

8 steps of the "Path"

- 1. Faith
- 2. Excellence
- 3. Knowledge
- 4. Self-control
- 5. Perseverance
- 6. Godliness
- 7. Brotherly affection
- 8. Unselfish love

Perseverance is when we choose to trust God in every test, temptation, and trial

Godliness is when we work to align our character, ethics, worldview, and thought patterns with Christ

Be careful!

- ① neglect \rightarrow drift \rightarrow
- ② unbelief / disobedience >
 fall away / forsake (apostasy)
- ③ apathy → rejection of Jesus and disqualification or death
- 4 deliberate, willful rejection > loss of everything except eternal salvation

Hebrews 12:1-3

- A "witness" is someone who gives a testimony.
 These may not have died for their faith, but they died in faith and in hope.
- They haven't yet received what God promised because God is still waiting for others to believe in Jesus and join the family.

Hebrews 12:1-3

Look at the parallels

- We have a race set before us,
 so we should persevere through our troubles,
 laying aside whatever would hold us down
- Jesus had joy set before him, so he endured (persevered) the cross and hostility, disregarding the shame

Hebrews 12:1-3

• Jesus is called the "pioneer" of our faith, the same word as in 2:10. "Perfecter" means "the one who brings it to completion." It's like other phrases: beginning/end, alpha/omega, first/last that we see in the Revelation.

Hebrews 12:4-6

- Just a reminder of what they were going through.
 It hadn't come to executions yet, but those were probably expected.
- BUT...the writer said that they were forgetting the bigger picture

Hebrews 12:4-6

- Not every bad situation is from God, but don't automatically dismiss that option
- Sometimes God uses terrible things for instruction/correction, discipline, or punishment

Hebrews 12:7-11

- Here's the perspective: if you don't know why it's happening, accept it as if it were God trying to teach you something
- Don't think of "discipline" as bad. It's a part of training. If earthly fathers did that in their imperfect way and we can accept it, how much more should we accept it from our Perfect Father?

Hebrews 12:12-13

 These imperatives are plural—commands for the community to strengthen those who have fallen and prep the way for them to come back (Galatians 6:1-2)

Questions

- 1. How do I respond to tests, temptations, and trials—especially when I don't always know which it is?
- 2. Who am I helping come back to strength, so they don't fall away?
- 3. Who is in my cloud of witnesses that I can point to as an example of perseverance?

Hebrews 10:32-34

- Their connection to the Christian faith was affecting their daily lives.
- They thought they were willing to trade in their "better and lasting possession" for temporary, earthly possessions and relationships.
- They were honestly questioning if Christianity was worth what it was costing them. But in doing so they forgot what it really cost—Jesus' life.

Hebrews 10:35-36

- Chapter 11 will look at past heroes who didn't fall away, but the writer said to look at our own pasts first.
- Choosing to turn away from Jesus is called throwing away one's confidence. It's basically saying, "I can't trust God anymore."
- God's promise is worth my perseverance

Hebrews 10:37-39

 Jesus will return as promised and right on time and that those who remain faithful will be rewarded, while the unfaithful will face God's disappointment

Hebrews 10:37-39

- "shrink back" refers to a state of timidity
- "perish" can mean eternal destruction, waste, or ruin
- "preserve" can mean security or some kind of gain or possession
- "soul" means the spiritual part of a person every time in Hebrews

Hebrews 10:39

• It can mean "shrink back to eternal destruction... have faith and preserve their souls."

• It can also mean "live as the timid resulting in a wasted life... live from faith resulting in preservation and possession of our spiritual lives."

Question

Can we — will we — find total sufficiency in Christ alone or will we waste our lives and lose everything he designed us for?
