naval forces "for the year prior to the commencement of his services in such forces".

The records indicate that the late Private John M. Dallas was 25 years of age when he enlisted in the Army for service during the World War and as there is a positive showing that the soldier in question was not incapacitated either mentally or physically at the time of his entry into the military service, it is not possible for his sister to have stood in loco parentis to him for the year immediately preceding the commencement of his service in the Army. Accordingly, it does not appear that the relationship of mother within the meaning of the Act has been established.

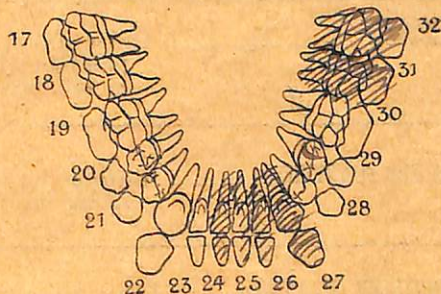
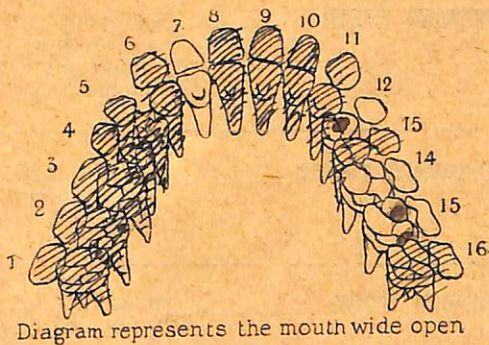

An examination should be made and findings charted to cover the following basic conditions: Lost teeth, crowned teeth, bridge work, fillings, caries (cavities of decay), dentures (plates), and any deformity of jaws found.
